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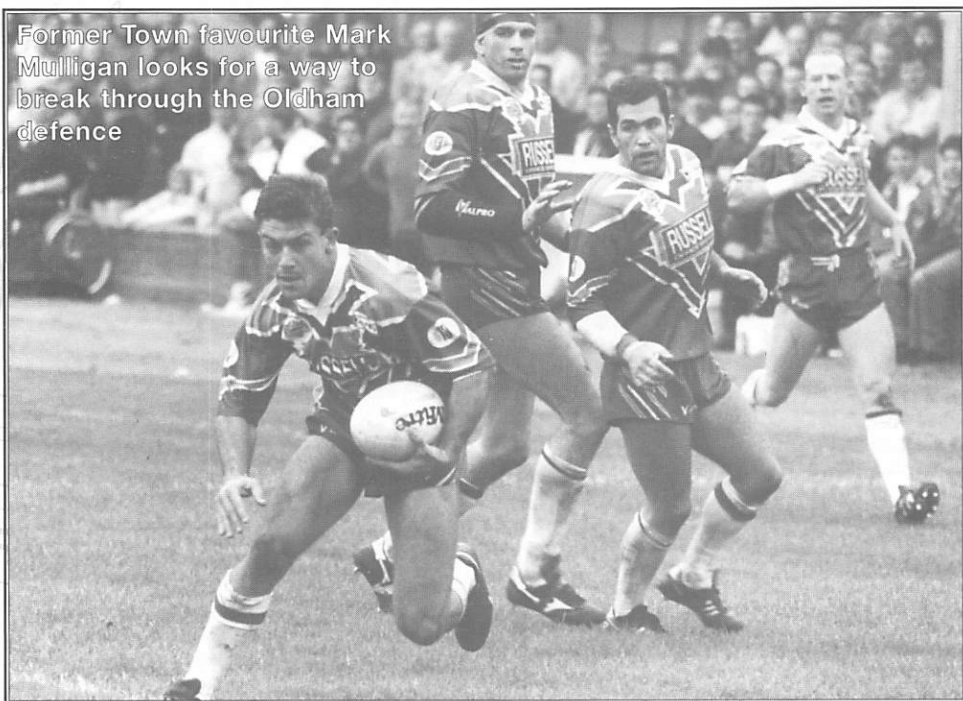
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Former Town favourite Mark Mulligan looks for a way to break through the Oldham defence

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our two latest signings, Stephen Stoddart and Jamie Smith. I'm sure they will fit in well, and help strengthen our team.

