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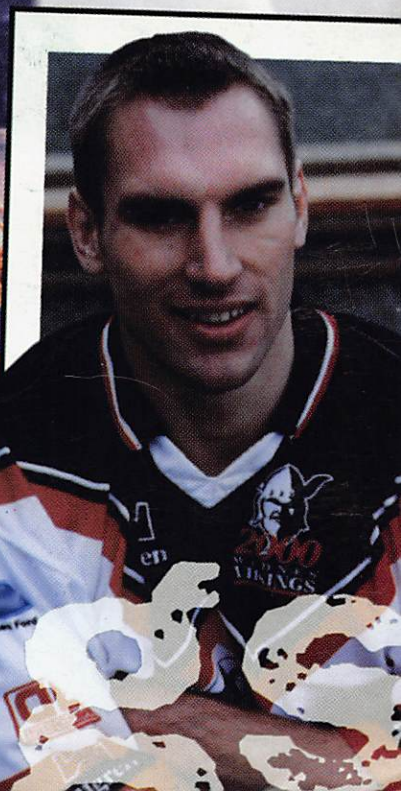
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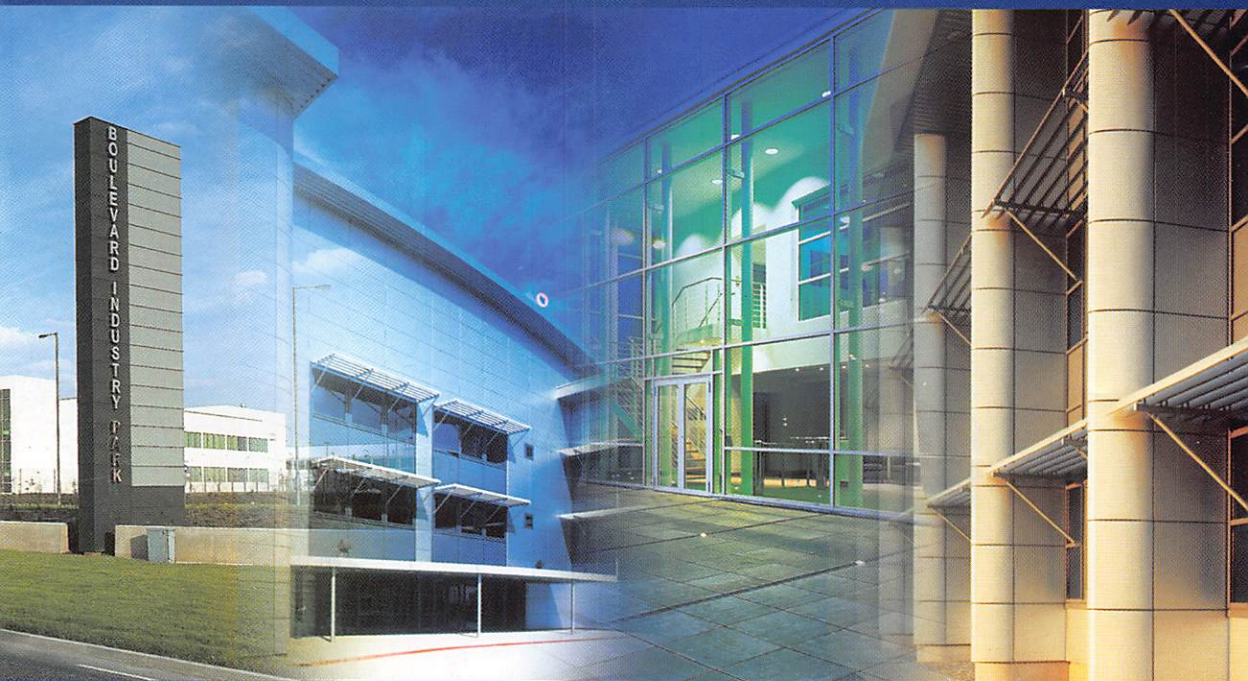

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VIKING VISITORS OLDHAM RLFC

CRAIG BARKER Local lad who was with the Bears before signing for the Roughyeds when one club died and the other was born in 1997. A stand-off half with a neat pair of hands, this product of the Waterhead amateur club is still waiting for the opportunity to command a senior place consistently.

