### 2000/2001 SILK CUT PRIZES

After 17 years of sponsorship the year 2000/2001 is the final year of Silk Cut's involvement in the Rugby League Challenge Cup. The final year is worth £1 million - a first for British club Rugby League. With the demolition of Wembley now well underway, the final will be held at the headquarters of rugby union - Twickenham - with the victorious team in 2001 receiving a record prize cheque of £150,000.

The winner will also receive a cheque for £200 from the third round through to the quarter-finals. THERE IS probably still no other competition, in either code of rugby, that captures the imagination as does the Rugby League Challenge Cup. Since the trophy was first contested in 1897 it has become a firm favourite with both the 'die hard' and casual

followers of the game.

For today's fourth round tie we welcome to Boundary Park the players, officials and supporters of Hull Kingston Rovers. The 'Roughyeds' and the 'Robins' have had some memorable cup encounters in the past - the 1925 final at Headingley when Oldham won the cup for the second time in their history. The titanic struggle in the 1964 semi-final when Rovers went to Wembley at the third attempt after two drawn games. The 1990 second division premiership final at Old Trafford when the 'Roughyeds' came from well behind to snatch a dramatic victory.

However, for today's featured match I have chosen a first round Challenge cup tie from January 25th, 1969. This was the last occasion when the two clubs met in this competition and yet again there was hardly anything to choose between the teams. The match, which attracted a healthy attendance of just under nine thousand spectators, was played at Watersheddings. Rovers opened the scoring in the 12th minute by means of a Terry Clawson penalty goal but the lead was short lived, for five minutes later, Wilf Briggs and Phil Larder combined well to send in new signing Jim Crellin for a try which was converted by Derek Whitehead. Briggs followed this up a few minutes later with a drop goal, which still counted for two points in 1969. Oldham then had a lucky escape when Larder knocked down a Roger Millward pass with the try line wide open.

Two further penalties by Clawson left Rovers just one point in arrears at the interval and shortly after the resumption the goal kicking prop forward was successful again to put Hull KR ahead. Oldham, although on the wrong end of the penalty count, were gaining a lot of possession from the scrums and this eventually led to a further score when Briggs got on the end of a Kevin Taylor break to score near the posts. Whitehead again converted to give the home side a 12-8 advantage. Clawson pulled back two points with another penalty goal but it was Oldham who finished the stronger. Scrum half Tom Canning had a try disallowed for a double movement and the last minutes of the match saw Oldham camped on the Rovers line. The final whistle sounded with the "Roughyeds' triumphant by twelve points to ten. Kevin Taylor for Oldham and, a nineteen year old, Phil Lowe for Hull KR were the pick of the players on view.

McIntyre earns a replay

CUP TIES between Oldham and Hull KR are always something a little bit special to me because I started to cover Oldham's fortunes for the Chronicle in April, 1964 just as Frank Dyson's men were preparing to meet Colin Hutton's Rovers in the semi-final of the Challenge Cup.

The late WD (Bill Doran), a former secretary to the old Lowermoor amateur club, had the pleasure of following the club for the Chronicle during those magnificent days of the 1950s and when he left the paper in 1962 he was succeeded by ken Ashton, a St. Helens man who was then working in Bristol and keen to return North to pursue his journalistic career in rugby league.

I had arrived at the Chronicle on July 31, 1961: a young news reporter with a general interest in sport and a passion for rugby league, who quickly came to realise that Billy Doran was a real character among the senior sports reporters.

In my second day on Union Street a piece of copy paper came floating over my shoulder and dropped on to my typewriter. "Are you one of us?" I was asked and on looking round I was confronted by Bill and one of my fellow members of the news desk team, a youthful John McKeown, whose brother Des was a player at Watersheddings.

"Well, are you?" they insisted. "Am I what?" asked I, growing more puzzled by the second.

"Are you a Catholic?" "No, but why do you ask?". "We thought you looked like one!"

I had well and truly arrived at the Chronicle. The swinging 60s were in their infancy and with Bill the gobetween, the Chronicle staff and the Watersheddings players of that time rocked many a night away.

