
On a final note all at the Taverners wish our Academy player Lee Knowles, who broke a bone in his neck at the last game, a speedy recovery.

Karl Harrison is still receiving treatment for his hamstring pain which is improving and he will resume full training next week.




Mike Umaga also misses this weeks clash due to damage of his ankle ligaments. Again he improves daily with treatment and we should see his return in the next



I'm sure we will carry on where we were before Hull and show that we really are worthy not only of being in the Championship but also of our top three placing.





PAUL ATCHESON

Outstanding attacking full-back. A product of Blackbrook Juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Moved to Wigan and then joined Oldham in June 1995 for £50,000. Has represented Great Britain at Academy and Under 21 Level and has been a member of the Welsh team in the various international competitions during the past two years.

SCOTT RANSON

Fast and elusive winger. A product of Thatto Heath Juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Swinton in 1987. Was top scorer at Swinton during his last two seasons with the Lions. Joined Oldham in February 1992 and has continued his prolific try scoring feats at Wastersheddings.

DARREN ABRAM

Prolific try scoring centre who has been Oldham's top try scorer during the past three season. A product of Thatto Heath Juniors (St. Helens) who won BARLA international honours before turning professional with Warrington in 1985. Has a spell on loan with Swinton before moving to Chorley Borough and then Rochdale Hornets. Oldham signed him in February 1993.

PAUL TOPPING

Utility player who is equally effective whether at centre, stand-off or loose-forward. Terrific defender. Topping is a product of the Wigan St. Patricks Junior club who turned professional with Swinton in 1985. He had a spell on loan with Mansfield before joining Leigh in 1990 and then transferring to Oldham in September 1993. Topping made one appearance for Lancashire in 1991 and was included in the Ireland squad for the Emerging Nations Championship in 1995.

ROB MYLER

Versatile back equally at home either at full-back or on the wing. A product of the Widnes St. Maries

Junior club who turned professional with Warrington in 1989. Had a spell on loan at Salford in 1995. Transferred to Oldham in July 1995 for £50,000.

FRANCIS MALONEY

Powerful stand-off and accurate positional kicker. A product of the St. John Fisher Junior club (Dewsbury) who turned professional with Leeds in 1990. Moved to Featherstone Rovers in 1992 and won Great Britain under 21 recognition whilst at Post Office Road. Transferred to Warrington in 1994 but did not settle at Wilderspool and so he moved onto Oldham in July 1995 for £50,000.

MARTIN CROMPTON

Scrum-half, captain and the orchestrator of most of Oldham's attacking play. A former Wigan St. Patricks Junior who began his professional career with Warrington in 1986. Moved back to Wigan in 1992 when he joined the senior Central Park outfit. Oldham snapped him up for a bargain £35,000 fee in September 1993.

IAN GILDART

Hard working fast forward. A product of Wigan Colts who turned professional at Central Park in 1986. Although he made 139 appearances for Wigan he failed to gain a regular first team spot and so moved over to Wakefield Trinity in 1994. Moved back over the Pennines to Oldham for £45,000 last August. Represented Great Britain at Under 21 level during his Central Park days.

JOHN CLARKE

Outstanding young hooker. A former East Leeds Junior who turned professional with Oldham in May 1993. Clarke toured Australia with the BARLA Under 18s in 1993 and further honours came his way two seasons ago when he represented Great Britain Under 21s against the Kangaroos. Had an unhappy campaign last season with a twice broken arm but is now back on top form.

JASON TEMU

Hard running and tough tackling prop who first came to notice with the Marist club in New Zealand. He joined the Counties-Manukau outfit for the New Zealand Lion Red Cup competition of 1994 and it was after that successful campaign that Temu ioined Oldham. He has represented New Zealand Residents during their 1994 tour of Australia and was a member of the Cook Island team which lifted the 1995 Emerging Nations Championship.

GARY LORD

A player well known here at Thrum Hall is Gary Lord. He is a former Stanley Rangers Junior (Castleford) who joined the senior Castleford club in 1984. Lord appeared at full-back for Castleford at Wembley in 1986 but he has since developed into a hard working second-row forward. He was transferred to Leeds in 1988 and then on to Halifax in October 1991. In all, Lord made 88 appearances for Halifax before moving to Oldham in July 1994 for £35,000.