KEITH BRENNAN A late entrant into the pro ranks, Keith played for Higginshaw and Shaw Rhinos before impressing as an amateur for Oldham towards the end of the 1999 season. Did enough to be offered a contract for 2000 at the age of 25. An extremely accomplished scrum half who is expected to push player-coach Mike Ford all the way for the number 7 jersey. **MARK CAMPBELL** One of 16 new boys brought to the club by Mike Ford during the first two months of the player-coach's reign. Formerly with Leeds Rhinos and Keighley Cougars. A 28-year-old hard-working back-row forward.

LEO CASEY Needs no introduction. A tough prop, who played with the former Oldham club, Featherstone Rovers, Swinton and Rochdale Hornets before signing for the Roughyeds for the 1999 season. Captained the side and, at the age of 32, became a firm favourite with the crowd. An Irish international, he was the first and only Oldham player to command a transfer fee of £100,000 when Peter Fox took him to Featherstone. **JASON CLEGG** A product of Littleborough RL club, this heavyweight prop turned pro for Bradford Bulls and had a stint with Batley before signing for the Roughyeds shortly after the club was formed. Made a first team place his own property in 1999 and earned selection for the West of Pennines side against an East side coached by Mike Ford. **MIKE FORD** A scrum half who has been making the right sort of headlines all his sporting life. Played for Wigan at Wembley when only 19. Also starred for Leigh, Oldham, Castleford, Warrington, Wakefield and South Queensland Crushers. Toured down under with Great Britain in 1988. Coached Bramley to mid-table respectability in 1999 before landing the Oldham job. **ANTHONY GIBBONS** One half of the twin combination which played for Leeds Rhinos and Bramley before joining Oldham at the start of the 2000 season. A utility back, 23-year-old Anthony is earmarked to play right centre. **DAVID GIBBONS** The other twin. Like brother Anthony, David turned pro with Leeds Rhinos as a 17-year-old to follow in the footsteps of their uncle, Neil Hague. Both became household names at Headingley and played more than 20 senior games, including several in the first Super League season of 1996.

DANNY GUEST This 22-year-old, 18 stone prop was an up-and-coming youngster with the Bears. He played for the

Roughyeds in the new club's first ever, and historic, game at Rochdale on January 1 1998, but then joined Keighley on a round-robin return to the Roughyeds via Lancashire Lynx. **JOEY HAYES** A young winger who has crammed a lot into his relatively short spell as a pro. Made his name with St. Helens, for whom he played in a Regal Trophy final and a Super League Premiership final to earn a place on the Great Britain tour squad which went to New Zealand, Fiji and Papua New Guinea in 1996. Suffered a setback with a serious knee injury, but fought back to play 11 Super League games with Salford Reds in 1999. **CHRIS HOLLAND** Aged 21 and a product of the youth game in Wigan, Chris has played for England and Great Britain Students and took the man-of-the-match award in England's defeat by New Zealand at Hull in the last World Cup. **JOHN HOUGH** Will go down in local RL history as the first player to sign for the new Oldham club when it was launched in the autumn of 1997. Has had two cracking seasons in 1998 and 1999, when he took the club's player of the year award. A native of Oldham, John played more than 30 senior games for Warrington. **KEVIN MANNION** Another Wiganer, 22-year-old Kevin is a ball-playing loose-forward who made his senior debut with Rochdale Hornets when only 16.

AIDIE MEAD Starting his third season with the Roughyeds after playing initially for the Bears. Did well as a centre in the Bears Alliance team of 1997, but prefers wing. **JOE MCNICHOLAS** Played his first senior game in the Bears' last match at Leeds. Broke his leg for the Roughyeds in the new club's first league game at Workington and missed the rest of the 1998 season.

