Talking

ON and Off the field steady progress is being made here at Watersheddings and I think it is reflected in the recent records of both our Super League side and our Alliance team.

The Alliance side, under the watchful eye of Paddy Kirwan, went to Castleford on Thursday having won four games in succession and with a record of five wins out of six matches since Paddy took charge about the middle of May.

Andy Goodway's men, meantime, have won four of their last five Super League games to raise hopes of a late-season challenge for fourth place, currently occupied by Warrington.

The squad is being built up steadily, but with the acquisition of Kiwi forward Reece Guy, who has had senior substitute appearances against Paris and Leeds, we now feel there are plenty of options for pack places and that the player-search should now be concentrated on the threequarters. Today's game should be a cracker. Our win at Leeds was particularly pleasing because we achieved it without reaching our best form and we pulled off a League

double over the Headingley outfit, last achieved by an Oldham side in the 1986/87 season.

Two nights earlier, at Wigan, Castleford put up a superb show and lost by one point in somewhat controversial circumstances - a clear indication that the men from Wheldon Road are running into good form.

Our fellows will be keen to complete a third double of the season, having already taken four points off Halifax and Leeds, but Lee Crooks and his boys will want to build on their big performance at Central Park

Another top game is in prospect, but we shouldn't be surprised at that, judging by the number of first-class matches that have taken place in this first Super League season, sadly in front of disappointingly low attendances. Some commentators are now calling for an end to summer rugby, but as an advocate of a summer season from day one I see no reason to shift my stand, given that the first campaign was always going to experience teething troubles. For those who were never keen on summer rugby in the first place, it is easy to look at some small attendance figures and talk about switching back without reflecting on the horrors of an English winter. No Super League games have been postponed yet because of bad weather, but it's a fair bet that around Christmas time and again when the Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties used to come around in late

January there would often be a clutch of postponements, with the entire programme frosted out on some occasions.


It's easy to forget that when we are enjoying decent weather in the English summer. No, I suggest it would be a massive retrograde step to reject summer rugby now and I remain optimistic that 1997 will see a major upturn in Super League fortunes.

To start with, traditionalists among supporters need to get used to the idea. We have gone through a period of massive change and we are also having to compete this year with the European soccer championships and the Olympic Games which come round only once every four years.

Having said that, I think there are lessons to be learned from what has happened so far in this first Super League campaign.

To start with I think it is fairly obvious that the spectator likes to know what he is doing well in advance. In other words, he likes clubs to fix kick-off times and stick to them, so that there is some uniformity of fixtures, whether they be played on Friday evenings or Sunday.

Reflections



GROUNDS FOR COMPLAINT

No-one would pretend that Watersheddings is the perfect rugby ground. But let's put the record straight: it isn't the worst either! In my time I have stood and sat on every side of Watersheddings and the one thing I can say with certainty is that wherever you go on the ground you will get the one thing most vital to any spectator - a good, uninterrupted view. Contrast that with Widnes, to take one example, where there is always a bloody great pylon in your line of vision. Also at Widnes, and again at Wakefield, on one part of the ground you can get a great view of players' boots and socks, but not much more!

On many grounds, unlike Watersheddings, the terracing is too shallow. Culprits here are Wigan, Castleford and Featherstone among others. If you're under 5'8" and not at the front you'll spend all match dodging around the person in front trying to see. And at Castleford the terraces slope forward, so you're in constant danger of falling on the bloke in front and likely to suffer cramp all the way home.

As for seating, on most grounds you end up with bum fag. Unless you carry a supply of cushions the old wooden seating at Castleford, St. Helens, Wigan, Leeds, Workington etc. etc. is desperate. Only grounds with plastic, bucket type seats afford any degree of comfort. These include Halifax, Bradford, Sheffield, Huddersfield, Rochdale, Salford North Stand and Wigan Whitbread stand. The problem with the latter, however, is that all the seats towards the back are booked by season ticket holders, so you end up right at the front where you can't see the play at the far end and are constantly disturbed by the locals going to buy their pies.

Meanwhile entering the main stand at Headingley is like going into a dungeon it's so dark. You half expect to find gas lighting or candles it's so medieval.

As for other facilities, well the toilets virtually everywhere are a disgrace, so Watersheddings is no worse than most. Indeed on Herbert Street the Gents is actually quite decent. Best Gents are at Headingley and Bradford (8/10); Sheffield - but only at the far end of the main stand - and Huddersfield (9/10); and Paris (10/10). Trust the French to have the best pissoirs!

