Talking

AN exciting development for Rugby League in this borough took place at the Civic Centre on Monday morning when plans were unveiled to the Press for the new stadium which is to be built on the Westwood site in time for the start of our 1998 Super League season.

Here at Watersheddings we are hoping sincerely that Oldham Athletic, our friends from Boundary Park, will also decide to move into the new stadium, which will be built at a cost of between £10 and £11 million pounds.

It will cater for 15,000 supporters if Athletic row in with the scheme and 10.000 if it is to be home only to Oldham Bears, but Council officials made it

clear at Monday's launch that the only difference between the two alternatives was the number of seats for spectators.

Other features of the stadium, such as its banqueting suite, restaurant and corporate hospitality facilities would remain the same whether both clubs were to use it or merely the Bears.

Whatever happens, it will be a magnificent achievement for the town, but I would like to see Athletic there with us because it could then be developed into a superb showpiece which would be a centrepiece for ALL the town's

professional sport.

I would like to take this opportunity of congratulating the Council for all they have achieved in recent years. It was, indeed, very interesting to listen to the views of Councillor John Battye when he urged, at the launch, more positive thinking in the town so that the borough of Oldham can get things done.

I agree wholeheartedly. Negative thinking is a dreadful thing. Like Councillor Battye, I think

there is far too much of it in our society. We see it in all walks of life.

As John said, negative thinking did not provide Spindles or the Sixth-Form College, two major projects of which this town can be proud. I am sure the new stadium will provide an excellent facility for this town for many, many years to come. To be honest, it cannot come quickly enough for us at Watersheddings because our existing facilities do not give us the Super League platform we need to enable us to compete with the best.

We have a lot of fond memories of our 100 years at Watersheddings, but to be brutally frank it is

> well past its sell-by date and the sooner we are out of here the better.



Don Yates looks back to a match from vesteryear.

After enjoying a successful start to their season. Warrington will be hoping that they at least qualify for the Premiership play-off at the end of this inaugural Super League campaign.

The last time Warrington won this lucrative end-ofseason play-off was in 1986 when they hit their best form just at the right time. First Division Champions that season were Halifax who managed to draw no fewer than six of their 30 league matches. Warrington ended the campaign in fourth spot whilst Oldham were placed 9th, just failing to qualify for this end-of-season money spinner. In the quarter-final ties, Halifax defeated Hull comfortably enough 32-20 whilst Warrington had a much tougher match at home to arch rivals Widnes. The Chemics led 8-6 at Wilderspool as the match approached injury time but then Paul Bishop put Ronnie Duane over for the winning try in a 10-8 Warrington victory. The other quarter-finals saw Leeds win 38-22 at St Helens and Wigan hammer Hull KR 47-0 at Central Park.

The two semi-finals were also interesting encounters. Halifax beat Leeds at home for the first time in 22 years but it was a close thing. The eventual 16-13 victory came at the end of a pulsating see-saw encounter. Following up his match winning performance in the quarter-finals, Paul Bishop also played a significant part in Warrington's fine 23-12 win at Wigan. He landed five dropped goals as Warrington claimed a victory which was more comfortable than the scoreline suggests. That 1986 Premiership final was staged at Elland Road. Leeds and attracted a crowd of 13,683. The teams for the final lined up as follows:

Champions Halifax were favourites to lift the Premiership trophy but Warrington, well led by skipper Les Boyd, had different ideas and they showed their intentions as early as the second minute when eventual man-of-the-match Les Boyd crossed for his first try. Halifax recovered from that shock to lead 8-4 after ten minutes. By half-time the scores were level at 10-10 but within five minutes of the restart Warrington had the match virtually won with two converted tries. They continued to dominate the second-half and ran out winners 38-10. It was a surprising yet well deserved

The Halifax try was scored by skipper Chris Anderson whilst Colin Whitfield landed three goals. Warrington crossed for seven tries, their try scorers being Les Boyd (2), Kevin Tamati, Bob Jackson, Brian Johnson, Mark Forster & Paul Bishop who also landed five goals. That fine Warrington success is their only triumph so far in that particular competition. They will be especially anxious to finish in the top four this year so that they can have another crack at lifting the trophy which gave their followers such happy memories of that trip to Leeds in the spring of 1986.