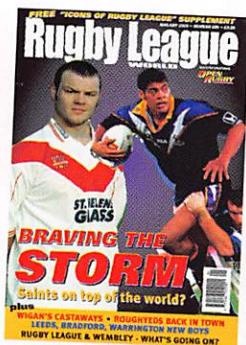
CHRIS NAYLOR A young prop formerly with the Academy sides at St. Helens and Salford. Big and strong, Chris played for England in the last Students World Cup. **ANDY PROCTOR** Named captain of the club by Ford for the 2000 season. This former Saddleworth, Wakefield Trinity, Oldham and Bramley prop forward, now aged 30, won a man of steel award while with Trinity, as the club was then called. **PAT RICH** Another of the younger signings, 21-year-old Pat is a native of the North East. Played regular senior rugby for Keighley in 1999, while studying for a law degree at Leeds. **WES ROGERS** A strong second-row forward, Wes has joined his home-town club after stints with Widnes and Swinton. **MARK SIBSON** An exciting full-back and goal kicker, this 23-year-old played for Loughborough University for four years before turning out for Castleford's Alliance side. **IAN SINFIELD** Local lad, Ian signed for an played Super League rugby with Salford before joining the Roughyeds in 1998. **NATHAN VARLEY** One of the best tacklers in the club, Nathan played for the Roughyeds in 1998 and 1999 after signing from Bradford. Missed much of the last season, but is fully fit now and raring to go in the new millennium.

2. Which two former Widnes players have coached Oldham in the past fifteen years? A clue is that one of them was in the Vikings first team as recently as 1998.

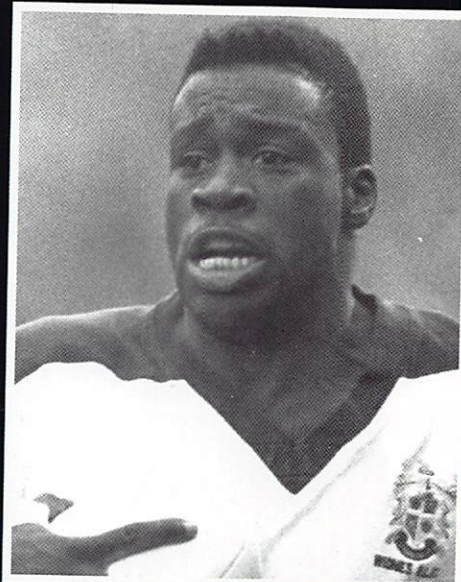

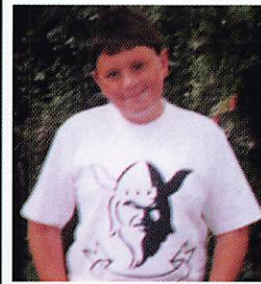

■ **Another thing which made me laugh was a letter in League Express last week from a Wigan fan saying how much she enjoyed watching NFP rugby at Leigh.**

