

YOU'VE read the rest: now read the best. Not the Club's view, not a journalist's view, but a fan's view.

Last week Featherstone Rovers came to Spotland as the NFP Team of the Month for June after seven straight wins and played no attacking football worth talking about, the only team who have not tried to do so. Even Lancashire Lynx, both home and away, tried to play some football. What exactly Featherstone's game plan was is beyond me: as they say they were lucky to get nil. And as for intimidation four penalties for high shots in nine minutes plus Steve Molloy in the sin bin does rather suggest that Featherstone's approach was, well, physical. Add a referee apparently unable to 'read' the game and the seeds were sown for confrontation which – surprise, surprise – came just before half-time. And guess what, an **Oldham** player cops the big red one for what

... retaliation? Pathetic. And did a man advantage for the whole of the second half inspire Featherstone to play? Sorry, no! Which leads me to an interesting conclusion. Remember this was the team that stuffed Oldham for 66 points on their own ground, yet they played as though frightened to death of the Roughyeds. So did they actually want to win at Spotland? Or was the object of the exercise actually to finish fifth, get a home tie with Widnes which they might win before a decent home crowd and then see what happens next? Because the alternative was a trip to Keighley. where they might get mauled, before facing a possible home tie against . . . you got it, Oldham. Evidence? Not easy, but what do you make of these three Peter Roe statements?

- "The play-off system is a farce, but at least it's a home game, which we possibly wouldn't have had if we had finished third."
- "There's no doubt we have overachieved this season." [What on earth is that supposed to mean?]; and
- "I've always said a dark horse could go all the way and I really think Oldham can be that surprise package."

Now I am not suggesting that Featherstone deliberately threw the match: they defended and tackled too fiercely for that. And I do not wish to take anything away from Oldham's performance which Christopher Hamilton, quite rightly, described as 'awesome'. But the absence of Peter Roe from the touchline at any stage (a rarity) does suggest that finishing fifth suits Rovers just fine.

BEFORE closing what is likely to be the last column for this season, I would like once again to put on record my thanks to all our regular writers who contribute to making this programme the quality publication I believe it to be. Thanks therefore to Don Yates, Michael Turner, Simon Winnard, Dave Roberts and Brian Walker. Also to Debra Rafferty for the Junior Roughyeds' column and, of course, to Christopher Hamilton, Mike Ford, Haydn Walker, Scott Claber and recently, to Mark Knight. In addition the Oldham Evening Chronicle and League Express have co-operated magnificently with the photography. And finally thanks also to our printers, Pennine Printing Services Limited, whose patience we sometimes sorely test, but who always come up trumps.

ROGER

COLIN Hutton will be consumed by nostalgia at Spotland today. Oldham v Hull KR in a sudden death knock-out....what memories that will stir for one of rugby league's most respected elder statesmen.

At the age of 74 Colin can truly say that, in terms of his chosen sport, he has seen and done it all.

Oddly enough, many of the key moments of his life and his rugby career have involved matches against Oldham.

Todya's clash of the Roughyeds and the Red, Red Robins of East Hull in the elmination semifinals of the Northern Ford Premiership top-eight play-off will be no exception.

But back to the start or, to be more precise, to 1957 and the Rugby League championship final at Odsal between Oldham and Hull.

A young Colin was then a loyalist of West Hull. He didn't sport red and white, but the black and white of the men from the Boulevard. he was the Hull FC full-back.

It was May 18, 1957 and Oldham won the championship for the first time since 1911.

The teams lined up like this: OLDHAM: Ganley; Cracknell, Davies, Ayres, Etty; Daley, Pitchford; Jackson, Keith, Vines, Little, Winslade, Turner,

HULL: Hutton; Cowan, Dannatt, Turner, Watts; Moat, Finn; Scott, Harris, J. Drake, Sykes, W. Drake, Whiteley.

Oldham won 15-14 in front of a 62,217 crowd, but Colin missed a goal in the last few minutes otherwise the title would have gone to Humberside.

Some seven years later Colin was coach of the Hull KR side which met Oldham in one of the most controversial Challenge Cup semi-finals of all time.

