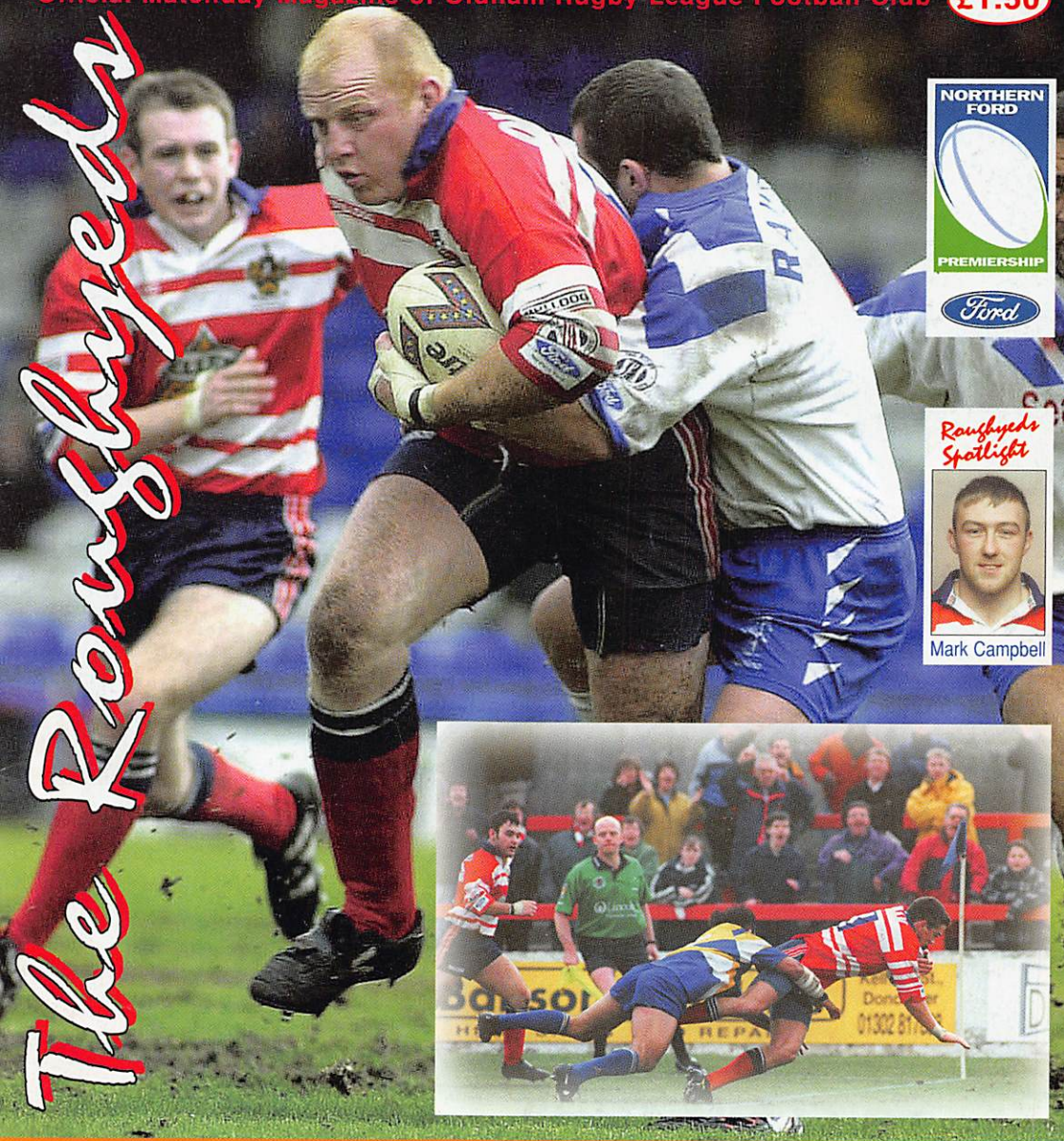

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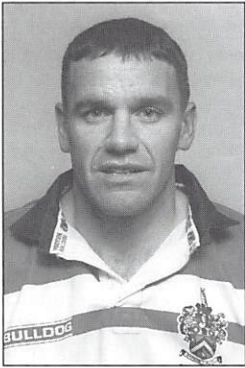

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In Yer Face



RUGBY has always had one big problem which soccer does not have: what happens when the progress of a man in possession is stopped? In soccer the opposing team gains possession. But in rugby one code opted for a player releasing the ball, and the other code opted for the tackled player retaining possession (albeit now for only a limited number of tackles). And neither solution has ever been entirely satisfactory. In Rugby Union the loose-scrum, ruck or maul - call it what you will - is an untidy shambles all too often leading to offences, some of which the spectators neither see nor understand. And, worse still, those penalties are badly overvalued at three points and are regularly the determining factors in a game's outcome. It is precisely this which leads the average Rugby League fan to shake his head in amazement at games which finish 27-18 with not a try scored.

