The players want you all to know that they were helped through the hardest moments of that classic game against the Bradford Bulls by your support. You are an important part of the team. And that is why we have dedicated that famous victory to the St Helens fans.

You have been very patient and loyal through some very disappointing days after Wembley defeats and we hope that this, at least in part, makes up for some

of those times.

Now Shaun and the boys are back in harness for the Super League and we shall see today against the Oldham Bears, who have proved that they are nobody's easy touch since the start of the summer season, yet another tough League battle. Let's hope that last Saturday's win has inspired the


team to think in terms of bringing more trophies back to Knowsley Road.

his afternoon's visitors Oldham have made a most encouraging start to Super League. Under one of Britains best young coaches Andy Goodway, the Bears have won three and drawn one of their opening five fixtures. Their Super League victories have been over Halifax 34-22 and Leeds 25-16 at home and Castleford 24-20 at Wheldon Road. Oldham shared the points in Paris in a 24 all draw and their sole defeat was a rather disappointing one to champions Wigan at Boundary Park on the opening round of the Super League fixture by 56 points to 16.

Many Rugby League pundits predicted that the Bears would struggle to maintain their Super League status, along with the likes of Paris and Workington, at the outset of the campaign, but since their opening day defeat to Wigan, their brand of open attacking football has been very entertaining and has been like a breath of fresh air amidst the local community. Last season Andy Goodway and Oldham were criticised and even fined by the RLF for fielding a weakened side but their policy of "blooding" youngsters during the Centenary season seems to have paid off as many of these lads are now first team regulars.

Oldhams main game plan revolves around a very strong half back partnership of Francis Maloney an Martin Crompton. Most moves originate from this pairing and invariably end with the likes of centre Darren Abram crossing the white wash for a try. In the pack the likes of lan Sherratt, Gary Lord and David Bradbury have a tremendous work load whilst hooker John Clarke is rapidly being seen as being one of the best number 9's in Super League around the

Prior to Super League the Bears finished 8th in the Stones Bitter Centenary Championship with eight wins from their 20 games whilst Warrington ended their Wembley aspirations in the 4th Round at a very snowy Watersheddings when they triumphed by 26 points to 4.

MARTIN CROMPTON

At the hub of just about all of Oldhams set plays, this afternoon, will be their scrum-half Martin Crompton. Martin, together with half-back partner Francis Maloney have forged a very close link and their almost telepathic understanding causes all sorts of problems for their opponents. At 27 years of age, Crompton is at his peak and his organisation, distribution and kicking game are his major assets.

He is also a very consistent player and has become a firm favourite with their loyal supporters since his move to the Bears in September, 1993 from Wigan. In his 77+2 appearances for Oldham, Martin has scored 28 tries and 9 drop goals for a total of 121 points. Martin started his Rugby League career with Wigan St Patrick's ARLFC and joined Warrington, for whom he made his debut for, against Featherstone Rovers in March 1987. His first try for the Wires came the following December against Bradford Northern. Martin went onto play for Warrington until the end of the 1992 season and made 56+25 appearances for the Club scoring 21 tries and 2 drop goals. The highlight of his stay with the Wilderspool outfit was playing stand-off in the 1989-90 Challenge Cup Final at Wembley when the Wires were beaten by Wigan by 36 points to

In 1992 Wigan signed Crompton from the Wires as a replacement for scrum-half Andy Gregory. Throughout his one season with the Riversiders. Martin was in competition for the number 7 jersey with Shaun

Edwards. Although Wigan won the league, Regal Trophy and Challenge Cup and were runners up in the Premiership Trophy, World Cup Challenge and Charity Shield during that season, Crompton played scrumhalf in his sides 17 nil Charity Shield defeat by Saints and was substitute back, both in Wigans 5-4 Lancashire Cup Final triumph over St Helens and in their 22-8 loss to Brisbane Broncos in the World Cup Challenge. During the campaign Crompton made 15+5

appearances scoring 4 tries. Throughout his very respectable career Martin had been rather unfortunate not to have gained any Representative Honours. However, during last years Emerging Nations World Cup he was selected to represent Ireland and he thoroughly enjoyed the experience as Ireland were the eventual runners up to the Cook Islands with Martin starring at scrum-half in the final.





Yet McRae turned back the clock, stuck to his guns and Graham coughed up the ball three times in seven minutes to blow a game that was Bradford's for the taking.



EMBLEY was a lovely place to be on Saturday. There were toy soldiers in red tunics marching where the go-go dancers had been in past finals. There was a brass band and a male voice choir singing Abide With Me instead of caterwauling pop star. In other words Rugby League wisely dumped the need to be trendy and settled instead for the music of tradition. The players met the occasion. There are moments when I wonder why on earth I love sport and others, when I witness moments of such splendour, they define my passion. St Helens against Bradford was such a one. Some said it was the greatest of

all finals. I am not that old. But it was the most marvellous Rugby League final I had ever seen.

It was Allan Lamb's first game of Rugby League. "Is it always like this?" he asked. If only.

