DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO A MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR

So far in their history, Oldham have staged home matches at Watersheddings, Boundary Park, Maine Road and the Willows, Salford. This afternoon the Roughyeds break new ground with a home first team game here at Ewen Field.

Today's visitors, Sheffield Eagles, have, during their 14 year history, staged home matches at no fewer than twelve venues.

They began life at Owlerton Stadium, better known for greyhound, speedway and stock car racing, but now play out of the Don Valley Stadium which is superbly appointed for athletic events. In between times the Eagles have entertained at the Halifax. Wakefield Trinity, Doncaster and Leeds rugby league ground, the Rotherham United, Sheffield Wednesday, Sheffield United, **Chesterfield and Barnsley soccer** grounds and last June they even staged a home game at the Cardiff rugby union ground some 179 miles from the City of Sheffield. When Sheffield were promoted in 1989, it was apparent that Owlerton would not be able to cope with the increased attendances that the First Division would bring. The biggest attendance for a Sheffield home game during their opening five seasons came in February 1989 when a crowd of 3,636 saw Oldham beat the Eagles 32-20 in a Silk Cut Challenge Cup-Tie. Eagles' opening match in the First Division was a home game against St. Helens which was switched to Hillsborough and attracted a new record crowd of 6,200. Sheffield then faced five away matches before meeting League **Champions Widnes in early** October. The Eagles had made an excellent start to the campaign with four wins in their opening six matches including excellent away league wins at Featherstone and Wakefield. Widnes had made an even better start to the season. By

the time the Chemics travelled over the Pennines to Sheffield they had played seven matches and won the lot. Included in those victories were a 27-22 victory over Wigan in the Charity Shield and a memorable 30-18 success over Canberra in the World Club Challenge, Not surprisingly, the Widnes game created tremendous interest in South Yorkshire and so the Eagles arranged for the match to be played at Bramall Lane, home of Sheffield United. It proved a smart move by the Eagles' management for the match attracted the biggest crowd to watch a Sheffield home match -8,636.

Substitutes, Barry Dowd & Paul Moriarty. Naturally Widnes were favourites to win but every half decent rugby league team rises to a challenge and the Eagles that afternoon certainly

rose to the occasion. Superbly led by Mark Aston, Sheffield were magnificent in the first half. During that opening 40 minutes each side scored a try. Phil McKenzie for the Chemics and Jeff Hardy for the Eagles. Two goals by Mark Aston were the difference between the teams as Sheffield turned round 8-4 in front. If the Eagles were superb in the first half, they were out of this World after the break when Bruce McGuire, Nick Grimoldby, Jeff Hardy again, and Sonny Nickle crossed for tries. Mark Aston landed another three goals and a dropped goal whilst the rock solid Eagles' defence restricted Widnes to a solitary penalty from Jonathan Davies. The final score was 31-6 to the Eagles, a remarkable scoreline after what must go down as the best ever Eagles' performance.

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
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STATISTICALLY SPEAKING

his afternoon's historic match against Sheffield Eagles is the 20th meeting between these two clubs. Oldham have won ten of the previous 19 games, Sheffield eight with one match drawn. Oldham's biggest victories over the Eagles came during the 1987-88 season when the Roughyeds won 44-20 at Watersheddings in October and then by 28-15 when the teams met in Sheffield the following March.

Sheffield's biggest wins occurred in January 1992 when Daryll

Powell scored three tries as the Eagles won 44-18 at Watersheddings and then in November 1995 Oldham lost 36-18 at the Don Valley Stadium. Oldham will be aiming to complete their first league double of the season this afternoon after winning at Sheffield in May. Should they be successful, it will be only their second such success since the Super League revolution 15 months ago.

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AUSTRALIAN SUPER LEAGUE ROUND UP

uropeans, still licking their wounds from the first batch of games in the World Club Championship,

will look at this weekends resumed Australasian Super League programme in a whole new light.

Players who were just names a few weeks ago are now familiar figures to British audiences and their doings in the competition down under will have all the more significance.

Take Cronulla, for instance. Of all the sides that came to Britain for the first phase, they were the ones who caught the public imagination, with the pace and skills of players like David Peachey, Mat Rogers, Russell Richardson and Paul Green proving a constant delight.

