

Talking

THIS evening we welcome to Watersheddings the Bulls of Bradford and first of all I must, on behalf of the Oldham board, congratulate everyone at Odsal on their achievement in reaching Wembley and, more important still, taking part in such a spectacular Silk Cut Challenge Cup Final.

The final portrayed everything that was good about Rugby League Football.

It was a magnificent sporting occasion and great credit should

be heaped on both clubs for making the sports annual showpiece an event which set the nation talking.

The sunshine and the high temperature played a significant role in enabling the players to provide a fast, open spectacle and it was perhaps fitting that the Bulls should be involved in a final on such a boiling hot day because Chris Caisley, the Odsal chairman, has long been an advocate of the summer season in which we are now involved.

It was Chris, Sheffield's Gary Hetherington and myself who started the ball rolling towards summer rugby, but many others have now come round to thinking that a season which avoids the worst of the winter must be a good idea.

Summer rugby, of course, brings with it demands of a different nature which the players have got to adjust to. I refer to hard grounds, playing in high temperatures, coping with a fast game that will go even faster in good weather and on firm surfaces, and coming to terms with the sheer intensity of Super League and the physical impact that will be a spin-off from full-time professionalism.

The Super League players of today are magnificent athletes and when you throw men like that into a high-collision sport played at top speed on hard grounds you are bound to run into a lot of injuries.

These are the problems that the game of today has to resolve, but I am convinced that clubs, coaches and players can take

those problems on board and come up with a superlative spectator sport which will not only attract good crowds this summer, but will enable the best of the English players to be more than a match for the cream of the Australian game. Here at Watersheddings, we have been making steady and effective progress despite our heavy defeat at St Helens last

There were reasons for that, not least the absence for one reason or another of Scott Ranson, Jason Temu, Tony Myler, Afi Leuila, Martin Crompton, David Bradbury, Andrew Patmore

> and Steve Garland, who was to have replaced Martin Crompton at scrum-half until he was injured in the Alliance game against Saints at Ashton United on the Thursday night.

Temu got a two match ban for a late tackle in the Castleford game and Ranson got three games, reduced to two on appeal, for raising an arm when preparing to take a tackle.

Jason's tackle WAS late. He was committed to it, but it was a shoulder-toshoulder challenge which caused a shoulder injury and in view of that we felt his disciplinary punishment was rather harsh.


In the case of Ranson, who was penalised

by the referee and who has an impeccable disciplinary record, we also felt a little bit aggrieved.

The net result was that we went to Saints last Sunday with a depleted side and the two places nobody wants to go if they are below strength are Knowsley Road and Central Park. It was difficult to compete with a talented Saints side when we were minus so many senior players.

Saints are full of pace and power, but it is only fair to remember that we had a lot of senior men missing and that this was only the second really bad result in our last 12 games.

BEARS IN PARIS

'Ee, I must stop enjoying myself,' said Harry in a Ken Goodwin voice. Everyone on the coach was in fits of laughter as one joke followed another to put the disappointment of the afternoon behind us. We were on our way back to the hotel in CACHAN after a meal at the SUD-OUEST Restaurant in the Latin Quarter. The wine and the beer flowed freely and we'd even been regaled by a mad accordionist singing Parisian ballads, though not all that tunefully! Some of us had even tried the snails. Oldham's performance of the afternoon had been dissected several times over and despite conceding a draw in the last minute the more optimistic among us were coming round to the view it was a point won rather than a point lost. 





Memory Lane

Don Yates Looks Back To A Match From Yesteryear

The launching of the European Super League has given the game of Rugby League a much needed fillip. Attendances during the opening weekend were better than expected in all three divisions. However one thing we know for certain is that the attendance at Bradford's Odsal Stadium on the evening of Wednesday 5th May 1954 will never be beaten.

