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# In Yer Face

IT HAS BEEN noticeable so far this season that Oldham have conceded fewer penalties than their opponents in each of the matches played. In view of the closeness of the scores the discipline of Mike Ford's side could be regarded as a significant contributory factor to victory. It contrasts sharply with last season when Oldham were caned on penalties in most matches and suffered far too many yellow and red cards. There is no doubt that in modern rugby penalties cost you dear. Not only are you likely to concede a lot of ground, but they enable the opposition to get on a roll. Significantly, Whitehaven took the lead at Boundary Park in the 65th minute following a penalty against Oldham and it took a mighty effort and two Joey Hayes tries to pull the game back. Equally significantly in the game against Hornets Oldham did not concede a single penalty after the first quarter, while Hornets, as they had in the Law Cup game, allowed their enthusiasm or was it anxiety? - to get the better of

them. With their terrific character and team spirit the added discipline that suggests Oldham might just have that all important ingredient, namely the ability to come out on top in matches with only a hairsbreadth in it.

And talking of penalties I would point out two areas where Oldham ought to have been awarded them and have not been. Although by and large the refereeing so far has been satisfactory (yes, I know you won't all agree with that!), it would be nice if two particular rules were upheld. The first is players running offside at the kick-off. In every match so far this season Oldham's opponents have had several players in their half and in front of the ball at kick-off. This may be of little importance when the ball is kicked deep, but if a side tries to regain possession by kicking short to the ten metre line it is a real problem. Whitehaven did this twice late in the game, gained possession through Buck Armstrong who was five metres offside on the second occasion and set up an attack at the death which almost brought an equalising try in the corner but for some desperate Oldham scrambling defence. What an injustice it would have been had they snatched something because the officials can't be bothered with this particular rule.

The second occasion it is noticeable that the laws of the game are ignored concerns scrums. [We have all long since given up on 'feeding' so I won't go into that!] With Oldham holding the ball in the scrum at the back of the pack why do referees ignore the opposing loose-forward breaking away or, even worse at Swinton, the loose-forward and two second-rows breaking off? This is an offence, cuts down and thereby attacking options entertainment value for the spectator. It should be penalised.

Finally another gripe not affecting Oldham. I was at the Super League friendly Huddersfield-Sheffield and between Halifax. On four occasions Halifax players were penalised for 'travelling' at play-theball when clearly what they were trying to do was step over a prone defender to play the ball quickly. In these days of speeding up play it struck me as an injustice that the team wanting to get on with things was penalised while the team trying to slow things down not only got away with it but gained possession. But then I suppose R.L. without controversy just wouldn't be R.L.

THE Northern Ford Premiership has got off to a cracking start.

Close to home, Oldham fans have witnessed a series of terrific matches against Rochdale Hornets and Whitehaven here at Boundary Park and against Swinton and Barrow at Gigg Lane and Craven Park respectively.

The season is still in its infancy and perhaps it is too early to become too enthusiastic about the appeal of the NFP over the course of the next six or seven months.

Early signs, however, are extremely encouraging. With four rounds of matches played only Dewsbury Rams still command a 100 per cent record and it says much for the changing face of the game outside Super League that the Rams record will be given the most severe examination today by Doncaster Dragons.

The Dragons suffered a minor setback at Hull KR, but responded positively to hammer Featherstone Rovers 32-14 at Doncaster last Sunday.

Hull KR, meanwhile, posted notice that they are coming good after a slow start by following up their defeat of Doncaster with a great win against Keighley at Cougar Park.

Widnes are pulling in crowds approaching 4,000 on a regular basis, while both Swinton and Whitehaven hit back from defeats by Mike Ford's Oldham to take out their frustrations on Leigh Centurions.

Leigh were expected to be a real force this season...and it's far too soon to write them off yet...but who would have expected them to slip up at home to Swinton or to go down 24-6 at Whitehaven a week later?

That was a great result for the

Cumbrians and their Kiwi boss Kevin Tamati, whose side played some terrific attacking rugby, inspired by classy playmaker Aaron Lester, in a thriller at Boundary Park a fortnight ago.



