

I MAKE no apology for once again using the facility of the Roughyeds match-day magazine, to which I am invited to contribute, to push for public support of the proposed new stadium in Oldham.

As an avid reader of the paper that employs me - like you, I hope - I have been following closely the lively debate on the stadium issue in letters to the editor.

One or two points have struck me forcibly, not least the vast amount of column inches devoted to political and social issues thrown up by the stadium proposals, but comparatively few letters discussing what the stadium is all about - sport.

We hear constantly about John Battye, Hire Target, the Clayton Action Group, B & Q, the Council, road congestion, town greens, but very little indeed about what it would all mean to Oldham Roughyeds, Oldham Athletic, sport in the town at amateur level and the possible provision of more sporting facilities in a town with great traditions of sporting excellence.

Why should this be? Is no one interested in the sporting issues? Are the pro-stadium elements complacent? Are they apathetic? Why is it that stadium debate has become a battle ground for legal politics?

There are many people inside and outside the Chronicle who are far better qualified than I to debate the aforementioned political and social matters - and debate must have its place in the democratic order of things.

It seems to me, however, that the silent majority are once again missing a wonderful opportunity to take part in that debate. The "antis" would have us believe that the whole town is vigorously opposed to the stadium; that it is some sort of play-thing for John Battye; that the only other people who want it are the Roughyeds because they don't have a stadium of their own anyway.

In short, it is time for those with an interest in Oldham sport - be it rugby league, soccer, rugby union, a variety of other winter sports or even traditional summer activities such as cricket and bowls - to stand up and be counted.

What do YOU think of the new stadium? What could it do for YOUR sport, or YOUR team? What could it do for future generations of sports loving Oldhamers, who no longer have Watersheddings and whose much loved Boundary Park (and rugby folk who 'lost' Watersheddings will surely know how Latics fans feel about BP) is rapidly growing old and being left behind in the race to put new stadiums in towns all around the country?

In my home town of Rochdale we have Morrisons on the old Athletic Grounds and Asda on that former bastion of CLL cricket and stage for many of world cricket's immortals, Dane Street. What would the late, great Cec Pepper have had to say about that?

Time moves on, of course. But there is a serious threat to our home town traditions and institutions - and most of you reading this will be Oldhamers - if the old is not replaced by the new.

Watersheddings WAS old. Boundary Park IS old. Not a million miles from here there are new stadiums housing new sports imported from across the Atlantic and already proving immensely popular.

Oldhamers, you can search for many heroes in your sporting history and find them in their hundreds. In the new century there will be hundreds more in the sports that are part of our national heritage such as soccer and rugby, of both codes.

We must not fail future generations. Agree? Then stand up and be counted and get out your pen and paper to tell the world.




We have to get some consistency: if we get that in our performances then the results will follow.

THROUGHOUT the last decade 'expansion' has been the buzz-word in rugby. In Australia the rivalry between the ARL and Super League spawned a host of new clubs. Yet, even before the current merger of interests in the new NRL, clubs were being dumped. Gone are Perth Western Reds, Adelaide Rams, South Queensland Crushers and Gold Coast Chargers, none of which were in areas duplicating existing teams and tapping into a pre-existing support base as with the Hunter Mariners. Now Penrith Panthers, ARL Champions but a decade ago, are also under threat while Illawarra Steelers have had to merge with St. George Dragons to secure any kind of future. Can you imagine that? It is like St. Helens and Wigan being forced to combine to preserve the future of the game! And we all saw how popular the idea of mergers was in England back in 1995. So if Australia, World leaders in rugby league, cannot sustain teams in major centres like Perth, Adelaide or Penrith what price expansion in Britain?

All of which brings me to the recent comments of Wigan Coach John Monie and his Oldham based Chairman Peter Norbury. Speaking on GMR Monie said, "I don't think that moving 25 Australians up to Gateshead is really a good move" . . . "If I had anything to do with it I'd take an area like Cumbria that has good grass roots and has always been a rugby league place, and I would try and get a team up there".

Welcome to the Club, John! Because isn't this what many of us have been saying for years.

And Peter Norbury went even further:" I may be proved wrong, but I can't see how Gateshead in the long term is going to

survive" . . . "Why don't we find areas that are already strong in rugby, and why don't we put money into them?" . . . "I would far rather we were putting money into the existing clubs in strongholds of Rugby League, and supporting those clubs, than on frolics that are probably doomed to failure".

After nearly 20 years in various guises London Broncos still operate largely on the basis of Australian players. How many Londoners have played for the London clubs? And in a city of over eight million London have yet to prove they can attract a bigger audience than, say, Widnes. Now don't get me wrong; I am not advocating that London be disbanded and I sincerely hope that the Broncos can defeat Castleford to secure a place at Wembley, if only so that Shaun Edwards and Martin Offiah, two of Rugby League's all-time greats, can grace the hallowed turf once more. But doesn't it make you wonder if all the money spent in London had been spent differently, say in buying a stadium to provide a permanent base instead of pursuing a nomadic existence, then a better outcome might have been achieved than is currently the case?