If we were not partying at his Fitton Hill home we were partying at the McKeown family home at Moorside - great days, great memories and rugby league to top it all off.

Bill went soon afterwards to pursue a career that took him to Fleet Street with the Sunday People and the great team of the fifties began to break up.

By '64 a new team had been built, but Ken Ashton covered the 'Sheddings scene for only two years before he also looked for pastures new.

He wrote in the Green Final: "Was it Will Shakespeare who said, 'Parting is such sweet sorrow' or was it Harry Goodwin (club president) in the Mare and Foal the other night?

"After two years I now hand over to my successor, Roger Halstead, and if he gets half as much pleasure out of the job as I have done he will be a very lucky man."

That was April, 1964 and in the 37 years since, I have reported on Oldham's fortunes in Lancashire Cup finals, in Challenge Cup semi-finals, in Old Trafford premiership finals, in Paris, on sun-baked grounds in the South of France (will those present ever forget the Battle of Carcassonne?), in tropical Queensland at Townsville and on the famous Adelaide Oval, not to mention the meeting of the Aussie RL disciplinary panel in Sydney when Paul Davidson was up for headbutting at Townsville and both he and Jim Quinn thought they had seen a ghost when I turned up unexpectedly to take my seat in the press gallery.

Wonderful rugby memories - but nothing to compare with my first game: Oldham v Hull KR in the cup semi-final at Headingley on Saturday, April 11th, 1964.

There is nothing to compare with a 'first'. Ken wasn't to finish until the end of the following week, but by way of an introduction it was arranged for me to do the 'runner' for that night's Green Final and Ken to do the follow up and comment piece for Monday's paper.


I was probably as nervous as the Oldham players - most of whom were a lot older than me. But I got through on adrenalin, fired by the pressures of the job and the excitement of the tie - although Len McIntyre left if so late to drop his equalising goal for 5-5 and a replay that our Green Final edition was a few minutes late.

Ken covered his last match when the teams replayed at Station Road on the following Wednesday night and then I was up and running and on my own for the second replay at Fartown on April 20.

Older supporters will have their own memories of that dramatic semi-final series from the kick off at Headingley to the final whistle at Fartown.

And what better time to relive them than in yet another Challenge Cup tie between the Roughyeds and the red, red Robins from East Hull.

## Probing The NFP

IN A bruising encounter at Belle Vue, Keighley Cougars ended Doncaster Dragons' unbeaten 16 match run at home. Both Paul Mansson (Doncaster) and Martin Wood (Keighley) had to retire from the fray injured, though not before Wood had notched his 1000th point for the Cougars. Two tries by Keighley right wing Craig Horne were the decisive scores.

With Keighley's Sunday fixture postponed, however, the Cougars were overtaken at the top of the table by Leigh Centurions who walloped Workington 70-0 in midweek before humbling Rochdale 48-0 last Sunday. Against Workington fullback Neil Turley equalled a 54 year old Leigh record by scoring six tries in one match, while Simon Svabic plundered eleven goals. Svabic then followed up with a try and six goals against Hornets, with Turley's try taking him to 18 for the season. What price Leigh to shock Salford in the Cup?

After their midweek humiliation Workington surprisingly bounced back to win at Swinton 29-20. Several players returned from injury not least influential stand-off Tane Manihera. Even so at 10-4 down at half time Town did well to recover, and it was largely thanks to livewire hooker Carl Sice that the Cumbrians hit back in a half which saw the lead change hands several times before Lewthwaite and Rumney scored tries in the last five minutes to settle it.

Another side to notch two wins was Featherstone Rovers. In midweek they defeated Hunslet 26-14 with Jamie Rooney reaching 100 points for the season in only his ninth match. Rovers followed this with a 37-6 victory at York to maintain the pressure at the top of the table.

Dewsbury Rams had only a midweek win at Sheffield to their name. Although Sheffield took an early 6-0 lead it was the Rams who took the game by the scruff of the neck in the second half to run out 25-6 winners.