JOE FAIMALO

Hard working second-row forward who is enjoying his best run of form. A product of the Eastern Suburbs club in New Zealand, Faimalo had brief spells with Workington Town, Oldham and then Swinton during the 1991-92 season without impressing. He returned home and enjoyed success with Hawkes Bay which prompted him to return to Oldham in September 1994. His determination and stamina since then have made him one of the mainstays of the Roughyed pack.

DAVID BRADBURY

Fiery utility forward who gives 100% in every match. Oldham signed him from Leigh Miners Welfare Juniors in August 1991. A former BARLA Under 18 tourist to New Zealand.

HOWARD HILL

Outstanding young back row forward. Joined Oldham in July 1994 from the Hensingham Junior club of Whitehaven. Made steady progress and broke into the first team squad at the beginning of last season. Has given some mature performances and was included in the Great Britain Under 21 squad for the match against France last January.

AFI LEUILA

Tough tackling centre or winger. He was signed last September from the Counties-Manukau club of New Zealand. Leuila has enjoyed spells with St. Helens in 1994 and with North Queensland Cowboys last summer. Has played rugby union for Tonga.

STEVE GARTLAND

Talented utility player who was with the Oldham St. Annes Junior club-before turning professional with Rochdale Hornets in 1990. Gartland was a prolific point scorer at Spotland where he notched up what was then a club record 276 points during season 1992-93. He was transferred to Oldham in July 1994.

PAUL DAVIDSON

Hard working prop or second-row forward. a product of the Hensingham Junior club (Whitehaven) who turned professional with Widnes in 1990. Joined Oldham in July 1994 for £17,000. Has a fine turn of speed which he uses with benefit following the switch to summer rugby.

CHRIS McKINNEY

Outstanding young forward who can play either hooker, second-row or loose-forward. Signed from the Hensingham Junior club (Whitehaven) in August 1994. Made rapid progress and broke into first team squad at the beginning of last season. Was a try scorer in Great Britain's 64-10 Academy victory over France last January.

IAN SHERRATT

Experienced prop. A former Lancashire schoolboy representative who played for the Waterhead (Oldham) Junior club before turning professional with Bradford Northern in 1982. Transferred to Oldham in 1987 and then moved to Salford in 1989 before returning to Watersheddings in November

ADRIAN BELLE

Powerful, determined winger. Was with Oldham St. Annes Junior club before he turned professional with Rochdale Hornets in 1990. Moved to Watersheddings in October 1993 and has become a regular in the Roughyeds first team squad.

MIKE NEAL

Speedy threequarter. A product of Parkside Juniors (Leigh) who has also played with the Wigan St. Patricks Junior outfit. Turned professional with Wigan in 1989 but was unable to break into their first team squad. Joined Oldham in March 1995.

CHRIS PARR

Hard working prop. A former Wigan St. Patricks Junior who began his professional career with Huddersfield in 1990. Won Great Britain Under 21 honours whilst at Fartown. Moved back over the Pennines in 1992 when he joined Swinton. Oldham signed him in October 1993.

GARY BURNS

Fine young utility player who joined Oldham in December 1993. Forced his way into first team contention last year. Was scrum-half then, could be hooker now.

STONES SUPER LEAGUE

WIGAN v ST. HELENS

Wigan are unbeaten in last eight home league meetings with St. Helens and they claimed a 58-4 victory against their neighbours at Central Park on Boxing Day. Saints fielded a much weakened side, that day, and Welsh International Scott Quinnell scored four tries with fellow back rowers Mick Cassidy and Simon Haughton getting two each. Wigan defeated Saints 25-16 at Huddersfield in January's Regal Trophy final but Shaun McRae's men were 41-26 winners at Knowsley Road in April when Danny Arnold scored a try hat-trick. Saints' last league win at Central Park was a 32-22 success in December 1987 when Phil Veivers scored two tries, while Wigan's last home league defeat was against Wakefield (13-20) in February 1994.

LEEDS v CASTLEFORD

Beaten 26-23, thanks to a late Jason Flowers try at Wheldon Road in April, Leeds are seeking only their second home Super League win of the season against the Tigers. Castleford have failed to win in their last four league visits to Headingley, although they won 34-14 in a Regal quarter-final in January 1995, having drawn 14-14 in league football earlier that season. Marvin Golden crossed two tries as Leeds claimed a 28-16 win over Castleford last Boxing Day, while Castleford's last league win at Leeds was an 18-4 success inspired by two-try Graham Steadman.

