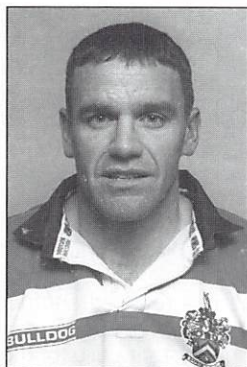

In Yer Face



WHEN CHAIRMAN Chris Hamilton and Coach Mike Ford decided to bring Shayne McMenemy back to England following his 'sacking' by Rochdale Hornets they made an inspired decision. After the Australian's two barn storming performances over Easter, together with his previous good form, we can see that at last, after some disastrous flirtations with Aussie players, albeit the product of injury and ill-luck, rather than poor decision making, Oldham are getting value for their investment. On current form Shayne is as good a forward as any in N.F.P. Let's hope he stays injury free and helps Oldham to a high placing in this year's championship.

Meanwhile, Oldham's current successful run will be sorely tested this month with some top class fixtures, both home and away, piled one upon the other. The consolation, of course, is that all the challengers for leading positions face the same problem so, hopefully, Oldham will fare no worse than anyone else. And of course, the old adage 'success breeds success' could work in the team's favour, as confidence builds on the back of an excellent run. What stands out about the recent run is that adversity has been turned to advantage: when injuries first struck things did not look at all bright, but the arrival of McMenemy, together with the excellent Neil Roden and Phil Farrell, has provided a strength in depth previously lacking. What's more the club can now boast a settled side and the benefits are there for all to see. Whatever soul searching went on after the Featherstone débâcle it quite clearly had the desired effect. While there is still a long way to go recent results suggest that, if nothing else, Oldham are a team to be reckoned with. Now all that is required is for rugby league fans in the town to turn out in numbers to give the team the backing they deserve.

On the wider R.L. stage one or two issues remain contentious. As I watch Super League on T.V. I am constantly struck by the number of high shots which go unpunished. Referees are resorting to 'on report' decisions rather than sending off or sin-binning players and I can only think this is a reaction to the dismissal of

Adrian Morley after 2 minutes in last year's Leeds v St. Helens fixture. If Greg McCallum has directed that players should be kept on the field to ensure a 'fair' 13 x 13 game it is time to think again. If any player is 'fouled off' the

opponent responsible should be dismissed. Otherwise a head tackle should be punished by a sin bin: to use the sin bin only for technical offences is ridiculous. A player persistently offending should be suspended. Funny isn't it that when I watched an Australian game a player guilty of a head shot was instantly dismissed?

Another Anglo-Australian discrepancy is the 20 metre tap to re-start. Here, we have to wait for the defending side to get back 10 metres, while in Australia a team that can organise a quick re-start is allowed to proceed. Since we are trying to speed up the game, why are we not using the Australian interpretation? Hull K.R. in their heyday were masters of the quick re-start and the game was all the better for it. If we can take quick tap penalties we should also be able to have quick re-starts.

Finally the video ref. It's no wonder Ian Millward protested about this after the Saints v Wigan game. It's absolutely crazy to go back through the tackle count and to hear a referee say "in my opinion" such and such happened. If that was the case why did he not blow up? And if the video ref. can rule on a knock-on, why on earth can he not rule on a forward pass? The video referee is a great idea, but let's iron out the anomalies before we degenerate into farce.

EVERYONE AT Oldham RLFC can take a bow for achieving five wins out of five matches in April.

Victories don't come easy in the Northern Ford Premiership and to record back-to-back wins against Sheffield Eagles (away), Hunslet Hawks (home), Batley Bulldogs (away), Rochdale Hornets (away) and Swinton Lions (home) says a lot about the squad's mental toughness and physical levels of endurance.

The Easter weekend was particularly demanding - first a derby clash at Spotland against a Rochdale side which not only included six former Roughyeds in its starting line-up, but went into the game full of confidence after whipping Featherstone Rovers on home soil seven days earlier.

In truth, the Roughyeds totally dominated the game, in which they had enough possession and enough territorial authority to have won far more comfortably than 13-12.

The score didn't reflect Oldham's control of the game or the fact that, until the dying seconds, Hornets had scored only one try and that was the result of a short kick close to the line by hooker Darren Robinson.

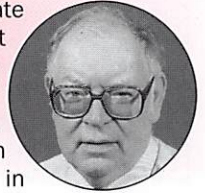
For Oldham, David Gibbons kicked Hornets to death and produced three spot-on 40-20 touch finders which made an invaluable contribution.

