2000 Silk Cut Prizes

This is the fourth year of Silk Cut's current contract with the RFL, having extended their original agreement for a further two years until 2001. The extension is worth £1.8 million, which guarantees Rugby League's first £1 million in sponsorship in the final year. For the first time in Rugby League history the final will be held at Murravfield in Edinburgh and the victorious team in 2000 will receive a record prize cheque of £120,000.

Of the 2000 sponsorship investment of £800,000 a total prize fund of £563.200 is projected for the Silk Cut Challenge Cup. The remaining funds will be deposited in the League's Capital Development Fund. The complete year 2000 Silk Cut Challenge Cup prize structure is:

FORD FOCUS With Mike Ford Haydn Walkers . . Alliance First Division Round Up



THERE's nothing like the Silk Cut Challenge Cup for carrying players, coaches, club officials and fans through the full range of sporting emotions.

Over the years I'm sure we've all experienced a buzz when it's time for clubs to hit the Wembley trail and it will be no different this year just because we are going north of the border to

Edinburgh, or to Murrayfield to be precise, for the Silk Cut Challenge Cup final..always one of the great days in the Rugby League calendar.

Between now and the big day there will be plenty of tears and plenty of cheers on the cup trail and I can speak from personal experience, having experienced both the highs and the lows of Silk Cut Challenge Cup rugby during my long playing career.

I was fortunate enough to play in two Wembley finals: the first in 1985 when Wigan beat Hull 28-24 and the second in 1992 when I was at scrum-half in the Castleford team beaten 28-12 by Wigan.

In 1985 there was the sheer euphoria of playing alongside the great Brett Kenny and winning the cup, but seven years later I sampled the despair of the Wembley losers' dressing room.

Incidentally, it is interesting to note that Graeme West was one of my Wigan team mates when we beat Hull in one of Wembley's best-ever finals and that his son, Vaughan, could be lining up against us this afternoon in the Wigan St Jude's team.

Another big disappointment came in the semi-final of 1990 when I was with the Oldham team beaten 10-6 by Warrington at Central Park in a thriller that could have gone either way.

We had a try disallowed in the dying seconds...heartbreak stuff.

In more recent times, however, I will never forget the empty feeling I was left with when Leigh Miners pulled off a cup shock by beating Bramley at Headingley in the same round last year.

It was my first professional game as coach and, to be frank, it provided me with a nightmare start to my coaching career.

Today's game, played against an Oldham team lying second in the Northern Ford Premiership and in a big stadium here at Boundary Park, will be Wembley and Murrayfield rolled into one for the lads of St. Judes.

They played Rochdale Hornets at this stage of the competition last year, so they are not exactly new to the demands of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup and they will be revved up to give it their best shot.

They will come to enjoy themselves...not too much I hope. Enjoy the game.

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
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In Yer Face

IF RECENT press reports are true the Challenge Cup tie you watch this afternoon may be one of the last under the current format. Apparently the Super League clubs or is it the R.F.L.? - are concerned that the gap in standards between Super League and the rest is such that heavy defeats suffered by the 'minnows' do the sport's credibility no good. Furthermore there are worries that the superior strength and fitness of full time professionals could result in serious injury being suffered by a part-time pro, or, worse, should it come to it by a fluke of the draw, by an amateur. While it is clearly true that Rugby League does not offer the same opportunities for 'giant killing' as soccer and there is no example of a Super League scalp being claimed by a non-Super League side as vet. there are examples of amateurs defeating professionals: just ask Mike Ford's Bramley last season (defeated by Leigh Miners Rangers). It does not follow automatically. however, that a Widnes or a Leigh could not surprise a Salford or a Huddersfield on the right day.

So, while at first sight there is some merit in the Super League club's argument, the fact of the matter is that this is like Manchester United undermining the F.A. Cup and the traditions of the game on a grand scale. At the end of the day the 'magic' of the cup is its unpredictability, the sometimes once in a lifetime chance for a David to slay a Goliath. A cup competition which takes away that possibility is arguably a cup competition not worth having.

