

THE second division promotion battle is building up into a fight to the death.

Lancashire Lynx look odds-on favourites now to take the £40,000 championship prize, but it would be a brave man who would put a week's wage on the two clubs to follow Kevin Tamati's men into

the first division.

York, Bramley, Oldham and Batley are separated by only two points after last Sunday's games which included Batley's 17-16 defeat of Barrow at Mount Pleasant and York's hard-fought 20-15 win against Workington at Derwent Park.

Both these results increased the pressure on the Roughyeds, who currently lie in fourth spot but with a game in hand on York, Bramley and Batley.

Every game is going to be vital in Oldham's five match run-in, starting with the visit to Boundary Park today of Doncaster, who last Sunday felt the full force of the title favourites when crashing to a 48-2 home hammering by Lynx.

Prior to that game the Dragons had looked capable of climbing away from the bottom of the table by pulling off a massive shock to win at Batley and then holding Bramley to a draw on the Doncaster Rovers soccer ground.

They will come to Oldham today smarting to put that Lynx horror show behind them and Paddy Kirwan's men will need no reminding that they cannot afford to take the fellows from South Yorkshire lightly.

Oldham must grab both points today because they then face eight action-packed days in which the club's hopes and ambitions for next season will almost certainly be decided.

In division two terms you could hardly get a tougher week than that which required the Roughyeds to play Batley away next Sunday, Lancashire Lynx at Boundary Park on the following Wednesday night and Barrow away on the following Sunday.

When you consider that they were well beaten by Barrow and Batley on their last visit to Craven Park and Mount Pleasant and they also slipped to defeat at Preston Grasshoppers on the last occasion they played Lynx you can see the size of the task confronting the Rugby League new boys.

To pile on the agony they then wrap up their fixtures with the visit to this stadium of York on Sunday, September 6....and the Wasps will feel confident of landing a decisive double after their 27-6 win at York last May.

It looks, at first glance, a formidable challenge. Certainly, the Roughyeds will deserve to win promotion if they qualify through that sort of late-season challenge but, if nothing else, this demanding programme should bring out the best in any side with promotion aspirations and with a desire to avenge previous defeats.

Championship ambitions, which looked "on" only a few weeks ago, have gone now barring a sensational collapse by Lynx, the most consistent side over the season so far. Oldham trail by five points with five to play and it would now be more useful to the Roughyeds if the leaders were to beat Bramley today to open up the scramble for second and third places.

Barrow (v York) and Workington (v Batley) can also do Oldham massive favours, but charity begins at home and it's here at Boundary Park where the Roughyeds need to be on their mettle today to do themselves a favour against a Doncaster side which is much stronger than it was when Oldham won 20-8 at Belle Vue in April.

On This Day

DON YATES RECALLS THIS DAY IN HISTORY

AS the Roughyeds move into the closing month of the 1998 season each match takes on the importance of a cuptie as the Club strives for promotion. Twenty-nine years ago, on Saturday 16th August 1969, Oldham were involved in a genuine cup-tie when they entertained Swinton in the first round of the Lancashire Cup. It proved a thrilling, seesaw affair which Swinton won 28-24. Oldham stand-off Wilf Briggs certainly did not deserve to be on the losing side. He scored three tries and four goals against a Swinton side who went on to lift the Lancashire Cup that season.

Doncaster were not involved in the County Cup that day because they had been knocked out the week before. However, they were involved in a first round Yorkshire Cup-tie on Sunday, 16th August 1981. That day Batley visited Tattersfield and they defeated Doncaster 12-11. Each side scored a try and four goals but the decisive score was a dropped goal landed by Batley looseforward Brendan Finn.

On that very same afternoon, Sunday 16th August 1981, the newly formed Carlisle club played its first ever competitive game. There was a crowd of 2,779 in attendance at Brunton Park for the visit of Wigan in the Lancashire Cup. Carlisle lost 9-6 but they recovered to gain promotion in their inaugural season with former Oldham prop Mick Morgan playing in all but one of their 36 matches.