BRADFORD BULLS v SHEFFIELD EAGLES

Sheffield inflicted Bradford's heaviest Super League defeat of the season, at Don Valley in April, winning 40-24 in a game in which Karl Fairbank received his marching orders. But the Eagles have fared badly at Odsal, winning only twice in 11 league and cup visits since 1989. Bradford won two home meetings with Sheffield last season, Paul Newlove scoring three tries in a 34-18 league win and St John Ellis scoring a try and five goals in their 22-0 Regal Trophy victory in November. Sheffield's last win at Odsal was a 17-8 Yorkshire Cup triumph in September 1992, with their solitary league win at Bradford being the 10-6 victory they claimed in February 1991 when their try-scorers were Sam Panapa and Mark Aston.

HALIFAX BLUE SOX v OLDHAM BEARS

Halifax have won only once in six attempts at Thrum Hall in Super League and they will be attempting to avenge a 22-34 defeat by Oldham at Watersheddings in April. Paul Crook and Wally Gibson scored three tries as the Bears were 12-4 winners on their last league visit to Halifax, in January, ending a seven-year wait for success at Thrum Hall. Western Samoan skipper John Schuster starred in Halifax's 34-8 home win over Oldham in 1994/95, scoring 22 points.

PARIS ST. GERMAIN v WARRINGTON

The French side suffered an eighth consecutive Super League defeat at Don Valley Stadium last Saturday, and their losing sequence began with a 24-48 defeat by Warrington at Wilderspool in April. Ian Knott and Toa Kohe-Love starred with two tries apiece in that Wire victory, while Regis Pastre-Courtine scored a hat trick in vain for the visitors. At least Paris showed a lot of spirit in scoring two late tries at Sheffield last week, but they have lost their last three games at the Charlety Stadium.

WORKINGTON TOWN v LONDON BRONCOS


London cruised to a 50-0 victory over Workington at the Valley, in April, with Terry Matterson setting Super League and London club records with his 11 goals and 26 points in the match. Town, although, have a fine home record against the Broncos and won 32-10 in January when Dean Marwood scored a try and six goals and ex-London players Logan Campbell and Mark Johnson were among the try scorers. London won 13-12 on their previous visit to Workington, in Second Division football in 1993-94 season, but lost 22-30 to the Cumbrians in the Premiership Final at Old Trafford at the end of that season.





FOUR TRIES FOR "BENTO"

"THIS has been coming for a while.

"To have come here and won that easily is a great effort."

Steve Simms could well afford to be a contented man after last Sunday's win at London Broncos.

"Our defence was superb," he purred.

second half, and although they scored one at the end, to keep the Broncos to one try in 40 minutes is a good effort.

"Our support play was also fantastic. We had worked hard all week on where to attack London after watching them against Wigan last week, and the game plan worked superbly. It was good to see John Bentley back to form. He's one of the best wingers in the world."


Bentley was at his very best at The Valley - the kind of form that makes him one of the hardest wingers in the game to stop.

Opposite number John Minto will be waking up in fright all week at the thought of the rampaging Bentley charging at him, and don't be surprised to find the name of Minto missing from the team list in Workington this afternoon.

Bentley's reaction was typical tongue in cheek stuff.

"I was very surprised with the London boys. Did they have a midweek game? he asked League Express reporter Andy Wilson.

"It's only the second time I have scored four tries in a match. The other was against Sheffield last season, and it's come at a good time because our





sponsors put up £500 for the next player to score a hat trick. But I'll share it - it's a team game."

But his next point was more serious.

"The Wigan game must have taken a lot out of them, because they were very, very lacklustre."

Which is a danger that Simms and his men must avoid going into today's game against the Bears (are they still Rougheyeds?).

"After the Lord Mayor's Show" is one of the most oft-used clichés in Rugby League and the Blue Sox will have to guard against complacency after what was one of the most impressive performances of Super League.











BOBBIE GOULDING, Rugby League's point scorer supreme, is back in the England squad after recovering from a cracked collar bone.

Goulding made a record breaking return to the game at the weekend, grabbing 20 points as European Super League leaders St. Helens slammed Workington Town 60-16.

And today he was immediately included in coach Phil Larder's 19 man squad for the European Super League Championship decider against Wales at Cardiff next Wednesday (26 June)

Goulding's 20 point haul against Workington Town included his 100th goal of the season in only 17 matches - the fastest century at the start of the season in Rugby League history - and his 200th point.