On this day

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

Not surprisingly, most of the action which has taken place on this day in previous years has done so on the other side of the World. In 1984 for instance, Great Britain met Australia at Sydney Cricket Ground in the first test of that 1984 tour. There were three Oldham players in the British line-up - stand-off Des Foy, prop Andy Goodway and second-rower Mick Worrall. Britain had won their opening six matches of that tour but they could not beat the Aussies who triumphed 25-8. The British try was scored by 18 years old Gary Schofield and in a typically torrid Anglo-Australia test, substitute David Hobbs was sent off in the second half. Things had been much easier for Britain 27 years earlier

as they warmed up for the 1957 World Cup competition. It was on Sunday, 9th June 1957 that they met and defeated Western Australia 66-5 in Perth. Star of the show was winger Mick Sullivan who crossed for seven of the sixteen British tries. Oldham had three players in that World Cup squad and all three scored in that match. Prop Syd Little and loose-forward Derek Turner each scored a try whilst substitute Alan Davies scored

two tries and also landed three goals. Warrington's sole representative in the party, stand-off Ray Price, also played but somehow failed to get on the scoresheet. On Wednesday 9th June 1982 a crowd of 2,000 were attracted to Wewak, Papua New Guinea where a North Coast Select outfit drew 5-5 with BARLA, the Great Britain amateurs. Right-winger John Taylor (Egremont Rangers) scored the British try whilst the other wingman, Martin Amor (Wath Brow Hornets) landed a goal. It was a good performance by the BARLA lads who had to contend with a 22-2 penalty count against them as well as the intense heat. Finally it was on this day in 1988, Thursday 9th June,

that a young Leigh lad, Scott Naylor, turned professional with Wigan. Naylor never quite made it at Central Park so he moved on to Salford. Since moving to the Willows almost three years ago Naylor's form has been exceptional and his reward is a place in the England squad for next Wednesday's match against the French at Gateshead.

LOFC The Crack'

Love 'em or hate 'em, we can't do without 'em. Referees. At the Oldham v Halifax game in April I sat behind the referee's wife. I knew she was Karl Kirkpatrick's wife because we arrived early and I saw them walking around together before the game. When I struck up a conversation during the game Mrs K begged me not to reveal who she was because she feared she would become the target of abuse. Hang on a minute, I thought, this is Oldham: we're much too civilised for that! Nevertheless I acceded to her request just in case, as it was perfectly obvious the poor woman was a nervous wreck. So what makes a nice, young couple get involved in an occupation clearly designed to bring down opprobrium on their heads? Well, whatever you may think, the answer is almost certainly love of the game in the first instance. Let's face it we can't all be top class players, but if you realise this early enough there's nothing to stop you being a top class referee. And yes, referees are ambitious like everyone else. After all, if you become one of the game's top officials you never know when the call might come to control a game in France,

In the meantime watching games on TV I get the impression that refereeing standards are improving all the time. Of course you never think so when you are watching your own team, because it always appears that every decision goes against you. But isn't it funny how, when you're not quite so emotionally involved, you can see the referee is usually right? Not that referees don't make mistakes. The ten metre rule means far too many forward passes go undetected. And the speed of the game these days means other errors can

creep in. Oldham followers can't get over the apparent penalty awarded against Paul Atcheson in the Bradford game after the full back followed his own kick to tackle the Bradford Receiver. Or, if you look closely, was it Gary Lord penalised by Mr Connolly for not retiring ten metres? Who knows? Certainly it was controversial, to say the least. Despite this the calm, authoritative approach inculcated in our top officials by Greg McCallum is paying off. The players seem to understand what is happening and aren't being screamed and shouted at by sergeant Major types, which seems to me to be all to the good, Meanwhile, innovations like in-goals judges and Sky TV's big screen have to be good for the game. The pity is that we can't have big screens at every game, because it could come down to a really tight decision as to who gets relegated at the end of the season. For example, if you saw it, Graeme Hallas' 'try' for Halifax at Workington would have stood without the screen and would probably have won the match, whereas Mark Forster got a try in Warrington's game at Leeds that would have been disallowed if shown on screen. And who would have believed that Martin Offiah had scored against Bath without seeing it replayed? All-in-all the verdict has to be that the screen is great value. Finally, next time you want to shout for offside look at the pitch markings and see how many refs go back 12 metres so they don't have to keep stopping the game when players pinch a yard. I know it's not the letter of the law (are scrums?) but it keeps the game flowing and that generally means more excitement for the spectators.

