CENTENARY SEASON REVIEW

An awful start and promising end is a reflection of Oldham's 1995-96 Centenary Season, with coach Andy Goodway surviving early criticism and eventually displaying positive direction for the club. Utilising the majority of his squad, Andy Goodway received a great deal of flak after Oldham lost all five of their opening fixtures. They then defeated London by 19-8 but were still struggling when knocked out of the Regal Trophy by Widnes. A memorable 28-26 victory over Wigan was the opener to a fruitful end of the campaign, yielding five wins from the last six games. Oldham lost to Warrington in their fourth round Challenge Cup tie.

SUPER LEAGUE REVIEW

The Bears received the opening fixture nobody else wanted, Champions Wigan at Boundary Park. They lost 16-56 but then displayed excellent character in their next three fixtures, defeating Halifax at home (34-22), drawing 24-245 at Paris and playing particularly well in a 25-16 Watersheddings victory over Leeds. A tremendous 24-20 win at Castleford in Round 5 elevated the Bears to one of the leading Challengers in Super League but they were brought back down to earth via a 18-66 defeat at St Helens. A poor spell followed with defeats against Bradford (H) 10-30, Sheffield (A) 10-23, Workington (H) 27-29 and London (A) 22-28. They returned to winning ways with a good performance in defeating Wire at home by 35-24. They lost at Wigan (16-44) but enjoyed an encouraging 20-14 victory over Halifax at Thrum Hall. Paris were defeated at home by 24pts-6 and the Bears completed a rare double over Leeds by virtue of a last gasp 28-26 victory at Headingley. Three defeats followed, at home to castleford and St Helens and away at Bradford. Oldham sent Workington nearer to the Super League trapdoor by winning at Derwent Park but last weekend they lost at home against Warrington's top four rivals London, by 14pts-22.

PAUL ATCHESON

Moved here to Wigan in October 1992 and made his debut the following January in the 19-4 Regal Trophy semifinal victory over Hull. Made 62 appearances for Wigan before transferring to Oldham in June 1995 for £50,000. Whilst at Central Park represented Great Britain at academy and under 21 level and he has also been a member of the Welsh team in various competitions during the past three seasons.

SCOTT RANSON

Fast and elusive winger. A product of Thatto Heath Juniors (St. Helens) who turned professional with Swinton in 1987. Was top try scorer at Swinton during his last two seasons with the Lions. Joined Oldham in February 1992 and has continued his prolific try scoring feats at Watersheddings.

DARREN ABRAM

Prolific try scoring centre who has been Oldham's top try scorer during the past three seasons. A product of Thatto Heath juniors (St. Helens) who won BARLA international honours before turning professional with Warrington in 1985. Had a spell on loan with Swinton before moving to Chorley Borough and then Rochdale Hornets. Oldham signed him in February 1993.

PAUL TOPPING

Utility player who is equally effective whether at centre, stand off or loose forward. Terrific defender. Topping is a

product of the Wigan St. Patricks junior club who turned professional with Swinton in 1985. He had a spell on loan at Mansfield before joining Leigh in 1990 and then transferring to Oldham in September 1993. Topping made one appearance for Lancashire in 1991 and was included in the Ireland squad for the Emerging Nations Championship in 1995.

OLDHAM BEARS PEN PICTURES FRANCIS MALONEY

A player whose experiences at Wilderspool in 1994 will make him determined to excel this afternoon. Powerful stand-off and accurate positional kicker. A product of the St. John Fisher Junior Club (Dewsbury) who turned professional with Leeds in 1990. Moved to Featherstone Rovers in 1992 and won Great Britain under-21 recognition whilst at Post Office Road. Transferred to Warrington in May 1994 but did not settle and made only 19 appearances for Warrington (4 tries) before moving on to Oldham 14 months later for £50,000. Took over the goal kicking duties at Watersheddings and was Oldham's top point scorer last season.

MARTIN CROMPTON

Scrum half captain and the orchestrator of most of Oldham's attacking play. A former Wigan St. Patricks junior who began his professional career with Warrington in 1986. Moved back to Wigan in July 1992 when he joined the senior Central Park outfit. Made his debut in the Charity Shield defeat against St. Helens at Gateshead when he was at scrum half. Also made a number of his 20 Wigan appearances at hooker before he moved to Oldham for a bargain £35,000 fee in September 1993. During his 12 months at Wigan was substitute in Wigan's World Club Challenge defeat against Brisbane Broncos. Represented Ireland in the 1995 Emerging Nations Championship and the 1996 Fijian Nines

JAN GILDART

Hard working and experienced forward. A product of Wigan Colts who turned professional here at Central Park during October 1986. Made his debut the following January in the 68-0 in the Challenge Cup victory over Workington Town . Went on to make 139 appearances for Wigan including an outing at Wembley in 1990. Also appeared in a Regal Trophy and Premiership Final for Wigan. Represented Great Britain at under 21 level whilst at Central Park. After eight years with Wigan was transferred to Wakefield Trinity in August 1994and then last August moved on to Oldham for a £45,000 transfer fee.

JASON TEMU

Hard running and tough tackling prop who first came to notice with the Marist club in New Zealand. He joined the Counties-Manukau outfit for the New Zealand Lion Red Cup competition of 1994 and it was after that successful campaign that Temu joined Oldham. He has represented New Zealand Residents during their 1994 tour of Australia and was a member of the Cook Island team which lifted the 1995 Emerging Nations Championship. Also played in the 1996 Fijian Nines.

GARY LORD

Experienced professional. A former Stanley Rangers junior (Castleford) who joined the senior Castleford club in 1984. He appeared at full back for Castleford at Wembley in 1986 but has since developed into a hard working second row forward. Lord was transferred to Leeds in 1988 and then on to Halifax in 1991 before joining Oldham in July 1994 for £35,000.

JOE FAIMALO

Hard working second row forward who is enjoying his best run of form. A product of the Eastern Suburbs club in New Zealand, Faimalo had brief spells with Workington Town, Oldham and then Swinton during the 1991-92 season without impressing. He returned home and enjoyed success with Hawkes Bay which prompted him to return to Oldham in . September 1994. DAVID BRADBURY

MATT MUNRO

doned or tolerated. Discipline, or lack of it cost Wire the game as they were undoubtably the better team when it came to playing open rugby.


