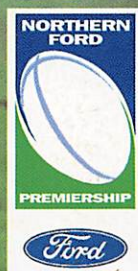
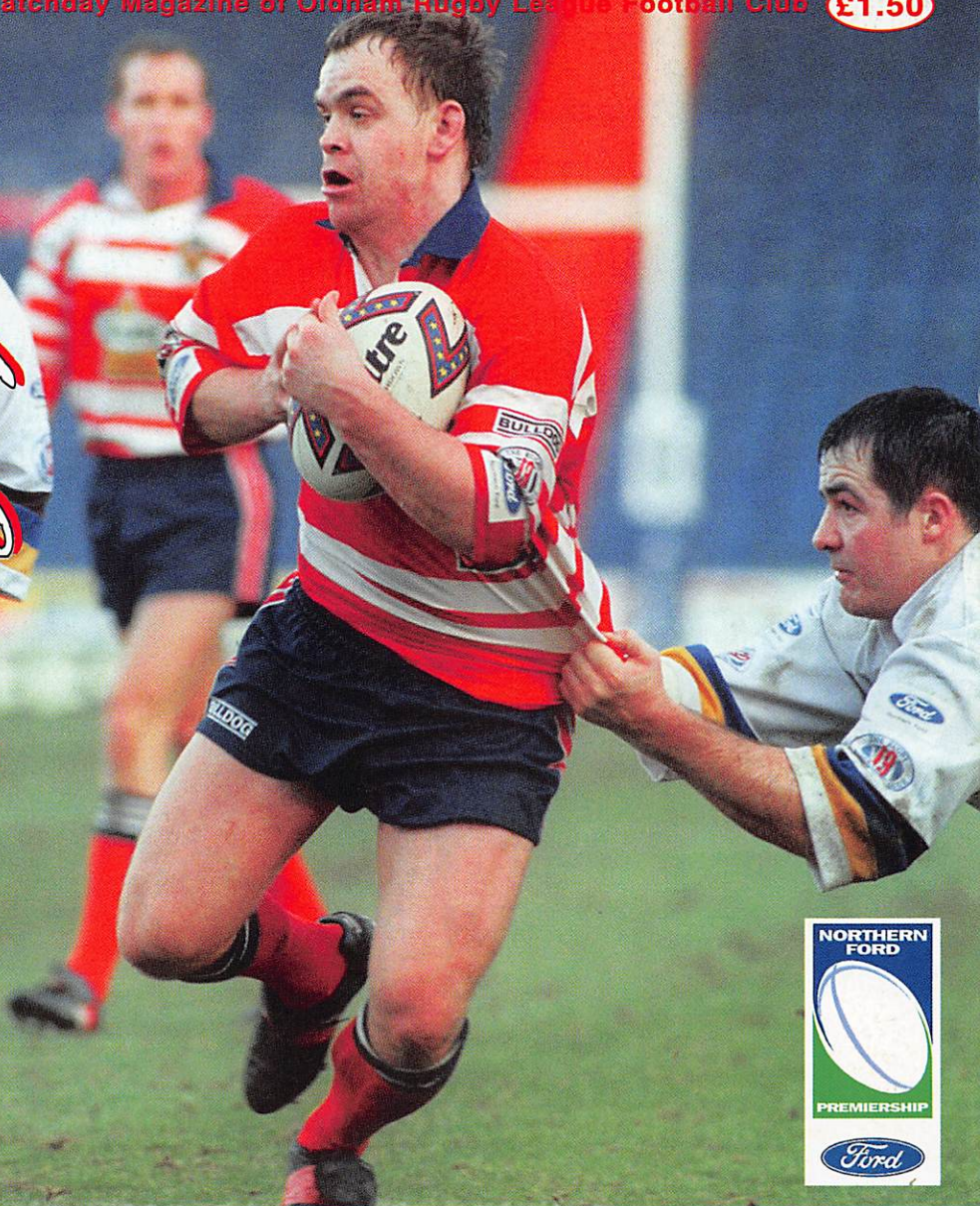

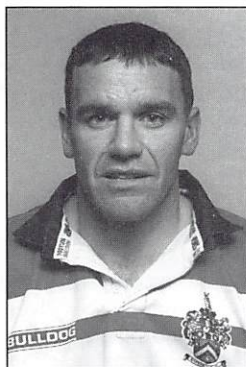

In Yer Face



"Disgraceful scenes"

"Ban them!"

"Tarnishes the name of the Hull club and Rugby League in general"

"Never again must the game be subjected to the irresponsible hooligan behaviour of a mindless minority"

"We must ensure scenes like these are never repeated"

Just some of the comments trotted out this week following the pitch invasion at the end of last week's Hull v Leeds Silk Cut Challenge Cup Semi-Final.

