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
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HERE AT LAST!!



I suppose that there will be a lot of critics who will say that we have been very fortunate to have reached this stage of the competition without coming up against Super League opposition. 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It's early days for Australian Super League

Dave Hadfield the Independent Rugby League correspondent will be continually monitoring the Australian Super League

It is very early days for Australian Super League, just two weeks into its delayed first season, but already questions are being asked about the coaching credentials of one of the game's greatest players.

Mal Meninga is not merely a legend of the modern game, he was also one of the driving forces behind the Super League revolution. So the way in which Canberra have started their campaign under his control is bound to be a hot topic around town. The Raiders have gone down to Cronulla and Penrith in their opening matches, conceding a total of 59 points in the process. and there are inevitable mutterings that Meninga's lack of coaching experience is to blame. There will be those willing him to

fail, but they would do well to remember that the big bloke was written off prematurely on more than one occasion during his playing career.

He always came back to prove the doom-mongers wrong and, as he tries to do the same as a coach, he has the distinct advantage of having plenty of outstanding talent at his disposal.

No other club can boast a threesome to match Laurie Daley, Ricky Stuart and Bradley Clyde. The Raiders will come right for Meninga – almost certainly in time for them to be a major force in the World Club Championship when they play Halifax, London and Wigan in June.

If anything would create more smirks than Canberra's early travails, it would have been the Brisbane Broncos – the club that can claim to be the originators of the Super League concept – falling flat on their faces.

Despite the absence of familiar names, now departed, like Willie Carne and Kerrod Walters, the Broncos have started smoothly, beating Auckland and new boys Adelaide in their first two outings. When they get here in July, watch out for their new acquisitions, middle back Anthony Mundine and forward Gorden Tallis. Excitement is the name of the game when these two get the ball and they are custom-built to continue the Brisbane tradition of swash-buckling attacking flair.

Super League in Australia also needs a genuine contender from Sydney. That is likely to mean Cronulla, who are inspired by two players familiar to British crowds in the shape of Andrew Ettingshausen and Twera Nikau, and who have made an impressive start.

They also have a coach we will become familiar with, the former Australian Test hooker, Johnny Lang, who will lead the Australian tourists to Britain this November. It would be unrealistic to expect the newly formed teams – Adelaide and the Hunter Mariners – to finish too high in the table first time out, but there will be great interest in how competitive they can be.

So far, the signs are encouraging. Adelaide have not been swamped in their first two games and the Mariners – who have both Kevin and Tony Iro on board – have been highly

respectable

against both Canterbury and Auckland.

Ah, yes, the Auckland Warriors.
This is a big season for them and for their coach John Monie.
Perhaps expectations in New Zealand were inflated, but there was keen disappointment there that Auckland failed to make an impact in their first two seasons in the Winfield/Optus Cup.

With the dawn of Super League, a squad that includes Denis Betts and most of the Kiwi Test team that humbled Great Britain last year has the chance to start a new era.



Community Programme

One of the biggest changes to affect the club in the wake of Gary Hetherington's appointment as Chief Executive was the announcement that the club would be instigating a Community Programme. This is aimed at securing links with the local community.

The key areas involved are the continuation of the already well established Apprenticeship scheme, the setting up of a complete schools coaching scheme, a much closer liaison with all the junior clubs in the Leeds area and the setting up of a classroom at Headingley to be used by schools on a daily basis.


Damian McGrath will head up the programme and will be assisted by Paul Fletcher, Ken Bond, the club's Apprentice Officer and Bob Pickles,

who has recently been appointed Communty Liaison Officer. The first phase was launched at a meeting of the Leeds lunior Amateur Rugby League Officials and it was agreed that Leeds would pay a signing on fee of £500 to the local junior club of anyone signing for Leeds, with further payments based on success. There will be further benefits involving coaching and the provision of kit for the junior representative teams. The Leeds and Hunslet Schools RL Association will also benefit: everyone who represents the city will be given a free Super League season ticket and coaching and kit will be provided for all schools representative teams. This represents a substantial investment by the club and a major

change of policy. It will

improve relations with the local amateur club and. speaking at the launch, an enthusiastic Colin Cooper. Secretary of the Leeds Junior ARL, commented: "The whole consultation process has been handled correctly and we look forward to being part of a relationship that will enhance rugby within the city of Leeds." Damian McGrath commented: "Leeds Rhinos acknowledge their responsibility as a community leader and further funding is planned that will involve schools and groups working with the socially disadvantaged in the City".





