ENVIRONMENT Secretary John Prescott's decision to approve Sports Park 2000, after a public enquiry, was just the tonic Oldham Roughyeds required as they prepared to square up to the demands of the Northern Ford Premiership.

A 30-0 defeat at Batley in the opening game put everyone at the club on a "downer", but four days later came the much-delayed and long-awaited verdict from the Government on the plans to centre a massive £20 million leisure complex around a new stadium on Clayton Playing Fields.

It was a thumbs-up for the stadium....and as far as professional sport in Oldham is concerned that was the most positive signal yet that both Oldham Roughyeds and Oldham Athletic can look to an uncertain future with at least a hint of confidence and conviction.

What disappoints and saddens me about the whole stadium issue is the amount of opposition to it within a borough, soon to celebrate its 150th Anniversary, which once boasted that, in many walks of life, its sons and daughters could match the achievements of the nation's best.

In the theatre, music and sport Oldham has a rich heritage going back across the 150 years that will be celebrated in some style this summer.

Sport has been to the forefront of Oldham life throughout the last century. Which northern town gave Walter Winterbottom, David Platt and many other big names in soccer? In the world of cricket no prizes for guessing where Michael Atheton was reared. Or which Central Lancashire League club gave Geoff Pullar to Lancashire and England, Malcolm Hilton, (the only man to bowl out Don Bradman twice in one match), to Lancashire and England, Jim Hilton to Somerset, Keith Andrew to Northants and Jack Dyson to Lancashire, not to mention his feats with Manchester City.

The list is endless. In Rugby League, Oldham men have played significant roles in the history of the sport since Joseph Platt became the breakaway code's first secretary in 1895.

The history of the game is filled with the achievement of Oldham men and Oldham teams, both at Watersheddings and on foreign fields.

In recent times, the town provided the Rugby League's Director of Coaching and later Great Britain boss in Phil Larder. It produced the man widely recognised as one of the leading marketing whizkids in sport, Peter Deakin.

And you've only to look around the leading clubs to pick an entire team of Oldhamers, from lestyn Harris at full-back to Paul Sculthorpe at loose-forward.

Why, it's only nine years since Athletic were in the semi-final of the Littlewood Cup at the same time as Oldham Rugby met Warrington in the semi-final of the Challenge Cup.

Latics got to Wembley, Oldham didn't. But what an achievement for a town the size of Oldham to produce semi-finalists in competitions of such stature.

Less than a decade on, times have changed. But how can so many Oldham people question or oppose a new stadium when towns like Warrington, Widnes and St. Helens, which don't even have a professional soccer team, are looking bravely to the future and putting their stadia in place?

In these days of centralisation, towns like Oldham are in grave danger of losing their identity and nothing gives them an identity more than pro football or rugby league teams. Whoever heard of Accrington?

A new stadium must be the centre point of Oldham professional sport into the next century. If not, the clubs could wither and die as the years unfold.

And once they've gone how much longer before other institutions fold? How much longer before Oldham becomes little more than north-east Manchester?

A cry from the heart. You bet it is. And I'll be crying right through the 150th birthday celebrations if the town fails to grasp the opportunities to set the stage for another 150 years of sporting achievements.

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WITH the season barely underway the Northern Ford Premiership already looks likely to be extremely competitive. Let us hope for a change in fortune so that we can get a regular pattern of weekly matches and some wins under our belt. And let's not be too critical of Feathersone who, rightly, were only trying to protect their own interests in wanting to get their game with Oldham played.



Local lad who escaped the net to go to Workington Town. Former BARLA international, Darren is equally at home at half back or in the forwards. This former Barrow Island player wrote himself into the record books with 42 points (including a record goals per match of 17) against Nottingham in 1994.

Another ex-BARLA international, this winger was known as the best finisher in the local amateur scene.

BRETT McDERMOTT

This ex-academy youngster will go a long way in the professional game. Unlucky with a major shoulder injury last season, his work rate and tackling will surely attract Super League if he can stay injury free.