Tamati knows a good rugby match when he sees one and he hid his disappointment in defeat by Oldham by declaring that this was a match which had left the paying customer keen to come back for more.

There followed another thriller at Barrow a week later and, sure enough, Craven Park boss Paul Charlton echoed similar opinions, going so far as to comment that the match had approached Super League standard.

By last Sunday evening nine clubs were separated by only two points, behind pace setting Dewsbury, and that must indicate that we are in for a season of thrills and spills, ups and downs, highs and lows, call them what you will, in the race for places in the top eight and qualification for the play off.

More importantly, we have witnessed already this season some terrific wing-towing rugby, not only by the Roughyeds but by each of their opponents.

Wingers and centres are scoring tries again and goalkickers are having to swot up how to land goals off the touchline.

Yes, it really is happening. Real rugby is back in the NFP.

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#### RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - a summary of important Events 1906 - 1909

THIS WAS an important time period in the evolution of the "Northern Union". After the initial enthusiasm of the breakaway from the Rugby Union the sport was becoming stagnant. To their credit the Northern Union governing body realised that the game needed streamlining. Attendances were in decline and soccer was becoming more and more popular. Rules were therefore introduced that speeded up the game and made for more open play. These 'spectator friendly' initiatives seemed to have the desired effect and attendances improved.

The two boldest departures from the old rules came into force for the 1906-07 season when the 'play the ball' rule was defined and the number of players in a team was reduced from fifteen to thirteen. With these two major changes the game had indeed acquired its own separate identity and any chance of a reuniting of the two codes was now completely out of the question.

Then in 1907 the first international touring team visited these shores. They were the New Zealand 'All Golds', who actually played in the same 'All Black' as their Rugby Union counter parts but were so named because of their professionalism. The first test was played at Leeds with Britain emerging winners 14-6. The second & third tests were played at the unlikely venues of Chelsea and Cheltenham and the Kiwis won them both to take the spoils from the first ever test series. At the conclusion of the tour two of the most famous players in the team joined English clubs. George (G.W.) Smith signed for Oldham whereas his fellow Kiwi, Lance Todd joined Wigan. They both made their debut on February 19th, 1908 in the league match between Wigan and Oldham at Central Park, with the 'Roughyeds' emerging winners by seven points to five before a crowd of 25,000.

This tour was followed by the first visit from the 'Kangaroos' of Australia in 1908. Once again the test matches went outside the heartland of the Northern Union. The first test, at the home of Queens Park Rangers in London, resulted in a draw. However, the second and third matches, played respectively in Newcastle and Birmingham, saw Great Britain victorious. So the first Rugby 'Ashes' success went to the Lions.

The 1907-08 season saw Hunslet reign supreme. The south Leeds club pulled out all the stops to win the Championship, Challenge Cup, Yorkshire Cup and Yorkshire League. All this achieved under the captaincy of the legendary Albert Goldthorpe. A veteran who had captained the club right from the start of the Northern Union back in 1895.

A whole host of clubs were on the 5 and 6/1 mark including Dewsbury Rams, Hull KR, Hunslet and dark horses Doncaster Dragons. If you fancied some longshots Oldham were 100/1, whilst Workington and Lancashire Lynx were both friendless, in the market, at 300/1. So if you have had a punt how is your team doing?

**Widnes Viking** - Most peoples favourites and have made an encouraging start winning two of their three starts, losing only to Leigh Centurions, with the magnificent Auto Quest stadium and enthusiastic supporters they must remain well fancied for a place in SL in 2001.

Leigh Centurions - Have only made a fair start and have tasted defeat on two occasions, most recently at Whitehaven. Obviously lan Millwards side must still be considered title contenders but will need to make an improvement to figure come July. Their 24-6 defeat at Whitehaven was a major shock from last weekends results.

Dewsbury Rams - Are the only club with a

100% record and have looked awesome so far, winning each of their opening four games and conceding only eighteen points. However 20 year old STEVE McGRADY, a close season signing from Kells and a BARLA representative could partner Cook in the centres today.

On the wings could be speedy LEIGH SMITH and the experienced GRAEME LEWTHWAITE who comes to Town after five vears at Whitehaven, having originally graduated to the professional ranks from Hensingham.

