Welcome to everybody attending Odsal today for the Bulls' penultimate fixture in the 1996 Super League. The last three weeks have been quite amazing, two fabulous home wins against St. Helens and Wigan, followed by a tough and extremely satisfying victory away at Warrington. In terms of our attendance, we were obviously pleased that in excess of 17,000 people turned up for the Wigan match and I can already foresee the day when 15,000 plus attendances for our home matches will be the norm rather than the exception. As the season moves towards a conclusion, the "Bulls' phenomenon" is gathering even greater momentum. I am now receiving correspondence from Bulls' supporters living far away and, for example, people are travelling from as far afield as London, South Wales and Newcastle to watch our home games. Other clubs are also benefiting from our away support as Warrington will surely testify. There must have been between 3,000 and 4,000 of our supporters at Wilderspool last weekend, and I know that this away support is greatly appreciated by our players. I would urge one word of caution to all or our supporters, and it concerns the issue of behaviour in front of our ever increasing army of young supporters. I sincerely hope that this is another area where the Bulls can lead the way and show a good example to all of the other teams in Super League by the wholesale condemnation of foul and abusive language Today's match against Oldham promises to be an entertain-


ing affair, and our visitors have shown on occasions this season that they are quite capable of upsetting the best of opposition. Whilst St. Helens eventually ran away with the game against Oldham last week, there were only a couple of points in it at half time and I am sure that the Bears will be doing all in their power to get back on track today.

I have to say how disappointed I was to read the comments made by the Warrington coach after last weeks game. Those comments not only contained an attack on the referee but also two of our players involved in a tackle which resulted in a Warrington player being propelled into a TV camera. To my mind there was clearly no deliberate attempt by either of the Bulls' players to do anything other than keep the Warrington player from getting back into the field of play. I would also make the point that the camera should not have been positioned so close to the pitch and Warrington ought to have provided a safe camera position further away. As to Mr Dorahy's comments, all I would say is that in the

past there have been players and club officials who have been found guilty of bringing the game into disrepute for launching less vitriolic attacks against referees. The decision to fast track South Wales (Cardiff) into the

Super League was a good one, provided that the club can put forward a sound business plan and get the right calibre of players to compete at the highest level. It is understood that a well known public company is providing some of the necessary funding, but it has yet to be determined how the RFL's portion of funding will be provided, and it promises to

be an interesting debate! It is on occasions such as this where club's self interest comes to the fore, but there is a considerable lack of logic behind a proposal whereby the club finishing second in Division One receives only £50,000.00 less than the club finishing third from the bottom of the Super League. Indeed, given the enormous expenditure which Super



League clubs have had to bear to make themselves competitive in all areas of their business, there is also a certain lack of logic concerning any proposal which says that they should lose any more of their money. You may recall that the News Corporation funding for Super League clubs started out at £1.1 million, was then reduced to £900,000 and has since been lowered even further. Problems such as this do, however, emphasise the need for the Super League to have its own management structure and control of its own income generating opportunities. As they say "watch this



pressure on the two dreams remaining above us in the League ladder.


After five matches this season we were 2 and 3, lost at Wembley and have lost one fixture since (Castleford).

Oldham Bears Rugby League Football Club

Visiting the Odsal Stadium

The Bears have suffered heavy defeats against each of the top three clubs in the Super League. Oldham went down heavily to both St. Helens and Wigan in games

played on the town's soccer pitch at Boundary Park. The Bulls registered a 30-10 success at the traditional Watersheddings venue whilst

the Bears conceding over forty points on their visit to Wigan and over sixty points at St. Helens.

Despite these setbacks
Yorkshire born coach Andy
Goodway will be satisfied with
the overall performance from
his outfit who have won four of
their eight home games in addition to their away victories at
Castleford, Halifax and Leeds,
the Bears also recorded a 24-24
draw in Paris.

The Backs...

One of the players to re-gain his form in the Super League has been the former Widnes and Wigan full back **Paul Atcheson**. He joined the Bears in 1995 after making two full appearances for Wales in the 1995 European Championship, in the

subsequent World Cup competition he was limited to just one substitute outing against Western Samoa. Atcheson is the leading try scorer for the Bears in the Super League with eight touchdowns.

