A Message FROM THE CHAIRMAN

IIM QUINN

This evening sees the start of our Boundary Park programme in Super League 97 and it is generally believed that this is going to be a glorious summer for rugby league football in the northern hemisphere.

Competition will be far more intense than last year and not merely because newly-promoted Salford Reds have already shown in their Silk Cut Challenge Cup run that they will be a force to be reconed with.

Most clubs have strengthened during the off season and I think we can expect far more this season from clubs like Leeds Rhinos and Paris St. Germain. Bradford Bulls, of course, come here this evening with realistic hopes of chasing a cup and league double, so perhaps this is an appropriate time to reflect on their recent visit here in the quarter-final of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

The tie produced an attendance of 11,284 which was our biggest gate for 30 years, our best in fact since we packed 18,000 fans into Watersheddings for a second-round replay against Bradford and a third round tie against Leeds in the late 1960s. There was a terrific atmosphere when the Bulls were here a fortnight ago and that was partly because Boundary Park, whilst boasting some of the finest facilities in Super League, retains a traditional character which in itself helps to create a big-buzz game.

I feel sure that the thousands of Bradford folk that were perhaps visiting Boundary Park for the first time would be more than



pleased with the facilities on offer and the comparative ease of arrival and departure.

We believe we now have use of some of the finest facilities in Super League at a ground which is ideally situated for visiting fans on the edge of the link road direct to the M62.

We were greatly encouraged by the size of the crowd at the cuptie, but also by the large number of supportive comments of Boundary Park in stark contrast to those at Watersheddings.

Even the Bradford players were known to be delighted at the facilities and at the condition of the playing surface and Steve McNamara said as much when he attended a post-match press conference.

Watersheddings had served our club well for more than one hundred years, but it was time to move on and, thanks to the hand of friendship extended by Oldham Athletic, we can now stand up and be counted in Super League, happy in the knowledge that we have acquired the use of a Super League stadium in every sense of the word.

Boundary Park is probably one

of the few stadiums which meets most of the Framing the Future requirements and we are hoping that both home and away fans will be eager to make a return visit once they have seen what the ground has to offer.


We have also reached agreement with Oldham Rugby Union Club for the Bears to set up base camp at Manor Park to do their Super League training and conditioning.

There has always been a good relationship in Oldham between what used to be known as rival codes and those friendships can only grow deeper as a result of greater co-operation.

There is now a three-way link-up involving the Bears, Oldham Athletic and Oldham RU Club, while we are also striving to develop a relationship with Manchester Storm, the Super League ice-hockey team based at Nynex Arena.

These are positive moves that can be of mutual benefit to all concerned.

TALKING POINT

The results from week one Super League 97 perhaps show how much all the teams becoming full time has levelled out the fitness and general playing standards of the competition. Only Bradford Bulls recorded a winning margin of more than 15 points with all the other matches swinging pendulum style before final scores were recorded.

Our match against Leeds Rhinos was great for the spectators but not for coaches pulse rates.

From 16-0 down after 15 minutes we should have gone in at half time only 4 points down.

However we allowed Gary

Mercer to score a converted try on the hooter and went in 10 points down.

With 20 minutes of the match remaining we trailed only 22-24 yet largely due to our error allowed Leeds to pull away once again.

The eventual 22-32 score did not reflect the balance of play but did reflect the amount of errors we made in our own 20. The close results throughout Super League prove that unforced errors will lose many matches this season. If we can cut down on ours we should win many too. One down side is the injuries to both starting centres Darren Abram and Vince Fawcett with groin and hamstring injuries respectively.





Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear

The revelation of the Super League era so far has been the Bradford Bulls. Excellent marketing has lead to excellent support which has encouraged excellence on the field of play, a prime example being last April's superb exhibition in the Cup Final at Wembley.