And doesn't it also make you wonder if with a little more fairness the likes of Doncaster, Workington and Oldham might have been saved from ruination by their flirtation with Super League? And shouldn't Keighley and Batley have had their chance after winning promotion fair and square? And what price Wakefield with every conceivable obstacle put in their way?

Yes, what price "expansion"? Perhaps someone would like to provide us with a cost-benefit analysis of the last ten years!







A CHRISTMAS FAIRY! I Think Not!



CHRISTMAS Fairy! – Not a recommended outburst just before the Boxing Day clash of the front rows of a rugby league pack, especially when the opposing prop happens to be John Brian Hogan! Not unless you wanted a 'Quick kiss on the misletoe'!

A welcome 1981 Christmas present from Widnes was how the arrival of England forward Brian Hogan was greeted. What the Oldham fans were not to know was that Hogan would have returned to his old club by the cessation of the following Christmas festitivites. Not the longest servant the Roughyeds ever had on their books!

Brian Hogan played just 34 matches for the Oldham Club, enough though, to seal the 1981/2 second division championship and provide a springboard to gain a top eight spot in the following season's first division — a feat not achieved by the Club for over 20 years!

The long haired firebrand never outstayed his welcome. Aged 33 on his arrival at Watersheddings, Hogan's CV already boasted spells at St Helens, Wigan, Workington, Bradford, Widnes, back to Wigan, and on again to Widnes. As short as Brian Hogan's stay at Oldham was, he will remain one of the most fondly remembered and often talked about players in the history of the Club.

Today Brian Hogan (aged 51) lives with his wife in St. Helens and is the Sales Manager for a window manufacturer. He is not involved within the game in any official capacity but keeps an interest watching the sport on TV and paying the occasional visit with Doug Laughton to Knowsley Road.

Along with the reputation of being one of the best ball playing forwards the sport has ever produced, also went the reputation 'Do not light the blue touch paper' (not ever!). Not admitting to the number of times he was dismissed during his career, it is amazing therefore that Brian's attitude to rugby is the same as it is to life itself: 'It's nice to be nice'.

Hogan well remem-bers the call from the then Oldham Coach and ex-Widnes star Frank Myler looking for on the field direction for his young, up and coming stars Ashton, Worrall, Flanagan, Goodway, Kirwan etc.

Not taking too much persuasion Hogan arrived for his first training stint at a snowbound 'Sheddings. Myler explained that due to the unplayable state of the training pitch the session would be held in the Counthill School gym. Told to run up Counthill Road to 'Limber up', Myler would then take the opportunity to introduce Hogan to his new team mates. Never known for his enthusiastic approach to training. Hogan expected to play the

following Sunday no way would his legs take that amount of stress and strain and far better to relax his aching limbs in the Watersheddings bath. Thus Hogan was introduced to his new mates – still in the bath! It worked. Making his debut at home to Huyton he was nominated Man of the Match!

Starting his career as a ball playing centre to St Helens crack winger Tom Van Vollenhoven, Hogan moved into the second row before making his name at prop. He remembers with amusement the times during his debut that Vollenhoven was bundled into touch after the defence swallowed his outrageous dummies!

Hogan rates Castleford's 18 stone prop Dennis Hartley the hardest and toughest opponent he ever played against. Describing himself as 'a big, fit, young lad'



suggested that if he was 1983. Return to Widnes. Hogan in the Widnes front row. Oldham win

who could 'Run a bit', 'fight a bit' and 'play a bit', he names Vince Karalius and Doug Laughton as having the most influence on his career and Tommy Bishop as the best on-field organiser and handler of a rugby ball. He played in 2 Challenge Cup finals and 5 times for England.

It best sums up the man and the player that soon after his return to Widnes (probably the only player ever to sign for the same Club 3 times!) Oldham were the visitors and the young Watersheddings team ended the match 23-13 victors. Despite being hit in the back pocket, Hogan privately took great pride in that Oldham performance. Hogan was sent off for a 'stiff arm' on Mick Morgan!

John Brian Hogan enjoyed his contribution to rugby league – the best years of his life.



Down Memory Lane

DON LOOKS BACK TO A WIDNES MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR





THERE is no doubt that from the mid-70s to the mid-90s the successful club in Britain were Widnes. During that period the Chemics collected no fewer than 28 major trophies and involved numerous high profile matches. The most sensational occasion during this glittering era for Widnes came at Old Trafford in October 1989 when the Chemics met Canberra for the World Club Challenge.