Twelve months ago, on Saturday 16th August 1997, Leigh Miners retained the Champions Challenge Trophy when they defeated Thatto Heath 22-16 in a keenly fought final at Twist Lane. Thatto Heath were leading 16-10 fifteen minutes from time when Miners' substitute Shane

HIndley scored wide out. Veteran winger Winston Sarsfield equalised with a conversion from the touchline and then, five minutes from time, raced 70 yards for an interception try which he again converted to give Miners a thrilling victory. One of the features of this fine Miners' victory was the showing of their young pack, well led by the experienced former Oldham hooker lan Sanderson.

Seventy-four years ago Great Britain toured Australia and New Zealand and, in so doing, played 27 matches. The final match of that tour took place on Saturday 16th August 1924 at Christchurch where the Lions defeated Canterbury 47-10. The tourists scored 11 tries in that match, two of which were scored by Oldham centre Sid Rix who ended that tour with 17 touchdowns from 17 appearances.

Thirty years later, on Monday 16th August 1954, the Lions were back in New Zealand although this time on the North Island where they met Auckland at Carlaw Park. A disappointing crowd of 4,949 saw the Lions turn in a disappointing performance to lose 5-4 with full-back Lewis Jones landing a couple of penalties for the tourists.

Staying down under, it was on this day in 1994, Tuesday 16th August, that the Balmain club announced that they were to change their name to Sydney Tigers and also switch grounds, leaving Leichhardt Oval to play at the Parramatta Stadium. The move did not meet with the approval of a good percentage of their support so after two years the Club reverted back to their original name and original playing venue.

If only the Roughyeds could revert back to Watersheddings.

The win against Workington put us back in joint second spot and heralded the return of Brian Quinlan playing his first game since February. Brian made a big impression in the second half and will be pressing for a spot today. With Paul Crook and Martin Maders getting another game under their belts and the return of Andy Proctor, Ian Sinfield and Steve Wilde competition for places is returning just in time for the run in to the end of the season.

Our target is to win all our remaining games, which will achieve the promotion target and hopefully the Championship.





1959 "Oldham Sign Robinson in

CELEBRITY



GEOFF ROBINSON had gained full RU County recognition with Cumberland and Westmorland when he joined the Cumbrian RL 'Conveyor Belt' team Whitehaven. Selling to survive was an art to the craggy Cumbrian Seasiders. John Temby and Dick Huddart went to St Helens, Sid Lowden to Salford and to break the RL World record transfer fee for a forward Oldham were to pay £9,000 (£275,000 at today's values) for the rangy, speedy, Robinson.

Teaming up in the town with fellow Cumbrian school mate and World record transfer fee holder lke Southward, Geoff Robinson was to make his Watersheddings debut against Leeds in the opening fixture of the 1959/60 season. It was a time of change at the old club, Sid Little, Derek Turner, Don Vines, Dick Cracknell and John Etty


having left the crack 50's side for one reason or another. Meanwhile the management had invested heavily in the attempt to ensure continued success twice smashing World record signing fees for Southward and Robinson, bringing in County hooker Len McIntyre, and the previous season having tempted Irish RU International winger Sean Quinlan to take the pro ticket. Around Robinson and the other newcomers were still many of the Oldham stars of that famous side, Davies, Ganley Pitchford, Ayres, Noon, Jackson Winslade, Keith and Kellett. The management had, they believed, provided the ingredients for further success. They hadn't! The Club has not won a major trophy since! But during the relatively short period of Robinson's reign at Oldham, how close they came! Especially to that elusive Wembley visit!

In Geoff's first campaign Oldham had battled their way to the Challenge

Cup Semi against Hull at Swinton, their first Challenge Cup Semi since 1942/43. It's well documented that during the match Bernard Ganley was sent off for the first time in his professional career (and an almost unknown occurrence in semis) and that Southward had been adjudged by an over zealous official to have stepped in touch for a try that would surely have sealed a visit to the Twin Towers.

It was for season 1963/64, though, that Robinson is perhaps best remembered by the Oldham Supporters - after the disappointment of the 1959/60 Semis the Club had slipped backwards and that season were members of the inaugural Second Division. Against the odds, and already having disposed of Keighley, Featherstone and Hunslet in earlier rounds the side again found itself in the Challenge Cup Semis. This time they faced Hull KR at Headingley. Geoff Robinson though, whilst in the squad and to the surprise of many supporters, was left out of the starting line up. With a pack of Bott, McIntyre, Wilson, Major Whitehead and Parker, Oldham managed to contain the 'star studded' Rovers and thanks to a late McIntyre drop goal came out of the match with a creditable draw.

