ur plan to market rugby league in Tameside appears to be showing signs of success, judging by the crowd of 710 fans who watched the Alliance team beat Wigan 26-24 at Stalybridge last week. Since we moved to Bower Fold for our reserve team games at the start of the season, attendances have shown a gradual increase. Unfortunately, the ground will soon be unavailable due to reseeding and other close-season work by Stalybridge Celtic, but I have been having talks with the nearby Hyde United soccer club and we may be moving there for the remainder of the season, although this was unconfirmed at the time of writing.


We are very grateful to Stalybridge Celtic for their help and co-operation, and those fans who have been to Bower Fold don't need me to tell them what a splendid set-up it is.

It is difficult to know how many of the 710 there for the Wigan game came from Oldham, Wigan or Tameside itself, but it is safe to assume the majority came from Oldham.

It is equally safe to say that the game is starting to arouse some interest in Tameside, albeit modestly, and I put that down to three things.

I. As we always believed it would, and with the help of BSkyB, Super League is starting to make an impression this season in areas like Tameside which have previously been barren lands in terms on rugby league.

3. Abe Kerr, our marketing manager, is attempting to get more bums on seats by issuing free tickets to primary schools and this sort of promotional work has spilled over into Tameside. In addition, let me tell you three little stories relating to our experiences in the past couple of weeks.

First of all, I handed out six tickets for the Paris St Germain game to a group of youngsters who live near me in the Hyde area. They had never been to a rugby league game before but I spoke to them again a few days after the match and I was delighted to learn that five of them had gone to the match, with their fathers, and all of them had enjoyed it so much they were wanting to know details of the next match at Boundary Park.

Secondly, each of our seasonticket holders were given an extra complimentary ticket for the Paris game and a couple of regulars who had two 'comps' to give away handed them to a couple in Stockport, who had never previously been to a Super League match.

They enjoyd it so much that a day or two later they made the

journey from Stockport to the Bears offices in Union Street to buy a couple of season tickets for themselves.

And so it goes on. Brian

Gartland's son, Shaun, who works in Hyde, provided two free youngsters' tickets for one of his workmates with the result that the whole family attended the game and later expressed an interest in taking out VIP tickets for a subsequent game. All the signs indicate that we are getting there. Long-term injury victims like Nathan Turner and lason Temu are on the way back and when we are able to choose from a full complement of players I am confident we will start to provide the performances that will be the biggest attraction of all. Today we welcome Halifax and all our old friends from Thrum Hall. Their new coach, John Pendlebury, must be congratulated on his appointment. John is steeped in rugby league and I am sure he will do an excellent job. We wish him well ... but not TOO well today.

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
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DOWN MEMORY LANE

Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear When the concept of the Super League burst onto the scene a couple of years ago there were serious concerns that one of the casualties of that revolution would be the Silk Cut Challenge Cup. However, common sense prevailed and the competition which began way back in 1897 as the Northern Union Cup is set to continue as the most prestigious competition in the British game. Oldham's progress in the first Cup campaign was brief. They lost 7-3 at Bradford in the first round. The following season the Roughyeds considerably better. They beat Leeds, Halifax and Runcorn to reach the quarter-finals but at that stage lost 3-0 at Mount Pleasant against Cup holders **Batley. The Gallant Youths** then went on to retain the trophy with a 7-0 victory over Bradford in the final. The 1899 competition included three clubs from the Oldham area - Oldham,

Werneth and Saddleworth

Rangers. Saddleworth were drawn at Huddersfield in the first round and they were eliminated 43-2. Oldham were also drawn away but Goole surrendered ground advantage and the match was staged at Watersheddings. Oldham won 63-0 which remains their biggest marginal victory to this day. Werneth also won but their victory over Salford St Bartholomews was by a much narrower margin, 4-2. Werneth's reward for that hard fought victory was a trip to Salford in round two. They lost there 31-0. Oldham, however, maintained local interest with a 14-0 home victory over Warrington. There was a spot of trouble at Swinton where Hunslet went through on the strength of an Albert Goldthorpe penalty. the referee and some Hunslet players were assaulted after the game and the Swinton ground was consequently closed until the following October. In round three Oldham won 23-3 at Bradford to avenge that


earlier reverse but the talk of the round was Batley's first ever Cup defeat by 16-6 at Leigh.