Well, for the benefit of Red Hall and Rugby League authorities everywhere, sorry but you're behind the times. This WAS unacceptable scenes being repeated by so called 'fans' of the Hull club. So whatever measures - if - any - were taken previously clearly did not work.

On Sunday 1st September 1996 I was at Cougar Park, Keighley for the semi-final play-off match of R.L. Division One between Keighley and Hull. And guess what? There was a pitch invasion and violent scenes involving Hull supporters after their team had gone behind. And from my observation that day not one Keighley fan did anything untoward to contribute to a situation that gave stewards and police enormous difficulty to control. Exactly the same as occurred with Leeds followers two weeks ago.

And what was the policy of the R.L. at the time? Their favoured outcome was a Hull victory,

because a city the size of Hull deserved a Super League team. They were to be disappointed. But did this do Keighley any good? Well, no actually. The Cougars did not fit the grand plan: they were denied their 'place in the sun' a second time. Small town, small ground you see, apparently un-like Castleford, Halifax or Wakefield. Worse still, Keighley then had to undertake expensive reconstruction work on their ground to make it 'safe', though quite how it had been unsafe before, given any kind of normal behaviour I do not know.

And the punishment meted out to Hull I hear you ask? Well, it was so high profile that I am not aware of any points lost, fines imposed, compensation paid, reprimands issued, notices published or fans banned for life!

I remember commenting at the time if this is the club and the followers that R.L. wants in Super League they are welcome to them! And now they have them and are surprised at the outcome. No wonder David Lloyd got exasperated with this lot.

And even then Super League had to step in and bale out a failing club. And the cost? Abandonment of an expansion area which had the full and wholehearted backing of its local authority and a kick in the teeth for all the new found followers of the game. So what this time? A slap on the wrist or something more because this game was high profile and the incident seen on T.V. thereby damaging the 'image' of the game? Whatever it is, it won't be enough. In my view the club should return lock, stock and barrel to Gateshead. Now that would be positive action.

HAVE OLDHAM acquired, in Haydn Walker, another Brian Gartland?

Brian, who passed away 18 months ago, was at his happiest when he was introducing some young unknown to Watersheddings or coaching the youngsters in the Colts team or the reserve side.

With his scores of contacts at all levels of the game in Lancashire, Brian spent nearly 20 years with the former Oldham club, to which he devoted much of his life and for which he signed on loads of lads from all over the county.

In terms of length of service to an Oldham club, Haydn is a comparative new-boy. Unlike Brian, he isn't an Oldhamer, although for the record it must be said that Brian was born in St. Helens before adopting Oldham as his home town when he married his Oldham born wife Maureen many years ago.

There are, nevertheless, many similarities in what Brian achieved for the Bears club and what Haydn is now striving to do for the Roughyeds.

A winger, Haydn has a vast knowledge of the sport not only at amateur and youth level, but also at the top echelons of the Students game.

He has worked at youth level for the Wigan, Rochdale and Hemel Hempstead clubs. He also did development work for the Hertfordshire club.

Over the years he has had a close association at club and league levels in the North-West Counties League, for whom he will play a leading role on next year's under 16s tour or Australia in his capacity as team manager.

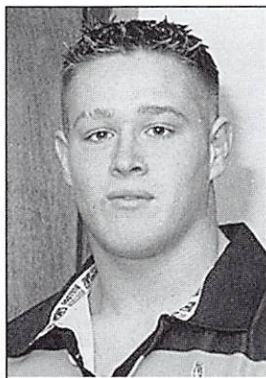
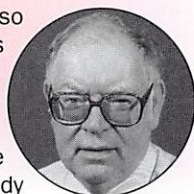
In short, he knows the Lancashire rugby league scene inside out and that's why he was head hunted by Mike Ford when Mike took over as Oldham player coach last Autumn.

Mike had spent all his career as a player, at the top level and he needed, to fill a key role on his staff, a man who had the grass-roots of the sport at his finger tips.

In less than half a season at the club, Walker has already build a reputation for

recruiting players, so much so that on most weekends several are left kicking their heels when the Alliance team has been picked.

They won't all make the grade, but some have already been signed on pro contracts, like Gavin Dodd and Lee Doran, and others such as David Harris and Wayne Gittens have been signed on loan from Warrington and given an opportunity to take their careers on a different route.

It was partially due to the success of the Alliance team this season, and Haydn's recruitment record, that the board took the decision, in consultation with Ford and Walker, to start an Academy team as quickly as possible.

In 1998 the newly formed Oldham club had ONE team. In 1999 it had TWO teams. There is every chance that, in 2000, it will have THREE teams and that can only be regarded as terrific progress by an emerging club that has never lacked ambition, not even in those depressing days of last season when, to all but the club's inner circle, there seemed to be little light at the end of a long dark tunnel.

