
A Message FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Super League season and for the home matches against the Aussie clubs in the second phase of the World Club Championship.


They will certainly be envious, on their travels, of the facilities available to leading sportsmen in Australia which are far superior to anything available in the UK.



DOWN MEMORY LANE

onight's visitors to Boundary park are Castleford, a club who, surprisingly, have never won the League Championship but whose cup pedigree stands comparison with any club in the game. They have won the Yorkshire Cup five times, the Regal Trophy twice, the Floodlit Trophy a record four times and the Wembley Challenge Cup on four occasions. Their first Wembley triumph came in 1935 after just nine years of professional rugby. Their route to Wembley that year began with an away tie against the amateurs of Astley & Tyldesley. That tie was switched to Castleford and, although the amateurs no doubt enjoyed the financial benefit, they conceded nine tries when losing 33-4. A hard fought 8-2 win at Liverpool Stanley earned Castleford a home quarter-final tie with Hunslet which drew a record crowd of 25,499 to Wheldon Road. Catleford won that tie 10-3 and they then beat Barrow 11-5 in the semifinal at Station Road, Swinton. Huddersfield provided the opposition at Wembley with Castleford slight favourites, but it was expected to be a close affair. Both sides had registered home victories over their opponents during the league campaign. Castleford won 12-9 before losing 5-3 at Huddersfield. In addition Castleford had knocked Huddersfield out of the Yorkshire Cup but only by the narrowest of margins. After a 6-6 draw at Fartown, Castleford won the replay 3-2. The teams for the final were as follows: Castleford: George Lewis, Bernard Cunniffe, Arthur Atkinson, Jim Croston, Tommy Askin; Billy Davies, Les Adams: Pat McManus, Harold Haley, Tommy Taylor, Iim Crossley, Frank Smith & Ted Sadler. Huddersfield: Tom Scourfield, Stan Mountain, Idris Towill, Alex Fiddes, Ray Markham, Gwyn Richards, Dai

Davies, Reg Roberts, Willie Watson, Herbert Sherwood, Henry Tiffany, John Fuller and Fred Talbot. Castleford's young team began well in that final. The wide open spaces of Wembley held no fears for the club from the tiny Wheldon Road enclosure. Indeed, Castleford should have been in double figures before Huddersfield shocked the 39,000 crowd by scoring completely against the run of play when Idris Towill was on the end of a sweeping passing move. The score failed to rattle Castleford who continued to press, and continued to miss scoring opportunities. However, on the halfhour they took a lead which they were never to lose. First skipper Arthur Atkinson landed a penalty and within a couple of minutes co-centre Jim Croston put his winger Tommy Askin over.

Castleford's 5-3 interval lead increased to what proved to be an unassailable 11-3 margin after only 10 minutes of the second half. First scrum-half Les Adams seized upon a Huddersfield mistake to score and then another bout of free flowing open rugby saw Bernard Cunniffe cross wide out. Huddersfield hit back and put Castleford under severe pressure but all they had to show for it was a penalty from Herbert Sherwood. Two minutes from time a rare Castleford blunder enabled Huddersfield skipper Alex Fiddes to score a try which gave the Fartowners hope at II-8. That score came much too late to worry a competent Castleford side who had little trouble playing out those closing moments and defending their II-8 lead.

Following that cup triumph,
Castleford became the first British
club to involve themselves in
European competition when they met
Lyons-Villeurbanne for an unofficial
European Cup Winners Cup.
Castleford beat the French cup
holders 24-21 away and then by 18-8
at Wheldon Road. After today
Castleford will begin preparations for
their World Challenge in which both
Hunter Mariners and Perth Western
Reds will discover what difficult
opponents the Tigers are in cup
competition.



his evening Castleford will be making their second appearance here at Boundary Park because in February 1985 a first round Challenge Cup-tie was switched here because Watersheddings was frost bound. The match attracted a crowd of 6,056 but most left disappointed as Castleford won the tie 14-8. That was one of 33 defeats suffered by Oldham at the hands of Castleford in the 57 matches between these clubs. Oldham have won 22 with two drawn.

Oldham's biggest victory over Castleford came in October 1985 when they won 46-22 at

Watersheddings whilst their biggest win at Wheldon Road came in January 1942 when winger Lees crossed for a hat-trick of tries in Oldham's 31-16 victory. Castleford's biggest victories over Oldham came in January 1986 when the Tigers won 28-4 at Castleford and in March 1987 when they won 29-6 at Watersheddings.

