



TODAY we welcome the players, officials and supporters of the Keighley club to Boundary Park and in so doing recall a match against the West Yorkshire team from our championship

winning season of 1956-57.

The match was played on October 27th 1956 and it was celebrations all the way at Watersheddings as the club paraded the Lancashire Cup, which had been won the previous week against St Helens at Station Road, Swinton. This was the first time the "Roughyeds" had secured the trophy since 1933 and before the game the team proudly posed with the cup (see pic). It was then left to two of the "rested" players to carry the cup around the ground. Ironically the task fell to two Yorkshiremen. Hooker, Jack Keith and winger John Etty paraded the cup to the delight of the Oldham supporters.

A crowd of just under thirteen and a half thousand turned up for the game, the majority of whom were no doubt anticipating an Oldham victory. This eventually came to pass but not before Keighley had put up some stout defence. However, this was a time when Oldham were sweeping all before them and tries from Turner, Pitchford and Cracknell complimented by five goals from Ganley were enough to give Oldham the spoils by nineteen points to five. The Keighley score consisted of a try from Lowe and a goal from Hollindrake. A pointer to the extent of the Keighley endeavours could be that the next visitors to Watersheddings were the 1956 Australian tourists who were whacked 21 - 2. (Three weeks later Oldham travelled to Lawkholme Lane, there to complete the "double" by 32 - 15.)



ROCIE!

THE battle for places in the top eight of the Northern Ford Premiership is building up into a fascinating contest in which at least a dozen clubs are in with a shout as the season passes the half-way mark and hits the back

straight.

It's a far cry from last season when, at this stage, only seventh and eighth places were realistically still available for a couple of clubs just outside the cut-off mark.

Another big change this year is the manner in which one club, Leigh Centurions, is racing way ahead several lengths in front of the rest, who jostle for places way behind as they approach each successive hurdle.

It is interesting to recall that, last season, the race to finish top went down to the wire and when the regular 28 match programme was completed Dewsbury had made it to the pinnacle for the second season running with the narrowest of margins over Keighley Cougars.

The Rams finished on 45 points, one more than Keighley and only three more than Doncaster and Leigh, who finished third and fourth

respectively.

Oldham, in sixth spot, pulled in 39 points and it could have been oh so different when you consider that Dewsbury won only 14-12 in a thriller at Boundary Park and only 16-12 at the Ram stadium where the Roughyeds went 10-down in as many minutes and then gave as good as they got, if not more, for the remaining 70 minutes.

Prior to last weekend's games Rochdale Hornets were in sixth place but, significantly, they were a massive 12 points behind leaders Leigh, who at that stage had won 16 of their 17 games.

Dewsbury, second, had been beaten four times; Keighley, third, had lost five; as had Featherstone. Widnes, Rochdale and Oldham had all lost six.

More importantly, and this is what makes the division so competitive, only four points split Featherstone in fourth place and Batley in 12th spot.

Even Whitehaven, 13th in the league ladder with 17 points, were only three points outside the

top eight and presumably still fancying their chances of qualifying for the end-of-season play-off carnival.

Loss of form on the one hand and loss of players on the other has hit some clubs hard - notably Dewsbury, who not only lost coach Neil Kelly when he took over at Widnes but, soon afterwards, suffered the departure, also to the Auto Quest Stadium, of key men Matthew Long, Sean Richardson and Richard Agar.

A huge injury list, headed by star man Martin Wood, took the edge off Keighley, while Doncaster's financial problems were such that several influential players walked away, not least scrum-half Latham Tawhai and utility man James Bunyan, who signed

for Rochdale.

Other clubs, on the other hand, appear to be gambling heavily financially on finishing in a good position in the play-off zone and making a determined bid to win the Grand Final in the hope

of earning promotion to Super League.

Heading this list is Widnes, the NFP's big spenders who have the facilities, the stadium and the fan base to put forward a strong case for elevation to the top flight. But what if they don't make it? What then, for Widnes, if they fail to achieve their goal and are left to pick up the pieces, still in the NFP and with no Murdoch money to speak of next year?


Rochdale are not quite in that bracket, but it doesn't take anyone with inside information to know that the Hornets must have spent pretty heavily to put together the Dave Watson inspired team which had won eight games out of nine when it beat Oldham and Sheffield over the Easter holiday.