Faced with an injury to Parker, Oldham draughted in Robinson for the mid week evening replay at Swinton's Station Road. When Rovers roared into an early 14-3 lead it looked to all the world like Challenge Cup curtains but, led

superbly by Captain Frank Dyson's example at full back and with the forwards now beginning to get the better of the Hull pack, the speedy Robinson was creating havoc breaking through those gaps that appeared wider as the second half wore on. Fighting back to 14-14 the match was to go into extra time when, early into this period, and with Rovers clearly beaten, Robinson on this occasion scooped up a loose ball to score in the corner. The Wembley hoodoo was again about to strike when referee Dennis Davies abandoned the game due to increasingly bad light. Match officials or just bad Cup luck? It was the only time in the history of the Challenge Cup that a team had won the Semi and not appeared in the

Final! Geoff's late score has unfortunately become known in Oldham Rugby folklore as 'The try that didn't get us to Wembley'.

Oldham were to lose the second replay at Fartown 12-2.

Between 1959 and 1965 Geoff Robinson was to play 177 first team games for the Club before Warrington beat the Challenge Cup deadline to sign him to replace the unfortunate ex Oldham stalwart Charlie Winslade (out with a broken ankle) in the Wires' second row. It seems to happen to many players that when they leave Oldham they are almost immediately successful in picking up silverware, Geoff Robinson being no exception, winning the Lancashire Cup in his second season. An irony was that whilst still at Whitehaven Geoff had the

chance to join the Wires who came in with a late bid but he preferred 'Sheddings.

After spending two seasons at Wilderspool former Oldham colleague and then Rochdale Hornets' coach, Johnny Noon enticed Robinson to the Athletic grounds where he was to play out his professional career in one of Hornets' most successful post war periods.

Geoff Robinson played 14 years as a pro gaining Cumbrian County Honours both whilst at Whitehaven and Oldham.

Having a successful career in banking Geoff continued to live in the Springhead area playing regularly for Ashton RU Vandals. He now though, is back in

Cumbria living in Penrith and pursuing a successful career in Management Development. Geoff still keeps an interest in rugby with occasional visits to Penrith RU, watching Super League on TV and obviously keeping tabs on the Roughyeds. To 'relax' he pursues his love of the outdoors – particularly climbing, having been a member of British Frigidairs' expedition to Pakistan and the Himalayas. It was in the early 70's whilst out walking in Wharfdale that Geoff rescued a young woman from drowning and was awarded the Royal Humane Society Medal presented to him in the Old Saddleworth Courtrooms by the then Chief Constable.

Another player who had starred for the old Dans, Martin signed for the Dragons from Hunslet last season and after suffering injury last year is now fit and raring to go.

ALEX GREEN

After spells at Hull, Dragons on Ioan in 1996 and Keighley, the Dragons brought him back in time for the 1998 kick off. Speedy half-back at home in either

position. Good solid player, with good kicking abilities.

JASON SIMS

Prop forward signed from Featherstone Rovers, during the close season. Leads the team from the front, taking the ball up strongly.

CHRIS WATSON

Hooker signed from Hunslet and was on ever-present last season. Chris learnt his trade in the Castleford side and was a promising prospect until injury forced him out.

RICHARD PELL

From The EDITOR

BARRY Williams' performance for Workington two weeks ago certainly had the crowd roaring its disapproval. But who can blame Workington's star man for not wanting to be on the wrong end of a 50 point hammering, which was the fate of his team mates the last time the two sides met? So when we reflect on Williams' abrasive performance let's remember that he is precisely the kind of player you want on your side rather than playing against you.

In the past I can recall two outstanding examples of players who had roused the crowd to fury, but who Oldham had the good sense to sign subsequently. One was Hugh Waddell who led Blackpool to a famous victory in the Lancashire Cup at Watersheddings in 1984. Since Hughie went on to be a Great Britain Test player, his signing ranks as one of Oldham's best ever. The second was the diminutive John Cogger who, playing for Runcorn, had the temerity to wallop each of Oldham's forwards in turn. Quite rightly, Oldham gave Cogger the chance to play at a higher level and were repaid with wholehearted effort and commitment in every game, attributes which quickly endeared him to the Oldham crowd.