But that has not been the first occasion that Bradford have excelled under twin towers. The last time Bradford won the Challenge Cup was way back in 1949. In those days the first round was staged over two legs which was perhaps as well because Bradford opened their Cup campaign with a tricky tie against St. Helens. After losing 4-3 at home it looked as though their efforts to reach Wembley for a third consecutive year had come to an end. However they pulled off a magnificent 5-0 victory at Knowsley Road on the second leg to edge through 8-4 on aggregate.

Round Two saw Bradford overcome Castleford 11-5 and then in the quarter-finals Northern entertained Belle Vue Rangers and scraped through 8-7, winger Alan Edwards scoring both their tries.

Bradford were involved in both semi-finals, playing in one and staging the other, both with satisfactory outcomes. Northern beat Barrow 10-0 at Swinton whilst a crowd of 64,250 were attracted to Odsal for the other semi-final which resulted in an

11-10 victory for Halifax over Huddersfield. In previous rounds Halifax had beaten Hull 10-4 on aggregate, Swinton (home) 5-0 and Oldham at Watersheddings 7-2.

So the Wembley final was to be a 'needle' match between local rivals Halifax and Bradford Northern. Despite this the crowds flocked from all over the North to Wembley to establish what was then a World record rugby league attendance of 95.050.

Halifax: Dennis Chalkley; Arthur Daniels, Paddy Reid, Gareth Price, Johnny MacDonald; George Kenny, Stan Keilty; Mike Condon, Alvin Ackerley, John Rothwell, Des Healy, Jack Pansegrouw and Frank Mawson.

Eight of the Bradford side were playing in their third consecutive Wembley final and with nerves playing such an important part in the early exchanges it was no surprise that Northern began better. For one of the eight, however, it provided a painful experience. Winger Eric Batten broke his shoulder blade in the opening minutes but as substitutes had not been introduced into the game at that time, he continued to play

throughout the 80 minutes. Indeed he was on hand after just ten minutes to chase an Ernest Ward kick and dive over for the opening score. Ernest Ward's touchline conversion made the score 5-0 and so it remained until the hour when Ward increased the lead with a penalty. Ten minutes from time Bradford sealed victory when Trevor Foster went in under the posts and Ernest Ward's third goal took the final score to 12-0. It was a thoroughly entertaining match which thrilled the record crowd but for the following 15 years things turned sour at Odsal culminating in their closure in 1963. They have bounced back from that and are now one of the leading clubs in the game and as such should guarantee an entertaining start to the Super League season here at Boundary Park.





Don Yates recalls this day in history Although Oldham will be hoping for a bumper gate with which to start their home Super League programme for 1997, tonight's attendance is unlikely to exceed the record attendance of 1936 and 1959. It was in this day 1936 that Leeds defeated Huddersfield 10-5 in the Challenge Cup semi-final at Belle Vue, Wakefield, A crowd of 37,906 were attracted to that tie, the biggest ever to watch a match at Wakefield, lust down the road at Featherstone, on 21st March 1959, there was a crowd of 17,531 to see Rovers beat St. Helens 20-6 in a Challenge Cup quarter-final tie, the biggest crowd to watch a match at Post Office Road. The 21st March 1964 was an important date in the career of international loose-forward Dave Robinson. He had turned

professional in the previous May when he joined Swinton from Folly Lane amateurs and it was on this day in 1964 that he made his senior debut. Swinton beat Leigh 16-7 at Station Road in a match which set Robinson on a career, the highlights of which were 13 test appearances for Great Britain and two tours to Australia in 1966 and 1970. It was on this day in 1934, Wednesday 21st March, that the French national team met London Highfield at the White City Stadium. France led 17-11 at half time and that score remained until five minutes from time. Highfield then scored two tries and a touchline conversion from prop Sam Oakley in injury time snatched a 19-17 victory for the Londoners. Another representative fixture took

Another representative fixture took place on this day in 1931, Saturday

21st March, The Recreation Ground, Whitehaven was the setting for a County Championship clash which saw Cumberland lose 19-12 to Glamorgan and Monmouthshire. Bradford were not represented in that match but Oldham had looseforward Hathway in the Welsh team and forwards Lister and Ashworth in the Cumbrian pack. Lister scored a try for Cumberland who failed to win a match that season. It was on Wednesday, 21st March 1990 that Oldham pulled off a fine 42-14 Second Division victory at Hunslet. Bradford Northern pulled off an even better victory on Sunday, 21st March 1982. That day they beat

