

# **OLDHAN**

### **KEITH ATKINSON**

The Stalwart. This is Keith's 8th comeback! Signed for Oldham in 1985 and hung up his boots for what everyone thought was the final time in 1992. Little did we know! Back come forward who has played in every position with the possible exception of scrum half. Broke more bones that a butcher (his own that is!). Superb attitude.

### **CRAIG BARKER**

Young stand-off half and a product of the Waterhead amateur RL club. Signed as a pro for the former Bears club and joined the Roughyeds as a free agent. Captained the Bears Academy side and graduated to the Alliance side, which he also led on occasions.

### **JASON CLEGG**

Big Prop. Started in Union with Littleborough, moved into League with Littleborough based North West Pioneers and turned pro with Bradford Northern, (as they were then called), after being spotted by a Northern scout playing in a BARLA cup tie at Redhill (Castleford). Played several senior games with Bradford and later had a spell on loan with Batley.

### SEAN COOPER

Former Saddleworth Rangers star, who was taken to Bradford in the Peter Fox era. Captained the Alliance side at Odsel, won numerous Alliance player of the year awards and joined Oldham as a free agent when the Bulls decided to scrap their reserve team. Impressive so far in the Roughyeds early games.

### **RICHARD DARKES**

Former Huddersfield, Bradford and Dewsbury utility back. Ex-paratrooper. Signed after impressing in a pre season match at Castleford. Played wing in his early days with Huddersfield and Bradford, but has since acquired considerable experience in the centre and in the back row of the pack.

### **CRAIG DIGGLE**

A Rochdalian, Craig played with Rochdale Hornets when Roughyeds boss Paddy Kirwan was Alliance team coach at Spotland. Best position, wing. Scored two tries in Oldham's first competitive match against Heworth in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

### CHRIS ECKERSLEY

Former schoolboy sprint champion, who signed for the old Oldham club as a 15 year old on a club record contract for a teenager. A long running contract dispute ended with his move to Warrington before he returned to his new home town club as a free agent after a major shake up of personnel at Wilderspool.

### MICHAEL EDWARDS

St Helens born, Michael first joined the old club as a 15 year old scrum half. Was a regular in Alliance rugby for two or three



seasons before Oldham coach Tony Barrow took him to Swinton. Now playing in the pack, he had a spell on loan with Salford last season and was delighted to return to Oldham when the opportunity arose.

### NEIL FLANAGAN

Club skipper and an influential leader. A product of St. Annes, Neil turned pro for his home town club and became it's youngest captain a the age of 19. Eventually moved on to Huddersfield, where he also had leadership responsibilities before joining Rochdale Hornets. Proud to be back in his home town and even prouder to be the skipper.

### JOHN HOUGH

Made his name as the first player to be signed by the Roughyeds shortly after the new club was formed. A product of the Oldham schoolboy and youth game, John is a determined little hooker, who gained considerable experience from his 30 senior games for Warrington.

### **AFI LEUILA**

Played 22 Super League games for the Bears last season after coming close to representing Tonga in the 1995 World Cup. First played for St Helens. This strong, tough South Sea Islander, born in Tonga, raised in Auckland, will probably figure in the centre this season, although he is equally at home on the flank.

### MARTIN MADERS

Young prop, who joined Huddersfield from Saddleworth Rangers as a club record buy for a teenager. Had a spell in Australia and later played with local amateurs, Waterhead before joining Oldham for an

undisclosed fee. His father Dennis played

for Oldham in the sixties and seventies.

### MICK MARTINDALE

Clever half handler. Represented Oldham schoolboys on tour in Australia with Iain MacCorqodale, Eric Fitzsimons and Fred Laughton in 1988. Turned pro with Halifax, moved to Wakefield as part of a swop deal and joined his home-town club in January. Made his debut in the cup defeat at Widnes. Loose-forward or stand-off.

### JOE McNICHOLAS

Out and out winger. Fast, elusive and good on his feet. Still only 18, signed for the Bears as a boy, but played only one senior game, at Leeds in the Premiership play-off last season. Rejected Bradford Bulls in a bid to make his name with the Roughyeds.

### ADRIAN MEAD

A Wiganer, Aidie first played in the Bears Academy side as a winger, but he switched to centre last season and impressed as a strong and pacy runner who could score tries. Keen to improve further and build on the success he enjoyed in the Bears 'A' team in 1997.

### **MIKE PRESCOTT**

Back-row forward, also from Wigan. Make a big name for himself as a strong running forward in the early days of Academy rugby. Since served his apprenticeship in the Alliance side and capable of doing well for the new Oldham club at prop or in the backrow.