Widnes visited
Watersheddings in the
quarter-finals and they
returned home defeated by
20 points to nil. Oldham,
therefore had conceded only
three points in reaching the
semi-finals. Hunslet had gone
one point better, having
disposed of Marypot 11–2,
Swinton 2–0, Castleford 16–0
and Hull 9–0.





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ON THIS DAY...

Don Yates recalls this day in history
The 27th April is not a happy date in the
history of the Oldham Rugby League club
because twice on this date the Roughyeds
have lost in the final of the Northern
Union Cup, forerunner of the Silk Cup
Challenge Cup.

The first occasion was on Saturday, 27th April 1907 when Oldham met Warrington at Wheater's Field, Broughton. Oldham began well and at half-time led 3-2 after second-row forward Bert Avery had scored the Roughyeds' try. Things went wrong after the interval when Warrington got on top and went on to win 17-3. Five years later, on Saturday 27th April 1912. Oldham were firm favourites to beat Dewsbury in the final which that season was staged at Headingley. Once again events went to plan in the first 40 minutes and at half-time the Roughyeds led 5-2. Winger G Cook had scored the Oldham try which had been converted by prop Joe Ferguson. With ten minutes remaining, the score remained at 5-2 for Oldham but then disaster struck. First of all Bert Avery was sent off and then winger Billy Rhodes crossed to equalise at 5-5. Two minutes from time Rhodes

scored again and Dewsbury had won the Cup 8-5.

On this day in 1959, Monday 27th April, Oldham fared a little better when they met St Helens at Watershedddings in what was a vital match for the Saints. A draw would have made Saints Lancashire Champions on points difference over Wigan, they came close, scoring four tries to Oldham's three, but the Roughyeds won 15-14 and so Wigan took the title. lack Keith, Vin Nestor and Ike Southward scored the Oldham tries with Bernard Ganley landing three goals. In the spring of 1955 Halifax faced a hectic finish to their season, they were called upon to play their closing five league matches in 10 days. They won them all and so qualified to visit league leaders Warrington in the Championship semi-final. That match was played on Wednesday, 27th April 1955, just 48 hours after completing that gruelling finale. Not surprisingly, a jaded Halifax outfit lost at Warrington who had not played for a fortnight. However, they put up a terrific scrap, the final score being 17-9. Winger Arthur Daniels scored the Halifax try to go alongside goals from

Tyssul Griffiths (2) and Derrick Schofield. Twelve months earlier, on Tuesday 27th April 1954, Odsal Stadium, Bradford staged an international between Great Britain and France. Neither Oldham nor Halifax were represented in that match which Britain won 17–8. Billy Boston (Wigan), Phil Jackson (Barrow) and Brian Biggs (Huddersfield) scored the British tries with Lewis Jones (Leeds) landing four goals. The French points came via four goals from the boot of legendary full-back Puig Aubert.

Finally, it was on this day in 1989, Thursday 27th April, that Oldham signed a promising 17-year old back-row forward from the Wigan St Patricks amateur club. His name was Chris Joynt and he went on to make 28 first team appearances for Oldham, scoring 10 tries, before moving to St Helens and further stardom in September 1992.





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AUSTRALIAN SUPER LEAGUE ROUND UP

ustralian Super Laeuge was until this Monday, in danger of turning into a

one-horse race - that horse being a Bronco.

Victory at Penrith would have put Brisbane six points clear of the field. Admittedly, the Australian system puts greater stress on the end-of- season play-offs than on first place at the end of the Championship fixtures, but it was still getting a little too processional. So thank heavens for the Panthers, who wn a thriller 27-26, inflicting a first defeat of the season on the Broncos, cutting their lead to two points and making the whole issue look infinitely more open and alive. It was a particularly good effort by the Panthers in the absence of their inspiration, Greg Alexander. He will be out for several weeks - including this Friday's Test against New Zealand, for which he was a certain starter - with a broken bone in his foot. In third place in Super League,

In third place in Super League, behind Brisbane and Penrith, are the Canterbury Bulldogs. They came from behind to win 38-24 in Auckland, with last season's London Broncos player Duncan McRae having a big hand in the victory.

The most surprising result of the weekend was Cronulla's 29-18 defeat by the Adelaide Rams. The Sharks are turning out to be something of an enigma: they can look so good on occasions, but they are also capable of the most horrendous lapses.