Right winger **Scott Ranson** was one of the two Oldham players to receive bans after the heated exchange with Castleford in April. A try scorer in the

20-30 defeat to the Tigers a fortnight ago Ranson is a former Swinton player who scored four tries during the Centenary season.

Tongan Afi Leuila has missed recent games through injury, he is still expected to be sidelined today with a broken leg. Rob Myler is the former Warrington flyer, he played in the eight consecutive games before missing out in the game against Castleford. The Bears have in their ranks one of the most under-rated centres in the Super League. His name is Darren Abram after starting his career with Warrington he later played for Chorley, Trafford and Rochdale Hornets before joining Oldham for the best period of his career. Another player who has been on the Lancashire League scene for a while is the goal kicking centre Paul Topping. He has returned to the centre position after spending part of

the early Super League season on the substitutes bench. Australian centre **Andrew Patmore**, a former 1995 South Sydney player scored a try on his full debut, helping the Bears to a draw in Paris. He has

now returned to Sydney due to a serious groin injury. Last of the regular three quarters is **Adrian Belle**. An October 1993 signing from Rochdale Hornets, despite a strong running style he has still to hit the try scor-

ing charts in any force.

The Play Makers... Stand off Francis Malonev joined the Bears from Warrington at the start of the Centenary season. A reliable goalkicker who is probably playing the best football of a career which included a spell as a youngster with the Leeds club. Many reckoned he had an outstanding game in the 28-26 Headingley victory scoring two tries and two games against his old side. Newly sprung in June could be the motto for Irish half back Martin Crompton. He scored in four consecutive games for the Bears. A member of Ireland's Emerging Nations World Cup team, he had originally been named in the original 40 man strong. England squad. Formerly with Warrington, a member of their losing 1990 Challenge Cup final team, he later

moved to Wigan.

Crompton may well join forces with the Bulls Bernard Dwyer as the Irish take on Scotland in a full international in August which is scheduled to be played in

Partick.

Former Dewsbury player **Paul Cook** made three consecutive appearances during the absence of Francis Maloney recently. A product of the Academy system

with the Crown Flatt club he is the son of Terry Crook the former Wakefield, Bramley and Batley three quarter who is now a commentator for Radio Leeds. Crook was a former team mate of Bulls stars Nathan Graham and Davide Longo.

The Forwards...

Former Wakefield Trinity and Wigan back row forward lan Gildart has now progressed to the front row of the pack. The six times capped Great Britain Under 21 forward made just eight full appearances for the Bears in the Centenary season. Big lan Sherratt has had two spells with the Oldham club, he re-joined his home town club in November 1991 after a spell at nearby Salford. His career started with Bradford where, in the days of Colts rather than Academy rugby, he had the distinction of being selected for both Lancashire and Yorkshire, he opted for Lancashire. Sherrett

has not played since the defeat against Wigan in June. Another former Bradford front rower is **Craig Richards**. He is the younger brother of Huddersfield's

former Warrington pack man Basil Richards - opted to play for the Cook Islands during the Halifax Emerging Nations World Cup in the autumn. A New

Zealander by birth his mother is Cook Islander and will no doubt be proud of her sons winners medal.

A one time opponent of Jason Temu in the New Zealand Lion Red club competition was Reece Guy. Now team mates at the Watersheddings Guy made his debut for the Bears in the home victory over Paris at Boundary Park in June. A true Yorkshireman is hooker John Clarke who was twice voted Youth Player of the Year in his amateur days. Clarke is now in his forth season with the Oldham club. He missed the game last weekend at Boundary Park against league leaders St. Helens when second row forward Matt Munro moved into the front row. Perhaps one of the "most improved" players in the Super. League is back row forward

Dave Bradbury. A former amateur with Leigh Miners he made just seven appearances

for the Bears during the winter campaign. Alongside Bradbury in the second row is Aussie forward **Matt** / **Munro.** A typical good defensive Winfield Cup forward who was in the Sydney Tigers ranks for the 1995

campaign, both Munro and Bradbury scored tries for the Bears in the Watersheddings encounter with the Bulls.

Regular **Gary Lord** represented Yorkshire and Great Britain at youth level before returning to the professional game with Leeds. He joined the Bears from Halifax in July 1994.



