Welcome to the Oldham Bears for our first Saturday evening spot in front of the Sky cameras. With the Baywatch series at an end they should have a good audience! Our clashes ended all square last season, both matches being closely fought affairs. Oldham opened our campaign and we had to stage another comeback to clinch the 28-22 home win. The visitors held a 12 point lead into the second half, and as at the time we were down to eleven men, with two in the sin bin, things looked somewhat gloomy. However a touchdown to Tony Smith sparked the revival which was completed in the 77th minute with an eighty yard try from Simon Middleton. At the Watersheddings we found Martin Crompton in form and although we led for a while Oldham stuck to their task and a great break by Gary Lord set up their winning try. Right at the beginning of the Centenary season Oldham were upfront about their intentions, they were looking ahead to Superleague and that season was seen as part of their preparations. In the first forty minutes of their opening Superleague fixture it looked as if their plans had gone horribly wrong as Champions Wigan ran them


gradually turning things around.
Although the match was all but lost they knuckled down in the second half against Wigan and then followed that by taking three points from their Easter fixtures. An impressive 34-22 victory over Halifax was followed by a tight struggle in Paris with the French side coming back to thwart the Bears and snatch a draw. Last week Oldham entertained Leeds and maintained their run of form with a notable victory which has left

the Loiners struggling near the foot of the table.

The Oldham squad has been changed around a lot over the past couple of years since their return to the top flight in 1993, coach Andy

Goodway having assembled a very solid looking outfit which has a good mix of Aussies, South Sea Islanders and home talent. Strong running full back Paul Atcheson is a Welsh international who cost Oldham £50,000 when they recruited him from Wigan. He is a powerful player who can take a lot of stopping on attack. Tongan Afi Leuila has proved himself an uncompromising winger and showed against Wigan on day one that he has respect for reputations. He came from New Zealand but has also played in Australia with North

Queensland. Local product Adrian Belle is a determined runner but he faces competition in the threequarters from Aussie capture Andrew Patmore. A former Junior Kangaroo, Patmore is a strong pacy runner. Darren Abram has topped the Oldham try scoring charts for the past three seasons. A Thatto Heath product. Abram rose to prominence with Rochdale and is an often underestimated opponent. The same can be said of utility back Paul Topping. The former Swinton and Leigh player is reliable in a range of positions and a very strong tackler. Another winger, Rob Myler, has had bad luck with injuries and is again an absentee at present Francis Maloney is a much travelled stand off who is also a very reliable goal kicker. Maloney is a dangerous attacker who has won GB U-21 honours. His professional career started at Leeds before a switch to Featherstone, where he was very highly rated, then 12 months with Warrington before a £50,000 move to the Watersheddings. Captain Martin Crompton is one of the games top scrum halves and a matchwinner. He started out with top amateur outfit Wigan St Pats before turning professional at Warrington, but was to return to Wigan to join the Central Park outfit. Competition was tough though and Crompton was allowed to leave for a bargain £35,000, a fee Oldham can't ever have regretted paying. Another former Wigan man is hard working prop lan Gildart. A GB

Last month's news that the Challenge Cup will continue to be played in the spring has been widely welcomed. Few players or fans wanted to change the habits of a lifetime, and a trip to Wembley at the end of April, when the nights are growing shorter and a young man's fancy turns to London beer, is far more attractive than a journey down to the smoke in the Autumn, when there's a nip in the air and spirits aren't quite so high.

One group which may be having second thoughts, though, is the Second Division clubs. More than a few struggled against amateur opposition in the 1996 competition, with Highfield and York going out to West Hull, Chorley toppling at the hands of Thatto Heath, and Heworth seeing victory at Bramley snatched from them in the dying seconds. Others gave good accounts of themselves, including Skirlaugh at Hunslet, and the thought occurs that, from next season, the gap could be narrowed even more because the professional clubs, from now on, will be going into the competition 'cold' whereas the ama-

teurs will have had a good half season under their belts and should be close to reaching their peak. Even as it stands now, there is little to choose between many of the players at top amateur clubs and those in the Second Division. Where the pros have the advantage is that they tend to have one or two players out on the park who are a cut above anything the opposition has to offer. That advantage has carried a few outfits through difficult games, and saved what would have been huge blushes. But, from next year, none of the professionals will have played serious rugby for several months. and no matter how hard pre season training might have been, there is nothing to compare with matches to provide full fitness.

So, while the pros will still be feeling their way, the amateur clubs, and they will be top clubs, and used to winning, will be operating at their smoothest level, their defensive patterns well-honed, their moves practised and perfected in match conditions, and their players hungry for the glory which only victory in the Challenge Cup can bring. The prospects of upsets may be fur-

ther increased if the calls for the seeded draw, where the amateurs cannot be drawn at home to be replaced by an open draw are heeded. If Division Two clubs struggle against amateur clubs at home, they are likely to find the task even harder if called upon to play away. Indeed, it could be that even First Division or Super League clubs would struggle if handed the task of taking on the likes of Woolston. Skirlaugh, Ellenborough or Wigan St Judes in January or February. If the scenario does develop, it can only be the good of the game, even though teams knocked out by the amateurs would disagree. There is nothing like a giant killing act to attract the attention of the media and the public and as Rugby League becomes ever more predictable on the field, we might as well all pack in if Cup upsets were to become a thing of the past. One things for sure, the new found advantage of the amateurs can only add extra spice to the Challenge Cup. And it may even create a situation were professional clubs will be secretly hoping for a draw against other professional opposition.