The Cronulla and Australia coach, John Lang, believed that this failure may have had something to do with an air of self-congratulation after having five men named in the Test Lineups. They will not need reminding that repulations can be fragile things.

It was the best day yet for Rod

Reddy's Rams, despite what sounds like less than ideal preparation when four of their players were arrested in a brawl outside a strip club

three days before the match. Who said league was in danger of losing its rough edges?

The other team newly formed for Super League, the Hunter Mariners, also had a terrific result, beating the Perth Western Reds 36-16 with their half-back, Noel Goldthorpe, having another excellent game.

And the Canberra
revival goes on. Mal
Meninga's Raiders
started to look
something like their old
selves in thrashing the
North Queensland Cowboys
40-16.

That exciting full-back Brett Mullins showed a return to form with two tries, whilst Ricky Stuart and Bradley Clyde gave notice that they want their Australian jumpers back.
One woeful defence of the
Cowboys was an even bigger
factor, however, and they are
now two points adrift at the
bottom of the table. Above
them on six points are the
Mariners, the Raiders, the Rams
and the Warriors - who go to
Townsville this weekend for a
fixture that now assumes extra
importance.



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
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
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HERE AND THERE

Although this year there is to be no European Championship competition, international rugby is still on the agenda. On Wednesday, 14th May, Paris will host a friendly match between France and Ireland. It is expected that Martin Crompton will once again be invited to skipper the Irish side and Tony Nuttall could be included in the Irish pack. Then on July 7th, the French will be in action again when they visit Glasgow to take on Scotland. Utility back Jimmy Cowans could be in the running for another Scottish cap in that encounter. At this point in time, those are the only two internationals scheduled to take place before the visit of the Australians in November.

A decision has yet to be made as to whether France will meet the Australians at the end of the British section of their tour. When the Kangaroos last visited France, the hosts crashed to a humiliating 74–0 defeat which followed Australian victories of 42–17, 60–16, and 64–9 in the regional matches. Clearly those results neither encouraged nor assisted the French in their attempts to strengthen the game in France. When Paris were included in the

Super League last year, it was hoped that this move would be of benefit to the french national side. Unfortunately this has not been the case. The Paris outfit is comprised mainly of antipodean players with the French domestic game continuing to be played in the winter months. The few players able to break into the Paris squad found the demands of Super League rugby together with their domestic club commitments much too big a strain. Consequently, their European Championship quest ended in embarrassing defeats at home to Wales 14-34 and away to England 73-6.

The differences between BARLA and the RFL have resulted in the suspension of the annual BARLA Open Age match with the French 'B' team. that is a major blow, not only to France, but also to our amateur open age players.

So where do the French go now with regard to international rugby? It seems that the British or Australian teams will prove much too strong and so the matches against Ireland and Scotland are suitable substitutions. However, it is essential for the well being of the European game that a worthwhile

international programme of matches is set up to assist the Celtic nations. Down in Australia the 'State of origin' series, which now incorporates New Zealand, ensures that players are battle hardened to international level before they set off on an Ashes tour. If we are to match the Australians, or the New Zealanders for that matter, then we. too, must have a series of European internationals which test our top players, the only way in which we can achieve that is by developing the game in Ireland, Scotland, Wales and France. The withdrawal of South Wales from professional rugby when they lost Super League status was a severe body blow to the development of the game in the Principality. It looks now as if France will follow Wales into the international wilderness unless action is taken quickly.

This state of affairs must be rectified if we are to achieve what we have been striving for during the past twenty five years. that is to defeat Australian in a three match test series, a feat that can only be achieved if European players have a suitable platform from which to launch their challenges to the Kangaroos.

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

PLATT CHARGING TO TRY CENTURY

Andy Platt ranking as one of Britain's greatest ever forwards is based on a tremendous work rate and blocking tries rather than scoring them. But the Salford Reds veteran is now poised to grab a little glory as a tryscorer for he needs only three more for a British career century of touchdowns.

His total of 97 tries has been steadily built up in 446 matches over 15 years with 68 for St. Helens, 24 Wigan, one for Salford and four in representative matches including two Test touchdowns for Great Britain.

Now 33, Platt's tryscoring peak came in only his third season of 1984-85 when he scored 19 for St. Helens. It must have been quite a season as he had a four-try blast against Warrington and grabbed the only other hattrick of his career.