He replaced the Watersheddings favourite Mike Kuiti in 1995 and has slotted in well at the back of Andy Goodway's pack. But with competition for the loose forward spot from Dave **Bradbury** the Cumbrian has shown his mettle by moving out to fill one of the vacant centre spots in recent games. Unfortunately he has dislocated a shoulder and is not expected to play for the Oldham Bears. The club

could give chances today to some of their youngsters with Chris McKinney, Jimmy Cowans and perhaps ex Bradford Academy player Steve Wilde all potential replacements.



For the last one hundred and one years the meeting at the George Hotel, Huddersfield in August 1895 is generally depicted as the birth of our great game. The reasons behind the split with the Rugby Union as supposed to be "brokentime" payments to players "To allow working men to compete on even terms with the gentlemen amateurs" - from this very basic belief generations of "Rugby" people of both codes have interpreted the divisions between League and Union as a battlefield for the age old British class war or, just as simplistic, the difference between both games has by many been seen as just another example of the great North/South divide.

Protagonists of the League v Union argument have revelled in these naive categorisation for the last seventy-five years at least. Yet the truth is that the snobbery of Rugby Union which is based on the fact that all the prestigious public schools play Union only dates back to the end of the first world war. Prior to the outbreak of the Great War many public schools played, amongst other things, soccer. It was the decision of both the Football Association and the Rugby League (then Northern Union) not to suspend playing at the start of hostilities compared to the RFU who immediately stopped playing as Britain went to war. Within weeks of the armistice the RFU were calling for the influential education establishments to play the "patriotic" game, which they still do. It would be very 'nice' to accept the romantic notion that League was created on egalitarian lines. Sadly the evidence suggests to the contrary. To understand the reasons behind the "split' which led to the ultimate formation of Rugby League we have to look at the state of the game in both Lancashire and Yorkshire at that time. In both counties well organised League structures were in place. In Lancashire clubs competed in a club championship first, second and third class. In the White Rose county clubs were organised into the Yorkshire senior, second, intermediate and third competition. At both sides of the Pennines the senior clubs were more interested in dictating how the county

championship should be contested and, which clubs played in which division. The concept of promotion and relegation being only decided by results would not be tolerated by the 'big' clubs who enjoyed their lucrative money spinning fixtures against each other

A report by "Pensee" in the Lancashire Guardian in August 1895 prior to the split makes interesting reading when referring to the "senior" clubs who had by:

"not getting their own way with broken-time payments endeavoured to boss the championship competition in each county in accordance with their own sweet ideas, in a manner which would have made promotion and relegation by merit a mispower and practically rendered it impossible for any of the junior clubs to reach the first division. Being checkmated in this manoeuvre they severed themselves from the competition". My interpretation of the above is that the leading clubs had effectively split before the now famous meeting at the George. Another factor that led to the split was the RFU's attempts to control the game in the North, which in itself would of been treated as an affront by the Yorkshire and Lancashire middle classes who run the game in the North. Only two years earlier in London the RFU had defeated a proposal by Yorkshire club representatives for broken-time payments as well as altering the rules of the RFU so that all further meetings


would be held in the capital, 200 miles away from the nations strongest clubs. The actual meeting at the George was an attempt to organise fixtures amongst the "elite" clubs to secure their own financial interests without the risks of relegation and subsequent decline in attendances and revenue. The traditional assumption that "broken-time" was the sole issue behind the split is unfounded. Three principal reasons can be identified from the evidence for the split.

- 1. Power; the leading clubs sought to control "their" own destiny and not be subservient to a committee of ex-Oxbridge students in London. The more powerful a club the more prestige for the local businessmen who run it.
- Financial interest were paramount to a clubs esteem and influence, so profitable fixtures were a necessity.
 Broken-time payments were only a passing argument in the struggle for control of the game.

Both the latter two reasons could be identified as extensions to the first, **POWER**.

My argument is backed-up by the fact it took the Northern Union a further ten years before letting the junior clubs have any say in the decision making process of the sport.

Whatever reasons behind the split just over a century later we have undoubtedly the greatest game of all, which I must confess is becoming very addictive.