Warrington 21-0 in a First Division

fixture at Wilderspool.

ast weekend was a memorable one for Rugby League in one of its newest outposts. The game has long toyed with the game in Adelaide, the delightful city that is the capital of South Australia. Winfield Cup and representative matches were taken to the City of Churches with considerable success, but it took the advent of Super League - and the need for a tenth team to complete the roster - that turned dreams into reality.

Nobody ever said that it would be easy for the Adelaide Rams, a team thrown together at short notice when it became clear that the competition would go

ahead this year, to establish themselves.

But, so far, the side coached by former Kangaroo second-row and one-time Barrow coach Rod Reddy has performed beyond expectations. In both their first two games on the road they proved highly competitive - and the stage was thus set for their debut on the Adelaide Oval, which must now surely be one of the most picturesque grounds in rugby league, last Friday night. It was a double triumph. First of all, over 27,000 fans turned up for a match in a city which normally reserves its greatest enthusiasms for Aussie rules football. In fact, Adelaide has never been quite as one-eyed about its sporting preferences as Melbourne, but that first gate was still highly gratifying.

Better yet, the Rams won. True, it was only by a 10-8 in a tight affair against Super League's other newcomers, the Hunter Mariners, but Adelaide already

understand enough about the realities of rugby league to know that every win counts.

It was not entirely surprising that it should have been the former Test hooker Kerrod Walters – the Rams' star-name recruit from the Brisbane Broncos – who inspired victory.

Walters, one of three brothers who have formed a little dynasty at the most successful end of Aussie league over the last decade, is undoubtedly Reddy's key signing. There are a few others there who will be vaguely familiar to British fans, like Joe lamani, who was with Bradford last season, the Papua New Guinea hooker Elias Paiyo - who was sought by both Workington and Paris last year - and his fellow Kumul, Bruce Mamando. The Rams' victory lifts them clear of the foot of the table after three rounds of matches, with only Hunter and the Canberra Raiders without a point. Mal Meninga's nightmare as new

Canberra coach goes on, with a 38-26 thrashing by Canterbury, His players have leapt to Meninga's defence, shouldering most of the blame themselves, but there is an undeniable air of crisis in the Australian Capital Territory.

Up at the top, just three clubs have maximum points in what promises to be a hard-fought competition.

Brisbane did not have it all their own way in beating the Western Reds 26-16, whilst Penrith only got home against the North Queensland Cowboys by a modest 19-12.

The most assured performance by far came from the Cronulla Sharks, who mauled Auckland to the tune of 34-3 on Monday night. It still isn't coming right for John Monie and is men at the Warriors, but early season suggests that ET and the Sharks are the side to watch.







Next Friday morning, Good Friday, Boundary Park stages the most prestigious match on the local amateur calender. It is the final of the Standard Cup competition which this season features Saddleworth Rangers and Waterhead. Rangers are the current holders of the Standard Cup. They defeated Higginshaw 22 - 12 in last season's final to register a record equalling 13th Standard Cup victory. Rangers have also appeared in a record 25 finals in the 92 years of this competition. Waterhead's record is not so impressive but they have won the trophy thee times from I lcup final appearances. Their last triumph was in 1986 when they beat Mayfield 13 - 8 in the final. Next Friday's final is the fourth final involving Saddleworth and Waterhead. Rangers have won two of those three previous finals with Waterhead's success coming in 1981 when they beat Rangers 9-7.

Rangers had beaten Waterhead 16 - 4 in 1976 and they repeated the feat five years ago when a crowd of 2,780 saw Saddleworth win 22-6. Winger Harry Maher scored Waterhead's try that morning and stand-off Jon Perks landed a first half penalty. Rangers four tries came from centres Sean Cooper and Peter Gallagher, winger Paul Coates and New Zealand stand-off Tom Coates. Loose-forward Sean Whitehead landed two goals for Saddleworth before being sent-off and scrum half David John landed a goal following that dismissal.