A year on from there, the first team is more than holding its own in the Northern Ford Premiership, the Alliance side was fourth in its division before it took on leaders Hunslet away from home on Wednesday and the Academy team is expected to be up and running within a month.

However you look at it, that's progress.

LIVING HISTORY

From the Pen of Michael Turner

RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

1930 - 1940

THE beginning of the 1930s saw Swinton again champions in the 1930/31 season, a feat they repeated in 1934/35. However, sandwiched in-between these successes was a defeat to local rivals Salford in the final of 1932/33. The prominence of the 'Manchester' clubs at this period of time was reflected in the 1932 touring party which contained four players from Swinton (Butters, Hodgson, Wright and B. Evans) and likewise four 'Red Devils' (Feetham, Hudson, Williams and Risman). Under the captaincy of Wigan's Jim Sullivan, the tourists won the Ashes two tests to one and followed this up with a clean sweep of all eight matches in New Zealand.

In 1933 the Wigan Highfield club was relocated to become London Highfield in an attempt to establish the game in the capital. Both of their games against Oldham ended in a single point victory for the 'Roughyeds', 8-7 in London on December 20th and 5-4 at Watersheddings on January 27th 1934. Despite a respectable mid-table position the venture only lasted for one season before the club eventually moves back north to become Liverpool Stanley. The same year the touring Australians enjoyed a successful opening to their tour winning the first eleven matches. This was followed by defeat in the first test at Belle Vue and although they continued in good form the ashes were lost by three tests to nil. The following year France made their international debut going down 21-32 against England in Paris.

In Yorkshire Leeds emerged as the dominant force of the decade winning the Yorkshire Cup no less than seven times and the Challenge Cup in 1932 (v Swinton), and 1936 (v Warrington). Still the championship eluded the 'Loiners'. The nearest they came was in 1937/38 when they succumbed to Hunslet (8-2) in a fiercely contested 'derby' played at Elland Road. There would be some consolation when Jim Brough was selected to lead the 1936 tourists. Once again the ashes were retained by two tests to one and likewise

the New Zealand leg of the tour was a 100% success. For the last championship before the war another soccer ground was chosen to stage the final when Maine Road was the venue for a Salford victory over Castleford.

Three games into the 1939/40 season the league programme was abandoned due to the outbreak of World War 2.

However, by the end of September localised county leagues were set up in Lancashire and Yorkshire.

PROBING THE NFP

HIGHLIGHT of week 11 in the NFP was a magnificent game at Boundary Park where Dewsbury Rams just overcame Oldham by 14-12. End to end rugby kept the spectators on the edges of their seats in a game which would have graced Super League for its intensity and sparkle. In the end the deciding factors were the outstanding scrambling defence of the Rams and the powerhouse running of second-row forward Sean Richardson.

Leigh Centurions accounted for Doncaster with 16 unanswered second-half points to show that the departure of Ian Millward had not upset them too much. Featherstone, meanwhile, kept up their run of success with a 42-25 win at Workington. The precocious Jamie Rooney was again in the points with two tries, 4 goals and 2 drop goals.

Hull KR overcame Swinton 54-16 with another scrum-half scoring freely, Mark Hewitt landing 9 goals and grabbing a touchdown. Widnes returned to winning ways under new Coach David Hulme, defeating York away 50-18.

Fortress Craven Park was too much for Sheffield who went down 34-16 to Barrow. The Border Raiders' home record reads six wins from six with 192 points for and 74 against. The other game in Cumbria saw Keighley defeat Whitehaven 56-10 to put real pressure on Kevin Tamati. Martin Wood kicked 10 goals for the Cougars.

Today's visitors Hunslet struggled to overcome Lancashire Lynx 24-16 before losing

at Barrow the following week. Testing times for David Plange.

Hornets lost at Mount Pleasant 24-12 and then, in week 12, went down again, this time at Spotland to Hull KR, by 38-26. The really big result of week 12, however, was Leigh's victory at Ram Stadium. Five tries with only one goal kept the scoreline closer than it might have been for longer than necessary for a nevertheless delighted Centurions.

Widnes Vikings scored another win, 30-10 over Batley, and Doncaster Dragons were too powerful for Whitehaven, 24-14 winners at the Recreation Ground.

The battle of the bottom two saw York Wasps pull away after defeating Lancashire Lynx 26-18, much to the relief of caretaker Coach Gary Atkins and the dismay of Lynx's Steve Hampson. Good away wins were secured by Doncaster at Whitehaven and by Keighley at Swinton, but the surprise of the round was the mauling suffered by Oldham at Featherstone, reviving memories of a troubled 1999 when Rovers scored exactly the same number of points (61) against a much inferior Oldham side to that of 2000.