Platt's senior career began as a substitute for St.Helens in

a 19-19 draw at Leigh on 22 August 1982. He was transfered to Wigan in 1988 for £140,000 and six years later joined New Zealand club Auckland Warriors. Widnes signed him for the 1996-96 Centenary season before he made a permanent return to Britain with Salford this year.

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IT'S THE COACH

Another week, another sacking.
Until Tuesday, Andy Goodway
was the longest-serving coach in
the Super League, where life
expectancy is now roughly
equivalent to that of the mayfly.
A month shy of three years at
Oldham

Bears, Goodway became the fifth Super League coach to part company with his club since the start of the season. In these turbulent times, the ranks of young and

talented English coaches are wearing thin. Goodway followed John Joyner at Castleford Tigers into coaching exile. Two men openly talked about as Great Britain coaches of the future, one of them, Joyner, coach of the year only three years ago, find themselves jobless, casualties of intolerance, short-termism, and the overwhelming desire that now exists in the Super League for instant success, or sheer desperation to survive among the elite.

Before the disappearances of Goodway and Joyner, Graeme West went from Wigan Warriors, Steve Simms departed Halifax Blue Sox and John Dorahy left Warrington Wolves. The merry-go-round is not peculiar to the Super League. Two months into the season and Swinton Lions, Workington Town and Featherstone Rovers, where Simms ended up this week, have all had a change of coaching personnel.

The balance of coaching power among the dozen Super League clubs has irresistibly shifted back the way of the southern hemisphere. Discounting Oldham (without a successor to Goodway up to print, but with Bob Lindner due back from Down Under as football director), Australians are in charge at seven Super League clubs. Ironically, it took an Australian to pinpoint the lack of tolerance in England. Before flying home this week, John Dorahy told the Rugby Leaguer newspaper:

"The system in England seems crazy. The coaching system in Rugby League seems to be very like it is in soccer, with a soccer type mentality. Coaches come and go very quickly. In Australia, you hardly ever see a coach leave a club during the season, unless it is for disciplinary reasons,"

THAT GETS IT!

As Dorahy left these shores, Stuart Raper rolled up this week at Castleford from Cronualla, pleading, of all things, for patience. Patience is one virtue not in abundance right now, as a succession of coaches can testify. The remaining Englishmen left in charge of Super League sides are Andy Gregory, at Salford Reds, who has succeeded Goodway as the longest-serving coach (he was appointed in March 1995), Phil Larder (sheffield Eagles), Eric Hughes (Wigan) and John Pendlebury (Halifax). In this age of hire-and-fire, you could get totally ridiculous. Should Gregory be allowed to stay at Salford, if they lose a third successive match, to Wigan on Friday? Can Darryl Van de Velde continue at Warrington after the dismal 60-16 hiding last week by St Helens? Might Eric Hughes survive a fourth Wigan League defeat? In short, enough heads have rolled. With the World Club Championship on the horizon, there has never been a greater need for stability and steady nerves.

The recent appointments of Raper by Castleford and Van de Velde by Warrington displayed the greater faith again being placed on the Australian coaching system. It is easy to

understand why. At St Helens and Bradford Bulls, Aussies Shaun McRae and Matthew Elliott - not even head men back in Australia - continue to set the standards over here. So where are all the young, up-and-coming English coaches? The National Coaching Scheme production line, once headed up

stifled.

What of Goodway? He might fulfill a long-held ambition to learn and prove himself in the hothouse atmosphere of the Australian game. If he does, and should he return, who knows, even Oldham might be glad to get him? One thing is certain. Since taking up the job last

month as the RFL's first technical director, Joe Lydon already has two fewer Englishmen, in Goodway and Joyner, to recommend as the Great British coach, should he

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GREAT BRITAIN COACH PHIL LARDER HAS TAKEN ON A NEW CHALLENGE THIS SEASON, SUCCEEDING GARY HETHERINGTON AS THE MAN IN CHARGE OF SHEFFIELD EAGLES. HE SPOKE TO SKY'S IAN PROCTOR ABOUT THE DIFFICULTIES HE HAS ENCOUNTERED.

PHIL, HAVE YOU SETTLED INTO LIFE AS HEAD COACH OF SHEFFIELD EAGLES?

