

THIS afternoon's game against the in-form Oldham Roughyeds is the first in a sequence of tough looking fixtures which will really test the capabilities of the Rovers' young squad. Player coach Mike Ford has done tremendously well in transforming a below-average side from last season into an outfit which is capable of giving any team in the Northern Ford Premiership a run for their money, as high flying Dewsbury found out last Sunday.

Rovers themselves, have proved also to be one of the 'surprise packets' of the season so far, with only two league defeats, in attaining a lofty third spot in the Premiership table. The loss of star quality players such as Brendon Tuuta, Hitro Okesene, Wayne Simonds and Richard Slater was considered to be a huge blow to the immediate fortunes of the club with the responsibility being laid squarely on the shoulders of a crop of youngsters who many thought would lack the physical attributes and experience to cope. Incredibly those same young men have come of age very quickly indeed and are growing in confidence with every game they play.

It may be a coincidence but to my mind the one game which really proved to these youngsters that they possess genuine talent was the Silk Cut Challenge Cup game against the Leeds Rhinos when the players' performance against the current trophy holders won them so very many friends. Although Rovers were defeated, that game in my opinion, proved to be a psychological victory from which the side has not yet looked back.

Having said that, we are by no means getting carried away. There is a long way to go and many tough matches ahead. We still need at least one big, tough and experienced forward and the club is

confident in making progress in this department over the next couple of days, having agreed a deal with a player who will be no stranger to the supporters of both of today's competing teams. Get your thinking caps

Next Sunday's game at Hilton Park against table toppers, Leigh Centurions, will go ahead as normal due to the Trans Pennine Cup Final now being played mid-week on Wednesday 12th April. The game will see the return of powerful forward, Micky Clarkson, who completes his four match ban this afternoon. His offence, as you will remember, was leading with the elbow which, in fairness, has to be punished. The annoying aspect of Micky's suspension is that he appears to have been treated more severely than Wakefield's Frank Watene who was also dismissed for the same offence which looks every bit as bad, if not worse, on video than Micky's and he only received a three match ban. If Rovers win today Micky will have lost four winning pay packets. Presumably Frank Watene, being with a Super League club, will still be receiving contract money. There seems to be a great disparity in the level of punishment for the same offence. Unfortunately it is too late for us to appeal against Micky's suspension but I would like someone to explain the reason for such an inconsistent application of justice.

Another question that I would like to know the answer to is . . . who was the last Super League player to receive a ban of four or more matches for any type of offence? My guess is that you'll have to go back a long, long way.

As you all know I would be the last person to suggest that Super League players receive preferential treatment.

Lancaster's Look Back

FEATHERSTONE Rovers entered senior Rugby League in the 1921/22 season after a number of successful seasons in junior football. As this is the first season of a new Millennium we thought we would look back at the men, some famous, some not so famous, who all played their part in that history making first year. Steve Lancaster continues his look back at the players who played their part in Featherstone Rovers' history-making first year.

JACK HIRST (36)

Debut: 27 August, Bradford (A) 17-3

Position: C Farewell: 6 December 30 Broughton R (H) 4–7

Career: A T G Po

278 115 3 351

Hemsworth youngster Jack Hirst was given a trial in November 1920. Having impressed he was signed immediately afterwards and went on to become one of Rovers' finest ever players. In a 10 year career JH played 278 times scoring 115 tries, almost 1 every 2 games, a terrific record in any era. Jack was a Centre with pace and body swerve, he seemed to glide across the ground. Played in the opening fixture against Bradford, making 36/39 appearances scoring 9 tries that season. Had to wait until his 7th appearance for his first try against Leeds (H) 1/10/21 scoring both tries in 10-13 defeat. Jack Hirst has the honour of being the first Rovers' player to score a hat trick against Bradford (H) 23/12/22 finishing the match with 4 tries in a 40-12 win. In that 2nd season JH crossed the whitewash a further 14 times, giving him his best ever return 18/25 appearances. Amazingly for such a prolific try scorer Jack finished as the club's top try scorer on only three occasions, 1922/23, 1923/24, and 1928/29. Jack was a

try scorer on 28/4/28 (A) Leeds in the play off semi final when Rovers beat Leeds 15-12. A week later JH lined up in a unchanged side at Watersheddings against Swinton but was unable to prevent Rovers going down 5-0. Rovers were Championship runners up in only their 7th season, a remarkable achievement. The following season 1928/29 JH missed just 4 games, playing 40 times including Rovers first Yorkshire Cup final appearance at Belle Vue, Wakefield against Leeds. Rovers again went down 5-0. A regular County player and England International, Jack Hirst's career was cut short by a knee injury which forced his retirement. Jack's Final try on 26/11/30 came (A) Swinton in a 7-21 defeat.

