A Message FROM THE CHAIRMAN




TALKING POINT

Il sport is about self belief and in a team sport this extends to belief in those around you. At this moment in time the Bears players could be forgiven for lacking in both these crucial areas. I have repeatedly said over the opening few weeks of the season that Super League is a distance race and not a sprint. Picking from a full squad is a luxury I have not had so far this season. Although few coaches have been able to pick from full strength squads with injury rife throughout the League. I fell that the return of two more defence oriented players in the mould of Matt Munro and Jason Temu over the next few weeks will really steady the ship.

We have recorded every imaginable opening to a match this far and yet cannot perform for the full eighty minutes. Against Salford on Good Friday we didn't even think about playing until we were 22 points behind. Against London and Warrington we made excellent starts, yet were unable to maintain the required intensity. I cannot emphasis enough that the platform for successful attack has got to be defence. Once a win is registered in Super League 97, I feel it will be the beginning of a dramatic hike up the table. In our current position it would not be pertinent to make specific predictions, however come August I am certain that Oldham Bears will still be a Super League side.







DOWN MEMORY LANE

Don Yates looks back to a match from Yesteryear.

As the Super League revolution grew closer during the early spring of 1996, there were doubts expressed about the ability of Paris to hold their own, both on and off the pitch, in the new intense competition. Little news had come from the French capital about player recruitment, the famous Parc des Princess stadium was not available to stage matches and the various French club sides had all fared badly when they appeared in the Regal Trophy competition. Surely the Paris St Germain side would flounder then face relegation before disappearing altogether. Another failed experiment. But when the fixture list for the inaugural season was published, Paris St Germain were given to honour of staging the very first Super League match, Sheffield Eagles were to be the visitors with the match being staged at the smart and well appointed Stade Charlety, home of French athletics.

Despite the pessimism, the
French authorities publicized the
match superbly and so a crowd
of 17,873 were present when the
following two teams were
paraded onto the pitch.

Lucchese, Mikhail Piskunov,
Freddy Banquet, Pierre
Chamorin, Arnaud Cervello,
Todd Brown, Patrick Entat,
Gregory Kacala, Patrick
Torreilles, Jason Sands, Darren
Adams, Didier Cabestany &

Jacques Pech, Substitutes; Ian Turner,

Vea Bloomfield, Regis Pastre & Fabien Devechi. Sheffield Eagles; Waisale Sovatabua, Joe Dakuitoga, Lynton Stott, Jean Mare Garcia, Matt Crowther, Ryan Sheridan, Dean Lawford, Paul Broadbent, Johnny Lawless, Danny McAllister, Andy Hay, Paul Carr & Mick Cook, Substitutes, Keith Senior, Mark Aston. Anthony Farrell & Dale Laughton. The build up to the big kick off had been excellent but could PSG match on the pitch what everyone had enjoyed off it? Ninety minutes later, the answer

to that question was an emphatic

yes. The reaction from the crowd to the tackling in the early minutes of the match indicated that a good percentage of those present were rugby union followers. By the end of the evening a good percentage must have been converted to the real code of rugby. It was an excellent advertisement for the game with plenty of free flowing rugby and ferocious tackling. PSG took the lead after ten minutes when Freddy Banquet scored an unconverted try. Sheffield his back to score a couple of tries in a five minute spell on the half hour. At that stage Sheffield led 10-4 and we began to wonder whether PSG would crumble. Mikhail Piskunov had different ideas and his try and subsequent conversion immediately before half-time left the sides level, 10-

10, at the interval. Ten minutes after the break Darren Adams put PSG in front much to delight of the crowd. However, the French lead lasted less than a minute and in another five minute spell the Eagles crossed for another brace of tries. Back came the French with skipper Pierre Chamorin once more edging PSG in front and then came a length of the filed try from Arnaud Cervello. There was no stopping the French now and a further try from Cervello put the issue beyond doubt. Kevin Senior scored a late consolation try for the Eagles but PSG were home and dry at 30-24. What a night and what a fantastic start to Super League.

Paris did avoid relegation and, although that opening attendance was never bettered, they averaged over 8,000 spectators during the season. Only Bradford, Leeds, St Helens and Wigan had better attendance figures. This second Super League season should see Paris that much stronger both on and off the field so we welcome them to Boundary Park this evening for what should be another tough and exciting encounter.



WISH OLDHAM BEARS SUCCESS IN THE SUPER LEAGUE

ON THIS DAY...