Headingley 1

Highly respected Oldham Coach Andy Goodway has always loved and responded to a challenge, liking nothing better than to prove the doubters wrong. Irrespective of the playing personnel at his disposal, the former Wigan, Manly and Oldham legend will have his charges extremely fit, highly motivated and well prepared for the rigours of Super League. Many critics are already predicting a struggle for the Bears this time around but the squad that finished eighth in the inaugural campaign and confounded many has been strengthened. Certainly the Rhinos will not be underestimating the potential threat of having conceded a double to today's visitors last time round.

Perhaps the biggest and most significant close season change has been the sale of the Watersheddings and a move to Boundary Park. There is little doubt that the improvements in surroundings will suit players and spectators alike, as witnessed by last week's big Cup crowd, but some believe that the Bears may have lost a psychological edge by moving from a venue that all who ventured into feared.

The new arrivals from Australia, Brett Goldspink, Luke Goodwin and Nathan Turner, should appreciate the more salubrious arena of their soccer neighbours and the side as a whole should benefit from playing on a wider, more consistent surface. The incoming Aussies join compatriot Matt Munro,

unfortunately out for the opening weeks with a broken hand, who was a real unsung hero in last year's campaign, producing a string of strong defensive efforts alongside a five try haul.

Kiwi's Jason Temu and Joe Faimalo complete the overseas line up, centre Andrew Patmore having not been retained, and both are capable of dominating a game up front, Temu with his big hits and Faimalo with some damaging running off the ruck and enormous work rate.

Adrian Belle and Ian Sherratt have also departed but the other new signing needs no introduction to Leeds fans. Strapping centre Vince Fawcett has been lured back

Maloney, another Headingley Junior, has all the skill and, if clear of niggling injuries, should stake a claim for the problem GB stand off



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berth. The other real strength in the side is in the back row where David Bradbury has emerged as a real find, forcing his way onto the autumn tour. Strong and powerful, he was one of the real stars last season and will be keen to maintain the standard that had several clubs chasing him as his contract came up for renewal. The move to Boundary Park was a major factor in persuading him to commit himself to another two years with the Red and Whites. Prodigious youngsters Howard Hill, Chris McKinney and Paul Crook will have all benefited from last summer's experience and will be looking to stake extended claims.

Full back Paul Atcheson is another genuine gamebreaker as his top try tally of 11 from 21 games illustrated. There is real pace on both wings, Scott Ranson, Rob Myler and Jimmy Cowan are all in contention and add a sprinkling of vital experience throughout the side. Paul Topping, Ian Gildart, Paul Davidson and irrepressible Gary Lord will provide the essential backbone of the squad. One player to watch is former East Leeds hooker John Clarke who, if he continues his excellent progress, has unlimited potential - a lot like the Bears outfit as a whole.

Namely Eric Hughes, Graeme West, Andy Gregory, Brian Johson and the rest of the coaches who knocked the current crop from The Valleys into shape.

No-one is doubting the fact that Jonathan Davies was a top performer when Doug Laughton took him to Widnes eight years ago. But, then again, people like Jiffy are a one-off. Superstar in any code, he was certainly a

better all-round performer when he headed for Cardiff than when he arrived.

The real proof of the pudding comes with the rest of the lads who headed back to Union when the lid came off the pot of gold.

David Young didn't get within a mile of a regular slot at Leeds when he signed. Eventually, after some bloody hard work from Doug Laughton and Andy Gregory at Salford, he became a prop par excellence.

And what happens? He walked straight back into Wales' international squad as one of the cornerstones of their Five Nations bid.

The same goes for Scott Quinnell. Wigan took the softly, softly approach with a man who, while he might have been good enough to carve out a reputation as one of Union's top forwards, patently wasn't fit enough to cut the mustard in League.

Yet what about his performance against Scotland in the opening international? Head and shoulders above the rest of his team-mates in thepack - and all thanks to the professional regime he worked under at Central Park. In fact the only men to rival Quinnell for personal honours in the win over the Jockos were a cerain Allan Bateman

and Scott Gibbs.

Now when Warrington signed Bateman, along with Kevin Ellis seven years ago, coach Johnson was jumping through hoops at his potential. Yet it was still a very raw one and took months before it finally came to the fore.





