



BOB IRVING - "ABOVE ALL HELPER OF THE HELPLESS"

THE sudden death in Blackpool last month of former Oldham forward Bob Irving, at the age of 51, stunned thousands of rugby league enthusiasts who watched Oldham in the sixties and Wigan in the seventies.

Bob was the type of bloke we thought was indestructible . . . strong as an ox, a terrific athlete in his playing days, a man who always looked after himself and, as he proved so often in the later years of a busy life, a Christian with a heart of gold and a deep desire to help those who were less fortunate than himself and his family.

He rang me last December in search of another journalist's telephone number and, during the conversation, he told me briefly of the work he was doing for Catholic charities in the Fylde, with particular emphasis on the job he and his wife Jenny were doing in setting up and running soup kitchens for the homeless.

He had heard that Jason Robinson was involved with a similar project in the Moss Side district of Manchester and he felt the journalist whose number he was seeking might be in a position to publicise the plight of the homeless in the North West and the need to recruit voluntary workers.

I told Bob that, once Christmas was over, I would ring him back for another chat with a view to writing a piece in the Oldham Chronicle about the role being played by a former Watersheddings star in the care of the homeless in Blackpool and beyond.

I never did make that call . . . and the next I knew of Bob was the sad news of his death, relayed to me in a telephone call from a distraught Lew Laverty.

I was overwhelmed by the feeling that I had let the side down; that Bob would never have been so careless when dealing with an issue that clearly meant a great deal to him.

Those feelings were reinforced at his Requiem Mass in St Cuthbert's RC Church, Blackpool, when Father Peter Draper referred to his "fierce determination" to fight for the hungry and the homeless.

Father Draper revealed that on the day Bob died from a heart attack he was due to travel to London on behalf of the Catholic community in the Fylde to attend a course in public speaking.

And he went on: "He was acutely aware of the hungry, both locally and throughout the world. He had no time for red tape or administration. If somebody was hungry, he wanted to feed him. He just wanted to get on with it."

It was a measure of the esteem in which he was held by the Catholic faith in the Blackpool area that the celebration of the Mass was shared by three parish priests and a deacon

Rugby League in Oldham was represented in force by many well-known former players and officials, including Joe Collins, who played in the team when Bob made his debut as a 16-year-old in 1965, and John Etty, a fellow member of the Watersheddings Hall of Fame.

Graham Starkey, who coached Bob at both Oldham and Wigan and whose close friendship spanned 30 years, made a moving tribute in which he spoke of Bob the man and Bob the rugby league player.

His feats on the rugby field have been well chronicled and are also given in detail elsewhere in this programme.

Suffice it for me to say that he was a fighter to the end . . . that the drive and determination which took him to the top in his chosen sport enabled him, in later years, to champion the cause of the hungry and the homeless, those who had fallen on hard times and those who had a genuine need.

He set an example to those of us who tend to "pass by on the other side" or those who are so pre-occupied with our own lives that we forget to return telephone calls which might have helped others.

The world is a poorer place for the passing of Bob Irving, rugby league star, business and family man, devoted member of the Catholic community and, above all, helper of the helpless.






FROM The Editor

HAVE Rugby League fans become armchair viewers and listeners? I ask this question because awareness of the sport nationally has probably never been higher, yet bums on seats are hard to come by and getting harder by the week. Sky T.V. coverage has enhanced the game's image nationally and the Summer Conference League is evidence that Sky has reached the parts others cannot reach. At regional level BBC 2's commendable Monday night magazine programme is a major break through. With G.M.R. and Radio Lancashire and other regional broadcasters producing midweek magazine programmes on radio the devoted League fan is almost overwhelmed with choice. Now comes the news that Talk Radio is switching its Monday night 'Rugby' slot from Union to League because League fans have proved more enthusiastic in 'phoning in than the followers of Union.


So, having said all this, why is it that attendances at matches are so alarmingly low? Throughout the Northern Ford Premiership clubs are struggling to attract support. At half of the clubs 1,000 would be a good gate: at the other half 2,000 is a rarity rather than a regular feature. And all this despite the fact that the product on the field is actually quite decent. Teams try to play attractive football and many games are hard fought, nailbiting encounters that lack only the atmosphere that a decent crowd can generate.