Last week, however, Oldham re-asserted themselves with a solid performance at Sheffield to run out 28-6 winners. Leigh secured a crucial win over Featherstone in the battle of the top two, which, with victories for Dewsbury at Whitehaven and Hull KR over Widnes, relegated the young Rovers from second to fourth. Fifth placed Doncaster accounted for Swinton 28-14 at Belle Vue, Craig Weston accounting for 16 of the Dragons' points with two tries, 3 goals and 2 drop goals.

Dark horses Keighley continue to threaten the leaders after outplaying Rochdale 26-14. Meanwhile the day's surprise result – York defeating Barrow 20-18 – did Oldham a lot of good in the battle for a top eight place. Today's visitors Hunslet racked up a fine 22-8 win over Workington and will come to Boundary Park with more confidence as a result.

This week the big games are Widnes v Keighley (an away win possible) and Swinton v Dewsbury, but Rochdale could just have an influence on the top of the table standings if they can front up to Doncaster Dragons. Yet more good games to savour in an exciting NFP season.

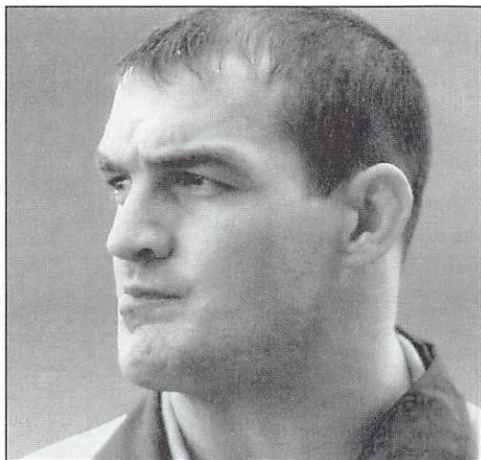


GRAND Final winners 1999, Hunslet Hawks, like Keighley and Batley before them, found their path to Super League blocked. The consequence has been the break-up of the 1999 side and some indifferent

results to date, although to be fair they have played against and lost to all the top sides ie Dewsbury, Hull KR and Keighley at home and Barrow, Doncaster, Featherstone and Widnes away. Their only win on the road was at Batley by 27-18.

The Hawks are coached by DAVID PLANGE, a Great Britain international who saw service with Doncaster, Castleford, Sheffield and Hull KR before taking over the reins at Hunslet from Steve Ferres in November 1996.

The team includes three former Oldham favourites. Captain and centre SEAN IRWIN enjoyed a spell at Watersheddings after appearing for Castleford and Great Britain. He has appeared in two NFP Grand Finals, first with Featherstone and then with Hunslet.

Hooker RICHARD PACHNIUK was allowed to leave Oldham prematurely and gave sterling service to Rochdale before moving to South Leeds. Voted NFP Player of the Season and a target for Wigan gives some idea of the quality of his football.

Prop GARY LORD is one of those players whose value is evident only when he isn't there. A grafting 'player's player', his services have been appreciated at Castleford, Halifax, Oldham, Wakefield and Batley.

After Pachniuk, the ball playing skills are provided by halfbacks JOHAN WINDLEY and WILLIE SWANN. Windley is an Academy international who joined Hunslet from Hull Sharks where he was unable to claim a regular starting spot. Swann, meanwhile, is a New Zealander who first appeared in this country for Warrington. He then saw service at Rochdale before joining the Hawks.

Elsewhere in the backs expect to see JAMIE THACKRAY a 20 year old graduate from the Academy ranks at South Leeds; STEVE PARNELL, a 19 year old ex-Academy fullback; CHRIS ROSS, a 21 year old wingman also moving up from the Academy ranks; centre CHRIS NORTH, formerly with Oldham and Dewsbury; DARREN HUGHES, a pacy and powerful centre; and AARON CAMPBELL who played on loan at Doncaster last year but is now back in South Leeds where recent reports have described him as both 'wily' and 'dangerous'.

Up front Lord and Pachniuk will be joined by STEVE PRYCE, a tough nut who joined Hunslet from York in 1994. First choice second-row is JIM LEATHAM and JAMIE LEIGHTON. Both are junior internationals with Leatham perhaps the 'runner' and Leighton the 'tackler' without doing either an injustice to their all-round game. Leighton, ex-Skirlaugh and Hull KR, was outstanding in last year's Grand Final.

Current last man down is Mick Coyle now in his tenth season with the Hawks, yet still only 28. A wily campaigner and a favourite of the fans.

Other pack men to feature this season include prop ALAN JULIAN who has been on the books at Leeds, Keighley and Bradford; JAMES WALKER an ex-Bradford Bull with a good kicking game and a fine pair of hands; and two young Hunslet Academy products in hooker MATTHEW GREEN and second-row ADAM MOORE. Additionally, recent inclusions include props PHIL KENNEDY and BEN SKERRETT, emphasising the quality of junior players making their way through the ranks as Hunslet seek to rebuild their credibility after the disappointment of 1999.