The interim report as the Rhinos shape up for their now customary tilt at the Challenge Cup Semi-finals and stand on the verge of Super League. would probably read "steady progress but could do better". Three tries against first division opposition have all been negotiated without too much alarm but have all exhibited failings that a higher calibre of opposition would have been able to successfully exploited. Rovers provided the sternest test yet and their performance illustrated how competitive the first division title race is likely to the gap between Super League able to overcome defensive

round strength all round strength and in particular, pace. Twice in the first half impressive Aussie second rower Danny Baker exposed the Rhino's markers at acting half back to grab an impressive brace of tries but on each occasion the home side stormed back within a set of 6 tackles to redress the balance.

With a virtual full strength squad to pick from, Dean Bell opted for

a Kemp/Sheridan half back combination which almost paid immediate dividends, the returning stand off's pass to Paul Sterling being deemed to have gone forward as the powerful winger surged over in the corner. Debutante Richie Blackmore bust the cover down the left hand side to make an immediate impact as the Rhino's used stifling defence at speed to get on a roll and force Rovers into mistakes. From one on the halfway line, Tony Kemp produced a gem of a one handed inside pass to the rampaging Barrie McDermott and the



form in an unstoppable charge from 30 metres out.

Far from spurring the Rhino's to maintain their early dominance, it was the visitors who took up the cudgels, responding to Neil Summers' prompting as he instigated a flowing backline move. From that confident platform it came as no surprise when Baker claimed his first score, exploiting a gap on the inside close to the ruck.

Commendably the Rhinos response was immediate, led by

From the ensuing scrum Kemp again turned provider, sending Francis Cummins, ironically linking from full back, sprinting clear for an excellent match winning score. Graham Holroyd's introduction was the final impetus for victory, the youngster kicking a landmark penalty and then setting up Cummins again after twice being involved in a flowing backline move. The main positive for the Rhinos going into a daunting semi-final clash with Bradford was that there was no lack of concentration in the closing stages this time and some credit in nilling committed opponents after the break. SUPERLEAGUE ACT II



Over the following weeks Ian Proctor is going to be reviewing the status of Super League clubs as they progress through the season, starting with London Broncos and Sheffield Eagles

LONDON BRONCOS



Seventeen years after Rugby League gave birth to a cheeky infant in the shape of Fulham there are real signs that the troubled 'teenager' is about to mature into a fully-fledged adult. London's time has surely come.

After years of struggle against adversity, apathy and a nomadic existence in the wake the sensational initial impact made at Craven Cottage, the Maranta-backed Broncos appear to have found their rightful home at the Stoop. Let us hope so, after fleeting stops at Craven Cottage, Chiswick, Crystal Palace, Barnet Copthall, Brentford, Charlton and other venues, it is time the Broncos had a long-standing base.

The Stoop, a much-changed venue from where the Broncos appeared in 1995/96, seemed home-from-home when they entertained Bradford in the Challenge Cup last month. Sure, the pitch will need some attention, but the place seems an ideal setting for summer Rugby League. On the field the Broncos appear strong enough to mount another challenge for a place in the top four. Last season's highest-ever league placing was a credit to the hard work of coach Tony Currie who was in his debut season at the club, and the ever-demanding Australian has set his sights on at least equalling that fine effort.

The Broncos may find it tough in the early weeks, as their influx of new players takes time to gel, and they have a difficult start with Sunday's home game against champions St Helens being followed by the visit to Warrington. But, by the time they entertain Paris in round three, the new signings should be settling into British Football.

Gone from last season's team are veteran half-back Kevin Langer, popular Leo

Dynevor, retired hooker Tony Rea (now chief executive), centre Evan Cochrane and utility back Duncan McRae. All will be missed, particularly Rea for his tireless work around the rucks and support play, and McRae, who was a brilliant footballer capable of hitting the heights in the big games.

The Broncos have addressed those losses with some shrewd recruitment from Australia. Ex-Manly prop Matt Dunford will fill the void left by Gavin Allen and Darren Shaw, and has the chance to emulate the achievements of his former Sea Eagles colleague Tony Mestrov, who has made such a success of his move to England.

There was no finer prop in the game than Mestrov last summer and, along with back-rower Peter Gill, a worthy selection in the Stones Super League Dream Team, the Broncos had two of the most consistent forwards in the entire competition.