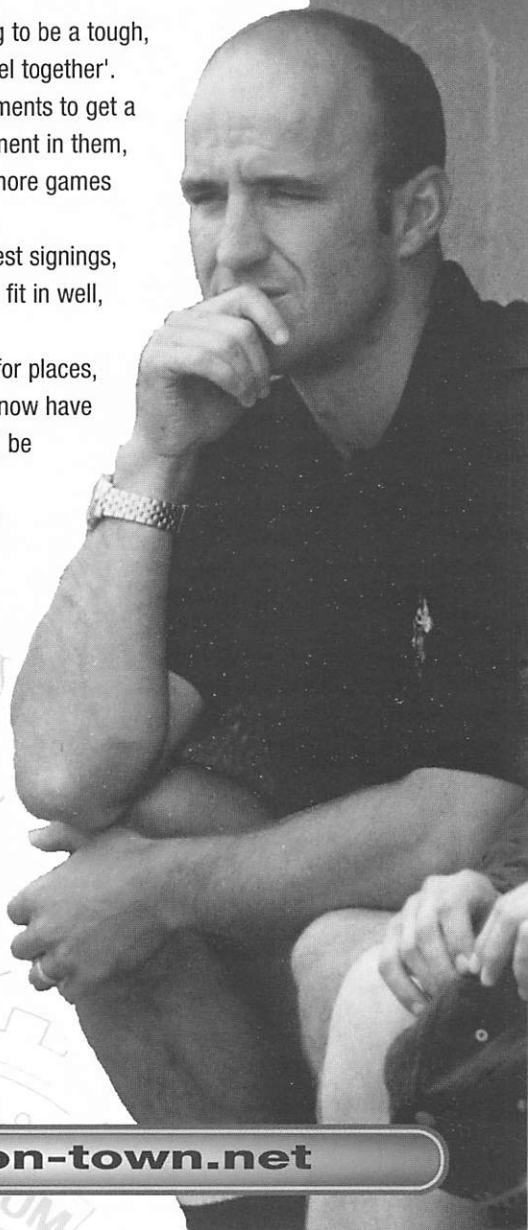

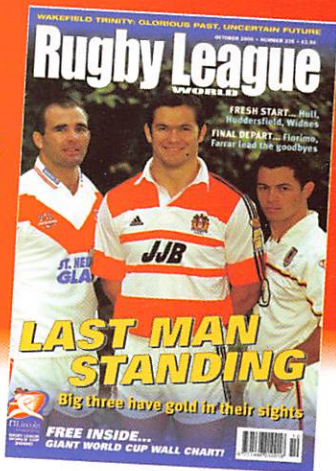
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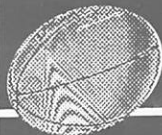

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It's a good job this profile lark. You get to know, at first hand, all the local stars. And journo 'Walshie' certainly earns that tab. He is so professional that an amateur like myself shrinks with humble embarrassment just talking to him. Here are his answers, (most truncated to be honest), to some questions I put before him recently.

Q1. How long have you been a journalist, and when did sport become your main agenda?

A....My first job was with the Cumberland News, I started in September 1963, at the weekly rate of just over £7 per week. My dreams of writing about sport were at first rudely shattered. Phone calls to the Police, fire and coast guard were the first orders of the day. I was even asked to write the Horoscope column one night. When I quizzed the chief reporter about that, suggesting that I might not be qualified to provide such information, he just told me look back in the files what HE had written last year and change the words a bit. A couple of months later Ian Cameron left and I was instructed to take over responsibilities about writing on Workington Town. I covered my first game at Derwent Park on November 9, 1963- Town A v. Widnes A.

Q2. Since becoming 'freelance' has any sport, you hadn't until then covered, impressed you?

A....Working as a freelance since Feb. 1999 I've continued to specialise in sport, but I have been particularly involved with coverage in all areas of the media for Workington Comets since they were reformed at Derwent Park. I used to go in the old days with the late Eric Easterbrook but I think it's a lot better to watch second time round. It really is a spectacular, exciting sport and is well promoted by the people in charge. I think Town can learn from the Comets and develop their marketing, while working closely with the speedway people. At times it seems like a reluctant partnership but there is so much to be gained from working in harmony.

Q3. Have you ever, or still are, been a sporting type yourself?

A....I played my last game of cricket when my daughter Emma was born seven years ago and since then my sporting activities have been confined to racing pigeons (gosh, you must still have pace then John...K.S.) along with my son Sean (10) and shouting at my trail hound which is currently kennelled for me in Seaton. Sean likes snooker and pool but is keen to have a crack at cricket when the season starts next year. Emma is going to be runner by the look of it. Obviously whatever sport they get involved in I will support and watch them.

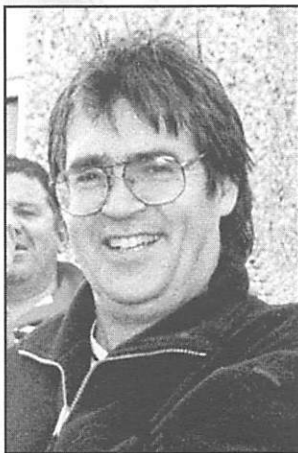
Q4. What is your favourite method of relaxation?

A... I regard quizzing as a relaxation. I'm involved with the Times and Star quiz team every Thursday and go to other one-off charity quizzes when and where they are held. I also read for relaxation. I particularly like autobiographies and am currently on with a good book- Graham Bradley's The Wayward Lad.