TAYLOR JOHNSON (4)

Signed from Dewsbury in July 1921, Taylor made a 2 try debut against Salford playing Centre. Last appearance came in a 0-0 draw (H) Bramley. Amazingly Rovers were nilled 8 times in that first season. Unable to force his way into the side, TJ drifted away from Post Office Road.



. . . OF THE RUGBY LEAGUER

IT WAS a treat to see Gateshead - sorry, Hull - on the telly a couple of weeks ago.

Not only because they beat mighty Wigan. Given the strength of the squad assembled by Shaun McRae, that was hardly a massive surprise. No, it was the many elements away from the action that impressed me.

There is a term in the newspaper business and in other walks of life known as USP. That stands for Unique Selling Point, it's something many businesses would give their eye teeth for, and it's a quality that many professional Rugby League clubs have in abundance.

None more than Hull. The evidence was there for the nation to see against Wigan, as it will be today for the Silk Cut Challenge Cup semi-final against Leeds.

It was a terrible mistake when Hull discarded the sobriquet 'FC' for the anonymous 'Sharks'. And it was just as bad when the famous irregular black and white hoops were replaced by something which could almost have belonged to any club.

They could never gag the fans though, and Old Faithful has remained the rallying call from the Boulevard terraces and the Threepenny Stand.

Not that it's been heard too often in the past few seasons. But the signs are that the good times could be back. And the old cowboy song is likely to reverberate throughout the north and beyond for a while yet.

Happily, the fans will no longer be cheering on the Sharks. It's back to the stylish Hull FC, a master-stroke of marketing which has put right a piece of idiocy foisted on the club by someone with little regard for Rugby League's traditions.

The same goes for the shirt, back to the

style worn by the likes of Billy Batten. Those colours, I always thought, must have been worth five points start to the Airlie Birds and they look superb.

It never ceased to amaze me that so many clubs seemed intent on dumping the strips which had served them so well for so long and which looked so good. If that last remark seems outdated, I can only defend myself by pointing out that major companies such as Benetton sold polo shirts based on the traditional Workington Town and Dewsbury colours by the million.

It's a pity there was no right of copyright on those designs, but at least many clubs have seen the light and are reverting to their original strips.

Hunslet have brought back the proper Myrtle, White and Flame, Leeds are again recognisable, and St Helens no longer look like Val Doonican after a night on the tiles.

Perhaps the most evocative strip of all -Featherstone Rovers' - presently graces the National Conference League, courtesy of Featherstone Lions.

I wrote earlier that Hull FC's strip must have been worth five points start. Rovers' certainly was, and I speak from experience. No rugby side has looked classier or more fearsome than Featherstone, and I know I am not the only fan who hopes that the Post Office Road outfit opts to return permanently to one of the most famous strips in the world.

The same applies to all the other clubs with long and proud heritages that should be nurtured and cherished. Unique Selling Points are among the first things the successful Marketing man seeks to highlight. We appear, at last, to be making the most of them.

ROVERS V OLDHAM Last time at Lionheart Stadium 27th June 1999

AT the time of Oldham's last visit to Featherstone we were pushing strongly for a top five spot, having regained our sense of direction under new coach Peter Roe. Only three points behind fifth placed Widnes, a win in this game was a must if our momentum was to be maintained.

Oldham on the other hand were languishing near the bottom of the table with only four wins from fourteen starts.

We had of course already beaten Oldham only two weeks earlier in a league game played at Rochdale, so we knew exactly what we were up against.

Inspired by acting skipper Richard Slater Rovers were in control from the start and never allowed the Oldham attack to get into gear.

Jamie Rooney kicked Rovers into a third minute lead and then only seven minutes later converted his own try after good work from Okesene and Bramald.

Newlove was next on the score sheet shortly followed by Stokes, who touched down under the sticks following a kick by Rooney.

With the young scrum half converting both tries and then coolly slotting over a drop goal on

thirty five minutes Rovers were fully deserved of their 21 - 0 half time lead.

The second period saw Oldham score their only points of the day albeit as a result of a terrible defensive blunder - two Rovers' defenders failing to collect a harmless looking kick allowed Farrell the opportunity of an easy try. The Oldham full back duly converted his own try but that was the last we saw of the Roughyeds.