Ladies, I am told, are dreadful virtually everywhere. Wigan, Sheffield and Halifax are apparently among the best, but the usual problem is that there are never enough.

Scoreboards range from the woeful, like Keighley, through the quaint, like Oldham and Leigh, to the hi-tech like Sheffield and Huddersfield which are almost an entertainment in themselves. For many people proximity to the play is all important, so although I like Sheffield myself I realise most people are not keen. Presumably these fans also share with me a dislike of the Hull grounds, Workington and Bradford.

Rugby League can be a funny old game, can't it? We played well at Leeds in the centenary season only to lose in the last minute when Garry Schofield converted a late try with the last kick of the match.

On the same ground last Sunday, we didn't play as well, but we snatched it in the dying seconds when Jason Temu crashed over near the posts for Paul Topping to add the winning goal.

As I sad after the match, we've played better and lost, but we're not complaining because we had to work very hard indeed for our rewards and full credit to the players for keeping going after they had missed part of the week's training due to a virus that affected most of the staff.

We also had a few injuries to contend with during the match, but the players stuck with it and came strongly at the end to finish worthy winners.

We started off a bit on the slow side, making mistakes in possession and not defending as stoutly as we could have done, with the result that we went 12-0 down The problem is that the game also needs to see you on the terraces. It's your game, inside the first ten minutes

Things didn't go our way, but the gratifying thing was that we never stopped working and by half time, when we were only 18-16 down, I was able to tell the players that if they stuck to their task and didn't panic they would have a good chance of coming from behind to win.

Matt Munro has been in fine form for the past three or four weeks and he had a cracking game at Headingley, as did Francis Maloney, who skipped in for two long range tries before he had to hobble off early in the second half with a thigh muscle

Today's game against Castleford will be a very tough one indeed, but no one can take away from us the fact that we have won four of our last five games and I hope the Oldham public will see that as serious progress and start to turn up in numbers for our remaining home games this summer.

One of Super League's big puzzles is that we are struggling to attract the fans

although we can provide more entertainment and more serious competition than we ever could before we had Super League and the Murdoch money,

I'm a great fan of Rugby League. They know their game, they call a spade a spade and I think their opinions should be listened to and respected.

They have a great deal of pride in their clubs, but there seems to be a lot of unwarranted pessimism around. It spreads like wildfire but the fact is that we have a terrific product to sell and I'm sure a lot of fans who might by staying away for reasons best known to themselves would love what they saw on the field if they would only turn up to watch

We are still playing rugby league and despite the involvement on such a big scale of TV, it's still the peoples game. TV is heavily involved in all major sports these days and it's a credit to the pulling power of League that so much of it is now shown on the little box

We will be trying hard to do that next season after considering the wishes of our supporters, who have had the opportunity to let us know whether they prefer to watch games on Friday or Sunday and, if Sunday, whether they would choose an afternoon start or an early evening kick off.

I think it is also apparent that clubs need more than 11 home games in a season if they are to have any chance of meeting financial demands. The game won't survive with only 11 matches from which to draw vital income and it is now down to the Rugby League to come up with a plan to provide clubs with more opportunities to open their turnstiles.

By switching today's game to an afternoon kick off we hope to have pleased our supporters but please note that next weekend's home game against St. Helens will be screened live by Sky and will be staged at Boundary Park next Friday kicking off



DON YATES DOWN

Memory Lane

Don Yates looks back to a match from vestervear.

Homely, little Castleford have been mixing it with the best throughout their history and have managed to pull off a number of notable successes but none have been greeted with such euphoria as their Regal Trophy victory over Wigan in January 1994.

That Regal Trophy competition of season 1993-94 was the first tournament in which the Premier League clubs were exempt from the first round. Despite this, Oldham were represented in round one by Saddleworth Rangers who put a brave performance at Swinton before bowing out 24-13. In round two the senior Oldham club visited Highfield where they led 26-0 at half-time before coasting through 26-8. Wigan had a similar comfortable ride up at Whitehaven where they won 22-8. It was much tougher for Castleford who had to rely on a late Graham Steadman try for their 16-12 victory at Hull Kingston

Dreadful weather greeted the third round ties but that did not prevent Oldham and Wigan putting on a classic at Watersheddings where Wigan had to defend desperately in the second half before overcoming the Roughveds 16-8. Winger Simon Middleton defied the conditions to run in a hat-trick of tries as Castleford eliminated Leigh 54-

Both Wigan and Castleford registered comfortable victories in the quarter-finals. Winger Jason Robinson was outstanding in Wigan's 27-10 win at Warrington whilst prop Lee Crooks stole the honours in Castleford's 44-4 home win over Carlisle.