Q5. Just supposing you could change the sporting face of west Cumbria what would your priorities be?

A..... I have a dream! Workington is fortunate enough to have the money to develop a multipurpose stadium-for professional sports and for the community. It's a massive enterprise on the current sites of Borough Park and Lonsdale park. There's a splendid grandstand with seats on each side so that on two sides are the playing areas - rugby/soccer on one side and athletics/speedway/greyhound track on the other. In the confines of the Sports Park are five-a-side soccer pitches, a floodlit rugby/football training pitch. Underneath the stand are facilities for squash, tennis, badminton, bowls indoor nets etc. All the main sporting groups in town use it, under the auspices of their separate committees- Town, Reds, Comets, Zebras and a new vibrant athletics club capable of bringing some top meetings to the stadium. Everybody in the community makes use of it in some way.
(Sorry John I know the dream continued for at least 40 winks longer...but being cramped for space brings about this rude awakening Keith Singleton)

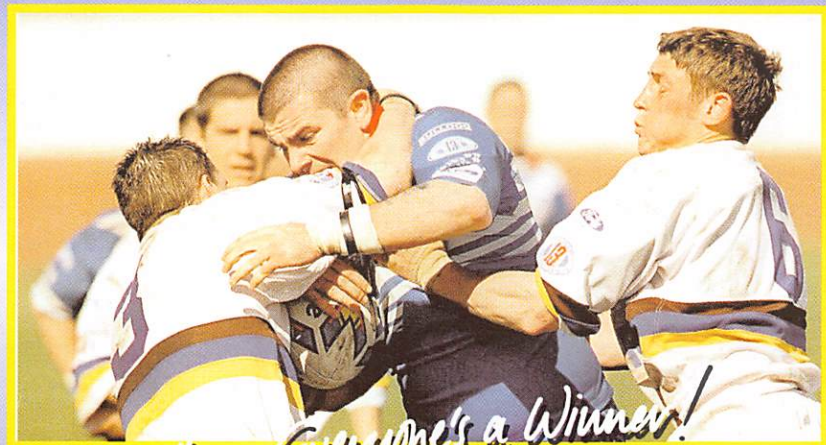

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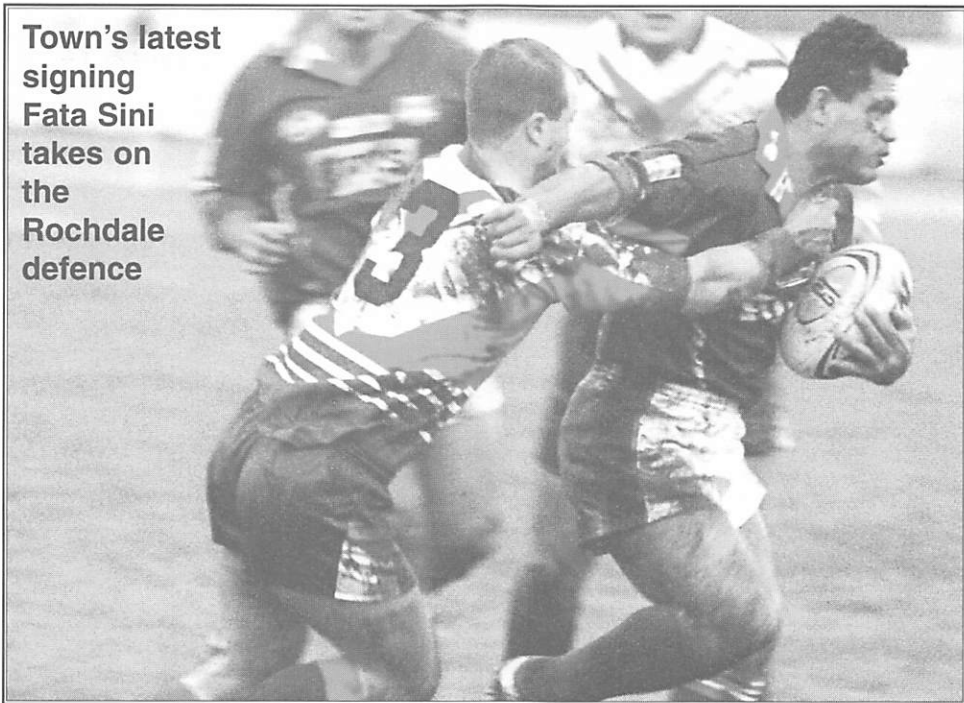