We stood at the Mount Mistake end of the Whitten Oval and the 'Roys were caned when they scored one of their two second-half points, a voice behind me sighed "Closing the gap, 'Roys." You need a sense of humour to follow

Nick grew up in the old Fitzroy. Not the trendy one it is today - the tough one. His Dad played a bit for the Lions before taking up wrestling seriously. Nick spoke of a season back in the '60's when Fitzroy didn't win a game. Lost five matches by less than a goal - and one of them to Carlton. Like me with Northern and now the Bulls. Nick carries his footy memories with him like a stack of old black and white photos. I guess it's one reason I like him. The blokes we stood with were members of the Giromberti family. Their grandfather arrived in Australia in 1920 and was taken to the footy by the Jewish tailor who lived next door and thus began a long tradition. The old fella would have been proud as hell that his granddaughter and great grandson had flown in from Alice Springs just to be at this

Jack Stott was there too. Jack lives in Fitzroy, or has done since he was born four months ago. His Dad felt this was a fitting match for young Jack to cut his footy teeth. Maybe in 80 years time, Jack will be pointed out in Brunswick Street as the old bloke who saw the Lions last match some time last century. But I doubt it. We seem to be losing the significance of memory for such events. It was a day to be there for Fitzroy and they came with their cameras. Husbands and Wives, parents and children, grandparents and grandchildren. Although outnumbered by the Geelong "Cat" army, they raised a huge heartfelt cheer as the Lions came out. One bloke tossed his Akubra hat into the air. It was an old fashioned gesture to greet an old fashioned club whose 113 years history is about to be consigned to the archives.

At the final siren a couple of old ladies ran on the field and threw their arms around the nearest Fitzroy players. It sparked a wave of emotion amongst Lion fans, sharing the last moments of their club as they knew it. Tears were shed. Friends, relatives and folk who just happened to be standing next to each other hugged and comforted one another. A group of lads began singing the Fitzroy club song, which follows the tune of the French National Anthem. "We are the boys from old Fitzroy..." It was taken up by the 500 or so gathered by the dressing sheds. And so the faithful remained. Tear-stained and torn between leaving and staying, not knowing if they would see their team again.

That night Nick and I shared a few beers and passed around our footy memories. About midnight Nick cried The Lions were a bunch of losers. Always had been. But he loved them anyway. Couldn't help it. Sport is the one area of public life where the little people still have enough information to form an idea of what is going on. But that's all changing. Is there no room for loyalty in this sanitised, corporate sporting world? Geez, what would I do if it ever happened to the Bulls? Cry too, I guess. But as I've already said, I just don't know anymore......




THE FRENCH CONNECTION.....

What an exciting 3 weeks we have had. Following what have probably been our best 3 performances against hard opposition, the players have been enjoying a well deserved break from their training programmes.

Every time I write I seem to be congratulating the players on their levels of fitness and strength but it really does seem to make my job easier when they are so well prepared for their games. Despite hard games against both Wigan and

Warrington, our injury count remains low.
Stuart Spruce is making good progress after receiving a knee in the back during a tackle at Warrington, following one the previous week from Wigan, and should be with us for Oldham. Gary Christie will, unfortunately, be missing after receiving a nasty foot injury following an awkward landing from a high ball (his team mate Joe Tamani managed to make his landing on top of Gary's leg....ouch!). Despite his bad bruising and swelling the initial X-rays look clear so things should settle

Carlos Hassan is making good progress and is now back to some light jogging work using a new leg brace. We aim to have him back on the pitch for the end of August but a close eye will have to be kept on his progress to make sure we avoid anything which will hinder his healing.

Prevention of injury is as important as treating injuries to sports physiotherapists. In a few months the football and rugby union season will be upon us again. Now is the time to start our pre-season training. After the lay-off it is important we start slowly and build into our training programme. Before any training a good warm up is required of stretching, jogging and sport specific drills to warm the body up. Endurance which can be achieved by cycling or swimming for 45 minutes to an hour.

Speed endurance which is important for the start stop nature of most sports can be developed by fartlek.

Fartlek is running for approximately 40 minutes at different speeds ranging from very fast to a walking pace.

Strength can be developed in the gym remembering to warm up with light weights first. Speed and power is best developed by a combination of strength work bounding and running feet. by a combination of strength work, bounding and running fast. Skill is developed with all the above but is best practiced when the body is fresh and not tired.

The most important part of training is rest. The harder the training the longer the rest required between sessions. If a session cannot be completed properly because you are tired, it should not be done. Active rest can be done instead such as a stretching session.

Stretching involves increasing the flexibility of the joints and

should be carried out daily.

Top tip of the day: If you do get injured see a Chartered Physiotherapist or Sports Doctor as soon as possible.