Fred Trueman wanted Bradford to win and thought they threw it away. Maybe. But in the end St Helens deserved the Cup. They were the more substantial, better-balanced team. Much will be made of Bradford's inability to deal with Goulding's up-andunders which clinched the game. Poor Nathan Graham, the full-back, might well suffer recurring nightmares about objects falling from the sky on to his head. He will not be mollified to be told Goulding's kicks were perfect examples of the play-makers art, pitched as they were into a hanging wind where they spun and drifted like a perfectly played approach shot with a sand iron. Robbie Paul, Bradford's scrum-half, won the individual honours and rarely can an athlete have played so well and finished on the losing side. One unforgettable individual run - jinking, side-stepping and gliding past opponents - gave him his third try, a place in the record books and created an

imperishable moment for anyone who saw it. It was one to bore my grandchildren with.

In the end, it was not just a great occasion for the spectators, it was a timely celebration for the game of Rugby League. With all the change and controversy, both here and in Australia, it was an important reminder of the enduring qualities of a great game. How can something so exhilarating and spectacular not have a future?

wenty years we have had to wait for this ... the return of the coveted Challenge Cup to Knowsley Road. It seems like an eternity. What were you doing 20 years ago? Doubtless a large percentage of our current support would not have even been thought of. May 8th 1976 ... if you were there, how could you forget it? The dreaded Abba were Top of the Pops with Fernando, Harold Wilson had handed over the Prime Ministerial reins to James Callaghan and the future Iron Lady ... Margaret Thatcher, Leader of the Opposition, presented a severelydehydrated Saints' captain ... Kel Coslett with the silverware. It was in the middle of the severest drought in Britain for over 200 years. Remarkably, Saints' Dad's Army side achieved a remarkable 20-5 success in burning heat over a much younger Widnes outfit, which included a familiar name in the centre ... Eric Hughes. And I was still a student!

In 1978, 1987, 1989, 1991, we tasted the bitter pill of defeat at the famous stadium. On three of those occasions, certainly, Lady Luck simply was not with us ... witness the Elia-Pendlebury knockout 'fluke' in '87 and the desperately unlucky Bernard Dwyer - inspired break against Wigan in '91 right on the half time hooter which so nearly brought a try for Les Quirk. Like every true Saints' supporter, I positively ached for the team to succeed in the Challenge Cup ... the Blue Ribband of Rugby League competitions. Although we were able to celebrate Premiership and County Cup successes ... there's no feeling like a Wembley win especially in a rown where Rugby League is tantamount to a religion.

Apart from our perennial tag of 'bridesmaids' on the rugby field-unfortunately at the expense of our deadly rivals from Central Park, the period from 1976 onwards held more kicks in the teeth for St Helens folk in economic terms ... mirrored by the slow strangulation of primary and manufacturing industry in the Borough in one of the worst recessions seen since the 1920's. A depressing time indeed!

Over the past few years, however, we have seen the dawn of a new era at St Helens R.L.F.C. which will, hopefully, be realised in terms of silverware. The defeat at Bradford did so much to raise our morale both as a club and a town! Just ask Bobbie

Goulding how he felt about lifting the cup in front of such tremendous support last week. 20,000 Saints' fans in total celebration mode. What a party it was after that final whistle! I didn't want it to end! The lads have made such an important breakthrough and they made it quite clear that it was for us. It is our team and our town. Makes you want to burst with pride!

Typical Saints, though. Things are never straightforward, are they? Bradford were allowed to swamp us at the play-the-ball, put extra pressure on our first receiver and force us into a down-the-middle confrontation by encroaching out wide. This, coupled with their own quick playthe-balls and the defending side pulled back, should I say rather diplomatically 'the full ten metres', it was hardly surprising to see us under the cosh! I do feel, however, that the Saints' tactics in the second half were absolutely spot on. The bombing of full back Graham paid handsome dividends. This was percentage rugby ... but we got the silverware at the end of it. Fancy having to deal with kicks like that coming out of the sun at Wembley! Some supporters were slightly miffed at the lack of 'purity' in the Saints' game plan. Absolute tosh! Bobbie and the boys ruthlessly exploited a glaring weakness in the opposition. It got us back into the game, for heaven's sake! You must remember that Wigan have won countless silverware in the modern era by doing just that! It is no disgrace. Other things that stick in the memory include Bobbie's first bomb ... just when we were at our lowest ebb at 26-12 and Kieron Cunningham's superb follow-up. At 26-18 we were right back in it! Remember Steve Prescott's dive and look back in amazement as Goulding's little chip-kick hit the crossbar and early in the first half; Newlove's sensational break for Danny Arnold's first touchdown and the performance of Saints' 'quiet achiever' on the day ... Karle Hammond, who must have been a contender, like Goulding and Precky, for the Lance Todd Trophy. Robbie Paul's superb third try was the clincher, obviously ... but in my estimation Bernard Dwyer must have pushed him very close indeed!