Nine minutes into the half Rooney had Handley over the line for another converted try to make it 27 - 6 and at that point the remnants of the Oldham defence completely wilted.

Six Rovers' tries in the final quarter saw Oldham completely routed.

Coventry, only on the field a few minutes, began the final onslaught when he raced in from the halfway line, then Amone followed up in typical style by forcing his way over from short range. Next was Matt Bramald who gathered Handley's kick to score wide of the uprights, and as the scoring spree continued Okesene's class was apparent when both Handley and Tuuta were on hand to put the ball over the whitewash. In the dying seconds Tuuta provided the final pass for Handley to complete a well deserved hat trick.

Rooney landing five out of six conversion attempts during this last twenty minutes meant that he finished the day with a creditable twenty five point haul.



BACK TO Post Office Road for the action this afternoon with the visit of Oldham. Many supporters will make the journey over the Pennines as Oldham is currently having resurgence after the ill fated Super League days. It's nice to see, long may it continue. Have a pleasant day with us but hopefully not too much of a happy one, as Rovers supporters obviously want the win and two vital points. Welcome just the same whoever you're here to

support today.

With Rovers sitting proudly up in the top four and a bit of a gap beginning to appear things are looking good despite Peter Roe constantly telling us how young, inexperienced a side Rovers are, not to mention how small a squad he has at his disposal. Of course Peter is right but supporters can't help themselves, his words are now a few inches above our heads instead of in our ears. I can't help comparing his words to those of David O'Leary who has been singing from the same hymn sheet all season, yet Leeds Utd are there, why not Rovers?

Oldham and Rovers go back along way without really having had our paths cross in any significant way, big games, finals or the like (except the Premiership at Old Trafford but that was division two, and anyway we lost, so let's not talk about that). 23rd April 1995 is one fixture no supporter can ever forget. The final fixture of that season, here at Post Office Road. The final fixture ever, possibly, no more Rovers. John's Hill's words on the video as fans flood onto the pitch in protest of the merger. (Where are you all now?). The result didn't matter; the players took an age to get off the pitch, lifted up as though they had just won the Championship. For the record Rovers won 36-14, but so what Rovers were to become Calder and Oldham were to become Manchester along with Salford and Swinton. Visionaries, who needs em? Up until that point Oldham were just a Lancashire outfit playing in a crappy ground that you always fancied Rovers could take two points off. Oldham survived and thankfully now is on the up. Rugby League needs all our clubs however big or small they may be. Expect Cas, of course.

WHO'S THE BEST?

League Express editor MARTYN SADLER considers today's big game in the Northern Ford Premiership.

Few people would argue against the view that Dewsbury and Leigh have been the two form teams in Northern Ford

Premiership in the early weeks of this

year's competition.

So it is wholly right and proper that these two clubs will contest the Trans-Pennine Cup final

Wednesday 12 April.

Dewsbury have only lost one game - to Keighley Cougars - while Leigh went down to Whitehaven and Swinton. More importantly, both clubs have an unbeaten run in the league competition, with Leigh's last defeat on 16 January in West Cumbria, while Dewsbury's defeat at Keighley came on 5 February, a game that I saw, when the Cougars played out of their skins to beat their Yorkshire rivals.

One of the two clubs will go into Trans-Pennine final with another defeat, however, if only because they play each other today at Ram Stadium in what looks likely to be the game of the season so far in the NFP.

Leigh are currently at the top of the league, with Dewsbury, having played one game fewer, in second place. It's the sort of game that should, by rights, have a massive crowd turning out at the Ram Stadium.

Leigh, despite losing their inspirational coach lan Millward to St Helens recently, had a great 22-6 win last weekend at home to title challengers Doncaster Dragons, while Dewsbury came back to pip Oldham at the post 14-12 at Boundary Park.

I'm still not sure that the rest of Rugby League world fully understands what a good standard the competition is reaching this season. Just read the report of these two games in League Express last Monday, and you'll realise just how compelling they were.

Dewsbury, still missing Agar, did marvellously well to hold out the rampant Roughyeds, with Barry Eaton,

as always, their main organiser, and the hard running Sean Richardson the

game star.

Leigh, in their first game without Millward at the helm, gradually pulled ahead of the Dragons after being level half-time, with Tim Street inspirational, as always, fullback Stuart Donlan a standout, and temporary coach Norman Turley timing his substitution just right, by swapping his hookers - the outstanding youngster Mick Higham and the experienced Anthony Murray - after 60 minutes, with two tries that clinched the game coming shortly afterwards.

