






A Message FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The fact that we are kicking off in the evening on this Bank Holiday Monday is due merely to the fact that a substantial number of our supporters wrote to let us know they were working during the day.

It is impossible to please everyone all the time, but we did recognise that the Bank Holiday was not held by everyone

in town and we took the view that if we kicked off in the daytime a vast majority of our supporters would be unable to attend. This is important not merely from the financial point of view but because crowd-attendance figures are always closely scrutinised by Super League officials, who will eventually start to ask questions of clubs which cannot pull in good support.

They will argue that if the support is not there a club will be unable to generate the funds to support a Super League outfit.

I would like to urge you, therefore, to try and make a special effort to attend our next home game against Castleford Tigers here at Boundary Park on Friday. Not only will this be a typical "four pointer" in our efforts to move up the Super League table, but it will be our last home match for a month and our last game before we set off for Australia and our history-making World Club Championship games. If you are a regular attender I am sure you will have enjoyed our last two home games against Halifax Blue Sox and Leeds Rhinos, while those who travelled to Sheffield Eagles were rewarded with a win and an excellent display of attacking rugby in the first half.

I must say the fans are providing the team with more vocal support these days than at any time in my years as chairman of the club.

The players got a standing ovation at the Don Valley Stadium and a similar display of support at the end of the Leeds game here at Boundary Park and I can tell you that the players appreciate it more than you will ever know.

This was particularly evident at Sheffield where the players remarked afterwards that they felt they had more support than the home side, such was the extent of the vocal backing from the Bears fans who had made the trip to south Yorkshire.

We are now involved in the busiest part of the season. Having played at Bradford on Friday, we meet Castleford next Friday in our third game in eight days - and then we are off to Australia for our games against North Queensland Cowboys and Adelaide Rams.

It will be tough, but we are still in this together, fans, players, coaches and directors. If we all pull together for the good of the club I'm sure we will come through with flying colours.

Salford must be highly delighted with the early impact they have made on Super League after winning promotion from the first division.




On this their first visit to Boundary Park, we welcome the men from the Willows as we seek to avenge our defeat on their ground earlier in the season.

DOWN MEMORY LANE

Salford's winning start to the Super League season, coming after back to back First Division successes, left many knowledgeable critics wondering whether the Red Devils could repeat the successes of their golden era between 1933 and 1939. During those years Salford won the Lancashire Championship twice, the Lancashire Cup three times, the Challenge Cup once and the League Championship on three occasions. Under the guidance of coach Lance Todd, Salford certainly ruled the roost and they did so by playing a brand of attractive, attacking rugby which had fans flocking to the Willows. During the 1938-39 season Salford lost just seven league matches as they ended their league campaign on top of the table. Under the old 'top four' Championship play-off, they were then called upon to entertain Huddersfield in the semi-final. The Part owners had enjoyed a tremendous finish to their league programme, losing just one of their closing 18 matches. That defeat was at home to Castleford 19-0. However, Huddersfield were no match for Salford who won through to the final 15-0. The same afternoon Castleford reached the final with a 21-4 home win over Halifax. Seven days later Halifax and Salford met at Wembley where Halifax lifted the Challenge Cup with a clear cut 20-3 victory. Earlier in the season Salford had lost against Wigan in the Lancashire Cup Final. Would the Championship Final bring a heart breaking hatrick of cup final defeats for the Red Devils? A crowd of 69,504 - at the time a World record - turned up at Maine Road, Manchester to watch the

following two teams do battle; Castleford: George Lewis; Bernard Cunniffe, Jim Robinson, Jim Croston, Reg Lloyd; Tommy Hardy, Les Adams; Bill Stead, Harold Haley, Tommy Taylor; John Horan, Ted Sadler & Fred Brindle. Salford: Sammy Miller; Barney Hudson, Albert Gear, Gus Risman, Alan Edwards; Tom Kenny, Billy Watkins; Dai Davies, Bert Day, Joe Bradbury, Paddy Dalton, Harold Thomas & Jack Feetham. Although Salford began the match as slight favourites, doubts were cast about their confidence following the previous week's Wembley defeat. Those doubts grew when Les Adams set up a try for experienced loose-forward Fred Brindle. Shortly afterwards Salford equalised when Billy Watkins put half-back partner Tom Kenny over but Jim Robinson then restored the Castleford lead with another touchdown. A penalty from Gus Risman completed the first half scoring, Castleford turning round 6-5 in front. The second half provided plenty of excitement but both sides defended magnificently and it looked as if Castleford would hang on for their first ever Championship success. However, that was not to be. With just eight

minutes remaining a kick from Albert Gear was gathered by Alan Edwards and he was over wide out. Risman's conversion attempt failed but Salford led 8-6 and they held out during those tense, closing few minutes to clinch their third title in seven years. It had been a momentous confrontation but one which Salford just about deserved to win. The following September an even bigger confrontation disrupted, not only Salford's winning run, but the lives of millions of people. It would be 35 years before Salford once again won the title. Now, twenty-one years after their last Championship, Reds' supporters reckon that the time is ripe for further Salford success.