But, is the Rugby League 'solution' any better? I know that R.U. fans who find R.L. boring (yes they do, believe it or not) always cite the play-the-ball as the aspect of the game which spoils the fluidity of the play. Now you and I may not agree with this view, but I am increasingly frustrated, especially with Super League, by the constant interference at play-the-ball (I hate the term ruck) by the defending side. Under the ten metre rule players will do anything, and in this they are actively encouraged by their coaches, to delay the play-the-ball in order to get their defensive line set. So turning a man on his back gains vital fractions of a second. Getting two, three or four men tangled up achieves the same object. So too lying on or holding down. And, worst of all, a sly hand on the ball causing a tackled player to lose possession in his efforts to execute a quick play-the-ball is a spoiling tactic now getting out of hand (no pun intended).

Of course we do not want referees awarding a stream of penalties thereby ruining the continuity of the game, but some stamping of authority on this area of the game is definitely needed. When you and I, from the stands and terraces, can see what is going on

we expect some action, because to abandon the play-the-ball to mayhem is to undermine the spectacle we have paid to see. And to apply the rules of the game intermittently or whimsically is the worst case scenario because nothing frustrates spectators and players more than not knowing when a referee will take action and when he won't. I know the problem is as old as the game itself, but when

I watch Bradford Bulls pull every trick in the book and James Lowes, in particular exploit every weakness or indecision of the referee I get really wound up. And what is worse I know full well that Bradford Bulls are

currently the best team in Super League by a mile and are going to win without the need to resort to such tactics anyway. So, Mr McCullum, how about a clean-up? And this time let's mean it and keep it going all the time, in every game.

AS a Rochdalian who has spent nearly 40 years working for the Oldham Chronicle – 37 of them on the Sports Desk and 36 of them covering rugby league in the town – I never thought I would see the day when, in a sporting sense, Rochdale would leave Oldham behind.

Is it happening? You bet it is. What else can you think when you look at what Rochdale has done, and is still doing, to redevelop Spotland and compare that with what hasn't been done in Oldham to give the town a half-decent stadium by modern standards.

We now hear that, as a result of the changes on the local political scene, there will never be a new stadium on Clayton Playing Fields and there won't be one anywhere else either, unless somebody comes up with the money.

I was brought up to believe passionately in that old saying: where there's a will, there's a way. Towns all over the country have had that will and have got new or redeveloped stadia to prove that they also found a way.

And what of Oldham? If this town had the will, I'm not so sure it has it now, so while Oldham talks . . . and talks . . . and talks . . . about a new stadium, or even the demolition and rebuilding of Boundary Park, the rest of the country builds . . . and builds . . . and builds . . . and builds.

As a simple geographical exercise let's for a moment or two go on a tour of the North-West and look at what other towns are doing, or have done, to improve and modernise their sporting facilities.

Deepdale, at Preston, and Turf Moor, at Burnley, have been redeveloped and modernised. so has Ewood Park at Blackburn.

We have the new Reebok Stadium near Bolton and the JJB Stadium in Wigan.

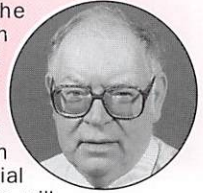
Widnes can boast the Autoquest Stadium – a revamped version of the old Naughton Park with three super new stands and a fourth to follow – and St Helens are moving out of Knowsley Road to go into a new stadium on the south side of the town close to the M62.

Over the Pennines in West Yorkshire, we have the McAlpine Stadium in Huddersfield and major development work taking place at The New Shay in Halifax.

Even in Rochdale, the town to which I pay council tax, we have a Spotland stadium which boasts two new stands, while work will start soon on the major development of the popular side.

Rugby League is crying out for a modern stadium in this locality, due to the close proximity of the M62 and it's half-way house situation between Lancashire and Yorkshire.

Spotland housed the Student international match last season between Great Britain and Australia and the forthcoming final of the forthcoming final of the Emerging Nations Championship, to be run alongside the Lincoln Financial Group World Cup in the autumn, will also take place on the same ground.



Boundary Park has been mentioned in despatches as a possibility for staging a Northern Ford Premiership Grand Final or even a Silk Cut Challenge Cup semi-final. Gigg Lane at Bury falls into a similar category.

Quite clearly, the RFL views the Oldham – Rochdale – Bury area as a strategic one in terms of catering for fans coming from opposite directions to a central venue.

What would the demand be, therefore, if Oldham could offer a similar, if perhaps somewhat smaller, version of the JJB or the McAlpine?

The opportunities are endless. But what if the town continues to pay lip service only to the dream of a new home for the Roughyeds and for Oldham Athletic? What will happen then?