And, in case you thought, given all the resources poured into Super League, that things were substantially better in the higher echelons. think again! True, Bradford Bulls, Leeds Rhinos and St. Helens can attract some decent gates. But Wigan Warriors, the dominant force in the game for so long, are down to about half the gates they commanded as little as three years ago. Castleford Tigers and Warrington Wolves have probably added a few to their numbers on the back of improved results. And as for the rest? Well 1,500 at Gateshead is a disaster. Struggling for 3,000 at Sheffield, London and Salford, or 4,000 at Huddersfield, Hull, Halifax and Wakefield is not much better. So alarming is the situation that there are doubts whether some clubs in both leagues can survive the season. And relegation from Super League almost certainly means oblivion for whichever club suffers, as Oldham

Bears and Paris St. Germain found to their cost.

I fear that unless someone in authority addresses the game's problems as a matter of urgency within a matter of a couple of years the game as we know it will no-longer exist. Am I going over the top? Time will tell. I would wish to be totally wrong in my perception of the current situation, but I am only too fearful that my view is accurate.

In the last home match programme a comment appeared which implied that York Wasps had failed to comply with salary cap regulations in season 1998. We wish to point out that this is not the case and that York Wasps did indeed fulfil their obligations under the salary cap. We wish to apologise to the Directors of York Wasps R.L.F.C. for this error.







"For Better Or Worse In

CENTRE threequarter Joe Collins signed for the Oldham club in 1964 making his debut against Liverpool in a team that included Malcolm Price, Frank Dyson, Vince Nestor, Harry Mayor and Charlie Bott. It was the season after those famous Challenge Cup Semis against Hull K. R. and the club was playing in the new format one division. Joe's last match was against Widnes in 1973 - the time most supporters remember as the Frank Foster, Cliff Hill era. Nine seasons. You could write a volume about the changes the club experienced during that time!

An Oldhamer through and through Joe still supports the current crop of Roughyeds, home and away.



THE REAR bedroom window of No.74. Sharples Hall Street now looks out over the roof tops of 'Old Rugby Green', a development of houses, being built on the hallowed Mecca of local rugby, Watersheddings. Three generations of our family were previously able to check the weather, spaces on the terraces and queues at the turn-stiles, before leaving to join friends for the much awaited kick off, just by glancing out of this window!

Little did anyone realise how much effort was needed, behind the scenes, to create the rush of adrenalin for crowd and players alike, as the team for the day jogged down the tunnel, onto that lush green turf....that sloped dramatically from right to left, but who cared, providing we won the toss and the match!

To get to the tunnel players walked amongst the fans, not all of whom were friendly, down steep steps that accounted for many a last minute change of studs or even to the team sheet. Players changed in "extended" changing rooms that hadn't been designed with room for a team and two substitutes, never mind four. Match day preparations were preceded by two nights training (plus extra for cup ties) spent on the roads, on the dirt sprint track, or on the training ground, all of which were only a candle away from being pitch black. Weight training involved a barbell and half a dozen weights or you could carry a colleague, or your half of a railway sleeper up and down the touchline. Science and diet played little or no part in training.

Then, training kit, washed and dried on the boiler, by "Little Jimmy" was issued on a first come, first served basis, vital in winter, if one was to avoid split seams or holes in shirts, jumpers or track suit bottoms, (never did see a top) training boots were handed

down, kept alive for years after their original owners had retired by "Little Joe", (my first training boots still bore Billy Mitchell's name).

Midweek refreshments were provided by the resident, and hardworking tenant of the pavilion offering a variety of sandwiches, bowls of onions, beetroots and red cabbage, but only for players who washed and brushed faster than the rest. Last there went hungry! Even travelling was a chore, a trip to Cumbria meant meeting at 7.30am outside Barlows Coaches and returning after midnight, sore, tired and weary.

However, I firmly believe that not one of the 1054 senior team players who have graced the Watersheddings turf would have let the sometimes difficult backroom activities tarnish their pride in wearing the red/white hoops, blue shorts and red/white socks in front of some of the greatest, most knowledgable, fans in this great sport of ours.