Widnes had qualified for that final by first winning the 1988-89 Stones Bitter Championship and then defeating French Champions St. Esteve 60-6 in a one-sided European play-off. The visit of Widnes to Oldham that season proved to be another memorable occasion, if only for the thunder, lightening and spectacular hailstorm which battered Watersheddings throughout the Chemics' 35-16 victory.

In the meantime Canberra were winning the Australian Premiership for the first time in their short history. But they were doing so the hard way. They ended their league programme in fourth position in the league table so faced a difficult path to the final through the play-offs. First of all they beat Cronulla 31-10, then eliminated Penrith 27-18 before reaching the final with a 32-16 victory over South Sydney. The Grand Final against Balmain attracted a ground record attendance of 40,500 to the Sydney Football Stadium, Balmain, with Andy Currier in their line-up, led 12-2 at half-time in a thrilling encounter which went into extra time after Canberra had fought back to equalise at 14-14. A dropped goal from former Oldham stand-off Chris O'Sullivan broke the deadlock before Canberra added a late try which saw them crowned Champions with a 19-14 winning scoreline.

So the action moved on to Old Trafford where a crowd of 30,786 saw the following two teams line up to do battle:

Canberra began in sensational fashion, scoring tries through Mal Meninga and Chris O'Sullivan in the opening eleven minutes. Matthew Wood converted both and such was Canberra's superiority at that stage that a rout looked on the cards. However, Widnes stuck to their task and by half-time they were back in contention after first Paul Hulme and then Martin Offiah scored. It was during the opening fifteen minutes of the second half that Widnes grabbed the initiative. Jonathan Davies scored an early try, taking a reckless, head high tackle from Laurie Daley in the process. Daley was duly sin binned and by the time he returned both Martin Offiah and Richard Eyres had scored further tries to put Widnes 24-12 in front. Darren Wright was next to score and a third goal from Jonathan Davies saw Widnes stretch their lead to 30-12. Steve Walters scored a late try for Canberra converted by Chris O'Sullivan but that was where the scoring ended

Widnes were 30-18 winners and Champions of the World following a superb evening's entertainment which was undoubtedly the highlight of a glorious chapter in the history of the Widnes club.



Rugby League World editor GRAHAM CLAY was in the crowd at Sydney's Olympic Stadium as Australia claimed the record for a Rugby League crowd.

EARLIER this month - on March 6th, to be precise -Australia's new Olympic Stadium in Sydney opened

its gates for the first time and immediately welcomed a new world record crowd.

Odsal's proud claim to fame had been snatched away after 45 years. The 102,569 that stood on railway sleepers and steep dirt bankings had finally been overtaken, a feat many people never believed would happen.

And as a lonely Pom present at the big night and my grandad who'd been at Odsal in '54 would expect it of me - I had to argue, maybe it didn't.

The official figure was 104,583, on the face of it a new League record. But amid the celebrations, I continued to wave the flag for Britain. Was it really time to re-write the record books?

Allow me to put my case.

The event was a double header, not a one-off like the Halifax-Warrington Challenge Cup Final replay.

And if you take into account the changeover between the departing Manly and Newcastle fans after the first game, and those arriving purely for the second game between Parramatta and St George-Illawarra, I doubt whether there were actually 104,583 inside the stadium at the same

Officials admitted that when the first game kicked off, only 89,000 were inside the stadium.

And while it is indisputable that 104,583 people passed through the turnstiles at some stage of the evening, another suit leaked out that the crowd peaked at just over 100,000.

But I'm being a spoilsport. Let the Aussies wallow in their glory.

Because there's one thing they will never take from us Brits.

Atmosphere.

Even with 100,000 plus inside the monolithic heap of concrete and steel, the noise wasn't on a par with even a run-of-the-mill League game over here. I can honestly say that 15,000 screaming Bulls fans at Odsal make more noise than the Sydneysiders managed.

Prior to Sydney, the biggest crowd I had been

in was the 98,000 who saw Brett Kenny's Wigan defeat Peter Sterling's Hull at Wembley in 1985.

Now that was a crowd, and legend has it that another 10,000 people were crammed in Wembley Stadium that day!

Maybe the relative silence in Oz was because arriving fans were simply knocked breathless by the sheer scale of the place. It is, in every sense, a gigantic stadium.


Its own sprawling road and rail network, the huge escalators that transport you forever upwards, the arching roof that would comfortably span four jumbo jets, the world's biggest video screens.

Entering the stadium is like walking into a posh hotel. All the public concourses are thickly carpeted and frosted glass walls flank each level.

Then you step out into a small section and the enormity of it all smacks you in the face. Down each touchline, tier after tier of seating reach skyward, sandwiching row after row of corporate hospitality boxes.