It was great stuff, and would have been a pleasure for any Leigh fan, or

NFP fans generally, to read about.

Despite all the great rugby, however, I still have a nagging feeling that the Northern Ford Premiership is not getting the profile it deserves, apart from in the Rugby League dedicated



A Rough Guide to ...

OLDHAM

OLDHAM have had a rather troubled existence over the past few years, but appear to have put all their troubles behind them. A new Board and new thinking have put the club on a steady course.

MIKE FORD (Player/Coach) Has put together a well balanced side and now their performances on the field make them very strong candidates for the play-offs at the end of the season.

A very good away win at Widnes a couple of matches ago augurs well for their future. The Vikings themselves looked top five candidates and will have been blown off course by the home defeat by Oldham.

Last week they were at home to high flyers, Dewsbury, and in a splendid encounter only came off

second best by 2 points. No mean feat.

MARK SIBSON - An exciting full back and goal kicker, this 23 year old played for Loughborough University for four years before turning out for Castleford's Alliance side. Recommended to Bramley and became an instant hit, going out on loan to Super League club Huddersfield Giants. An elusive attacker he has been a key player so far this season for the Roughyeds.

JOEY HAYES - A young winger who has crammed a lot into his relatively short spell as a pro. Made his name with St Helens but also played 11 Super League games for Salford City Reds last season. Turning into a real crowd favourite at Oldham and certainly must be one of the most

exciting wingers in the NFP.

ANTHONY GIBBONS - One half of the twin combination which played for Leeds Rhinos and Bramley before joining Oldham at the start of the 2000 season. The 23 year old is playing consistently well at centre but also helped out at scrum-half against Rochdale in the Cup.

PAT RICH - Another of the younger signings, 21 years old Pat is a native of the North-East. Played regular senior rugby for Keighley in 1999, while studying for a law degree at Leeds. Can play centre or back-row and recently achieved the new clubs points in a game record when scoring 18 in the win over Widnes. A sound goal kicker.

JOE McNICHOLAS - Broke his leg for the Roughyeds in the new club's first league game at Workington and missed the rest of the 1998 season apart from a brief spell as sub in the final match. A pacy winger, Joe bounced back to hold down a regular spot on the right flank in 1999.

DAVID GIBBONS - The other twin. Became a household name at Headingley and played more than 20 senior games, including several in the first Super League season of 1996. Formerly captain of Bramley, David will be a key figure for the Roughyeds at stand-off half.

MIKE FORD - A scrum-half who has been making the right sort of headlines all his sporting life. Played for Wigan at Wembley when only 19. Also starred for Leigh, Oldham, Castleford, Warrington, Wakefield and South Queensland Crushers. Toured Down Under with Great Britain in 1988. Coached Bramley to mid-table respectability in 1999 before landing his dream job of coaching his home town club. Still a key player with an excellent kicking game.

LEO CASEY - A tough prop who played for the former

Oldham club, Featherstone Rovers, Swinton and Rochdale Hornets before signing for the Roughyeds for the 1999 season. Captained the side and, at the age of 32, became a firm favourite of the crowd. Recently returned from a three match suspension after being sent off at Rochdale in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup. An Irish International and well respected by the supporters.

JOHN HOUGH - Will go down in local RL history as the first player to sign for the new Oldham club when it was launched in the autumn of 1997. Has had two cracking seasons in 1998 and 1999, when he took the club's player of the year award. Played more than 30 senior games for Warrington before returning 'home' to Oldham. Been in tremendous form again this season which was encapsulated in a superb match winning try in the defeat of Widnes Vikings.

JASON CLEGG - A product of Littleborough RL Club, this heavyweight prop turned pro for the Bradford Bulls and had a stint with Batley before signing for the Roughyeds shortly after the club was formed. Made a first-team place his own property in 1999 and earned selection for the West of Pennines side against an East side coached by Mike Ford. In superb form this season and was voted the Oldham player of the month for February.

CHRIS HOLLAND - Aged 21, Chris has played for England and Great Britain students and took the Man-of-the-Match award in England's defeat by New Zealand at Hull in the last World Cup. Equally at home at centre or in the back row.

KEVIN MANNION - 22 year old Kevin is a ball playing loose forward, who made his senior debut with Rochdale Hornets when only 16. Played for England and GB students, for whom he has toured Australia and played in France. Has put in some good performances so far this season but was unlucky in picking up a serious knee injury in the victory over Widnes Vikings.