Their coach, John Lang, said that they were going home a more confident and complete team than they were when they arrived, but they have a searching test first-up against Brisbane Broncos, who showed in their victories over London, Wigan and Halifax that they deserve to be the favourites, not just for Super League but for the World Club Championship as well.

Two other sides who thoroughly enjoyed their visit to England meet this weekend when Auckland go to Penrith. Their three weekends over here proved the perfect rehabilitation exercise for Auckland, who came off a long losing streak to win all three matches here in some style. The question now is whether they can take that revitalised form back to the southern hemisphere with them. Or will it be the case, as Penrith's coach Royce Simmons, puts it, that, "We need the points more than them. We need them to make

the play-offs, whilst their chance has gone?"

The worst home-coming must have been that of Perth Reds, mortally embarrassed by losses to Sheffield and Paris and their credibility perhaps fatally dented as a result. The Reds had to prove that Super league - or, as now seems increasingly certain, a merged competition next season - needs a team in Western Australia.

Instead, they have managed to make themselves look highly dispensable and they must start recouping some pride at Adelaide this weekend. The Hunter Mariners looked an

impressive, progressive type of side over here, where they beat Paris, Castleford and Sheffield. With all due respect to that calibre of opposition, they are having to step up just a notch or two this week against the Canberra Raiders - and that's after the long flight home. North Queensland, victorious at home over Leeds, Oldham and Salford, entertain Canterbury, who blotted their record by losing to Wigan. The question there, as here, is who will adapt back to domestic

Caught Ball watching!

When former Australian cricket captain Richie Benaud, during his T.V. match commentary from Headingley, reminds the viewers that Darren Gough or Robert Croft is bowling from the Football Stand End the B.B.C. are invariably inundated with calls from irate League devotees. Our friend from the Antipodes is taken to task. mistakenly, by the viewers for not referring to the pride of Headingley as the Rugby League Stand. But the angry letters and Benaud's observations only highlight the many differences between the two countries in the vocabulary surrounding Rugby League. For Rugby League in Australia is Football, while **Rugby refers to Rugby Union** only. Yes, fans standing close to the trainers bench or sitting next to any visitors from Down Under during the first leg of the World **Club Championships have** been forced to review their terminology and brush up on their dictionaries as before casting strange looks at their

neighbour's outbursts. And I'm not referring to infantile terminology like 'Hits', 'Busts' and 'Scoots.' (Have you ever heard anything as barmy as 'Scoots' which is to be found in one magazine describing a winger's darting runs!)

In the dressing room, before kick-off, Aussie Test stars Andrew Ettinghausen, Bradley Clyde or Allan Langer take their 'jumper' off the peg, not their jersey and check their 'sprigs,' not their boots, before proceeding onto the 'Paddock,' not the Pitch. Once on the pitch the Locks, (the second rows) and the 'Five Eighth' (stand off) take up their positions in readiness to receive the ball from the kick-off. As does the 'dummy half' acting half back) who will be close at hand to carry out the first movement of the ball from the 'Ruck' (Play the Ball). Sadly, for the purist, even the Australian players, during the recent Anglo/Aussie clashes, were forced to conform to the ludicrous numbering system which now blights

the domestic game in Britain. Canberra Raiders' loose forward Bradley Clyde had the choice of any number 1 to 50, instead of the number 8 jumper, once worn by his predecessors Johnny Raper or Ron Coote in the Australian teams of yesteryear. Yes, you've guessed it, the pack Down Under was once numbered the reverse of the British domestic game.

Away from the terminology, however, the fans, both in Britain and Down Under, have noticed that the biggest difference between the two Hemispheres still lies on the scoreboard where record scores have been posted by a succession of Aussie clubs. And those differences are far more worrying for League in Britain than any confusion in a dictionary.

The decision to ask the game's new Technical Director, Joe Lydon, to lead an inquiry into the state of play in Britain will only be of value if the former Great Britain full-back is given a free hand to carry out his recommendations. If his


report is to be swept under the carpet like all discussion documents of the past and clubs continue to interest themselves in only their little patch of territory then there will never be rugby parity between the two Hemispheres.

The choice is ours. We can continue to enjoy an inferior brand of rugby at home but we cannot continue with it for much longer if we want to consider ourselves a major sport in the British Isles.