The following season, 1992-93, Waterhead gained revenge by knocking Rangers out of the competition with a 23-20 quarter-final victory in Waterhead Park. Since then, however, Rangers have had the better of the exchanges with semi-final victories both in 1995 (18-2) and last year (44-22). Saddleworth, coached by former Oldham and Great Britian backrow forward Mick Worrall, will start as slight favourites if only by virtue of their status as members of the Premier League of the National Conference League.

However, they have not had a vintage and are currently lying in the lower half of the table. Waterhead, on the other hand, have enjoyed atremendous seaon under the guidance of former Saddleworth stalward Norman Widdall. They are currently plugging away at the head of the North West Countries League, Premier Division. The championship seems to be a three way battle between Waterhead, Farnworth and Rasebridge, the Wigan outfit who have Oldham skipper Martin Crompton on their coaching staff. Waterhaed's championship challenge will be put to one side next week as they concentrate on what is the Wembley of the local amateur scene. It should be a rousing final so why not make the effort to got here. It's an Ham kick off and we guarantee that it will be a final to remember.

Ian Proctor continues his review of the status of Super League clubs as they progress through the season. This week he looks at Castleford, Warrington and Halifax.

CASTLEFORD TIGERS SIPERIFACT

CASTLEFORD TIGERS

Castleford are earmarked for a fight against the drop, but they reckon without the pride and spirit which has kept the Tigers in top-flight football for the past 24 years. Castleford have never been relegated - and they don't intend to start now. Pre-season matches are never a reliable guide to how a side will perform when the real action starts, but coach John Joyner must have been relieved when the Tigers gained an eve-of-season boost with their friendly win against Wigan. It set them up nicely for their revenge mission with Salford at the Willows and they gave as good as they got in a game decided by Phil Coussons' try. But Joyner left the ground shaking his head after a Simon Middleton score was disallowed - the Tigers need luck and they are not getting much at the moment.

Joyner, who has given his adult life to his hometown club, believes his squad is much healthier than when they started in Super League. It will need to be, because the challenges will be that much greater for Super League's 'small town boys'. In charge for four years, Joyner presided over the break-up of the Regal Trophy-winning side which earned him Coach of the Year. Now, the likes of Blackmore, Ford, Nikau, Ellis and Kemp are just names from a successful past and it is the surviv-

ing members of that team who will

have key roles.

Skipper Lee Crooks got back on track when he joined Castleford from Leeds in 1990, but how much longer can the 33-year-old continue to produce his matchless handling skills in the summer heat? If Cas' get the best out of their prop for another year, they could surprise the doom-and-gloom merchants. Similarly, club record signing Graham Steadman is at the veteran stage of a brilliant career and this is likely to be his last season at top level. Fully fit, the hard grounds should suit his flamboyant style, but he struggled with injuries in 1996 and Cas' missed his dazzling influ-

Joyner lost Junior Paramore and Frano Botica to rugby union but will be more worried that Lions tourist Tony Smith recently requested a transfer and looks set to leave Wheldon Road.


One of the finest try-poachers in Super League, Smith is a tremendous asset on attack and defence. But Cas' insist they will get the best possible deal, with Nigel Wright mentioned in any possible transfer with Wigan. The former Wakefield starlet would be a quality acquisition for the Tigers at stand-off.

Australians Jason Lidden and Adrian

Australians Jason Lidden and Adrian Vowles have both arrived with big reputations and prop Sean McVean adds to the fierce competition for the front-row with Crooks, Dean Sampson and Nathan Sykes. Lidden

was a classy performer with Western Suburbs and Canterbury down under, and along with Brendon Tuuta may form a second-row. Huddersfield hooker Lee St Hilaire and former St Helens and Swinton winger Jason Roach have their opportunity in Super League. Castleford will be hoping teenagers Danny Orr, Spencer Hargrave and Lee Bardauskas take steps towards the first-team providing competition for places to keep everyone honest. Castleford have the talent to win a majority of their home games, particularly if their passionate supporters rally round a club flying the Super League flag for all of the game's homespun clubs. Steady home wins should be enough to keep their heads above water.



