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

Some postponements are better than others, and I must say being deprived of the opportunity to brave the freezing fog on the M62, to go to the Autoquest Stadium last weekend and see us go into a battle on a bitterly cold afternoon against a vastly more experienced Widnes outfit was about the best result we could have hoped for. There is a god. It is never that much fun going to Widnes at the best of times for any reason - and despite wishing to put a brave face on it, for the Lions these are not the best of times.

One problem I find with trips to Widnes, quite apart from anything that might happen on the field of play, is that I can never find the blasted ground. I don't know why it is, but there is some grounds, however many times I have visited them, that I still fail to reach without a struggle, and Widnes is one, whether they call it the Autoquest, Naughton Park or whatever. Our opponents today, Oldham, had the misfortune of actually playing last week, and their heavy defeat at home against Leigh was something of a bonus for us. It confirmed what those of us at Hilton Park on New Year's Day suspected, that Leigh are one of the very best sides in the division. When your own side is struggling, there is a tendency to put all heavy defeats down to your own deficiencies, but Leigh look to have taken strength from last season's near miss, and in Simon Syabic have unearthed a real star.

My colleagues at the BBC who watch a great deal of Super League tell me that he looked a little naive at the top level last season, but in the NFP he is set to be a real sensation. In my view, he will find himself back in Super League soon enough, either with Leigh or courtesy of the transfer market. What I am hoping Oldham's heavy defeat means is that we are not quite as far behind the rest of the NFP, as it might have appeared from this season's matches so far. Admittedly, I have only been able to go to the home match against Barrow and the game at Leigh this season, but it has not looked too promising.

However, given the resources at his disposal, and taking into account the talent he has lost in the close season, nobody could deny that Mike Gregory is doing a creditable job. It will clearly take some time to knit our disparate talents into anything resembling a team, but there are signs progress is being made. Let us hope for further promising signs this afternoon. Meanwhile, did you read the interview with Peter Purves in the Sunday Times in which he suggested Blue Peter be revived with the original team - Purves, John Noakes and Valerie Singleton - for those of us oldies who enjoyed it first time round?

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
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Danny Arnold

Daryl hit the headlines as a 13 year old when he signed for Wigan on a seven year contract. Is one of several ex-Wiganers in the Roughyeds squad which has benefited from the Wigan-area knowledge of Alliance team coach Haydn Walker and new club scout John Jackson.

MIKE FORD

Celebrated his 35th birthday recently and recognised as one of the up and coming coaches of the English game. Has played for a string of clubs and has won almost every honour in the game. A scrum-half, he is just starting out on the second year of a twoyear deal as playercoach.

ANTHONY GIBBONS

There are two sets of twins at Oldham, the Gibbons and the Farrells. Anthony Gibbons played in 31 of Oldham's 34 games last season as the Roughyeds marched into the NFP semi finals. A versatile player, this Gibbons is used mainly by Ford as a centre.

DAVID GIBBONS

Other half of the 'twin partnership' in Oldham's backs, David, used primarily as a stand-off, missed only one match last season. Sound and reliable, he joined Oldham from Bramley after starting his career, like Anthony, with Leeds.

MARK SIBSON

Quick full back who loves nothing better than to attack from deep. Top-scored with 24 tries last season after joining Oldham on a two-year deal from Bramley.

PHIL FARRELL

Anything the Gibbons can do in the backs, the Farrells can have you seeing double in the forwards. Phil, a secondrower, joined Oldham last March, quickly made a back row spot his own and played a major part in the gradual improvement of a team that finished as semi-finalists and NFP club of the year.

NEIL RODEN

Another ex-Wigan player, Neil came to Oldham with Phil Farrell. He also quickly established himself with the Roughyeds, either as a scrum half or as a stand off.

LEO CASEY

Veteran of the Oldham side at 35, Lee also had a spell with Hornets after leaving Featherstone, where he spent the best years of his career after leaving home-town Oldham for a club record £100,000. Returned to the ROughyeds after spells with Hornets and Swinton. One of the most experienced props in the NFP.