PREVIOUS ENGAGEMENTS

Although this afternoon Salford will be paying their first visit to Boundary Park, they have met Oldham on 91 occasions at Watersheddings, their first ever visit to Oldham coming in December 1896 when they lost 11-3. In fact, Salford lost on their five visits to Oldham before securing a 0-0 draw in January 1902 and then winning here 2-0 the following season. Those 91 visits to Oldham have resulted in 56 victories for Oldham, 26 Salford successes and nine draws. Salford's biggest victory at Watersheddings came in April 1977 when they beat Oldham 37-8 with winger Keith Fielding crossing for four tries. On two occasions Salford have lost at Oldham by a margin of 37 points. In November 1960 they lost a league match 37-0 and in

March 1991 were knocked out of the Challenge Cup 40-3. Salford's biggest victory over Oldham at the Willows came in March 1933 when they won 44-0. Surprisingly, the two sides had drawn 3-3 at Watersheddings just seven days previously. Oldham's best win at Salford was a 50-4 victory in November 1962 when full-back Geoff Sims, later to join Salford, scored a try and ten goals. Altogether these clubs have met on 187 previous occasions, Oldham winning 97 times, Salford 76 times and 14 matches have been drawn. During season 1953-54 both league matches between these clubs were drawn, 2-2 at Watersheddings and 11-11 at the Willows.



AUSTRALIAN SUPER LEAGUE ROUND UP

From Dave Hadfield, the Independent's Rugby League Correspondent

For anybody who missed it – and full marks to Sky for giving so many of us the chance to see it – the news is that the passion and intensity is back in big-time Australian football.

The deciding match of the first Tri-Series competition was a classic – at least the equal of anything that State of Origin has produced over the last 15 years – with New South Wales finally winning 23-22 in the third period of extra time.

It was not just one of the best matches between the states; at 105 minutes it was easily the longest and hardly a minute of it was dull.

NSW led early through a try – the first of his three – from former Australian full-back Brett Mullins, playing on the wing to

great effect. Tonie Carroll and Steve Renouf put the home side ahead at Brisbane's ANZ Stadium, but Mullins restored the Blues lead after half time. That second half was a breathless, fluctuating affair, with the lead changing hands three times before Matt Ryan's try gave NSW a 22-16 lead. But when Queensland's hugely experienced winger Michael Hancock went over with 10 minutes to go, the match went into two additional ten minute periods of extra time – much to the surprise of the commentators and some players, who believed it would be decided on a toss of a coin or

awarded to NSW because they had beaten

Queensland in a previous match.

Either of those courses of action, would have denied a 35,507 crowd –

considered a touch disappointing – one of the most compelling spectacles that the game has

produced for ages.

With players literally dropping from exhaustion, both sides tried to manoeuvre for the winning score, with Queensland going the closest during the initial 20 minutes of overtime.


Their failure to get the breakthrough took the match into sudden death, and both teams missed with field goals before the Hunter Mariners' Noel Goldthorpe – drafted in at scrum half in place of the injured Ricky Stuart – lined up his drop kick and sent it spiralling just inside the right hand upright. One of the epic struggles in the long confrontation between the two states was over.


The information for British consumption, with the World Club Championships getting closer by the day, was that the ferocious competitiveness that has sometimes seemed to be lacking at club level this season can be summoned up when representative football comes round.

It will also be noted that players like Brisbane's Renouf and Canberra's Mullins – both struggling for form and fitness at times this season – are back to their potent best. There is an obvious warning there for British clubs.

In the only club match played last weekend, Penrith's decline continued when they were beaten 30-6 by the Hunter Mariners, for whom young centre Craig Wise scored a hat-trick in only his second game.

Brisbane's Steve Renouf – back to his potent best after struggling with form and fitness this season





Furry animals and fireworks, notwithstanding, nothing beats success for attracting people in numbers. What we have seen is a demographic shift of the basic 50,000-75,000 active support, and not a revolutionary upsurge in actual numbers. Now for the positive spin, no matter that this revolves almost entirely around the Bulls. Remarkably, they have also disproved some of the

above theory by their popular appeal. Thrum Hall, hidebound by a ground limit of 7500, could have been sold out more than twice for Tuesday's visit by Bradford. Next Friday night Castleford visit Boundary Park for a crucial Super League match which should attract the attention of most local rugby enthusiasts. However, more than a few Oldham followers will be watching an amateur match eighty miles away over on Humberside. The reason for that is the inclusion of Higginshaw loose-forward Peter Ferris in the BARLA Great Britain open age squad for their match against France 'B' at the Boulevard, Hull. Ferris is one of only five Lancashire representatives in the squad which includes nine players from the Humberside area.

This annual encounter usually provides BARLA with a stern test against a France side which invariably includes players with full test experience. Last season BARLA gave an excellent account of themselves in the heat of Toulouse before eventually losing 30-6.

