Oldham have had a great season starting with a new coach and a lot of new players - the season has got better and better. After a great win at Doncaster last week their confidence must be sky high.

MIKE FORD FROM PIE EATER TO ROUGHYEDS

This evening we welcome Mike Ford and his Oldham charges to Hilton Park for this NFP Elimination Semi-Final.

Mike is one of the most recognisable figures in the NFP after a great playing career with Wigan, Leigh, Oldham, Castleford (in two spells), Warrington, Wakefield and Bramley in this country, and a spell with Australian expansion side South Queensland Crushers.

His career has taken him to the pinnacle of success and the depths of despair, but through it all, Ford has been a focused, determined and talented player. Although almost 35, Ford is still proving a dangerous and clever player at NFP level, and is a major source of inspiration to his team. He is in the second year of a promising coaching career and has shown an eye for unearthing talent and moulding teams together at little cost.

Mike Ford has pushed the boundaries back as a coach, forging links with the student game that has led players like Mark Sibson trying their hand at the professional game. An Oldham lad, Ford has never been scared to accept new challenges. After helping Wigan to a Challenge Cup victory over Hull in 1985, Ford joined Leigh and played 27 times for the club before revealing his real dream, to lead Oldham at Wembley!

A childhood dream was realised for Ford when he moved to the Watersheddings and helped Oldham regain First Division status and an end of season Premiership before a big money move to Castleford. Arguably, Ford spent the best years of his playing career with the Tigers, guiding them to a Challenge Cup Final appearance and securing the Regal Trophy by virtue of an amazing 33-2 success over a Wigan team that rarely lost. With Ford at the top of his game, Under-21 and Colts honours were followed by two appearances for the RFL Great Britain side in 1993.

From Weldon Road, Mike moved to Brisbane to link up with former mentor Darryl Van DeVelde at new team South Queensland Crushers.

Unfortunately, Mike failed to settle on the Queensland coast and after just 15 games with the

Crushers, Ford made a return to the British game with a short and fruitless spell at Warrington.

Mike's career at the top level looked to be finished when he joined Wakefield but after just 24 games with Trinity, along came Stuart Raper and Castleford to offer the scrum-half another chance. Ford grabbed his opportunity with both hands and helped steer the Tigers away from the foot of the Super League table. Ford appeared in 22 of Castleford's 30 games and also played 25 games for the Tigers in 1998, with eleven of those appearances coming from the bench.

Sensing the time was right, Ford decided to move into coaching. He was successful with his application at Bramley and took the player-coach reigns. In his first season Bramley achieved a credible 11th position with 11 wins and a draw from 28 League games. Ford played in all 29 of his team's fixtures, scoring three tries and two drop goals and was instrumental in persuading players like Garry Schofield and Richard Russel to end their careers with the unfashionable Leeds Club.

Unfortunately, Bramley slid into oblivion and Ford moved on to coach his hometown club. The season, Oldham have done well with 19 wins and a draw from 28 matches. With the Ford factor behind them the Roughyeds are a team on the rise.

JASON CLEGG

Formerly a Bradford Bull this prop had a barnstorming season for the Roughyeds last year. 'Cleggy' is becoming a favourite with the Oldham spectators and is a member of a very consistent front row.

MIKE FORD

A scrum-half who has been making the right sort of headlines all his sporting life. Played for Wigan at Wembley when only 19. Also starred for Leigh, Oldham, Castleford, Warrington, Wakefield and South Queensland Crushers. Toured Down Under with Great Britain in 1988. Coached Bramley to mid-table respectability in 1999 before landing the Oldham job - at the third attempt - to fulfil a sporting ambition.

ANTHONY GIBBONS

Signed with his twin brother, David, from Bramley this close season. Anthony can play anywhere in the backs but will be hoping to make the centre spot his own.

DAVID GIBBONS

Signed with his twin Anthony from Bramley. Can play anywhere in the backs but will be hoping to impress at stand off. David is very talented and began his career at Leeds.

DANNY GUEST

This 22 year old, 18 stone, prop was an up-andcoming youngster with the Bears. He played for the Roughyeds in the new club's first ever and historic game at Rochdale on January 1, 1998 but then joined Keighley on a round-robin return to the Roughyeds via Lancashire Lynx.