That was the evening of the Challenge Cup Final replay between Halifax and Warrington, a match which attracted a crowd of 102,569 to the vast Odsal bowl. Attendances at sports meetings were generally higher in 1954 than they are today and that is clearly shown in the 1954 Challenge Cup campaign. In those days the first round of the Challenge Cup was contested over two legs. The eventual finalists each had comfortable victories in the first round. Halifax defeated Dewsbury 19-0 at home and then 15-9 away whilst Warrington beat Bramley 17-0 at home before winning 30-5 away. Oldham beat Liverpool City 15-5 away and 18-11 at home but the biggest crowd of the first round ties was also at Odsal where 20,014 saw Northern beat Rochdale Hornets 11-2 after the first leg had been drawn

In round two Halifax beat Keighley 24-5 at home and Warrington won 7-4 at Watersheddings before a crowd of 21,000. However the biggest crowd of the second round ties was 31,172 who assembled at Fartown to see Huddersfield beat St. Helens 12-5. The guarter final saw Warrington beat York 26-5 at home whilst Halifax won 2-0 at Wigan before a crowd of 43,953. Halifax also played before the bigger semi final crowd, 46,961, at Odsal where the Thrum Hallers beat Hunslet 18-3. At the same time Warrington were beating Leeds 8-4 at Swinton. The final at Wembley attracted 81,841 who saw a dull match which ended at 4-4. The replay, 11 days later, attracted Rugby League's biggest ever crowd who saw the following two teams line up for action:

Halifax: Tyssul Griffiths, Arthur Daniels, Tommy Lynch, Billy Mather, Dai Bevan, Ken Dean, Stan Kielty, John Thorley, Alvin Ackerley, Jack Wilkinson, Albert Fernley, Derek Schofield and Des Clarkson.

Warrington: Eric Frodsham, Brian Bevan, Jim Challinor, Ron Ryder, Stan McCormick, Ray Price, Gerry Helme, Dan Naughton, Frank Wright, Ged Lowe, Harry Bath, Austin Heathwood & Bob Ryan.

This replay was as dull as the original final and is best remembered by the massive crowd which caused traffic jams on both sides of the Pennines. With no M62 in those days, Lancashire traffic had to pass through Oldham and the Mumps Bridge junction (no roundabout either in those days) was blocked solid from 4pm onwards. Warrington won the match 8-4, scoring two tries from

players who were later to manage Oldham. The first from Jim Challinor came after ten minutes and although Halifax dominated much of the first half and had two tries disallowed their only score in the first period was a penalty from Tyssul Griffiths. Harry Bath and Griffiths each landed a penalty midway through the second half before Gerry Helme closed the scoring ten minutes from time. Halifax had another try disallowed late in the game but disallowed tries count for nought and the record books show that Warrington won 8-4 in front of a record attendance which is likely to stand for all time.



On this day....

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

Early May has frequently been the time of year when the Challenge Cup Final has been staged and on two occasions the Wembley Final has been staged on Saturday, 10th May. The first occasion was in 1958 when Wigan beat Workington Town 13-9. Then in 1975 Widnes beat Warrington 14-7. Of course, both those matches attracted huge crowds but another big crowd was drawn to Central Park, Wigan on Saturday, 10th May 1987 when Wigan beat Halifax 18-10 in a Premiership semi-final which attracted a crowd of 22,457. On this day in 1992 Wigan again found themselves at home in a Premiership semi-final. Leeds were their opponents on that occasion and Martin Offiah ran amok to score no fewer than ten tries in Wigan's historic 74-6 victory.

On that very same day, Sunday 10th May 1992 Brisbane Broncos were beaten 10-8 at home by Illawarra Steelers in one of the shock results of the Australian season. It was one of only four defeats suffered by the Broncos that season but they recovered to win the Australian Premiership and, in so doing, gained revenge over Illawarra by beating them 22-12 in the play-off semi-final.