Sheffield had also been on a roll until they came unstuck at Spotland, while Workington have also put pressure in recent week on the teams hovering in mid table just outside the top eight.

Amazingly, all this is against a background of severe financial hardship, with several of the aforementioned clubs hoisting distress signals, not to mention similar tales of woe from some of the clubs in the division's lower echelons.

Where it will all end is anyone's guess, but the Oldham chairman, Christopher Hamilton, is probably close to the mark when he says that, for several clubs in the NFP, it will finish in tears.

Too many other clubs, he fears, are spending money they haven't got and are heading for a fall.





Probing The MFP

MY FORECASTS of last week's games which appeared in Wednesday's Doncaster programme were spot on, with one exception. Having called Rochdale the form team of the moment I went with home advantage to Featherstone at the Lionheart only for the Hornets, who now lie seventh in the table, to prove me wrong by springing yet another sensational victory by 20-18. Highlight of the game was a 90 yard interception try by winger Marlon Billy which restored Hornets lead after Fev had fought back to 18-16 from 16-0 down.

As well as Featherstone another well fancied side to go down, though it was expected, was Dewsbury, who succumbed to Leigh Centurions 32-18, a game in which Neil Turley equalled the all time record of 33 tries in a season for a fullback. Nevertheless Leigh made hard work of it after leading at one stage 22-0.

Meanwhile my 'mad' forecast that Swinton would beat Doncaster was correct, albeit by the narrowest of margins, 19-18, a Jim Lyons drop goal deciding the issue.

And another game decided by a single point was Oldham's win at Batley, 9-8. In this case it was a Gavin Dodd drop goal which separated the sides in a game where the Roughyed's defensive resilience was tested to the full.

Easy wins were chalked up by the sides facing three of the bottom four clubs. Today's visitors Keighley regained some confidence when they saw off Chorley 60-18. Wingman Gareth Hooson scored a hattrick while Craig Murdock and

Ian Hughes both grabbed two. Jason Ramshaw was the Cougars' outstanding player.

Workington Town also ran up 60 against 10 by York. Left-wing Graeme Lewthwaite ran in 5 tries for Town, but stand-off Tane Manihera dictated the game and slotted over 8 goals.

Town's neighbours Whitehaven overwhelmed Hunslet 50-10 at the Recreation Ground. In this game hooker Aaron Lester had a hattrick, with fullback Paul O'Neil landing seven goals.

And finally, Barrow defeated bottom club Gateshead who put up much the best performance of the bottom four in losing by only 20-12. With the Thunder leading 12-8 on the hour a shock looked on the cards only for Darren Holt to rescue the Border Raiders after Brett McDermott had edged them ahead on 67 minutes, Holts 73rd minute try and goal finally killing off a gallant Gateshead.

This week not all clubs are in action following yesterday's Silk Cut Challenge Cup Final between Bradford Bulls and St. Helens. The game here at Boundary Park is the hardest one to call with both sides anxious to take the points. It's so close it could even finish as a rare draw. Home advantage should see Dewsbury overcome Workington, but Town have found their feet this season and will look on this as a potential victory.

I think we can expect Featherstone to win at Gateshead and Hull K.R. to defeat Chorley. Similarly, with York in dire straits, Whitehaven ought to prevail at Huntington Stadium, the Cumbrians still keen to gate crash the play-off places.

That leaves Sheffield to entertain Leigh at Don Valley Stadium and it would be a major upset for the Eagles to turn over the Centurions, so don't hold your breath over this one!

TOWN TODAY

KEIGHLEY COUGARS

THERE are fewer penalties in games involving Keighley than any other team and the Cougars are the best disciplined team in the NFP after Barrow Border Raiders, Conclusion; expect our visitors today to play open, flowing football. Problem: that football is not as effective without the presence of the best player in the NFP. Martin Wood. Additionally, influential Australian scrumhalf Nathan Antonik has also been absent injured recently with the result that Keighley's results have nose-dived. However, if Oldham underestimate the Cougars in any way today, they will be in for a bloody nose (metaphorically speaking, of course) as our visitors seek to get their season back on track.

23 year old fullback JAMES RUSHFORTH is a former Academy Player of the Year and has progressed to be a reliable last line of defence in

Keighley's strong side.