Another side to score first before going down were Chorley Lynx, a Brian Capewell penalty the

forerunner of an Oldham blitz. David Gibbons followed his hattrick against Queensbury with four more tries against Lynx. Dean Cross grabbed two more and prop Andy Proctor, a rare scorer also had two, one of them displaying surprisingly neat footwork. Pat Rich added eight goals from ten attempts. Although Chorley started with young Chris Ramsdale on the wing they looked a much better attacking force when he switched to hooker in the second-half. Graeme West is right to persist with a youth policy but it's obviously going to be a long, hard road before the team posts its first win.

The other midweek winners were Whitehaven who overcame Rochdale 13-4 in a thriller. Hornets lost halfbacks Paul Owen and Mick Coates to injury which disrupted their attacking play but 'Haven also lost Leroy Joe on a bad night for the playmakers.

At the weekend Hunslet recovered from their defeat by Featherstone to win in a snowstorm at Gateshead (another of my forecasts down the pan!). With some players treated for mild hypothermia it makes you wonder how the game got the go-ahead, but Hawks' scrum-half Chris Robinson defied the odds to lead his side to a 27-12 win.

My forecasting wasn't totally useless as I did say Barrow would trouble Widnes and so it proved as the Border Raiders fought out a 6-6 draw with the Vikings. Martin Crompton starred for the visitors but in another game played in a snowstorm Barrow's Mike Whitehead scored a crucial equalising try in the 75th minute.

And finally, today's visitors Hull KR, with a reputation for scoring few and conceding few, edged out Sheffied at Don Valley Stadium 12-11, but only after Mark Aston failed with a last minute conversion attempt. Two goals off the touchline by Rovers' Chris Charles proved vital, therefore, and

serve as a warning to Oldham today.

And speaking of today, can any of the NFP teams pull off a shock? Leigh are desperate to prove their credentials and will give Salford City Reds a tough run-out. It could go either way. Keighley will similarly give Hull FC a close call, but the Cougars aren't relishing the game after the behaviour of the Hull 'fans' when last they met. Dewsbury v Castleford is another interesting one, but the Tigers are a class side so I don't expect a surprise. Similarly I can't see Barrow (v Halifax), Swinton (v Leeds), Widnes (at Bradford), or Batley (at London) troubling their Super League opponents. However, I am intrigued by Workington v Wakefield and wonder how the Wildcats will cope on Town's mudheap pitch. And what about Featherstone at Huddersfield: if one thing is certain it's that the Rovers will give it everything they've got. I'd just love them to turn over a club that enjoys Super League status because it's got a stadium rather than a team.

## TOWN TODAY



### HULL K.R.

TODAY'S fourth round Silk Cut Challenge Cup pitches Oldham in against on of the best known club in Rugby League. Last season the Roughyeds pulled off a rare victory at New Craven Park and completed a double with a play-off tie victory at Spotland. Past form, however, will count for nothing today when the Robins will be out for revenge and to extend their interest in the Cup. Now coached by former Academy Coach Gary Wilkinson a young looking H.K.R. will be a tough test for Mike Ford's men.

At fullback today will be the diminutive but whole-hearted BOB EVERITT. A mormon missionary, Everitt has twice had the misfortune to break a leg but is now back to his best.

In the threequarters Rovers can chose from: DEAN ANDREWS a wingman with five years service punctuated by a brief spell at Doncaster;

MARK BLANCHARD a young centre who scored on his debut against Oldham two seasons ago; GAVIN MOLLOY, a graduate from the Robins Academy; club captain and fans' favourite WHETU TAEWA a Challenge Cup winner with Sheffield Eagles, Kiwi international and former Auckland Warrior and North Queensland Cowboy; BRIGHT SODJE, a strong finishing winger who has seen service with Sheffield and Wakefield as well as two spells with the Robins; ANTHONY CHAMBERS, a versatile recruit from Ideal Isberg; and possibly second row cum centre ANDY SMITH once a Hull F.C. man before crossing the river to Craven Park four years ago.