Dunford's signing will strengthen the pack and former Illawarra man Robbie Beazley is set to get the hooker's berth. He had a tough start at the Stoop, coming up against an inspired James Lowes, but will get better as he gets to know his colleagues. Tony Currie has confidence in him.

Josh White was another who found the going tough against the Bulls, and London may feel the need to recruit another halfback to complement Lions tourist Tulsen Tollett, one of their major stars of 1996. White's kicking game is his strength, but it was significant that the Broncos were being linked with Wigan legend Shaun Edwards as the build-up to the Super League kick-off began last week. Edwards would give the London operation another massive shot of credibility and, alongside ex-Wigan colleague Martin Offiah, add to the Broncos already potent attacking threat with Tollett, the outstanding Greg Barwick and giant centre David Krause, who is bound to prove a success in '97. The Broncos management are well aware of the need to give youth a chance. Tony Martin at full-back was, arguably, the discovery of last summer and his progress will be monitored with interest. And there was great delight at the Broncos when forward Matt Salter, still to make his debut, earned selection for the GB Academy tour last summer. SHEFFIELD EAGLES

It has been 'all change' at Sheffield, in the close-season, with founder Gary Hetherington departing for Leeds, leaving the Eagles to restructure the club completely. Now Sheffield are set to become the first Rugby League club to float on the Stock Exchange. With the Great Britain management team of Phil Larder and John Kear installed as coaches and Hetherington having left behind a young, highlymotivated playing staff to work with, the Eagles will be looking to improve upon last season's creditable 7th-place finish. Larder did an ultra-professional job at his previous clubs, Widnes and Keighley, and the prospect of pitting his wits against the best in Super League is bound to bring the best out of the former Director of Coaching. And he has moved quickly to put together an Eagles playing staff more to his liking.

The acquisition of Nick Pinkney and

Martin Wood from Keighley and the signing of GB forward Steve McCurrie brings Sheffield three players he knows from his previous clubs. All are quality signings and, together with a trio of Australians (Steve Edmed, Willie Morganson and Rod Doyle), plus 1993 Kiwi tour winger Whetu Taewa, they give the Eagles playing staff a whole new look. In former Wakefield centre Wayne Flynn, Sheffield have signed an Academy international with real potential. Larder released Ryan Sheridan, Anthony Farrell and Dean Lawford to Leeds, Ian Hughes has gone to Wakefield, Richard Chapman to Featherstone and Mark Gamson severed links with the Eagles which stretched all the way back to their formation in the summer of 1984. It has certainly been a close-season of sweeping change at Don Valley. Two long-serving players, Mark Aston and Test prop Paul Broadbent, will remain to play important roles in 1997, and Larder will relish the chance to work again with the admirable Broadbent (one of the successes of the Lions tour), fellow tourist Keith Senior, hooker Johnny Lawless, Paul Carr and Andy Hay. And luckless David Mycoe will hope for an injury-free season so that he can fulfil the potential which was apparent when he made his debut as a 17 yearold, back in 1989.

seemed imminent, the Sheffield management have resisted further change by brokering a deal to remain at Don Valley Stadium, which seems a natural venue for summer Rugby League. Supporters recalling the club's nomadic days of the '80s will surely be relieved at the prospect of staying put.

Don Valley proved a lucky venue last season, of course, with Sheffield remaining undefeated there in Super League. The Eagles' only home defeats were against Wigan (at Bramall Lane) and in the clash with St Helens which was switched to Cardiff.

In contrast, Sheffield, the Jekyll and Hyde outfit of Super League, were awful on their travels. They managed only one win, at relegated Workington, and conceded an average of 44 points away from home. A larger supporter base has got to be one of the Eagles' aims in 1997, because they have been unable to add significantly to the loyal fans they already have on board. Their impressive home form deserves better although it's not easy in a city of soccer fanatics.



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
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The league season gets underway in earnest this week for the club's Alliance and Academy teams.

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
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

OBITUARY

We are sad to report the death on February 16 of the greatest winger to grace the Headingley turf, Eric Harris. Eric passed away at his home in Queensland. He was suffering from a form of cancer. He was 87. Eric joined Leeds in 1930 and made his debut against Featherstone Rovers at Headingley in September of that year. It was the great Australian centre, Jeff Moores, who was responsible for bringing him to Leeds with whom he played in his native Brisbane in the late 1920s. He had already represented Queensland and when Leeds were looking for a winger, Jeff Moores moved quickly and Leeds got their man. In only his first seventeen matches he broke the club scoring record of 30 tries and by the end of the season he had accumulated an astonishing 58.