Penrith based young forward who came out of Carlisle Border Raider's Academy side and from whom great things are expected this season.

TANE MANIHERA

Full name Tane Atva Ira Hohepa Manihera! Originally signed by Carlisle Border Raiders in 1995 from Christchurch City RLFC in New Zealand. This vastly skilled halfback briefly left Carlisle for pastures new in Widnes but is now back in his adopted county where he lives in Wigton. Plays fly half for Wigton RUFC alongside scrum half Darren Holt during his league off season.

DAMIEN WHITTER

Dynamic and hard running young prop who travels through to Barrow three times a week from his home in Warrington.

JONATHAN HUGHES

Another ex-Carlisle player who was originally imported from Waitakere Raiders in New Zealand in 1997. Did not play for the club in 1998 as he returned to New Zealand to finish his teacher's training course. Jonathan had some very big games for Carlisle at second row and he has only improved since then. Played for President's 13 last year in New Zealand.

GEOFF LUXON

This former London Broncos second row evergreen player is a real crowd favourite and improves with every game. Drives a bus for a living outside rugby.


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STUART RHODES

Now back playing for his hometown following Barrow's merger with Carlisle last year. Stuart played all last season at prop but is equally at home in the second row. Fast and hugely powerful. Turned down a recent and confident approach from Whitehaven and stayed faithful to his home town.

Recruited by coach Paul Charlton during his stay in Australia's Gold Coast. Originally a hooker with Gold Coast Chargers. He was amazed to discover that we had gyms and houses in England. Heaven alone knows what they are told about Pommie land over there!

MIKE 'BLUEY' KAVANAGH

Canny half back who can also play at hooker and loose forward. Originally signed by Carlisle from amateur club Askam for whom he still plays in the off season.

DARREN HOLT

This 1998 "Second Division Hooker of the Year" was originally signed by Carlisle from the very posh Lime House Boarding School where he had been spotted playing scrum half in Union games. Still plays the odd game of "lick and clap" for Wigton RUFC alongside his league team mate Tane Manihera. In fact they are the team.

GARY RUDDY

Carlisle's all time record try scorer in 1997 with 31 in the season and 5 in one match against Prescot. Surprisingly he hardly received a pass last season and barely made it into double figures following the Carlisle/Barrow merger. Gary has been playing Union for Carlisle RUFC in the offseason and amazingly for the Union game has seen plenty of ball and returned to his old scoring ways. Counties under 16. Cumbria v Lancs Academy League Express Man of the Match. Cumbria Australasian Tour 1st top try and point scorer. Cumbria under 19's school soccer, Cumbria 100m champion.

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DON LOOKS BACK TO A BARROW MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR



TONIGHT'S visitors to Spotland are Barrow, a club who have enjoyed more success in cup competitions than they have in Championship campaigns. In fact their only two Championship winning seasons have been the much disrupted wartime campaigns of season 1917-18 and 1918-19.

The Shipbuilders have also been Second Division Champions twice, in seasons 1975-76 and 1983-84. The team which won the

Second Division title in 1976 were a talented and hard working unit who led the table from start to finish after winning their opening ten league matches of that 1975-76 campaign. However, by the time that run was ended they had been eliminated from the Lancashire Cup at the first hurdle and from the Plavers No.6 Trophy after reaching round two only after an unimpressive victory over the amateurs of Pilkington Recs. Later in the season they were knocked out of the Challenge Cup by bottom club Doncaster but to compensate for those three cup disappointments, Barrow enjoyed a memorable run in the Floodlit Trophy. Barrow's route to the semi-final of the Floodlit Trophy came via two home victories. First of all they beat Leigh 12-7 and then avenged their Player Trophy elimination by beating Huddersfield 14-O. Their semi-final opponents, St.Helens, had won 15-7 at Rochdale and then recorded two impressive home victories over Whitehaven 38-10 and Hull 36-13. By the time that semi-final came round in early December, Barrow were six points clear at the top of Division Two but were still given no chance of winning at Knowsley Road. The teams for that semi-final were as