Oh!, and before I forget, no, I'm not a referee!



THE BACKS

Full back Lee Penny has been with the Wilderspool club since October 1991. A Great Britain Under 11 player, he picked up three caps at that level in 1993, Penny has been the regular last line of defence for the Wire throughout the Super League campaign. However it is the try scoring ability of Penny that is noteworthy, starting the Centenary season with three successive games from the substitutes bench he went on to head the Warrington try scoring list with 16 touchdowns in 24 outings. His form has continued into the Super League and he was one of six Warrington players to score a try in the 48-24 victory over Paris St Germain at Wilderspool. One of the most frequent try scorers in recent seasons has been the experienced wingman Mark Forster. He raced to 24 touchdowns in the 1994-95 campaign but could only manage 10 tries in the Centenary season. The former Woolston player has been with Warrington since November 1981 and has scored three tries in the current 1996 season.

A newcomer to the club, and a relative newcomer to the British game is Richard Henare. He made a try scoring debut from the substitutes bench against bottom club Workington. The Kiwi had already made his mark with the Carlisle Border Raiders, scoring twelve tries in just nine games including a Silk Cut Challenge Cup third round effort against the Bradford amateur opposition West bowling. The Warrington three-quarter line up is certainly a test for radio and television commentators.

Exciting centre three-quarter Toa Kohe-Love adds to the tongue twisters and you can expect to here his name mentioned at regular intervals, the Kiwi has scored in three of his four full outings since joining Warrington in

The southern hemisphere three quarter line up also includes former Olympic sprinter **Mateaki Mafi**. The Tongan took his place in the Warrington side during the Centenary season but failed to trouble the record keepers. His first try for the club was a controversial touchdown, in the eyes of Leeds fans, at Headingley on the opening weekend of the Super League season. Fellow Tongan Salesi Finau earned a two match suspension for his dismissal at Knowsley Road in January. Like Mafi he also had to wait until the 1996 season to record his first try for the club with a fifth round Silk Cut Challenge Cup touchdown against Leeds. A former player with Canberra Raiders he was a try scorer for Tonga against New Zealand at Wilderspool in October. Mafi was also a non-playing World Cub squad member with the Tongans who were captained by former Warrington hooker Duane Mann. The last recognised three-quarter to mention is centre Chris Rudd. The Cumbrian was one of three successful goalkickers for Warrington in their recent win over Paris, his try against St Germain was the first of the campaign for the player who joined Warrington in 1988.

THE PLAY MAKERS

Regular stand off and goal kicker lestyn Harris can claim to be the superstar of the Warrington side. He was voted international Player of the Year in 1995 and was also selected for a fictitious World XIII by a panel of journalists and coaches after the Halifax Centenary World Cup competition. Aussie captain Brad Fittler bagged the stand off role with Harris nominated as the full back, a position he filled in each of the three Welsh games in the competition. Harris joined the Wire from Oldham amateurs St. Annes in 1993, quickly gaining selection for the Great Britain Under 21 side with outings against New Zealand and France the same year. Kiwi Kelly Shelford can claim the versatile tag, he has recently been filling the scrum half role whilst the club awaits the arrival of the Western Samoan half back Willie Swann. Shelford has also occupied the loose forward and stand off berths during his time at the Wilderspool. Swann was a World Cup try scorer for the Western Samoans and arrives at Wilderspool after experiences as a member of the Auckland Warriors outfit. However he failed to gain selection for the Warriors in the Winfield Cup competition, losing out in the battle for the half back position to Kiwi Stacey Jones (the Warriors development player of the year) and the more experienced Gene Ngamu.

THE ENGINE ROOM.