At halfback 18 years old SCOTT YEAMAN is a former captain of Hull K.R.'s highly successful Academy team who drives his forwards on. He could be partnered at stand-off by the highly experienced MIKE CRANE a former Hull Dockers and York Wasps player before lending the benefit

of his years in the game to the Robins. And in the absence of either of these two expect JIMMY WALKER, another Academy product, to be on stand-by.

At No. 8 will be JON ASTON who originally signed for Hull F.C. in 1994. He has also appeared with Carassone in France and with Rochdale Hornets. Last season he suffered an horrendous broken jaw from which, I am pleased to say, he has made a full recovery. He will, as ever, be leading from the front today.

On the blind side I would expect to see RICH HAYES in a second spell with Rovers after returning from a sorely troubled York Wasps. However, there are alternatives in the shape of JAMIE BOVILL a Great Britain under 16 international and tourist to Australia, and DAVID LUCKWELL a Welsh World Cup selection, once with Batley but currently troubled by injury.

Hooker MIKE DIXON started with the Robins, crossed to Hull F.C. and then returned to his roots. A dynamic runner from acting half, Dixon is a 5'5" non-stop action man who will need to be policed.

The first choice back row is highly experienced. At 11 the 33 year old RICHARD SLATER never stops working and the former Featherstone skipper undoubtedly sets a good example to Rover's battery of young guns. So too 30 year old PAUL FLETCHER whose display against Oldham at Spotland last year was an absolute tour de force. Rovers longest serving player, Fletcher enjoyed a testimonial year in 1999 and is a keen fan of Leeds United. He has now spent 14 years in H.K.R. colours, a tribute to his commitment, fitness and stamina. By contrast loose-forward CHRIS CHARLES is still only 24 but packs a wealth of experience. Signed from Hull Boys Club in 1994 Charles is an accomplished goalkicker with representative honours in sides east of the Pennines.

Back-up takes the form of half-back CHRIS KITCHING, ex-Hull F.C. and Great Britain Academy and a regular try scorer; ALAN DUNHAM reserve hooker and utility forward; RICHARD WILSON yet another ex-Academy man; and JON WILKINS a loose-forward who is the youngest player ever to appear in the Robins first team and is a G.B. U16 international.

### POINTS GALORE!

WHILST Mikes' boys have done well, thank you very much, their growing reputation has been earned more in respect of 'mean machine' than 'points machine' so breaking club scoring records would perhaps have been as remote in Mike Ford's thinking as winning the World Club Championship!

However, the 64-0 victory over plucky amateur side Queensbury was the widest winning margin achieved by any Oldham professional side, pipping the long standing 63-0 victory of 1899, ironically also against first round amateur opposition, Goole. Oldham that season went on to be the first Lancashire side to lift the Challenge Cup! The scoring of one hundred and twenty points in just two consecutive matches, (Queensbury and Chorley Lynx), has never previously been achieved by either the new or old club.

Oldham's highest score is 70, beating Ray Ashton's Bramley side 70-10 in the 1995 Challenge Cup. Until the Queensbury match both the highest score and margin attributed to the new club was the 56-8 win in the chase for Trans Pennine Cup qualification points

against Workington in 1998.


The eight goals from the boot of Pat Rich against Queensbury was also a record for the new club. Also you have to go back to Wilson Marsh in 1994 and before that to 1959 and the era of points machine Bernard Ganley to equal Pat's tally of 16 in two consecutive games.

Whilst during the Queensbury game, Mark Sibson equalled his own new club record of four tries, David Gibbons touching down seven times in two games provided the talking point. Seven in ONE match (James Miller in 1908) is the Oldham record and whilst seven in consecutive games is not going to get David into the record book, it is not a feat achieved too often. Our own John Henderson was the last Oldham player to achieve this in 1990, before that was Malcolm Price in 1964 and you then have to go way back to 1922 and to the days of wingman Reg Farrar.

No Oldham player has ever kicked more than two drop goals in one game so Neil Roden's brace earlier in the season at Workington equals the record shared by. amongst others, Ray Ashton, John Blair, Tommy Martin, Fred Hall, Martin Crompton

and Mike Ford.