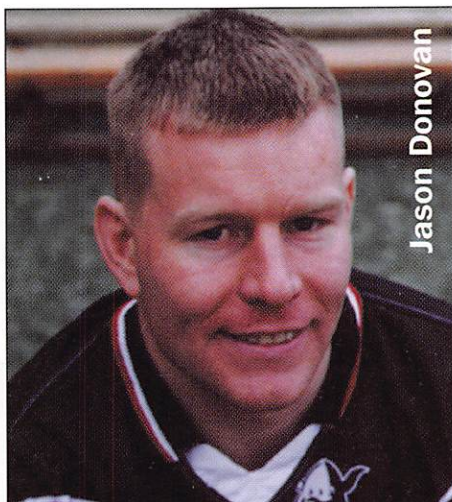

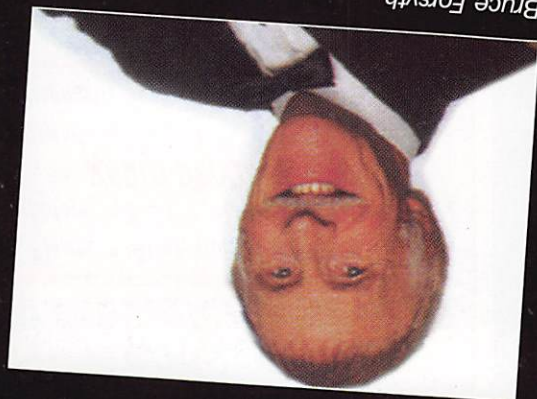
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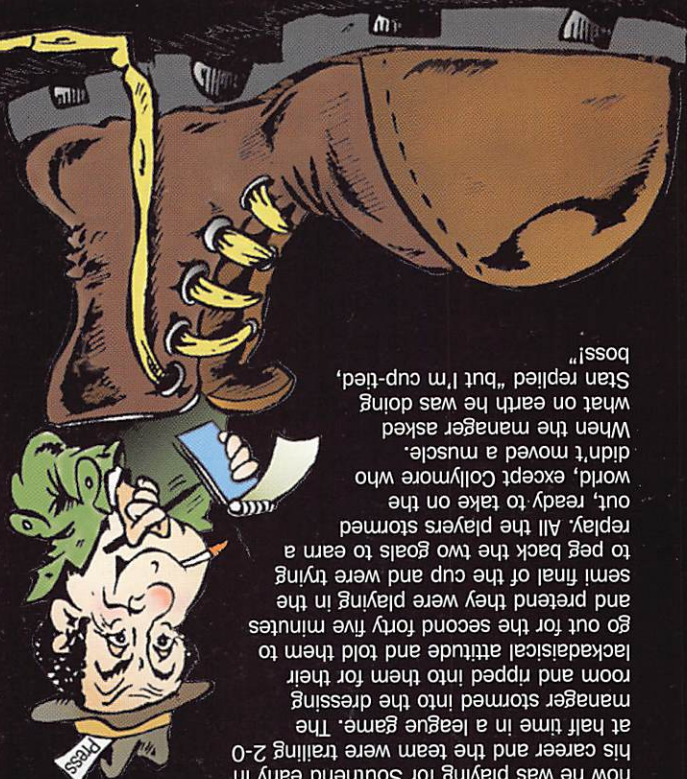

Mr Murdoch (not that he is losing any sleep over that state of affairs) but I do object to our sport being singled out for attack because of the financial travails of some clubs. If you were to take a look at just about any Nationwide league soccer club their balance sheets would make us appear like millionaires in comparison and they've also had a few bob of Sky's money over recent times as well, have they not? I also object to blatant distortion of the facts and that is what is going on when people complain that there is no RL on telly any more because Sky have got it all. The truth is that the only rugby which Sky have which the BBC used to have are the internationals and even there the Beeb still get highlights. The Regal Trophy has gone altogether, of course, but that was inevitable once the decision was made to switch to the summer and the extra Challenge Cup coverage almost makes up. In the dim and distant the BBC did used to show the County Cups but they lost interest in these in the late 1980's (local commercial TV screened the last two or three years), something which may well have helped hasten the demise of those famous old competitions. And as for league rugby - well that just makes my blood boil. I was talking to a mate not long ago who had clearly swallowed the media hype, used to have league games shown on the BBC instead of Sky," he said. It may well have been, but you'd have to have a pretty long memory to recall the time when the Beeb last showed championship matches live. It certainly goes back to the Eddie Waring era, which places it at least before 1982, probably further still in the mists of time. For all those subsequent years the rights to the Slalom Lager/Stones Bitter Championship were going begging. Granada and Yorkshire TV dabbled with them for a while, but at any time the Beeb could probably have secured league rugby on a twenty year contract for the price of one of Bruce Forsyth's wigs. But did they bother? Of course they bloody didn't. They were happy to skim off the cream, being the cup comps, to pay peanuts for international rugby on annual contracts, to allocate us thirty seconds per year on the Sports Review and generally to use us as filler material on

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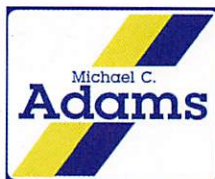
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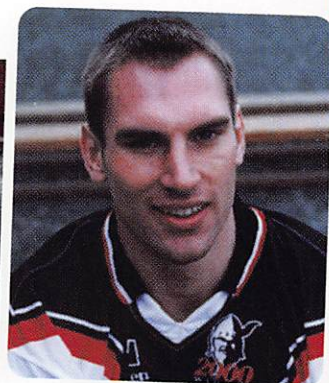
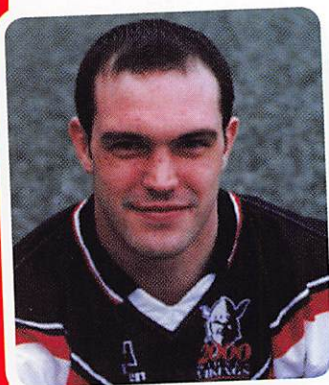
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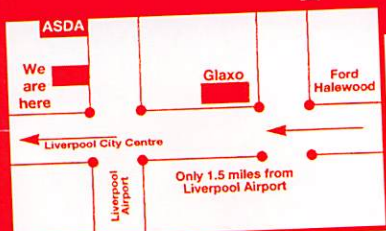
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TRAINSPOTTING

We are really paranoid, well not paranoid, but extremely sensitive about our television commentators aren't we?