I was never under any illusions about the scale of the job or the length of time it would take to have Sheffield Eagles playing the way I would like. I'd watched videos of their games from last season and knew that I'd have to change the squad. And, without much money to spend, the only way I could do that was by releasing players and generating the capital to make the signings I wanted. Leeds came in for Anthony Farrell, Dean Lawford and Ryan Sheridan and, while I was reluctant to release Ryan, it was adeal that had to be struck to allow me to sign Martin Wood and Nick Pinkney from Keighley. The only other way I could strengthen the squad was to recruit from the overseas market and we brought in Rod Doyle, Steve Edmed and Willie Morganson, plus Kiwi winger Whetu Taewa...

HOW CLOSE WERE YOU TO JOINING HUDDERSFIELD AND NOT SHEFFIELD AT THE END. OF LAST SEASON?

It was as close as could be, Ian. I

was due to meet the Giants chairman, Bob Scott, on the Saturday afternoon before departing on the Lions tour of the South Pacific and received the call from Gary Hetherington that morning, offering me the Eagles job. Bob Scott greatly impressed me with his plans and ambitions for Huddersfield and had they been in Super League I'd probably have accepted their offer. But, having been denied the opportunity to coach at this level whilst with Keighley, I simply had to take the Sheffield offer and I was delighted when John Kear agreed to come with me.

IS IT FAIR TO SAY THAT YOU AND JOHN KEAR STARTED BEHIND ALL THE OTHER CLUBS IN YOUR PRE-SEASON PREPARATION OF THE SHEFFIELD PLAYERS?

We were very much behind the other clubs and, while that was something that couldn't be helped, I hated that situation. Anyone who knows me will tell you that I'm methodical and like to do things exactly right. But we've been chasing our tails since the turn of the year and the Eagles players are probably encountering a more intense style of coaching than they have come across before. Gary Hetherington was wearing that many hats in his various roles at Sheffield that, with respect, he was unable to do proper justice to his coaching position, although he had a quality staff around him. John Kear and I have worked very hard on the fitness and preparation of the players and we've seen a gradual improvement in each of our opening five Super League performances. The Paris game (our opener) was embarrassing, but we've steadily progressed, and there is a great deal of improvement to come. It does take time to implement new coaching methods and shape a new team at a club as Brian Smith's arrival at Bradford, last year, illustrated that point. The Bulls made little

impression in the centenary season as Brian moulded a new-look side, but they hit their straps in Super League and the Bulls have kicked on since then. We're gradually getting the response we want from the playersand steadily adding to the squad.

NICK PINKNEY AND MARTIN WOOD HAVE MADE A BIG IMPRESSION AND YOU HAVE STEVE MCCURRIE TO COME. DID YOU HAVE COMPLETE CONFIDENCE IN THEIR ABILITY TO MAKE IT IN SUPER LEAGUE?

I had no doubts about either Martin or Nick, and Steve McCurrie will prove another quality signing for Sheffield - when we eventually see him and get him conditioned to the required standards. I'm not entirely happy about the fact that we won't get him at Sheffield until Bedford's season is over, but it's a one-off and we have to live with the situation. Nick Pinkney and Martin Wood are both top quality players and there are plenty more like them in Division One. Salford's impressive start in Super League has illustrated that there isn't such an enormous gulf between Super League and the top sides in the

First Division. I believe that my Keighley side of last year, Huddersfield and Hull would have held their own in this league.

WHAT HAVE YOU HAD TO WORK ON MOST WITH THE EAGLES PLAYERS ?

I changed last season's defensive pattern completely. We threw that out of the window and started from scratch because Sheffield were conceding far too many points in their games during 1996. But I took the job on the understanding that the Sheffield public would continue to see attractive, attacking football and I think we've provided that. But once our defence is properly sorted, they should see more winning football. The Castleford game was a case in point, with some wonderful tries. followed by an unaccountable late defensive lapse! Sheffield is a sports mad city and we've got to start attracting more people to the home games...a winning side is the way towards achieving that aim.


UNUSUALLY, YOU PUBLICLY CRITICISED YOUR PLAYERS AFTER THE NARROW DEFEAT AT HALIFAX - WAS THAT BECAUSE OF THE PRESSURES WHICH ARE NOW ON COACHES?