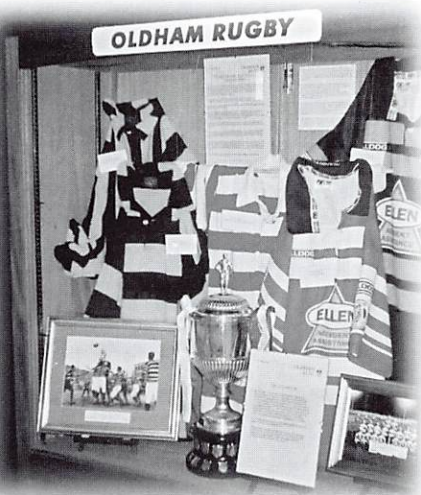

We call Mark Campbell Kench. He knows what it means.

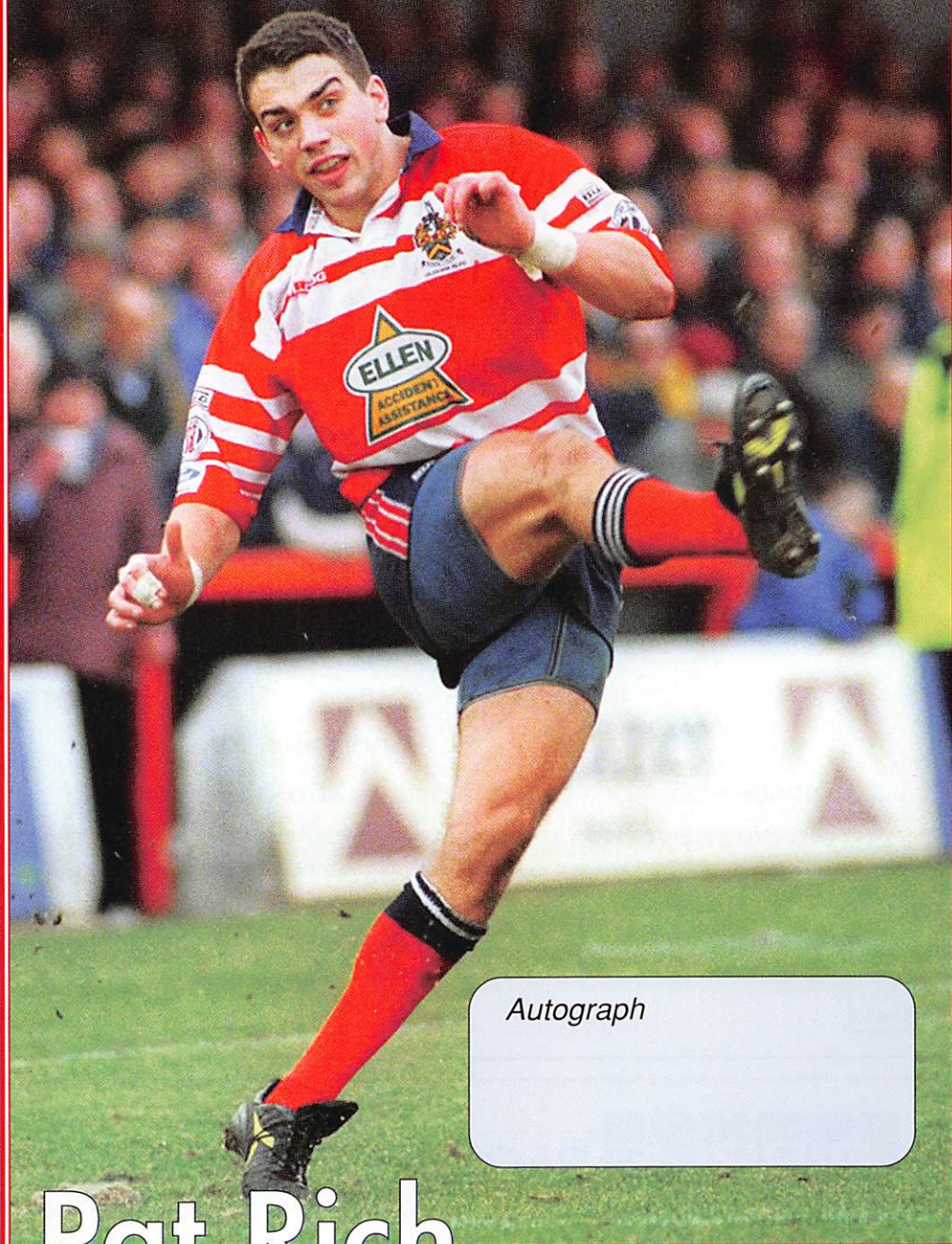

THE NEXT rugby league match to be staged here at Boundary Park is the Standard Cup Final between Saddleworth Rangers and Waterhead who meet on Good Friday morning, 21st April, kick off 11am.

