



A Message FROM THE CHAIRMAN



When the final score sounds this afternoon it will bring an end to a traumatic season for everybody at Oldham Bears. All the players, coaching staff, supporters and everybody connected feels the same after the battle for Super League survival finally took its last fatal turn in Paris on Tuesday night.

The 23-12 defeat meant that we were doomed to finish in bottom spot and, unless there is a late, late reprieve by any decision to increase the number of teams in the Super League, today's visit from Warrington Wolves is our last brush with the Super powers at least for the time being. Of course, there is still the Premiership Trophy to come - a trip to play the team finishing fifth at the end of today's matches - but that, I am sure, hardly rates high in most supporters' thoughts just at this moment.

It has been a long, hard struggle not helped by a long string of injuries to key players in an overstretched squad at a crucial time. Many of the big money clubs could easily overcome the loss of four or five leading players because they can afford to have strength in depth. We at Oldham have not got such luxuries.

I think that most supporters will agree that Bob Linder and his players have worked tirelessly to keep the team in Super League. We all know how important it is to be playing among the elite. It gives the town and the club a high profile, it is a status symbol in the world of Rugby League. But as I warned in the Wigan programme, life outside the top flight can be a nightmare without the support and the will to get back among the big guns at the first opportunity. Just look at the rugby towns of Workington Town and Widnes if you think I exaggerate.

So where do we - the Oldham Bears - go from here?

We are a club playing on a rented ground, using rented training facilities and rented offices. But there are four other Super League clubs in exactly the same boat - three of them among the so-called big city clubs of the Super League status.

I know it is hard for any fans to see on the any bright side to look on at this moment but Oldham is a club of more than 100 years tradition and we have been relegated before and bounced back.

If doom and gloom is your style then there isn't much I can say that will change your mind. Super League status may be lost (temporarily) but now is the time to build for the future, Oldham Rugby League has to have a future - we are not quite ready to roll over and die.


Other clubs have come back from seemingly being ready for burial before they were dead - even Wigan spent time in the second division. And how many incarnations have London had?

Finally, thanks to those who have supported the club through what I said has been a traumatic season. In the end injuries, a few points either way, could have made all the difference. Today's visitors Warrington have hit a run of form lately so hopefully we can bring down the curtain with a good performance.

Down Memory Lane

Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear

The years immediately after the Second World War were exceptional for sport in general and rugby league in particular. Huge crowds flocked to see matches with the Warrington team of that era being one of the big crowd pullers. They had a good, young side in those days which went on to dominate the domestic scene in the late 40s and early 50s.

Warrington's dominance began in the 1947-48 season, a season which began for them here in Oldham. It also began with a defeat, Warrington losing a league match at Watersheddings by 14-3. Their final league match of that campaign also involved Oldham although the result was a little different. Warrington won 45-3 with Brian Bevan scoring five of their 11 tries. That result left Warrington second in the Championship table behind Wigan and with a home match against Huddersleld in the Championship semi-final. As expected Warrington beat Huddersfield 17-5 but the other semi-final produced a shock, Bradford Northern won at Wigan 15-3.

The Championship Final was staged at Maine Road, Manchester and drew a crowd of 69,143. Warrington were slight favourites but they were up against a side who had enjoyed a tremendous finish to their season. They had lost only two of their previous 18 matches. The week before they had lost 8-3 at Wembley against Wigan and, significantly, six weeks previously had lost 21-5 at Wilderspool.

The teams for that final were as follows:

Warrington: Les Jones; Brian Bevan, Bryn Knowelden Albert Pimblett, Stan Powell; Jackie Fleming, Gerry Helme; Billy Derbyshire, Dave Cotton, Bill Riley, Jim Featherstone, Bob Ryan & Harold Palin.