Incidentally, the Oldham side having already this season won at both Barrow and Workington, have the incentive to go for that rare Cumbrian hat trick by winning at Whitehaven, a match scheduled for mid June, and a feat not achieved by Oldham since season 1957/8.

## Cook(e)ing up a storm



THE weather in January and the postponement of several NFP fixtures has – predictably – renewed the debate regarding 'summer' v 'winter' rugby.

Now I don't propose to come down on one side or the other in this continuing argument, especially as an APC working party is going to investigate this question as thoroughly as it can. But what I don't like - and from his public pronouncements Chris Hamilton is determined to avoid this - is knee-jerk reaction because it snows in January and games are postponed. What does anyone expect? In Britain we often get snow in December, January, February and March! It's even been known to snow in other months as well. So if you choose to play in those months the first thing you do is build into the fixture list some flexibility so you are not FORCED to re-play matches in midweek. The clubs have the voting power: if matches are played on a cold, wet, windy, dismal Tuesday or Wednesday in January or February it's because the clubs themselves allow this to happen.

Another point to remember is that 'winter' rugby means rugby in September, October and November (ie autumn) as well as winter. If the current season was two-thirds of the way through because it had started in September would we be quite so worried about fixtures lost in January? As Simon Winnard has pointed out in this programme before, Rugby League managed to run its competitions successfully for a hundred years before the advent of 'summer' rugby, so let's identify the real reason for change, which is not the weather but bums on seats. It shouldn't be beyond the wit of a half-decent statistician to show which alternative, 'summer' or 'winter', produces the best crowds. And that I would suggest is the only thing that matters.

Oh! and the statement that no game played in a 'summer' season has been postponed is incorrect: I refer you to Oldham v Lancashire Lynx Good Friday 10th April 1998 – match postponed: waterlogged pitch! And it snowed on Easter

Monday, too!

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

THE letter printed in the Queensbury programme from Brian Wood praising the standard of Oldham's publication has prompted me to look at the quality of programmes being produced in the NFP. Bearing in mind that all clubs are working with limited budgets, I will try not to be over-the-top in criticising, but instead will try to highlight the positive features. I am particularly aware of this because one of the best programmes I ever read was flimsy and poorly produced but had outstanding written content: it belonged to Runcorn Highfield!

So, to begin this feature, let's look at Featherstone Rovers and Swinton.

#### FEATHERSTONE Price: £1.50, 32 pages.

Essentially black and white with blue standing colour. Printed by Pennine Printing Services (who produce the Oldham programme). Photography by Andrew Varley is top quality but the pictures could do with captions.

Content: Lots of stats, which is okay for visiting supporters, but a bit repetitious if you are a home fan.

Good reading material. In particular, Coach Peter Roe is usually forthright, as is Editor Glyn Robinson. Trenchant comment also from Steve Lancaster, Bob Fowler and Colin Smith (The Flat Capper). Clearly, they call a spade a spade down Fev. way! Historical material and the visitors are dealt with by Alan Brookes. Supporters' views by Paul Cox.

**Verdict:** Plenty of entertaining comment. Lots of variety. A good buy.

Rating: 8/10

### SWINTON Price £1.50, 32 pages. Full colour.

Printed by Colourplan, who produce several Super League programmes, but will not normally produce for NFP clubs because of the smaller quantities and the cost of full colour. Tony Barrow has the connections to pull off a deal for Swinton!

Content: Peter Young, the Editor, has some very reliable contributors. So, in addition to Chairman Malcolm White and Coach Mike Gregory, you can read the excellent club historian Steve Wild, together with Mike Caine and Dave Hadfied of the Independent who are now the Lions' main club sponsor. Then there's Spelly, the inimitable John Spellman – to the point as always – and some peculiar ramblings from Martin Kelner, plus a Junior Lions page with what I always think is a sad looking mascot in Vinny the Lion.

The photography is not acknowledged (unless it's Bury Times) but, being in colour, is

excellent.

**Verdict:** Good value. Plenty to read and make you think.

Rating: 8/10.