The entire pack worked hard, but none harder or more effectively than Aussie second-rower Shayne McMenemy, who followed up on Easter

Monday with another rip-roaring performance against Swinton Lions at Boundary Park.

McMenemy was an outstanding man of the match on both occasions, producing performances which, in some ways, took my mind back to the Watersheddings days of Bob Lindner.

I don't want to overstate my case by claiming that McMenemy is in the same class as Lindner - one of his country's all-time greats - but I could see certain similarities in the manner in which McMenemy conducted himself in a potentially explosive atmosphere at Spotland.



On current form he is easily the best overseas player to have worn a Roughyeds jersey and he also ranks high among his fellow countrymen who played at Watersheddings for the Bears.

He is making tries, scoring them, taking the ball up relentlessly, doing his tackling and all the time retaining the composure and the cool head to weigh up a given situation and take the lead in decision making.

His field goal at Rochdale was a case in point: so, too, was his chip to the line against Swinton which failed to produce a try but nevertheless showed that the Aussie can think on his feet.

And have you spotted that he is now starting to take the drop-out when Oldham have to kick from under their own posts?

In his short stay with the Roughyeds, the former Western Suburbs man has proved he is a multi-talented footballer with the skills to make a real name for himself over the remainder of the season.

If he can maintain his current form Oldham fans will soon be talking of McMenemy in the same breath as Lindner, the Liddiards, Paul Taylor, Gary Warnecke or Mal Graham, all of whom came to town from a land Down Under and contributed a great deal to the Oldham Rugby story.

If the players can show the enthusiasm and resilience which were hallmarks of their April performances they will be well on their way to cementing a place in the top-eight, if not the top five or six.

LIVING HISTORY

From the Pen of Michael Turner

RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

1945 - 1950

THE RUGBY LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP resumed after the Second World War with Workington Town taking their place in the competition. The Cumbrians won 16 of the 36 matches they played in that first campaign and, respectable as that was, they would go on to much greater things in the very near future.

In the two county cups Bradford maintained their War-time form to take the Yorkshire Cup and Widnes were the somewhat surprise winners of the Lancashire trophy with a 7 - 3 victory over Wigan in the final at Warrington. However, the men from Central Park would make amends by taking the overall championship with a 13 - 4 victory over Huddersfield at Maine Road, The achievement was made more remarkable by the fact that four of their star players had already departed with the 1946 touring party to Australia. The cherry and whites also reached the Challenge Cup Final but the day belonged to Wakefield Trinity and, most notably, to captain Billy Stott who kicked the deciding goal in the 13-12 victory in the last few minutes of the match and also became the first winner of the now legendary "Lance Todd Trophy". This award, which goes to the outstanding player in the final, is still one of the highest personal honours a player can receive in any form of rugby.

The aforementioned tourists became known as the "Indomitables". This name was taken from the Royal Navy ship on which they travelled on the trip "Down Under". The tour, under the captaincy of Salford's Gus Risman, was a success in so much as the "Ashes" were secured after a draw and two victories in the series against the Aussies although the one test in New Zealand was lost. The Oldham club was represented on the tour by the towering, Welsh second row forward Doug Phillips.

Bradford Northern became the first club to reach three successive Wembley finals. Their defeat to Wigan in 1948 was sandwiched between victories over Leeds in 1947 and Halifax in 1949.

The immediate Post War period was a boom time for all sports and Rugby League was no exception, with massive crowds turning up to cheer on their favourites. This was in evidence in that 1949 Wembley final when a crowd of over 95,000 set a new record for a Rugby League match.

PROBING THE NFP

THE Easter fixtures were packed with good football and some crucial results. All those people who prefer to spend their time in B & Q just don't know what they're missing.

The two big results of Good Friday were Featherstone's defeat of Hull K.R., and Widnes' home win against Leigh. In the former game Jamie Rooney won the battle of the scrum-halves with Mark Hewitt as 2,409 saw Fev bounce back from defeat at Spotland with big performances from pack stars Danny Evans, Maea David and Stuart Dickens. Meanwhile 4,237 were at the Autoquest for the Vikings win against the Centurions. The 59th minute dismissal of Stuart Donlan for tripping, with the score 14-8 in Widnes favour, undoubtedly influenced the outcome as the home side went on to win 28-16 with big games coming from Tommy Hodgkinson and Lee Hansen.

Dewsbury hung on to top spot with a comfortable 45-10 win against Batley and second placed Doncaster overwhelmed York by 70-8, stand off Craig Weston accounting for 26 points with 2 tries and 9 goals, and wingman Steve Booth scoring a hat-trick.