Oldham RLFC (1997 Ltd) was formed in November, 1997 after Oldham Bears went into liquidation the previous month. With no ground or training facilities to call their own, it was initially, always going to be an uphill struggle.

The new club was admitted to the Rugby League as associate members only, which meant that for the opening season in 1998, there would be no funding from the game's governing body. It was therefore left to the four original Directors (Chris Hamilton, Melvyn Lord, Sean Whitehead, and Stuart Hardacre) to finance the venture and harness the goodwill of the Rugby League loving public of Oldham. One aspect of the reformation that had instant appeal with the supporters was the fact that the old traditional red and white hooped jerseys with navy shorts were adopted as the club colours. This was vital as it gave the long standing supporter a renewed sense of identity, as did the re-introduction of the nickname 'Roughyeds'. Two old favourites, Paul Round and Afi Leuila, were among the many new players which again gave a link to the past.

The first fixture for the new club was a friendly against Rochdale Hornets on New Years Day 1998. This historic match for the long established Law cup provided Oldham with a dream start, for with a scratch team and to the astonishment of most of the 3,000 plus people on the ground, they duly won the trophy by 36 points to 16. That first season, with home matches being played at Boundary Park, was a moderate success with the club also going all the way in the "trans-pennine" cup only to fall to Batley at the final hurdle. Overall, the relaunch had been a success, but definitely no fairytale.

After the euphoria that greeted the new club in 1998, the 1999 campaign brought home the reality of the difficulties of maintaining a modern day Rugby League organisation. The club was now forced to play its home matches out of town at Rochdale's Spotland Stadium. Training was still something of a nomadic exercise and some of their better players from the previous season had been lured to other clubs. also there was now a revised single division for professional clubs outside of the Super League elite which provided a much sterner list of fixtures. There is no doubt that the second season for Oldham RLFC (1997Ltd) was frustrating for all concerned with the club, despite a super effort from the front row partnership of John Hough, Jason Clegg and ex Roughyed Leo Casey. A series of heavy defeats in the second half of the campaign tested the resolve of even the most die hard supporters. As a result, attendances dwindled to the faithful few

Still, the next year would be approached with a renewed enthusiasm. An immediate positive and popular development came when a deal was struck that enabled the club to play once again at Boundary Park, the home of Oldham Athletic AFC. This was followed by the appointment of Mike Ford as player/coach. The acquisition of Ford, another favourite from the Watersheddings days, a Great Britain tourist and player of proven ability was seen by many as a move in the right direction. The results so far would certainly add weight to this argument.

So here now, in the new millennium, the great game of Rugby League can still count amongst its member clubs the distinguished name of Oldham RLFC and the Oldham public still have a chance to rally round and boast the successes of their beloved Roughyeds.

MIKE FORD

A scrum half who has been making the right sort of headlines all his sporting life. Played for Wigan at Wembley when only 19. Also starred for Leigh, Oldham, Castleford, Warrington, Wakefield and South Queensland Crushers. Toured down under with Great Britain in 1988. Coached Burnley to mid-table respectability in 1999 before landing his dream job of coaching his hometown club.

CRAIG BARKER A local lad who was with the bears before signing with the Roughyeds. A stand off half with a neat pair of hands, this product of the Waterhead amateur club is still waiting for the opportunity to command a regular senior place.