Every programme (sorry, match day magazine) writer and contributor to the prestigious Rugby Leaguer Letters to the Editor section has a go...and often with plenty of justification. But there's more to it than that. Take Stuart Hall, sometime colleague of Eddie Waring on It's A Knockout, currently fronting the JIB Sports advertising campaign and, importantly, a soccer (I'll never call it football) commentator on Radio Five Live. Why was it OK for Hall to front one of the tackiest (and this is going some) game shows ever to grace our telly and not lose credibility for his sport like Eddie is perceived to have done? Why are the surreal ramblings which constitute his post match summaries not held up to ridicule in the same way that Eddie's more fanciful outpourings were? Easy: there are many soccer commentators on radio and TV, so Hall's rococo style is balanced out, it was the same when the team from Billerica played their joker and when he's trying to flog JJB's end of range bargains. All Rugby League had was Eddie. He truly was the voice of Rugby League. Waring mangled the language, reinforced all sorts of stereotypes and quite often didn't interpret play all that well. But he sure knew his Rugby League, as his CV shows. Mike Stephenson has a lot in common with Eddie Waring. He's a Dewsbury lad, he's a bit quirky with his use of English and he says lots of things that the expert fan (and aren't we all experts?) disagrees with. He also knows his Rugby League. The difference is that he has a counterpoint in the rather more urbane Eddie Hemmings, he has far

better production values than Eddie Waring, who didn't have the luxury of even the most primitive form of action replay for instance. And there's the rub. Stevo is the Eddie Waring of today and I reckon he makes, on the whole, a good job of it. Yet the current BBC incumbents, with all their improved production values, albeit nowhere near as good as SKY's, don't seem to be hacking it. If Eddie Waring had had all those toys at his disposal, he would have been unstoppable. I don't want to have a go at Ray French because; I've done it before, I like him, and whatever you say it doesn't make any difference. We all know what his peccadilloes are, although he called some brilliant games at the back end of the Challenge Cup last year.

Jonathan Davies on the other hand is another proposition. We've talked about his siren like voice, his lack of touch with the current game and the fact that he only got the job because he used to be a Rugby Union player as well. The reason he is a different proposition is that there are loads of his contemporaries who are more articulate, use their voices better and have an exclusively Rugby League pedigree - I offer you Paul Cullen as an example. Who could replace Ray? Not John Champion, he does soccer on Saturdays and people are already starting to have a go at him because he's a smart a**e.

Which brings me to the point where I once again reiterate the idea that whoever it is, people will have a go at them because, well, your supposed to aren't you?

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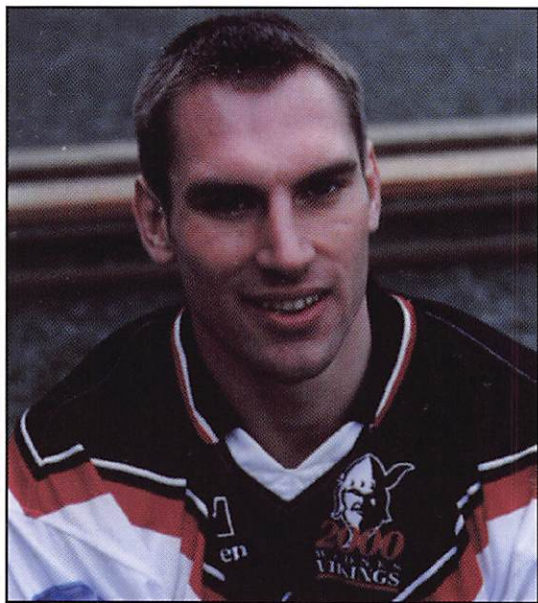
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memories ARE MADE OF THIS

There have been plenty of big games between Oldham and Widnes down the years but, despite both clubs having collected plenty of silverware between them, we have yet to meet in the final of a major cup competition.