Whether in Britain or Australia it matters not how you talk about rugby league but, for the future of the sport worldwide, it matters if the differences on the field are allowed to continue.

TASTE THE ACTION

ON THIS DAY... DON YATES

It was on this day in 1966, Wednesday 6th July, that Oldham utility forward Gary Lord was born. Happy 31st Birthday Gary.

Exactly twelve months ago, on Saturday 6th July 1996, Sheffield Eagles travelled down to The Valley, Charlton for a Super League match against London Broncos.

Unfortunately for the Eagles, they found the Broncos in superb form, especially centre Greg Barwick who crossed for a hat trick of tries as the Londoners raced to a 45-8 victory. Prop Paul Broadbent scored the Eagles' try with scrum-half Mark Aston landing a couple of goals. On the same day, Saturday 6th July 1996, Parramatta announced the signing of Bradford Northern coach Brain Smith on a two year contract. He moved down to Sydney the following August. It was on Wednesday, 6th July 1994 that the Parramatta Stadium, Sydney staged the Australia-France test match during the ill-fated French tour of the South Pacific. France won only one of their seven tour games and,

not surprisingly, their heaviest defeat came against the Kangaroos who beat France 58-0. Centre Steve Renouf scored three of the 12 Australian tries. Eagles centre David Fraisse was included in the french line-up, as was their current winger Jean-Marc Garcia.

As a curtain raiser to the test, Great Britain's academy squad played Australia's under-19s. The Australians won that too - 46-8. Cronulla centre Mat Rogers scored two tries and seven goals for the Kangaroos whilst the British a try scorers were Francis Cummins (Leeds) and Jonathan Roper (Warrington).

It was on this day in 1995, Thursday 6th July, that the BARLA under-18's also suffered defeat. They lost 14-8 to West Coast in Greymouth, New Zealand.

Britain had more to cheer about on Sunday 6th July 1975 when England defeated Papua New Guinea 40-12 before a crowd of 12,000 in Port Moresby. The star for England was a Scot, full-back George Fairbairn, who was with Wigan at the time. He scored two tries and landed eight goals.

Fifty-one-years ago, on Saturday 6th July 1946, Great Britain pulled off an even better victory when they defeated Australia 14-5 at the Brisbane Exhibition Ground, Halifax winger Arthur Bassett scored a hat trick of tries for the Lion but it was the British pack who forged the way for victory. Included in the pack was Oldham second-rower Doug Philips. On their way home from the 1957 World Cup, won by hosts Australia, Great Britain were involved in five tour matches. On Saturday, 6th July they met France at Carlaw Park, Auckland, France led 12-3 at Halftime but Britain hit back to pull off a 26-12 victory. Oldham second-rower Sid Little was included in the British pack.

Finally, on that same afternoon, Saturday 6th July 1957, Althea Gibson became the first black Wimbledon champion when she defeated Darlene Hard to win the women's singles title.

HERE AND THERE DON YATES

Last Month's Annual General Meeting of the British Amateur Rugby League Association re-elected Oldham's Nigel Hollingsworth as secretary of the association. Another Oldham League Member, Sid Miller, was appointed as one of the open age representatives on a new streamlined board. Manchester businessman Mike Morrissey was appointed as Chairman. He has been Youth Chairman during the past four years and his first move was to give the green light to the Youth Commission, a body that will include representatives from BARLA and the Rugby Football League in equal partnership. It is hoped that the Youth Commission will build on the work of the Youth Working Party and hammer out a coordinated policy for the youth junior game, to address the fundamental deficiencies highlighted by the World Club Championship Series. The disappointing results of European clubs in the first phase of the competition have been blamed on a number of factors. One factor is the current rift between BARLA and the Rugby Football League. It is a rift which must be healed if the British clubs are to compete with the Australians who, once again, have proved that they are years ahead of the British. Meanwhile, amateur clubs in the Oldham area will soon commence training for the 1997-98 season. Former Oldham second-rower Mick Worrall continues as coach of Saddleworth Rangers in the Premier Division of the National Conference League. Their arch rivals St.Annes have appointed Mark Rowbottom and Gary Ainsworth to take over as coaches of their first team following the resignation of Mark Lord and Mick Swift after four very successful years in the National Conference League. They face a difficult task following in the footsteps of Lord and Swift who twice led Saints to promotion and into the Premier League where they made a determined challenge for the title before falling away in the closing weeks of last season.