Watson's scrum-half partner is LEE ALLEN a 1999 signing from Lowca.

In the pack will be TAU LIKU who had five seasons at Leigh and whose robust style makes him a big favourite with the crowd. A Tongan with World Cup ambitions.

Equally robust is JOE NADIOLE who needs no introduction to Oldham fans after two spells with the new club. A Fijian with a forceful running style. Joe has also seen service at Hudders-field and Hunslet, among others.

Hooker OWEN WILLIAMSON is a 19 year old newcomer with CRAIG FISHER and CARL SICE as rivals for his role.

Second-row MATT STURM was a regular for Huddersfield in each of the last three seasons. He played in New Zealand for Counties Manukau and is a likely selection for the Maoris in the World Cup. His partner ANTHONY SAMUEL, meanwhile, is a Cook Island World Cup representative who played briefly for Widnes before joining Town in 1998.



Loose-forward STUART HOYLES is a stalwart of the outstanding Ellenborough side who adds a touch of class to the Workington pack.

Other players in running for the selection include:-JAMIE BEAUMONT, now returned for a

second spell at Derwent Park after appearing at stand-off for Seaton last year; JONATHAN HEANEY, a 19 year old native Cumbrian who has played RU at Northampton while at Bedford University. Tracked by London Broncos, Salford and Wigan he nevertheless elected to turn pro for Gary Murdock, Town's coach this year and Heaney's former coach at Ellenborough; RYAN CHARTERS is also ex-Ellenborough and is a newcomer to the proranks in 2000. He plays at second-row; NICKY CRELLIN is a big, powerful forward bearing a famous RL name. Can be devastating when used as an impact player; TONY HUDDART is 19 and a utility back who has progressed through the Academy and Alliance sides; TONY DMYTROWSKI is a close-season halfback recruit from Whitehaven. He formerly played at Egremont and Wath Brow Hornets.

Selected are twenty players who, for the best part of their career, graced the British game but did not necessarily need to be of British decent, plus twenty players each from Australia, New Zealand and France.


The 'British' selection is Lance Todd, Harold Wagstaff, Billy Batten, Jonty Parkin, Jim Sullivan, Gus Risman, Brian

Bevan, Dave Valentine, Billy Boston, Tom Van Vollenhoven, Alan Prescott, Neil Fox, Mick Sullivan, Alex Murphy, Vince Karalius, Roger Millward, Clive Sullivan, Ellery Hanley, Garry Schofield and Martin Offiah.

Not too many problems there with the exception that I would certainly have included centre James Lomas, captain of the first tour to Australia and regarded by many historians as 'the' player of the Edwardian era. Lomas was transferred from Salford to Oldham for a then world record fee of £300. Should Lomas have been included it would have been at the expense of winger Mick Sullivan. No room either for the likes of record goal scorer David Watkins (221 in a season), record try scorer Albert Rosenfield (80 in a season), Shaun Edwards, Eric Ashton, Brian McTigue and Martin Hodgson!

If I have a grouse, (and I have), it is with the selection of the Kiwi twenty.

The first ever New Zealand League touring party to these shores was Albert Baskerville's 1907 'All Golds'. They beat the British 2-1 in the three match series. It was not to be until 1971 that the Kiwi's would again win a series in this


#### What can we achieve this season?

But if you want to be part of a homely little club playing rugby at a competitive but not ultraprofessional level, then Hollinwood is the club for you.

Founded in 1979, Hollinwood currently play at the Melrose Playing Fields, off Fields New Road, Chadderton. The ground is actually owned by the Rugby Football League and is leased to the Oldham Amateur League who, in turn, sub-let it to Hollinwood. The clubhouse was built seven years ago and houses changing rooms and small kitchen-cum-shop. Spectators and visitors, therefore, can obtain hot drinks and confectionery on match days. After match hospitality, though, is supplied by the nearby Owd Tatts public house, Butler Green.

Training nights for Hollinwood are Tuesdays and Thursdays at the Hathershaw Sports Centre. Tuesdays inside the gym and Thursdays outside on the floodlit all-weather pitch. Head coach at the club is Colin Garratt, an outstanding and most reliable full-back in his playing days. He enjoyed a fourteen year playing career with Saddleworth Rangers during which time he won a multitude of honours including the Ben Powell Trophy in 1996 when Rangers defeated Higginshaw 18-10 in the Standard Cup Final.