Crooks was again in inspired form in the semi-finals as Castleford booked their place in the final with a sound 23-10 win at Bradford. Wigan found it much tougher at Salford where Barrie-Jon Mather's late try enabled the

Riversiders to win 18-12

The final was staged at Headingley and Wigan were understandably odds on to beat Castleford. Probably because of this, the attendance was a disappointing 15,626, but those present were about to witness one of the biggest upsets in the history of the competition. The teams for the final were as follows:

Castleford gave what must have been one of their best performances of all time in this final. They were absolutely magnificent. Everyone in their team played to his full potential and by half-time they led by an astonishing 20 points to two. Wigan were such favourites to win that even at that stage the spectators were expecting them to launch a comeback which would rock Castleford to their very foundations. Although Wigan did show much more spirit early in the secondhalf, that comeback never materialised and Castleford went on to register an amazing 33-2 victory. Their points came from tries by Martin Ketteridge (2). Grant Anderson, Tawera Nikau and Lee Crooks who also landed six goals. Tony Kemp dropped a goal for Castleford whilst Frano Botica landed a solitary Wigan goal. The streets around Headingley immediately after the match resembled Christmas Eve and VE Day all rolled into one. A fantastic day when the underdog triumphed against all odds



On this day.

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

It was on this day way back in 1917 that Australian test winger Harold Horder scored five tries for South Sydney in their 31-8 victory over North Sydney, the club Horder was to join three years later.

Staying in Australia, it was on this day in 1985 that St George defeated Canterbury 16-6 at the Sydney Cricket Ground in the big Wingfield Cup clash of the weekend. That match was a preview of the following September's Grand Final when Canterbury gained revenge by beating St George 7-6 also at the SCG. Switching across to New Zealand, it was on Sunday, 14th July 1991 that the Junior Kiwis defeated the BARLA under-18's by 34-16 in the first test at Greymouth. The star of the British side was Waterhead second-rower Barrie McDermott, now with Leeds, but one of six members of that BARLA party who later had spells at Watersheddings. The other five? David Bradbury, Gary Burns, Gary Christie, Alf Goulbourne and Abraham Phillips.

Seven years earlier, on Saturday 14th July 1984, the

senior New Zealand team defeated Great Britain 12-0 in the first test match at Carlaw Park, Auckland. All the Kiwi points came in the first half - James Leuluai and Fred Ah Kuoi tries, Olsen Filipaina two goals. Oldham had five representatives in that tour party but only current coach Andy Goodway played. He was in the second-row whilst current Castleford coach John Joyner was one of the British substitutes.

It was on this day in 1951, Bastille Day, that the French national team, who did not travel very well, recorded one of their best ever results. It was not a victory but the 14-14 draw against New South Wales during their tour of Australia was certainly a result to be proud of. Exactly twelve months ago today, Friday, 14th July 1995, Australia completed a 3-0 test whitewash over New Zealand when they defeated the Kiwis 46-10 in the third test at Suncorp Stadium, Brisbane. The Kiwis put up a brave show for an hour, pulling back to 10-10 after trailing 10-6 at the interval. However, Australia then ran in six tries in the closing quarter to leave the Kiwis mesmerised.

Signed from Keighley Albion amateurs, Dixon made his debut as a substitute in a 46-12 Division Two defeat at Runcorn Highfield on 21 April 1985. Dixon made one other substitute appearance before his full debut on the wing when he scored Keighley's only try in a 58-4 Division Two defeat at Barrow on 27 April 1986. He had a three match loan spell with Hunslet in 1993-94, scoring 15 points from a try and six goals including a drop goal. Born 16 September 1966.



OLDHAM Bears 11 A 7 Team



WELCOME Castleford Tigers to Watersheddings

RICHARD GAY (Full Back) Captured from Hull earlier this year, although deadlines meant that Richard had to wait for Super League to make his debut. An England International from the 1995 European Championships, Richard likes to link up on attack and grabs his share of tries. Started his career with Hull Boys Club ARL and although a follower of Rovers made the grade across the City. CHRIS SMITH (Winger) Promising youngsters who already has bags of first team experience. Chris is a local product who came from the Academy team, gaining Great Britain honours at that level including a tour to Australia in 1994. Chris subsequently stepped up a further rung winning Gt Britain Under 21honours. Originally a half back, Chris's enthusiastic approach offers the promise of more honours if he continues to develop.