No doubt you all have your own memories of similar signings, so let's remember it's not always the top-rated players who turn out to be the most useful acquisitions. Sometimes all it takes is the right club and coach to galvanise a player previously under-rated. Certainly in this

season's Second Division there have been some out-standing performers who have given Oldham trouble. To go with Williams one thinks particularly of Batley stand-off Richard Price, probably the best player in his position outside Super League. Lancashire Lynx stand-off Phil Jones is another to have impressed, along with team-mates Neil Parsley and P J Soloman. Disregarding some of their more exotic 'signings' Bramley have the talented Neil Kite and Dan Potter in the backs to go with Glen and Wayne Freeman in the forwards. Doncaster Dragons Dean Creasser and Alex Green are proven performers together with player coach Colin Maskill. At York Shaun Austerfield, Alan Pallister and Lee Tichener took the eye, while John McKelleher, Barrow's full-back, was a stand out player for the Border Raiders behind a powerful pack spearheaded by Geoff Luxon and Shaun Wallis. Surprisingly, in three games against Oldham Barrow scrum-half Dean Marwood, a highly rated player, has not shone. Finally Batley Bulldogs' promising scrum-half Gary Barnett and hooker Mark Cass have looked good playing off another very powerful pack of forwards.

So, all in all, the Second Division has had a lot to offer. So much so that as the season enters its closing stages the promotion spots are very much up for grabs. Given that Oldham started the year with barely enough players for a team what a tribute it is that we enter the closing weeks with all to play for.

ENTER THE DRAGONS!

TODAY we extend a Roughyed welcome to the Players, Officials and Supporters of Doncaster. Admitted into the Rugby League in 1951, it was not until the 1963-64 season that the first fixtures between the teams took place.

Oldham recorded a "double with a 45-13 score line in their favour at Watersheddings on October 12th, 1963, which included nine goals from skipper Frank Dyson. This was followed up with a hard earned 12-6 victory on their first trip to Tattersfield three weeks later.

The only occasion the "Dons" took a point away from Watersheddings was after a 9-9 draw on March 20th, 1971. The turning point of the

match was the controversial dismissal of Oldham captain Bob Irving by referee (Sgt Maj) Eric Clay. This in fact worked against the visitors, as the official seemed to realise the error of his ways and proceeded to award a succession of penalties to Oldham, with Phil Larder landing three goals to square the match.

The most recent success for Doncaster came when Oldham travelled over to South Yorkshire in the Challenge Cup 5th round on February 13th, 1994. On that day our visitors really rose to the occasion to run out worthy winners by twenty point to nil. The game proved to be the last for Oldham coach Peter Tunks who resigned soon afterwards.

One match against Doncaster will have special memories for coach Paddy Kirwan.

On September 27th, 1981 Oldham defeated the "Dons" by 38 points to 10 at Watersheddings and the current Roughyeds coach scored his only ever "hat trick" of tries in an Oldham senior game.





DAVE 'Nosey' Parker writes a cautionary tale of fund-raising in RL. With the possibility of a new stadium in Oldham, albeit one taking some considerable time in coming to frution. It is worth reading this article to see what might be involved.

I HAVE, for my sins, become involved with two money raising ventures in Rugby League over the last 18 months.

The first invitation came from my adopted town's Rugby League Club, Brighouse Rangers, in December 1996 and the second from my hometown Club of Halifax in October 1997. Rangers, one of the founder members of the RFL back in 1895 were planning a tour to New Zealand for their youth side, while the then Thrum Hall board were planning to move in with Halifax Town at the Shay and build a stadium for a future together.

I'm never one to say 'No', although I do have a lot on my plate, as they say. Whilst we had to raise around £17,000 to send off the under-16 side on 1st August, the Blue Sox have had to work to an original target of £140,000. It has been sheer graft to grind out £17,000, and it has been done with only half of the players' families getting involved. Never again would I take that on board and I just hope the lads will appreciate the effort when they are swanning around the North Island.

In contrast, by the weekend of June 13/14, the Halifax Stadium Appeal Committee as they have called themselves, will have raised £100,000 in six months and whilst the original figure is now £160,000 they should reach that by November - 12 months on.