There is only one team at Hollinwood and they are currently playing in Division Two of the Pennine League. Club secretary, treasurer, trainer and general odd job man Fred Halliwell, awarded the 'Sportsman of the Year' trophy by the Oldham Amateur League last season, is happy for his team to play in the Pennine League in preference to the North West Counties League. 'It's better for us.', he said, 'There are less matches postponed, there is a friendlier atmosphere at games and the matches are closer.' Club income is generated only by player subscription, ground collection, after match raffle in Owd Tatts and a lottery 'bonus ball' competition in the pub. 'Sponsorship, what sponsorship?' laughed Fred when asked if the club was sponsored in any way. 'We have had sponsors in the past by there are none at present but if anyone's interested I'm sure we could sort something out.' Fred can be contacted on 624-3542 but, typically, it was the club who actually sponsored the Oldham schoolboys' team which appeared at Wembley in 1984, supplying each member of the squad with a specially designed tie. They are that type of club.

During 1995 as part of the RL centenary celebrations the New Zealand postal authorities announced the issue of a series of five postage stamps to commemorate league in their country. The only individuals they thought fit to honour were Baskerville and **GEORGE SMITH**. Winger, Smith was vice captain of the All Golds also a member of the 1905 union All Blocks taur a champion corinter and burdler and

union All Blacks tour, a champion sprinter and hurdler and a competent pro jockey.

At the end of the 1907 tour George Smith became Oldham's first ever overseas player outstanding with the club through the most successful period of its history. Later he was to become team coach staying in the town for the rest of his life.

At the end of the tour Lance Todd, also a threequarter, signed for Wigan. By coincidence both Todd and Smith made their debuts in the same match at Central Park and on the day were in direct opposition. Smith had the better of the battle and helped Oldham to a 7-5 victory. By skill and reputation George Smith had the edge over Lance Todd. The younger Todd spent most of his rugby years playing the English game and probably quite rightly named as one of the twenty 'British' icons.


RUGBY LEAGUE'S earliest pioneers, George Smith (left) and Albert Baskerville, are honoured on this stamp. Together, the pair were instrumental in organising New Zealand's first league team, the All Golds, for the groundbreaking tour of Britain and Australia in 1907. their involvement is also a story of sacrifice. Smith, a 1905 All Black, received a lifetime ban from rugby union for changing codes, while Baskerville tragically died of pneumonia in Australia on the homeward leg of the tour.





SHORT SIGHTED administration, the absence of a clear long term strategy and dubious development plans are all issues that blight our game at present....yes, you've heard it all before. However, it is with great difficulty that these allegations could be levelled at our own club who can stand proud within the turmoil and point the way forward.

The Professional approach taken by the club this season, both on and off the field, has not gone unnoticed. Financial stability, positive attitude and sheet commitment will ensure a competitive edge in a fiercely intense competition this season. This has been keenly demonstrated in our first three victories and also in last weeks narrow defeat at Barrow. Never have these qualities been needed more than in the quest to secure a permanent home for the Roughyeds in Oldham.



In sharp contrast to the fate of Watersheddings, the sale of Boundary Park will hopefully secure a long term home for the Roughyeds in the town. This stability should provide the club with a solid base and thus the opportunity to successfully promote itself within the community.

A long term tenancy agreement for both Athletic and the Roughyeds has been agreed with the ground's new owners, Hiretarget - a move which should prevent a repeat of last season's disastrous exile from the town. So far so good.

After a period of hesitance, the football club has now placed it's backing to the proposed new stadium scheme. Whether this decision was taken from a long term perspective or was purely financially driven to alleviate massive debts in the short term is another issue. Are both clubs putting their past differences behind them and looking to forge a better working relationship?....let's hope so.

Indeed, this significant move appears to be the first crucial step towards the completion of the Sportspark 2000 development. That possibility raises many emotive issues for all the parties concerned.