Don't let cherished memories cloud the need for progress, the stadium announced recently is a must! Who in their right minds doesn't want ample local parking, clean dry seating, tiled toilets, meeting rooms, lounge facilities and a flat, smooth playing field with uninterrupted views. I'd like to think that the next three generations looking out from the bedroom window of No.74 Boundary Park

Road would always look out on a successful, well maintained facility that benefits Rugby League in Oldham.



DON LOOKS BACK TO A WHITEHAVEN MATCH FROM YESTERYEAR



RUGBY League is firmly established in west Cumbria where strength of the amateur game has never been greater and where the three professional outfits plod along despite the fact that all three have known better times. Barrow and Workington Town each has a history which tells of trophies won and includes Wembley. visits to Whitehaven, on the other hand, have never made the Wembley final. In fact the Whitehaven first team have never played in any sort of final nor have they

won any major trophy. Their highest league placing came in the 1959-60 season when they finished in sixth spot and also provided five players to the Cumberland team which lifted the County Championship. It was in March of that season when Whitehaven's Recreation Ground held its biggest ever attendance with 18,650 packed into the stadium to see Whitehaven meet Wakefield Trinity in the quarter-final of the Challenge Cup. Earlier in the campaign a crowd of 12,000 were attracted to Whitehaven for a Lancashire Cup quarter-final tie against St. Helens despite the fact that the match kicked off at 4.30pm on a Wednesday afternoon. Whitehaven lost both those quarter-finals but, no doubt, the gate receipts softened the blows somewhat. Meanwhile Whitehaven's league campaign progressed in satisfactory fashion. They lost only three home league matches all season and completed league 'double' victories over seven of their opponents.

The most satisfying victories of that sequence must have been against their arch rivals Workington Town. The two clubs met early in the season at Whitehaven where the home club won 20-4. John Tembey, Jackie Reid, Ron Stephenson and Ron Morgan scored tries that evening with South African full-back Tony Forster adding four

goals. Adding to Whitehaven's satisfaction, Town were unable to breach the Whitehaven try line, Workington's points coming from a couple of Eric Stephenson penalties. Two months later the bitter rivalry between Whitehaven and Workington was put to one side as the clubs combined to take on the Australian tourists. The West Cumbrians turned in a great show at Derwent Park where only an uncharacteristic kicking display from full-back Syd Lowdon, who missed eight out of nine attempts at goal, enabled the tourists to win 13-8.

On New Years Day 1960 the two west Cumbrian rivals met again with Workington Town determined to avenge their early season defeat. The teams for that match were as follows:

Workington Town: Eric Stephenson: Dennis McDowell, John O'Neill, Syd Lowden, Kenny Foord; Harry Archer, Sol Roper; Norman Herbert, Bert Eden, Jacky Armstrong, Bill Martin, Fred Hodgson & Bill McCall.

Whitehaven: John McKeown; Bill Smith, Harry Hughes, Eppie Gibson, Ian Coles; Alf Hadley, Bruno Davies; Bill McAlone, John McKinnell, Bobby Vincent, John Tembey, Bill Holliday & Ron Morgan.

Once again the Whitehaven defence was up to the task ahead and once again Workington were unable to breach the Whitehaven try line. Indeed, the Whitehaven defence was even tighter than it was in the home game and it enabled 'Haven to register the dream achievement of all their followers, to 'nil' their arch rivals on Workington's home ground. The final scoreline was a convincing 24-0. Alf Hadley (2), Bruno Davies and Bill Holliday scored tries with John McKeown landing six goals.

That victory sparked Whitehaven into an eleven match unbeaten run which looked like bringing an elusive trophy to the Recreation Ground. Alas, six defeats in seven outings around Easter, including one at Watersheddings, ended both their Cup and Championship aspirations. Whitehaven still await their first trophy success but they continue to serve the west Cumbria coast, providing entertainment and the odd inspiring victory for their small but dedicated band of followers.