Leading Oldham Athletic people have already stated publicly that a new stadium is essential to future plans. The same can be said of the Roughyeds.

The worrying part of all this is that not enough people in high places in this town seem to appreciate the value to the town's future status of the continued existence of Oldham Rugby and Oldham Athletic.

More and more Oldhamers are heading in ever-increasing numbers to big-city Manchester for their sporting and other leisure pursuits.

Old Trafford is arguably the best stadium in the country. City will soon be moving to a brand-new home not a million miles from here – can Maine Road be all that bad? – and Manchester Storm and Manchester Giants can attract fans to the well-equipped MEN Arena.

Poor old Oldham. It was once so proud of its past and its present, of its heritage, of its sporting prowess, of its sons and daughters who made an impact on the national and international scenes, of its Oldham Athletic and its Oldham RL Club,

Are we to sit idly by and do nothing as Manchester swallows us up because it can't get a foothold in Bolton, Rochdale or Wigan?

This town is fast losing its identity. Oldhamers beware!

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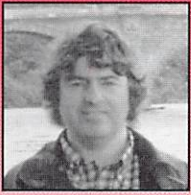
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LIVING HISTORY

From the Pen of Michael Turner

RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

1960 - 1965

THE 1960 Championship Final was won by Wigan who defeated Wakefield at Odsal. The crowd of over 83,000 reversed the current trend, as by this time Rugby League attendances were in rapid decline. For Trinity there was the consolation of winning the Challenge Cup, before Her Majesty the Queen, when an injury ravaged Hull side were hammered by a then record score of 38-5. Under the dynamic leadership of skipper Derek Turner, Trinity would also take the trophy in 1962 and 1963.

The RL authorities experimented with a two division system in 1962-3 and 1963-4. On both occasions Swinton, who could boast star players of the calibre of Blan, Buckley, Gowers, Stopford etc, were crowned champions finishing well clear of the rest in the first division. As a result the Lions enjoyed their best post war spell, although in the Lancashire Cup they finished runners up four times in five years, each time to St. Helens. The two division system was supplemented by a divisional competition which in effect amounted to an extra Lancashire and Yorkshire championship.

The 1962 Great Britain tourists beat the Aussies two tests to one but lost both matches against the Kiwis. However, there would be ample revenge for the Kangaroos who blitzed the Brits in the first two tests of the 1963 series, inflicting a record defeat of 50 points to 12 in the second test

at Station Road.

The 1963-64 season will long be remembered for the extraordinary amount of draws in the Challenge Cup competition. Widnes, the eventual winners drew twice with Leigh in the first round, twice with Swinton in the third round and once with Castleford in the semi final. However, local supporters are more than likely to recall the epic battle between Oldham and Hull K.R. in the other semi final which also went to two replays before the "Robins" progressed to the twin towers.

1964-65 saw the two division system scrapped and the introduction, for the first time, of substitutes, although the original rules meant that replacements could only be sent on for injured players and only up to half time. The end of season play off was extended to the top 16 with the result that Halifax, who finished in seventh position in the league table, were unlikely champions after defeating table toppers St. Helens in the final. The Challenge Cup final of the same year was a classic. Wigan beat Hunslet 20-16 at Wembley in what many people regard as the best Rugby League match ever to grace the national stadium. A peculiarity of the occasion was the sharing of the Lance Todd Trophy with Ray Ashby of Wigan and Hunslet's Brian Gabbitas the co-winners.

PROBING THE NFP

THESE programme notes were written before last Friday evening's full list of fixtures, several of which had a crucial bearing on the scramble for top eight placings. Doncaster Dragons come to us today, for example, on the back of a visit from Dewsbury Rams, a match I would forecast as a hairsbreadth Dewsbury win. If I am right and Oldham managed a win at Workington - always a tall order - today's match would give the Roughyeds the chance to overtake the Dragons in the league table. Similarly, if Featherstone failed at Whitehaven and Oldham beat both Workington and Doncaster the Roughyeds could break into the top four irrespective of Featherstone's game today against Sheffield.

Other top games on Friday involved Leigh at Barrow, which I would expect the Centurions to have won if only because of Barrow's injury list. Keighley will have slaughtered Lancashire Lynx to maintain their challenge, but will Widnes have managed a win at Gigg Lane? Somehow I doubt it as the Lions mount a serious top 8 bid.

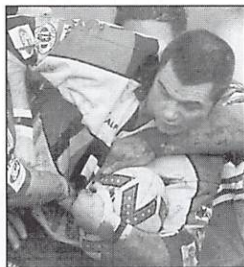
Of today's games Oldham v Doncaster is undoubtedly a gem, but Hull K.R. may return to winning ways at home to Workington, Widnes should account for Whitehaven at the Autoquest, and Rochdale could pull off a derby victory at home to Swinton. However pick of the day, assuming Dewsbury dispose of Hunslet, is the clash at Hilton Park of Leigh and Keighley, third and second in the league respectively. And my money goes on the Cougars who I think are a better disciplined and more organised side.