So ... where do we go from here? The Wembley team of '76 tasted further glory in the Premiership. Let's hope that Bobbie and the boys can achieve their own unique double and clinch the Super League title at the first attempt. The lads of '96 have got that winning feeling which is so important! Ain't no stopping us now!

THEY say sporting heroes often hunt in pairs and that is certainly true of two stars who had leading roles in Saints' last-but-one Cup success against Widnes in 1976 - and remain firm friends to this day!

Take a bow record-breaking skipper and prop Kel Coslett who topped the tackle count, and full-back and vice captain Geoff Pimblett who became Saints' only local-born Lance Todd Trophy winner with an impeccable display, and landed three conversions and two drop goals for good measure. Treading the hallowed Wembley turf was no novelty for either player, for they were also in the Saints' team which defeated Leeds 16-13 in 1972, on a day when Welshman Coslett was again in charge but this time at loose-forward, with five conversions and a non-stop performance earning Kel the Lance Todd Trophy on this occasion.

Twenty years on both Kel and Geoff still look fit enough to turn out at a pinch and are very much part of the local sporting scene, in particular Saints' Past Players Association, where Pimblett is secretary and Coslett is installed in the Hall of Fame

Reflecting on that epic fifth successive Challenge Cup success when Saints were coached by Eric Ashton, Geoff told me: 'Our pack was labelled 'Dad's Army' due to their age, but they lasted the pace better than Widnes on a hot day, and that was the key to victory.

'I went to Wembley with one aim in mind, and that was to pick up another winner's medal, but being named man-of-the-match and awarded the Lance Todd Trophy was a nice bonus.

'As for taking the goal-kicks it was part of the arrangement I had with Kel that he would take the long-distance shots, and fortunately for me the ones I landed at Wembley did not come into that category, but the pressure was on just the same,' added Geoff.

Commenting on his abiding memory of the 1976 trip to the Twin Towers Goal King Kel said: 'It was a great honour to captain a winning Saints' side at Wembley once - to do it

twice was just fantastic and the highlight of my sporting life.'
Other moments to savour for the Coslett/Pimblett dynamic duo included receiving the Challenge Cup from Opposition MP Margaret Thatcher, and returning home to a heroes' welcome from a 20,000 crowd in Victoria Square, which took in a civic reception at the Town Hall hosted by Mayor Peggy

Saints' path to Wembley saw them win 5-3 at Hull, 17-11 at Salford, 17-9 at home to Oldham, and 5-4 versus Keighley in the semi-final at Huddersfield, with Coslett and his men rounding off a season to remember by lifting the Premiership Trophy against Salford at Swinton.

Now aged 53, brewery representative Kel Coslett lives at Eccleston with his Rainhill-born wife lackie. The holder of three Welsh RU caps as a full-back with Aberavon, Kel signed for Saints in 1962 and played in that position until an ankle injury caused him to miss the 1966 Cup Final against Wigan. and on recovering he moved to the loose-forward role. Records and Coslett were synonymous at Saints for Kel made 530 appearances, kicked 1,639 goals and scored 45 tries for a total of 3,413 points, and also established another 'first' when amassing 452 points, including 214 goals, in season 1971-72. In addition Kel made 13 appearances for Wales in the Rugby League code, with his Saintly swan-song arriving in Auckland during the club's tour of Australia and New Zealand which followed in the wake of the 1976 Challenge Cup success. Spells as player/coach at Rochdale and coach at Wigan and Saints rounded off Coslett's official involvement in RL matters, but knowing the man, one can't help feeling that Kel still has a lot to offer to the game, and it has been hinted that he become Saints' goalkicking tutor - the credentials are there, that's for sure!

A remarkably-spry 51 and senior master at Broadway High School, Geoff Pimblett lives at Windle with his wife Marle, who is the daughter of former Supporter's Club official the late Len Kilshaw. Geoff, incidentally, also captained the Saints' team which lost to Leeds at Wembley in 1978. United as ever, Kel and Geoff were at Wembley last week, and were confident that Saints would repeat their triumph of 1976 via pace, flair and the inspirational leadership of Bobbie Gouldine.


That last point was particularly important in the unique Wembley atmosphere," said Kel Coslett, 'and I knew that as well as concentrating on his own game Bobbie would ensure that his team-mates had the right mental preparation.'

RECORDS broken at Wembley included the following:

The 72 points beat the previous Challenge Cup final record aggregate of 52 scored in the 1985 showpiece between Hull and Wigan.

The 13 tries were also the most scored in a Challenge Cup final.

St Helens beat the previous biggest score by a winning team, Wakefield's 38 points against Hull in 1960.

Bradford's 32 points were the most scored by a losing side in a Challenge Cup final, beating the 24 chalked up by Hull in 1985.

TRAILED

St Helens produced the most successful fightback seen in a Wembley final when they overturned the biggest deficit, a 14-point one at 26-12. The previous best was by Leeds who had trailed by 10 points against Saints in 1978 before winning 14-12.