Barrow made a fine start to the tie despite losing Denis Jackson who was the victim of an early injury. He was replaced by Steve Martin, then a promising young Wagga Wagga utility back who was visiting Britain in order to pick up experience. His visit was a successful one and experience was not the only thing he picked up. He also won a Second Division Championship winners medal with Barrow although he had to wait two years before he got his hands on it. He picked it up during the 1978 Kangaroo tour of Europe after gaining international recognition following his move to the Manly club. A few years later Martin enjoyed a period coaching Featherstone Rovers. He and his halfback partner Frank Jones were particularly impressive for Barrow during the first half of this semi-final when the Shipbuilders moved into a 9-0 lead, all their points coming from experienced skipper and full-back Colin Tyrer with two tries, a goal and dropped goal. Unfortunately for the Shipbuilders, St.Helens, well led by Eric Chisnall, hit back strongly in the second-half when Les Jones (2) and Geoff Heaton scored tries which, with a Geoff Pimblett conversion, enabled Saints to snatch an 11-9 victory. Saints went on to lift the trophy with a comfortable victory over Dewsbury in the Final. They also won the Challenge Cup and Premiership Trophy that season but of all the ties which they played during that campaign, none could have been as difficult or exciting as that thrilling encounter with Barrow in the Floodlit Trophy.

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




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TODAY'S GUEST Roughy OBE



Alex Murphy

ALEX MURPHY OBE is undoubtedly one of the greatest players ever to lace up a rugby boot. Almost certainly he is the greatest half-back ever to grace the game. Nevertheless, when asked to sign an autograph at a recent dinner 'from the World's greatest scrum-half' Alex declined. Now, Alex is not noted for being backward at coming forward, but that modest gesture said a lot about his love of the game and his thoughts on his contemporaries and on current players rather than about his own monumental achievements. I suspect that Paul Wilson, who is currently preparing a biography of Alex will have his work cut out trying to prise information from him.

Alex revealed that his signing-on fee for St. Helens at midnight on his sixteenth birthday was £80, paid in two instalments. (By comparison Tom Van Vollenhoven received £8,000 to turn professional from South African Rugby Union). Saints probably got the bargain of all time! It emerged that he rated his first coach - Jim Sullivan - the greatest coach of all time; 'fifty years ahead of his time' in Alex's own words. And particularly, he singled out Sullivan's man management skills, an area he learned from in his own illustrious career which was to bring him nine Wembley appearances without losing and the distinction of being the only man ever to captain three different clubs (St. Helens, Leigh, and Warrington) to cup final victories.

Of his contemporaries Murphy mentioned Tom Van Vollenhoven, Brian Bevan, Billy Boston and Johnny Freeman – interestingly, all wingmen – as some of the finest he had played with. But he named Australian centre Reg Gasnier as the greatest player he had ever faced.


The 'hardmen' Alex came across included Derek Turner and Frank Foster, both of whom had spells at Oldham. 'If Frank said it were Sunday, it were bloody Sunday'! However, I got the impression that Alex was grateful that the two he rated hardest of all both played with him for St Helens. In the backs there was Dougie Greenall who, when asked why he was so nasty, replied 'Alex, I'm a professional: if I marked me mother she'd have to go!' And in the forwards, of course, there was Murphy's guardian angel the one and only Vince Karalius.

Recently Leigh held a dinner in honour of Alex to mark the award of his OBE. He was clearly very touched by this fine gesture and obviously has a soft spot for the town. Never one of RL's

greatest clubs, nor ever likely to be if only because of the size of the town, Leigh have nevertheless had their moments of glory, particularly when Alex was in command during one of his three separate spells as player and coach. He clearly loved Leigh's obsession with Rugby League and of players he coached there singled out Steve Donlan and John Woods – 'a world-class player who never quite got the recognition he deserved' – for special mention.



Of modern coaching methods, Alex was baffled by coaches who sit in the back of the stand. He clearly favoured a seat on the bench, explaining 'when things aren't going quite right for a player he needs a bit of help. How can you help him when you're sat in the stand?'

