





#### DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO A MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR

Although tonight we welcome to Boundary Park the first Australian club side to visit Oldham, there have been seventeen visits from the Kangaroo national team. Oldham have won only four of those matches, in 1908, 1911, 1922 and 1956 when the Roughyeds beat the Kangaroo 21-2 during the season Oldham went on to lift the Championship. That 1956 tour was a disappointment for the Kangaroos who lost seven matches against club opposition as well as the test series. Australia have certainly improved since then. After losing to Widnes in October 1978, the Kangaroos have registered 43 straight wins over British club sides. The last time the Kangaroos visited Oldham was in 1986 when those tourists repeated the feat of the 1982 Kangaroos and completed the tour with a 100% record. One of the toughest matches for Australia during that 1986 tour came up at Watersheddings where a crowd of 5,678 attended to see the Kangaroos take on an

Oldham side who, at that

time, were a match for anyone. The match was played just four days before the second test so the Australian team contained only five players who were included in the following Saturday's test line-up. Nevertheless the only player in their team who failed to play test match rugby was loose-forward Paul Langmack and between them their line-up amassed 198 test caps. 

#### STATISTICALLY SPEAKING

#### **DON YATES**

onight's visitors to Boundary Park are the Cowboys of North Queensland who were formed as recently as 1995 and play out of Stockland Stadium, Townsville. They had a difficult opening season when they won only two matches and suffered several heavy defeats, the heaviest being a 66-4 hammering against Canterbury in August 1995. Last season they showed considerable improvement but still won only six matches. Nevertheless the Cowboys continued to pull in the crowd with 27,096 being attracted to the Cowboys v. South Sydney match last July which Souths won 22-20.

This season the Cowboys have again struggled and they find themselves at the foot of the table. However, they are a match for anyone on their day as was seen last May when they forced a 20-20 draw away at Brisbane Broncos. It must be said that their three World Club Championship victories have been by wider margins than any other victory in their short history and their club record victory is now the 54-16 defeat of Oldham last month. It will be interesting to see if, during their stay in England, they can improve on their biggest away win which is currently their 24-14 win over the Gold Coast last July.

Oldham got of to a flying start when David Hobbs landed a penatly in the first minute as the Roughyeds matched the Kangaroos during a fiery opening quarter. The first scum broke up in mayhem with fists flying in all directions. As a result Mick Worrall and Paul Sjerman together with Kangaroo forwards Martin Bella and Steve Folkes were dispatched to the sin bin. Shortly after their return Australia drew level when Mike o'Connor landed a penalty. The two packs continued to hammer at each other but it was half-back Terry Lamb who was involved in the decisive action on the half-hour. During a two minute spell the popular stand-off crossed for two tries both converted by Mike O'Connor to take the score to 4-2 Against such opposition most clubs would have folded but the Roughyeds were far from beaten and before the interval Colin Halkyard scored for Mick Worrall to convert and leave Oldham well in contention at half-time with the score at 14-8. After the break Oldham continued to press. The stubborn Kanagaroo defence stood firm but Mick Worrall twice landed penalties so as the match moved into its final quarter a vulnerable looking Australia led by only 14-12. Kangeroo skipper Ben Elias was enjoying a tremendous evening so it was perhaps fitting that it was he who scrambled over for a try on the hour and then made the decision break ten minutes later which led to actry from scrum-half Greg Alexander. In the dying seconds Stuart Raper put Des Foy over to complete the scoring. Oldham had played magnificently against World class opponents and although beaten 22-16 they had the concolation of restricting Australia to the lowest winning margin on that historic tour.



# A Benchmar k for Britain



The Super League XXXX Cowboys are part of the North Queensland community.

The Super League XXXX Cowboys receive outstanding community support and the players and the organisation put this back into North Queensland through a range of avenues.

As well as their sponsor commitments, the players conduct regular visits to the Cleveland Youth Centre and have taken on roles promoting a range of community organisations. They are popular visitors to the Cleveland Youth Centre and have taken on roles promoting a range of community organisations and projects, including SunSmart for the Cancer Fund, the Cootharinga Society and a range of other charity and children's organisations.

Wherever possible the Super League Cowboys players travel around the North Queensland region visiting schools and community organisations. The players are being developed as role models for the younger generation and outstanding examples of what can be achieved through commitment, dedication and determination.

The club's junior development program is ongoing, promoting the importance for rugby league and sport in a healthy lifestyle for young North Queenslanders.

In late 1995 the XXXX Cowboys established the Cowboys Community Foundation under the banner of the Queensland Community Foundation. The club contributed \$30,000 to the

fund during its inaugural year with the first series of grants issued early in 1996 and this will continue in 1997. The aim of the foundation is to help, particularly those smaller organisations and charities in the community, who assist those most in need.

While the Cowboys receive around 100 letters a month asking for smaller donations, the Cowboys Community Foundation allows the Cowboys to make more significant contributions to organisations.

The Cowboys are also building a close working relationship with James Cook University (JCU) through a number of avenues.