JOEY HAYES

A young winger who has crammed a lot into his relatively short spell as a pro. Made his name with St Helens, for whom he played in a Regal Trophy final and a Super League Premiership final to earn a place on the Great Britain tour squad which went to New Zealand, Fiji, and Papua New Guinea in 1996. Suffered a setback with a serious knee injury, but fought back to play 11 Super League games with Salford Reds in 1999.

CHRIS HOLLAND

Aged 21 and a product of the youth game in Wigan, Chris has played for England and Great Britain Students and took the man-of-the-match award in England's defeat by New Zealand at Hull in the last World Cup. Equally at home at centre or in the back row.

JOHN HOUGH

John will go down in the 'new' clubs history books as the first player to officially sign for the Roughyeds. A bright future is predicted for the ex-Warrington hooker who is renowned for his hard work and sportsmanship. Has been consistently outstanding for the Roughyeds and is one of the divisions form hookers.

KEVIN MANNION

22 year old Kevin is a ball playing loose forward who made his senior debut with Rochdale Hornets when only 16. Played for England and GB students, for whom he has toured Australia and played in France. Has recently returned from a knee injury and has been outstanding with his strong running out wide catching the eye.

JOE MCNICHOLAS

This young winger is one of the most exciting prospects in the new First Division.Having turned down an offer from Bradford Bulls, Joe was unfortunate to miss most of '98 after breaking his leg in the early season. Rochdale born, he is armed with pace and a great side step.

SHAYNE MCMENEMY

Recent recruit to the club replacing the injured Tom O'Reilly. Began the season at Rochdale Hornets weere he caught the eye of Mike Ford. Hard working second row forward this Austrlian made his debut 48 hours after arriving from Sydney. Has surely been the NFP signing of the season with the tremendous impact he has made with the Roughyeds. Shayne has never shown anything less than 100% commitment and his strong tackling has been a revelation.

ANDY PROCTOR

Andy has returned to the club to play for Mike Ford, who was his coach last season at Bramley. Procky can play at prop or in the back row and with his professional attitude to training will be a valuable addition to this season's team.

PAT RICH

Signed from Keighley Cougars in the close season. Pat is a promising young centre who played for England in the recent Student's World Cup. He has the drive, ambition and ability to have a really big season.

WES ROGERS

Wes signed from Swinton Lions in the close season. Wes is very pleased to have signed for

his home team, not least because his family are all fanatics! Can play anywhere in the forwards and is major boost to the Roughyeds pack.

MARK SIBSON

Major pre-season signing for the Roughyeds. A lot is expected from this goal kicking full-back. Although he played 2 games for Huddersfield Giants in the Super League last season most of his performances were for Bramley.

IAN SINFIELD

Local lad, lan signed for and played Super League rugby with Salford before joining Roughyeds in 1998. Had a brief stint in France in the early part of 1999 before returning to the club, finishing the season and re-signing for 2000. A back row for and who tackles hard, run strongly and uses the ball intelligently wide cut.

WARREN BARROW

Signed recently from St Helens Alliance side making his debut at Leigh on the wing. A regular try scorer whilst at Saints he can play either on the wing or at centre. A strong, abrasive runner who likes to help out his forwards.

PHIL FARRELL

Recently signed for the club after a successful loan period. Hard working back row forward who has the right pedigree, as he is the younger brother of Wigan and GB Captain Andy Farrell. Scored a memorable individual try in the defeat of Leigh Centurions and his work rate and commitment have made him a favourite with the fans.

NEIL RODEN



Action Replay...

LEIGH CENTURIONS 38 DEWSBURY RAMS 16 2/7/00

THE disappointment of losing out on Super League status was pushed on to the backburner as Leigh's timely win set up another crunch clash between the two sides in the opening play-off round next week.

The Centurions, the only team to have inflicted defeat on the Rams on their home ground, will have the upper hand after this comfortable win over the league champions.