Furthermore, if you look beyond the superficial and analyse just WHY Super League clubs are so dominant (in my view at least) you might be surprised. David Hulme is quoted as saying in Rugby League World recently: "when I was at Widnes we only trained twice a week and I reckon we were just as fit and prepared for a game...[as Super League players]". Remember this comes from a player just returned to his home town club after stints at Salford and Leeds, a player still going strong at 35 with an outstanding international career behind him. Is he wrong? And if he isn't, where does the difference lie?

I would suggest - and I am aware that this is controversial and will have many of you disagreeing with me fundamentally - that the cause of the disparity in standards is the ten metre rule. Our Australian cousins talk about making the 'hard yards', but I would suggest that under the ten metre rule there are no hard yards. Any player worth his salt should be able 'to get over the advantage line' as current jargon has it. Just consider how often play goes from one end of the field to the other within six tackles, turning modern Rugby League into an elevated form of basketball. Long gone are the days when one side could lay siege to its opponents line for minutes on end provoking a prolonged 'scratching shed' roar of support for the home side whether attacking or defending. To hear fans these days shouting repeatedly for offside has me wondering if they'd like to see the defensive line forming up in the Car Park rather than on the field!

To return to the point, the advantage the top sides have over their 'inferiors' is greater bulk via weight training, more power running on to the ball produced by better coaching techniques and tactical awareness and an emphasis on a quick play the ball to keep defenders constantly on the back foot. Now, put these teams on mid-winter mud heaps or snow bound pitch under a five yard rule where they lose these advantages and who knows what might happen? Oldham might yet knock over Wigan as they did so famously at Watersheddings in 1987.

But then it's just not going to happen is it? Because if the administrators have their way there'll be one cup for Super League and another for the rest.

AT RISK of putting the kiss of death on some poor, unsuspecting Northern Ford Premiership club, I will advance the view here and now that I don't think there will be one pro-am cup shock in this weekend's third-round Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties.

You might have been tempted to take Walney Central to win at Lancashire Lynx, but Lynx will have taken great heart from their defeat of Whitehaven and that pick-meup will probably tip the scales their way.

Dudley Hill at York Wasps? An outside chance, perhaps, but York seem to be improving and strengthening by the match and much as I admire Dudley Hill as renowned cup battlers I believe the Wasps will carry too much of a professional sting.

The strongest amateur teams in cup action this weekend are West Hull, Skirlaugh and our own Oldham St Anne's, but West Hull face Mission Impossible (well, almost) at Widnes, Skirlaugh face the long trek to Workington and Saints - of the green and gold variety - have to go to Batley Bulldogs.

A month ago vou might have fancied Skirlaugh to cause an upset at Workington, but as we saw when the Cumbrians ran the Roughyeds close here at Boundary Park last Sunday, Town can be a Tau Liku



formidable force

now that Ryan Charters, Matt Sturm, Anthony Samuel and Tau Liku have been joined at Derwent Park by Paul Cook. Dave Watson and Joe Nadiole.

I have a sneaking feeling St Anne's might give Batley a few frights, but home advantage - and THAT slope - should prove crucial in a game that could be tight for 50 minutes or so if Saints get first use of the gradient.

You see, there are no 'easy beats' in the NFP so far this season and, unlike

last year, when the professionals were coming in cold, they have just passed through a highly-competitive five weeks and are now well into their new season.

Compare that with last year. Oldham played Rochdale Hornets in the Law Cup at New Year and then had only a couple of friendlies before going into their tie with Eccles on the first weekend of February.

While the professionals were ring rusty, the amateurs were half-way through their season and, in some cases, it was an advantage that tipped things towards the lads who play for fun - and the odd pint or two after the match.

That advantage has been taken away from the BARLA clubs by the decision to start the new NFP season over Christmas and that's another big reason why I'm going for no upsets.