DON YATES

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

It was on this day in 1955, Wednesday 13th April, that the French Services took on their British counterparts at Headingley, Leeds. The crowd of 3,453 saw France take a 7-2 interval lead with a try from loose-forward Jean Rouqueirol and a couple of goals from full-back Manuel Perez. The British hit back after the break to win 15-7 with tries from Phil Jackson (Barrow), Brian Howard (St Helens) and Les Brookfield (Hull KR) whilst Warrington's Laurie Gilfedder landed three goals.

It was on 13th April 1995 that Australian press reports indicated that the Perth Western Red's coach Peter Mulholland was under investigation because of an alleged involvement with the Super League. At that time the Australian Rugby League versus Super League battle was in full flow. Since then the Western Reds have switched to Super League under the name Perth Reds whilst Mulholland is now chief coach with tonight's visitors to Boundary Park, Paris St

Germain.

Good Friday fell on 13th April in 1990 and on that day the traditional Standard Cup Final featured old rivals Saddleworth Rangers and St Annes. Rangers took the trophy back to Shaw Hall Road after a 13-8 victory in what proved to be a thrilling encounter.

Exactly twelve months ago, on Saturday 13th April 1996, Paris St Germain registered their biggest win of the inaugural Super League season when they defeated Workington Town

34-12 at the Stade Charlety. Skipper Pierre Chamorin crossed for a hattrick of tries in that match.

On the very same evening Oldham's Irish International Tony Nuttall made his debut as the Roughyeds beat Leeds 25-16. He had joined Oldham from Newsome Magpies (Huddersfield) the previous November. Another player who made his debut on this day was the Wigan full-back Ray Ashby whose first match was a 33-11 league

victory at Hunslet on 13th April 1964. Ashby had been signed earlier in the year from Liverpool City. He had won Great Britain recognition the previous month and represented his country again the following season but the highlight of his career came in 1965 when he won the Lance Todd Trophy as Wigan beat Hunslet at Wembley. It was Saturday, 13th April 1901 that Oldham met Batley in the Northern Union Cup semi-final at Fartown, Huddersfield. A crowd of 16,000 saw the Batley stand-off loe Oakland score the only try of the match with the Gallant Youths won 9-2. Another Heavy Woollen victory occurred on 13th April 1907 when Dewsbury ran in 16 tries as they demolished Liverpool City 60-0. Eight of those tries were scored by winger Dai Thomas who crossed for a club record total of 40 touchdowns during that 1906-07 season

SUPER LEAGUE DOWN UNDER

David Hadfield the Independent Rugby League correspondent reports

here's nothing unusual in seeing the Brisbane Broncos on top of the heap in Australia. What is new - to British eyes, at any rate - is the identity of many of the players who have put them there. After six rounds of Australian Super League, the Broncos are clear at the top, with their 42-16 win over the North Queensland Cowboys in front of a record 30,000 plus crowd in Townsville last weekend maintaining their perfect

There is still a healthy leavening of players who are household names here as well as in Australia; stalwarts like Alan Langer, Kevin Walters and Glenn Lazarus - who has been hinting that he would fancy a season or two in England when his Brisbane contract expires later this year.

Steve Renouf, not long ago generally acknowledged as the best centre in the world, is also back to something approaching his most potent form, as illustrated by his two tries against the Cowboys. But much of the damage this season has been done by the new wave of Broncos; players like the brilliant young full-back Darren Lockyer, winger Michael Devere, the oddly-spelt but highly-rated centre Conie Carroll and prop Shane Wemeke.

Throw in the club's big-name signings for '97 - Gordon Tallis and Anthony Mundine - and it does not take much working out why the Broncos are running as strong favourites for the inaugural Super League title. Penrith may still have something to say about that. They remain Brisbane's closest chasers after

beating the Hunter Mariners 36-24.

The Panthers did not have this one all their own way and it took a vintage performance from their local hero Greg Alexander - who returned to his old club this year - to steer them to victory.


Cronulla beat Perth 20-6, with former London Bronco Chris McKenna among their try scorers. The match marked the return to fitness of one of Australian Super League's rare Poms, the Western Reds' former Wigan centre Barrie-Ion Mather.

The bad news in Western Australia, however, is that ex-Sheffield Eagle Mark Geyer has copped a ten match suspension on charges of high tackling and gouging an opponent's eyes. If that ban is not overturned on appeal, Geyer will be ruled out of the World Club Championship matches against

to Perth's hopes.

Canterbury are running fourth, thanks to a 34-22 win over Adelaide, Former Manly forward Solomon Haumono crossed twice for the Bulldogs, with Papua New Guinea back-row Bruce Mamando matching him for the Rams.

In what might have been billed as the mournful match-up between misery men Monie and Meninga, Little John's Auckland Warriors beat Big Mal's Canberra Raiders 31-24. It was the second win in two outings for the Warriors, but if I were St Helens I would be starting to worry about just how and when Canberra will try to prise Shaun McRae away.