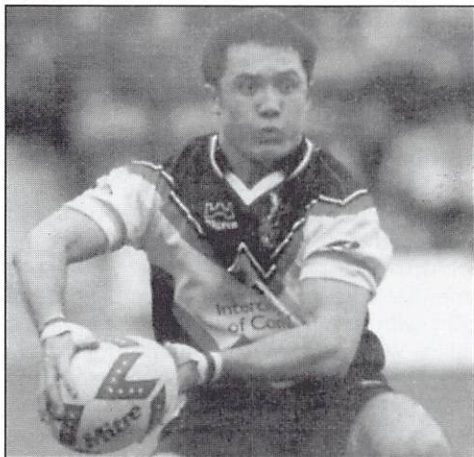
Another hat-trick man was ex-Bramley three quarter Neil Kite, who notched three in Sheffield's 56-12 victory against Lancashire Lynx. Equally convincing winners were Whitehaven, who routed Cumbrian rivals Barrow 30-0 with prop Dean Vaughan in the thick of the action.

The other games were all nail-biters. Keighley won with the last move of the match when Dean Hanger scored in the corner to send Hunslet down by 24-23. Similarly, at Gigg Lane Swinton second row Ian Pickavance scored in the last minute to overturn Workington 38-34. Not quite so close was Oldham's 13-12 win at Rochdale. A magnificent display by ex-Hornet, now Roughyed, Shayne McMenemy, capped by what turned out to be the winning drop goal, gave the visitors the points, Hornet's score in the last minute merely closing the gap rather than threatening the lead.

On Easter Monday Oldham and Swinton again turned in magnificent performances that had the crowd on the edges of their seats. At one stage of the first half Swinton led 18-0 after playing some sweeping width of the pitch football. It would have been enough to demoralise most teams, but Mike Ford's Oldham are made of stern stuff. With Shayne McMenemy again leading the way, Oldham fought their way back with David Gibbons, Neil Roden and Pat Rich on top form. For the Lions Ian Watson and Tony Barrow were outstanding,

but it was not enough to deny the Roughyeds another home win.

Lancashire Lynx frightened Widnes by taking a 14-0 lead but the Vikings fought back led by Paul Mansson and Liam Jones, the latter finishing with a try and 5 goals, the former with two tries in a 30-14 victory.

Barrow maintained their 100% home record with a solid 38-10 defeat of Featherstone. For once Jamie Rooney was outplayed, Barrow's Darren Holt finishing with 7 goals and a try.

Doncaster's 28-20 win at Batley took them to the top of the table as Dewsbury went down 20-12 at Hull K.R. These results allowed Leigh, 42-10 winners over Rochdale to reclaim second spot with Paul Wingfield scoring five goals and a try. The Dragons and the Centurions are separated only by points difference so Doncaster's visit to Widnes yesterday was a big game, with Leigh favourites to win at Hunslet.

In other games last week Workington won the local derby with Whitehaven by 27-18, and Keighley accounted for York 26-2.

Big games today feature Dewsbury v Hornets, the home side expected to win, but Rochdale, a better team than their league position suggests, one of only two sides to win at Ram Stadium last year. Featherstone have a tough test at home to Swinton, a game the Lions might just shade and, perhaps the biggest game of all, Barrow's 'fortress Craven Park' will be tested by Hull K.R. My forecast: a bold home win.

In Town Today



... YORK WASPS



ACTING coach Gary Atkins had instilled some extra pride into the Wasps, who this year had been but a shadow of the team which had performed so admirably in 1998 and 1999. Lower revenues have seen the York playing staff cut back and poor results culminated in the departure of coach Dean Robinson. Despite defeats at Workington (23-7) and at home to Leigh (28-22) the closeness of the scores had given grounds for optimism. Unfortunately the wheels came off on Good Friday when Doncaster Dragons ran in 70 points against 8. A further defeat by Keighley Cougars on Easter Monday (26-2) left the Wasps anchored second from bottom of the N.F.P. table. Despite this the Wasps will be no pushover today as their tough pack will pose Oldham plenty of problems.

Full back today will be contended between recent signing from Hull JOHN McCracken, a 21 year old utility player and DARREN CALLAGHAN, a former York Acorn player and BARLA tourist.

In the three-quarters Great Britain student international MATT WOODCOCK will take one wing spot and MAX RYCE the other. In the injury absence of, arguably, York's best player SHAUN AUSTERFIELD, expect to see the centre berths occupied by ANDY PRESTON, who is more used to a half back role, and KEVIN GRAY, a goalkicking former Hull K.R. and Hull F.C. player.