One is the Cowboys sponsorship of the North Queensland Cowboys Honours Research Awards promoting research into sport exercise through a program underway between the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and ICU.

This information is a major factor in the development of the Australian game being at a much more advanced stage. They have realised that support is a reciprocal process, not just something clubs should take for granted.

The idea for a national North Queensland based rugby league team surfaced in 1989 after 16,000 people turned out to watch the Brisbane Broncos play the Parramatta Eels in a Panasonic Cup quarter final in Townsville.

The response was so great the idea of basing a national rugby league side in the north was born, and later that year a formal committee was in place working towards the bid.
Years of toil by a few North
Queenslanders and they were
rewarded for their tenacity with the
entry of a North Queensland team
into the Winfield Cup's 20 team
competition in late 1992.
It was helped along by the support of a
petition signed by 30,000 North
Queenslanders and promises of
support from major companies, public
sector organisations and politicians.
On March 11, 1995 when the team ran
on to Stockland Stadium for their first

expectations.

While on the paddock the club hoped for more wins, the public of North Queensland showed unprecedented support for a sporting organisation, flocking to home games and making the club's merchandise the second highest seller in the league.

The 238,734 people who attended the II home games in the club's inaugural year, and the professional presentation of the organisation were high points for the Cowboys in 1995.

Other features of the inaugural year included the first win against Illawarra and the first home win against Wests at Stockland Stadium in Round 15. On October 18, 1995 the club announce a joint venture with News Limited. It resulted in a \$5.5 million injection of funds and allowed the major \$6.5 million redevelopment of Stockland Stadium.

At the commencement of the 1996 season the club boasted the best rugby

league player facilities in Australia in the middle of one of the strongest supporter bases in the competition. The ongoing improvement saw the club win six games in their second year and well on the way to being a premier performer as the Super League competition kick-off loomed in 1997.

The first class stadium, able to seat 11,000 and house 31,500 people, and totally integrated player training and rehabilitation facilities, now provide the centrepiece of a growing club which is earmarked as a club set to be one of the premier performers of the future.

This is in part due to the immense community support, along with the impact of 1996 head coach Graham Lowe and the legacy of coaching leadership which continues in 1997 with Tim Sheens taking over the reins. Sheens is recognised as a modern day pioneer of the game of rugby league and will be the base around which the Super League Cowboys will develop their truly professional playing and administration structure in the coming years.

The focus will remain on developing the juniors and growing young Super League Cowboys to fill the teams of the future.

In 1997 the Super League Cowboys are aiming to set the standard in player professionalism and overall presentation, giving the public of North Queensland not only a team to support, but a team to admire.

#### ON THIS DAY...

#### recalling this day in history

Before introduction of summer rugby, July was the month when the only rugby action involving British players took place on tours to the other side of the World.

It was on this day in 1914, Saturday 18th July, that Great Britain met Hawkes Bay in Napier, New Zealand. The Lions won easily enough 30-7 with Willie Davies (Leeds) crossing for a hattrick of tries.

Seventy years later, on Wednesday 18th July 1984, the Lions were back in New Zealand, this time in Wellington where they beat the Central Districts 38-6. Oldham's Terry Flanagan was in the second-row for Britain that evening.

Two years ago it was the BARLA under-18's who were in New Zealand. Their results were not so successful and on Tuesday 18th July 1995 they were beaten 18-12 by Manawatu in Palmerston North.

It was on this day in 1964, Saturday 18th July, that Australia completed a

whitewash of test victories over the touring French side. The Kangaroos won this third test 35-9 at Sydney Cricket Ground where winger Ken Irvine crossed for two tries as well as landing seven goals.

Twenty-eight years previously, on Saturday 18th July, Great Britain met Australia in a deciding test match at Sydney Cricket Ground. It was a typically torrid test in which Ray Stehr (Australia) and lack Arkwright (Britain) were sent off but the Lions clinched the test series with a 12-7 victory. Barney Hudson, one of five Salford backs in the British line-up, scored the first try, Stan Brogden (Leeds) scored the second and Martin Hodgson (Swinton) landed three goals. Vic Hey (try) and Dave Brown (two goals), two players who later moved to British clubs, were the Australian scorers.

One of the most famous clubs in Australia are St.George who won the Australian Premiership on eleven consecutive seasons between 1956 and 1966. Because of their dominance of the Australian domestic game, in 1962 they were awarded a match against the touring British Lions. That match was switched from their Kogarah Jubilee Oval ground (capacity 24,000) to Sydney Cricket Ground and on Wednesday, 18th July 1962 a crowd of 57,895 attended the match. Great Britain silenced the multitude, winning 33-5. It was on Wednesday, 18th July 1984


It was on Wednesday, 18th July 1984 that Halifax signed centre Tony Anderson from Eastern Suburbs, the Sydney club who now play under the name of Sydney City. Anderson made 145 appearances for Halifax and scored 66 tries before transferring to Oldham for £70,000 in March 1990. Finally, it was way back on 18th July 1896 that the first sod of grass was laid at Boundary Park, then the new ground of the Oldham Association football & Athletic Club, later renamed Oldham Athletic and the current hosts of the Oldham Rugby League Football Club.