It was Jeff Moores who made him, with split-second timing of his passes. His growing reputation made him a marked man and again Moores was on hand to keep a watchful eye on his protégé. His deceptive change of pace gave him the lasting nickname of 'The Toowoomba Ghost' and he used that skill to good effect in the 1932



Challenge Cup Final at Wigan. He left the Swinton full back, Scott, for dead and ensured a Leeds victory in what was an epic Final.

After Moores' transfer to York he struck up an amazing partnership with his namesake, Fred. Leeds went from strength to strength in what will always be known as the 'Golden Thirties'.

Harris perfected the scissors move and used it to good effect during the 1936 Challenge Cup campaign. Both Fred and Eric scored tries in the Final at Wembley. By the end of the season he had scored 63 tries and set a record that stands to this day. 1936 was the highlight of Eric's career with Leeds. He created another record when he scored 36 tries in 17 consecutive games. With the outbreak of the war, Eric returned to his native Australia, never to wear the Blue and Amber again.

It's been quite a wait, lan, but I'm thrilled the time has come. From that first meeting at Huddersfield in April 1995 I was pro-Super League because I'd seen what had been coming from the base of the game and this was by far the best offer we'd ever get to enable Rugby League to go forward into the next century. Super League was a great opportunity. I had to be sold on the idea but I'm a summer fanatic and believe that, while 1996 was good for Super League, this year will be even better.

Salford have facilities as good as anywhere in the game. We've always run our business well, but when you've got Manchester United on one side and Manchester City on the other, it makes life difficult. Summer gives us the chance to pull some of those soccer fans into The Willows.

Q ORIGINALLY, SALFORD AND OLDHAM WERE ASKED TO MERGE TO FORM A SUPER LEAGUE TEAM. WAS THAT EVER ON?

It was never really on the cards, but a quick decision had to be made if we were to accept money on the table. I spoke with Jim Quinn (Oldham chairman) for five hours but we were at stalemate. I'd just bought The Willows Variety Centre and had a ground which held 12,500 in comfort, while Oldham weren't in anything like that situation. It was a marriage which couldn't work. We had to go into the lower division, come back and really show who could be the strongest. Our collective assets weren't owned by Jim Quinn and John

Wilkinson but by those shareholders. It couldn't have been put together easily. I'm not against mergers, but a better one would perhaps have been Salford and Swinton.

Q OLDHAM WENT INTO SUPER LEAGUE, THEN, AND YOU WERE OUT. HOW DID YOU VIEW THINGS AT THAT STAGE?

A Andy Gregory had just come in as coach and we talked about what we needed to get out of the First Division at the first opportunity. We knew we'd be in a loss-making situation for the best part of a year. Our sums had to be good.

But Andy's a knowledgeable guy and brought in Eddie McDonnell as scout. Eddie had a great deal to do with assembling the late-80s side at Widnes. We signed Fata Sini, Darren Rogers and Peter Edwards. Since promotion, we've bought well again with Andy Platt, John Cartwright,

Esene Faimalo and David Hulme bringing vast experience to the club.

It's all started to come together, we've performed superbly in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup, we're through to

the semi-finals for the first time since 1988 and we hope to do what Bradford did last year. Qualifying for Wembley ignited their summer in Super League. We're hopeful it can happen for us too.

Q YOU'VE A GREAT HERITAGE TO FOLLOW AT SALFORD IN THE WAKE OF THE BRIAN SNAPE ERA AND THE FABULOUS TEAM OF THE 70s, HAVEN'T YOU?

A We all like flair players and wingers racing in for tries, so it would be wonderful for those great days to return to The Willows. My biggest regret was that I never knew Brian Snape and, of course, he died last year. He seemed a man who liked his own company. I probably read him wrongly. I went to his funeral last year and was invited back home by his wife and daughters and they showed me all his Salford memorabilia. It was touching to see how much he cared about the club.

Q HE SEEMED TO BE SO MUCH AHEAD OF HIS TIME, WITH HIS DECISION TO BUILD THE WILLOWS VARIETY CENTRE AND GO FOR FRIDAY EVENING MATCHES IN THE 60s. YOU SEEM TO HAVE INHERITED THAT ZEST FOR THE GAME AND AN UNSWERVING LOYALTY TO SALFORD.