Leigh coach Paul Terzis was quick to accept that fact. "Individually we were motivated this week and again today was the fruition of a lot of hard work," he said. "We have a psychological edge over them and it will be a great game. We are the only side to have beaten Dewsbury twice this season. We have had losses and know how to bounce back from them. I don't know if they can. Our ball movement in attack came up trumps. We possibly wanted it more today than Dewsbury, maybe they had a bit of complacency. We now want three more wins and we have won the Premiership." Terzis praised Liam Bretherton, playing his first game at stand-off since moving on loan from Wigan. "Bretherton is a class act and he showed it out there today. He gives us more options." The coach said that he thought the bad news over Super League status did not affect the players' performance. "The Super League decision is outside the players' control. We just go out and perform. If a decision comes that Leigh deserve the chance to be reinstated then well and good.

"The RL need to start thinking logically instead of illogically. They need promotion and relegation to increase crowds and to keep the supporters' dreams alive."

Rams coach Neil Kelly was looking forwards as well. "We have expected to play them and it all points to being a great game next week," he remarked. "It probably gives Leigh a bit of an edge but we have to believe that after winning the league we can beat anyone on our day. It is always a tough place to come and get a result and they are now the only side to have done the double over us. I am disappointed overall. We allowed Leigh to make too much headway up the middle and that pulls in defenders from out wide and they hit us there. We can play a lot better. The players are disappointed that some of our fellow clubs voted against us. But as long as our promotion bid is on the table we have hope. The vote in the first place was totally irrelevant as I don't know of any other club who has to ask where they can play."

It was the visitors who started the better and two early tries against sloppy Leigh tackling put them in the driving seat before the Centurions got their act together.

The Rams scored their first try inside three minutes when the ball was whipped along the line and Dan Potter shook off three tacklers before diving over.

They did not maintain the lead for long as a spilled ball near their own line was quickly pounced on by the Centurions and centre Paul Anderson blasted his way over for his 14th try of the season.

But it was still Dewsbury who looked the more dangerous and breached the Leigh defence again in the 17th minute when the influential Barry Eaton was put in the clear by Mark Cain and then converted his own try.

Leigh bounced back with a sparkling try in the 23rd minute when Adam Bristow began a move on the half-way line. He burst through the defence before flicking a pass over his shoulder for Simon Baldwin, who laid it off to Stuart Donlan, who won a spectacular race for the line. Bretherton goaled.

The home side produced a timely score just before the break with another dazzling try when Aussie Bristow set up the try when he fed Bretherton who sent his halfback partner Kieron Purtill sprinting under the posts. Bretherton added another goal.

Leigh opened the second-half in style with a try within three minutes when Purtill cleverly turned the ball inside for Donlan to scamper over for his second touchdown and Bretherton added the touchline goal.

The Rams came storming back but Leigh's defence held firm for a series of tackles before finally wilting in the 59th minute when Eaton chipped ahead and Alex Godfrey dived on the ball and Eaton added the conversion.

But hopes of a Yorkshire comeback were soon dashed when Phil Kendrick topped a fine display with a superb individual effort, bursting through four tacklers to score.

Leigh put the game out of reach in the 70th minute when Radney Bowker raced through another gap and Bretherton goaled.

In the last minute Bretherton, relishing the stand-off role, took advantage of sloppy tackling to dart over and kicked the goal.

GAMEBREAKER: Phil Kendrick's powerful burst which put Leigh ten points clear in the 64th minute and ended the Rams' fightback.







DEWSBURY RAMS 12 LEIGH CENTURIONS 29 9/7/00

A typical Cup tie atmosphere, this crucial semi-final started with a firecracker explosion, when on 3 minutes, Rams lynchpin, half back Barry Eaton was cleaned out by a head high tackle after which Centurions second rower, Simon Baldwin, was sent off by top referee Russ Smith.

Eaton recovered to kick the ensuing penalty goal. The tough, uncompromising start continued, as tackles went in extra hard and only first class handling by Mr Smith eased the fire in the defences.

With the outstanding Adam Bristow leading the way, Leigh made light of being a man down and on 15 minutes a superb break by eventual man of the match, Liam Bretherton, covering fully 50 metres, saw swift handling between Bristow, the eye-catching Kieron Purtill and Andy Fairclough, to give strong running Phil Kendrick a chance to crash over for an unconverted try.