Meanwhile back on Sunday May 21st the big result was Featherstone's defeat of Doncaster, which I not so much tipped as hinted at. Last gasp it may have been with a Matt Bramald 75th minute try, but Jamie Rooney again dominated for Rovers and scored 12 of the 16 points.

Widnes defeated a badly disciplined Rochdale side 38-10. Hooker Phil Cantillon equalled a club record five tries in a match for the second time. But Hornets were their own worst enemies with Darren Robinson and Lee Maher dismissed and Dane Dorahy and Martin Bunce sin-binned. A 15-5 penalty count against the Hornets tells its own story.

Leigh Centurions had a comfortable outing against Whitehaven Warriors, 34-8. Centre Paul Anderson scored a try for the seventh consecutive match, while Paul Wingfield landed 7 goals. Penalty count here 18-6 to Centurions.

Oldham consolidated their position with a 30-16 defeat of Barrow, Kevin Mannion and Anthony Gibbons were on top form for the Roughyeds as was the irrepressible John Hough who scored a trademark solo try from 20 yards. For Barrow Glen Hutton scored a spectacular 67th minute try.

Dewsbury stayed top of the league by winning at Derwent Park 58-6. Shayne Williams and Sean Richardson did the spadework for Barry Eaton and Daniel Frame to inflict the damage. Wingman Adrian Flynn finished with four tries and Eaton with 9 goals.

Keighley retained second place with an expected win against Hull K.R. (30-8) and set a new record of consecutive wins which had stood for 97 years.

And finally 15th placed Sheffield Eagles overcame 16th placed Batley 21-14 at Mount Pleasant, Gavin Brown grabbing two tries and two goals, while 14th placed Hunslet Hawks defeated 17th placed York Wasps 22-18 at Huntington Stadium, with Chris Ross scoring a try and five goals for the Hawks.

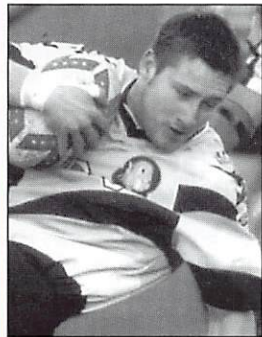


...DONCASTER DRAGONS

FOLLOWING Doncaster (Dragons or otherwise) is a bit like a ride on the Big One – all ups and downs (probably with more downs than ups). Currently the Dragons are very much in an up phase which gives all those of us with the interests of the wider Rugby League scene at heart a great deal of pleasure (except, of course, when they are Oldham's opponents).

Coached by St. John Ellis, an uncompromising three-quarter with Castleford and Great Britain, the Dragons reflect their Coach's go-forward style. Possessed of a non-nonsense pack of forwards who like to dominate their opponents and lay the platform for a prolific back division, the Dragons boast a mean defence and a free-scoring attack. Rest assured they will test the Roughyeds to the limit today.

Full-back STEVE BOOTH is a pacy former Huddersfield Giants player currently on loan from Hunslet Hawks.

The three-quarters feature LYNTON STOTT, a free-scoring former Wakefield and Sheffield wingman; CARL HALL, in a second spell with Doncaster after considerable experience with Bradford Bulls and holder of a 'tries in a match' record, with five against Mysons in the Challenge Cup; JAMES BUNYAN, a

centre who started with Milford ARLFC, signed for Huddersfield in 1995, scored a try in the 1997 Premiership Final at Old Trafford, and joined the Dragons at the start of this season; FATA SINI, a 1995 World Cup representative with Western Samoa and an ex-Salford and York three-quarter who has given Oldham plenty of headaches in the last two seasons; and NEIL BENNETT a wingman signed from Castleford Lock Lane.

At stand-off Doncaster boast CRAIG WESTON, a prolific marksman and try-scorer. Weston played three seasons with Gold Coast Chargers, one with Sydney City Roosters and two with South Queensland Crushers before coming to England to sign for Huddersfield in 1997. His partner at scrum-half is the 1999 N.F.P. Grand Final man-of-the-match LATHAM TAWHAI who left Hunslet Hawks to join the Dragons for the

millennium season. Tawhai has also played for Keighley and represented New Zealand in the World Nines competition in 1996. Also in contention today at halfback is COLIN CARTER a Hull born and bred former BARLA international.



Asa Amone

A powerful front-row features ASA AMONE, a Tongan international at both League and Union. He played in the Union World Cup in 1987 and the League World Cup in 1995. Amone played for Mount Albert in N.Z., for Blaney in New South Wales and then for Halifax in Super League and Featherstone in the N.F.P. Together with BASIL RICHARDS and JOE BERRY, Amone gains the Dragons plenty of hard yards. RICHARDS started with Queensbury in the Pennine League and then joined Warrington and Huddersfield before going to Belle Vue. BERRY, meanwhile, signed for Keighley, playing three seasons at Cougar Park before transferring to McAlpine Stadium where he featured in the Giants' Premiership Final team.

