

'Ram raiding' took up a new meaning for me on Sunday. I was gob smacked by it all to be honest. I had said in the programme of how I had recently "found my voice again" at Town matches only then to be stunned into eighty minutes of silence by the Dewsbury blitz. It was in truth a fine showing by the rampant Rams. But behind the scenes, prior to the game, I did notice we were destined to field team that probably contained too many 'walking wounded'. And, despite those players creditable commitment, that cannot have aided our effort by any means. The midweek news of an 'injury crisis at Derwent Park' was patently not scare mongering and some players were obviously carrying a burden which affected their performance, and consequently Dewsbury unceremoniously capitalised on it. The May schedule was always considered as a testing time on the horizon by the Town hierarchy. Even with all fit and well it was bound to become an examination of the clubs reborn achievement level. Seven fixtures set within 28 days would be a difficult agenda to surmount successfully for any full time pro club, never mind little old NFP members. It therefore seems crazy to me that those at RLHQ couldn't manage to spread the burden throughout the season with more uniformity, while avoiding overloading one of Summers traditionally hottest months. Incidentally, and sadly for us Townies, Sunday's encounter once again provided a reminder of how cruel this game can become when the going gets unbearably tough, with silly tries conceded as the heat became intolerable.

So then we need once more to take stock and lift up heads and hearts. I believe some of those wounded troops took further knocks on Sunday and this game tonight may have come too early for full recoveries.

Now then approx two weeks ago I would have held little fear of today's visitors upsetting Gary Murdock's Marauders recent charge to respectability. The aforementioned 'crack' puts a different perspective on things however. Having said that I am 'quietly' confident that Town can get back into winning ways tonight. I saw Oldham at Whitehaven a week gone Sunday, having been at the Recre to watch 'Bens Boyz' slaughter the young Warriors. Town Academy Director, Barry Earl, and I stayed on to watch the main event. Considering it would serve us as a guide to Oldham's capabilities, and I was hoping for the Roughyeds to further sicken the home fans following our crushing Academy display. Sadly the Oldham effort was very below par. Haven had set off like the proverbial train going 18-2 up in no time. A lead, as I recall, they also raced into on Easter Monday, only to be left pointless that day. Oldham did wake up and clawed the arrears back somewhat. But despite enjoying copious possession the Roughyeds were too tamely tackled out of it by a less than awesome Haven outfit. But that must surely have been just a 'bad day at the office' for the Yeds, I mean a bad team don't proudly sit in the sixth position they currently occupy in this mega competitive NFP do they? I am now of the opinion that even the most ardent supporters of Workington and Whitehaven (with one or two exceptions) would now welcome the formation of one professional West Cumbrian side as suggested (yet again) in the press, this time by Town coach Gary Murdock. Evening Star wag and die hard Whitehaven supporter Martin Morgan believes the time has come to join forces in order to move forward.

Super League and all its ramifications hit Britain early in April 1995, causing the biggest upheaval and controversy in the game's history. The battle for the television rights for rugby league had started months earlier during a power struggle between media giants Kerry Packer and Rupert Murdoch as they battled for the television rights

to cover the Winfield Cup. Packer's Channel Nine station had already won the contract, so Murdoch and his News Corporation company retaliated by planning a new Star League in opposition. Murdoch direct began by buying up many of Australia's top players in order to force Packer to rengotiate the television contract, but when that failed he set his sights on Britain. His plan was for Britain and France to become key players in a £300m worldwide competition that would exclude the official Australian League. Murdoch's

initial offer of £77m to share among British clubs seemed like an unbelievable lifeline as many clubs, including Workington and Oldham were in severe financial trouble. But the haste with which the league rushed through the new Super League, featuring the controversial 'mergers' of clubs and summer rugby, caused widespread anger among supporters.

Although is was obvious that something had to be done in order to save the game, and the Super League idea was right in principle, the idea of many clubs being virtually forced to merge led to many anti merger feelings among supporters, not least amongst Whitehaven, Carlisle and Barrow fans who would have been forced into a Cumbria side based here at Derwent Park.

It seems ridiculous now, looking back to see what we could have had here at Workington. Although we had Super League for one season, the 'cash

windfall' was too little too late to save Workington as the club plunged into financial ruin, and two successive relegations.

So, five years down the line after turning our backs on the original merger what have we achieved here in West Cumbria? - nothing.

What are we actually playing for? - should we be

good enough to win the NFP next year there's no guarantee that the Super League pot of gold will be waiting for us, quite the opposite in fact, I'm sure the RFL could find any one of several reasons not to admit us into Super League. I cannot help feeling that over the last five years there has been some sort of hidden agenda at the RFL. I mean if you had a spare million and wanted to start a Super League club, where would you take a franchise? The North East, an area that has no rugby league background at all, or Edinburgh,

Glasgow, Wales, Northhampton or Birmingham. The list of suggestions for a franchise seems to include every part of the British Isles except one, THE ONLY area in the country where rugby league, not football is the dominant sport, and where there would be a guaranteed hardcore crowd base of at least 2,500 on which to build! Seems strange doesn't it. Which brings me back to the question of a hidden agenda. Could the RFL be secretly hoping that one of the remaining two West Cumbrian sides goes out of business.

It is only going to be a matter of time before the merger happens, so why not open discussions now. It certainly makes sense, one club, bigger sponsorship deals, and a chance to give our top amateur players the opportunity to play rugby league at the highest level ... on their own doorstep, in front of their own supporters.


#### And 'Bens Boyz' ....


