Playing Bradford at Odsal is no easy task. Remember: they put more that 50 points against St. Helens and Wigan, so going there without Nick Pinkney, Keith Senior, Johnny Lawless, Paul Carr, Martin Wood and with Bright Sodje, Darren Turner, Dale Laughton and Matt Crowther also injured, we were always going to be up against it.

We realised that to get a result our tactics must be carefully though out and rigidly adhered to. we all agreed that ball security was the key, particularly since the Bulls have been involved in an energy-sapping fixture against Halifax the previous Wednesday.

Rugby Football League is unique in that the team is allowed to retain possession in the tackle up to and including the sixth play. Our major goal was therefore to reduce our handling errors to a minimum and to concentrate on playing out our set of six tackles.

Teams that are able to do this control possession, thereby forcing the opposition to defend and any player will tell you that it is far more energy sapping when attacking. We therefore attempted to drain the Bulls out of energy and then to hit them with a hard, fast, expansive exploding game in the last 15 minutes of each half.

These were the only tactics to use - we all agreed on that - and we all arrived at Odsal focussed.

Our ball control this season has been quite good: we always aim for a 75% success rate. Against Warrington and Castleford we were able to force the percentage into the mid 80's by making less than ten errors.

At Odsal the opposite happened and in our first set Jean Marc Garcia's forward to Whetu Taewa, on the second Mark Aston gave a forward pass to Paul Broadbent and then the mistakes spread throughout the team like a rash. We made 11 errors in the first half total of 18 possession periods and a staggering 14 errors in 22 in the second half.

Those 25 errors in 40 plays means that we simply committed suicide - a hard lesson to learn, one which I am sure has now sunk in.

Today I would like to welcome all the spectators, players and officials of Oldham RLFC. Oldham is my home town and during my playing career I played over 350 first team game for them. I still have a close affinity for the town and am always interested to hear how their team is progressing.

The recent dismissal of Andy Goodway was a big surprise: I worked with Andy during the 1995 World Cup and have a lot of respect for him. I do wish new coach Bob Linder the best of luck and we in the Eagles Nest are aware Oldham will go into this game committed and with all guns blazing.

Rugby à Treize

Whenever I visit France, one of my regular pleasures is the Monday edition of *L'Equipe*. How fortunate they are over the water to have a daily paper completely dedicated to sport: it is detailed, comprehensive and above all readable.

Monday provides all the results from the weekend, French ones in particular (naturally) but with all sorts of international bits and pieces. I had already seen Saturday's copy last week and scoured it for Super League news: after all, there is a 'French' team in the competition. The Rugby rubric is not hard to find, but it is all Union!

After much searching, I found it... on page eight! There are eight columns on the large pages of the paper and one quarter of a column featured a preview of the Paris St. Germain v. Saints game.

I checked and found that this was less coverage than received by Table Tennis, Weightlifting and Fencing! It warranted the same space as Water Polo and Modern Pentathlon! The full page of Union news (32 times more) included all the English, Welsh and Aussie fixtures as well as news of a possible transfer of French players to Wasps.

Still, I had Monday to look forward to... but if anything it was worse! Super League still merited one quarter column, but Union now had a full double page spread (a staggering 64 times more!). There was a brief, critical report of P.S.G.'s poor show against St. Helen's plus the other results: no scorers, no other details.

What does this say about the French Super League adventure? Rugby in France means Union. Union Rules O.K.!

Rugby à Trieze, Super League style is very marginalised - apparently even more so than the indigenous French competition. The column title does not refer to Super League and the term itself does not always get a mention. It might be argued that if L'Equipe is not interested, France is not interested. Perhaps Rupert should add the title to his media empire and jazz it up a bit...

On the other hand, there is considerable Rugby interest in the South West, several hundred miles from Paris (does that strike a chord?). International Union matches attract national attention. The average oval ball fan is probably more interested in the Aussies playing against fifteen of France than in the Aussie collection representing Super League in the capital. *Pourquoi pas?*

Paris is the obvious, logical flagship if there is to be just one presence across the channel. However, this is unlikely to tempt the Union fans in the South West to try a different dish. Of course they might be resistant to the superior code as the Twickers fraternity, but then again they might not.

One more French team based in more traditional territory might provide an extra spark. At least that would provide two 'local derbies' each season. Rather like London playing Aberdeen!

It must be worth considering, especially as the seasonal change could open ground sharing posibilties along Stoop lines in Brive, Dax or Toulouse? At the moment, the gamble is not really paying off and it would be sad if 13 in *Rugby à Trieze* became an unlucky one.





Eagles piled on the pressure and the hard running Paul Carr off-loaded to Anthony Farrell in the tackle for a well-worked try goaled by Aston.

The Tigers stormed back and after good work by Crooks and Sampson, Botica popped up a pass to Chris Smith who evaded Sovatabua to score.

The Don Valley referee's kinx struck again during the break with Mr Cummings failing to appear, and Sheffield carried on in fine style. A fine Sovatabua break went unrewarded when Carr's final pass was

mishandled by Garcia with the line at his mercy and - a few minutes later - Andy Hay was held inches short.

It was Castleford who were next to score, however, Schick putting Gay through a gap, then taking the return pass to score. Rocky Turner was introduced and caused some confusion as he shared the acting half-back duties with Lawless.