WARRINGTON WOLVES

Warrington's bombshell to sack ex-Great Britain hooker Martin Dermott after just three games, and to give Willie Swann and Mateaki Mafi free transfers while suspending lestyn Harris, illustrates how hungry the club is for success. The message is clear: mediocrity will not be tolerated.

Performances like the one which brought a 10-try hammering at Odsal, and that Cup disappointment against Salford, dampened the enthusiasm for the new season. The early signs are that Wilderspool will be a place of transition in 1997. Defeat in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup always leaves a hangover and when it comes with Wembley in sight, the anguish seems more acute. Warrington's players have every right to feel their home quarter-final was 'one that got away', but the display which brought that heavy defeat at Bradford was unacceptable ... following on from a 66-14 loss at St Helens last August.

The turning point of the cup-tie came when Richard Henare was unable to ground the ball properly after looking a certain try-scorer just before the interval and Kelly Shelford's near miss after the break resulting in a length-of-the-field Salford move which brought the

critical score to Nathan McAvoy. It was all downhill from there. The Wolves had their chances against Salford and should have been well clear at the interval. Paul Hulme's early try gave them a perfect start and Warrington dominated for the first quarter, but prematch fears about their ability to subdue the Reds pack proved well founded. It was a similar tale of men-against-boys at Odsal, where Chris Holden and Gareth Davies were making their first starting appearances in the pack. Wilderspool's injury jinx has already struck and they will lack Mark Hilton for most of the season, along with Dallas Mead. Plans for a dominant

Plans for a dominant pack have been wrecked and they will have to open the chequebook or turn to promising young talent. Paul Cullen has still to pull on a jersey this season, and Lee Penny has also been missing at full back, although Nigel Vagana looks a quality asset. With lestyn Harris under a cloud, Warrington are already stretched and Paul Darbyshire's return after a two-year absence is timely for John Dorahy.

Warrington were edged out of the top four last summer, a tremendous effort given the turmoil at the end of the centenary season when Brian




Johnson and Clive Griffiths left the club and Warrington suffered that 0-80 Regal Trophy semi-final humiliation at St Helens.

They copped another hiding at Knowsley Road bringing down the curtain on a campaign which had begun impressively with four wins in their opening five matches. It ended with four defeats in the final six games and allowed the Broncos to steal their position in the Premiership play-offs.

Tongan Salesi Finau ended on a high and will be aiming to impress, at front-row, in the company of a host of fellow New Zealanders.

The Wolves have class in their backs with Harris, if he's still around, and fellow Lions tourist Jonathan Roper capable of embarrassing any opposition, and Toa Kohe-Love, Richard Henare and Nigel Vagana having the class to become big favourites. They will be looking to Kelly Shelford to take control of games at half-back. Warrington have the finest young forward in the business in 19-yearold Paul Sculthorpe. He was everpresent in Super League '96. He thrives on a heavy workload but the Wolves must be careful he doesn't burn himself out - he missed the Odsal defeat.

Last season's 5th-place would have been even better had Warrington reproduced their fine Wilderspool form in away matches. If they can cure travel sickness and overcome early injuries, Wolves can contest a top-four placing – but the competition will be fiercer and they have to steady the ship after the blows of the past fortnight.



IN THE GAME'S TOP FLIGHT

Q SUPER LEAGUE TWO HAS BEGUN AND, FINALLY, THE ACTION STARTED. WILL YOU BE PLEASED TO SEE YOUR TEAM ON THE FIELD, HOPEFULLY ANSWERING SOME OF THE CRITICS WHO HAVE WRITTEN YOU OFF AS RELEGATION CANDIDATES?