MARK CAMPBELL - One of 16 new boys brought to the club by Mike Ford during the first two months of the player coach's reign. Formerly with Leeds and Keighley Cougars, this 21 year old hardworking back-row forward is studying at Leeds University for a degree in chemical

engineering

DANNY GUEST - This 22 year old, 18 stone prop was an up-and-coming youngster with the Bears. Also played for Keighley and Lancashire Lynx before returning to Oldham. Has been playing mainly as a substitute this season but has been a consistent performer, as shown when scoring with his first touch of the ball in the recent rout of Lancashire Lynx.

SHAYNE McMENEMY - Recent recruit to the club replacing the injured Tom O'Reilly. Began the season at Rochdale Hornets where he caught the eye of Mike Ford. Hard working second row forward, this Australian made

his debut 48 Hours after arriving from Sydney.

ANDY PROCTOR - Named captain of the club by Ford for the 2000 season. This former Saddleworth, Wakefield Trinity, Oldham and Bramley prop-forward, now aged 30, won a man-of-steel award while with Trinity, as the club was then called, and has built a reputation as a players' player, who performs well above his weight.



He's In Yer Face. He's Up For It . . He's Down to Earth, He's Pete Moss 'Friend of the Stars'.

THERE ARE certain subjects that are pegs for us to hang our opinions about Rugby League on. It can be playing strips, overseas players and coaches, what time of year we play the game, and plenty of others. You know what they are and you've got your own standpoint. One of these 'pegs' is attendances. Martyn Sadler touched upon this in a syndicated article a couple of weeks back. His main point being that the rise in NFPL crowds has plateaued by comparing crowds for corresponding fixtures in 1999.

Remember that we are still within the boundaries of the old winter season and that on the field the competition is more vibrant and exciting than

last year and that's going some.

Last week saw the second round of Superleague V. Remember that the party line is that we are supposed to be against summer football, Superleague is played mainly in summer and yet somehow (or so we are told week after week ad nauseam in this magazine) it's a scandal that we're not in it and that it's rubbish for all sorts of other reasons. On top of which we are told, and I'm sure many of you think, that it's a good idea to go even further back into mudbath territory next year: please god, no.

So lets carry on where Sadler left off and look at last weeks crowds. This time juxtaposing the NFPL

and Superleague.

Giving the '99 figures first; Batley-Rochdale 478/464, Hull KR-Swinton 2,005/2,073, Hunslet-Lancashire 1,809/666, Leigh-Doncaster 1,372/2,767. Oldham-Dewsbury 859/2,115, Whitehaven-Keighley 803/905, Workington-Rovers 1,007/829, York-Widnes 1,214/757.

Bearing in mind that the Hawks have still got the monk on because they were (quite rightly in my view) excluded from Superleague, by an independent body I might add, who's decision SL are bound by and bearing in mind the changes in competitiveness on the field of some clubs: not always a factor as we shall see, only Leigh, Oldham and maybe the Robins have anything to shout about. Leigh were competitive last year, but still their crowds rise. Oldham are outside the top eight and Dewsbury don't have that big an away following, but still that crowd rose.

Perhaps we should ask them. Maybe they know something we don't.

Meanwhile in Superleague, bearing in mind that we had a semi final rehearsal which could have created more interest: we had

Bradford-Warrington 13,063/17,127, Hull-Saints 5,879/7,160, Broncos-Huddersfield, Sheffield 2,278/2,856 (the corresponding Huddersfield fixture), Salford-Tigers 3,663/5,534, Wildcats-Bluesox 3,082/4,678,

Wigan-Leeds 9,558/11,200. The Broncos crowd might give the dinosaurs something to sneer at, but bearing in mind their recent ground move, which might take a bit to er, get off the ground and the state of the Giants it's not surprising, but is still compares favourably with say Rovers average crowd the year we won the championship and is better than our average crowd the year we last won the cup. I know they're a huge metropolis, but we're supposed to be a 'hot bed' steeped in Rugby League tradition aren't we? I recently read an article criticising the crowd for the recent Bulls - Giants cup tie, 6,000 and odd if memory serves. Intriguingly this crowd was significantly higher than Northern's (as they then were) average the year they came joint top of the league in, significantly, 1994.

