Our thanks go to Paul Farrell and the players who have been involved with the schools over this time.



TOP teenage prospect Gary Smith made a dream debut for White-haven yesterday, scoring a try just 16 minutes after making his entrance as a second-half sub against York.

The former Keils forward learned he was playing less than an hour before kick-off when Alan Bone pulled out with a knee injury, but he showed no sign of nerves in the 44-12 win.

"For a 17-year-old, he did remarkably well when he got out there," said coach Kevin Tamati. "He had played 80 minutes for the A-team on Saturday and had no inkling that he would be playing again until 45 minutes before the game."I told him not to try to be Superman but just do the simple things right. He came to the game expecting to be 18th man but we went through our options -Steve McCourt, Buck Armstrong, George Suafoa, Andrew Nelson and Gary Smith and between Peter Smith, Joe Stewart and myself<sup>~</sup> we decided to give Gary his chance."

Winger Craig Walsh crossed for a try hat-trick, while second-row Howard Hill also impressed, slotting into the centres after Wesley Wilson suffered hamstring trouble, and taking the B & H Motors man-of-the-match award.

"Craig Walsh was in the right place at the right time for all three tries and good luck to him," the coach added. "It was a convincing victory for us and the guys carried out the game plan we had set out for the week."

Tamati believes the team can continue to improve and go through May unbeaten. To do that they must win at Leigh and Widnes.

but Tamati reckons it is possible - if their attitude is right.

"Widnes at Widnes are a different kettle of fish but I'm confident we can turn them over," he said.

Oldham May 14th

In the mid 1950's Oldham R.L.F.C was a force to be reckoned with, winning the Rugby League Championship 1956-57, the Lancashire League 1956-57, 1957-58 and the Lancashire Cup 1956-57, '57-58, 58-59.

Since that time their success has been less dramatic, although their league position so far this season, suggests that they are comfortably within the top eight play-offs at the end of the season.

The result at Oldham early in January this year, when Whitehaven were narrowly beaten 26-22 lends itself to the exciting possibility that home advantage may prove a point. Also bearing in mind the recent improvement in Haven's results, and coming after a convincing display in the last home fixture against York.

In season 1956-57 John McKeown kicked 141 goals, and anyone who saw him play would appreciate the talent that he was. The following year 1957-58 Bernard Gawley the Oldham full-back kicked 200 goals to put him in the top flight of goal kickers, and shows what a fantastic achievement that was.

Thinking of Oldham always brings to mind some of the Cumbrian connec-

tions. I remember Syd Little a second row forward signed from Carlisle Rugby Union. Geoff Robinson the Whitehaven loose forward transferred to Oldham in the late 1950's.

Ike Southward the winger from Workington Town signed by Oldham for a then record fee, who later on came back home and played for a short spell with Haven.

Another talented player in my opinion was hooker Alan McCurrie who came to us via Oldham. Proficient at his job and an adventurous acting half-back.

It interests me that today, the player wearing the number nine jersey is still referred to as the hooker. Yet the change in scrummaging rules makes this a mistomener as he now is just the player in the middle of the scrum. The scrum being an excuse to bring the forwards together, out of the way, so that they can lean on each other and have a rest, while the scrum-half puts the ball somewhere in the second row. It then gives the backs a chance to handle the ball while the forwards are otherwise engaged.

Two thirds of the season gone already gone, but with some interesting fixtures still remaining. A strong finish would do everybody a world of good.



MARTYN SADLER, the editor of Rugby League Express, asks whether it's time to experiment with a new knock-on rule.

Some time ago in League Express I floated the idea that we should look again the knock-on, and what the at

consequences of a knock-on should be. Recently, when watching a whole series of games, both in Super League and in the Northern Ford Premiership, I've become more convinced than ever that the knock-on rule needs to be reviewed.

Those readers who have Sky Sports may have noticed their commentators Eddie and Stevo recently getting into

arguments about whether a place, as a player drops the up again. More and more of those incidents seem to happen, leading to contentious decisions by referees that seem to favour one side or the other.

The consequences of a knock-on - that the other side get the ball from the scrum with the ensuing six tackles - and therefore of a mistaken decision, are potentially enormous

The problem, however, is that the game stops. And it presents us with the biggest disparity between Rugby League and soccer. Whereas in soccer a pass doesn't have to go straight to the player receiving it, in Rugby League it does, and the slightest error in catching the ball leads to a very negative stoppage in play.

I believe that a player who knocks on accidentally, but who regathers the ball



himself, should be allowed to play on. Such a rule would improve the game immensely, and would get rid of one of the biggest anticlimaxes in the game. We would

still have a scrum if his teammate picked the ball up, but if the player who has knocked on the ball re-gathers it himself, why shouldn't play continue?

Some people may claim we would be reducing the skill element, by allowing a player to get away with dropping the ball. That isn't true, however, because players would still need to catch the ball, and we would in fact be adding a new skill - the

ability to recover a dropped ball. For fans, it would be exciting to knock-on has actually taken Knick knock- see whether a player could do that, and whether the other ball sideways and then picks it **On rule into** team could prevent him from regathering the ball.

The rules of the game were invented in the middle of the last century by old boys of

Rugby School, and we have moved a long way from the rules that were originally set out. But, oddly enough, on this rule we haven't, and now is perhaps the time to do SO.

If you have any doubts about this proposal, which, admittedly, is a radical one, then just watch today's game, and see how the game loses its momentum with each knock-on.

In my view this proposal deserves a trial, and the obvious place to trial it is in one or more NFP games at the end of the season where both clubs are out of the running for the topeight play-off series. After all, what would those games have to lose?



#### **Ref's Review by Steve Nicholson**

Greg McCallum the director of referee's performance returned back from his business trip in Australia, with a few issues sort out. Two main issues were the video referee and on field reporting systems.

Greg issued a statement to coaches and referee's last week to try and reduce both the number of times we use the screen in live Sky matches and for referee's to use their own judgement when dealing with foul play. In recent Sky games some officials have been going back four or five tackles which is permitted. One of the things that Greg was worried about, was that some officials were looking at incidents that have already been seen and judges by the referee, which has been highlighted by not only Eddie & Stevo from Sky but the games major stake holder? You the spectator.

In this case McCallum has told referee's to use the people such as touch judges and coach in the stand to help them rather than let play go on four or five tackles, and then ask the video referee to look at three or four situations at once. Doing this was slightly degrading to the system, which to be honest, worked so well in the past.

McCallum was also concerned about the number of incident that were being placed on report, when after reading the

referee's report it was guite evident that the referee had seen the incident. Therefore should have used his judgement to decide whether the act of foul play warranted a full dismissal or not. The Sin Bin is not the place for acts of foul play, it is for professional fouls, persistent infringements, technical offenses and man to man confrontation. Last weekend we saw four people being placed on report and three being dismissed for alleged foul play, a lot of spectators say that no one get sent off on TV. That theory was blown out of the water on Friday evening when Castleford referee Steve Presley dismissed London Bronco's Anthony Selbold for an alleged high tackle on Leeds Rhino's lestvn Harris. Hopefully players, coaches and referees will take heed of the advice from Mr McCallum.
