

ENVIRONMENT Secretary John Prescott's decision to approve Sports Park 2000, after a public enquiry, was just the tonic Oldham Roughyeds required as they prepared to square up to the demands of the Northern Ford Premiership.

A 30-0 defeat at Batley in the opening game put everyone at the club on a "downer", but four days later came the much-delayed and long-awaited verdict from the Government on the plans to centre a massive £20 million leisure complex around a new stadium on Clayton Playing Fields.

It was a thumbs-up for the stadium....and as far as professional sport in Oldham is concerned that was the most positive signal yet that both Oldham Roughyeds and Oldham Athletic can look to an uncertain future with at least a hint of confidence and conviction.

What disappoints and saddens me about the whole stadium issue is the amount of opposition to it within a borough, soon to celebrate its 150th Anniversary, which once boasted that, in many walks of life, its sons and daughters could match the achievements of the nation's best.

In the theatre, music and sport Oldham has a rich heritage going back across the 150 years that will be celebrated in some style this summer.

Sport has been to the forefront of Oldham life throughout the last century. Which northern town gave Walter Winterbottom, David Platt and many other big names in soccer? In the world of cricket no prizes for guessing where Michael Atheton was reared. Or which Central Lancashire League club gave Geoff Pullar to Lancashire and England, Malcolm Hilton, (the only man to bowl out Don Bradman twice in one match), to Lancashire and England, Jim Hilton to Somerset, Keith Andrew to Northants and Jack Dyson to Lancashire, not to mention his feats with Manchester City.

The list is endless. In Rugby League, Oldham men have played significant roles in the history of the sport since Joseph Platt became the breakaway code's first secretary in 1895.

The history of the game is filled with the achievement of Oldham men and Oldham teams, both at Watersheddings and on foreign fields.

In recent times, the town provided the Rugby League's Director of Coaching and later Great Britain boss in Phil Larder. It produced the man widely recognised as one of the leading marketing whizkids in sport, Peter Deakin.

And you've only to look around the leading clubs to pick an entire team of Oldhamers, from lestyn Harris at full-back to Paul Sculthorpe at loose-forward.

Why, it's only nine years since Athletic were in the semi-final of the Littlewood Cup at the same time as Oldham Rugby met Warrington in the semi-final of the Challenge Cup.

Latics got to Wembley, Oldham didn't. But what an achievement for a town the size of Oldham to produce semi-finalists in competitions of such stature.

Less than a decade on, times have changed. But how can so many Oldham people question or oppose a new stadium when towns like Warrington, Widnes and St. Helens, which don't even have a professional soccer team, are looking bravely to the future and putting their stadia in place?

In these days of centralisation, towns like Oldham are in grave danger of losing their identity and nothing gives them an identity more than pro football or rugby league teams. Whoever heard of Accrington?

A new stadium must be the centre point of Oldham professional sport into the next century. If not, the clubs could wither and die as the years unfold.

And once they've gone how much longer before other institutions fold? How much longer before Oldham becomes little more than north-east Manchester?

A cry from the heart. You bet it is. And I'll be crying right through the 150th birthday celebrations if the town fails to grasp the opportunities to set the stage for another 150 years of sporting achievements.




What we need to do now is carry that performance into tonight's game. If anything, we need to improve on that and earn the respect of opposing teams and our spectators.

THE NEWS THAT the controversial Sportspark 2000 Stadium plan is to get the go-ahead is good news indeed. The prospect of Oldham R.L.F.C. and Oldham Athletic playing at the new ground by 2001 is truly a mouthwatering one. And should anyone doubt the wisdom of the scheme they need only to look at what the McAlpine stadium has done to revive the fortunes of professional rugby in the shape of the Huddersfield Giants, a club which now has the best arena in Rugby League, the best coach in the world and a bright future in Super League.

So, could Sportspark 2000 help catapult Oldham back to Super League status? Who knows? But ask anyone in Derby, Middlesborough, Sunderland or Bolton - to name a few - whether new facilities can be the catalyst which improves on-field performance and see what answer you get. Do you think anyone in those towns would honestly want a return to their old grounds? Of course it is nice to honour tradition, but this can be achieved in a myriad of ways as Oldham have tried to do in their choice of colours, their nickname and the Hall of Fame. But when it comes to comfort let's have the best and say goodbye to make-do-andmend, second-rate, victorian, past their sell by date facilities.