And finally, why do we say 'traditionalist', when in fact we mean 'reactionary'. Rugby League has different layers of tradition. One of the most important of these is a willingness to change, innovate and adapt, and yes, take on authority. But to hijack 'tradition', in the name of an at best distorted and sometime non existent past doesn't do justice to the word. Remember, that when 50 odd thousand turned up to watch a championship final at Odsal in the early sixties a couple of hundred were turning up to watch a rapidly going bankrupt Bradford Northern at the same ground the rest of the time.

To sum up, as Peter Snow says on election night; can we stop whinging about Superleague, stop kidding ourselves that to succeed all we have to do is play in the depths of winter....and maybe acquire a bit of acumen and open up our minds a bit, think what we are really doing when we play the 'tradition' card, acknowledge all aspects of our history, not just the

ones that fit our preconceptions.

Rovers Reflections




... WITH BOB FOWLER

This is not on, no matter who the teams are, any player going in to tackle at shoulder height, and at speed is going to have his arm round an opponents neck just by the sheer momentum of the tackle. I am frightened that someone is going to get seriously hurt soon. I just hope that the officials will be able to look themselves in the mirror if this does happen. Too many are willing to pass the buck and place players on report. If foul play is suspected then the offending player should be punished. Mistakes will happen, but the dangerous practice of making high shots

might just be eradicated. I doubt it though because there are too many players who's only talent is thuggery.

Moaning time over and I now make an appeal for all genuine fans of the Rovers to try and get to Leigh next week. Hilton Park two years ago held no fears for us or any other team for that matter. Now, though it is one of the most formidable grounds in the NFP. We will need all the support we can muster, against a crowd that has suddenly appeared from nowhere to make it a very intimidating venue. I am not trying to predict today's result, because make no mistake Oldham are a better side than their league position shows and Peter Roe will give them the respect they are entitled to. Today apart, we have one of the games best away followings. It is a wonderful atmosphere when we all get together to urge our team on. The players respond and the difference that this can make is immeasurable, I am going in the hope that the pig falls off his bike (again) and because I want to try and watch every game this season. It might not be possible for me to achieve that as I have yet to discuss with my better half just when she can have a well deserved holiday instead of the usual Monday to Friday breaks we have had for the last three years. THE FRISA STAND POINT

THERE WAS a letter in *Rugby League Express* on the Monday before last from "an avid Leigh fan" about Ian Millward's appointment to St. Helens. The writer bore no ill will towards his team's erstwhile coach, in fact he had nothing but admiration for the man and for what he's achieved in his eighteen months at Hilton Park, but he concluded his letter with the despairing words: "I feel we are now trapped".

He concluded thus after relating that Millward had turned down Saints the previous year, when Hanley was suspended, because at the time he felt Leigh had a chance of winning the Grand Final and thereby gaining promotion. In the light of what subsequently happened to Hunslet - the team that did win the Grand Final, didn't gain entry to Super League, but did, as a direct result of that win and that refusal, lose players, support and sponsorship - the writer understood that Millward, a talented, ambitious coach, had to go.

Trapped by that, and the belief that were his team to unearth another good coach, or star player, he would feel obliged to go too; that were Leigh to achieve anything on the field or, God forbid, win something, then rather than be rewarded they would suffer for it. What a crazy, Humpty Dumpty state British Rugby is in since it's come to this, via Murdoch and his schemes, and his money, squabbled over by his greedy underlings in the self serving, I'm all right Jack clique of a Super League that is his creature.

Do Featherstone Rovers want to be part of that exclusive Super League? Yorkshire Youth Amateur Rugby League
The Young South Africans are Coming to Yorkshire
South Africa Tour 2000

IN 1997 THE Yorkshire Youth Amateur Rugby League took a total of 42 players (20 under 18's, 22 under 16's) on a 3 week tour to play against mixed race teams within South African Rugby League, and help promote and develop the game within the townships. This was a highly successful tour creating a tremendous amount of goodwill between our respective associations and it was agreed that the South Africans would tour the Yorkshire Youth in April 2000.

Arriving on the 14th April the South African RL Under 18's and 16's respectively (25 players per squad plus officials, we are envisaging providing accommodation for 58 people maximum) are to tour the Yorkshire Youth area. The tour encompassing playing representative sides from the Yorkshire Youth ARL, West Riding Youth ARL, Humberside ARL, and a BARLA President's XIII with the Yorkshire Youth providing accommodation and transport in a reciprocal arrangement agreed with the SARL.

The Yorkshire Youth game will be played here at Featherstone RLFC on Sunday 16th April, 2000, 1st game to kick off at 1.00pm.