A We're hoping to do our talking on the field because although we had a rough start, with our home defeat by Salford in the Challenge Cup, I have every confidence in the ability of the players at Wheldon Road. If they give total commitment and 100% effort on a weekend, there'll be no worries, and we saw at Salford, last Sunday, that we're only lacking a bit of luck because Simon Middleton had a perfectly good try disallowed.

Q IS IT FAIR TO SAY THAT YOU WERE LESS-THAN-HAPPY WITH THE COMMITMENT OF SOME OF YOUR PLAYERS AFTER THE CUP DEFEAT?

A The commitment in the Salford cup-tie, and in the first of two preseason friendlies with Wigan, simply wasn't there from all of the players. Some tried hard and others didn't give their all and you can't win matches like that. We had a long talk about it, and the players put it right in the home friendly against Wigan. We needed that win and we've now got to carry on in that vein. Basically, they're showing a lack of self-respect. I've no time for players who say they're going to do it for the coach or for someone else - if they can't do it for themselves, they can't do it for anybody. It's very hard to accept a lack of effort when you know players have ability. I can understand any player going through a bad patch, but there's no excuse for giving less than your best.

Q AREYOU STILL ENJOYING THE JOB AND DO YOU BELIEVE THAT YOU CAN STILL COMPETE IN SUPER LEAGUE AT A CLUB LIKE CASTLEFORD?

A I'm still enjoying it because it's all good coaching experience. I enjoyed the good times, almost immediately, as coach at Wheldon Road, winning the Regal Trophy and taking the Coach of the Year award at the end of my first season in the job, and now times are a lot tougher. That's the nature of the job but we've got the personnel to get through and I'm sure that Castleford can make progress in this competition. We're very proud of our record of having remained in the top division throughout the past 24 years - I played all my career at the top level and I want to keep

Cas' there.
A lot of people are writing us off and a lot of people don't even want us in the Super League and that's particularly disappointing when I hear certain

comments from

people who are supposedly friends of ours. But they're entitled to their opinion, I guess. We know what we've got to do. The players and coaching staff at

Wheldon Road are all in this together and our aim is to silence our detractors. It's always that much easier when you fight as one solid unit - and we shall do that.

Q IT'S NICE TO PROVE DOUBTERS WRONG AND A LOT OF PEOPLE ARE NOW COMPARING YOUR STATUS IN THE SUPER LEAGUE TO THAT OF WIMBLEDON IN THE FA PREMIERSHIP IS IT A FAIR COMPARISON?

A If we can do half as well as Wimbledon have done over the past ten years, then I'll be delighted. I think we have to develop that siege mentality which has served them so well down the years because when you think the world is against you, when your backs are against the wall, you tend to come out fighting twice as hard. Only the players can do anything about Castleford's onfield progress and we've got to make sure we stick together, work hard as a unit and give that total commitment I was talking about, whether it's playing or in training.

Q YOU'VE SIGNED FIVE PLAYERS TO STRENGTHEN THE SQUAD IN THE OFF-SEASON. AREYOU HAPPY WITH THE NEW RECRUITS AND THE DEPTH OF YOUR SQUAD?


A They've all settled in well and they have helped contribute new ideas but we haven't seen anything like the best of them, on the field, yet. I am sure that will come, particularly with the overseas imports because we've been well-

served by a succession of Australians at the club, down the years. I'm confident Jason Lidden, Adrian Vowles and Sean McVean can follow in the footsteps of such as Paul Khan, Jamie Sandy, lan French, Jeff Hardy, Gary Belcher, Bob Lindner, Chris Johns, Michael Beattie and Ron Gibbs. All of those players gave great service to the Tigers and the fans appreciated their efforts. I'm sure it will be the same this season.

Q TONY SMITH'S TRANSFER REQUEST MUST CONCERN YOU BECAUSE YOU'RE SET TO LOSE ANOTHER INTERNATIONAL PLAYER. WHAT'S YOUR VIEW OF THE SITUATION!