Mark Lord and Mick Swift have now taken over the coaching duties of the Oldham Amateur Town Team. Last September, Oldham lost to Widnes in the first round of the Inter-LEague Cup Competition. Oldham led 16-0 early in the second-half of that match but they then collapsed and lost 22-16 to the team which went on to reach they final. Oldham have never won this tournament although they have twice reached the final, losing 24-0 to Leeds in 1981 and 11-7 to Heavy Woollen in 1989. Perhaps this season Oldham will progress further although Humberside still remain favourites for this competition.

Next Wednesday evening, 9th July, Scotland entertain France at Firhill Park, Glasgow home of the Partick Thistle Football Club. Included in the Scottish squad is Oldham utility player Jimmy Cowans who played in the 26-6 defeat of Ireland at the Same venue last August.


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ACADEMY NEWS


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
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ormer Great Britain coach, Phil Larder, in his "Rugby League Coaching Manual" describes the art of tackling as "one of the most important individual skills in the game, and the aim of most tackles should be not merely to stop the other sides progress but to go forward and attempt to gain possession by forcing the ball carrier into handling errors." He further elaborates on the needs for expertise in 'marker defence,' 'sweeper defence,' and 'goal line defence' and then proceeds to take his readers onto an even higher, advanced plain, with detailed analysis of a team's 'wedge defence,' 'umbrella defence,' or even 'channel defence.' All good reading and first class advice for any aspiring or current player or coach. So why is it then that so few of the modern day Super League players really do relish tackling the opposition? Why is it then that, in the recent World Club Championships, every time the Penrith Panthers, **Cronulla Sharks, Brisbane**

Why should clubs like St



tackling practices with their squads on a weekly basis, but with the individual players and the way they approach the game.

The modern era, when a front rower like Apollo Perelini, Brian McDermott, and Terry O'Connor will average around 24 tackles per match and a backrower like Paul Sculthorpe, Chris Joynt, or Any Farrell is credited with an average of around 30 tackles per match, must seem strange to the forwards of yesteryear who plied their trade in an age of unlimited tackles.

The days have long gone when the likes of Vince Karalius, Derek Turner, and John Whiteley were forced to withstand a barrage of tackling on their try line for up to twenty minutes at a time. But human beings are still the same, surely. Sadly, in Britain, the players' approach to a game is not.

Modern players are conditioned to defending for a mere five tackles (invariably the opposition kick at the sixth Play the Ball) and the occasion does not assume the importance it once did. Nor do the modern players attack, legally, the opposition with the aggression and ferocity their predecessors once did. Nor do they appear to practice the art of tackling in a real situation as did teams of the Fifties and Sixties who. often on a Tuesday and Thursday evening, would be pitted against the 'A' team without

the ball for fifteen or twenty minutes at a time - real tackling, with a competitive edge and the occasional flare up between mates. But all profited far more than today's players appear to do from the Tackle Shields, introduced to this country over a decade ago by the Aussies.

Too much hype and adulation is given over to players who indulge in fancy footwork, we must redress the balance and sing the praises of those who can, will, and want to tackle. Or we will never again be able to take on the world.

ROBINSON AND NEWLOVE HEAD TRY CHART

Jason Robinson and Paul Newlove begin the second phase of the Stones Super League as the top try scorers since it was launched 15 months ago. Both have totalled 33 tries over the two seasons. St. Helens centre Newlove headed the chart last season with 28 but injury has restricted him to five this time. Robinson scored 24 in 1996 and has added nine this year. The Wigan winger is the only player to have retained a Top Ten place, being second last year and joint fourth now.

Wigan captain Andrew Farrell heads the other two scoring charts with 168 goals and 370 points, including nine tries and two drop goals. Farrell scored 103 goals and 226 points in 1996 when Bobby Goulding of St. Helens led with 120 and 257.



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
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ALLIANCE NEWS

The Alliance team produced a massive improvement in their attitude and commitment away at St Helens last week. The Bears opened the scoring in the first five minutes when a half break by Chris McKinney was well supported by David Milne who drew the full back and sent Paul Deacon over for a try which he converted from under the posts.