WARREN BARROW Signed regularly from St Helens Alliance side making his debut at Leigh on the wing. A regular try scorer whilst at Saints he can play either wing or at centre..

KEITH BRENNAN A late entrant to the pro ranks, Keith played for Higginshaw and Shaw Rhinos before impressing as an amateur for Oldham towards the end of the 1999 season. An extremely accomplished scrum-half who was expected to push player coach Mike Ford all the way before picking up a serious knee injury in the cup defeat at Rochdale.

MARK CAMPBELL One of the 16 new boys brought to the club by Mike Ford during the first two months of the player coach's reign. Formerly with Leeds and Keighley Cougars, this 21-year-old hardworking back row forward is studying at Leeds University for a degree in Chemical Engineering

LEO CASEY A tough prop who played for the former Oldham club, Featherstone Rovers, Swinton and Rochdale Hornets before signing for the Roughyeds for the 1999 season. Captained the side and, at the age of 32, became a firm favourite of the crowd. Recently returned from a three-match suspension after being sent off at the Rochdale in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

JASON CLEGG A product of Littleborough RL Club, this heavyweight prop turned pro for the Bradford Bulls and had a stint with Batley before signing for the Roughyeds shortly after the club was formed. Made a first-team place his own property in 1999 and earned selection for the West of Pennines side against an East side

coached by Mike Ford. In superb form this season and was voted the Oldham player of the month for February

PETER FERRIS Another former Higginshaw player and another late recruit into the pro ranks. Toured Australia with BARLA under 19's and represented BARLA under 23's but left the game to play for Duckinfield Rugby Union. It was there that Mike Ford spotted the utility back and invited him to join the Roughyeds.

KEVIN FITZPATRICK A fullback who made his name with Saddleworth Rangers before signing for Oldham at the age of 20. Recently celebrated his 21st birthday while studying for a degree in journalism and the media. Hopes to make the headlines as well as write them.

ANTHONY GIBBONS One half of the twin combination which played for Leeds Rhinos and Bramley before joining Oldham at the start of the 2000 season. The 23-year-old is playing consistently well at centre but also helped out at scrum half against Rochdale in the cup.

DAVID GIBBONS The other twin. Became a household name at Headingley and played more than 20 senior games, including several in the first Super League Season of 1996. Formerly Captain of Bramley, David will be a key figure for the Roughyeds at stand-off half

DANNY GUEST This 22 year old, 18 stone prop was an up and coming youngster with the bears. Also played for Keighley and Lancashire Lynx before returning to Oldham. Has been playing mainly as a substitute this season but has been a consistent performer, as shown when scoring with his first touch of the ball in a recent rout of Lancashire Lynx.

JOEY HAYES A young winger who has crammed a lot into his relatively short spell as a pro. Made his name with St Helens but also played 11 super league games for Salford City Reds last

season. Turning into a real crowd favourite at Oldham and certainly must be one of the most exciting wingers in the NFP.

CHRIS HOLLAND Aged 21, Chris has played for England and Great Britain students and took the man of the match award in England's defeat by New Zealand at Hull in the last world cup. Equally at home at centre or in the back.

JOHN HOUGH Will go down in local history as the first player to sign for the new Oldham club when it was launched in the autumn of 1997. Has had two cracking seasons in 1998 and 1999, when he took the club's

player of the year award. Played more than 30 senior games for Warrington before returning "home" to Oldham. Been in tremendous form again this season, which was encapsulated in a superb match winning try in the defeat of Widnes Vikings..

KEVIN MANNION

22 year old Kevin is a ball playing loose forward, who made his senior debut with Rochdale Hornets when only 16. Played for England and GB Students, for whom he has toured Australia and played in France. Has put in some good performances so far this season but was unlucky in picking up a serious Knee injury in the victory over Widnes Vikings.

JOE McNICHOLAS Broke his leg for the Roughyeds in the new clubs first league game at Workington and missed the rest of the 1998

season apart from a brief spell as sub in the final match. A pacy winger, Joe bounced back to hold down a regular spot on the right flank in 1999..