A It's disappointing, naturally, because Tony sees his future elsewhere. That's his prerogative but we've just got to get on with working with the players who are keen to represent Castleford. In youngster Danny Orr, we have a skilful, enthusiastic half-back who's determined to do well for this club. He'll never let us down and he'll give 100%, just as Tony Smith always has. I'd like to see Tony remain with the club, but if he wishes to move on. then we have to get the best possible deal for Castleford, Any deal will have to be right for Castleford before we release him because Tony's contract still has the best part of a year to run.



Q WILLYOU BE ABLE TO USE ANY INCOMING TRANSFER FEE TO SIGN NEW PLAYERS YOURSELE?

A We're constantly on the look-out for players and there have been assurances that some of the money from any possible outgoing transfers will be used to strengthen the squad. It's vital to have the depth of squad to compete in Super League.

Q YOU'VE DONE EVERYTHING IN YOUR LONG SPELL AT THE CLUB, BOTH AS A PLAYER AND COACH, WAS IT DISHEARTENING WHEN YOU SAW THE BREAK-UP OF A SIDE LIKE THE ONE WHICH SWEPT CASTLEFORD TO THEIR 1994 REGAL TROPHY SUCCESS OVER

A You do get despondent from time to time, Ian, but can't let it get you down for long. There's no time for self-pity in this job, because you always have another match to focus upon. Of course, it's been disappointing to lose a succession of world-class players like Blackmore, Nikau, Kemp and Ford, but that's the name of the game in rugby league. There's nothing we can do about that. We've simply got to get on with

things as they stand and try and bring back those happy days.

Q COACHING REALLY IS A TIME CONSUMING JOB, THESE DAYS, WITH ALL THE DIFFERENT FACETS INVOLVED. HOW DEMANDING IS IT IN 1997?

A There aren't enough hours in the day, really, and most clubs employ two or three full-time coaching staff to encompass all the demands of the job. You're preparing your players (possibly trying to oversee all three teams at first-team, Alliance and Academy levels), and looking at videos/matches involving your forthcoming opponents. Junior development is a vitally important area for a club like Castleford, the media demands are greater than ever before, you have a duty to promote and project the club and there are plenty of other tasks. But we're in the game because we love it and I'm still enjoying the experience. I look at it this way - the harder we work, the greater the rewards.

Q HOW EASY IS IT TO PERSUADE A LOCAL LAD TO PLAY FOR CASTLEFORD, THESE DAYS?

A It's unfair to judge everyone the same because it depends on the

individual. There are still some local juniors whose sole aim is to pull on the Castleford jersey and that's heartwarming. I turned down bigger offers to play for Castleford, when I was a kid, and it's pleasing that that attitude still prevails in the 1990s. But some youngsters will follow the money and that's fine although it's not always the best policy. Youngsters coming to Wheldon Road know they will get their chance and that's not always the case at other so-called 'bigger' clubs. What I say to them is to make sure they're happy in their choice of club, because if they have faith in their ability, the big money will come further down the line. We have introduced a scouting and

We have introduced a scouting and youth development system and it will probably bear fruit further down the track, but it's that much harder, nowadays, with all the other clubs raiding junior clubs in the area. The local Under-16s schools team is red hot at the moment, and the scouts are there in force ... from Leeds, Bradford, Wigan ... it is hard but we've signed five or six from the team and believe we've got the pick of them.

Q YOU'VE NEVER HAD ANY CAUSE TO REGRET JOINING CASTLEFORD, REMAINING A ONE-CLUB MAN FOR 25 YEARS. WHAT HAVE BEEN THE HIGHLIGHTS OF YOUR TIME AT WHELDON ROAD?

A Being the captain of the Challenge Cup winning team in 1986 has to be at the top of the list, because I was very proud to lead my hometown team to victory, against the odds, in that Wembley final against Hull KR. Also, on a personal level, making my Great Britain debut in the Second Test defeat of Australia, at Odsal in 1978, was very special and then going on to make three tours down under to Australia. As coach, the Regal Trophy triumph, three years ago, gave me enormous personal satisfaction.

Q WHO POINTED YOU THE WAY TOWARDS A COACHING CAREER?