At each end, slabs of seating stretch endlessly backwards. Looking out on this great expanse, you can just make out the bodies of

hundreds of people streaming in like scurrying ants.

It really is an incredible feat of architecture.

But strangely, bits of it are only temporary. After the Olympic Games next year, the two ends will be down-sized to reduce the capacity to a mere 80,000.

The whole thing was designed with this in mind. Apparently, officials reckon its capacity will be tested only six times before the Games, and therefore the ends have been built with a maximum life span of just five years!

The rebuilding of the ends will mean that the stadium will transform into a rectangular shape.

but in the meantime, Stadium Australia - to give it its official name - has a quaint tribute to the stadium that previously held the world record.


Just like Odsal, it has stick-down artificial corners!

First Time-Last Time

TODAY WE welcome Widnes, one of the founder members of the Northern Union in 1895. In that first season after the "breakaway", our first Northern Union clash with the "Chemics" took place at Widnes on October 26th 1895. The Roughveds returned with the points after a 13-0 victory and completed the double at Watersheddings on February 15th 1896. This time the margin was 21-0. The Oldham points came from two tries converted from Jack Hurst and one each from Arthur Lees and Tom Martin, Sam Lees converted three of the tries and Harry Eagland landed a penalty goal. It is interesting to note that in those days the try was worth three points, the conversion two points and the penalty goal three points. The attendance was 10,000 and the Oldham team was as follows:

H. Eagland; T. Martin, S. Lees, W. McCutcheon, J. Hurst; H. Varley, A. Lees; E. Bosner, E. Hughes, J. Merrill, R. Edwards, R. Wylie, A. Childs, E. Etchells, F. Worrall

Coming right up to date Widnes defeated the

"Roughyeds" in a pre season friendly game in January this year by twenty points to six. The last senior match between the two teams was in the Challenge Cup last season. This was a third round tie played at the revamped Naughton Park/Autoquest Stadium on February 1st. The Vikings proved too strong for Oldham in this first match for the re launched club against senior opposition after they had defeated the York amateur outfit, Heworth in the previous round. The final score of 48-8 underlined the superiority of the home team in front of a good attendance of over four and a half thousand spectators.





On This Day





Eleven years later, on Saturday 28th March 1992, Wigan met Bradford Northern in another Challenge Cup semi-Final which was staged at Burnden Park, the old Bolton Wanderers soccer ground. It was expected to be a close match but Wigan winger Martin Offiah put paid to that theory by running in five tries as the pie-eaters coasted to an astonishing 71-IO victory.

Leigh registered an even more comfortable victory on this day in 1976, Sunday 28th March. That day they entertained Doncaster in a Second Division match and beat them 75-3. Centre Mick Stacey led the scoring spree with two tries and 15 goals and there was also a try for former Oldham scrum-half Cliff Sayer. Another former Roughyed in the Leigh line-up that afternoon was prop-forward Geoff Fletcher.

In 1982, Sunday 28th March, Oldham were running up the points when Blackpool Borough visited Watersheddings for a Second Division match. The Roughyeds won 66-7 with winger Geoff Munro running in four tries and centre Mick Parrish claiming 27 points with three tries and nine goals. Parrish played and scored in every Oldham match throughout that 1981-82 season.

Next weekend is Easter which means the staging of the Standard Cup Final. On Good Friday, 28th March 1975 the trophy went out of town to Rochdale after Mayfield had defeated Higginshaw 11-5 in the final.

Eleven years later, Good Friday 28th March 1986, Mayfield were again in the final although on that occasion Waterhead lifted the trophy, winning 13-8. That day a substitute, Waterhead's Gary Dobbs, was awarded the Ben Powell Trophy as man of-the-match.

A further eleven years on, Good Friday 28th March 1997, Dobbs was again a Standard Cup winner although he was playing against Waterhead that day when Saddleworth Rangers won the trophy 25-12. Full-back Kevin Fitzpatrick, now a member of the Roughyeds' Alliance team, was a try scorer in that final. Next weekend the final will be played on Easter Monday 5th April at Boundary Park with an 11.00am kick-off and it's Shaw Rhinos v. Waterhead.

Staying with the amateurs, twelve months ago, Saturday 28th March 1998 was a mixed day for our local amateurs. Waterhead recovered from a 14-6 deficit to draw 15-15 at home to Haydock, Watersheddings Wanderers won 24-20 at Silsden Park Rangers after trailing 10-0 early on but the Higginshaw 'come back' was not so successful. They were losing 30-4 early in the second half at Folly Lane and, although they staged a stirring revival, they still lost 38-20. Both our Conference League clubs won however. Saddleworth Rangers beat Walney central 44-21 at Greenfield where that man Kevin Fitzpatrick again scored a try and St.Annes won 30-24 at Beverley where the Saints full-back Mark Whitehead went one better, he scored two tries.