This season's competition is the 96th staging of the the Standard Cup and it began in October when centre three-quarter Lee Maher

scored a hattrick of tries as Higginshaw Eagles defeated Middleton Rhinos 44-0.

Unfortunately, the Eagles suffered recruitment problems around the turn of the year and they were unable to fulfil their quarter-final tie against Shaw Rhinos. Trophy holders Waterhead travelled across town to Hollinwood where they trailed 6-4 after twenty minutes before recovering to win by 40 points to sixteen. Salem Hornets defeated Watersheddings Wanderers in another quarter final tie, but the big match was the Saddleworth Rangers - St Anne's match at Greenfield. Rangers won a superb tie 22-6, thereby gaining revenge for a league match defeat suffered against St. Anne's at the same venue just eleven days previously.

The semi-final draw produced tricky away ties for Saddleworth and Waterhead. Unfortunately for Salem Hornets, heavy rain caused their tie against Waterhead to be switched from their Breeze Hill pitch to Manor Park, the Oldham RUFC ground. Having lost ground advantage, Salem were no match for their Conference League opponents who went on to win 52-0. Saddleworth found their tie at Shaw much more difficult. In atrocious conditions, the Rhinos held Rangers up to half-time when the tie was scoreless but, after the break, Rangers were able to ease through 10-4. Good Friday's final, therefore, throws together trophy holders Waterhead and the club who have lifted this trophy a record fourteen times including six consecutive victories between 1987 and 1992. In that 1992 final Rangers defeated Waterhead 22-8 in one of four previous finals involving these two clubs. In 1976 a crowd of 2,677 saw Rangers win 16-4

but five years later Waterhead gained revenge when they defeated Rangers 9-7, thereby winning the Standard Cup for the first time. Rangers then repeated that 1992 victory when they beat Waterhead 25-12 in the 1997 final when eleven points from second-row forward Danny Tyrell swung the tie Saddleworth's way after they had trailed 12-11 on the hour.

Although Saddleworth's record in this competition is much better than that of Waterhead, it must be noted that Waterhead have knocked Rangers out of the past two competitions. Two years ago they won a first round tie at Shaw Hall Bank Road 32-12 when centre Paul Brassington (three tries) and stand off Paul Garrett (try, three goals) led the way shortly after joining Waterhead from Rangers. They have since returned to Saddleworth but that did not stop Waterhead beating Rangers 14-6 at Peach Road in last season's quarter final despite the fact that they trailed 6-0 after only a couple of minutes.

Waterhead enjoyed a tremendous season and so with Saddleworth's pedigree it should be a thrilling final and certainly not one to be missed. So make a note in your diary. Good Friday, 11am. Waterhead v Saddleworth.

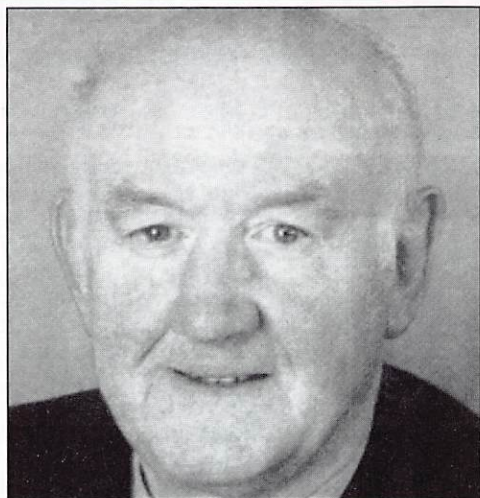

Today's Guest Interview...

RAY FRENCH



Ray, What's it like working for the B.B.C.?

I love working for the B.B.C. although the job with Radio Merseyside is much more relaxed and enjoyable than match commentaries for T.V. On radio you pretty well dictate how the programme goes. You can't be tripped up by the producer showing a different shot to what you are talking about. And with the 'phone-in you get the chance to listen to people's views and to air your own.

On T.V. I can have three different people talking to me through the headphones. First there's the producer, then there's a girl keeping all the match stats and finally there's a link to the Grandstand studio to ensure a smooth transition to other items in the programme. And remember, it all goes out live, so if you make a mistake you can be sure it will be pounced on. Eddie and Stevo on Sky don't have the same problems with links to other sports and some of their material is pre-recorded. It can be very stressful I can tell you.

How do you get on with Jonathan Davies?

John & I get on really well. We have a good working relationship and like to take the mickey out of each other. I like to think we make a good team.

What do you think about all the criticism you get?

R.L. fans are very critical, but you have to realise that on Grandstand 80% of the viewers are not R.L. fans. The audience covers the whole country and you can't assume people will

be familiar with all aspects of the game. You have to try to explain things and to keep it simple; people have tuned in to be entertained so you can't always get too technical.