RICHARD GODDARD (Centre) Capture from Wakefield Trinity, with a £75,000 fee being set by the tribunal. Richard already has Gt Britain Under 21 honours and a full England cap and looks to have a big future in the game. A product of Stanley Rangers ARL which has over the years provided Cas with some top talent, Richard is goalkicker. Gained some useful experience when he guessed with top Aussie outfit Manley.

ADRIAN FLYNN (Centre) Another signing from neighbours Wakefield, Adrian, who was a former Dewsbury junior player joined Castleford after a drawn out transfer battle with other interested clubs, in a deal that cost the club a fee of £70,000 plus winger Jon Wray. A Great Britain Under 21 cap and Academy tourist, who also represented England in the Fiji "nines" Adrian has proved himself in both the centre and second row positions.

SIMON MIDDLETON (Winger) Simon switched codes after a long career win local rugby union and settled in quickly and well to league after his move from Knottingley RU. He has been a regular try scorer for Cas. Although normally wingman he has provided versatility by switching to the backline when called upon. Simon was missed when injury ended his Centenary season prematurely. FRANO BOTICA (Stand Off) Former All Black rugby union star and Kiwi inter-

national, Frano joined Cas from Auckland Warriors although he made his biggest mark in league in a glittering career at Wigan. Frano figured in many of the Riversiders' recent successes with his record breaking points scoring feats, which included reaching the quickest ever 1000 points in rugby league, playing a major part in their tremendous trophy winning exploits. A bad injury ended his brief career with the Warriors but he has fought his way back to fitness and is looking for more honours with Cas.

TONY SMITH (Half back) A key utility player, Tony has the ability to play in either half back position as well as centre where he has played much of his early first team rugby. His big break though came two years back when he was called up for the trip to Australia with the Great Britain "Sevens" squad. He then won his first full international cap for England to add to earlier GB under 21 honours. Last season he gained four more England caps on World Cup duty, including the Wembley final. A local product, Tony's great support play brings him a regular

LEE CROOKS (Prop Forward) Club captain and inspirational pack leader Lee was a £150,000 buy from the Leeds club. He guickly became a key figure at Castleford and in turn his representative career was resurrected, with county and test call ups being added to an already healthy total of such honours. Lee started his career on his native Humberside, where he gained a string of honours whilst still a teenager, and despite not settling too well at Headingley his Hull and Cas

form has ensured that he remains one of the games biggest names.

RICHARD RUSSELL (Hooker) One of John Joyner's first signings, Richard came to Cas from Oldham in exchange for Shaun Irwin. Originally a three quarter at Wigan when he gained GB junior honours before linking up with Oldham. Very lively in the loose and a top tackler Richard has made a highly successful transition to hooker and has gone on to represent England in that position.

NATHAN SYKES (Prop Forward) Signed as a highly rated junior player from the Moldgreen Cub in Huddersfield, Nathan is making good progress and has now established himself in the senior squad. Castleford beat off a host of opposition to sign him as a youngster and his promise is being realised with Academy international honours, including a tour to Australia, and a GB Under 21 cap already under his belt.

ANDREW SHICK (Second Row) The club's last capture from Australia, Andrew joined up from Brisbane league team Redcliffe. A ball handling back rower, Andrew was spotted by coach John Joyner on a summer trip "Down Under" last year and was offered a chance to come over for the Centenary season and stake a place for the Super League. Once settled he took his chance well and did enough to clinch a new contract.

LEE HARLAND (Second Row) A product of Drighlington ARL, Lee turned professional with Leeds but with first team opportunities limited at Headingley he then moved on to Halifax. A Gt Britain under 21 international he joined Cas in exchange for Martin Ketteridge when Halifax were looking for an experienced prop. Lee has continued to develop his early promise and looks a very shrewd

BRENDON TUUTA (Back Row Forward) New Zealand international who was signed last season from local rivals Featherstone. Brendon has Australian experience with Western Suburbs and more recently with the Perth Western Reds. His international career has taken in a tour of this country and most recently the Trans Tasman test series against Australia. He was also in the Kiwi squad for the Centenary Season World Cup. Brendon had 5 years with Rovers and although primarily a back rower he also has plenty of experience at stand off

GRAHAM STEADMAN (Full Back/Stand Off) Castleford's club record signing Graham joined the club from near neighbours Featherstone in a £170.000 deal seven seasons back. Previously with York he has been a consistent points scorer throughout his career. Having gained representative honours at stand off a switch to full back took Graham to even further success including a starring role on the 1992 GB tour to Australia. Last season Graham moved around the back line but his form was maintained which was recognised by his award as the sponsors player of the season.