Waterhead, like St Anne's, have a relatively big pack and some fine footballers in key midfield positions, but they won't be able to last the 80 minutes against Swinton's heavyweights at Gigg Lane, nor would you expect them to.

St Jude's? I know little about them, but I'm sure they will be travelling from Wigan in a bid to uphold the fine rugby league traditions of their town at both pro and amateur levels.

They will play their part in an entertaining game and will take away lasting memories, but I can't see a shock either here or elsewhere. Am I sticking out my neck? **Roger Halstead**

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RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - a summary of important Events 1910 - 1915

AFTER THE ground breaking tours by New Zealand and Australia to Britain in 1907 and 1908 respectively, the second decade of the twentieth century brought the first reciprocal trip "down under". Jim Lomas of Salford captained the British team who, after losing the opening two matches, went on to win nine and draw one of the remaining twelve fixtures in Australia. This included both of the test matches. The short tour of New Zealand was a complete success for Lomas and his men who won all four games, concluding the tour with a 52 points to twenty rout of the Kiwis in Auckland on August 6th. The colours for tourists were red and white hoops. Oldham had two representatives on the tour, Bert Avery and Scotsman, Tom Helm who unfortunately was taken ill on the journey and did not play in any of the matches.

Back on the domestic scene the county cup competitions were now established and the final red rose final of the decade saw Swinton go down to Oldham by four points to three at Broughton. The 'Roughyeds' victory coming courtesy of a towering drop goal from Joe Ferguson. Oldham, along with Wigan, were very much the Lancashire form teams of the era, but as far as the history books are concerned, it is a team from the 'white rose' county that stole the limelight. This was of course Huddersfield. dubbed 'the team of all talents'. Captained by the mercurial Harold Wagstaff, who became known as 'the prince of centre's', the Yorkshire outfit embarked on a run of remarkable success. as the fans flocked to Fartown in their thousands. The zenith of their achievements came when they emulated the Hunslet triumph of 1907-08 winning all four major trophies in the 1914-15 season. In the 1913-14 campaign Australian winger, Albert Rosenfield scored 80 tries in senior competition to establish a Rugby League record that still survives today after more than eighty years.

Wagstaff went on to skipper the second touring team down under in 1914, during which he would take part in the most famous Rugby League test match of all time. The game in question was the final test of the three match series against the Aussies. With the honours even at one victory each, Wagstaff led Britain to a remarkable triumph, bearing in mind that the already injury ravaged tourists, were reduced to just ten players by the conclusion of the match. Nevertheless, the 'Lions' prevailed to register a fourteen points to six victory. This famous encounter has since passed into Rugby League folklore and become known as the 'Rorkes Drift' test, comparing the match to the famous rearguard action fought by the Welsh Guards against the massed Zulu tribes. Included in the team were all three Oldham players; Alf Wood, who kicked four goals, Billy Hall and Dave Holland.

THIS WEEK we take a break from the League action and concentrate on the third round of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

We are at the stage when the amateur clubs are drawn against the Pro clubs of the NFP. Shocks are rare but have taken place more frequently in the last few years. Here are some brief thoughts on some of the games.

Barrow Border Raiders v Featherstone Lions

Barrow remain as hard as ever to beat on their own patch and there appears to be no reason why the Lions, who are fourth in the National Conference First Division, will trouble the Cumbrians. Prediction: Barrow by 40.

Batley Bulldogs v Oldham St Annes

St Annes almost caused an upset last season only being beaten in extra time against Doncaster. Batley are not having the best of seasons but their infamous slope always provides them with an advantage. Lets hope the local men can repeat last years heroics. Prediction: Batley by 32.

Castleford Lock Lane v Villeneuve

The French side must be favourites against Lock Lane, who are having an inconsistent season in the National Conference. The fact that the French always have to travel may prove a disadvantage but I doubt it. Prediction: Villeneuve by 16.