It was on this day in 1978 that the BARLA tourists faced the Northern Zone of Papua New Guinea in a torrid match which was staged at The Oval, Lae. The British had two players, winger Steve Critchenson and second-rower Ronnie Carter, sent off and they also conceded 34 penalties before crowd trouble caused the match to be abandoned after 74 minutes. At that stage the locals were leading 4-2. Full-back Rodney Som had landed a couple of penalties for the home side whilst Peter Glover had landed a similar effort for the tourists. Staying with the amateurs, it was on this day in 1994 that Saddleworth Rangers pulled off a magnificent 24-8 away win over Woolsten Rovers. However, it was not enough to stop the Rovers who went on to win the National Conference Championship for the first time. they won it again last year and look like making it a hat-trick of successes this time.

That very same day, Wednesday, 10th May 1994 Leeds signed second-row forward Adrian Morley from the Eccles Junior Club. He could turn out to be one of their best ever signings.


This was not good enough, Oldham ... and I'm afraid that, as Tameside taster, it wasn't the fare to get the locals begging for more.

SAINTS ONLY UNBEATEN SIDE IN THE SUPER LEAGUE

Paul Newlove, St. Helens and Great Britain centre star, joins team mate Danny Arnold at the top of the Stones European Super League tryscoring charts after scoring a hat-trick of tries in his sides 66-18 victory over Oldham Bears.

The dynamic duo have now scored 11 tries each in only six Super League matches so far this season.

Newlove's fourth hat-trick since joining Saints from Bradford Bulls last November takes his tally to 18 tries in just 11

Saints skipper Bobbie Goulding heads the Stones Super League goalscoring charts with 43, including one drop goal and the pointscoring charts with 89, including one try. Top of the Super League table Saints are now averaging more than 44 points a game with second placed Wigan just behind with 41 points a game.

Saints are the only unbeaten side in the Stones Super League with Keighley Cougars and Salford Reds having a 100% record in Division One, along with Hull KR in the Second Division.

GRAHAM HOLROYD NEARS 100 APPEARANCES

Graham Holroyd of Leeds will make his 100th appearance for the club when they visit Paris St. Germain in the Stones Super League on Friday. His 99 appearances, include 17 as a substitute, and have brought him 670 points from 29 tries and 280 goals including six drop goals. And he will not be 21 until 25 October.

The former Siddall (Halifax) amateur scored two tries on his debut for Leeds as à 17 year old substitute in a 46-10 old Division One home defeat of Sheffield Eagles on 7 March 1993. He made three more substitute appearances before his full debut at stand off when he again scored a try in the 38-34 home league defeat of Hull on 28 March 1993.

While still a teenager, he became only the fifth player to total over 300 points in a season for Leeds with 317 from 12 tries and 135 goals, including a drop goal, in 1994-95. Holroyd has kicked nine goals in a match three times with a best points total of 26, but he has yet to score a try hat trick. He has made one representative appearance, as a substitute for Great Britain Under 21's without scoring.

Steve Blakeley of Salford Reds has the longest points scoring run of 25 successive matches, including all eight this season.

The stand off's scoring run began with eight goals and a try in the 48-20 First Division win at Huddersfield on 17 September 1995. The Stones Super League player with the best points scoring run is Wigan's Henry Paul who has scored in 17 successive Cup and League matches, including all eight this season. His scoring run started with four goals and a try in the 32-18 home defeat of Halifax on 13 December 1995.




BULLS **GAMEBREAKER PAUL LOUGHLIN**





Thoughts from the

Terraces...

It seems a long time since the last home game – and a lot has happened in the meantime! Perhaps the business of high/dangerous tackles, citing, suspension and referees is the most controversial area.

Rugby League is a hard game, and there will always be players injured accidentally like Martin Crompton. When a player is injured as a result of foul play, I think we would all agree that action should be taken against the perpetrator; and when the foul seems to have the deliberate intent of inflicting injury, then the action should be very severe. Thus, I had no objection to the punishment meted out to David Bradbury – provided, of course, that the RL disciplinary committee was consistent in its application of whatever principles it operates. But George Mann's assault on John Clarke seemed to me also to be deliberate, and therefore also in the same category. Temu's at Castleford, I thought, was marginally late, and not quite identical to the incident at St Helens which put Howard Hill out of the game, when no action at all was taken! But Matautia's deliberate use of the elbow against Bradford's Knox, two weeks before the cup final, cost him only a one match suspension. The inconsistency brings the game into disrepute.