On a personal level I am trying to save up for a holiday in Cyprus; I've been told it's a great place to


Q. Do the supporters really affect the game and the players?

## Amateur Album

### .... WITH DON YATES





Sid Miller

THIS afternoon Oldham meet Hull Kingston Rovers in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup, rugby league's knockout oldest competition. Sat in the stand watching events will be Sid Miller, a player who, a little over seven years ago, created a little piece of Challenge Cup history by turning out for

Littleborough when he was 52 years of age, thereby becoming the oldest player to appear in this doyen of competitions.

Sid's playing career began thirty odd years previously on the banks of the Humber where he was an amateur player with the South Newington club. He turned professional with Rochdale Hornets in 1963, moved across to Rochdale and has lived there ever since.

Whilst with Hornets, Miller was a member of the first team squad which reached the final of the 1965 Lancashire Cup. Despite being involved in all matches leading up that final, Miller was left out of the final itself, a situation he describes as one of the biggest disappointments of his professional career. After three seasons with Hornets, half-back Miller was transferred to Leigh, snapped up by Leigh coach Alex Murphy who certainly knows all there is to know about scrum-halves and half-back play in general. Miller enjoyed a couple of years at Leigh before moving back into amateur rugby with the Rochdale based Mayfield club. During the early seventies Mayfield were involved in the Standard Cup and Miller starred for them in that particular competition. He was a Standard Cup winner on three occasions with Mavfield and was awarded the Ben Powell Trophy in 1973 for his match winning performance in the defeat of Waterhead. Sid also appeared in a Standard Cup final for local club St. Anne's before moving back into the Rochdale league with Milnrow and then Littleborough. Miller also enjoyed considerable coaching success whilst at St. Anne's, coaching the Saints open age squad as well as the Lancashire under 18 and open age teams. He also served on the Oldham Amateur league executive committee but he has had no active involvement in rugby league during recent years. However that may quickly change as he has just received an invitation to do some scouting work for the Huddersfield Super League club.

Sid Miller in action

Despite Sid's success at Rochdale. and particularly during his time at Mayfield, he will forever be remembered for events which occurred in early December 1993 when he was substitute in the Littleborough team contesting a first round Silk Cut Challenge Cup tie at

Redhill. Miller came on for the closing 14 minutes of that fiery tie which included three dismissals and a late disputed try which saw

Redhill through 16-12. Littleborough were unlucky to lose that match, the star of which was their young prop-forward Jason Clegg, a try scorer and winner of the man of the match award. Despite Clegg's award winning display it was Miller who hit the headlines earning his place in rugby league history with a feat that is unlikely ever to be beaten.

THE START to their Northern Ford Premiership campaign has seen the Roughyeds register a 5 and 1 record and having to utilise the full extent of their senior squad, one of the largest squads in the NFP. However, the game became the third Oldham fixture to become a victim of the weather this season.

Gareth Barber did particularly well during the games against Queensbury and Chorley. Whilst either of these sides would not be regarded as the best standard of opposition, he showed great pace and a willingness to get the ball out wide and added another dimension on attack. David Gibbons move to centre as cover for his twin brother appeared to give him another lease of life. In addition Mark Sibson, who to date had only shown brief alimpses of what we know he's capable of, also seemed to benefit as the two totalled 12 tries between them. Indeed. Anthony Gibbons return from suspension poses a difficult selection decision for Mike Ford. It was also good to see Lee Doran and Gavin Dodd further cutting their teeth at senior level. These players, amongst others, are sure to carry the very future of our club and full credit to all for this investment. Oldham's long term future will surely depend on its ability to invest and nurture young talent and, if the recent signings are anything to go by, a prosperous future lies ahead.

Oldham today will also be looking to erase the memory of last season's Challenge Cup exit at the hands of neighbours Rochdale Hornets. That defeat was probably the lowest point of the season and today they have the chance to make

amends. With the possibility of a lucrative home tie in the next round the Roughyeds will be giving it their all and, given the club's Super League ambitions, it would offer a golden opportunity to square up against top flight opposition. Indeed, Leigh are principal NFP ambassadors today as they meet Salford in front of both the TV cameras and what is sure to be a bumper crowd at Hilton Park.