Warrington have selected a fairly settled pack during the Super League campaign with former England Schoolboys international Paul Sculthorpe the linchpin. A product of the Waterhead club in Oldham he made his first team debut during the 1994-95 campaign with half a dozen outings from the substitutes bench. Now the regular loose forward he made 16 full appearances during the Centenary season scoring seven

Remember Australian second row scoring sensation Steve

Menzies from the World Cup? He was the competitions top try scorer, the top try scorer in the 1995 Winfield Cup and at the time of writing is the top try scorer in the Optus Cup. Well those fantasy rugby league players had best keep an eye on Warrington's young second rower lan Knott. Maybe not yet on the same level as Menzies the 19 year old Knott is already making a name as a try scoring forward with eight tries in just seventeen senior outings. He is also an able goalkicker and represented Great Britain in February's Academy international against France, and scored a try.


If Sculthorpe and Knott bring youth and enthusiasm to the pack forwards then Paul Cullen brings the experience. He has been with the Cheshire cub since 1980, making sixteen appearances in the 1981-82 season, his first campaign in the first team. Now a regular summariser with the Sky TV team his senior career started in a team which included the likes of Dave Chisnall, Bob Eccles, Phil Ford, Steve Hesford and John Bevan, Cullen's first pro try helped the Wire to a 25-17 success over Barrow in the final league game of the season.

At 26 years of age prop forward Gary Chambers is the senior member of the Warrington front row. One of the many former Kells players in the professional game he joined Warrington on the same day as centre Rudd in 1988. Mark Hilton fills the open side berth, possibly one of the youngest regular prop forwards in the European game, he celebrated his 21st birthday in March (on the day Wire trashed Leeds at Headingley) and is joined in the front row by 20 year old John Hough. He is the first choice hooker. now gaining selection in advance of John Thursfield and the more versatile Andy Bennett. Both are recorded in various reference books as being products of the game's top amateurs in the Warrington area, Woolston Rangers.

Other contenders for selection in the forwards are former Welsh union player Mark Jones and youngster Mike Wainwright. The tall Wainwright has been limited to substitute duty during the early season games, whilst Jones has been slightly more fortunate with a couple of starts in the first thirteen.

The Warrington football management team of John Dorahy and Alex Murphy make an interesting pair. Australian Dorahy was dubbed "Joe Cool" during a playing career which included British clubs Leigh, Hull KR and Halifax. Twice capped for Australia (both times in 1978) his Australian career included spells with Western Suburbs, Manly and Illawara, a club he left in 1983. He returned from Britain in 1986 for a spell with North Sydney.

Murphy has had a distinguished playing and coaching career with a host of Lancashire clubs. He signed for St. Helens as a sixteen year old back in 1955, by 1958 he had been selected for the Lions tour of Australia. He won 24 international caps, and was a regular half back selection for Great Britain between 1958 and 1966. By the seventies he was one of the games leading coaches, taking Leigh and Warrington to Challenge Cup success. In 1975 he coached England in the World Championships and was twice coach of his native Lancashire.







THE RUGBY CHALLENGE

The great Rugby challenge of 1996 between Bath and Wigan probably achieved its objective but did it really tell us anything that we did not already know? Bath was the substitution of three of Wigan's top performers when the match was over after just 15 minutes. It would have been so much sweeter to see Wigan run in 150 points which they surely would have done with a full team. Anyway 82-6 will do for starters.

The only other point to come out of the exercise is that the two codes are a million miles apart. Union is a scrimmaging, kicking game and League is a running, handling and tackling game. There is little chance of the two producing a hybrid game in the foreseeable future.

So forget Union, concentrate on healing the wounds between Britain and Australia and the more superior game - League - will flourish.

Thoughts from the

Terraces...

Although there didn't seem to be many of us there, thank goodness for the performance at the Valley last Sunday. Although we lost, obviously, the level of effort and commitment left nothing to be desired, I felt. In spite of further injuries during the course of the game – at one stage, there didn't seem to be an Oldham player not suffering from one knock or other – we competed superbly. The London Broncos are a good side, let there be no doubt. They play to a clear gameplan, and are attractive to watch: I think their growth in attendances is one of the best features of Super League so far, and even though there were lots of Earls Court Aussie accents in evidence, there were also a lot of genuine Londoners too, many with families, and kitted out with all sorts of Broncos paraphernalia. My only gripe was the atrocious man with the mike; unlike the rest of their set-up, including a superb stadium, he was amateurish.