What's really amusing is the way some R.L. fans write to the B.B.C. I have a copy of one letter calling my commentary inept, hopeless, vile, incomprehensible, patronising etc. etc. and I wasn't even at the match! On other occasions I get copies of letters accusing me of bias. One Salford fan wrote "Dear French, I am appalled at the bias you showed towards Hull in last week's match..." The same week I had a letter from a Hull fan, "Dear Sir, Your commentary was totally biased towards Salford and gave no credit to anything Hull did..." You get resigned to fans seeing everything through spectacles the colour of their team's shirts.

You live and work in St. Helens, a town with the most successful club since the start of Super League: what's going on at the club?

Well, in the case of Ellery he just had to go. He upset too many people and St. Helens have lost too many good workers for the club who have been there for years and just wouldn't go near the place.

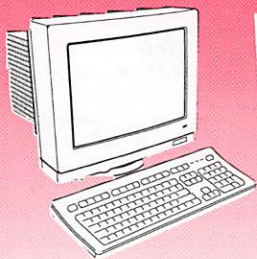
With Shaun McRea that was probably a mistake because he did so much in his time there, but he wasn't too happy after David Howes left. Howesey is the best in the game for marketing and media relations so he was a big loss too.

Will Saints leave Knowsley Road?

Yes, it's going to happen. It isn't that Knowsley Road is a bad ground, in fact it's one of the best in the league for viewing and atmosphere, but the maintenance costs on an old stadium are astronomical and a new ground will provide more up to date facilities and greater comfort for the spectators.

Finally Ray, now that Super League is in its fifth season how do you think it is progressing?

Well, at first everybody thought that the Murdoch money was going to save the game, but in fact it created as many problems as it solved because converting to full time was so expensive and players' salaries went mad. A lot of clubs were effectively bankrupt including Wigan: why else would they have had to sell Central Park to Tesco? There was a lot of maladministration. Things seem to have settled down a bit now and the competition is much stronger. Also SLE is much better run now, with much less in-fighting.

With Simon Winnard

I WAS not so much shocked as disappointed by the disgraceful behaviour from the Hull supporters after the semi final defeat at the hands of Leeds. However, I expect my disappointment is nothing compared to that of the RL authorities who must see this as scant reward from the 'Old Faithful' for bending almost every rule in the book to ensure that Hull were given a successful side.

The ridiculous rescue plan dressed up as a merger by Mr Caisley and company saved Hull from financial crisis and almost certain closure. The cream of one of the most talented squads in last year's competition was simply relocated from Gateshead to Humberside to significantly strengthen the 'new' club's playing staff. This undoubtedly afforded the Humberside club another Challenge Cup semi final appearance.

Having mismanaged the club almost into oblivion, the old administration was then simply replaced by a similarly unsuccessful one and the 'merger' incentive money merely used to clear Hull's massive debts. Indeed, success on the field came at a price for Thunder and despite significant 'development' funding from the News Corporation coffers, they still managed to incur a £750,000 loss in only one Super League season . . . now here we could see a little bit of long term natural justice should a similar financial strategy be adopted on Humberside.

In addition to this, the Hull club still benefits from an increased quota of Antipodean imports despite being no more a development side than Wigan, St Helens or our beloved Oldham. You have only to briefly examine the highest level of the Amateur game to see that it's the Hull and Oldham teams who are pushing for honours. Rugby League at grass roots level has never been stronger on Humberside and the same can be said locally. However, the powers that be can see their way to putting together an all encompassing survival package for Hull when Oldham were all but allowed to die . . . and this is the gratitude they are given in return! One thing is for sure, I would have loved to

have been a fly on the wall in the Hetherington household that night.

Rugby League does not need its family image tarnished in this way. With limited opportunity for genuine national exposure, we can surely do without this sort of publicity. However, whilst the behaviour of the minority yob element deeply saddens me, the product on the pitch has been nothing short of superb and I am already looking forward in anticipation of a magnificent Murrayfield final and a great Rugby League weekend away.

With regards to Super League, the early indicators show that Bradford Bulls are hot favourites for the crown and the Huddersfield Giants look a sure wooden spoon bet for the second year in a row. The RL authorities however will be hoping that a remarkable improvement is made on their early season form. The embarrassment of them inventing a Huddersfield - Sheffield - Salford Giants for next year's competition would surely be too much to take . . . or would it?

Today we extend a warm welcome to the Hunslet Hawks who have seen a recent decline in fortunes due to the Super League closed shop. Last season's Grand Final victors more than earned a Super League place but were excluded on the same 'grounds' that Wakefield had been allowed clemency the year before. The Wildcats were allowed time to reach the minimum ground criteria whereas the Hawks (despite a South Leeds local authority guarantee that the necessary work would be carried out) had their claims simply rejected. That rejection has seen the vultures circle and many of their star players have departed to ply their trade elsewhere. As a result they have seen the crowds diminish and the hard work of an ambitious, hardworking club who built slowly and within their means for a successful future, suffer a major setback through no fault of their own. I say you can keep your Gateshead FC, Hull Thunder, Charlton Broncos or Anyfield Giants. Give me Hunslet, Bramley and Sheffield any day.