CRAIG HORNE wears no.2 and is a pacy right wing with experience at Bradford Bulls. His centre partner is GARETH HOOSON who arrived at Cougar Park after departing Huddersfield-Sheffield Giants. With Daio Powell looking like he will have to retire following a third broken arm in a year Hooson looks likely to be a regular selection.

Left centre GRAEME HALLAS is a Great Britain international and is team captain. He has experience with Hull K.R., Halifax, Hull, Hunslet and Canterbury Bulldogs. He has also (alas!)

appeared with Saracens.

Cougars top try Welsh scorer is international left wing JASON LEE, a class act and a selection in the NFP 'Dream 2000 Team'.

In the absence of Wood, Keighley have CRAIG brought in MURDOCK the clever halfback who appeared for Wigan and Hull. No Jason Lee mean play-maker, the

Cougars will hope he has settled in by the time they meet Oldham today.

With Antonik out Keighley have brought back experienced scrum-half CHRIS ROBINSON a wily play-maker who started his career at Halifax and has always been hard to handle.

Up front Oldham born former Waterhead



Similarly, JASON RAMSHAW is also a former Halifax player, albeit some years ago. Now established as one of the best and cleverest hookers in the League, Ramshaw also heads up the Cougars' development programme.

On the blind side ALAN BOOTHROYD has also played for Halifax. Highly experienced, the powerful prop has also done service at Castleford,

Bradford, Huddersfield and Dewsbury.

Second-row poses a definite threat, where PAUL HARRISON and JIM LEATHAM form a potentially lethal combination. Harrison, formerly with Hull and Batley, is the brother of former coach Karl and is a big hitter in his own right. Leatham, meanwhile has played at Hull, Hunslet and Hull K.R. and is a former Academy international.

DANNY SEAL at loose-froward completes the Blue Sox connection. An all action utility player, Seal can prise the open best defences so is definitely one to watch out for.

Other players who could appear today include MATT WALKER. a 22 year old ex-Bradford Bulls prop or KARL Danny Seal second-row;



SMITH a locally developed utility back; PHIL STEPHENSON a destructive prop forward; JAMES WALKER, older brother of Matt, a goal kicker, ex-Hunslet, Doncaster and Hull K.R. and now making an impression after struggling with injury; JAMES SIMEONOVICH an ex-Siddal and Huddersfield second-row; CHRIS ROSS, a newly arrived halfback from Hunslet covering the Cougars' crisis positions; MATT FOSTER a flying wing recruited from Doncaster; and another ex-Dragon returning to Cougar Park prop JOE BERRY.

And, last but not least, the Cougars are, of course, coached by STEVE DEAKIN, ex-Oldham St. Anne's, Keighley assistant, Rochdale Hornets, and now one of the most highly regarded and respected coaches in the NFP. He is sure to want a victory in his home town today.

WIGAN owner Dave Whelan in a recent Daily Telegraph interview was fiercely critical of rugby league officials "small men with small minds run Rugby League and I don't like it" he

On the face of it a stupid statement when the sport is still spending more than its income, but his argument is that his club has to be in a position to pay its star players sufficient to ward off the temptation to move to union, and perhaps the NRL and added the club also needed the ability to attract star players from throughout the rugby playing world. His added threat to move his team over to union was ridiculed from most quarters as too stupid to contemplate. But is it?

The week before Whelan's outburst Leeds leaders, Hetherington and Carrick, proclaimed that Leeds Tykes recent union promotional

tussle at Headingley was more important to Leeds 'rugby club' than the Rhinos Challenge Cup semi-final against St Helens!

This, despite the fact that the current Tykes crowds would fit into the ladies loo, as opposed to two 13,000 home gatherings the Rhinos have attracted already this season! The truth is that next season, playing in union's premier one, and with the right marketing message, crowds will be drummed up for the visits of Saracens, Harlequins, Leicester, Northampton and Bath etc.

Down the road Bradford have also expressed interest in a 'union' venture by forming a complete new club to share the Bulls name, revamped Odsal facilities, and hopefully a good proportion of their large fan base.

Similar noises have been made by Saints and the word on the street is that the association between Warrington and Sale

could become a whole lot closer.

It's old news that the kick and run broadsheets have been full of union's intention, both to attempt to strengthen their fragile hold here in the north and to attract to their sport many of league's top players. They really are out to convince their readers that this is not something that just might happen but, rather, how quickly it will happen.