PAYING tribute to Bob Irving the rugby player you would think easy, Oldham, Yorkshire, England, Great Britain, World Cup winner, Hall of Fame member....but not so! I find it impossible to separate the player from the man. Having read Roger Halsteads earlier tribute you will understand why. When ever anything was asked of Bob it was 'yes'. He could never be negative. A prime example must be that when the 'End of an Era' brochure to mark the closure of Watersheddings was suggested Bob was the first with a supporting article. This article best sums up the man and the rugby player - he wrote it! So no apologises for reprinting it here!

"From Over The Hill to the End of The World" by Bob Irving

In September 1964 as a 16 year old A. N. Other trialist with Oldham, living in Huddersfield, the most daunting aspect was the travel to and from Watersheddings. I was totally dependant on Frank Dyson the player coach who also lived in

Huddersfield.

Being a mechanic Frank was really into cars and in the swinging sixties the Mini was all the rage. The ultimate Mini was the Cooper S but Frank only had the ordinary mini but drove it as if it were a Cooper S.

Tuesday's and Thursday's training meant a quick dash from work to meet Frank in Huddersfield town centre to start our journey. Although only 16 I was quite well made and Frank in his sheepskin coat was quite a size too, so we were really squashed together in this Mini. Whether we took the Stanedge or Nont Sarahs route was purely academic since both were unlit, foggy with sheer drops from the roadside. The only

way of knowing whether we were still on the road was by bumping into the sheep. When the weather was really bad Frank would slow down to 50 mph from his usual 70-90 mph, side window open (I think it was to give us a bit more room), fag in mouth, one hand on the wheel, nose against the windscreen, frantically wiping away the condensation. Frank probably thought my silence was due to youthful shyness but in truth I was numb with fear. Lifting sheep off the bonnet was better than any tackling practice.

The worst journey of all in those days of limited motorways was Workington Town away, Saturday 6am - get out of bed. 6.15am - walk to bus stop. 6.30am - bus to Huddersfield town centre. 7am - meet Frank. 8am - team coach leaves Watersheddings and proceeds to Bolton-le-Sands, picking up players along the way. 8.30 am - realise I should not play cards with seasonal professionals, 8.35am - lost last week's winning pay so might as well have a nap. 10am - arrive Bolton-le-Sands for breakfast. Mid-day - arrive Royal Oak Keswick for steak and egg lunch. 2.30pm - arrive Workington wishing I had not eaten all that food. 3.00pm - kick off. 3.01pm - hit by Brian Edgar and the Martin Brothers (wish I had never got out of bed in the first place). 7.00pm -Wake up in Ambleside at dinner. Cannot eat mixed grill, two teeth missing. 7 pints and as many hours later crawl back into bed.

Eventually I buy my own car which means I can now travel to Oldham for other purposes than training. On several occasions the team was

invited by Chief Constable Palmer to enjoy the hospitality of the police social club. The local lads always seemed to get safely back without having to drive but obviously such hospitality did not extend to that journey over the tops. However, I was offered a vacant cell if I was ever stuck. Some weeks later having skidded on black ice and leaving the road, I vowed not to risk that journey again in such bad conditions. Another social evening later at 1.30am on a foggy freezing night I presented myself to the desk sergeant at police HQ. Fortunately my misgivings were banished on being greeted by Walter Alcock who was always on the turnstile on match day and was kindly soul. He found me a vacant cell and gave me a couple of blankets. At 6am I was awakened by a screaming officer who was throwing out the previous night's drunks My protestations were ignored and he obviously did not follow rugby league because Bob Irving meant nothing to him. Perhaps he was a Rochdale supporter. He physically man-handled me out of the station and onto the freezing street. I decide to make that journey again. The old pavilion with its lights blazing, Mrs Wood making the after training butties, little Jimmy wisecracking with the lads as he handed out the newly washed kit and polished boots, Sergeant Walter on the gate greeting players and spectators alike with fatherly protection, the buzz of the crowd, the banter in the bar, were yesterday's rewards at the journey's end and today's happy memories. Thank you to everyone who made it so.