It was all Leigh now, but poor Dewsbury passing and handling did not help their cause. Bristow then was involved in two pieces of tremendous football that epitomised the Leigh spirit. Firstly, he kicked through, chased and caught Nathan Graham in his own in-goal area with a crunching tackle, then, two minutes later, on 24 minutes, Bristow fired out the sweetest of passes to lively centre, Fairclough who swept 40 metres and sent in the inside supporting Stuart Donlan for a copybook try converted by Bretherton.

A great run by Leigh wingman, Alan Cross ended when Bretherton kicked a neat penalty goal for a foul on Cross. The Rams appeared demoralised and Leigh made the game look so easy, on 31 minutes, as Mick Higham slipped through a raggy defence, passed inside to the ever supporting Purtill who, when challenged by Graham, sent Bretherton in under the sticks for a wonderful support try, the same player converted. With sub forward Tim Street rampant for Leigh, the Dewsbury defence was a shambles and Bretherton kicked a further penalty goal on 36 minutes and on 38 minutes rubbed in the first half drubbing by dropping a smart goal. The Rams had been given a harsh lesson in spirit, enthusiasm and support play.

Half Time 2-21.

Playing virtually the whole of the first half with 12 men, it was expected that Leigh would tire quickly but with Purtill in the van, and that jackin-the-box Bristow slipping out superb passes and knocking Dewsbury's runners sideways in his defence, Leigh continued to control this semi-final in confident mood.

On 51 minutes Paul Anderson gauged a grubber kick to perfection for Cross to dive over too far out for Bretherton to convert. Rams began to realise that Leigh were vulnerable wide out and after a bout of sustained pressure the 12 men of Leigh succumbed to a neat pass by the home side's outstanding forward, Daniel Frame, who hit wingman Richard Baker with a wide ball, to give him a walk-in on 55 minutes.

With the visitors now tiring badly the Rams, with Eaton rushing them on, hammered on the Leigh line and only a brave Donlan catch held the Rams at bay. Unbelievably, Leigh scored again when, whilst attempting to clear his own quarter, on 65 minutes, Alex Godfrey sliced a kick which stood up for Cross to collect and scamper over. Graham dropped a pass with a walk-in open and on 76 minutes, with the game already lost, Godfrey raced 50 metres to set up a well deserved victory for the Centurions and quickly back to the drawing board for coach, Kelly and his battered troops.



GREAT entertainment though it is - and the Northern Ford Premiership has thrown up many memorable sporting moments in the season now drawing to a close - Rugby League continues to do itself a great disservice by its failure to deal efficiently with simple fundamentals.

You wouldn't think it was too difficult, for instance, for extra-time arrangements in any knock-out competition to be agreed upon well in advance and to be widely publicised so that, in the event of a draw after 80 minutes everyone who needed to know would be well versed in what to do next.

When I get to Hilton Park this early evening for what has all the makings of an absolute cracker in the major semi finals of the NFP top eight play-off I will be interested to see if this programme tells us exactly what will happen if there is nothing to separate Leigh and Oldham at the end of normal time

There was a time, in the good old days when attention to detail was a matter of course and you weren't considered to de a doddering old worrier if you demanded rules and regulations to be specific, when extra-time details would be printed in appropriate match programmes by order of the Rugby League.

What a contrast in the year 2000. This is what we got over the public address system at Doncaster last Sunday when the Dragons and the Roughyed's were all locked up at 16-16 after 80 minutes.

First we were informed there would be ten minutes of extra time each way. Then we were informed that was wrong: that in fact there would be one period of ten minutes. Wrong again. Switching on for the third time, the announcer told us there would be ten minutes each way with the "golden point" rule applying if there was still nothing to separate the teams after 100 minutes.

At that point the teams kicked off for extra time just as the Press Box was informed by official sources that if the teams were still all-square after ten minutes each way there would be additional periods of ten minutes until a winner was established.

Is it any wonder our friends in the round ball game often regard us as laughing stocks?

They've had a field day recently, what with preliminary semi finals, elimination semi finals, minor semi finals and major semi finals.

Now, I have no problem with the Aussie-style play-off system, yet can we do anything in Rugby League without howls of protest from one club or another about unfair formulae or uneven playing fields?