Also back in the England squad after injury are Keighley Cougars stand off Darryl Powell and Wigan trio Mick Cassidy, Andrew Farrell and Kirs Radlinski.

Cassidy and Farrell proved their fitness at the weekend by helping Wigan to victory over Oldham Bears and obviously Radlinski and Powell will have to play this weekend to ensure they are fully fit.

ST. HELENS CHASE RECORD RUN

St. Helens visit Wigan in the Stones Super League on Friday needing a victory that would equal their arch rivals' run of 13 successive wins from the start of a "major league" season.

Widnes set the current record with 13 successive wins at the start of the Division One in 1981-82 and Wigan equalled it in 1994-95. Widnes drew their next match before suffering their first defeat to give them a record opening unbeaten run of 14 matches.

St. Helens already hold the record for the overall longest winning run in either Super League or the old Division One with 25 successive wins from February to December 1986. This is also the longest unbeaten run.

The Saints have also won all five Silk Cut Challenge Cup-ties for a 100 per cent success record of 17 in all matches this season. Their last defeat was in the final match of last season when they lost 32-24 to Halifax on 21 January.

But they have a long way to go to beat their best club sequences which are as follows:







THE influence of the games blueprint Framing the Future continues to be felt with clubs under notice to achieve a salary cap of 40%. The salary cap is an attempt to control clubs spending on Football talent to a level that the club can sustain. Therefore all player payments, national insurance and other benefits in kind should not exceed 40% of a clubs income. It would appear that very few % of clubs currently are within salary cap.

The rule doesn't come into force until January 1st, 1997 so clubs have time to address the problem. Clearly there are two

strategies available, a) to increase income to an extent that existing contracts can be maintained or b) to reduce players costs. Obviously the first is the most palatable but usually harder to achieve. For instance if we could find a mechanism of improving the average attendance by 2,000 paying spectators (which would be nice trick anyway) consequences for salary cap purposes would be the equivalent of just one extra player.

As the deadline approaches the other problem in reducing the player cost is of course that legally binding employment contracts have been agreed, and the club is committed. Transferring players is diminishing as an option because all clubs are aware of the situation and looking to off load player costs. Transfer fees are no longer driven by player ability but by the contract commitment that is being assumed. And when the full implications of the Jean Marc Bosman case are fully felt transfer fees themselves will be a thing of the past.



DDE RADIO IF YOU want a job that involves plenty of travelling then become a Rugby League

If you want a job with a certain future don't become a Rugby

League reporter.

In the past three weeks I watched matches in Carcassonne, Paris, Cardiff, Gateshead, London - O, and Wigan. There is no guarantee that we will be watching Rugby League in any of those venues in 5 years time, not even in Wigan.


For those of us with an emotional investment in the game, each day and each venue brings about a new shot of optimism of total pessimism.

In Carcassonne, Rugby League is indestructible. It has survived a Nazi invasion and Rugby Union subterfuge. But the game will no more than just survive in Southern France.

You travel up to Paris and you feel as though you are in a bubble that is set to burst at any moment. The players are dispirited, the crowds are beginning to dwindle and Tas Baltieri, the soul of French Rugby League and founder of Paris St Germain is heading back to Australia. Something dramatic needs to happen if Paris is to retain a Super League identity.

A crowd of around 6000 was decent in Gateshead for the England vs France game. It's just such a pity the game was so one sided. And unfortunately the North East still seems an age away from getting a professional Rugby League side.

The further South you travel the more you can begin to smile. Interestingly, Rugby League in Cardiff is burgeoning, they simply have to be given a chance to launch a Super League team. The impression from the locals was that League and Union can happily sit side by side in the valleys.



In London it is more of a struggle. If you are a Blue sox fan and recently travelled down to The Valley, you will know now why the Bay City rollers split up in the first place.

You will also get better odds on the Broncos surviving than Woody and the boys will get of getting into the pop charts again.

But London need to be supported now. If Paris does fail, London's success becomes even more vital to the game.

There are still some people who have the attitude that it doesn't matter whether we spread the game or not. We have survived for 100 years in our own little northern corner, so why not spend the next century in the same manner.

Well it is simple. If we stay as we are, we say goodbye to top class Rugby League. The better players will go to Union, even the better clubs will be tempted that

If we don't succeed in expansion then not being able to watch Rugby League, even in Wigan, will be a very real possibility.