Saddleworth's Emmerson Jackman and Chris Wright from St Annes played that evening so it is hoped that Ferris continues the Oldham representation. It has been a satisfactory season for our two National Conference League sides, St Annes and Saddleworth Rangers, although I suspect that the coaching staff at both clubs will disagree. Saddleworth ended the season in 12th position, or fourth from bottom if you wish to be cruel. Nevertheless, I consider it satisfactory considering the intensity of competition in the Conference and the fact that Rangers are steadily rebuilding a squad which broke up after dominating the amateur game during the early to middle 1990's. Rangers won the Standard Cup for a record time last Easter and will be hoping for a better season nationally next year when several of their young players will have matured. It has been an unbelievable season for St

Annes who end the campaign in fifth spot. Two of the big clubs above them, Woolston Rovers and Wigan St Patricks, were beaten both home and away. A remarkable achievement for a club who were enjoying their first season in the Premier Division. It is no exaggeration to state that, with a little more consistency, Saints would have won the title. The club also suffered a major blow when they lost their clubhouse at Christmas when it was burned down. Work to rebuild the club is now well underway and it is hoped that by mid August the club will be up and running. Before next season, Saints will have to find a new coach duo. Last season's coaches, Mark Lord and Mick Swift, have stepped down after five very successful years. We wish them well in the future and hope that if they do get fixed up with other clubs, they are with clubs in the area.







At 9.00pm on a Sunday evening Bradford Bulls' James Lowes and St Helens' Tommy Martyn, bruised and battered, dragged their weary bodies in the direction of the dressing rooms after an awesome clash between the games two leading teams. Lindsay, and his international partners must be to stimulate international competition and lay down a structure for it, at least for the next five years. If Rugby Union, Soccer and Cricket can plan ahead then why not Rugby League?


Without genuine international competition no sport today, with the exception of soccer, will be able to command the attention of the national media. And without full blooded competition between nations, League, exciting and spectacular as it is, will never command attention worldwide.

Over the past eighteen months we have seen an Oceania Cup tournament, designed to help boost Pacific Island nations, collapse through sheer incompetence on the part of the organisers. We have seen British Lions tourists brought home from a tour of New Zealand in an attempt to save funds while now, grant aid is cut off from Morocco, one of the emerging League nations.

Wales, European champions just two years ago, no longer exist and the World Cup deeds of Iestyn Harris, Jonathan Davies, Scott Gibbs, Kieron Cunningham and Co. are but a distant memory to supporters of the 13-a-side code in the

NEWLOVE ENTERS TOP TEN LEAGUE LIST



Paul Newlove has broken into the top ten list of all-time major league tryscorers. The St Helens centre's total of 130 tries in Stone Super League and the old Division One matches moves him into 10th place to the exclusion of Des Drummond. But Newlove has a long way to go to catch Ellery Hanley's top total of 279 with Bradford, Wigan and Leeds between 1978 and 1995.

This is Newlove's ninth campaign in the top division, having played the 1992-93 season in the old Division Two with Featherstone Rovers. But he totalled 48 major league tries with Featherstone, before adding 52 with Bradford and 35 since joining Saints during the 1995-96 Centenary Championship.

The Great Britain Test star headed the first Super League try chart with 28 last year after failing to touch down in only two of the 20 matches in which he played.



COMMENTARY

A WAY FORWARD

The importance of international competition has not been lost within Rugby League and that is why we are keen to maintain a level of competition below that of full Super League Test status.

Over the last two years the standard of rugby produced in the Super League has improved dramatically and that ensured that some of the developing nations as well as the lesser equipped such as France would have little to look forward to but a series of severe beatings if they entered that arena.

This would neither aid the game in such countries nor allow recent recruits to the international scene such as Ireland or Scotland any incentive to grow and develop.

The Emerging Nations World Cup in 1995 proved that there is a need and desire for such competition and, if the game is to reach its full potential in Europe, then we have to nurture the delicate state of French Rugby League.


If you then add the need for Academy Under 19 International Rugby into the equation, it becomes even more important

to have Non-Test Internationals because it is through that route that the sport eventually hopes to bring Wales back into the fold... (although this time on a more lasting basis) as well as ensuring that other developing nations can enjoy worthwhile competition at the appropriate level.

There is only one way to find out if a player, or coach for that matter, can survive the transition from the comfortable and familiar cocoon of club rugby into the demanding world of the representative game, and that is to test him at a higher level.

Also if a potential player in a developing nation has the goal to represent and be capped for his country it may well swing his decision to take up, or stay with the game of Rugby League.

For anyone who thought that there were people within the League who didn't care about the international game, take it from me you couldn't be more wrong. I do however concede that we will still have a long way to go to overcome the somewhat selfish attitudes of many who believe the way forward is with quantity instead of quality. No matter how high we aim or how confident we are in the abilities of our players and coaches, our international sides will never develop or compete at the highest level if they aren't given the time and support to prepare.