I thought that Lord, Faimalo and Sherratt in particular deserved ratings. Because of the injuries, they all had to play the full eighty minutes, and the way they battled up the middle, and were quickly in as second man in tackles to minimise the Broncos off-loading efforts, were crucial to our performance. In the third quarter, we hardly ever made it over the half-way line, but to restrict them, and then to come back so well near the end, was a superb effort. I suspect that most sides will leave Valley with defeats by more than six points, as the season progresses. The good thing about the performance, though, was that it should get

the knockers off Andy Goodway's back, I would hope. With the season almost half way gone, surely he should be getting credit for our position in Super League, not brick-bats. We have had some poor performances, certainly - the first half v Wigan, the last few minutes in Paris, the first 20 minutes v Bradford, the games at Saints and Sheffield, and particularly the second half against Workington. But there is a lot more to be said on the credit side; I bet the knockers were shouting the loudest at Castleford, for example. We have got a small squad, with limited resources, and have a Super League place to defend. The only hope of achieving that, surely, is for everyone to pull together for the next couple of years. What the players achieve will come through maximum commitment and organisation, and they, and the coach, need full backing. Once we move to a new stadium, and hopefully gain the benefits of much improved attendances, as well as the benefits of the Sky and Murdock money, then perhaps we can think of the upper reaches of the Premier Division as a realistic long-term goal. But, in the meantime, Super League survival is the name of the game, and I can't think that anyone really believes that there is anyone better than our present coach to guide us along that path. Finally, just a post-script on referees. What does the disciplinary committee's response to Mr Morris' display at Sheffield say about his judgement? And what a treat to see Bill Harrigan at the Valley; another referee with a feel for the game, and a rapport with the players.



Warrington's Challenge Cup victory over Oldham here at Watersheddings last February was their 108th success against Oldham from the 200 previous meetings between these clubs. Nine of those meetings have ended in draws and Oldham have recorded 83 victories. These clubs have met in 168 League matches of which Oldham have won 74. Warrington have won 85 and nine have ended all square.

Oldham's biggest victories against the Wire occurred many years ago. In November 1898 winger Martin scored four tries when Oldham beat Warrington 35-0 in a League match at Watersheddings whilst the best Oldham victory at Wilderspool came in April 1910 when the Roughveds won 32-0. Oldham's biggest defeat at Wilderspool came in a Lancashire Cup semi-final during September 1948 when Brian Bevan scored five tries in a 55-0 victory. Bevan scored another five tries four days later when Warrington won a League match at Watersheddings 37-0. That was not Warrington's biggest win at Watersheddings for they triumphed here 43-4 in a League match during February 1977 when winger Denis Curling was on hand to score four tries. 





OVER To You

IT was very encouraging indeed, for all sports lovers, to hear Oldham Council representatives speaking so positively about the proposed new stadium at Westwood when the plans were officially unveiled at the Civic Centre on Monday. Councillor John Battye was scathing in his criticism of "negative thinking" and expressed the view that the local authority was striving to protect the Town's sporting interests for the next 100 years - a reference to the fact that Rugby League has been played in the Borough for the past 100 years. If, as is hoped, Oldham Athletic also decide to use the new stadium it will be a 15,000 all-seater operation, which will be used by the Bears and the Latics for 12 months of the year. If Latics decide to stay put at Boundary Park, the Council will be looking for other uses for the pitch and the stadium in the winter months and, to that end, inquiries are already being made about the availability of turf which will cope with year-

Council officials were keen to stress that money to pay for the stadium would come from private sources and grants, but definitely **NOT** through the Council tax.

It was also made clear that the development would include offices, a banqueting suite, restaurants and corporate hospitality facilities and these would be in place whether the stadium housed 10,000 spectators of 15,000.

If Huddersfield can have the McAlpine Stadium, and many other Towns throughout the country can have new stadiums for a variety of sports and pastimes, I see no reason why the Town of Oldham cannot get in on the act.

The easiest thing in the world is to advance reasons for **NOT DOING** something.

Had this Town's leaders taken notice of such negative vibes down the years there would have been no Spindles, no Oldham Sixth-Form College and no doubt other projects would have

fallen by the wayside, too.

The stadium is coming. Of that, there is no doubt. It will be a project of which Oldham Council and Oldham Bears RLFC will be justifiably proud and it will be a milestone along the road of the Town's sporting achievements.