Hooker PETER EDWARDS is well-known to Oldham followers as a troublesome former York Wasp. A Kiwi tourist in 1993 who played with Auckland Warriors, Edwards arrived in England to play for Salford before signing for the Wasps and now the Dragons.

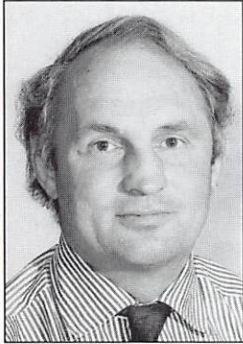
In the back-row is CARL GILLESPIE, a workaholic tackler formerly with Halifax Blue Sox who was on the fringes of GB selection in 1997. Partner ROB WILSON is another ex-Hunslet Grand Finalist who also has experience at Hull KR. And loose-forward TONY MILLER is Doncaster's longest serving player. Now also Assistant Coach, Miller appeared with the Dons in Super League and has now completed ten seasons since arriving from Featherstone.

Other players who might appear from the bench include MICK COULT, in a second spell with Doncaster after playing as a three-quarter with Rochdale and Hunslet; WAYNE PARKER the crafty play-making ex-Hull K.R. and Halifax scrum-half cum loose-forward; PAUL LISTER a product of Eastmoor ARLFC in Wakefield from where he first signed for Trinity; utility player JAMES WALKER; Academy product and ex-Toll Bar forward GAVIN MORGAN; ex-Huddersfield hooker GUY ADAMS; ex-York centre CRAIG MOORE; and finally ex-Wakefield hooker or half-back, the elusive BILLY CONWAY.

SID LITTLE OBE has recently undergone heart surgery and is currently recovering at his West Midlands home. The ex RAF pilot (Sid was awarded his OBE for services to the Air Training Corp), Harlequins and Cumberland union star signed for Oldham in 1952 to form a tremendous

back row partnership with Welshman Charlie Winslade winning 10 Great Britain caps during his stay with the club.

We wish Sid all the best during his period of recuperation and I make no apology for repeating his article featured in 'The End of An Era' published to mark the closure of Watersheddings. This was, in my opinion, one of the best short reviews ever written for an Oldham rugby publication.

It was a surprise, albeit a pleasant one, to be asked to write a few notes on my memories of the period when I played for Oldham. Sadly many of the older players who could have written a better recollection have permanently transferred to another higher league. A few, of course may be playing in that hotter lower division but my first thought must be of them. They were all very good team mates. My time with Oldham was in the 50's when, as another old player said **"We played rugby Sid when the game was positively dangerous, but sex was safe!"** It is nearly 50 years ago but I well remember arriving in Oldham in February 1952. It must have been 10 below freezing that night and at Mumps' Bridge when I got off that No. 98 bus visibility was nil. I had never been to Oldham before and it looked as if I would not see much of it on this trip!

You will perhaps understand my relief when I eventually found the Red Lion. I had been a pilot in the RAF not a navigator. But I did speak the language and several helpful directions got me to my home for the next few days. The bar was heated my bedroom was

not, so I benefited from the loose interpretation of the licensing laws that applied in Oldham at that time.

The generous hospitality of the people of Oldham impressed me on that first night and during my 10 years living, working and playing in the town that generosity never changed. I made many good friends. My welcome from the Oldham Chron's correspondent was less generous, and simply pointed out to its readers that now Oldham FC has signed a Harlequin that would complete the circus! But as many will recall the team of the 50's was no circus, although the tricks, moves and dummy options devised, practiced and perfected contributed to the team's success. Everybody has their opinions as to what makes a good successful team that is entertaining to watch. My personal view is that it owed its success to only three factors, a fit squad with balanced complimentary talents, encouragement, and good coaching. We had a committee who gathered together such a group of talented players who blended and benefited from each other's skills.