In the chase for the Grand Final, Leigh are also benefiting from a large squad and, along with Keighley, are already looking a good early season bet. Pre-season bookies favourites were big spending Widnes who dropped yet another point last weekend against Barrow. Such is the competitiveness of the NFP, there are any one of seven or eight clubs more than capable of success. Today's visitors Hull KR fall firmly in that category despite, like our very own club, having to struggle through some difficult times of late. Their own troubles aside, nothing must stick in their throat more than the rescue package offered to their fiercest rivals. The Gateshead Thunder / Hull FC Super League sponsored takeover was financed as a thinly veiled merger. The new club was then allowed a development club overseas quota despite the local amateur scene clearly being the most successful in the country. As a result of this, they are also now close to sealing a new shared stadium with the town's ailing football club. Not long ago, the debate was underway to merge the two Humberside RL sides, but full credit to all involved that the identity of two great RL clubs were kept distinct and not made extinct.

I wish our visitors the very best of luck in their continued efforts to return their club back where it surely belongs. One thing is for sure, they will have to do it the hard way. However, the success will be all the sweeter for all the suffering endured rather than an empty sense of achievement if the powers that be simply bend the rules and hand it to

## THE DON'

### On THIS DAY . . . Don Yates looks back to February 11th yesteryear

THIS AFTERNOON Oldham continue their Silk Cut Challenge Cup campaign with a match against Hull Kingston Rovers, the club who knocked the Roughyeds out of the competition in that heart breaking semi final in 1964. There have been other Humberside disasters during Oldham's cup campaigns, one occurring exactly 40 years ago, on Saturday 11th February 1961. Oldham travelled over to the Boulevard that day for a tough first round tie which was decided on goal kicks after a terrific forward battle, the Airlie birds winning 4-2. Full-back Peter Bateson landed a couple of penalties for Hull and Bernard Ganley one for the Roughyeds.

The all conquering Wigan team lifted the Silk Cut Challenge Cup on eight consecutive occasions between 1988 and 1995 but it was on this day in 1996, Sunday 11th February that their winning sequence was shattered when they crashed to a 26-16 fifth round defeat at Salford. It ended a run of 43 unbeaten Challenge Cup games, a record that is unlikely ever to be beaten On that same afternoon, Sunday 11th February 1996, Hull defeated Keighley 42-10 in another fifth round tie. Included in the Hull line up that day were hooker Mike Dixon and substitutes Chris Kitching and Jon Aston, all three of whom have since moved across Humberside and are likely to be in action against Oldham today. One player who certainly will not be in action is Oldham winger Danny Arnold, out for a couple more weeks with a broken collar bone. On Sunday 11th February 1996 he scored a hattrick of tries for St. Helens as they won 58-20 at Rochdale. Scrum half Mike Ford and hooker John Hough have less pleasant memories of that afternoon. They were members of the Warrington team beaten 30-10 at home by Leeds in another fifth round tie. The only amateur team left in the competition are Woolston Rovers who received the draw they always wanted, a trip to Wilderspoon. Six years ago on Saturday 11th February 1995 they were involved in a third round National Amateur Cuptie here in Oldham when they visited Waterhead. The Peach Road boys, then a North West Counties League outfit, put up a brave fight and actually led 4-0 at one stage before slipping to a 34-4 defeat.

Today's visitors, Hull Kingston Rovers, had an outstanding team during the 1960s including a number of internationals. On Sunday 11th February 1968 four Hull KR players were included in the Great Britain team which travelled to Paris to take on the French. They were hooker Flash Flanagan, stand-off Roger Millward and wingers Chris Young and Alan Burwell. France had beaten Australia earlier that season and were confident of further success but Great Britain had difference ideas. They led 15-3 at the break and went on to win 22-13. Burwell and Millward each scored a try but the hero for Britain was Leeds full back Bev Risman who scored two tries and five goals.

Sponsorship is a vital part of all sports funding these days when every opportunity to gain income has to be explored. Twelve months ago, on Friday 11th February 2000, it was announced that the Tissot watch company would be the official timing sponsors to the Rugby Football League.