It was Turner who regained the lead for the Eagles when he scampered over from ten yards out, showing impressive strength to bump off Tuuta.

The Eagles were now firmly in control and made the game safe when Keith Senior walked in at the corner after Aston's deflected chip had been gathered by Garcia.

The Eagles' Greatest Player..?

Driving home after our recent visit to the Theatre of Dreams (or was it Odsal?) was a gloomy affair. After witnessing a comprehensive second-half thumping from a Bull's side which rarely got into top gear and seeing two more Eagles players carried from the field, there was not a lot to sing about.

After maybe 20 minutes in a desperate attempt to improve the atmosphere, my partner asked: "Which player would you most like to have seen in an Eagles shirt, then?"

"Past or present?," I enquired, a little caught by surprise. "It doesn't matter. It's only hypothetical," she replied.

I began to think about some of the great Eagles players we've seen since first watching the team nine years ago. Daryl Powell, Lee Jackson, Jeff Hardy, Francis Leota, Tawere Nickau, Sam Panapa, Ian Russell, Garry Jack, Bruce McGuire and Mick Cook. My selection would have to better these players: it would be a tall order.

I thought of some of the older legends I'd read about: Gus Risman, Billy Boston and Tom Van Vollenhoven. Experts say Alex Murphy would have been a top-liner in any era, but without ever seeing these players in action it would be difficult to consider them.

Finally I tried to recall as many of the top players as possible from nearly a decade of observing the game. Wallly Lewis and Peter Stirling came to mind, so too did Mal Meninga, Shaun Edwards, Adny Gregory, Gary Schofield and Jonathan Davies. Imagine the likes of Bradley Clyde or Dean Bell in an Eagles' shirt! Henry and Robbie Paul, Bobbie Goulding and Viaga Tuigamala (until he returned to his Union roots) would all figure.

In the end I think I selected a player that would eclipse even these great names - Ellery Hanley.

I knew of Ellery Hanley long before I began watching Rugby League. His reputation as a phenomenal athlete travelled well. Often referred to as the best of his generation, Hanley is one of only a handful of competitors who could be described as complete Rugby League players.

At his peak, his power was awesome: great speed and strength coupled with agility and fine balance made breaking tackles look effortless,

whilst his hand-off was a vritual art-form.

The famous sidestep wrought havoc

in the strongest of defences. Defensively his credentials were equally good: a thirst for tackling regularly put him at the top end of the tackle-count. One of his trademarks was an ability to complete a number of tackles in quick succession. His strength allowed him to tackle the games' more awkward customers. Hanley also seemed to possess a knack of making big tackles at critical stages in a game.

Ellery Hanley knew the value of sports psychology: he proved to be as mentally tough as he was physically. By the time he led his team out onto the field, his face relaxed but ultra-confident, many opponents were already defeated. During a game he showed little emotion, the opposition never knew if he was in pain or carrying an injury.

His influence on the other team members was very important both on and off the pitch. It was seen at Wigan - the stage of his greatest triumphs - but was even more evident when he moved to Leeds.

The whole team seemed to draw strength and confidence from his presence: a number of ordinary players seemed to play well above themselves during his stay at the club.

Yes, my choice would have to be Ellery Hanley for the Eagles' number 13 shirt. At his peak, Hanley was feared by the Australians more than any other player. That would have been the time to have him at Sheffield. Small crowds at Don Valley could have been a thing of the past: although the Sheffield public did not know much about Rugby League, many of them knew Ellery Hanley.

He is the sort of player the Eagles need right now: an inspirational leader, a confident, influential character who has seen it all and done it all many, many times over at the highest level.

My partner's choice? Well, she went for Dean Bell. Again, an interesting selection but that (as they say) is another story...



COMMENTARY

A WAY FORWARD

The importance of international competition has not been lost within Rugby League and that is why we are keen to maintain a level of competition below that of full Super League Test status.

Over the last two years the standard of rugby produced in the Super League has improved dramatically and that ensured that some of the developing nations as well as the lesser equipped such as France would have little to look forward to but a series of severe beatings if they entered that arena.

This would neither aid the game in such countries nor allow recent recruits to the international scene such as Ireland or Scotland any incentive to grow and develop.

The Emerging Nations World Cup in 1995 proved that there is a need and desire for such competition and, if the game is to reach its full potential in Europe, then we have to nurture the delicate state of French Rugby League.

If you then add the need for Academy Under 19 International Rugby into the equation, it becomes even more important to have Non-Test Internationals because it is through that route that the sport eventually hopes to bring Wales back into the fold...(although this time on a more lasting basis) as well as ensuring that other developing nations can enjoy worthwhile competition at the appropriate level.

There is only one way to find out if a player, or coach for that matter, can survive the transition from the comfortable and familiar cocoon of club rugby into the demanding world of the representative game, and that is to test him at a higher level.

Also if a potential player in a developing nation has the goal to represent and be capped for his country it may well swing his decision to take up, or stay with the game of Rugby

For anyone who thought that there were people within the League who didn't care about the international game, take it from me you couldn't be more wrong. I do however concede that we will still have a long way to go to overcome the somewhat selfish attitudes of many who believe the way forward is with quantity instead of quality. No matter how high we aim or how confident we are in the abilities of our players and coaches, our international sides will never develop or compete at

international sides will never develop or compete at the highest level if they aren't given the time and support to prepare.