Doncaster Dragons v St Gaudens

Belle Vue is proving to be an intimidating place to visit so far this season. The French will arrive in good form but as underdogs. With players such as Carl Hall and Carl Gillespie it looks like the Dragons will have too much fire power for their opposition. Prediction: Doncaster by 20.

Rochdale Hornets v The Army

This should be a real battle (sorry, couldn't resist that!). The army beat Dewsbury Celtic 54-7 in the last round and certainly should lack little in fitness and courage. Rochdale have been hit by injuries but are beginning to get their season back on track. Prediction: Rochdale by 36.

Lancashire Lynx v Walney Central

Lynx have made a poor start to the season but had a good result against Whitehaven last weekend. Walney coach Dave Kendall has been doing his homework and must sense they are in with a chance.

Swinton Lions v Waterhead

Our local National Conference Division Two side Waterhead, have already done themselves a credit reaching this round for the first time in their history. It would seem

that they would have their work cut out though against a strong Swinton side. Mike Gregory certainly has improved the Lions fortunes this season by adding quality players such as Paul Loughlin to his squad. Prediction: Swinton by 48.

Skirlaugh had spies at Boundary Park last weekend and must have been impressed with a rapidly improving Town. With Dave Watson pulling the strings and Joe Nadiole adding power to the pack Town must be confident of achieving their first win of the season. Prediction: Workington by 16.

The club was founded in 1980, when a rugby club was formed from St. Judes Catholic Club in Wigan and took it's name from those origins. The three founder members are still serving officials of the club today, secretary Joe Fitzsimmons. along with Eddie Movlett and Tommy Martindale. The Wigan club made rapid progress through the North West Counties Leagues, and reached the premier division where they staved for three season before successfully applying to join the National Conference in 1995. They won the Conference Division Two title at the very first attempt. The following season they failed by just one agonising point to win a second successive promotion to the Premier League, when finishing third in Division One

St. Judes had already opened their clubhouse with a three pitch complex at Parsons Meadow, off Keats Avenue just a few minutes drive from the now defunct Central Park.

The venue staged the BARLA Great Britain versus Russia international in 1994.

From that base and under the guidance of Tommy Martindale St Jude's laid the foundations of what is now a very strong and vibrant youth structure. This gives the club a tremendous depth for the future with sides from under 7 to under 18s.

Players who have left the club to join the professional ranks include Kris Radlinski, Mick Cassidy, Wes Davies and Mark Smith (all Wigan), Sean Long (St Helens) and Craig Makin (Salford).

Head coach is former Wigan and Huddersfield player **Dave Walsh**.

Last season Judes reached the third round of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup going down to Rochdale Hornets (52-12).

NOT ALL that drops through the Walkers letterbox are final demands, junk mail or the Chron! Just received a letter from a certain Sir Adrian Stott, descendant of world famous architect, textile mill builder, baronet and Oldham rugby forward, **SIR PHILIP SIDNEY STOTT.**

Of course, in his playing days (around the 1880's) he was then just plain Phil, the knighthood awarded in 1920 supposedly in recognition of his mill design and building prowess but in truth for his financial support to the Blues (the Tories not the Latics).

Anyway to quote from Sir Adrians news, 'The Right Reverend, Dr John Lang is currently writing an autobiography of Sir Philip. Dr John of course is chaplain to Her Majesty (no less!) and can be contacted at.....!" (A must for the club shop!

which incidentally has the latest line in replica shirts, woolly hats, scarves, nodding dogs.....).

Sadly Sir Phil suffered his biggest setback in 1895 over in Germany when one of his mills collapsed, killing 22. He was temporarily imprisoned until finally exonerated when it was proved that the builder had carried out inept work. This was of course the world's first example of 'Jerry building' and also the first time, but nowhere near the last, that an Oldham forward would be thrown in jail!!

Sir Philip and the Stott millions retired to an estate in Gloucestershire, (taking a similar route to most of the wealth made from the towns textile industry!). Maybe now some could be shovelled back in this direction 'Dear Sir Adrian, Associated match sponsorship costs......'