CHRIS NAYLOR A young prop formerly with the Academy sides at St Helens and Salford. Big and Strong, Chris played for England in the Students World Cup, becoming the only player to be named in an imaginary World X111. Played for the first team until picking up a serious injury, which he is just returning from.

ANDY PROCTOR Named captain of the club by Ford for the 2000 season. This former

Saddleworth, Wakefield Trinity, Oldham and Bramley prop-forward, now aged 30, won a man of steel award while with Trinity, as the club was then called, and has built a reputation as a players player, who performs well above his weight. **WES ROGERS** A strong second row forward, Wes has

Recommended to Bramley and became an instant hit. An exclusive attacker has been a key player so far this season for the Roughyeds.

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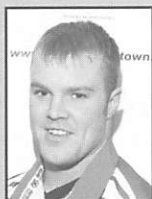
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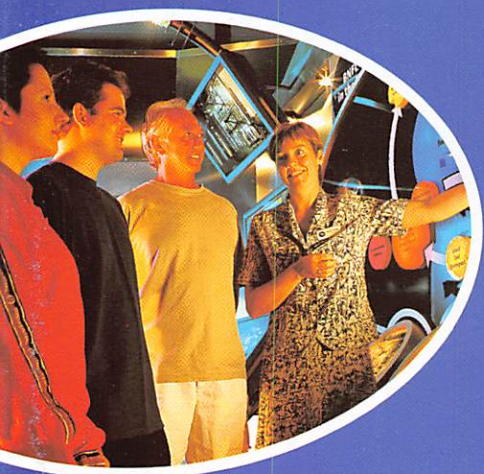

Let's have a part-time World Cup

proposes a second tier of
international competition.

One of the issues facing the Northern Ford Premiership, it seems to me, is the question of representative rugby. It arose recently, when some officials floated the idea of a NFP representative side playing a game against the touring Australians at the start of the World Champions' tour next October, with Workington being mentioned as a possible venue. At the time of writing nothing had been confirmed about that fixture, although there is a chance that something more definite may be known by the time you are reading this article. NFP players deserve the chance to play representative rugby. But is a game against the Aussies really a sensible idea for the NFP team? I don't think so, and I would propose something radically different. In a game against the Aussies in October, the NFP stars would be badly out of season, playing against a team of superstars that had just completed their season in the southern hemisphere. Can you imagine what the score might be? I can't see how it would help promote the NFP at all, particularly when there is a

much better alternative. So what is that alternative? I think it lies in the direction of international competition exclusively for part-time professional players. Imagine, for example, a competition based broadly on the format of the World Cup, but excluding any players from Super League or the Australian NRL. It would mean that a team representing England (or Great Britain) would be picked from the NFP, the Australian team would be picked from players in the Queensland State League, Country Football or the Sydney Metropolitan Cup, and the New Zealand team would be chosen from their domestic Bartercard Cup. The French team could be picked, as it is now, from their own domestic competition. And there could perhaps be four other teams, maybe PNG, Russia, South Africa and another team, all selected on the same basis, with no players from Super League or the NRL. I discussed the idea recently with some French representatives at

the World Cup, and they were very keen on the idea, even to the extent of considering hosting such a tournament. The beauty of it is that there would be a level playing field. The Aussies wouldn't have things all their own way. It would be a great incentive for NFP players and coaches, and also for the fans, if the tournament were to be held after the end of the NFP season in France. My guess is that a lot of NFP fans would make the trip across the Channel to cheer on their rep team, and to sample the delightful hospitality offered by French Rugby League enthusiasts.

Meanwhile, after a highly competitive start to the season, all NFP fans are awaiting the Christmas fixture programme with eager anticipation. With some great games in store, we really will be spoiled for choice this Christmas. And it sure would be good to see the crowds rolling out in their thousands, to rival the attendances we got for the season opener on Boxing Day last year.