Len McIntyre's late drop goal earned Oldham a replay

after a 5-5 draw at Headingley. At Swinton on the following Wednesday night Oldham went in front in extra time from a Geoff Robinson try but referee Dennis Davies abandoned the tie for bad light.

Thus robbed, Oldham never recovered and lost 12-2 at Fartown in the second replay, much to the delight of a relieved Colin Hutton, who took his team to Wembley where they were beaten by Widnes.

To this day, Colin is convinced Oldham would have gone to Wembley but for the decision to call off the tie in the first replay.

"We had 'gone'" recalled Colin this week. "We became the only side ever to lose a semifinal and still go on to Wembley. There would have been no way back for us once Robinson scored in the corner.

By the time 1990 came round Colin had left the dressing room behind, waved farewell to the coach's dug-out and was firmly established 'upstairs' as chairman of the Rovers club.

On May 13, 1990 Oldham beat the Robins 30-29 at Old Trafford in one of the most dramatic Second Division Premiership finals of all time.

Ford and Henderson, coach and assistant coach respectively of today's Oldham team, were among the try scorers in a brilliant match that had everything.

If today's game is half as good it will be a fitting tribute to everything Colin Hutton has done for rugby league in Hull spanning nearly half a century.

LIVING HISTORY

From the Pen of Michael Turner

RUGBY LEAGUE MILESTONES - A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

1990 - 2000

THE 1990s started where the '80s had left off in so much as Wigan swept all before them in their relentless quest for honours. In the entire history of Rugby League no one club has ever had such a stranglehold on the game's silverware and even in today's shrinking level of club compatibility, it seems unlikely such domination will ever be seen again.

In 1991-92 Division Two was contested by just eight clubs playing each other four times. The reasoning behind this system was sound enough with more intense games being played out by teams with comparable ability to prepare them for a higher level of competition, rather than the tight match one week - cricket score the next syndrome, which was a regular occurrence in the old second division. The drawback of course was the monotony of the fixture list, which led to the demise of the idea after two seasons.

Going into the last month of the 1994-95 season, the whole game of Rugby League and everyone associated with it, had been shellshocked by the announcement that many clubs would have to merge before going on to compete in a Summer based, 'Super League' competition backed by the millions of media mogul Rupert Murdoch. Oldham & Salford / Castleford, Featherstone & Wakefield / Widnes & Warrington / Bradford & Halifax / Hull & Hull KR, all these and more, famous clubs would seemingly disappear almost overnight.

Whether the Rugby League administrators ever seriously thought that this steam-roller tactic would work, is open to question, but the response from the fans was swift and loud. NO

MERGERS.

In order to bring about the transition to summer rugby, a shortened 1995-96 'Centenary Season' was organised, in which no clubs would

be promoted or relegated. This left the Rugby League with something of a meaningless competition, just when a high profile celebration of 100 years of the 'greatest game' was what the supporters expected and deserved.

In 1996 Salford ended Wigan's Challenge Cup run. St Helens won the cup but there was some consolation for beaten finalists Bradford, now the 'Bulls', in so much as Robbie Paul became the first player to score a hat trick in the Wembley final. In 1997. The World Club Championship was introduced and not surprisingly the British clubs were well and truly hammered by the opposition from down under, especially eventual winners Brisbane Broncos.

It was at this time that the RL authorities completely lost their way and betrayed their heritage, with vast amounts of money being pumped into the Paris, London and Gateshead clubs, while the likes of Leigh, Widnes, Featherstone, Workington and Hunslet, to name but a few from the game's heartland, were left to struggle.

THE UNDER ACHIEVERS BARROW BORDER RAIDERS

Given their fantastic home record, with only Dewsbury and Workington able to win at Craven Park, the Raiders should really have made the 8. Travelling proved a major problem with away points gathered only at Lancashire and Workington. **Top players:** DARREN HOLT AND GEOFF LUXON.