DEAN SAMPSON (Prop Forward) Strong running prop, Dean has been a big favourite for a number of years at Cas. He won GB Under 21 honours and then added a tour call up, as a late replacement to the party in New Zealand back in 1992. It remains a mystery to many why he then seemed to drop out of the representative scene but he made a return with the England squad for last terms World Cup, winning three caps. A Stanley ARL product whose father Dave was both a player and coach with Castleford.

GARETH STEPHENS Recruited two terms back, Gareth returned to his junior roots at Cas, and the club where his father played, having started out his professional career with Leeds. Despite gaining GB under 21 honours Gareth was unable to secure a regular slot at Headingley and Cas moved in to secure his signature when their scrum half spot became vacant. The new qualification rules paved the way for Welsh representative honour for him, touring the USA last summer, gaining a place in the Wales World Cup squad and then representing the Principality in the Fiji "nines"



Earnt GB Academy representative honours in the 1994 tour of Australia and is tipped by some good judges to gain senior

GRANT ANDERSON (Centre) Made a welcome return to the club after a two year "break" with Halifax, Grant provides a number of positional options for his coach. Many at the club were disappointed when he left Cas to link up with Mal Reilly at Thrum Hall, having appreciated his no nonsense tackling and strong bursts. Having gained four GB Under 21 caps Grant still has plenty of time to fulfil his earlier promise that looked likely to bring more honours.

COLIN MASKILL A local product who started his professional career with Wakefield Trinity before having a long and successful spell with Leeds. He then had a term with Doncaster when the "Dons" were having their moment of glory in the top flight. Colin has been unlucky not to gain representative honours in a long career and Cas were glad to bring his experience to the club when injury ruled out Richard Russell for the whole of last season.

JAMIE COVENTRY (Utility Back) Local prospect who joined the club from the Travellers Saints ARL. A stand off as a junior, when he gained England Schools honours. Jamie had a good run on the wing last term when he deservedly won Academy representative honours. Another player who followed his father's footsteps to Castleford.





Terraces...

It was no surprise to read Alex Murphy last week bemoaning the switch to summer rugby, and calling for an immediate abandonment of the change, and a reversion to winter rugby. If there was anything more designed to make the game look stupid, I can't imagine it. To decide to change after less than one full season would make us a complete laughing stock. And who says that the missing crowds would come back in winter, anyway? No, we have to stick to the change, and try harder to make it work.



Oldham's victory at Castleford last April has enabled the Roughveds to go into this afternoon's match looking for their first League double over Castleford since season 1973/74 when they won 14-13 at Watersheddings and followed that up with a superb 25-12 victory at Wheldon Road. Today's game is the 57th meeting between these clubs. Of the previous 56, Oldham have won 22, Castleford have won 32 and the other two have ended all square. 



"UGLY" WIN FOR WARRIORS... AUCKLAND 24 SOUTH SYDNEY 10 WARRIORS coach John Monie had mixed feelings after watching his side claim two precious Premiership points on their home track last Friday night.

Monie described the style of Auckland's victory as "ugly" and "disappointing" but was more than happy to claim the spoils which take his team to the edge of the Optus Cup top eight. "Souths tried to get us into the arm-wrette type of game and we fell for it," Monie admitted. "It was a bit of a disappointment, but, once again, it proved there are no easy games in this competition. It wasn't a pretty win, but last year we came up with some sensational losses, and I know which I prefer.

It was only in the final seven minutes of the match that Auckland put away their lowly-rated opponents by rattling on twelve unanswered points. "We came here to play good football," Shine reasoned. "I honestly felt that we deserved better fate."



CAN Oldham make a serious challenge for a top-four play-off spot? We will have a better idea at around 4.30 this afternoon, but if the Bears can manage to complete their third Super League double of the summer there is no reason why. at least, they shouldn't make life hot for the two clubs immediately above them in the table, Warrington and London

Before the start of round 16 on Friday night, the Bears had crept into sixth place with 15 points from 15 games - two points fewer than Broncos and three fewer than the Wire. 