HERE AND THERE

A week tomorrow, Monday 21st April, the National Conference League are to hold a meeting to thrash out a fixture formula for next season. Currently the league is split into three divisions, each of 12 clubs, and these clubs also contest their respective county cups, the National Amateur Cup and the Silk Cut Challenge Cup. The season, therefore, consists of 22 league matches and between three and 16 cup-ties. This does not include the likes of the Standard Cup but with this formula most clubs would expect to be involved in around 30 matches, an ideal number for a nine month season.

Nevertheless the gaps in the league programme caused by cup competitions led to the withdrawal of Hemel Hempstead from the Conference a few years ago. This season local club St Annes have suffered from a disjointed fixture list following their early elimination from all three cup competitions.

Next season, therefore, moves are afoot to withdraw Conference clubs from the county and National Cup competitions. Replacing those cup dates would be additional league matches caused by an increase in the size of divisions from 12 to 14. That would give a season comprising of 26 league matches. The programme could then be made up of Silk Cut Challenge Cup-ties and a possible League Cup competition which would cover six rounds including the final. Under this formula, clubs would be guaranteed 28 matches and would again be expected to be involved in around 30 matches. The leading players would also be involved in the Inter-league Cup competition and the County Championship, both of which are proposed to be staged at weekends next season. There will be no shortage of clubs applying to fill the six vacancies caused by the expansion of the divisions because 16 clubs have applied to join the Conference next season. Those applicants will have to be vetted very carefully because the Conference League is very demanding competition. However, the applicants include several capable outfits who should be able to cope with the demands of Conference League Rugby.

Thatto Heath, Siddal, Stanningley, Walnut Warriors, East Hull, and Keighley Albion are amongst the list of applicants and they will be the front runners in the race to join the prestigious Conference League. Meanwhile, the Premier Division of this Season's Conference League is reaching a thrilling climax. St Annes are still very much in contention for the Championship and yesterday they entertained West Hull in a crucial match.

Next Saturday Dudley Hill visit Higginshaw Road and, seven days later, Saints wind up their home league Programme when they entertain Lock Lane. Although Saints should win their two remaining home matches, they face a difficult trip to Woolston Rovers, another of the title contenders. Wigan St Partricks are beginning to emerge as Championship favourites although they still have six matches to play including vital trips to both Woolston Rovers and West Hull. They also have to visits Saddleworth Rangers although the date for that match has yet to be decided.

It is all very interesting so why not give the Conference League ago. Saints' two home games kick off at 2.30pm and I am sure that you will enjoy the action over at Higginshaw Road.





For all the talk of them being Murdoch bankroll an untested hybrid, when he has already got two established, highly popular sports for the same price? A year ago, too, Lindsay and Hallett were talking about the cross-code challenges being the first of many. Truthfully, would anyone like to endure those two utterly one-sided contests again? Were the rigmarole of the favourite tap-room argument to be played out a second time, it would be St Helens and Leicester who found themselves in vogue. The reason is partly due to them having fallen in love with the other's sport. estyn Harris' display on his debut for Leeds left spectators and TV viewers convinced that the Rhinos had captured one of the most exciting talents in rugby league - a talent well worth a club record £350,000. fee. And yet the fee, less than a third of the original asking price of £1,350,000, did not place the Welsh Wizard at the head of the World Record Transfers - a list currently led by St Helens' Paul Newlove whose cash plus player exchange deal from Bradford in November 1995 reached a staggering £500,000.

The 20 years old Harris, with at least ten seasons of top class action ahead of him, is one of those gifted players for whom clubs like Wigan, St Helens, Leeds or Bradford are often prepared to break

from Wilderspool.

Why should this be, when a century of transfers in rugby league teaches us that reason tends to go out of the window when a rare talent becomes available on the transfer market? Since the days of Bramley's Jim Lomas' record £100,000 move to Salford in 1901, through Joe Lydon's £100 world record fee from Widnes to Wigan in 1985/86, to Newlove's half million pounds fee, record sums of money have changed hands at regular intervals. But Harris' move, and the departure from Wheldon Road to Central Park of Castleford's international halfback, Tony Smith, for only £150,000 surely heralds an era of realism in rugby league. Unlike in Union where ageing 33 years old Frenchmen and South

holders of world record transfer payouts for back stars Stan McCormick, Mick Sullivan, and Paul Newlove, and never a club to shirk a big deal, pointed to the restrictions of their current business plans when they backed off any agreement with Warrington for their half back star.