So is there now a realisation and acceptance by some of our top clubs that unions quest will succeed? Is it that they now intend to enter this new arena from a position of strength, rather than later when they could have already lost many of their better players?

The men who make these decisions will all be like minded and at the end of the day the motivation will be profit. There are obvious benefits, cross coding players, year round rugby, and most important, a slice of the union sponsorship cake, but before they jump they should at least give a moment's consideration to league's heritage, including one hundred and six years of bigotry dished out by the RU. They should consider, too, that the first step into a union tie up will also be the first into the eventual formation of a hybrid sport, and the end of league as we now know it.

The irony is that yesterday Twickenham would be packed almost to the rafters in anticipation of a fast, exciting, no quarter given, humdinger club cup football game. Rugby



I like to watch TV sometimes especially golf, and I sometimes go to body building competitions. These are very interesting and informative.





..... WITH DON YATES

THE Rugby Football League, together with BARLA and with huge funding from the National Lottery, have set into motion a programme designed for developing young talent in the game. As part of this development programme young players from the age of 13 are being invited to join development camps where they can receive expert coaching from the game's top youth coaches.

Young players at under 13, under 14 and under 15 levels at present, but, hopefully right up to under 18 level during the next three years, are nominated, usually by their local service area, to take part in a four day regional development camp during the Eater holiday period. The four regions covered are the North, the North West, the North East and the South and Wales. From those four regions, players are then nominated for a week long National Camp which is held in August.

Last month I had the pleasure of attending the under 15 North West camp which was staged at Rossall School. Fleetwood. Fifty-five young players were nominated for the camp and they were split into three teams, two of 18 players and the team to which I was allocated which contained 19 players. Each team has one head coach, two assistant coaches and a support staff assistant. I was the support staff assistant which basically means that I do all the odd jobs and also keep an eye on the boys once the coaching sessions are over for the day which is usually after 8pm. Each evening the boys fill in a personal diary and another of my tasks is to assist the boys with their paperwork. At the end of the camp an 11 page report is prepared on each player. I enter player details, results of tests and assessments of player strengths and weaknesses into a computer for this report. As you can imagine, the camp is every bit as exhausting for the support staff assistant as it if for the player. Fortunately it is also just as interesting. During the camp players attend various lectures on subjects such as lifestyle management, sports physiology, nutrition, weight training and a talk by a match official. The players also had the opportunity to meet several legendary characters from the game such as Bev Risman and Ray French, they had a talk from John Kear, were treated to a coaching session from Dean Bell and enjoyed a video presentation from National Coaching Director and Great Britain coach David Waite.

Every skill is covered during the course of the week - passing, catching, tackling, play-the-ball and grubber kicking together with defence systems and attacking manoeuvres with players 'running angles' in support of the player in possession. Every player should leave the camp with his skills enhanced and his knowledge of the game improved.

It is a tremendous experience for any youngster who is lucky enough to be invited into this development system. There were ten local players involved in last months under 15 camp including scrum-half Andy Gorey (Royton Tigers) and second row forward Matthew Bottom (Saddleworth Rangers) who were both included in the same group to which I was allocated. Both were a pleasure to work with and both look like having a future in the game. I look forward to meeting them, and other talented teenagers like them, in future years.

ORIGINATING from an official NFP website, this notification was recently posted on message boards; it states that, English, French and Russian clubs may compete in an elite European tournament next season. Three Northern Ford Premiership sides and a team from Moscow will play against the top four French clubs. The competition has been planned at the instigation of the French, spearheaded by Toulouse and Villeneuve two clubs who have been keen to revive the concept of the Treize Tournoi of 1998.

It will be the first to involve a Russian club playing alongside English and French opposition.

Of the three NFP clubs invited to compete, two have already agreed to take part, although their identity will not be revealed until the official launch of the competition in April. The top four French teams in the present Championship (expected to be Villeneuve, St Gaudens, Union Treiziste Catalane and Toulouse) will take part. If Pia finish in the top four, they will join forces with their neighbours UTC.

Each team in the Anglo-Russian group will play each team in the French group once, giving four matches per team. The top team in each group will contest the final, while the teams which finish second will play off for the plate on the eve of the final. The tournament is believed to be backed by a blue-chip sponsor who has guaranteed the travel and accommodation costs, while a further eight associate sponsors are also said to have signed up

We want to make this tournament the pinnacle of the season," said Paul Faires, whose World Rugby Ltd public relations and marketing company has organised the competition on behalf of the French clubs.