On tactics Murphy clearly believed in the value of a good goalkicker. 'If the opposition had a good kicker then you knew you couldn't take too many chances in that game'. One of his best signings, he said, was Steve Hesford for Warrington who was worth maybe 300 points a season. 'He could kick goals from behind the stand' was Alex's typical hyperbolic statement. And, of course, we all know Murphy's own prowess with the drop goal, so much so that the Rugby League actually reduced its value from two points to one. "I suppose I'll just have to kick twice as many" was the typical Murphy riposte when guizzed about the RL's decision by the press.

Finally, of the current scene Murphy observed that most half-backs these days lack pace. Although many of them, like Bobby Goulding, are good fastballers they can't make 50 yard breaks to score tries. On this basis he rated Sean Long and Ryan Sheridan as the pick of the current crop.

IVA'S CHALLENGE:

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BARROW JOINED the Northern Union just after the turn of the century in time to take part in the 1900-01 season. At this point in time the teams were still 15-a-side and the league structure was regionalised, so the "Shipbuilders" duly took their place in the Lancashire senior competition.

As it happened their inaugural senior fixture was at home to Oldham on September 8th 1900. Naturally this was the opening day of the season and the "Roughyeds" returned home with a six points to three victory, courtesy of a try each for the right wing pairing of Sam Williams and his centre lke Taylor. The return match was just two weeks later when Oldham completed the double at Watersheddings by eight points to two. The Oldham points came from tries from Joe Lawton and Rob Potter with one conversion from Sam Lees. Oldham would go on to win the league competition with Barrow finishing in a respectable eighth position in their first season.

The most famous encounter between the two teams was the 1954 Lancashire Cup Final. That day belonged to Barrow who secured their first major trophy by recording a twelve points to two victory at a rain soaked Station Road, Swinton.


Coming right up to date and I'm sure all the "Roughyeds" faithful will remember that Barrow were one of the eight teams who made up last seasons second division and were involved in four fixtures with Oldham in 1998.

The honours were even with each team winning its' home matches. Oldham won the first match on May 17th 13 - 4 at Boundary Park. This was a torrid forward battle that was effectively won by a superb length of the field effort from Chris Eckersley and followed that victory with a 32 - 8 win at Spotland.

Two weeks later Oldham suffered a 19 - 2 reverse on their first trip to Craven Park and Barrow completed the home double with a 31 - 20 victory on August 30th.

The Oldham team that day was: S Wilde; A Mead, A Leuila, B Quinlan, R Darkes; P Crook, C Barker;

P Round, J Hough, M Edwards, T Nadiole, M Maders, I Sinfield. SUBS: E Jackman, N Varley, M Martindale, J Clegg. Brian Quinlan kicked 6 goals with tries from John Hough and Emerson Jackman.

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
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Eighty-nine years ago, on Saturday 12th March 1910, Oldham met Barrow in a League Championship match up at Cavendish Park, then the headquarters of the Barrow club but now the home of Marsh Hornets amateurs. The Roughyeds won 11-6 with tries from loose-forward Joe Owens, winger George Smith and stand-off Tom White who also added a goal. Barrow's points came from tries scored by prop A.Hannah and winger S.Treloar.

It was on this day in 1949, Saturday 12th March, that France defeated England 12-5 in a European Championship match which was staged at Wembley. Surprisingly, it is the only full international involving France which has been played in London.

Twenty-three years later, on Sunday 12th March 1972, France were again in action in England, this time at Bradford where they met Great Britain.

The French were not so successful on that occasion, Britain winning 45-10. Current Barrow coach Paul Charlton was a try scorer in that match, one of 223 tries he scored in a career which spanned 727 appearances including 19 tests. One of the British substitutes was Oldham's Bob Irving whilst at hooker was Mick Stephenson (Dewsbury), Stevo of SkyTV fame.