Perhaps this has something to do with the fact that the Roughyeds most succesful periods, prior to 1930 and the during the 1950s, were two eras in which our club was relatively week. On the other hand Oldham weren't so strong when we were in our pomp in the 1930s, 70s and 80s.

There won't be too many people here today who remember it, but arguably the most important meeting between the sides was in 1934 in the semi final of the Challenge Cup. We were bidding to reach our second Wembley final in five years whereas Oldham were bidding for their first visit to the twin towers. The game, played at Swinton in front of a crowd of 17,577 paying £1,050, was a close one but we prevailed by the score of 7-4 before going on to lose in the final against Hunslet.



As all students of the game will know, Oldham are still waiting for their first visit to Wembley some sixty-odd years later and on the occasion when they came closest to achieving that there was also a Widnes connection. The cup semi final draw of 1964 saw us paired with Castleford and Oldham drawn to play Hull KR. Amazingly both ties finished all square - the only time that has happened in the Wembeley era, with our game seing a 7-7 scoreline and the Robins-Roughyeds encounter resulting in an equally dour 5-5 draw.

Our replay, in Castleford's backyard in Wakefield, was another close encounter but we triumphed by a score of 7-5. Over at Swinton history was being made. The scores were once more level, 14-14 at eighty minutes but Oldham had established a 17-14 lead over the Humbersiders in extra time. A Widnes-Oldham Challenge Cup final beckoned, but the lack of floodlights at the Swinton venue meant that the light wasn't good enough to play out the full period of extra time and so the match was abandoned. The Roughyeds chance had gone and they were well beaten by 12-2 in the third game. A footnote to those amazing sequence of matches is that all five attracted attendances in excess of 25,000, no mean feat given that the replays were played in midweek in an era before motorways. Of the several other occasions when Oldham came close to reaching Wembley, the 1990 campaign stands out not just because they were a second division side who were cruelly denied a final place by a late disallowed try in the semi against Warrington, but also because they achieved a shock 16-4 win against a star-studded Widnes team in the semi-final here on Lowerhouse Lane, with a couple of ex-Chemics Keith Newton and Duncan Platt doing the damage that day. One game that the Roughyed fans will not thank us for recalling is last season's match at the Auto Quest when we racked up a club record victory of 84-0 against a visiting team severely depleted by injuries. Phil Cantillon (pictured) was our hero that day, bagging five tries to equal the club record.

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It's about time we came up with some positives about Rugby League after the negatives of last week's report on Super League. The On The Line programme, on Radio 5, presented an in-depth view of Super League via the thesis of a Sheffield University student.

The research evidence claimed that when Super League started five years ago its performance criteria was increased crowds, establishment of clubs in development areas, a larger TV audience and greater sponsorship in terms of the number of sponsors and the amount of sponsorship achieved. On all counts Super League has apparently failed, other than to have slight increases on average attendances. There are no new clubs in development areas – gone are Paris, Sheffield and Gateshead. Despite the superb coverage of RL on Sky TV, audiences are tiny in comparison to those who watched RL on Grandstand on Saturday afternoons. Smaller TV audiences have apparently reduced the amount of sponsorship received by the game as a whole and for SL clubs in particular. Even the Challenge Cup format has been criticised because of the failure of NFP clubs to offer any meaningful resistance to SL clubs. So I have decided to find some good news of my own about the NFP and share it with you. Elsewhere in the programme this season we have seen figures which reflect a steady increase in attendances for most clubs. But those who scrutinise such figures carefully suggest that the totals so far may not be an improvement on last year overall. But, I am here to tell you that they are! If we look at the games played so far this season and compare them with the identical fixture last season, we can achieve a direct comparison. The table below shows who has had the largest total increases in numbers and also in percentage terms. Remember that last year not all teams played each other home and away. We also have to ignore attendances for teams who have

played Sheffield Eagles at home this year because there was no corresponding fixture last year.

As you can see, almost every club has increased attendances when comparing this years attendance figures with those of the same fixture last year. Eleven clubs have shown an increase in attendances for every comparable home game played so far. Hunslet, it appears, are this seasons only losers.