Then comes the stock answer: the clubs voted for it, the frightening thing is they invariably did.

Only Doncaster voted against the play-off system that has come in for considerable criticism. There was a similar situation in mid-season when several coaches, headed by Workington, protested that seven League games in May were far too demanding on players' endurance and on spectators' pockets, yet again the clubs had approved the fixture formula in the first place. This clearly raises several questions, "Do club reps attend meetings of the APC, the RFL, Super League Europe or whatever with a mandate from their clubs on each specific topic?"

As it is invariably coaches who protest about crowded fixture programmes, alleged play-off injustice or any manner of things can we assume that there is insufficient club-coach liason before the hand goes up to cast a vote?

Are all clubs represented by senior personnel or do some send less senior members of staff or boardroom without a specific mandate? It is too easy to say clubs voted for this or for that and then to blame those of the shop floor, who perhaps never got the opportunity to make an input in the first pace, for raising doubts or criticisms.

Anyway enough of that. Let's hope we see a cracking, semi-final today with or without extra time.

By the way, do YOU know how it will work if extra time has to be played?





Leigh's Cup Final Appearances

LANCASHIRE CUP FINAL

Saturday 26th September 1981 Leigh 8 - 3 Widnes

As the 1981-82 season dawned there was an air of confidence and expectation at Hilton Park with the feeling that Alex Murphy had assembled a Leigh side ready to challenge again for the game's top honours.

Enthusiasm was generated by the early season results and home wins against Whitehaven, Workington and St Helens took Leigh to their first Lancashire Cup Final for 11 years. Opponents were 'up kings' Widnes, who had begun the season with seven straight wins including Cup successes over Rochdale, Wigan and Salford. Clearly the Chemics were to provide the acid test to Leigh's revival hopes.

Sadly the weather for Cup Final day at Central Park was atrocious. Rain cascaded down from slate grey skies from early morning and made the pitch waterlogged in places. As hooker Ray Tabern recalls, however, Leigh were in a confident mood. "We had a tremendous team spirit at the club with everyone working for each other. There were two world class players, John Woods and Des Drummond, but our greatest was our team-work and determination. We were fired up and raring to go whereas Widnes appeared strangely tense. In the tunnel before the game we were all lined up ready to take the field but Widnes were still their dressing room. I remember Mick Hogan banging on the door and shouting, "Come on you lot, there's a game on!"

Despite the cold and driving rain the action was pulsating. Widnes were shaken out their stride by an early Leigh try.

After only seven minutes centre Terry Bilsbury, a fine opportunist, kicked past a flat defence and darted through to touchdown by the posts. John Woods tagged on the conversion.

This was the only score of a thrilling first-half dominated by the tremendous work-rate of the Leigh forwards. Tabern, Alf Wilkinson and Mick McTigue were the pick of the pack while half-backs Woods and Ken Green formed a redoubtable partnership. Leigh put in an awesome tackling stint, blotting out Chemics' danger man Brian Lockwood and halting the charges of second rowers Les Gorley and Eric Prescott with copybook defence. When Mick Adams tried to create something with some towering kicks, full-back Hogan was more than equal to the task, gathering the ball confidently and running out strongly.

For all Leigh's hard work Widnes looked like taking charge as they dominated play early in the second half. Gorley connected a loose ball and timed his pass superbly to send winger Keith Bentley on a clear run to the line (5-3). Widnes continued to press and ten minutes later Eddie Cunningham seized on another knee ball and kicked ahead. Steve Donlan reacted quickly and dived on the ball as he slid over the line only for the ball to run free for Bentley to claim a second try. A touch-judge ruled that Donlan had made the ball dead and Widnes were denied.

Leigh recovered their composure and again began to attack the Widnes line. A Woods penalty and a Donlan drop goal put them back in the driving seat as they achieved their first major honour for nearly nine years. It was a superb performance in the worst possible conditions and fittingly Tabern picked up the 'Man of the Match' award.

"That was a great surprise to me" recalls Ray, because I thought Kenny Green should have won the award. But perhaps it was right that a forward won it because our pack was superb that day. It was a tremendous all-round team effort, we covered the gaps and never stopped working for each other and it was that spirit which won the day. The supporters were super, there was red and white everywhere around the ground, and the scenes at the final whistle as Woody went up for the cup were never to be forgotten."