On the question of citing, it should be irrelevant. Greg McCullum and his team should watch the videos of every match surely, and **they** should refer cases of foul play to the disciplinary committee. The clubs should simply not come into it at all. What of our recent performances? Against both Leeds and Castleford, I thought we thoroughly deserved our victories. The defence was aggressive and committed, and with Crompton, Maloney, Aitchison and Belle particularly impressive in the backs, I thought, we took chances, and therefore also the points. In each game, invariably, we had poor spells. But overall we performed like a top six side. The media hype tried hard to label us as dirty, but I thought completely unjustifiably. Unlike in the Cup Final - which was certainly marvellous entertainment, and a great P.R. boost to the game, even if the defensive qualities were less than impressive - we showed what positive tackling and defensive organisation can achieve. There were, admittedly, a

couple of instances of foul play, even if our Yorkshire opponents in each case were more guilty in this respect. But to label us as dirty is, simply, quite ludicrous. The performance at St Helens, of course, was rather different. I wonder whether there was some reaction to the 'dirty Oldham' tag? Certainly, the gang tackling was not as much in evidence, and we let them run the ball around far too much. But what the game showed was our relative lack of strength in depth - and we can't do much about that.

Returning to the subject of referees, I watched a video last week of the last few minutes of the Bath V Leicester R.U. Cup Final. (I had been told that if I tried to watch the whole game, I would have been fast asleep before the exciting bit). I don't know enough about the laws of the ra-ra game to know whether the ref was justified in awarding the penalty try; it certainly didn't look to me to fall within our "try would have been scored" principle. But the assault of the referee afterwards was something else. The incident looked quite clear, still annoyed at the award of the penalty try which cost his side the cup, the Leicester flanker Back punched the referee, soon after he blew the final whistle. I would have thought a very long ban, if not a sine die decision, was the only possible outcome in either code of rugby. What was really sickening, though, was the attempt to gloss over the incident. Back said he had mistaken the ref for one of his opponents; laughable! The ref said it was accidental: pathetic. And the TV experts' seemed very keen to brush the incident under their game's very large carpet. I would like to have seen the outcome of a similar incident if the ref had been Eric Clay or Bill Thompson!

Finally, it would be wrong not to mention the Paris experience. A good coach driver. A cracking hotel, and excellent food at the Capanile next door. Good drink - though we drank both hotels and both local cafes dry by Sunday evening! And a superb stadium, with an excellent atmosphere all weekend, even though we did chuck a point away. Can we have the Easter weekend in Paris again next year, please, Mr Lindsay?



This evening's visit of Bradford Bulls to Watersheddings will mark the 90th match between these two clubs. Of the previous 89. Oldham have won 38. Bradford 48 and three matches have been drawn. Sixty nine of those matches have been league matches with Oldham registering 31 successes and Bradford 38. Two of the most surprising matches between these clubs were staged in November 1941 when they met in the guarter final of the Yorkshire Cup. Bradford won 10-0 at Watersheddings in the first leg but then lost the second leg at home by 9-5. They went on to win the Cup that year, defeating Halifax 24-0 in the final, Oldham's best home win over Bradford came in January 1922 when they won a league match 41-5. Their best win at Odsal came in March 1992 when Oldham won 37-10. Oldham's biggest defeat at Bradford came in a war league match in September 1944 when Eric Batten scored three tries as Bradford romped home 36-0. They won by an even bigger margin when they visited Watersheddings for a Challenge Cup tie in March 1993 and Oldham slumped to a 42-4 defeat.



The biggest problem will be the backrow.