The same company already handles perimeter advertising for the French Elite 1 clubs and was involved in the organisation of the Treize Tournoi final. Well get a full house for the final, which is scheduled for the same venue in Toulouse where PNG played South Africa in the World Cup," Faires added.

The timing of the competition will depend ultimately on the dates of the NFP season, which is currently being debated. "Ideally we would like to play two matches in September prior to the start of the NFP season and the remaining two matches at the end of their season, with the final on June 1st," said Faires, "but we will fit in accordingly."

The concept seems like an interesting idea and will certainly help to promote the game across Europe something that Super League Europe Ltd has so far failed to do. It could also break up the lengthy closed season should the NFP maintain its current calendar. However, whether the Roughyeds will be involved should the idea be followed through will only come to light as and when the official announcement is made in the near future.

We entertain the Keighley Cougars in this evening's game following on from a midweek home clash against the Doncaster Dragons. Playing three tough games in eight days is hardly ideal. However it is the harsh reality for the remainder of the season due to the annual pitch problems here at Boundary Park. This gruelling run in will undoubtedly test the strength of character of the set of players that Fordy has assembled around him. However, I just have a feeling that, in the face of adversity, they can show the resolve that is needed to give the season one or two twists and turns just yet.

THE DON'

ON THIS DAY . . . Don Yates looks back to April 29th yesteryear

NO doubt several Oldham supporters here today will have enjoyed vesterday's Challenge Cup Final at Twickenham, But 102 years ago. on Saturday 29th April 1899, Oldham supporters in the 15,762 crowd at Fallowfield. Manchester would have enjoyed that final much more. The reason being that Oldham won the trophy that day. beating Hunslet 19-9 after an exciting tussle. The south Leeds' outfit led 9-5 at half-time but the Roughveds were the better side on the day and fully deserved their success. They crossed for five tries scored by winger Sam Williams (2), centre Sam Lees and forwards Joe Lees and Jim Moffatt. Conversions by Sam Lees and fullback Dickie Thomas completed the scoring and sparked off mass celebrations throughout the town.

Although Oldham won the Challenge Cup on another couple of occasions, the Roughveds never made it to Wembley although several local lads did play for other clubs beneath the twin towers. On Saturday 29th April 1989 two former Oldham juniors. one from Saddleworth Rangers and one from arch rivals St. Annes, were on opposite sides when bitter rivals St Helens and Wigan met at Wembley. Wigan won that final 27-0 with St. Helens unable to cope with the superb Wigan defence. A prominent member of the Wigan pack was hooker Nicky Kiss, ex-Saddleworth, whilst substitute for Saints that day was Darren Bloor although when he was introduced into the match, midway through the second-half, the game was already decided.

Exactly forty years ago, on Saturday 29th April 1961, Keighley visited Oldham for a league match although, of course, in those days the crowds would flock to Watersheddings instead of drifting down here to Boundary Park as they do today. Oldham, as expected, won that match 23-11, diminutive winger Bill Patterson scoring

a hattrick of tries. The other try scorers were other winger Vinny Nestor and centre Alan Davies whilst full-back Geoff Sims landed four goals. The try which Alan Davies scored proved to be the final touchdown he made for the Roughyeds. Later that year he was transferred to Wigan but the 174 tries

which Davies scored for Oldham constitute a club record which certainly will not be bettered in foreseeable future. The Keighley scorers that match. incidentally. were stand-off Roy Sabine, winger Mike Smith and prop-forward Syd Phillips who all scored and hooker tries Malcolm Waring who landed a goal.

It was on this day three years ago, Wednesday 29th April 1998, that Bramley met Lancashire Lynx in a vital top-of-thetable Division Two match at Headingley. Lynx, who later that season went on to win the Second Division title and reach the Treize Tournoi Final, recovered from a 10-0 deficit to win 19-14. Despite the importance of the match, only 453 spectators were in attendance. At stand-off for Bramley that evening was current Oldham utility back David Gibbons although twin brother Anthony was absent working off a term of suspension.

One hundred years ago, on Monday 29th April 1901, Leigh won the South West Lancashire and Border Towns' Cup Final without scoring a point. They drew 0-0 with Warrington at Wigan that evening and when Warrington failed to arrive for the replay at Widnes the following night, the trophy was awarded to Leigh.