Bryn Goldswain was a talented player and a very good captain. He was a teacher by profession and I suspect a very good one. His communication skills laid many of the

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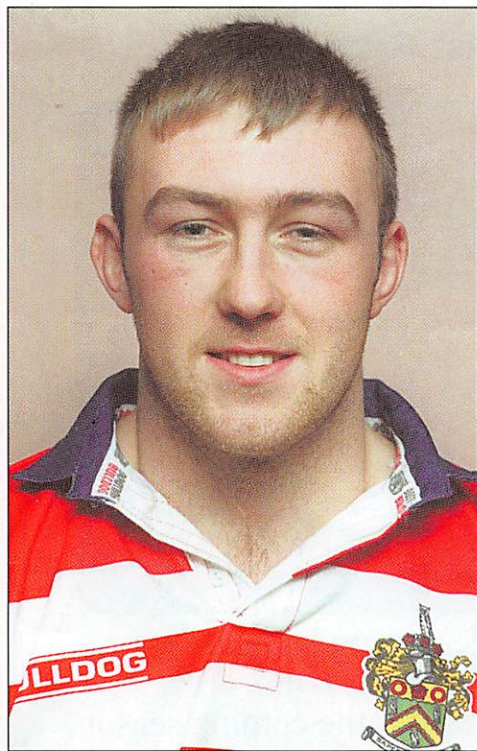

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An interview by Dave Roberts with Mark Campbell



It was nice to get back to winning ways against Barrow.

Yes, it was a good win and it was a big match for both teams. It was a welcome two points for us as Barrow are ninth in the Table and it gave us a bit of breathing space. We knew it was a game we should win as Barrow are poor away from home. On the whole we played better and had more belief in ourselves.

What remaining games are most important?

All of them. To be honest I don't look too far ahead and just take one game at a time, obviously some of the games we have left are four-pointers and will give us a chance to move up the table. Hopefully we will start a run again but as I say I only look at one game at a time.

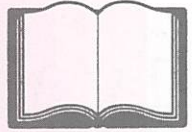

HIGGINSHAW EAGLES



Oldham v Higginshaw 1936

ARGUABLY the most successful amateur club in the history of the Oldham junior rugby league are Higginshaw and so it was most disappointing when the Club's open age team were unable to fulfil their fixtures earlier this year.

The Higginshaw Club has been in existence for over 100 years and enjoyed unparalleled success during the 1930s, 1940s and 1950s. During the 1930s Higginshaw reached the first round of the Challenge Cup on no fewer than four occasions. No doubt the Club enjoyed financial satisfaction from visits to Hull, Widnes and Swinton but the biggest day in the Club's history was probably their visit to Watersheddings in 1936 when they took on the Roughyeds. Season 1931-32 was a typical campaign during their domination of the local amateur game. That season Higginshaw won 14 and drew one of their 16 matches in their Oldham Amateur League campaign before going on to beat Heyside 13-2 in the semi-final of the Championship play-off and Roundthorn 16-0 in the final. The Standard Cup competition at that time was contested between the winners of two mini-leagues of five clubs. Higginshaw were undefeated in their division, winning seven and drawing one of their eight matches. They then beat Saddleworth Rangers 16-0 in the final. That match against Saddleworth was one of a competition record eight consecutive appearances in the Standard Cup Final between 1929 and 1936. Higginshaw have appeared in 24 Standard Cup Finals and have lifted the trophy thirteen times.

Their last appearance in the Standard Cup Final came as recently as 1998 when Higginshaw were playing in the Premier Division of the North West Counties League. Unfortunately, by the time St Annes beat them in that final, Higginshaw had already been relegated. Indeed their first league victory of that 1997/98 season was not achieved until February. Twelve months later Higginshaw were relegated for a

second consecutive season following a campaign in which they frequently had trouble actually putting a team onto the meadow. In May 1999 Higginshaw announced an amalgamation with Heyside Eagles playing under the new name Higginshaw Eagles. The 1999/2000 season opened optimistically when the Eagles reached the final of the Oldham League Championship only to lose to St. Annes despite full-back Michael Fogarty crossing for a hatrick of tries. However, it proved another difficult season with player recruitment once again proving a major problem. In mid-January Higginshaw Eagles played their final match, a 42-0 away defeat against Albert Park. Within a month the Club had withdrawn from the North West Counties League.

Higginshaw hope to relaunch their open age team next season but are having difficulty recruiting a high profile coach able to draw fresh blood to the Club and lead them, hopefully, to its former glory.

The youth section, nevertheless, continues to thrive with five teams between Under-9s and Under-14s all enjoying successful campaigns. The Club has also maintained the tremendous support of its two main sponsors, Grimwood & Dix, Electrical Contractors of Wellington Road, Ashton and Derek Anthony Ltd, the Sheet Metal Fabricators of Derker Street, Oldham. With their support and encouragement, and the inspiration of the talented youth section, surely Higginshaw will soon be back as a major force in the local amateur rugby league scene.

foundations on which the 50's team subsequently blossomed. Bryn Day an ex-paratrooper, played his rugby as he said he had fought the war. Bryn unquestionably believed in the practice of getting his retaliation in first. At his best his ball distribution was as outstanding as his left hook but he was a character and we had many arguments on what rugby was about. I did not win the argument but, while not accepting his pragmatic practices I liked the man, as did many others and he certainly played a role in the 50's team development.