The match had the classic ingredients of a powerful and efficient Warrington outfit taking on Bradford who, critics agreed, had more flair and footballing acumen. Warrington began the better and after ten minutes went in front with a penalty from Harold Palin. Although Warrington were the more workmanlike side they also had a footballing genius in the shape of winger Brian Bevan. When he got going no-one could stop him. After 15 minutes he got going. Five-nil to Warrington. That score remained until half-time although Bradford were unlucky not to trouble the scoreboard attendant on a couple of occasions.

Warrington began the second-half as they had the first, and again they made their pressure count. Stan Powell scored for Harold Palin to convert and leave Northern with a mountain to climb. Undeterred, Bradford hit back and played some sparkling rugby. They were rewarded when centre Des Case sliced through the Warrington defence for a try. Warrington's players claimed that Ernie Ward's conversion attempt went wide but the goal was given and Northern were back to within a score of Warrington. This was the signal for Warrington to tighten up their defence and show their opponents that they too had some talented backs. As a result they got well on top and it was no surprise when Albert Pimblett crossed to put the match beyond Bradford. Harold Palin landed a penalty in the closing minutes to make the final score 15-5 in Warrington's favour.

It was Warrington's first Championship success. They won the title again in 1954, when they beat Oldham, and in 1955 but they have not won it since. Warrington have enjoyed success in other competitions but the Championship remains the big one and everyone at Wilderspool is determined that Championship success will be achieved in the not too distant future.



Oldham Evening Chronicle

Rugby League clubs, facing a major crisis in the game, meet at Leeds on Wednesday to discuss the way forward. Lots of hard talking will have to be done because, whichever way you look at it, the game faces massive problems.

They were highlighted by recent events at Wigan where the resignation of chairman Jack Robinson and his No, 2 Tom Rathbone, put the spotlight on that famous club's massive financial crisis.

A team of RFL financial experts later arrived at Central Park to investigate the extent of the debt and recommend the way forward.

The crisis at one of the world's most famous rugby league clubs must have set alarm bells ringing throughout Super League and beyond.

If Wigan, of all clubs, have a cash crisis, what about the rest?

As we approach the end of the second Super League season, clubs are coming to terms with the fact that the Murdoch revolution hasn't made the impact many expected of it.

The financial worries at most clubs began many years before Murdoch's intervention, but the media tycoon's injection of £87-million over five years now looks small change if it was intended to restore the bank manager's smile.

Some £35-million will already have been pumped into the game, but most of it must have gone on paying off debts or keeping players happy judging by the number of clubs

now hoisting distress signals.

With the Murdoch millions, of course, came orders from above that Super League clubs had to turn their part-time players into full time professionals and employ all manner of men such as media managers, marketing experts and chief executives.

The revolution, which also included a switch to summer rugby, was intended to pull in the fans like never before. In reality, and with odd exception, it has alienated many traditionalists and failed to attract new fans in sufficient numbers to turn deficits into profits.

A salary cap alone will not provide the solution. If Oldham Bears face an uncertain future, the sport as we know it faces an even bigger one.

Due to copy deadlines, last weekend's Bank Holiday, and the game in Paris on Tuesday, I had to submit these notes before the outcome of the relegation battle was known. Hopefully, Oldham's Super League survival hopes will still be alive as the club goes into its final league game of the season today against Warrington. If that is the case, we should be in for quite an occasion.


Relegated or not, the Bears face a difficult future, not merely because of the sort of financial problems that are currently undermining the sport as a whole, but because they have no home of their own.

I suspect that both for the Bears and the game of rugby league, it will be a traumatic close season which will throw up many questions.

Let's hope the answers are the right ones.

TASTE THE ACTION

Statistically Speaking

The final visitors to Boundary Park during this 1997 Super League season are Warrington, one of the founder members of the Rugby Football League. This afternoon they will be meeting Oldham for the 204th time. The Roughyeds have won 84 of the 203 previous matches with Warrington having won 110 and nine matches having ended all square.

Oldham's biggest win in that sequence came way back in November 1898 when winger Martin scored four tries as the Roughyeds won 35-0 Watersheddings. The best win Oldham achieved at Wilderspool came in April 1910 when Warrington were defeated 32-0. Warrington's best results against Oldham came during a four day spell in September 1948.