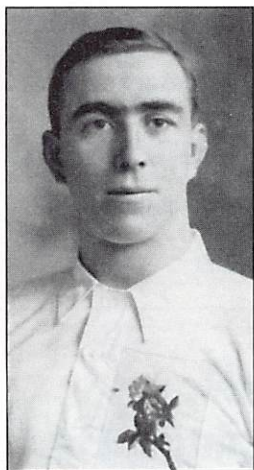
'THE DON'



ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO APRIL 9TH YESTERYEAR.

IT WAS on this day in 1910, Saturday 9th April, that Wales defeated England 39-18 down at Ebbw Vale. It was the first time that England had lost to Wales and was a major shock for the Englishmen. But a bigger shock awaited Hunslet winger Billy Batten who injured a knee in that resounding defeat; the injury was considered so serious that Batten was told that he certainly would not be touring Australasia with Great Britain the following summer and, in fact, he was told that he might never play again. Batten was not convinced. He tested his knee two weeks later in an amateur match in which he scored a hattrick of tries for Hemsworth. He did tour with the 1910 British Lions and two years later was transferred to Hull for a World record fee!!



Albert Avery

There were two Oldham players involved in that international at Ebbw Vale, scrum-half Tom White and prop-forward Albert Avery. The Roughyeds did not appear to miss their international duo that afternoon, Saturday 9th April 1910, when Treherbert visited Watersheddings for what proved to be their last ever match. The

Welshman were beaten 54-13, conceding fourteen tries, four of which were scored by winger Tom McLean.

It was a much more disappointing afternoon for Oldham fifty years later, on Saturday 9th April 1960. That day the Roughyeds met Hull in the Challenge Cup semi-final at Station Road, Swinton. Oldham were favourites to win that tie but some

hesitancy in defence gifted points to the Airlie Birds who went on to win 12-9. Winger Vin Nestor scored the Oldham try with full-back Bernard Ganley adding three goals.

On Easter Monday 9th April 1928 Oldham entertained Widnes who were hammered to the tune of 60 points to five. Winger Abe Johnson led the rout with two tries and 12 goals, his 30 point haul being a club record for points scored in a match.

Eric Fitzsimons was a free scoring winger for both Oldham and Hunslet. It was on this day in 1980, Wednesday 9th April, that he landed six goals for the Roughyeds when they defeated Halifax 24-5. Two years later, on Good Friday 9th April 1982, he had moved on to Hunslet for whom he landed a couple of goals although Hunslet were beaten 15-13 by Batley at Mount Pleasant in what, technically, was a home match for Hunslet. At that time the Hawks were homeless and played their home matches at Batley.

Six years ago, on Saturday 9th April 1994, the Great Britain amateur team met Russia at Keats Avenue, the home of the Wigan St. Jude's club. That match was scheduled to be played the previous evening at Central Park but was postponed because of a waterlogged pitch. The Russians were no match for the BARLA boys who won easily by 62 points to 14. Second-row forward Steve Maudsley (Saddleworth Rangers) was in unstoppable form and scored four of the 12 British tries. Another Saddleworth player, prop Gary Dobbs who is now at St. Anne's, was on the bench for Great Britain that afternoon whilst a third Saddleworth representative was physiotherapist Neil Wiseman.

Saddleworth appear here at Boundary Park on Good Friday 11am when they meet holders Waterhead in the Standard Cup Final. Rangers won the Standard Cup in 1971, Good Friday 9th April, when they beat St. Anne's 20-8 whilst eleven years later, on Good Friday 9th April 1982, Waterhead lifted the trophy when they defeated St. Anne's, the score on that occasion being 9-6.

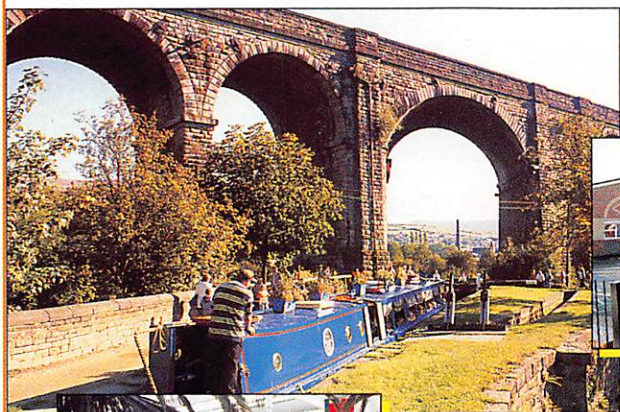