Frank Daley was perhaps the most underrated player of my time and an example to prove that point was made when Wigan played the great Billy Boston at stand off opposite Frank in a Lancashire Cup Final at Swinton. All that needs saying is that Billy never played at stand off again. Frank was a key player and it is sad that he too died a short while ago.

Billy Mitchell, Johnny Noon and Denis Ayres were local lads and they too all played a part. Dick Cracknell's arrival acknowledged the importance of side step and pace in any team and Dick's skill was complimented by the strength and perfectly timed crash tackling of John Etty. Alan Davies "a centre exceptional" had everything on and off the field. A charming vociferous character, everyone liked Alan, and his performance on the field was outstanding. Frank Stirrup was our "football brain" and had much influence in devising and refining set moves. Older supporters may remember the team's No 10 set piece which suited Terry O'Grady's style so well and its 10 dummies were effective in confusing the opposition!

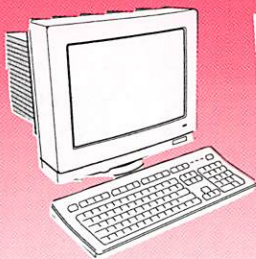
We had good coaching in depth and I will remember the on-going constructive part played by the Leigh mafia! And I should mention Alec Givvons who explained to me some of the game's harder but often clinically executed features considered particularly appropriate for Rugby Union players! Frank Pitchford another regular match winner was perhaps the outstanding scrum half in the League in the 50's. At his peak Frank's eye for an opening and his ability to go through it in the blink of an eye was devastating to the opposition, that is when we could keep up with him. Bernard Ganley whose goalkicking not only broke records possibly won us more matches than any other player while confirming week in and week out that the first man you pick for your rugby team is a man who never misses his goal kicks. (Current coaches take note!)

Derek Turner was surely one of the game's best loose forwards and it was a real pleasure for me to meet him again at a Lion's re-union at Headingley. In the 50's with Derek calling the shots we had a strong mobile pack including keep fit fanatic Don Vine a strong ball handling prop, and in Jack Keith our hooker, we had a remarkable player who could always win the ball that is if he decided to strike for it! For good measure Jack could and did score many tries. Charlie Winslade from Maesteg and Oldham's own Ken Jackson were Internationals and very good players. Indeed if Don, Jack, Ken and Charlie are all packing down in that team in heaven they have the basis for a very good pack. Derek and I miss playing but neither of us feels ready to complete the six just yet. I enjoyed playing at Watersheddings. I had great team mates. There was much humour, there was much success and some disappointment but that is how it should be although we did not think so at the time.

I enjoyed playing rugby league which is such a splendid game, I am pleased to have been associated with such a fine club, and with so many of its players and supporters. I am also delighted to have had this opportunity of thanking the club and its supporters for the kindness shown to me over the years.

We are now in a period of change, and it is a whole new ball game for others to write about. I wish the club growth and success in the future which surely can be and must be bright and successful.

AS WE fast approach the climax to what has been an excellent season in the Northern Ford Premiership, thoughts are already starting to turn to next season. However, the nightmare at Chorley seems to go from bad to worse for Lancashire Lynx. Having conceded more than a thousand points already this season, serious questions have been raised as to whether they will be with us for much longer. Somewhat surprisingly, however, there are positive noises emanating from the ironically named Victory Park. Well let's look on the bright side, it couldn't get much worse. So, happily, it appears that we aren't about to lose any clubs from the bottom of the NFP ladder and, all being well, should actually add to our numbers next season.

This week has seen both Bramley and Gateshead visiting the Houses of Parliament following an invite from the All Parliamentary Group of RLMPs. Both clubs have been working extremely hard since their untimely exclusion from the professional ranks last term. Indeed, Gateshead have already submitted their application for entry to the Premiership and I understand that Bramley are

due to submit their bid in just two days time.

Both clubs have attempted to keep a high profile throughout this season and have received fantastic encouragement from true Rugby League folk everywhere. Indeed, I have been reliably informed that vocal support for Bramley was evident from both Featherstone and Dewsbury fans during their recent clash at the Ram Stadium. Many true RL fans have also bought shares in Bramley – real evidence that the RL community can look after its own when needs be. With business plans formulated, marketing strategies poised and major sponsors at the ready, let's hope that we are soon welcoming both of these clubs back into the family.

At the other end of the spectrum is the prospect of promotion to Super League (he said with tongue firmly in cheek). Keighley coach, Karl Harrison has recently stated that the Cougars would not apply for a Super League place should they eventually win the NFP Grand Final this year. He feels that the finances need to be sorted before the club can commit to what could prove to be a very costly venture. Its a refreshing change to hear a coach talk so realistically but raises the question of what Oldham would do in a similar situation. Its not unfeasible that, one on one in the play offs, we could go all the way this year and if that happens is it really in our interests at such an early stage in the clubs development to apply for Super League ? Indeed, would Boundary Park or any of the top eight grounds now meet Super League's minimum ground criteria? Widnes of course, with the AutoQuest Stadium, are the exception but are by no means the strongest side in the NFP this year and in my opinion are unlikely to go all the way.

