Talking

OLDHAM Bears make a little bit of club history this evening by entertaining, for the first time, the new Super League club based in France, Paris St Germain.

This is a new concept and a new team and the people behind the Paris club are battling against the odds to get their team solidly established in the heart of the Rugby Union Territory.

They face a big task and one wonders if that task would have been easier had the new club been established in the south-west of France where Rugby League is already well established and part of everyday life.

It is interesting to note that there is now talk of Super League applications being received from more traditional League bases such as Bordeaux and Toulouse. not to mention Barcelona and Milan. Super League wings are indeed spreading.

The Paris St Germain club looks to have set the ball rolling across the Channel in Super League's ambitious plans to create a competition that lives up to its name.

Oldham Bears and hundreds of our fans had a thoroughly enjoyable trip to Paris at Easter, where the supporters not only had a great time in the beautiful and cultural French capital but got an early taste of what Super League in the future might be all about.

Six or seven coach loads of supporters made the trip, while others went by plane or car and judging by the feedback we received at the club afterwards everyone voted it a massive hit.

The game ended in a draw, but I know our lads felt they had dropped a point rather than gained one after commanding a substantial lead early in the second half and finally losing that lead only with the last throw of the dice.

To the neutral supporter it must have been a thriller

and we hope both sides put on a spectacular show again this evening when Boundary Park stages its second Super League game.

The Wigan game on the opening weekend of the season was played here and shown live on SKY **SPORTS** and tonight we extend another warm welcome to Eddie Hemmings, Stevo and the entire Sky team.

We have seen some stunning Super League matches on Sky in the past three months and I am confident that more public awareness of our great game will eventually be reflected in increased attendances.

> Changes on the scale of those which have so dramatically overtaken Rugby League in the past 12 months will take time to be universally accepted. It will take one or two seasons for the new-look game to become established, but there is no doubt that it will become established and then it will go from strength to strength. Facilities will be constantly


improved, new grounds will be built and the quality of the football will improve as players and coaches get used to the demands of summer rugby and the great sporting public gets used to having a new game to watch in their summer schedule.

At Oldham, we are hoping our new overseas forward Reece Cleveland Guy will be here by now and that he may be included in the squad for this evening's game.

SUPERLEAGUE

Reflections

Bienvenu A Paris St. Germain. Nous souhaitons bonne chance a tous les officiels, joueurs et spectateurs de la premiere equipe de France.

After such a bright start to their season it is distressing to see Paris St. Germain struggling. For the future of Super League and the game in Europe it is essential that a reasonably successful French side is established. Unfortunately the demands made on the Paris St. Germain players were always going to make it difficult to sustain any impetus. Many of their players were involved until the end of May in the French Championship play offs and in the Lord Derby Cup. Travelling back and forth for these matches and their Super League games can have done the players no good at all. No sooner are these fixtures completed than along comes the internationals against Wales and England, I noted that the French squad to play England contained only two players not contracted to Paris St. Germain. And did you notice that two days after the Welsh game Paris were expected to play Castleford in a match brought forward for the benefit of Sky TV? How professional athletes are expected to produce top drawer performances under these circumstances is beyond me!

It seems obvious that for the future we must provide the resources, management and coaching skills to build a successful game across the Channel. I for one am entirely in favour of expanding the French presence in Super League

and of admitting French clubs to the English First and/or Second Divisions. Anything which helps to improve standards and provides variety has to be good for the game. Longer term I even look forward to a Super League presence in Barcelona and Casablanca, wouldn't that be different to a wet Saturday in Workington?

Back at home I very much favour fast tracking South Wales into Super League. I'd love to see Newcastle in too. However. I don't like the idea of a merged Humberside club being fasttracked (although this week's rejection of a merger by Hull FC seems to have put this one on hold). This is because, in my view, existing sides should earn their place on merit. It would be a real slap in the face if Salford Reds. Keighley Cougars (already denied twice by re-organisation) or Widnes were leap frogged by a team below them in the league. Potential support should not be a criteria for promotion. If it were, Wimbledon would not be a Premier League soccer team, yet their performances clearly merit their status. And, anyway, how will we know what Keighley Cougars true Super League potential following is if we never admit them to membership? Keighley is not one of those clubs Maurice Lindsay could throw his famous pocket handkerchief over. whereas the West Lancashire area covering Wigan, St. Helens, Warrington and Widnes is. Any chance of a merger there?