At stand-off will be either MARK CAIN, York's 14 try leading scorer last term, or CRAIG ROBINSON, while scrum-half will be GARETH DOBSON a tricky play-maker on loan from Castleford.

In the last two years York's great strength has been a powerful pack. Although former Oldham prop CRAIG BOOTH has recently moved to Featherstone, the Wasps

will still boost a fearsome pack of forwards. 21 year old MICK HAGAN will feature at No. 8 or possibly in the second row. Ex-Castleford man STEVE HILL is the likely

No.10, a player noted for his powerful driving. Unhappily for the Wasps another big prop LEA TICHENER has had his appearances restricted by injury. In the middle long serving hooker ALAN PALLISTER is a robust and troublesome No.9 who has proved a handful for Oldham previously and will be one to watch today.

In the back-row the three likely incumbents are CHRIS JUDGE, ANDY PRECIOUS and PAUL DARLEY. Judge has played in France and with Wakefield Trinity and is a strong-running, try-scoring second row. PRECIOUS, meanwhile, was York Supporters Player of the Year in 1999 and is noted for an ability to land drop goals. And club captain Darley is an enthusiastic former Castleford and Hull player.

Other York players to watch out for include CRAIG FORSYTH, recently returned from Heworth for a second spell with the Wasps and son of ex-Oldham and York prop Colin. Wingman LEROY MCKENZIE is returning from injury and can be a real danger. He is a former Hull F.C. favourite. Prop RICH HAYES returns to the Huntington Stadium after a spell at Hunslet, while ANDY HILL is also a returnee after appearances in 1999 with Castleford and Huddersfield at second-row. Finally others on the team sheet recently have been centre ANDREW LAMBERT and LEE MCTIGUE, together with ex-Castleford Alliance Player of the Year, second-rower SPENCER HARGRAVE.

Many thanks to those many fans who, either as a result of the article appearing in the Oldham v Dewsbury match programme, or Roger Halsteads Chronicle columns aired their views as to which former player/s should be further added to the **OLDHAM HALL OF FAME**. The response was excellent.

Throughout its history the club has had three golden periods, the turn of the nineteenth century, when during a seventeen year period, it only once ended the season outside the top six (winning a cabinet of trophies along the way!), the twenties when the side appeared in four consecutive Challenge Cup finals and the allstar team of

the fifties when it won everything **EXCEPT** the Challenge Cup.

The current **HALL OF FAME** includes Joe Ferguson who is representative of the period at the turn of the nineteenth century

with John Etty, Alan Davies, Derek Turner and Bernard Ganley representing the fifties.

There has so far been no inclusion of a player from the twenties side but this has now been put to rights with the the inclusion of **HERMAN HILTON** perhaps the greatest ever forward to pull on the red and white hoops! A local man Herman played ten times for his country, scored two tries in the ashes winning test whilst on the 1920 tour and captained the Oldham club to their 1924 Challenge Cup Final victory over Hull K.R. Represented the Oldham club no less than 253 occasions.

The fifties team is still fondly remembered by many older fans and it was therefore no surprise that an overwhelming number of votes went to a player who perhaps left the fans with the most lasting impression of any player in living memory, **FRANK STIRRUP**. Signed from Salford the ball handling half back had so much skill he was known throughout the sport as **MR FOOTBALL**. His sleight of hand exchanges

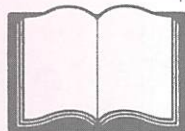

SALEM HORNETS



THE AMATEUR season which is drawing to a close has been blighted by clubs failing to fulfil fixtures because of a shortage of players. It is nice therefore, to report that a local club, Salem Hornets, have bucked the trend with around twenty-five players attending training sessions and a full complement of players turning up virtually every match, home or away.

Club secretary, baggage man and general organiser Stephen Hughes admits that he does not know the secret of Hornets' popularity but he went on to say, 'We're all good mates. Should these ambitious signings come to fruition then Salem could soon be moving up the North West Counties League. They currently play in the Third Division but three seasons ago they were up in Division One. An ageing playing squad suffered consecutive relegation in 1997 and 1998 but Salem's slide seems to have been arrested this season. Scrum half Tony Pemberton has done a superb job coaching the side ably assisted by popular loose forward Lee Robinson. John Eddleston skips the side from either stand-off or centre but Salem's finest quality must be their terrific team spirit.