#### HERE AND THERE

#### DON YATES

In the wake of the disastrous results of English clubs in the World Club Championship, the rugby Football League have set up an enquiry under the chairmanship of Joe Lydon. The League Management are determined to raise standards in this country so that British clubs can, in future, enter this tournament with a realistic chance of success.

Having watched a number of World Championship matches in Europe I do not consider that the difference in playing strengths is as great as at first they appear. Generally speaking, I do not think that the Australian players are any faster than the Europeans, nor do I consider that they are any more powerful or that they tackle any better. The big difference seems to be that the Australians show more intelligence than the Europeans. They seem more aware tactically and, as a result, take up better field positions thereby making themselves look faster, fitter and stronger.

In order for our players to match the high standards of their Australian counterparts, they must participate in a similarly intense competition. During the past fifteen years or so, the Australians have had one distinct advantage over the Europeans. The advantage is the intense competition provided by their State of Origin competition which provides three matches where the competition is as intense as any International match. Unfortunately for Britain we do not have a competition which provides such an intense competition. The War of the Roses matches which were set up some time ago lacked the passion generated by the State of Origin clashes. In addition to that our matches against the French have not grounded the fierce competition which the fired-up New Zealanders provide when they take on the Kangaroos. It is essential that we set a similar high intensity set of fixtures to test the mettle of our leading players. The game in France is suffering at the moment and the demise of the South Wales club was a hefty bodyblow to the game in Wales. What a tremendous difference it would make to the general standard of our play if we could complete in a European Championship involving England, France and Wales if the passion generated was equal to that of the State of Origin.

The League Management are making determined efforts to set the game up in both Ireland and Scotland and they are to be congratulated for that but we must continue to give every assistance to both Wales and France. International competition is the pinnacle of sporting achievement and as such it must be encouraged vigorously. In recent years the Australian Rugby League have worked wonders in such places as Papua New Guinea, the Cook Islands, Fiji, Western Somea and Tonga as well as building up the run down New Zealand game. We must follow their example in the Northern Hemisphere. The team who are working with Joe Lydon are almost exclusively from Europe and I was a little dissappointed that the working party did not include a leading administrator from Australia. Nevertheless, we must not criticse st this stage because I am sure that we will eventually pull back the Australians. Until then we will just have to sit back and enjoy their skills, starting this evening with the visit of the North Queensland Cowboys.

#### **OLDHAM EVENING CHRONICLE**

Flying back from Australia after Oldham's games with Townsville and Adelaide in the World Club Championships I stumbled across one of the main reasons why our game in this country is years behind the game Down Under.

I suspect we were somewhere over Tibet or Afghanistan. I was engrossed in one of my Father's Day gifts: the joint autobiography of Aussie stars Bradley Clyde (?) and Laurie Daley. Both came from relatively humble backgrounds in the vast interior of New South Wales. And both played League from the day they first stepped into primary school at the age of five or six.. Soccer wasn't on the agenda. In winter, it was League or Aussie rules for the toddlers. Most preferred League and, even at that early age, dreamed of the day they would play for the Raiders or the Sea

We can safely assume that every young boy in New South Wales and Queensland handles a rugby ball from soon after they discard their nappies.

And in much the same way that the majority of primary school boys in this country dream of playing soccer for Manchester United, Liverpool, Arsenal or the likes, so the Aussie kids from Cairns to Cantima think only of playing for the Cowboys, the Raiders or the big clubs in



Even if you isolate Lancashire, Yorkshire and Cumbria from the rest of the UK, in a similar way to how I have picked out Queensland and New South Wales from the rest of Australia, you still cannot believe that most kids prefer League to

When we try to compare League in Australia, therefore with League in the UK the first thing we must deduce is that it is an uneven contest.

League in this country, whether we like it or not as enthusiasts of the sport, is a minority sport which has a similar status to that of soccer in Australia. And we all know what would happen if the top dozen or so Australian soccer

clubs came to England to have a crack at Tottenham, Man. United etc. Not even Terry Venables could address the balance

The Australians have been full-time professionals for several years and the game receives as much coverage in the media as soccer does here. It is a massive business attracting enormous sponsorship and corporate backing.

You need only to look at the Leagues clubs at Parramatta or Penrith to get an idea of what League in Australia is all

Of course it has been ripped apart in the last 12 months by the ARL versus Super League row. but once compromise is reached and the warring factions smoke the pipe of peace - as they certainly will the Aussie game will close ranks once more and go from strength to strength. The only thing that surprised me about the English defeats in the first phase of the World Championship was the fact that the game here was shocked by them. We can be competitive now at Test level because no matter how strong a county is it can only have 13 players on the field at

But haven't we always recognised that the Aussies could probably pick three or four teams to give us a run? Accept that and it naturally follows that they will be stronger all round at club level.