WITH BOTH LAST year's finalists already eliminated the Silk Cut Challenge Cup is certain to generate plenty of interest. With other Super League big guns certain to be knocked out in the next round this could just be the year of an underdog like Castleford, Huddersfield or London. Just think what an appearance at Wembley would do for the profile of the game in their area if either of the latter two could qualify, and though followers of Wigan won't agree, doesn't the current unpredictability of the competition make it so much more enthralling than the era of one club dominance?

The fourth round didn't really throw up any major surprises, although Rochdale Hornets will have been disappointed to lose against York, and Barrow to go down to Leigh. In view of Dave Hadfield's article in the Dewsbury programme it is interesting to note that the only clubs to overcome opposition placed higher than themselves in 1998 were Salford (against Sheffield) and Widnes (against Keighley), both of whom had home advantage. (This was written before Oldham v Dewsbury). This probably means that the intriguing ties in the fifth round are Huddersfield v Salford and Warrington v Halifax. Home advantage is likely to prove decisive in each case. And my tip for this year's winners? It has to be Bradford Bulls.





By now everybody with a passing interest in the Oldham Club will be aware that Oldham MBC have insisted that the street names within the new Watersheddings Housing Development will be sympathetic to what went on there during the previous 110 years - the sport of rugby and those who played it! This was well documented in the press during the close season.

It was pleasing to see this featured article in The South Wales press last week.

Givvons, when he was capped for Wales against England in 1938. Mr Givvons, also pictured above, has had a street named after him in Oldham.

HAVING a street named after you is something usually reserved for the very famous – and the dead. But former Cross Keys Club rugby player, Alex Givvons will soon see a street plaque erected bearing the name Givvons Fold in Oldham where he lives.

Newport-born Alex Givvons, now 85, travelled

to Oldham in January, 1933 to play half-back for Oldham Rugby League Club.

Sixty-six years later, he is one of four former club players being honoured by the council.

The Old Rugby Green development is being built on the spot where Watersheddings Rugby Club once stood.

The streets will be named after the great in Oldham's rugby history – including Welshman Alex Givvons.

Alex was born in Newport in 1913 and discovered rugby at nine, at High Cross School, Emlyn Street.

He played half-back for Pill Harriers RC before moving to Cross Keys.

In January 1933, Alex moved to Oldham and remained there, except for a brief spell at Huddersfield in the mid 40s, for the rest of his playing days.

Alex Givvons was regularly capped for Wales. Sixty years after he first went to Oldham RC, he was still employed as their kit man.

His sister, Marge Le Clare, 80, of Daniel Place, Pill, treasures newspaper cuttings and photographs cataloguing Alex's rugby career.

"He was so well-respected. People still ask me 'How's Alex'?" said Marge. "I am so proud of him".

Marge and Alex last got together about 18 months ago but they keep in touch by phone.


When he first heard that a street was to be named after him Alex said: "It is a great honour for me. I can't really believe it to tell the truth."

A spokesman at Oldham council said: "In Mr Givvons case, we don't normally do this before someone has died, but he has such a long a distinguished career with the club that we had a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to reward this."



KEVIN HOBBS - Head coach

Takes over as Head Coach after considerable success with the Rovers Alliance and Academy teams. Last season he was Assistant to Steve Simms, whom he helped to bring dramatic success at the end of the season. Featherstone were out of the top five before a headlong dash of famous victories took them to the Grand Final.

MATT BRAMALD - Full Back or Winger

Matt was a close season signing from Dewsbury. He is the type of player who can sniff out a try from nothing. Last season he was leading try scorer at the Rams and Rovers were fortunate to gain his signature. An exciting player, especially when he joins the line.

IAN THOMPSON - Winger

Comes from the Hunslet area and was originally snapped up by Wigan. He became a victim of the salary cap, forcing the Lancashire club to release him. Featherstone were quick to snap up the pacy youngster. An exciting player, who could easily fill Karl Pratt's position. Has just broken into the first team this year.

MARTIN LAW - Centre

Was Wakefield's 'Man of Steel' last year. Originally he played in the pack but made the successful transition to the backs. Big and strong he is likely to be a big asset to his new club.

CARL HALL - Centre

He was greatly honoured to be asked to skipper the side by Kevin Hobbs. He has had previous experience with Doncaster, Bradford and Leeds, as well as a brief spell with Mosley R.U., where he was not happy. A very strong player, who can be used in the second row if necessary. JAMIE STOKES - Winger

He was an Academy tourist at 17. A product of the Dewsbury area. Very fast and exciting, he has the ability to reach the top.