BATLEY BULLDOGS

A real no-no of a season for the Bulldogs whose form at Mount Pleasant was dismal. When I saw them I thought Batley would have done better to play some football instead of trying to rough up their opponents. **Top players:** RICHARD PRICE, ROGER SIMPSON.

HUNSLET HAWKS

The refusal of Super League to take the Hawks was the kiss of death. A mass exodus of players followed and results went into freefall. Financial peril looms and it really makes you wonder about R.L. priorites when you get stabbed in the back like this. But then we know all about that at Oldham! **Top players:** ALL LEFT

ROCHDALE HORNETS

I won't say they'll regret losing Steve Linnane at Spotland because in my view his team was terribly lacking in discipline and it cost them dear. At times they could mix it with the best, but their record shows only one big scalp, Featherstone at home. **Top players:** DANE DORAHY, DANNY SCULTHORPE.

SWINTON LIONS

Peter Young chastised me at the start of the year for forecasting an indifferent year for the Lions. But my inconsistent' tag was proved right. Like Hornets they could claim only one big victory, against Leigh away: Top players: IAN WATSON, IAN PICKAVANCE.

WIDNES VIKINGS

Although they finished in the 8 Widnes had high expectations of being at or near the top and have invested heavily to this end. They could not live up to their billing and were unable to topple any of their top rivals when it mattered, a 19-18 win over Doncaster excepted. **Top players:** PHIL CANTILLON, PAUL MANSSON.

THE ACHIEVERS DONCASTER DRAGONS

A heavy investment in new players meant the Dragons were always likely to be serious contenders, but even quality players have to be coached and blended into a good team, something lan St. John Ellis has managed to do. No club managed a victory in the Belle Vue 'House of Pain', but away from home only a 30-27 win at Keighley toppled a top side. **Top players:** CRAIG WESTON, PETER EDWARDS.

FEATHERSTONE ROVERS

A lot of old hands were dispensed with and young players were given their head. And what a successful formula that was under the astute guidance of one of the best coaches around, Peter Roe. **Top players:** JAMIE ROONEY, DANNY EVANS

KEIGHLEY COUGARS

Like Peter Roe, Karl Harrison had a big rebuilding job on his hands but at least he started with a clutch of experienced, quality players from whom he has been able to extract the best. **Top players:** MARTIN WOOD, NATHAN ANTONIK.

OLDHAM ROUGHYEDS

New coach, new team and a big overall improvement in League position. In my view Oldham therefore are THE team of the season. Except, of course, everyone's expectations have been raised to the point where play-off success in now going to determine the final verdict. **Top players:** SHAYNE MCMENEMY, JOHN HOUGH.

SHEFFIELD EAGLES

The Eagles started where Oldham started nearly three years ago and Mark Aston's achievement is much to be admired, especially without the financial resources enjoyed by the rest. Their result of the season was a 26-24 win at Leigh. **Top players:** GAVIN BROWN, JEFF WITTENBERG.

AS EXPECTED DEWSBURY RAMS

It's a bit cheeky not to have the Rams in the Achievers category, but as a top side for four years and last season's beaten Grand Finalalists they were expected to be the team to beat and so it proved. Only Leigh won at Ram Stadium with away defeats at Doncaster, Hull K.R., Keighley and Leigh and a draw at Swinton. **Top players:** BARRY EATON, SEAN RICHARDSON.

HULL K.R.

The Robins Board and supporters no doubt had high hopes of their season but away from Humberside a dispassoniate view suggests that Rovers had too many problems to overcome to mount the kind of challenge they wanted. For the future a club no longer in administraion and with an outstanding crop of young players coming through has much to hope for.

Top players: MARK HEWITT, WHETU TAEWA

LANCASHIRE LYNX

I forcast Lynx to finish bottom and they did not disappoint. Quite frankly how they manage to surivie is amazing, but enthusiastic Chairman Harry Morris says the club is not in debt and Preston North End will keep backing them as long as they break even.

Top players: They all left!

LEIGH CENTURIONS

At the start of the season Leigh were my personal tip to finish top of the League, but then I hadn't reckoned on Ian Millward going to St. Helens. Despite the setback Leigh continuted to play well and finished in the top 4. **Top players:** STUART DONLAN, DAVE WHITTLE.