First Time-Last Time

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to our Cumbrian visitors Whitehaven. 'Haven' were admitted into the Rugby League from the 1948-49 season, following on from the success of Workington Town who joined the league three years earlier. The first ever meeting between the teams took place at Watersheddings on February 18th 1950. Oldham won the match 17 -3 with tries from Ken Ward, Bob Batten and a hat trick from right winger Joe Warham. Bryn Goldswain kicked one goal and the attendance was a more than respectable 10.232.

Oldham Team: I Barraclough; J. Warham, K. Ward, W. Mitchell, R. Batten; F. Heyes, J. Silva; H. Ogden, J. Dean, L. Anthony, J. Sugden, T. Leyland, B. Goldswain.

The return match which was the last game of the 1949–50 season was played at Whitehaven on April 29th 1950 and the Cumbrians gained revenge with a five points to three victory. Bob Ratten again on the score sheet was the score

Batten again on the score sheet with the Oldham try.

We have only to go back to this season's Challenge Cup competition for the last meeting between the teams, when Whitehaven won a dour sixth round tie by eighteen points to two at the Recreation Ground on February 28th. However, one has to go back as far as January 10th 1988 for the last league encounter. This was in a second division fixture at Watersheddings and resulted in a 28 - 20 victory for Oldham. There was a special interest in the game for it was the debut match for local born scrum half Mike Ford who had just signed for his home town club after successful





On This Day



DON RECALLS THIS DAY IN RUGBY LEAGUE HISTORY

TWENTY-nine long years have elapsed since Great Britain last won a test series against Australia. The team which achieved that distinction was the 1970 British Lions, an outstanding touring team consisting of 26 players, all of whom played in at least one of the six tests on that trip. It was on this day in 1970, Friday 30th May, that the tourists met Oueensland at Lang Park, Brisbane. It was the first big match of the tour but the Lions were up to the task, scoring six tries as they raced to a 32-7 victory. One of the British tries that evening was scored by the only Oldham representative on that tour, secondrower Bob Irving. Bob was not tall as second-row forwards go, but he was solid. Solid by stature and, as we were to find out later, solid morally too. He was a great favourite with the Oldham fans, not only for his exploits on the field, but also for the time and patience he showed towards those fans off the pitch. His untimely death earlier this year left the World a poorer place but Roughyeds everywhere will always remember him, not only as a great player but also as a great human being.

During the autumn of 1982 Australia toured Europe and so, in order to accommodate that tour, the 1982–83 County Championship was brought forward to the previous May and completed within eight days. The third and final match of the series was played on Sunday 30th May 1982 when Cumbria entertained Lancashire at Derwent Park, Workington. There were three Whitehaven players in the Cumbrian line-up, winger John Bulman, scrum-half 'Boxer' Walker and prop Paul Grimes. Oldham's Alan McCurrie was at hooker for Cumbria whilst Terry Flanagan was loose-forward for Lancashire. After an even first half Lancashire led 10-8 but the visitors then got well on top and went on to win 46–8. St. Helens winger Kevin Meadows scored a hattrick of tries for Lancashire whilst Mick Burke (Widnes), landed eight goals. Both later enjoyed successful spells at Watersheddings. The big disappointment of the afternoon, however, was the attendance of a mere 732.

Two years ago, on Friday 30th May 1997, the representative action took place at the Boulevard, Hull where the BARLA open age team entertained France 'B'. The French boys looked likely winners of this match when they led 12–2 early in the second half. However, BARLA hit hack and snatched a 15–14 victory when substitute prop Graham Summerscales (Shaw Cross) dropped an unlikely goal late in the game. A member of the BARLA pack that evening was Steve Mills, then of Wigan St. Patricks but last season of Saddleworth Rangers. The French squad included Emmanuel Peralta, now with the Roughyeds, but who then was making a name for himself with the Villeneuve club.

Staying with France, it was on this day in 1971, Sunday 30th May, that Marseille lifted the French Cup with a 17–2 victory over Lezignan in Perpignan. Six years previously, on Sunday 30th May 1965, Rochdale Hornets visited Perpignan during their three match tour of the South of France. Hornets lost all three matches, XIII Catalan winning that match in Perpignan by 16–13.