RYAN HORSLEY - Stand Off

As a life long Rovers supporter Ryan was happy to sign for Rovers from nearby Trinity, where he played a lot on the wing. Prefers the half back position .

PADDY HANDLEY - Scrum Half

Signed from Heworth by Leeds Rhinos in 1996. Used as a utility player a lot last season but would like to make the scrum-half berth his own. A tricky customer.

HITRO OKESENE - Prop

Nick-named 'The Maneater'. The giant Kiwi played for Hull Sharks last season and was snapped up by Rovers when his contract ended. A very strong, ball playing forward, who tackles with power.

STUART DICKENS - Prop

Incredibly at 18 has made the position his own. Must have a great future. Plays with power and experience above his years. A very good goal kicker. An Academy international.

RICHARD CHAPMAN

Hooker

Formerly played with Sheffield Eagles. One of the best in the game. Very lively about the park. Last season scored 18 tries and kicked 83 goals to become leading points scorer for Rovers.

NEIL LOWE - Second Row

Another young player who is a great prospect. Academy international with only one season under his belt. Looks to have a great future. Pace combined with a sure defence.

STEVE DOOLER - Second Row

Another young player who forced his way into the team at the end of last season. Again another young Rover who looks an outstanding prospect.

RICHARD SLATER -

Loose Forward

A tackling machine. The longest serving player on Featherstone's books, who made the short journey from Wakefield. An outstanding defender, whose technique, style and workrate are all fantastic. He combines this with great ball handling.



BRENDON TUUTA - Loose Forward

Toured Great Britain with the Kiwi's before joining Featherstone Rovers. A New Zealand international who has also played Super League for Castleford Tigers and Warrington Wolves. Back for a second spell with Rovers. Hugely popular.

JAMIE COVENTRY - Stand Off

Has pace to spare. A very relaxed player, defensively sound and an outstanding stand-off. Had Super League experience with Castleford Tigers and Huddersfield Giants.

ASA AMONE - Utility Player

Tongan international. Very powerful, Signed from Halifax Blue Sox. Turns many a game when coming off the bench. Takes three or four men to stop him.

MICKY CLARKSON - Second Row

Another player from Wakefield Trinity. Tremendous worker. Fast and strong, Began his career with Stanley Rangers.

DANNY EVANS - Utility Player

Can fill any pack position. Came through the Club's juniors. Powerful forward who always gives 100 per cent. Strong family ties as his father and grand-father played with the Club before him.



IT MAY BE because I am growing old but there are certain things in life which I am beginning to dislike. The wearing of baseball caps the wrong way round; that dreadful noise which blasts out at Salford under the guise of prematch entertainment; mobile phones ringing our on railway trains; summer rugby; I've never liked Manchester United; field goals instead of dropped goals and, come to think about it, the wearing of baseball caps the right

way round.

There are certain things which do make life tolerable. My grandson, even though he does wear a baseball cap; travelling through Leigh where all the playing fields have rugby posts, not soccer just rugby league posts; the financial tangle which rugby union has got itself into; eating dinner at the Town House in Greaves Street; and Featherstone.

Yes, I love Featherstone. It's a rugby league town. Even progress has not altered the fact that Featherstone is a rugby league town. The amalgamation of Travellers Saints and Jubilee has resulted in a superb complex appearing at Mill Pond Stadium and an even better team called Featherstone Lions. The reconstruction of Post Office Road has left Rovers with two superb stands in a brilliant, compact, little ground but one which still has character. That quaint scoreboard, manually operated, not a neon monstrosity. That damned slope which Rovers have mastered so that it's more difficult to play down it than up it. And then there's the spectators. Totally biased and offering ferocious advice to visitors and referee alike. I recall visiting Post Office Road not long ago when even I thought the referee was having a good game. Not so the Featherstone speccies. 'The last right decision you made ref', yelled a voice from the crowd, 'was when you put the right boots on the right feet.' And Rovers were winning 31-0 at the time!!

Yes Featherstone is a rugby town alright and so it was appropriate that, in 1987, when Papua-New Guinea made their first tour against professional opposition, that tour began at Post Office Road. The line up for that historic match was as follow:

Rovers: Chris Bibb; David Jones, Danny Beach, Ian Smales, Richard Marsh; John Crossley, Deryck Fox; Tim Slatter, Tony Staniforth, Gary Siddal, Alan Dakin, Peter Smith & Paul Lyman. Substitutes, Paul Geary & Keith Bell.