WHITEHAVEN WARRIORS

Like Barrow the Warriors don't travel well and they even lost to all the top teams at home (Oldham excepted). I shudder to think how they'll go on without the experience of Kevin Tamati to guide them. **Top players:** AARON LESTER, DAVID FATIALOFA.

YORK WASPS

...HULL KINGSTON ROVERS

ONE of the great names of Rugby League and a major force in the game in the '80s, Hull Kingston Rovers have recently travelled a very rocky road. Now located at a new stadium and out of administration Rovers can look forward to a better future. No doubt the Club would have wished to finish higher in the League than seventh, but all things considered they have enjoyed a decent season.

Coach of the Robins is the highly respected Dave Harrison and it is good to see a Board back their man despite the odd disappointment. A former Rugby Union player at Cowley G.S. and Waterloo and with representative honours for Lancashire and the North, Harrison turned to R.L. with St. Helens. After four years at Knowsley Road he transferred to Hull KR playing three seasons before starting coaching as assistant at Scarborough Pirates (remember them?). Returned to Rovers in 1997.

After Bob Everitt unfortunately broke his leg last week, today's fullback is likely to be MARK BLANCHARD who made a try-scoring debut against

Oldham last year.

Wingman JON WRAY played RU for Morley and England Colts and Under 21's before taking the professional ticket with Castleford. Signed for the Robins from Wakefield in 1998. Always a potential try-scorer with plenty of pace.

At centre the regular selections are ROB NOLAN and WHETU TAEWA. Nolan is big and strong and spent 10 years over the river at Hull FC. Vastly experienced and dangerous. Taewa meanwhile has played for Auckland Warriors and North Queensland Cowboys and has represented native his New Zealand. Came to England to play for Sheffield Eagles, with

whom he won a Challenge Cup Winners Medal. A very accomplished and elusive player.

Left-wing GAVIN MALLOY is big and strong and is a product of the Robins' exceptionally strong Academy set-up.

Stand-off LEROY JOE is a New Zealand Maori international who played for Otahuhu and Counties Manukau before signing for North Queensland

Cowboys. Kevin Tamati signed him up for Whitehaven where he played a season at scrumhalf before joining Rovers for 2000.

Scrum-half will be MARK HEWITT. Leading points scorer in Hull Sharks' 1997 promotion campaign, Hewitt subsequently went to Widnes Vikings for two seasons. The Vikings have proved singularly unable to replace him following his return to Humberside with the Robins this year. An outstanding goalkicker to whom it is wise not to provide too many chances.

Last week Rovers' longest serving player PAUL FLETCHER played at prop, though more normally associated with second-row. Enjoyed a testimonial last year and is one of the real stalwarts of the game. Bears the nickname 'Psycho'.

Hooker MIKE DIXON, a lively, eye-catching performer is another ex-Hull FC man. A former Gt Britain Under 21 international he takes a lot of policing around play-the-ball.

At 10 will be RICHARD WILSON (no, not that one!), a big, robust chap sure to be in the thick of the action.

With Andy Smith having suffered cartilage damage the likely second-row is JIM LEATHAM and DEAN ANDREWS. Leatham is a recent signing, having played in Hunslet's Grand Final winning side in 1999. However he is a native of Hull and started with Hull FC. Andrews is also a local lad, progressing through the ranks to claim a starting spot in the first team.




Mike Ford is a very wise man, he definitely won't get carried away so we won't be making any predictions, we will just be working hard.



. BARLA'S INTERNATIONAL CHALLENGE

IN FOUR months time the BARLA national team will be involved in the Emerging Nations Championship, a competition which runs alongside, and promises to be just as interesting as, the Lincoln Financial Group World Championship Competition. Indeed, the Emerging Nations should be more exciting than the major competition because few people would bet against Australia lifting the World title which they have held ever since 1975. Of the six countries involved in the Emerging Nations tournament, at least three have realistic chances of lifting the trophy - BARLA. Morocco and Italy. One of the other three. Japan, Canada or United States could spring a surprise so the eight day competition, consisting of nine matches, promises to produce some thrilling rugby.