DONCASTER v HUNSLET

The Dragons came through a potentially tricky derby game at Sheffield last Sunday with a win that was more convincing than the 16-10 scoreline suggests, since they scored four tries to the Eagles one. Just a week earlier they had put up a highly creditable performance at Wigan and it seems that St John Ellis has done a fine job in moulding together his big-money team into a well organised unit which plays a good brand of football.

It might be a little too strong to say that the Hawks are in crisis but the latest high-profile departures from South Leeds Stadium - Greame Hallas and Dean Hanger - suggest that all is not well in David Plange's squad. He is now left to rely on a very youthful team and it will be a major test of his coaching credentials as to whether he can improve on their current record of just two wins from eight games.

Editor's Verdict: Doncaster have been very clinical so far this season and I don't expect them to slip up against the Hawks.

FEATHERSTONE v BATLEY

Rovers are one of the form teams in the division at present having won their last five games and they are also scoring plenty of points into the bargain. Teenage halfback Jamie Rooney continues to be the driving force behind the success but a big blow to the men from Post Office Road will be the loss to Salford of Brad Hepi. The arrival of the experienced Kiwi coincided with their recent

revival and they will certainly miss his power in midfield. Ex-Rovers coach David Ward will lack nothing in motivation as he takes a side full of former Featherstone lads back to their old stomping ground. The Bulldogs form this season has been a real mystery. On their travels they have won three out of four, including a 32-16 drubbing of Swinton on their last road game, which is playoff form. But they still haven't managed a single win on their own paddock. It was a similar story last year and one which Ward must solve if his team are to achieve their potential.

Editor's Verdict: Every week I predict one or two shock results and every week there are one or two shock results...though not the ones I've plumped for. I'll stick my neck out and take the Bulldogs to extend their good away form.

HULL KR v WHITEHAVEN

The Robins put behind them the disappointment of that controversial defeat against Leigh with a resounding victory at Batley last weekend.

Kiwi halfback Leroy Joe at last seems to be finding his feet following his move from Whitehaven and Mark Hewitt is earning glowing reports for his all-round play as well as his goalkicking.

Whitehaven are another enigma club. They followed up a 98-0 drubbing at Wigan with their first away win of the season at Rochdale and then lost their 100% home record at the hands of Swinton. Last week's loss probably had something to do with the absence of hooker Aaron Lester (pictured) who coach Kevin Tamati



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has admitted is at the heart of most of his team's good work.

Editor's Verdict: Whitehaven normally don't like travelling to Lancashire, let alone to the East coast, so expect a comfortable home win in this one.

KEIGHLEY v SHEFFIELD

After their recent big win over Dewsbury and 28-8 up at half time against high flying Leigh last week, it all seemed set fair for the Cougars for another big scalp. But the Centurions bounced back for a sensational 36-28 win which will have been a big blow to the confidence of the Keighley side.

Sheffield continue to trouble most sides in the competition - they ran Doncaster close following on from that nail biter at the Auto Quest a fortnight ago - but their big problem is that they just aren't scoring enough tries. Their thin squad is also stretched to the limit by a number of injuries to key players.

Editor's Verdict: Expect the Eagles to give a good account of themselves but to be unable to outscore the free flowing Cougars.

LANCASHIRE LYNX v LEIGH

The plight of the Lynx was epitomised when three of their players failed to turn up last week and coach Steve Hampson was forced to register himself as a player only minutes before the game at Oldham, which predictably resulted in a fifty point mauling. Hampo was threatening to seek employment elsewhere if the situation at the club did not improve, with a role as personal trainer to golfer Darren Clarke being one possibility.

Leigh, on the other hand, are riding the crest of a wave. Five successive wins include consecutive away victories at Hull KR and Keighley. Alan Cross and Andy Fairclough are their in-form players with eight and seven tries respectively.

Editor's Verdict: The League Against Cruel Sports should have something to say about this mis-match. I tip Leigh to win by the odd point or two.

ROCHDALE v WORKINGTON

We recently triumphed comfortably at Rochdale and then lost at Workington five days later so a form line might suggest a Town win. But of course sport doesn't always work out like that. Much will depend on whether Aussies Dane

The Raiders put in an excellent performance here at the Auto Quest a few weeks ago, with halves Darren Holt and Tane Manihera

(pictured) bossing the show. Much attention will focus on recent recruit from Aussie RL, fullback Rod Maybon.