The Football League Ground initiative Trust have weighed in with £480,000 and the work has never stopped on the site. The new North Terrace, as you may have seen on Sky Sports, was up in 12 weeks from start to finish and had to be to ensure Halifax Town could get back in the Football League if they won the GM Vauxhall Conference, while the South Stand end has been proving a problem in ensuring the footings were right in what was an old ash tipping site.

Now the stanchions and cross members are being bolted together for the stand and the Blue Sox have set a target for it to be ready by August 23 when they entertian Bradford Bulls, while Halifax Town would like a week earlier for their debut back in the Football League. In the meantime with the dinners, race nights, car boot sales, match collections, pubs and working mens clubs all doing their bit, the effort continues apace.

It is human nature to sit back and gloat on achieving something worthwhile and I certainly will when I see phase one completed. That will ensure they can both get 10-11,000 in the ground then, when phase two is completed, somewhere in the region of 15,000.

The projected costs of that are coming in at £1.7m – reckon £2m by the time they start. It will certianly be the stadium of the people because, apart from the Football League grant, no other funds will have come forward. However, to make that phase 2 successful the board, and whoever makes up their fund-raising sub-committee, will have to bring in corporate help – with many hoping that Halifax Plc will at long last get involved in supporting their two professional clubs in the town.

Obv iously, you Roughyed supporters, after the loss of your old Watersheddings Stadium and the original club, will be hoping for your own stadium as you climb back into your rightful place in the world of Rugby League – food for thought after reading this!



Don Yates looks back to a match from yesteryear

PROFESSIONAL rugby came to Doncaster in 1951. Their first match produced a 10-3 home victory over Wakefield Trinity and set them off on a satisfactory opening season which brought them 21 league wins and a respectable 11th place in the league table. Unfortunately Doncaster have never been able to surpass the achievements of that inaugural season. They did gain promotion to Super League four seasons ago and were actually top of the table briefly but, just like Oldham, their flirtation with the big time ended in relegation and almost oblivion.

Doncaster's record in cup competition is almost as disappointing. They have never won a cup competition although they did reach the final of the little known bottom 14 competition which

was staged in the spring of 1965.

The final was staged at Tattersfield, Doncaster on a Tuesday evening and attracted a crowd of 2,479. The line-up for the match, which was refereed by Oldham whistler Sam Shepherd, was as follows:

Doncaster: R. Astbury; Peter Goodchild, Graham Arrand, B. Kennedy, R. Roberts; E. Horsman, W. Charlton; Don Robinson, Ted Strawbridge, J. Holt, B. Saville, M. Smith and A. Redfearn.

Huddersfield: Brian Curry; T. Waqabaca, Ray Hayward (substitute Paul Longstaff), Bob Hagan, Ken Senior; Martin Calvert, B. Gascoigne; Peter Goddard, Don Close, Dave Heppleston, Brian Dobson, Frank Davies and Rob Valentine.

The match proved to be a scrappy affair but Huddersfield were deserved winners. They restricted Doncaster to just one try, scored by winger Roberts. Huddersfield led 8-3 at half-time and went on to win by 13 points to three. Bob Hagan, Ken Senior and Rob Valentine scored their tries and Brian Curry, later to join the Roughyeds, landed a couple of goals.

Doncaster's moment of glory was over and current form suggests that it could be quite a while before the Dons make a second cup final

appearance.

Making their first ever visit to Boundary Park this afternoon Doncaster will be hoping to brighten up what has been a pretty dismal season for them by pulling off their first ever victory in Oldham. The Dons did force a 9-9 draw at Watersheddings in March 1971 but they have won only two of their 28 previous matches against Oldham. The Roughyeds' biggest home victory in that sequence was a 46-2 win during March 1980. Wingers Eric Fitzsimmons (eight goals) and Geoff Munro (three tries) led the scoring but there was also a hattrick of tries from prop Steve Herbert that afternoon. Oldham's biggest away win against Doncaster came a couple of seasons later when, late in the campaign, they won 36-13 at Tattersfield. Centre Mick Parrish scored two tries and six goals in that match as he went on to play and score in every competitive Oldham match during that 1981-82 season. Doncaster's biggest win over the Roughyeds occurred in February 1994 when they won a fifth round Challenge Cup-tie 20-0, a result which brought about the resignation of Oldham coach Peter Tunks.