The composition of the BARLA national side has been the subject of some controversy in recent months. During the past few years BARLA have maintained that selection for the national team must be earned via county selection and, before that, selection in the local team for the Inter-town knock-out Cup Competition. However, those criteria have been sidestepped in the past and I expect them to be sidestepped again this year. During the season just past, three local players have been involved in the Amateur County Championship, centre Stuart Fraser (Saddleworth Rangers) and props Lee Fletcher (Saddleworth Rangers and Jason Akeroyd (St. Annes). Nevertheless, it would be no surprise to me if one or two other local players were included despite their lack of recent representative recognition. Gareth 'Spike' Davies has had a tremendous season at Saddleworth whether turning out at hooker or full back whilst St. Annes have several candidates. Full back Chris Wright, utility player John Brierley and winger Graeme Sykes are just three who spring to mind. At Waterhead loose-forward Peter 'Percy' Pearson would be a strong candidate and if BARLA decide to select players who have returned to the amateur game after brief professional contracts then the list of local candidates would be a lengthy

BARLA have been included in the group with Morocco and Japan. Their first match is against Morocco and takes place at Post Office Road, Featherstone on Monday evening 13th November. Four days later, on Friday evening, 17th November BARLA take on Japan

at the Recreation Ground, Whitehaven. Should BARLA be successful in those matches, and I am confident that they will win both, then they will meet the winners of the other group in the final. That final takes place here at Spotland, Rochdale on Monday 20th November, kick off 7.30pm. Italy are firm favourites to win their group which includes Canada and United States. Should the Emerging Nations final throw together BARLA and Italy then it certainly

would be a match not to be missed. The Italian squad consists mainly of players connected with Australian clubs but is also likely to include Super League stars Greg Florimo (Halifax), Carlo Napolitano (Salford) and London Broncos' Frank Napoli.

The tournament will be a severe test for the BARLA boys, especially if, as expected, they meet Italy in the final. But it is a challenge they will be eager to meet. Hopefully, one or two local lads will be involved to add further interest to what already promises to be a tremendous competition.

XTHE RECENT exodus of top Australian players has caused dismay in the NRL and provoked widespread media interest both here and down under. This has prompted a very public reaction from both Maurice Lindsay and Gary Hetherington. Whilst Hetherington was simply happy to call NRL officials whinging Aussies, Lindsay has seen fit to defend his actions.

Australian officials have publicly stated that they can't compete with the kind of money being thrown at their stars by English clubs. Lindsay has touted these high profile signings as being in the best interests of the English game. He has stated that there isn't any comparable British talent around and to a large extent he's right. However, could that be because our young talent here is being stifled by an overload of overseas imports? Hardly rocket science Maurice.

What is disturbing to hear is that the Australians cannot compete financially with the offers from British clubs. This is despite their game attracting massive crowds, far more income and generating massive sponsorship compared to ours. The obvious answer to this puzzle is that the money generated down under is ploughed back into development of the sport at grass roots level. The Sky television deal presented itself as an ideal opportunity to follow that lead and build a successful future.

However, there is simply no evidence that News Corporation funding is filtering its way down through the system to youth development in this country. That's a crying shame. A vast amount of this money is simply being used to line overseas players' pockets, most of whom, to put it politely, are past their best. Far from wanting to tar all of these players with the same brush, some are still great players and it will be good to see them in action, but not at the expense of our prospective stars of tomorrow.

Of course, I understand why clubs are desperate to maintain their Super League status. These are the very same clubs who confined the News Corporation funding to that

league. Many feel that their only short term option is to look for ready made talent elsewhere. However, I feel that a long term perspective needs to be taken up by the games governing bodies.

Home grown talent is bound to suffer if there is a flood of overseas players taking up first team places on big contracts.it has to. We have placed the future of our game in the hands of the likes of Lindsay, Hetherington and Caisley and I fear that they have badly let us down. Some might even say that we are in danger of becoming something akin to an Antipodean Nursing Home League. These people in charge of our game will be the very same people who will rally round forming working parties to investigate our continued failure to compete at International level in the not too distant future and when they frantically search for the cause, they need look no further than their own doorstep.