In my opinion, there is no question that the sporting public of Oldham deserve a state of the art stadium and all the facilities that come with it. However, whether this should take place at Clayton playing fields is one of many more difficult questions which need to be answered.

There are apparently at least two alternative sights which have been earmarked should the present bid be unsuccessful. However, these locations have not been publicised. Surely for the public to make an informed decision whether to support or oppose the scheme, all the facts must be presented.

What particularly concerns me is the lack of clarification over what part the Roughyeds will play in the ownership/management of the proposed new stadium. Indeed, this week we learned that a company has been created to administrate this venture. This consisted of three Athletic directors but only the option of a Roughyeds official joining 'should the club become involved at a later stage'. Did the sale of Watersheddings to Hiretarget some four years ago not come hand in hand with the promise of an involvement in a new stadium?

Like the vast majority of the Oldham public, I remain disappointingly uninformed about the specific details of the scheme and as a result, somewhat sceptical.

As a Roughyed supporter, I have of course over the years developed a slightly pessimistic (or was that realistic?) approach. However, I certainly have faith in our present administration to protect the club's interests and hope that my concerns prove to be unnecessary.

Quite simply, the jury is still out. Not only in form of the Charities Commission who are expected to make a ruling within the next month, but also many of the Roughyed faithful who are understandably concerned that their club gets a fair deal this time around.



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



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JANUARY 23rd is a very significant day in the history of Workington Town because it was on that day in 1945. Wednesday 23rd January. that Workington town were admitted into the Northern Rugby Football League, Their admission was decided at a special meeting which was convened at the Grosvenor Hotel. Manchester and presided over by George Hutchins, the then Oldham Chairman.

Workington's arrival on the professional scene has resulted in many demanding trips by their rivals to west Cumbria where Town are always formidable opponents. The Cumbrians have also nurtured many promising young players who have

Two players currently in the Workington first team squad were starring for their amateur clubs twelve months ago, on Saturday 23rd January, 1999. Centre Steve McGrady scored a try for Kells as they defeated Seaton 36-12 in the first round of the Cumberland Cup but it was not such a successful afternoon for scrumhalf Lee Allen. Although he scored one of Lowca's three tries, they crashed out of the cup, beaten 32-12 at Penrith. On that same afternoon, Saturday 23rd January, 1999 several local clubs had to claw their way to victory after initially falling behind. St. Annes won 12-7 at

27-6.

Thornhill with a late try from winger Graeme Sykes: Saddleworth were 7-0 behind against Leigh Miners but recovered to win 12-7: Hollinwood were 14-6 down against Siddal but hit back to win 16-14 and Royton Tigers fell 6-0 behind at Pendle Lions before Grant Bithell's try and three goals enabled them to recover and win 14-12. Alas, there was no comeback for Watersheddings Wanderers who lost 72-0 at home to Shelf Lions.

The Great Britain team also staged an unlikely revival on this day in 1965. Saturday 23rd January, during a sensational match at Swinton. That day the Lions took on France seeking revenge for a defeat which they had suffered the previous month in Perpignan. Leading the French in both internationals was prop-forward Marcel 'The Bear' Bescos and he was outstanding as Britain fell 7-0 behind. Wakefield Trinity centre Neil Fox reduced the arrears with a couple of goals before half time but then, on the hour, the match erupted and Bescos was sent off. He refused to walk so referee Dennis Davies left the field followed by the entire French team. Eventually the French, and referee, returned but without Bescos or, indeed, the fighting spirit which had put them in front. Winger Berwyn Jones, also of Wakefield, scored a try for Britain and Fox continued to land goals, seven in total, as Britain went on to win 17-7.

Whilst Britain were slugging it out with France on Saturday 23rd January 1965, a player who was to enjoy a short stint with Oldham, was making his professional debut just down the East Lancashire Road in St. Helens. John Mantle had joined St. Helens from Newport RUFC earlier in the month and he made his debut in the second row as Saints beat Whitehaven 16-3. Mantle went on to win every domestic honour with Saints, made 13 test appearances, toured Australasia with the British Lions and represented Wales in the World Cup. He also played for Salford, Keighley and Blackpool Borough as well as enjoying player coaching appointments at Leigh and Oldham, making just one first team appearance for the Roughyeds.