So the promotion verdict – the Anfield Giants to be sheltered behind the firmly closed trap door of Super League yet again and whilst the exclusive world of Super League seems to get more distant by the minute, the Northern

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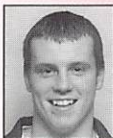

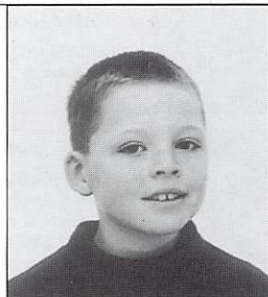

ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO MAY 29TH YESTERYEAR.

IT WAS on this day in 1965, Saturday 29th May, that the Roughyeds paid tribute to Vin Nestor, a talented inside back who made 232 appearances for Oldham between 1955 and 1965. His benefit match that day saw Oldham take on a team of former Oldham players with Oldham Present beating Oldham Past by 47 points to 32.

A player who had a much shorter spell at Oldham was back-row forward Doug Phillips who was signed from Swansea RUFC. He made just 18 appearances for the Roughyeds between February 1945 and December 1946.

Despite his inexperience in the league code, Phillips toured Australasia with the British Lions in 1946 and during that tour, on Wednesday 29th May, he appeared at loose-forward in the Great Britain team which defeated the Canberra district team 45-12. Phillips, who later moved to Belle Vue Rangers and toured again in 1950, died earlier this month aged 80 years.

In 1985, Premiership winners St. Helens undertook a four match tour of New Zealand. On Wednesday 29th May 1985 they met Waikato at Huntly where Saints were beaten 34-24. The fifth minute dismissal of Roy Haggarty for a high tackle did not help Saints who included a young Paul Round in their line up. He scored one of the Saints tries. Round, of course, later played for both Oldham clubs. Also included in the St. Helens party for that tour was Gary Ainsworth, still playing and enjoying his rugby up at Saddleworth.

Saddleworth Rangers enjoyed a comfortable victory nine years ago, on

Wednesday 29th May 1991. That day they defeated Wigan St. Patricks 38-18 at Shaw Hall Bank Road. They scored seven tries through Tony Hurst (2), Gary Dobbs, John Fleming, Paul Garrett, Alan Dalton and Andy McKeown. Graham Schofield landed five goals.

Two years ago Rangers entered two teams in the Oldham Championships, their first team and their under 18s. It is an indication of the strength in depth at Saddleworth that both teams reached the final and on Friday 29th May 1998 Rangers first team won the trophy with a 36-8 victory over the under 18s.

The 1977 World Championship competition was staged in Australia and New Zealand with the opening match, on Sunday 29th May, involving those two nations who met in Auckland. Eventual Champions Australia won that opening fixture, beating New Zealand 27-12.

In late May 1949, a British Empire XIII travelled to France where they met the French national team and then a Pyrenees outfit on Sunday 29th May. The Empire team, full of Antipodean stars, lost to France but then proved too strong for the Pyrenees selection whom they beat 38-12. Australian centre Pat Devery (Huddersfield) crossed for a hattrick of tries in that match.

In 1965 Rochdale Hornets made a short tour of France, unfortunately losing all three matches. The tour opened in Carcassonne on Saturday 29th May when the home side defeated Hornets by 30 points to ten.

Finally it was on Friday 29th May 1998 that Bramley met York in a vital Second Division match at Headingley. Dave Gibbons was at stand off for Bramley that evening and also included in the Bramley line up were a couple of controversial loan signings from Leeds, winger Leroy Rivett and prop-forward Barrie McDermott. Both were try scorers in an entertaining game which Bramley won 36-14. Incidentally, the officials at that match were all from Oldham, referee Ian Smith and touch judges Paul Hewitt and Tony Martin.

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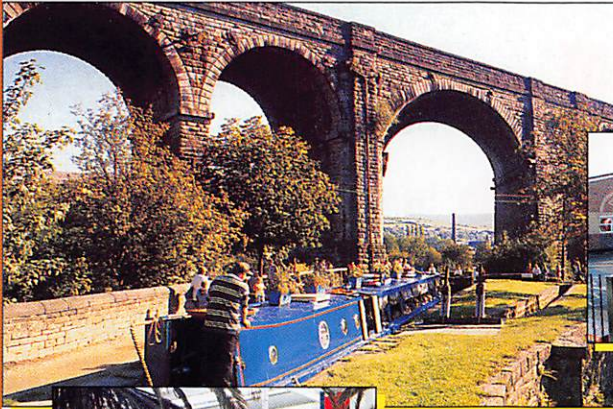