First of all Oldham were beaten 55-0 at Wilderspool in the semi-final of the Lancashire Cup and four days later Warrington won 37-0 at Watersheddings. In both those matches legendary winger Brian Bevan scored five tries.

On This Day . . .

Don Yates recalls this day in history.

It was on this day in 1957, Saturday 3I st August, that full-back Frank Dyson enjoyed a field day in Huddersfield's 68-19 home victory over Batley in a Yorkshire Cup-tie. He landed 13 goals and still found time to cross for a couple of tries for a total of 32 points. Winger Mick Sullivan also enjoyed himself that day, scoring six tries.

Six years later, on Saturday 31 st August 1963, Dyson had moved on to Oldham as player-coach and he landed seven goals that day as the Roughyeds beat Batley 44-7 in a Second Division match at Watersheddings. Winger Trevor Simms scored a hattrick of tries in that

match.

Another high scoring match took place on Saturday 31st August 1935 down in Sydney, Australia where Western Suburbs defeated Canterbury 65-11 with halfback Les Mead scoring a try and 12 goals. Five years after suffering that disappointing defeat Canterbury suffered further disappointment on Saturday 31st August 1940 when they lost 24-14 to Eastern Suburbs in the Australian Premiership Final. The Roosters pack, which included Ray Stehr and Joe Pearce, proved too much for Canterbury before a crowd of 24,167 at Sydney Cricket Ground. Back to Britain where, on Wednesday 31st August 1960, Yorkshire met Lancashire before a crowd of 15,045 at Belle Vue, Wakefield. The Tykes led 17-8 at half-time but Lancashire hit back to win 21-20. Both Oldham and Warrington were well represented in that match. Oldham stand-off Alan Kellett scored a try for

Yorkshire and centre Alan Davies two tries for Lancashire. Warrington had four players in the Lancashire line-up, full-back Eric Fraser (two goals), winger Bobby Greenhough (try), centre Jim Challinor and second-row forward Laurie Gilfedder (goal). In addition, Warrington whistler Charlie Appleton was in charge of the match.

On Tuesday 31st August 1 965, Oldham entertained the New Zealand tourists. It was a dour encounter which the Kiwis won 5-2. Full-back John Winton landed a penalty for Oldham whilst Kevin Dixon scored the Kiwi try which was converted by Jack Fagan. Making his debut for Oldham that evening was scrum-half Tommy Canning who had been signed from the Vulcan RUFC.

Ten years later, on Sunday 31st August 1975, Rochdale Hornets lost 22-10 at home to Workington Town in a Lancashire Cup-tie. Making his debut for Hornets that day was second-row forward Wally Jones who had been signed from Warrington for £500 earlier that month. Jones later moved on to Oldham where he gave good service to the Roughyeds.

Finally, it was on this day in 1969, Sunday 31st August, that the undefeated former World Heavyweight Boxing Champion, Rocky Marciano was killed in a plane crash.

A nice thought 24 hours before I fly home from Australia.

WARRINGTON WOLVES

PAUL HULME Age 30. Joined Warrington in June 1996 from Widnes, a club he served with distinction for 12 years, earning Great Britain honours along the way. Began his career as a scrum half, but has played a lot of his rugby in the back row and is more than an able hooker. A tremendous tackling forward with a huge heart and appetite for the game. He is a role model for the younger players to follow.

CHRIS RUDD Age 27. Centre. Joined Warrington along with Gary Chambers from Kells ARLC in Cumbria in February 1988. A Cumbrian County player who can play in several positions, he has to date made over 140 appearances for Warrington, scored 17 tries and kicked 100 goals.

TONY TAPUPU Age 27. Second row forward who signed for Warrington in November 1996 from Auckland Warriors. A strong running forward with a reputation for winning matches, much is expected from him over the coming months at Wilderspool.