P-NG: Mathias Kitimun; James Kapia, Lauta Atoi, Bal Numapo, Kepi Saea, Darius Haili, Tony Kila; Joe Tep, Roy Heni, Ati Lomutopa, Mathias Kombra, Bernard Waketsi & Arebo Taumaku. Substitutes: Dairi Kovae & Thomas Rombuk.

The Kumuls displayed a refreshing brand of attacking rugby that afternoon which brought several bouts of spontaneous applause from an appreciative audience. Stand-off Darius Haili had the distinction of scoring the first try of the tour in the seventh minute and Mathias Kombra added another shortly afterwards. Bal Numapo converted both to put the Kumuls 12-2 in front, Deryck Fox having landed a penalty for Rovers. Peter Smith reduced the arrears before half time and then, during a five minute spell early in the second-half, lan Smales scored one try, converted it, and put Richard Marsh over for another. Rovers were 16-12 in front and heading for victory. However, the Kumuls, with total disregard to what for them were unfamiliar conditions, turned the game round in the closing quarter. Kepi Saea and Thomas Rombuk scored tries, Bal Numapo converted the first and Papua-New Guinea had won 22-16.

We came away from the match having been richly entertained, been present on an historic occasion, and with memories of rugby mad Featherstone further enhanced.





ERIC FITZSIMONS was a member of the Oldham first team squad between 1978 and 1981. Threequarter and prolific goalscorer he was one of only a handful of Oldham goalkickers to kick more than 100 goals in a season. Eric also played for Hunslet where he is still their record goalscorer.

As the Oldham Coach he succeeded in winning both the 1987/88 second division Championship and the second division Premiership Final v Featherstone at Old Trafford.

I WATCHED the "re-birth" of Oldham RLFC at Spotland last year and I must admit, I felt a buzz as the red and white hoops crossed the touchline at the start of the game. My first year as a spectator in 22 years of the game of RL, and suffering in my new role. My wife, Liz, had the benefit of my expert game commentary. Needless to say she's pleased I'm back in the game now. That game was won on sheer enthusiasm. What a great spectacle when the underdog has his day . . . the feelings flow from field to terrace, players begin to ride the high waves . . . tackles become easier, recovery is quicker, you are in control and you can sense victory. The performance had a little hint of Paddy Kirwan about it.

Two weeks ago, Bramley were on the receiving end. Leigh Miners Rangers, coached by my old mate Ian Taylor, really hit the high waves and defeated us by taking their 3 chances. Bramley scored twice but "bombed" ten others. And I ask myself "who would want to be a coach"? . . . and I answer myself "Well, it's better being here than in the crowd!".

Another question for you: what have Oldham, Lynx, Swinton and Bramley got in common?

Answer: they are all squatters!

Who would have thought that a team like Oldham with such RL history and such a weight of talent could end up squatters at a smaller town which, until recently, were always viewed as also-rans to Oldham. There's not much to be

gained from travelling down (Bad) Memory Lane; the new regime must aim to get it right because, if they do, they'll find a well of support. Evidence of that support has been demonstrated lately, and regrettably, at a series of funerals . . . Karl, Roy and then Brian. God Bless them all, their families and the people who travelled to mourn with their families . . . it's a strong local fraternity and we should all be proud to be a part of it. Oldham lads from Leeds. Sheffield. Hull, St. Helens, Warrington,

First Time-Last Time

A WELCOME to Featherstone Rovers for our opening First Division "home" fixture for the 1999 season. I am sure everyone connected with the "Roughyeds" will be looking forward to a continuation of the fine history of encounters between these two famous members of the Rugby League.

The first meeting between the clubs took place at Watersheddings on February 18th 1922 (Rovers' first season as a senior club) with victory going to the "Roughyeds" by 28 points to 5. Star of the show for Oldham was the Halifax born wingman Reg Farrar who crossed for five ties. This was the season that Reg set the club try scoring record with 49 touchdowns, which was also the top tally for all of the Rugby League in the 1921-22 season. In all Oldham scored eight tries that

day with the others coming from Evan Davies, Maurice Tighe and Herman Hilton. The goal kickers seem to have had an off day with scrum half Tighe only managing to convert two to the tries.