While we are striving constantly to establish ourselves in this first Super League campaign, we are also looking to the future and trying to lay down some roots so that the Bears will be up there with the best for many years to come. When I joined Oldham as an 18 year old there was a first class youth set up and in that summer of 1979 a lot of lads were signed who progressed through the colts team and the 'A' team and eventually went on to form the backbone of a side which kept Oldham in the first division for five excellent

The head coach was Graham Starkey and I think it's fair to say that not since Starkey's days have Oldham put as much emphasis and shown as much interest in a well structured youth policy as we are doing now.

We don't have vast sums of money to lay out on 12 and 13 year olds, as some clubs do, but we are doing our homework, locally as well as further afield, and we already have a nice group of 15, 16 and 17 year olds who will be given the opportunity of taking part in our newly created apprenticeship

A lot of local boys have pledged their futures to the club and we can promise them that they will be given every opportunity to make the grade in a professional environment.

My long term plan for Oldham is to have a first class youth policy in which boys can graduate through the system, earn their contracts on the strength of their talent and their hard work and progress through a young Alliance side until they are ready for Super League.

We are striving right now to bring down the average age of the Alliance side and we are rewarding hard work and talent. as shown by the decision to give Neil Melling and Jimmy Cowan the opportunity to train full time with the senior

They grasped that opportunity with both hands and I am sure they will benefit from it.

As with any youth policy there are bound to be disappointments along the way. Some boys fall by the wayside. Others won't come up to early expectations.

We will have to make difficult decisions, but I can assure everyone they will be made with our professional judgement of a players abilities and attitudes and nothing else.

There are disappointments at all clubs, but there are terrific success stories, too, and I'm sure there will be a lot of those at Oldham as the youth policy starts to blossom.



DON YATES Down

Memory Lane

Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear.

During the 1920's a couple of attempts were made to introduce Rugby League into France by staging exhibition matches involving touring teams from Australasia. In 1922 a match between England and the Australian touring team was cancelled when the proposed ground in Paris became unavailable after the Rugby Union hierarchy brought pressure to bear on the local authorities. Five years later New Zealand were set to meet England, again in Paris, but injuries in the New Zealand camp and rumours of a strike amongst the Kiwi tourists caused that venture to be abandoned. At that time it was thought that the game would never spread across the Channel but the visit of the 1933 Kangaroos and disagreement in Rugby Union circles resurrected hopes. The home Rugby Unions had banned France from the International Championship (The Five Nations tournament) because of the suspected flouting of the amateur rules and allegations of rough play. With French Rugby starved of international competition, the time was considered ripe for the introduction of the Rugby League game onto the Continent.

The Kangaroos were scheduled to meet Wales down at Wembley on Saturday 30th December so arrangements were made for the Kangaroo party to travel over to Paris immediately after the match and meet England at the Stade Pershing the following afternoon.

The Kangaroos had a good day out at Wembley where they beat Wales 51-19, centre Dave Brown leading the way with a try and nine goals. As arranged the Kangaroos then moved on to Paris where 24 hours later they faced an 'England' team which included five

Welshmen. The line-up in Paris was as follows: England: Jim Sullivan (Wigan); Jack Morley (Wigan, Arthur Atkinson (Castleford), Joe Oliver (Hull), Tommy Thompson (Warrington); Stan Brogden (Huddersfield). Bryn Evans (Swinton); Norman Fender (York), Les White (Hunslet), Nat Silcock (Widnes), Ken Jubb (Leeds), Bill Horton (Wakefield Trinity) and Ted Sadler (Oldham).

Australia: Frank McMillan; Jack Why, Dave Brown, Vic Hey, Cliff Pearce; Fred Doonar, Les Mead; Mick Madsen, Arthur Folwell, Ray Stehr, Jim Gibbs, Joe Pearce and Wally Prigg.

Despite the cold weather, snow and a frozen pitch, a crowd of 5,000 attended the match. It was an opportunity for the Kangaroos to regain a little pride after a 3-0 whitewash which they suffered against Great Britain. They took the opportunity with both hands, led 20-10 at half-time and went on to run in 15 tries as they walloped the English by an amazing 63-13 scoreline. Dave Brown was once again the inspiration with three tries and another nine goals. There was also a hat-trick of tries from Jim Gibbs whilst the other nine tries were shared by Joe Pearce (2), Jack Why (2), Wally Prigg (2), Vic Hey, Les Mead and Ray Stehr. England's tries came via Bryn Evans, Jack Morley and Ken Jubb with Jim Sullivan landing a couple of goals. The match proved an exciting spectacle for the French who within three months had organised a squad of players to undertake a short tour of England. As a result of those events a little over 32 years ago; the game did spread to France where it has had its ups and downs but where it still maintains a foothold. And long may the game continue on the Continent so that the British domestic game can be brightened up by the visit of the colourful French.