Editor's Verdict: The Raiders to trouble the Lions but the home side to emerge victorious.

Editor's Verdict: No prediction!





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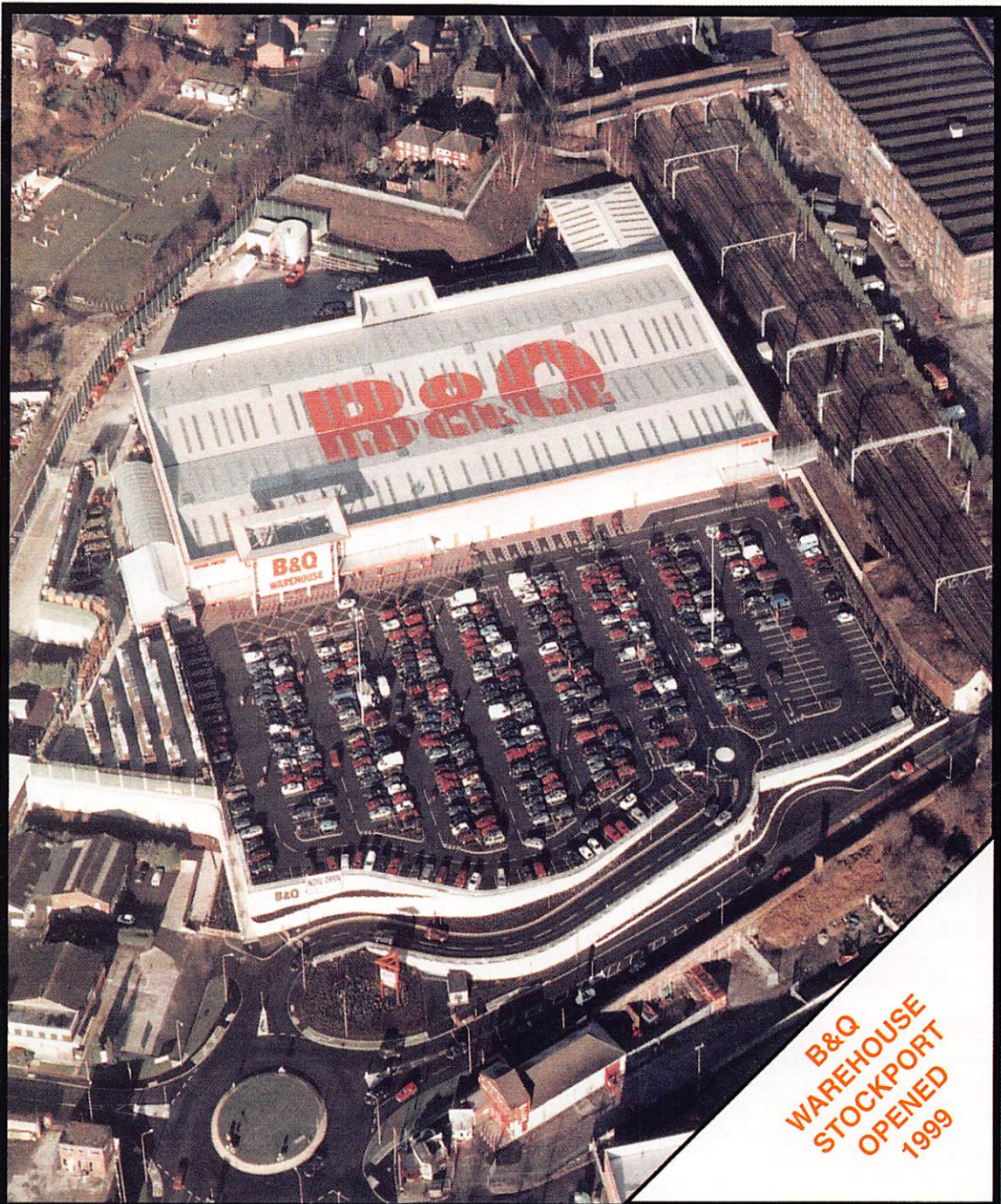
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