Good defence forced several errors from St Helens which led to Carl Switzer finding Simon Svabic with an inside pass to break the St Helens line. From 20 metres out Svabic skipped around the St Helens full-back to score wide on the left. Further pressure on the St Helens line resulted in a drop out and then Chris McKinney scooted under the posts from acting half-back to make the score 16-0.

Within 25 minutes Paul Deacon

had added a penalty and a drop goal, before we had a 15 minute relaxation period. As errors crept in the tackling slackened and a game that was won began to slip. Saints hit back to score three tries on our left hand side through Paul Anderson and Joey Hayes (2) to go in at half time trailing Oldham 19-14. We started the second half as we had in the first. Good approach play by Paul Deacon, (who had a fine game) sent in David Milne to stretch the lead to 23-14 Deacon followed this up with a fine break into the Saint Helens half. From the quick play the ball Craig Barker threw a long, wide pass to Aidie Meade who ran strongly through the Saints defence, beat the fullback, to score under the posts from 50 metres out. Paul Deacon converted. At 29-14 we had the game sewn

up, but again a ten minute lapse

allowed Saints to capitalise on missed tackles, and score four tries and two conversions without reply. At 34-29 we went behind for the first time with eight minutes remaining. A good strong drive from Jimmy Cowans (who had another tremendous game in the second row) set up position for Craig Barker to feed Chris McKinney. McKinney spun out of a tackle into space and headed for the line for a try which Paul Deacon failed to convert.

With minutes to go losing 34-33 Craig Barker was hit off the tackle. Good work by the linesman meant a penalty was awarded in the same position as where Paul Deacon had failed to convert the McKinney try. This time he kept his cool and slotted the penalty home for a well deserved win.

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
OLDHAM EVENING CHRONICLE

The Oldham Bears are doing a spot of "missionary" work today by playing the Super League game against Sheffield Eagles at Hyde United.

Missionaries like to spread the gospel and the Bears appear to be determined to win over a few converts in soccer-mad Tameside.

They have already played several Alliance team fixtures at Stalybridge Celtic's Bower Fold ground and, having watched most of the games, I have to say that those fans who travel from Oldham appear to have grown increasingly appreciative of the facilities on offer. Whether the run of Alliance games attracted much interest locally is difficult to asses, but if you accept the concept of sporting organisations going out to market their product - as indeed they must in 1997 - you must surely accept that Tameside is an area that the Bears marketing team must try to "crack". Geographically, it borders the Oldham metropolitan borough and it has a population of some 200,000 people without a professional rugby league club, let alone a Super League club, within its boundaries.

There is clearly some interest in the game in the locality thanks to the presence of Tameside Borough, a successful Pennine League club which flies the rugby flag thanks to the dedication of a hard-



working group of officials who include my old pal Peter Wilson, a leading official of the rugby League Writers' Association. Peter and his Tameside Borough colleagues are doing a great job for rugby league in this part of the world and I'm sure it must be encouraging for everyone at the amateur club to see their nearest Super League club actively pushing the sport in an area which is not exactly a hotbed of the game.

The Bears of course, are not the first club to go walk-about in a bid to spread the game. In Australia they do it big style and long before new clubs were formed in Perth and Adelaide, the old Winfield Cup clubs from Sydney would think nothing of transporting one of their home games several thousands of miles to other leading cities of Australia. Even today, the Aussies think nothing of staging big games like Tests or State of Origin battles outside the traditional areas and moving them to places like Melbourne, still a hotbed of Aussie Rules in the southern hemisphere winter. Nearer home, we've had Sheffield taking a game against St. Helens to Cardiff and Saints staging a game against Castleford at Anfield on Merseyside, plus the staging of several International games in the North-East at Gateshead, where there is a thriving youth development programme. Had the Bears not been forced to find a new venue for today's game due to Boundary Park repair work, they would almost certainly have been content this season to restrict their Tameside adventure to the staging of Alliance matches.

But when they needed to look around for alternative accommodation they had no hesitation in bringing Super League rugby to Hyde.

The missionaries of old didn't expect to work miracles, and nor must the Bears. But it will be fascinating to see if they maintain their Tameside interests in the long term and, if so, how much support they will generate from the area.



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

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


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