On this day.

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

The Parisienne tour of England continues this evening when the St Germain squad visit Boundary Park. Oldham followers will be hoping that tonight's result is similar to that which involved the French national team when they met Australian side Newcastle on Sunday, 28th June 1981. Winger Tanna scored three of the seven Newcastle tries that afternoon as the French were tanned 29-0. It was on this day in 1989 that Queensland met New South Wales at Lang Park, Brisbane in the third State of Origin match of that season. The Queenslanders had won the first two matches of the series and so were looking for a whitewash. This they achieved with relative ease. registering a 36-16 victory. Centre Dale Shearer led the way with two tries and four goals although man-of-thematch was hooker Kerrod Walters. There was a crowd of 33,268 to watch this match which generates more passion than test matches in Australia. One test match which the Aussies will quickly like to forget took place on this day in 1952, Saturday, 28th June. Brisbane Cricket Ground was

the venue of the second test match between Australia and New Zealand. The Kangaroos were confident of success after winning the first test 25-13 but the Kiwis rocked them by piling up the highest score ever conceded by an Australian test side. Full-back Des White converted eight of the nine Kiwi tries and also landed three penalties in New Zealand's amazing 49-25 victory. That victory boosted New Zealand confidence and they were able to clinch the series with a 19-9 victory at Sydney the following Wednesday. Exactly 28 years previously, on Saturday 28th June 1924, Great Britain met Australia in the second test match at Sydney Cricket Ground before a crowd of 33,842. The Lions had won the first test 22-3 so were looking for a win which would clinch the Ashes. Heavy rain had reduced the pitch to a quagmire which should have suited the two Oldham representatives in the British line-up, winger Syd Rix and second-rower Albert Brough. 

WELCOME Paris St Germain to

Boundary Park

Full back Laurent Luchesse is one of the growing band of French league players to have tasted English league football. Capped by France at Under 21 level Laurent first came to England along with compatriot Pierre Jammes for the 1993-94 season, both joining the Huddersfield club. Luchesse made seventeen appearances for the "Fartowners", scoring a brace of tries during his debut season. He followed up with seven goals from just two outings in the 1994-95 campaign before joining Sheffield. Laurent, who has represented Tarn Sud and Carcasonne in the French League has been the regular full back for the St. Germain club. His deputy is Bagdad Yaha, he made his full debut in the defeat at Warrington in April

Moldovian winger Mikhail Plskunov starred in the autumn Emerging Nations competition and a total of five tries from just two games, including a hat trick against Morocco at Northampton. His only appearance for St. Germain was in the opening game against Sheffield. The likely wingers are Pascal Bomati and Regis Pastre-Courtine. The latter had a spell with the Batley club where he played under the shortened name of Regis Pastre, he scored an hat trick in the free scoring encounter at Warrington. All the wingers have been able to register tries in the Super League with Bomati scoring in three consecutive games and Arnaud Cervello claiming three tries in the opening

Freddie Banquet holds the distinction of scoring the first ever Super League try. The 22 year old has plenty of experience of English conditions after spells with Yorkshire clubs Featherstone Rovers. Sheffield Eagles and Wakefield Trinity. Freddie was the second top scorer for Rovers in their 1994/95 Stones Bitter Championship campaign with 94 points. He then became one of the many French players to join Sheffield Eagles, in his six outings with the Don Valley club he scored 30 points from 13 goals and 1 try. From Sheffield his English rugby journey continued to Wakefield where, once again he found scoring quite an easy achievement. By this time he was scoring tries at regular intervals with nine touchdowns in seven outings during the Centenary season. Banguet played in both of France's games in the Halifax Centenary World Cup event, kicking a goal against Wales at Ninian Park, Cardiff.

Centre Pierre Chamorin was given the honour of captaining the Paris team for their opening Super League encounter against Sheffield Eagles. Formerly wth the AS St. Esteve club, where he played alongside brother Stephen, he was a member of St. Esteve's 1994 Regal Trophy side which faced Bradford at Odsal

Now a regular member of the full French international side he has regularly attracted the attention of the top English clubs. After a 1989 test debut against New Zealand he is now on the verge of his 20th cap. In the recent World Cup he was a try scorer in the encounter with Western Samoa.