Maybe a fellow NFP club in the next round. After beating them a Super League club at home would be nice.


Like who?

Hicks, Fred Royales and Tony Martin. Paul Hewitt has run the line at Wembley on four occasions, three Challenge Cup Finals and the 1995 World Cup Final. He has also officiated in France on seven occasions. Fred Royales is another official who has refereed in France, he had a particularly hair raising experience in Lezignan some years ago

but, as one of the most experienced officials in Oldham, I could fill this page three times over with stories of his playing and refereeing exploits. All sixteen referees have amusing stories to tell and they certainly get a great deal of amusement and satisfaction from the chosen profession.

Refereeing is not just the domain of the explayer thought. A stint of refereeing can introduce so many other aspects of the game to any young or aspiring player. The current Leeds skipper, Super League superstar lestyn Harris, was a member of the Oldham Society for about twelve months during his

early teens and that does not appear to have hindered his playing career or, indeed, his coaching duties with the Shaw Rhinos. Anyone who fancies taking up the whistle should contact the Oldham Society secretary Phil Bradbury on 284-3728. The Society will provide all kit except boots and, after undertaking a Tony Martin



short referees' course and a simple, basic exam, you are ready for your first match. probably an under-11s game between two of the local clubs. From then on referees are assessed by club officials at matches and exams are set in order to move through the various grades.



There is also a rigorous Paul Hewitt fitness test and so local

referees train each Thursday at Hathershaw Sports Centre under the watchful eye of Alan Burke, a former first grade official who recently retired from the middle because of a back problem. He hopes to remain in the game by working as a video referee at televised matches or maybe adding back-up to officials at Super League games.

Whatever position he eventually decides upon, Alan will always be around to give advice and, like several other ex-referees such as Johnny Blair and Sam Shepherd, he will retain his membership of the Oldham Society, a clear indication of the pleasure and fulfilment which one gets from being a member of this important branch of our sport.



MIKE FORD'S disappointment in last weeks victory over Workington is understandable. Mike is the consummate professional in everything he does. He is meticulous in approach and competitive to the last - anything less than 100% effort and achievement means there is room for improvement. As a coach there is nothing more frustrating than failing to transfer success on the training pitch into performances on match day. Whilst obviously feeling justifiably satisfied with our league position, after the initial few exchanges in a fiercely competitive NFP, Mike is quite rightly analysing the underlying reasons for the team not quite firing on all cylinders.

The players seem to have felt under increasing pressure in recent weeks as the expectations of supporters have rocketed following our great start to the season. This has clearly manifested itself in their play at times. They look edgy and like they are trying too hard to score every time they are in possession. Structured sets of six are subsequently lost, one pass too many given and the crowd becomes even even more restless. This is where I feel that we, as supporters, have a part to play if we can learn to exercise a little more patience. Fans are champing at the bit to enjoy any kind of success for the Roughyeds and don't get me wrong. that's great to see. However, it's all too easy to forget the difficulties of the last two years and the struggle we have endured to bring us to this early stage in the club's development.

During the Workington game, and particularly in what was a poor first half, you could clearly hear the tension in the crowd. Cries of 'get the ball out wide' on the first tackle and 'we should be beating teams like this' serve no more purpose than to add to the pressure on the players.

Let's put this into some kind of perspective here. I don't believe that Workington are a bad side and their performance certainly didn't reflect their position at the foot of the NFP table. The recent signings of players like Paul Cook and Dave Watson will ensure a steady improvement and I believe they are more than capable of earning a mid table berth come July. The team also needs time to gel together and on early showings there looks enough talent in the side to suggest that things can only get better. Despite not really hitting top gear in our first five games we are second in the table - a magnificent start to the season by anybody's standards and a positive indicator of what can be achieved in the long term.