LEADING SCORERS

Danny Arnold of St. Helens celebrated his 19th birthday yesterday (Monday) as the first tryscorer to reach double figures in the Stones Super League. The winger has scored in all four Stones Super League matches with a sequence of 4 - 3 - 2- 1. He has also scored four in two Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties to make him the clear leader in all matches this season with 14.

Club colleague Paul Newlove is second with 12 in all matches. The only other player into double figures is Second Division Hull Kingston Rovers centre Rob D'Arcy with 10.

St. Helens scrum-half Bobbie Goulding heads the other two charts with 109 points from 55 goals, including a drop goal. Thirty of Goulding's goals have been scored in Super League.

POINTSCORING RUN

Steve Blakeley of Salford Reds has

taken over as the player with the longest pointscoring run after Chris Wilkinson missed Leigh Centurions' match at Hunslet Hawks because of suspension. The stand-off has scored in 23 successive matches, starting with eight goals and a try in the 48-20 First Division win at Huddersfield on 17 September 1995. The Stones Super League player with the best pointscoring run is Wigan's Henry Paul who has scored in 15 successive Cup and League matches, starting with four goals and a try in the 32-18 home defeat of Halifax on 13 December 1995.

WINNING RUN

St. Helens have the longest winning run, having won all eight matches this season - four Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties and four Stones Super League matches. Their last defeat was 32-24 at Halifax in their final Centenary Championship match on 21 January 1996.

LOSING RUN

Workington Town and Chorley share the longest losing run of seven matches, stretching back to last season. MILESTONES

Having been asked several times over the years for my views on a Castleford Rugby League Hall of Fame, I have always maintained that Club appearances should be the chief qualification, taking preference over International and County appearances. There are 19 players with 300 or more 1st team appearances, with a further 13 players with 250 for more appear-

Looking through the various statistics I now feel that the length of service should also be taken into consideration, as in the case of my next player to feature in the list, Jim (Ginger) or James Morgan Crossley, to give him his full name. Jim's 261 appearance would obviously rule him out of a Hall of Fame for those players with 300 or more appearances, but his playing career with Castleford lasted 16 seasons, his appearances being limited by his War time service, and the fact that Castleford did not field a team in the 1942/3 and 1943/4 season, and I feel that these should be taken into account, when creating a club Hall of Fame. Jim made his 1st team debut at the age of 18 in the 2nd row v Huddersfield at Wheldon Road, Saturday 3rd March 1933. and quite a coincidence that also making his debut was Bernard Cunniffe, who along with Jim are the only survivors of Castleford's 1935 Wembley Cup Final. Jim has the distinction of being the only Castleford player to play in that first

Castleford Challenge Cup Final and also to play in Castleford's first Yorkshire Cup Final v Bradford Northern at Headingley. Saturday 30th. December 1948. He was also the last

player from the 1935 Final to cease playing, his last match being at Dewsbury Saturday 23rd April 1949. Altogether he made 261 appearances, scoring 23 tries 6 goals and 2 drop goals a total of 85 points. All but one of his 261 games were in the forwards, 2nd row prop and loose forward and not many supporters will remember that his other game was at stand off half at Oldham, Saturday 27 September 1941. Not the biggest of forwards, Jim was feared but respected by his opponents and along side Frank Smith formed a dynamic 2nd row being a household name for many years in Rugby League Football, I well remember being looked after by those two when I made my 1st team debut at scrum half at York, Easter Monday, 18th April 1938. His long service with Castleford is only equalled by Arthur Atkinson with 16 seasons, and bettered by John Joyner with 20 seasons, all three of them giving great service to Castleford.

After his playing days were over Jim was appointed 'A' team Coach and in the 1950/51 season his team won the Yorkshire Senior Competition Cup, beating Halifax 20-2 in the Final.

A few years ago Jim was made a Life

BIG screen Rugby League makes its Wheldon Road debut today, writes Nigel Brookes, the Yorkshire Evening Post's Mandown-the-lane.

And, having seen simultaneous screening in action at Thrum Hall the other day, I have to say that despite enormous misgivings, I now think it's a great idea. I very much feared that somehow, the giant screen would distract the fans from what was happening on the field of play, but if the Halifax encounter is anything to go by, nothing could be further from the truth. Well into the second half there was a serious Halifax tilt for a try up the right hand touch-line. Every man Jack (or Jill) in the main stand was on his or her feet in an instant, craning their collective necks to see the outcome of the duel between runner and tackler.

Not one person (it seemed fo me) scorned the real thing to look at the screen, where the view of the proceedings would have been magnificent!
When the dust had settled, it was a different matter altogether, eyes switched to the instant replay for a re-run of the action. Of course, it's all early days yet and there is plenty of time for things to go wrong, but the big screen appeared to me to add to the game rather than to distract from it.

From the way the crowd behaved at Halifax, I don't see the screen, despite the pin-sharp images it shows, preventing people from concentrating on the "live" game taking shape before them.

The screen will only ever be a fall-back, I believe, for fans.

Referees, some say, should trust their own judgement and not rely on the screen as an aid to them in making their decisions in hairline matters.

Having seen the idea working, I can't agree ... well not whole-heartedly.




While on one hand it seems ridiculous that an official should not make use of up-to-date technology in deciding a knife-edge issue, it must not be overdone. Using the screen to resolve things when the hand has been quicker than the eye is not just fair enough, it is a good thing. But refs must be very careful that they do not dilute their authority by referring to the replay when they should make their own minds up.

The big danger is, though, that the fans will come to expect a big screen at every match and I daren't even contemplate what such screens might cost, let alone the three or four commercial quality instant replay machines, plus at least half a dozen high resolution cameras and at least half a dozen highly skilled operators.





John Smith's Tackle Count TOP FIVE TACKLERS SO FAR