The return match at Featherstone a month later was a much closer affair with the Roughyeds completing the double by means of a Jim Finnerty try. This was the only score of the match in a 3-0 win for Oldham.

The Oldham team for that first match 77 years ago was as follows: E. Knapman; J. Finnerty, W. Hall, E. Davies, R. Farrar; J. Donovan, M. Tighe; F. Brown, A. Tomkins, R. Marlor, T. Rees, H. Hilton, J. Collins. Attendance: 7,000

THE LAST match between the clubs took place at Post Office Road on April 23rd 1995. This was the last match of the 1994-95 campaign and this time it was Rovers turn to complete the double with a 36-14 victory, having already won at Watersheddings 20-10 earlier in the season. This was the last game "Pre-Super League" and with the clubs to be included already decided, it might have been expected to be a tame end of season wind down for the two teams. Not a bit of it! The match was a bruising encounter like so many before between these two great trans-Pennine rivals and the heated exchanges culminated in the dismissal of Oldham prop Jason Temu five minutes from the end of the game. Frenchman Frederic Banquet had a match to remember with seven goals and two tries and the Rovers pack was in dominant form with current "Roughyed" skipper, Leo Casey leading the charge. The Oldham points came from three tries from Darren Abram and Joe Faimalo with Paul Topping landing three goals.



DON RECALLS THIS DAY IN RUGBY LEAGUE HISTORY

AFTER THE disappointing defeat at Batley two weeks ago, Oldham will be hoping to turn things round this evening when Featherstone Rovers visit Spotland for Oldham's first home league match of the 1999 campaign. Fifteen years ago, on Sunday 19th February 1984, Whitehaven were able to turn things round in spectacular fashion. In those days, of course, professional rugby league was played in the winter and Whitehaven were preparing for their 24th match of the season. The previous twenty three matches had all ended in defeat with no fewer than 793 points conceded. Unfortunately Whitehaven's next opponents were Oldham and the Roughyeds crashed to a 42-8 defeat at the Recreation Ground. Loose forward Milton Huddart led the scoring spree with a hattrick of tries in what was a dismal afternoon for the Roughyeds.

It was on this day in 1993, Friday 19th February, that centre Darren Abram was signed by Oldham from Rochdale Hornets. Abram enjoyed over four years with the Roughyeds during which time he made 127 appearances and scored 64 tries and 11 goals. He moved on to Lancashire Lynx in December 1997 after the previous Oldham club folded. Four years later, on Wednesday 19th February 1997, another centre was on the move although the move was from rugby league to rugby union. The player concerned was Vaiga Tuigamala who, after three successful years with Wigan, joined Newcastle RUFC. Tuigamala had joined Wigan from New Zealand rugby union in January 1994 and he made 102 appearances for the pie-eaters, scoring 62 tries and 3 goals. He represented Western Samoa in the 1995 World Championships. On the same day Wednesday 19th February 1997, it was announced that Richard Branson had bought 20% of the shares in the London Broncos. Branson's interest and involvement in rugby league was a big boost to the game, so if anyone knows of another millionaire looking to invest in rugby league, point him in the direction of Chris Hamilton.

The weather on that Wednesday, 19th February 1997 was not too clever. As a result, the Standard Cup semi-final between Higginshaw and Waterhead, which was scheduled to be staged at Saddleworth, was postponed because of a water logged pitch. Two years previously, on Sunday 19th February 1995, a Standard Cup semi final did go ahead as scheduled at Hollinwood where Saddleworth Rangers defeated Waterhead 18-2. On Saturday 19th February 1994, St. Annes crashed out of the National Conference League Cup when they lost a quarter final tie at Walney Central by 22 points to 4.

It was the first round of the Challenge Cup on Saturday 19th February 1938 with the Roughyeds facing Batley at Watersheddings. It proved a close fought and exciting encounter which looked like going Oldham's way as the match moved into stoppage time. The Roughyeds led 7-6 with stand-off Mick Downey having scored the only try of the match and full-back Tommy Rees adding a couple of goals. Loose-forward George Brown had landed three penalties for Batley to keep them in contention but then, with the last kick of the match, scrum-half Dicky Ralph dropped a goal, worth two points in those days, so Batley went through 8-7. Finally, just to prove that it hasn't all been doom and gloom for Oldham on February 19th, in 1989 the Roughyeds beat Hull 9-7 in a home First Division match.