### **BRIAN QUINLAN**

Raised at St Anne's, Brain was one of the three Oldham amateurs taken to Bramley by Maurice Bamford. The others were Jon Perks and Roy Jewitt. A strong prop or second-row, Brian is a useful goalkicker.



He also plays, during the winter, for Oldham RU but he is the first to admit that RL is his real sporting love.

### PAUL ROUND

Veteran of the squad at 34. Joined Oldham from St Helens in 1987. The fee, £65,000 set by tribunal. Enjoyed the best days of his career at Watersheddings. Since had further experience with Wakefield, Halifax and Castleford. One of the 'old heads' in a young pack.

### DARREN ROBINSON

'Baby' of the squad at 18. Scrum-half, who can also operate at stand-off. A Leeds lad, Darren played for the Bears Academy and Alliance teams, but never signed on. Signed for the Roughyeds as a free agent and has since caught the eye in warm-up matches, particularly in the 27-26 defeat at Castleford.

### **GRAEME SHAW**

Son of former Oldham Athletic and West Brom soccer star David Shaw, Graeme played Union as a boy at Rakewood (Littleborough), but turned to amateur RL with Moldgreen when his family moved to Huddersfield. Represented the Young Lions against the Junior Kiwis and then signed for Bradford. Made a try-scoring Super League debut at Leeds. Second-row forward.

### IAN SINFIELD

Made a big impression so far. Another Oldhamer, a product of Waterhead. Turned pro with Salford, who got an undisclosed fee when he signed for Oldham at Christmas. A natural backrower, he is the elder brother of England schoolboys star and now Leeds youngster, Kevin Sinfield.

### NATHAN VARLEY

A go-go forward, who excelled with his allround performance in attack and defence in the friendly at Whelton Road. Not the biggest of forwards, Nathan has a big heart. He won Yorkshire youth honours before rejecting Keighley to sign for Bradford. One of several ex-Bradford men in the Oldham Camp.

### **STEVE WILDE**

Utility back. Strong and pacy. Started with Saddleworth Rangers. Signed by Brian Gatland for the Bears Alliance side last season. Played with Waterhead when the Bears folded, but was keen to sign the new club when opportunity knocked.

### JOE NADIOLE

Big forward signed from Featherstone Rovers for an undisclosed fee. Huddersfield-born Joe played for his home-town club before moving on to Post Office Road. His elder brother, Tom, used to play for the former Oldham club and Joe made many visits to Watersheddings in those days to watch big brother in action. He never realised then that one day he would play for a new Oldham club.


### **CHRIS WILKINSON**

Played for Oldham as a teenage amateur in the old colts team of about 15 years ago. Signed for London Crusaders and also played for Carlisle, Dewsbury, Swinton and home-town Leigh, from whom the Roughyeds snapped him up on a free transfer a month ago.



# LYNX EFFORTS ARE ALL IN VAIN


### **SUNDAY JULY 5TH**

### LANCASHIRE LYNX 32 BARROW B RAIDERS 14

JUDGING by their pained expression at the end Lancashire's players looked like they had just lost the game instead of winning handsomely.

It was of course another two points towards the main objective of the Second Division title.

But Lynx wanted desperately to make the Trans-Pennine Cup Final and clinch the Red Rose Championship at the same time.



And they were well on course to fulfil their double goal leading 26-0 after 56 minutes.

That gave them a 39-point advantage over Oldham in the competition.

The wheels however then fell off.

Oldham piled up the points against Workington while Lancashire allowed their Cumbrian visitors back into the match while becoming over anxious to run up a cricket score themselves.

Eventually they were beaten by the clock and their own failings when they might have added to their five touchdowns.

However on any other day they would certainly have been satisfied by the margin of victory.

They weren't probably helped by having to switch the game from Deepdale to the smaller pitch belonging to their rugby union neighbours at Preston Grasshoppers.

The extra width of Deepdale would certainly have suited them but they had to accept what was on offer and certainly there was nothing wrong with a pristine playing surface.

"The main thing was to just to get the win and the two points", said influential loose forward Andy Ruane.

"It we had managed to score plenty of points than that would have been a bonus."

"It would have been nice to get to the final but our priority is the Second Division."

After their victory over Oldham seven days earlier Barrow had hoped for better things.

"We certainly came here to win" said frustrated coach Stewart Wilkinson.

"I have the players who can do the business but they showed too much indiscipline and lost the ball more that I would have liked."

"The effort was there but it was all misdirected."

It took Lancashire 15 minutes to get the scoreboard ticking over.


Winger Ray Waring, in for Steve Byrne, scored his first try of the season to set Lynx on the way.

Phil Jones converted for the first of his six successful kicks.