A Brian was ahead of his time, with his vision to make the game appeal to a wider public. I've had to be patient to see things evolve

at the club. It's a young man's game but I'm young enough to take Salford further forward. The Willows Centre was bought through my own company because it was the only way I could get together the money needed. But all profits go to the rugby club and I hope one day to marry the football club and The Willows club together.

Q DO YOU EVER SEETHE DAY WHEN YOU WILL CALL YOURSELF MANCHESTER, AS RUGBY LEAGUE BECOMES EVER MORE GLOBAL?

Salford is a proud city with

proud traditions. I'm probably the major stumbling block here because I have very strong Salford connections. My grandfather worked for Salford Gas for 41 years and my father also worked for the Gas Board for 29 years, so that's 70 years given to the city of Salford between them. I've spent all my working life in the city of Salford. I have that blood in me. I feel I'm such a part of Salford that I couldn't let the name go maybe, 'Salford-Manchester' might be a way round the problem, but Salford would always have to be there, somewhere, for me.

Q YOU'RE THE LONGEST SERVING CHAIRMAN IN THE GAME, JOHN. WHAT ARE THE MAJOR CHANGES YOU'VE SEEN IN THOSE 15 YEARS AT THE HELM OF SALFORD?

A Maurice Lindsay had a vision no-one else possessed. I'm one of his keenest supporters. I know what he's done for the game and saw he had the guts to follow it through.

He has never ducked a challenge or avoided doing what he believes

to be right for the game.

I hope Super League's marketing arm has the common sense to work with the Rugby Football League to make our game better.

No-one should forget what Maurice has done to bring our game to the exciting position where we're looking forward to the World Club Challenge matches – it's all a long way from a year ago when we were in Division One.

I believe Maurice still has a big role to play in helping us go further forward.

It's quite a mouth-watering prospect to look forward to Adelaide Rams and North Queensland Cowboys coming to The Willows.

We've done what other sports are only thinking about.

Q WHAT'S YOUR AIM FOR SALFORD IN 1997?

A I'd love to take the club to Wembley for the first time since 1969.



Steve Blakeley holds the Division One cup aloft to propel Salford into the Super League



Computer companies, mobile phone shops and leading sportswear companies obviously took her to heart.

Compaq, Hewlett Packard, JWE, Puma, Nike and household names like Dairycrest Milk are lending their enormous backing to the arrival of Super League in a new hi tech dimension. They easily recognise, and are quick to support, a good thing when they see one.

Before the 1966 Challenge Cup final against deadly rivals Wigan I and my St Helens team-mates entered into the first sponsorship deal in the history of the club.

We received a string vest and were granted the opportunity of purchasing another at a bargain price from a stockist in town. It is a world away from the commercial merry-go-round of 97, where cut glass vases, silver goblets, holidays abroad and hand made suits are the order of the day for the likes of Bobbie Goulding, Robbie Paul and Richie Blackmore.

As a reward for my exertions over 80 minutes and a Man of the Match award I earned £5 and a packet of ten cigarettes by the sponsors. Three pounds had to be placed in the players' kitty for the annual trip to Blackpool, while the cigarettes were handed over to the skipman, the only one around the changing rooms who smoked. They are sponsorship deals that belong to a past age, and rightly so.

The first pack of forwards I played in – Abe Terry, Bob Dagnall, Cliff Watson, Dick Huddart, Vince Karalius – included coalminers, a joiner, a lorry driver and a scrap metal merchant.





EDWARDS TARGETS 300 TRIES

Shaun Edwards begins the new Super League campaign needing only three tries for a career total of 300. He has scored 274 for Wigan plus 23 in representative matches, including 15 Test touchdowns for Great Britain from a total of 520 appearances.

One of the greatest half-backs of all time, Edwards' most notable season was 1991-92 when he headed the try chart

with 40.

The following season he equalled the Wigan match record with 10 against Swinton – still the best tally by a nonwinger for any club.

Edwards made his debut as a 17-year-old stand-off in a John Player Trophy defeat of York on 6 November 1983 and has been a regular first team player ever since. After being dropped from Wigan's starting line-up late last season he hit back with a vintage streak of tryscoring for a total of 11 tries in the final six

matches. He carries over a

four-match tryscoring sequence from the

last Super League season of I-2-I-2.