Castleford have lost only once from their last five visits to Oldham so it is to be hoped that the Bears alter that trend in this evening's match which is vitally important in the long term future of both clubs.





ON THIS DAY...

t was on this day in 1984, Wednesday 30th May, that Great Britain met North Sydney during their tour of Australia. The Lions won 14-8 before a crowd of 4,067. Castleford hooker Kevin Beardmore appeared in that match alongside three Oldham players, winger Des Foy, secondrow forward Andy Goodway and substitute Mick Worrall. Goodway scored one of Britain's two tries, with Des Drummond grabbing the other and Mick Burke landing three goals. Six years later, on Wednesday 30th May 1990, Olympic Park, Melbourne staged the second 'State of Origin' match of that season. New South Wales clinched the series with a 12-6 victory before a sell out crowd of 25.800. At loose-forward for Oueensland in that match was Oldham's current coach Bob Lindner who made 25 appearances in that competition. On that very same day, Wednesday 30th May 1990, Wigan signed utility back Frano Botica from New

Zealand rugby union. Frano enjoyed five highly successful seasons at Central Park. He made 179 appearances and scored 66 tries, 827 goals and 13 dropped goals. Botica then moved to Castleford in March 1996 but is now back playing rugby union. Another prolific goal kicker, Australian Mick Cronin, enjoyed a successful afternoon on Sunday, 30th May 1982. That day he landed a club record II goals for Parramatta and also crossed for a try as Illawarra were hammered 55-5 at Belmore Sports Ground. Back in England on that day, Sunday 30th May 1982, Lancashire met Cumbria in a County Championship match at Derwent Park, Workington. The match was only of academic interest as Yorkshire had already beaten both counties to lift the title which probably accounted for the disappointing attendance of only 732. Lancashire won 46-8 after a close first half, at the end of which they led by only

10-8. Oldham had a player appearing for each country. Hooker Alan McCurrie for Cumbria and loose-forward Terry Flanagan for Lancashire. It was on this day way back in 1908, Saturday 30th May, that Australia met New Zealand at the Exhibition Ground. Brisbane. The New Zealand 'All Golds' were returning from their tour of England and proved too good for the Kangaroos. They won this test 24-12 to wrap up the three match series having already won in Sydney three weeks preivously. It was on this day in 1963, Thursday 30th May, that Oldham met St. Helens at Watersheddings in a First Division match. That 1962-63 season had been extended because of the harsh winter and Saints were playing their third match in six days. Despite that, they were too strong for Oldham and won 24-9 to clinch the Championship runners-up spot. Not such a successful season for Oldham who were relegated.

The Luke Goodwin show gave Leeds the fright of their lives in another Boundary Park thriller. And it's no coincidence that the Bears are playing some of their best rugby for years since the Aussie half-back was found a niche at loose-forward by new boss Bob Lindner.

The Rhinos won 43-26, but the score did scant justice to an Oldham side which went 28-4 down and pulled back in glorious fashion to 28-26 in a thrill-a-minute second-half.

Ten minutes from the end it was anybody's game after the Bears had rammed 22 unanswered points down Rhinos throats.

But Goodwin, who had kicked immaculately up to that point, missed a conversion attempt from just wide of the posts and Leeds were visibly lifted as they regrouped to run away with the game in the last few minutes. Even so, the Bears players were given a standing ovation as they left the field, such was the impact they made in the second half when Goodwin led



a comeback charge that was full of fire, determination and, most of all, quality football.

First he capitalised on great work by Darren Abram, Paul Atcheson and Matt Munro to crash over near the posts.

Then he spotted a weak link in the Leeds defence on the short side to chip ahead, re-gather at speed and score in the corner before hammering home a superb goal off the touchline to reduce the Leeds lead to 28-22.

Still not finished, he produced a pass across the face of the Leeds goal that went with all the speed and accuracy of a missile to drop into the hands of David Stephenson, whose quick transfer gave Martin Crompton a walk-in for the fifth Bears try. Despite missing the goal, the Aussie was a landslide man-of-the-match winner, proving conclusively that Oldham have unearthed a little gem who can play a major role in what will surely be a steady climb away from the relegation danger zone. Not one of the 4,500 fans who watched this game at Boundary Park would have believed that Leeds had reached the dizzy heights of second place while the Bears were struggling at the wrong end of the of the table.