The Playmakers

Australian Todd Brown occupied the stand off berth in the opening two Super League games. Injured in the game against London he has been replaced by Fabien Devecchi. The regular scrum half, Patrick Entat, is well known to English fans after periods with the Hull and Leeds clubs. He left Headingley to return to the French club Avignon. A regular international, and captain of his country, Entat was voted player of the series on the 1995 French tour of New Zealand. That was just one of many tours for the player with 33 test caps who can expect to add to that tally in this summer's European Super League Championship.

A member of the French schoolboys tour party to Australia in 1983 he toured Australia in 1990 and 1994 with the full French party. Entat was the French player of the year in 1989 and was a try scorer in the 1990 Perpignan test encounter with the Kangaroos, the last time that the French side could manage a score against the Aussies.

The Engine Room

Huge Polish international rugby union forward Gregory Kacala was one of the many unknowns when the St. Germain club made their debut in the

Super League. He has impressed in the televised encounters and forms a formidable looking prop partnership with the pony tailed Kava Utoikamanu. He made his first Super League appearance at London and has gained regular selection in front of Australian Jason Sands and Kiwi Vea Bloomfield. Goalkicking hooker Patrick Torreilles comes from a more traditional source, the French club Pia. A member of the French 1995 Halifax Centenary World Cup squad the current French international hooker has been a regular inclusion in touring squads. In 1991 he journeved to Papua New Guinea and New Zealand, in 1994 to Papua New Guinea, Australia and Fiji, and last year to New Zealand and Canada. Scorer of one of France's three World Cup tries he was a member of Pia's 1995 Championship winning side.

Kiwi Darren Adams has settled in well in the second row. He has also played centre for St. Germain club but appears to be the regular second row partner for international Didier Cabestany. The French second row made his international debut in the narrow defeat against Great Britain at Perpignan in 1989. He kept his place for the return fixture at Headingley and played his part in a 25-18 victory. A former player with the well known St. Esteve club he moved to Catalan in 1991 and was a member of their 1994 Championship winning team. A French tourist to New Zealand and Canada in 1995 he was also a member of their Halifax Centenary World Cup squad and scored a try against the Western Samoans at Cardiff. Loose forward Jacques Pech is one of the most versatile players in the Paris St. Germain squad, Jacques can play stand off, hooker or in the back row positions. A member of Pia's 1995 Championship squad Jacques toured Russia with the 1992 French touring party and followed on with selection for the 1995 tour of New Zealand and Canada.

Jacques played in both of France's 1995 European Championship encounters but missed out on the subsequent World Cup competition. He has been a regular in the loose forward role for Paris.


Listed in the original 34 man squad are a number of well known French league players who have still to make an impact in the Stones Super League. Ones to watch out for are:

David Despin a stand off or centre who has been marked down as a possible future Test captain. He has made just three test appearances. The most recent against Wales in the 1995 Halifax Centenary World Cup when he played at full back.

Frederic Teixido - The Limoux prop forward is renowned for his endeavours on the rugby field and has been amply rewarded at test level with regular selection since a debut against Wales in 1989. Made his Paris debut in the heavy defeat at Wigan. Frederic gained a 1992 French Division One Championship winners medal with Limoux and featured in both of France's 1995 Halifax Centenary Word Cup competition matches.

Pascal Fages - Stand off A player with plenty of international experience Pascal fitted the stand off role for France in both their matches during last year's Halifax Centenary World Cup competition. Pascal toured Papua New Guinea and New Zealand in 1991 but missed the 1995 tour through injury. Has now gained 16 full caps for France. Lilian Herbert - Forward With eight test appearances behind him Lilian has also enjoyed success in the French domestic competition, picking up a Championship winners medal in 1995. A mobile front or second row forward Lilian has been a member of the French touring teams to Australia in 1994 and New Zealand last year.

Karl Jaavuo - Prop A 1995 test debut against England in Gateshead was the first of four caps for the Pia prop forward, with over five years experience of the French league behind him Karl has already gained a champ onship winners medal. He can also count on his Australian experience, Karl actually comes from Cairns.







Thoughts from the

Terraces...