Man of the Match Darren Abram added try number tow after 35 minutes, ironically with Barrow back at full strength after the earlier sin-binning of Stewart Rhodes.

Scrum-half Chris Kelly added another try before the interval and with Jones booting three further goals, Lynx led 20-0 at half-way. Winger Neil Parsley finished off some good work by Doc Murray, for touchdown number four before his own afternoon and that of the teams took a turn for the worst.

To their credit Barrow stuck to their task.

### CHRIS JONES examines the future for the clubs outside Super League

The FASDA clubs recently joined their Super League colleagues in voting to accept the new deal being offered to the game by Rupert Murdoch's News Limited.

hat means that Super League will continue to be broadcast on BskyB until the end of the 2003 season, with the Super League clubs receiving £45 million from News Limited over that period.

The FASDA clubs, those professional clubs outside Super League, will not share in the long term broadcasting deal, however.

Instead they will receive £10.8 million over the next two years, the timescale of the original BskyB deal, and they will be free to negotiate with other broadcasters to screen their competitions.

The FASDA clubs now face some thorny questions about the structure of their leagues, and how they will distribute their funds. Will they allow all the money to go to players, or will they attempt to invest it to secure their future?

And will they stick with their previous decision to have 14 clubs in Division One next season, leaving just four of five clubs remaining in Division Two.

"At the time those decisions were made the game was shrouded in uncertainty", says Bob Scott, the General Manager of FASDA, who believes that his organisation should open up a debate about some fundamental issues.

"The future has been uncertain for the last 18 months, both with regard to finance and the right to get into Super League", adds Scott.

"We now have to begin making positive plans for the future, and the debate has to begin at this Friday's FASDA meeting.

"The key issues are the league structure, the distribution of finances, and the timing of the playing season".

### WHAT WILL WORK?

COMING up with the best league structure for FASDA clubs next season is a tough problem, possibly demanding brainpower of MENSA proportions.

19 clubs is too many for one division, but is too few for two divisions. And the fact that there is an odd number of clubs adds to the problem.

The RFL Council has already decided that there will be 14 clubs in division one next season, with the remaining clubs staying in division two. But that may remain in the lowest division, unless new clubs can be found from somewhere. And only Hemel Hempstead would seem to be realistic contenders to come into division two next season.

Batley Chairman Kevin Nicholas, whose club is battling to get into division one, is convinced that the structure would be unjust, whether his club is still in division two or not.

fasda news courtesy of rugby league express "The prospect of having five or six teams in division two next season is unworkable," says Nicholas.

"Even if we were lucky enough to be promoted, I wouldn't want to see five teams abandoned in division two."

At the other end of the FASDA scale, Wakefield Trinity Chairman Ted Richardson accepts that the league structure already decided upon is now unrealistic. "Everything should be up for discussion," says Richardson.

"We were presuming things when we made that decision that are no longer true."

"We decided on having 14 clubs in division one when we didn't have the knowledge we have now. I believe, for one, that we should have twelve clubs in division one."

Oldham Chairman Chris Hamilton, whose club is also in division two, is another who believes that division two threatens to be unworkable next season.

"FASDA can go from strength to strength, but we nee to sit down and plan our structure now," says Hamilton.

"Everyone in Oldham is loving their rugby this year. They are glad to get back to watching rugby for the right reasons, after the traumas of Super League last season."

"But we don't have clubs queuing up to get in the second division next season, although not long ago we are assured that other clubs were wanting to come in."

"Even Hemel Hempstead must wonder about joining division two. And the last thing we would want to do with them is destroy 15 years of Rugby League

### development."

"But we need to have a plan for next year. Clubs like Lancashire and York have said that they will not be here next season unless they are in division one, and we can't allow that to happen."

But will bringing all the clubs into one league be the best solution?

"If 19 teams were in one league that would give 36 games, which would also not be ideal, although if we had 20 teams it would be easier to find a solution," argues Nicholas, although Bob Scott is cautious about whether that is likely to happen.

"Some clubs, particularly those that aspire to get into Super League, are resisting bringing all the clubs outside Super League into one division," says Scott, although most FASDA clubs recognise that they have to find a solution.

"We have to talk until the best possible system emerges." Says Rochdale Hornets Chairman Ray Taylor.

"At the moment we are all coming from different directions."

And Taylor is ready to jettison one aspect of the game hat he believes has created many of the financial problems FASDA clubs are currently suffering from.

"Promotion and relegation has eaten the game away," claims Taylor.

"Almost every club in the game is paying more than it can afford to avoid being relegated from its respective division.

"I certainly don't think it's vital that promotion is retained to Super League.