Elsewhere, Mark Aston's Sheffield Eagles have secured a £100,000 sponsorship deal, the biggest in the NFP, with internet provider fastfreenet.com. This is not only a major coup for the Eagles but also one in the eye for the Super League officials who played such a significant role in their near demise. Sheffield, without any News Corporate funding, intend to celebrate this lifeline with an investment in local youth development. Super League officials, however, now look to be left without any major sponsor for their fast approaching season following BT's withdrawal from negotiations....now there's a

little natural justice for you! Sources have indicated that BT's decision has been influenced, in no small part, by the farcical instability of the closed season. It's disappointing, but sadly no surprise, to see that our 'showpiece' competition is not taken seriously by those who take a step back and view it's chaotic management from afar.

However, Northern Ford appear to be more than satisfied with their sponsorship of the Premiership. Winter Rugby with minimal fixture disruption in the seasons first month (unlike last year) and despite a continual Hull KR mud bath, increased competitiveness throughout the league, good crowds and the Roughyeds pushing hard for an end of year play off spot....now that's enough to make your heart glow, even on a cold Sunday afternoon in Oldham.



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



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THIS AFTERNOON the Roughyeds set out on the Murrayfield trail, with a match against St. Judes, a club from Wigan, the town which, at one time, seemed to be twinned with Wembley.

The senior Wigan club were Wembley winners eight years running between 1988 and 1995, winning 42 consecutive ties, including three against Oldham, in a sequence that almost failed to get off the mark. For it was on this day in 1988, Saturday 30th January, that Wigan entertained Bradford Northern at the start of that record breaking run. The Pieeaters scraped through a drab tie 2-0 with a controversial penalty from centre Joe Lydon late in the first half.

A product of the St. Judes club, versatile forward Mick Cassidy, played in ten of the closing eleven matches of that aforementioned run, his first tie coming on Sunday 30th January 1994 when Wakefield Trinity visited Wigan for a fourth round tie. Cassidy was at hooker in that match, which Wigan won 24-16, but he has been in the second-row for seven of the other nine ties, and substitute for the other two.

Twelve months previously, on Saturday 30th January 1993, Warrington met Castleford in a televised first round tie. The visitors were clear winners by 21-6 and it was scrum half Mike Ford who set Castleford on the way to victory by scoring their first try.

Ford is the only member of the current Oldham squad to have figured in a Wembley final although several former Roughyeds have appeared at Wembley, albeit with a different club. January 30th is a significant date in the careers of two of those Wembley finalists, John Fieldhouse and Terry Clawson. On Wednesday 30th January 1985 Fieldhouse made his debut in the Widnes second-row shortly after his transfer from Warrington. Widnes lost 26-12 at Wigan that night in another match which featured Mike Ford. He seems to get everywhere but was a scrum half on that occasion. Twenty years previously, on Saturday 30th January 1965, Ford was merely a twinkle in his father's eye so was not present when Terry Clawson made his debut for Bradford Northern in a home league match against the club with whom he started his career, Featherstone Rovers. Clawson landed a goal although Rovers spoiled his debut by beating Bradford 11-5.

Twelve months ago, on Saturday 30th January 1999, Oldham half-back Keith Brennan was playing amateur rugby in the North West Counties League with Shaw Rhinos. Kirkholt visited George Street that day and returned home on the wrong side on a 58-6 hammering. The Rhinos scored eleven tries and Brennan converted seven of them. On the same afternoon, Saturday 30th January 1999, former Oldham utility back Richard Darkes was back in town playing loose-forward for YMCA Huddersfield who took on Watersheddings Wanderers in a Pennine League match. There did not appear to be many christian actions in that match which YMCA won 38-6 after a bitter clash in which Watersheddings stand-off Mark Jewitt was shown the red card. There was plenty of good rugby up at Waterhead Park where Waterhead beat Castleford Panthers 14-4 in the second round of the BNFL National Cup. Winger John Thewlis scored a first half try for the home side and then, after the break, hooker Chris McAndrew grabbed another and Jon Perks added three goals.

Waterhead are at Swinton today where we hope they pull off a shock result although here at Boundary Park it is the last thing we want.