It is no particular comfort, I know, but it is becoming increasingly evident that our crowd problems are by no means unique. Wigan, Leeds and Workington in Super League are the latest to hit the headlines, with many other smaller clubs suffering too. I am afraid that it is the switch to summer mainly at fault. Regular sport's spectators are mostly creatures of habit, and when habits are forced to be broken, as they have been, you cannot assume that new ones will replace them instantly. Summer Saturday evenings will never be acceptable to RL fans - and someone should chop that idea from the schedules straightaway (or, at least, as soon as the Sky contract allows us to). Away matches on Sunday nights are not really attractive propositions to all but the most dedicated, either. And then people get out of the habit of going to away matches altogether. Even at Halifax, our closest derby match, the number of Oldham supporters I could spot was the lowest I can remember. And I had to chuckle to hear Mr Lindsay expressing regrets that the first summer season coincided with Euro '96: did he not know it was due? And the Olympics are still to come, Maurice. Not to mention the July and August holidays. No, it has to be said that, at this stage, summer rugby, at least in terms of attendances at matches, has been a failure.

However, I don't think it is all gloom. Certainly Bradford have shown what might be possible, as well as London and, to a lesser extent, Sheffield. And all three have gone in for at least a credible pre-match entertainment programme. I think Jim Quinn's comments at last week's A.G.M. were very sensible. We will sadly miss the Sunday afternoon

habit in the winter months ahead, I have no doubt, and it may well be that, by spring 1997, new habits may be ready to be established. I am not so sure about Friday nights as he is; what about those away trips to Castleford and Saints, never mind Workington, London, Paris (!) and Cardiff (?)? But there may certainly be more chance next year than this, with the farcical Centenary season by then faded far enough into the memory, the chaos in Australia hopefully over, with the knock-on effects for the opportunities for our top four (I am really looking forward to getting Manly up to Watersheddings), and Mr Lindsay's casual musings about who might be unsuitable and who might be forcibly merged or fast-tracked hopefully knocked on the head. We need a period of stability, with clear rules of the game, and the maximum effort of all focused on both retaining/regaining traditional support and earning new. On the field, what a superb performance at Halifax. Warrington was good, both in the first half quality and the second half fight-back. Wigan was nothing like as bad as the score suggested. But Fax was superb. The defensive commitment was top-notch - we held out for six consecutive sets of six at one stage. And to hit them as we did just before and just after half-time was Wigan-style at its best. Hats off to the cracking job done in Francis Maloney's absence by Paul Crook - I thought his passing was particularly impressive against the Wire. And, with Gildart and Lord stand-out men at Thrum Hall, we now seem to have around a dozen who can do a good job in the pack. Wins tonight and in the next two games are not unrealistic targets - and would surely see us into the top half of the table. Dizzy heights indeed!





Illawarra Steelers 14 Brisbane Broncos 6

At Steelers Stadium

The round of upsets continued yesterday when Illawarra held on to beat Premiership heavyweights Brisbane 14-6 at Steelers Stadium. The loss was Brisbane's third on the trot.







OVER TO YOU

BOCCES by Roger Halstead of the Oldham Evening Chronicle

The importance, to a club like Oldham Bears, of staying in Super League is best underlined by the experience of several clubs which easily recall the great days of yesteryear while looking enviously at Super League in 1996.

One thinks of Hull KR, in division two, and of Salford, Hull, Widnes and perhaps Featherstone Rovers in division one, good clubs which were a power in the game not all that long ago.

Going further back in time it is a tragedy for those old enough to remember the great days of clubs like Barrow, Swinton, Leigh, Wakefield and Huddersfield to see them now in the lower divisions.

Credit all of them with the guts and determination to keep the flag flying while striving at all times to reach their goals, whether their objectives be promotion to Super League on the one hand or mere survival on the other.

If Super League is the aim they are battling against enormous odds. Of the division one clubs, only Salford look to have realistic hopes of winning and retaining Super League status, while the plight of the once mighty Chemics was underlined recently when they had to release the Hulme brothers due to financial difficulties.

It is reasonable to predict that the gap between Super League and division one will grow wider by the year, and that before the current five year Super League contract has run its course we will see new clubs leap frogging the also rans to join the elite.

Where does all this leave the Bears? Well, while they are in Super League and while progress is being made on the proposed new stadium there are realistic grounds for optimism far beyond the expectations of those clubs currently on the outside and looking in.

Possession is nine tenths of the law in the game's corridors of power just as it is in the coaching manual, but I do wonder sometimes if a town with great rugby league traditions and one of the strongest schoolboy and amateur games in the

country has fully appreciated what the club has achieved in the past few years.

Oldham's presence in Super League is akin to Oldham Athletic being in the Premiership. Short of winning it, or appearing in the play off, the Bears cannot advance up the league ladder.

They are up there with the elite. They are in Super League by right, and many a club would give anything to swop shops with them.