A Darryl Van de Velde was a great influence, during his time here, as I came to the end of my career, and I learned more about the job from him than anyone else. But at the end of the day, you have to be your own man and that's what I always try to be. Going into coaching was just a natural progression for me.



Tonight Bradford pay their second visit to Boundary Park within a fortnight and they will hope to continue their winning sequence in Oldham after beating the Roughyeds on their past three visits to the town. 

ust for the record, Stuart
Cummings doesn't have a
dubious parentage, he isn't
blind, and he does understand
the rules of Rugby League. He
even knows his on side from
his off side.

But none of this stops fans, coaches and club officials having a pop at him at most games he takes charge of.

So it's a good job that Stuart, like most refs, has a hide like the proverbial rhino. "I am not saying the stick doesn't get to me, but you have just got to live with it," says Stuart, widely recognised as one of the most respected whistlers in the game.

"As long as you know in your own head that you are correct then you can live with yourself."

Which is why Stuart loves having the Sky TV cameras

PE teacher Stuart, 36, said: "The standard of discipline among players these days is very good. They are professional and are the ones you work with week in and week out so they get to know you. Refereeing at this level is more a case of man management, knowing what is the correct thing to do at the most appropriate time." Players' wage packets may be light years better than the referee's fee of £140 per game.

But compare the similarities between the time they both have to put in and you can understand why Stuart is one of a growing band who want referees to become full-time professionals. He said: "They say we're not full-time now but we are really, even though we also have other full-time jobs. We train six times a week and put in a lot of work attending meetings and in recruiting people and developing the game."

Stuart's typical weekly training

thanks to his three-year-old daughter Sophie.

"I'll spend time with Sophie and it's not until about 9am when I iron my kit that I start focusing on the match.

"I might watch a few videos of the teams I'll be refereeing just to refresh my memory on any moves they may have, so I can anticipate where I should be."

After an 'exotic' early lunch of jam sandwiches, Stuart meets up with his touch judges for the day to travel to the game.

"It's good for us to travel together because we are all working as a team. I like to arrive about 90 minutes before the game, have a look at the pitch, get changed and then relax until about 20 minutes before the game when I'll warm up.

"Some people say I am too relaxed, but that's just the way I am. Hopefully the game goes well and then it's just a case of filling in a score sheet but not, as

schedule, which is always fitted in at night after work, is: Mondays – skills training with the Lancashire Referees

What a tremendous start to the new Super League season! The average attendance of 9,022 was the best for an opening weekend of top division matches since the old league set-up was scrapped 24 years ago. It just beat last season's 9,009 which heralded in the new Super League era.

And the 54,136 total at this year's six-match programme was the most for any Super League weekend. It was headed by the 15,070 who saw Bradford Bull's Friday night defeat of Warrington Wolves – the biggest for an opening fixture at Odsal Stadium for more than 40 years.




STEADMAN TARGETS 2000 POINTS

Castleford Tigers veteran Graham Steadman is now in his 17th season as a pro and needs only ten points for a career total of 2,000. The 35year-old stand-off or fullback has scored 828 points for Castleford, 350 Featherstone Rovers and 762 York plus 50 in representative matches. His 1,990 points come from 237 tries and 549 goals, including 28 drop goals, in a total of 431 appearances. He still holds the York record of 318 points in a season. It is generally believed that Steadman began his senior career with York, but in fact he made his pro debut as an unnamed trialist for Huddersfield against Dewsbury on 21 March 1982. Three days later he played the first of two trialist matches for York before signing for them.

PROP RECORD

Barrie McDermott's recent try hat-trick for Leeds Rhinos raised the query: "What's the match record for a prop?" It was actually set by another Leeds prop, 84 years ago! Fred Webster charged in for eight tries when Leeds ended Coventry's brief existence with a club record 102-0 victory. In fact, the eight tries are still the most by any forward. Former Wales Rugby Union international Tommy David is credited with most tries by a prop in a season - 26 for Cardiff City in 1982-83.