Whilst causing short term irritation to the NRL, the departure of established stars will of course result in the bright young talent being offered greater opportunity to progress. This being the case, I strongly suspect that their game will actually benefit and we will suffer the consequences yet again.

On a brighter note the recent suggestions for restructuring the points scoring system in Super League introduced a delightful element of comedy to the season. Suggested by the Halifax Chief Executive, presumably this is a desperate attempt to give the clubs outside the top half of Super League something to actually play for. Perhaps points should be awarded for the nicest kit, how many consecutive Australian coaches you can employ and how many other teams you can swallow up to avoid relegation despite finishing bottom of the league. Whilst Super League goes from the sublime to the ridiculous, the game outside Super League looks forward to welcoming Bramley and Gateshead back next season. After Sheffield's survival this season it will be great to welcome them back to the NFP family.



'THE DON'



On this Day Don Yates looks back to July 9th yesteryear

THIS AFTERNOON Oldham begin their play-off campaign with high hopes of reaching Gigg Lane, lifting the Northern Ford Premiership and then posting a firm bid for inclusion into Super League. Their opponents are another club aiming to regain former glories, for it was not too long ago that Hull Kingston Rovers were a team to be feared and one which included several star names.

Hull Kingston Rovers' players were prominent on this day in 1983, Saturday 9th July, in a sensational test match which was staged at Lang Park, Brisbane. Australia met New Zealand that day hoping to extend a 16 test winning sequence which included five victories over the Kiwis, However, New Zealand sprang a major surprise by defeating the all conquering Kangaroos 19-12. Four Hull Kingston Rovers players of that era were involved in that match. Kerry Boustead, who played for the Robins in 1986-87, was on the wing for Australia, whilst stand-off Gordon Smith, loose-forward Gary Prohm and prop Mark Broadhurst, all Championship winners with Rovers in 1984, were included in the Kiwi line-up. The architect of the New Zealand victory, though, was full back Nick Wright, a former Oldham player, whose superb kicking game was a feature of the match whilst his three placed goals and one dropped goal proved to be decisive scores.

Five years previously, on Sunday 9th July 1978, New Zealand had a less successful day during another tour of Australia. The Kiwis met North Queensland in Townsville that afternoon when they fell to a disappointing 27-20 defeat. Versatile Gary Prohm was in the Kiwi secondrow for that match but the star of the show was Kerry Boustead who scored two tries for the home side.

It was on this day in 1995, Sunday 9th July, that the BARLA under-18 team met the Junior Kiwis at Greymouth. The New Zealand juniors proved much too good for our youngsters that afternoon and they hammered us 52-10. There was one Humberside player in the British line-up, substitute forward David Holdstock (West Hull), who scored a try, whilst the only Oldham representative with the tourists was a member of the medical staff, Dr David Atherton who was involved with Higginshaw for many years.

Three years ago, on Wednesday 9th July 1997, Scotland met France at Firhill Park, Glasgow. Scotland did enough to win that evening but a late, disputed French try enabled the visitors to win 22-20. A try scorer for the Scots in the match was Bradford winger Gary Christie who began his professional career with the Roughyeds. Also included in the Scotland line-up was substitute Mike Dixon, a diminutive but lively hooker who was then with Hull but who has since crossed the city to team up with the Robins.

In 1988 Great Britain undertook a less than successful tour 'down under'. Nevertheless the trip did leave one outstanding memory and that occurred on Saturday 9th July when the Lions met Australia at Sydney Football Stadium in a World Cup rated test match. Most spectators expected

the match to follow the pattern of the first two tests and end in a Kangaroo victory. The Lions has not won a test in Australia for 14 years but, prompted by scrum-half Andv Gregory (Wigan) they won convincingly 26-12. Oldham prop Hugh Waddell was included in the British pack whilst one of the Australian substitutes was Bob Lindner. destined to have a spell as player-coach with the Roughyeds.