It is to be hoped that the weather tonight is better than it was on Wednesday 12th March 1958. That day a 'tour trial' was staged at Swinton between the 'Whites' and the 'Greens'. The game was played in a blizzard and abandoned after 68 minutes, not really the kind of weather for assessing players to tour in the heat of Australia. For the record, the 'Whites' beat the 'Greens' 22-10. There were three Roughyeds in the 'Whites' line-up, centre Denis Ayres who scored a try, scrum-half Frank Pitchford and secondrower Charlie Winslade.



Brett Goldspink

It was on this day in 1995, Sunday 12th March, that the Perth Western Reds played their first competitive match. They beat St.George 28-16 in an Australian Premiership match at the WACA ground before what proved to be their biggest ever crowd, 24,392. Playing prop for the Reds that afternoon was Brett Goldspink, later to star for the Bears and, surprise, surprise, St.George's fiery prop Gorden Tallis spent ten minutes in the sin bin.

On that same aftenoon, Sunday 12th March 1995, St.Annes defeated Higginshaw 22-14 in a hard fought Standard Cup semi-final which was staged at Hollinwood whilst the Furness based amateur club, Millom, had a much easier afternoon. They pulled off their biggest ever

victory when they won at Nottingham City 114-6 in a National Conference, First Division match. Hooker Steve Miles scored five of Millom's 21 tries that afternoon and stand-off Paul Tyson fmished with two tries and 15 goals. A well known character in Barrow rugby circles is diminutive half-back Steve Rea. He began his career with Holker Pioneers, played professionally with both Barrow and Carlisle and is now coach of Walney Central. It was on this day in 1989, Sunday 12th March, that Rea made his debut for Carlisle. He was a substitute in the Carlisle side which lost 14-4 at Dewsbury in a Second Division match. Rea made 27 appearances for Carlisle and scored thirteen tries before returning to Craven Park in September 1991.

Anyone for winter rugby?

Not, I trust, in Oldham!

After three weeks of competition in the Northern Ford Premiership, the Roughyeds are lying at the bottom of the league, despite having only lost one match, by an admittedly

decisive 30-0 scoreline at Batley.

Since then, despite a good run in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup, Oldham have played no more league matches. The home game against Featherstone Rovers has been postponed twice, because of the heavy state of the Spotland pitch. And last weekend the Roughyeds' away game at Hull Kingston Rovers was also postponed, after the appalling weather on Humberside.

So it was ironic last week to hear Richard Evans, the Chairman of Featherstone, on Radio 5 Live calling for a return to winter rugby. I'm afraid that Richard, and those who think like him, are living in the past, in a different world. Perhaps Richard should be asked to explain his desire for winter rugby to the Oldham fan who travelled all the way to Hull Kingston Rovers last Sunday, only to find the match called off. Unfortunately you can never re-visit the past. It's about time we all realised that Rugby League should now be a vibrant summer sport that we can all feel good about, as we sip our coke and munch our barbecued sausages. Rugby League has made enormous gains from the switch in seasons, although many clubs have yet to come to terms with the magnitude of the switch.

This season the competition for the Northern Ford Premiership looks like being a thriller, right through to the Grand Final on 25 September. What a summer in prospect! I would hate to predict a winner, although Hunslet Hawks seem to be setting the early pace, to judge from their 14-8 win at Batley Bulldogs last Sunday.

And if you look at the NFP league table, as it was published on Monday in Rugby League Express you'll notice that the club in second place is Barrow, tonight's opponents at Spotland.

Has any club got a greater Rugby League history than the club from the Furness peninsula? In the 1950s they were up there with the Roughyeds, as one of the top sides in the game. But unlike Oldham, as I won't need to remind tonight's older supporters, Barrow went to Wembley three times. In 1955 they won the Challenge Cup, defeating Workington 21-12 at Wembley, and in 1951 and 1957 they lost to Wigan (10-0) and Leeds (9-7) respectively. Great names like Willie Horne, Phil Jackson, Frank Castle and Reg Parker characterised Barrow teams from those days, and it would be good to see them and the Roughyeds building up to those heights again.

Weather permitting, I hope we are in for another thriller this evening.