No. I just felt that the players lost the game at Thrum Hall because of dumb football, taking wrong options. They know that they should have won that game and I just felt I needed to reinforce the point. I'll always support players giving their all, but, sometimes, they've got to take responsibility for their actions. Regarding pressure, I can honestly say that it doesn't bother me, because, at 3pm (or whenever) on matchday, I know

-it's too easy to sack the poor coach! I was shocked when Graeme West left Wigan and it hurt me to see a good coach (and friend) like John Joyner leaving Castleford recently. And John Dorahy didn't become a bad coach overnight. Warrington looked a particularly wellcoached side when we defeated them on Good Friday, yet John got the bullet and the Wolves bounced back to defeat Wigan on Easter Monday. He must have been doing something right.

WHAT IS YOUR POSITION REGARDING THE GREAT BRITAIN COACHING POSITION?

Well, for the first time in history, the GB coaching position has been put on ice because there aren't any matches. But, of course, I'd like to be in charge of the side for the Ashes series against Australia in November. Any coach worth his salt wants to be in charge of the international team and, as the man in possession, I'd like to think I'll be in the frame. I haven't had time to talk to Joe Lydon, since his appointment as Technical Director, but that's probably because he's inherited a massive job and he'll have plenty on his





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

The failure of the team coach to turn up on time for the away trip to Hull was the start of a very disappointing visit to the Boulevard. When the coach eventually arrived at Union St at 5.30pm for an 8.00pm kick off in Hull it was the start of a frantic rush along the M62 without a stop and with players being strapped on the coach.

It wasn't ideal preparation, but we started well enough with an early try by CHRIS MCKINNEY goaled by PAUL DEACON putting us 6-0 up. From the restart however we gave away the first of a stream of penalties, which interspersed with the inability to go six tackles without making a mistake allowed Hull to go 14-6 in the lead. We then hit back with Danny Guest feeding Howard Hill deep in our own half. Hill went to the half way line before the ball went through 6 pairs of hands leading to CHRIS McKINNEY going under the posts for the best try of the game. At 14-12 down just before half time we had everything to play for.

In the second half the penalties and mistakes continued and when after 10 minutes I took David Stephenson off for

1st team duty we seemed to surrender. Quality players, who have the benefits of full time training must perform better than this. We played most of the second half with only 12 men as first Paul Norman, then Chris McKinney and Dale Aldred were sent to the sin bin and conceded 24 points with only a HOWARD HILL breakaway try converted by DEACON to show for our efforts before going down 42-18. On the positive side, Paul Norman came through his first game for over two months. David Stephenson is now pushing for a regular 1st team spot and Paul Crook did enough to convince Hull to make Jim Quinn an offer for his services. The move into 1st team rugby in the first division with Hull is good business for Paul and for the Oldham RLFC. It gives him an opportunity to prove his ability which he was unlikely to get at Oldham queueing behind Francis Maloney and Luke Goodwin, and also improves the cash flow situation at the club. 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
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
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

Bears fans must have been encouraged by the comments of Super League boss Maurice Lindsay after his first visit to Boundary Park for the Paris St Germain game.

For those who might have missed Maurice's words of wisdom, he said he was "very impressed" by the Boundary Park facilities, the match presentation and the general manner in which the Bears had staged a Super League game to go out on Sky.

Almost inevitably, he compared Boundary Park with dear old Watersheddings and left no-one in any doubt that he was right behind the Bears' decision to vacate the old ground up there on the hill, even though they had no permanent home to go to. "Nostalgia is all very well," said Maurice, "but you can't run a modern Super League club on it and you can't build for the future on it. People can come to Boundary Park knowing they will be comfortable and well looked after. That alone will encourage them to return." The Bears' current agreement with Oldham Athletic for the use of BP covers one season only and even if the proposed new stadium does finally get the go-ahead it won't be ready for 1998 and it will be pushing it to have it up and running for 1999. Councillor John Battye, leader of Oldham Council, took the opportunity to spell out to




Maurice that the proposed new stadium would be similar, but smaller, to the McAlpine Stadium at Huddersfield. It would be situated just across the road from BP and, as such, would enjoy similar benefits to those currently enjoyed by BP in relation to car parking and easy access to the M62 and beyond. "Vital," replied Maurice. "Absolutely vital. In an ideal world, cars heading for sports stadia would drive straight off the motorway network and into the car parks. That's what they are doing in the States and it's what we will have to do here." One up to Oldham because there can't be many sites in the enitre country, and certainly not in the North West, which match up to Boundary Park (or dare we say Westwood Park?) when it comes to easy access. We have since learned that Government approval or rejection of the planned new

Once the Election is over, the big debate locally will start all over again. It willbe fascinating to see how it all works out.


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