The club has some way to go before emulating the team which lifted the Oldham Championship ten years or so ago. 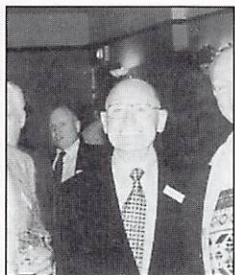

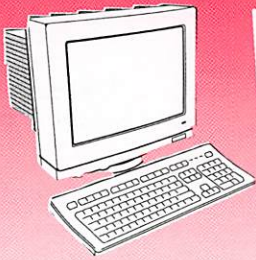
It is two years since Martin Murphy was inaugurated and it is now intended that in the future the situation will be reviewed on an annual basis.

RL can ill afford to turn it's back on its own in an attempt to gain universal popularity. Let's hope that they make a speedy return next season...it could have so easily been us!

ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO MAY 1ST YESTERYEAR.

EXACTLY 85 years ago, on Saturday 1st May 1915, the Oldham club staged the finals of the Challenge Cup competition when the Huddersfield 'Team of all Talents' completed a clean sweep of honours by defeating St. Helens 17-3 at Watersheddings. The margin of victory in that final was the widest in the history of the competition. That is until twelve months ago, on 1st May 1999, when Leeds defeated the London Broncos by 52 points to sixteen.

Oldham were themselves involved in the Challenge Cup Final on Saturday 1st May 1926. Unfortunately that final ended in defeat for the Roughyeds who were beaten 9-3 by Swinton. Winger Joe Corsi scored the Oldham try whilst for the Lions, Henry Blewer scored a try which Bert Morris improved and he also landed a couple of penalties. That final, which was played at Rochdale, was the first to be broadcast live over the radio. The Roughyeds had also been beaten in a final seventeen years earlier, on Saturday 1st May 1909. On that day Wigan beat Oldham 7-2 at Salford in the Championship Final. Second row forward Billy Jardine scored the Oldham try in a match which was watched by a disappointing attendance of 12,000. It was the third consecutive Championship Final involving the Roughyeds and they lost the lot although they came back to appear in the next two finals and gained revenge over Wigan by beating them on both occasions.

A match of much less significance took place on Friday 1st May 1959 when today's visitors York entertained Doncaster in the final league match of the season. Included in the York line-up that evening were four players who currently hold club records for the Wasps. In the second row was Basil Watts who won five caps for Great Britain whilst with York, more than any other player. At prop-forward was Vic Yorke who landed

1,060 goals and scored 2,159 points between 1954 and 1967, whilst on the winger was Peter Foster whose 167 tries between 1955 and 1967 was also a club record. Full-back in that team was Willie Hargreaves who made a club record 449 appearances for York between 1952 and

1965. York won that match against Doncaster 13-7 with tries from Brian Smith, Jeff Stevenson and, of course, Peter Foster plus a couple of goals from Vic Yorke.

Quite close to the Ryedale Stadium is Elm Park Way, the home of the Heworth amateur club who were founder members of the National Conference League. It was on this day in 1991, Wednesday 1st May, that Heworth entertained Saddleworth Rangers in a First Division match which the home side won 32-8. Andy Mercer (2), Tony Carr, Andy Tindall and Dave Reed scored tries for Heworth with Tony Carr (4) and Neil Rennison landing goals. Andy Tindall and Carl Deighton added dropped goals. John Fleming and Tony Hurst scored tries for the Rangers. Sixty per cent of professional players begin their careers with National Conference League clubs and one such player joined Oldham on Sunday 1st May 1993. That player was hooker John Clarke who was signed from East Leeds. He made 87 appearances for the Roughyeds and scored 11 tries before moving on to Hunslet in January 1998. He now plays for Batley.

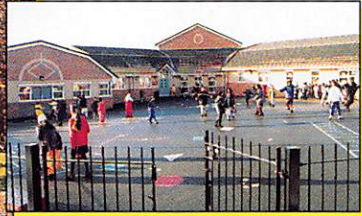
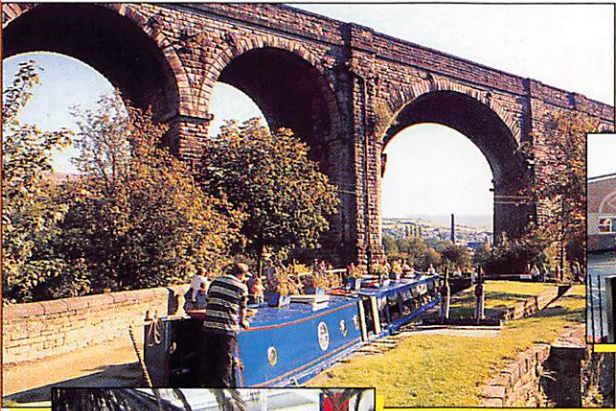