Wigan, feeling the pinch before their 12 million pounds Tesco deal, were forced to release their once world record transfer holder, Martin Offish, (£440,00 from Widnes in January 1992) and recoup a few bob from Bedford Rugby Union club and the London Broncos for him.

I think so. That is, until along comes an Ellery Hanley, a Mick Sullivan, a Billy Batten, or a Martin Offiah and we all again beg the question – "Just where are they getting the money from?"





A STADIUM BY ANY OTHER NAME!

David Burke reflects on the state of League stadiums and those being demolished and sees improve standards for the Rugby League supporter

finest sport in the world but sadly we have not had the stadiums to match.

Now there are grounds for optimism – literally! It would have been a Midsummer Night's Dream for many Rugby League clubs several years ago anticipating the prospect of playing in space-age stadiums. Fortunately those that resembled ash-trays with lights now belong in the dark ages.

Just ask anybody who has visited the magnificent McAlpine Stadium whether they prefer watching Rugby League at Huddersfield's new complex of draughty old Fartown.

Wigan Warriors have now, controversially but correctly, opted to sell Central Park and build a new stadium in the town. The traditionalists have opposed the decision but nostalgia is a thing of the past!

Wigan look set to move in with Bolton Wanderers, temporarily at



Twickenham one of the foremost rugby stadiums to be completed in recent years. Rugby league supporters first visit to Twickenham was the Bath v Wigan clash in 1996.

I recall as a player with Rochdale Hornets at Ice Station Zebra in the early 70's it wasn't slices of fresh oranges that were passed round the dressing room at half time – it was a bottle of Harvey's Bristol Cream!

Now Oldham have moved in with soccer neighbours Oldham Athletic at the vastly superior Boundary Park.

The Bears are still hoping a new council-backed ground will be built in the town but it won't be disastrous if they stay permanently at their new base.

The Stoop, in the shadow of the state-of-the-art Twickenham showpiece, has a new grandstand and can accommodate 10,000 in comfort.

Headingley has long been the flagship for Rugby League grounds and Leeds still boasts superb facilities.

Resurgent Bradford want to redevelop Odsal and thankfully Rugby League clubs are now moving with the time.

Exciting days are ahead – on and off the field!



Do the statistics reveal a



ARE the Bears heading for relegation? If you've discussed that once you must have discussed it a dozen times this season at home, at work, in the pub or with the guy who sits next to you in the Boundary Park Stands.

For what it's worth - and I'm not going to sit on the fence (now that's a change, editor) - I will state here and now that the Bears will again be looking forward to Super League in 1998 come the end of August. Tonight's game against Paris is of immense importance, but Andy Goodway was spot on when he stated after the defeat at Warrington last Sunday that there was no need to panic.

Returning from Wilderspool and listening on the car radio to GMR it was interesting to hear Kevin Ashcroft advancing the view that the Oldham board needed to dig deep and find the money to reinforce Goodway's squad. Perhaps Kevin wasn't aware that most of the Bears problems this season have stemmed from an injury list as long as your arm. And there was no let-up in the jinx that seems to have descended on the club when Francis Maloney had to quit with the game at Warrington only ten minutes old. He now joins a casualty list which includes Vince Fawcett, Rob Myler, Matt Munro.

David Bradbury, Paul Topping, David Jones, Jason Temu and Nathan Turner.

No amount of plotting, planning and signing can take into account an early-season injury list of such massive proportions.

The Bears have lost five games on the trot because they have been shot to pieces and, like any losing team, other problems then present themselves, like a lack of confidence and self-belief.

In turn, this causes players to look over their shoulders and examine the contribution of colleagues, coaching staff, club officials and club organisation.

But there have been many good signs ... like the superb form of Paul Atcheson, the consistency of half backs Maloney and Martin Crompton, the sharpness on attack at Salford of two-try Darren Abram and the sound performances of props lan Gildart and Brett Goldspink. Goldspink is included in the Open Rugby form team for March, while Maloney is ranked third behind Tommy Martyn and Henry Paul, such has been the Yorkshireman's impact in a fine partnership with Crompton. It has been all the more commendable because the two half backs have been battling hard

in a losing team.

It was typical of the club's luck that

Maloney should go down injured when in the act of scoring a try from inside his own half. He went a

similar distance for a try against the Bronco's in the last home game at Boundary Park.

At Wilderspool it was interesting to note that he produced a fine turn of pace to hold off a challenge from Warrington winger Mark Forster, who was coming in from his right.

Maloney has looked sharp and hungry this season, but the Bears will now have to do without him for a match or two in another major blow.

Sooner or later the pendulum of fortune will change and once the Bears can get most of their injured players back on the field, I think we can look forward to a steady climb out of the relegation danger zone.