Alliance Team Match Report

Leigh's Alliance season ended in heartbreak as the Centurion youngsters were bundled out of the play-off's in the Elimination Semi-Final.

For the third game in succession Leigh held the lead at half-time thanks to first half tries from the outstanding Safraz Patel, Stuart Dickinson (his 14th of the season) and Craig Wingfield. It could have been worse for the visitors had Leigh Winger Ben Pye not been hauled back when seemingly in full flight. A high speed start to the second-half caught the hosts cold, however as Rovers staged a brilliant comeback from 16-4 down to take the win.

Academy fullback Simon Warhurst leapt high into the air to take a kick but was unable to hold onto the ball and Featherstone stand-off Gibson nipped through to put Rovers back in the game, Featherstone centre Chris Spurr has had an excellent year at Alliance level for Featherstone and it was he who showed great determination to cross from acting halfback. With Leigh looking to take a grip on the game Sanderson just missed a "40-20" and Rovers were able to feed the ball wide for Spurr to break 60 metres. With the defence still at sea Rovers fired possession out to the opposite wing and Riley put Turner in before another fight erupted in the in-goal area. Once things settled down, the referee sent Costello and Riley to the sin bin.

The Rovers conversion struck the posts and at 22-20 the game was finely poised. Featherstone struck again when substitute Bickerton had far too much pace for the defence and when Spurr collected a superbly weighted kick to go over, Rovers led by 34-20.

Cue the Leigh comeback, Dickinson had a quiet second period but came up with a great play to bust the defence and send substitute Halliwell romping over from close range. Sanderson converted with haste but was clearly unhappy with something that had gone on in back play. The scrum-half then lost his cool completely and was sent off for taking the law into his own hands, kicking a grounded opponent.

With under ten minutes remaining and down to 12 men, Leigh looked to have blown their chance but the Centurions battled forward and Costello barged over for an inspired score. Featherstone were left clinging to their lead when Wingfield converted quickly but time ran out for the Leigh side.

A LAST minute interception try killed off the challenge of brave depleted Leigh. An ambitious pass following the game's last scrum by Scott Hilton was swooped on by Haven's Spencer Miller who raced unopposed to the posts.

A combination of holidays and injuries reduced Centurions' contingent to fifteen, including assistant kit man Simon Warhurst and coach Mark Bailey. Safraz Patel returned after serving a one-match ban and Haven included Wath Brow back-rower Phil Sherwen, who trialled with Leeds Rhinos last term.

Haven hit a purple patch during Patel's sinbinning running in three tries, but were under the cosh again when the hooker redeemed himself with a late converted touchdown.

The Cumbrians, seeking a seasonal treble against their Lancashire opponents, took the lead against the run of play. Graham Colley taking an awkward ball after Miller and Andrew Nelson created an opening.

Missing the services of several regulars, Leigh Academy gave their worst performance of the season, slipping to a 10-29 home defeat.

The Rams, particularly promising South African duo Green and Schwartz, always had the edge on enthusiasm, and raced into a 6-0 lead after just 9 minutes when speedy winger Renton intercepted and ran 80 metres.

The first half was something of a stop-start affair

but Leigh finally looked to be making an impact when good running from Hughes and Hartley almost put Watson over while Kilshaw was hauled back after Owens barnstorming run.

Dewsbury extended their lead with another great try, started by the pace of that man Renton. Leigh fullback Warhurst did well to delay a score, but with five men up with play, it was near impossible to stop the move. The conversion gave The Rams a 12-0 half-time lead.

When Rams fullback Green opened the second half scoring after just 8 minutes play, Dewsbury had a decisive 18 point buffer. Leigh struck back 5 minutes later with a good try by the corner flag.

With time ticking away Leigh grabbed their second try when Hartley split the defence to send Man-Of-The-Match Owens over.

That was as good as it got for Centurions as Dewsbury crossed for two further tries. A cheeky drop goal with little more than a minute remaining confirmed victory that helps cement The Rams place in the top five.