DANNY ARNOLD

Former Saints and Huddersfield winger who signed just before Christmas and made his debut at full back at Rochdale on Christmas Eve. Scored 2 tries on his Boundary Park debut against Widnes on New Year's Day. One of the most prolific try scorers in the five years of Super League, he possesses 2 Silk Cut Challenge Cup winners medals, both won with St. Helens.

DANNY GUEST

Another of the Roughyeds 'originals' who returned to the club last season. A big prop, Guest is expected to be a force in the NFP this season after a good pre-season and good marks in the squad's stay with the Green Berets during the autumn.

IAN SINFIELD

Another 'original', Ian had a spell in France, but returned to Oldham last season and has been with the club ever since. Elder brother of Kevin, the England forward, Ian works hard in the back-row and always plays above his weight.

ANDY PROCTOR

Club captain, formerly with Saddleworth Rangers, Wakefield Trinity and Bramley. Highly regarded by Ford as a genuine grafter with a spot-on attitude and motivational qualities which he uses as skipper.

PAT RICH

This recently qualified lawyer scored more points for Oldham last season than anyone else. Eleven tries and 108 goals gave him 260 points in 32 games from a possible 34. Started with Keighley Cougars and was wanted by new club Gateshead Thunder 2000, but opted to stick with the ROughyeds.

JOHN HOUGH

Walked away last season with three player-of-the-year trophies. Carved himself a niche in Roughyeds history by becoming the new club's first signing in 1997. Has since played in 87 of the club's 90 matches and has scored 32 tries, a phenomenal record for a hooker.

JASON CLEGG

Rochdale lad, big-prop Jason turned pro for Bradford from Sid Miller's Littleborough team, but has since enjoyed three good seasons with the Roughyeds. Powerful on the surge, he was voted Top-Gun by the Green Berets and the player who most demonstrated the commando spirit.

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Leigh Versus Who?

MARTYN SADLER, the editor of Rugby League Express, wonders which club East of the Pennines will join Leigh in the final of this season's Trans-Pennine Cup. The Trans-Pennine Cup is one of the unsung trophies of Rugby League. It was first introduced in 1998, when there were two separate divisions below Super League, and the eight teams in the second division played for the Trans-Pennine Cup to supplement their sparse fixture programme.

The first Trans-Pennine Cup final was played on 19 July that year at Batley, when the Bulldogs defeated the newly formed Oldham 28-12 in front of 2,696 fans at Mount Pleasant. It was a great win for Batley, although the occasion, sadly, was marked by a collapse suffered on the pitch by the club's former Great Britain backrower Roy Powell. A few months later, while in his early thirties, Roy would pass away after collapsing at a training session while employed as the assistant coach to Deryck Fox at Rochdale Hornets.

The trophy was not contested in 1999, but last year it was back on the agenda. As in this season, the clubs were split into East (Yorkshire) and West


(Lancashire and Cumbria) sections, and for the first nine rounds of the competition they played other clubs in their own section. When each club had played every other club once in its section the leading club in the East and West played off against each other in the final, tossing up for the right to the home venue.

Last year it was Leigh and Dewsbury who reached the final, which was held on 12 April, one of the foulest nights of the year, at Ram Stadium. The Rams held out the Centurions to win 10-8. Later in the season, in the NFP Grand Final, the score would be even closer, as Dewsbury won 13-12. So who will make it to the Trans-Pennine

Cup final in 2001? There are just two rounds'of fixtures remaining, and Leigh, with their decisive win over Oldham last Sunday, look cenain to have booked their place in the final as the West of Pennines representative. They are now in the driving seat, undefeated and with home games remaining against Workington and Rochdale Hornets.

The competition East of the Penines is a little more uncertain. The finalist will be one of Keighley, Doncaster and Dewsbury, but everything between those three clubs is on a knife-edge. The Cougars, with 13 points, are one point in front of the Dragons, both having played seven games, with Dewsbury on 10 points, having played a game less. This weekend Keighley travel to Doncaster, and if they win they will go through if they can then get a result against Batley. But if the Dragons can beat the Cougars, we will then have what effectively will be a play-off the following week at Belle Vue, as the Rams visit the Dragons. That would certainly bring the Trans-Pennine Cup to life, and it would surely guarantee one of Doncaster's biggest gates for many seasons. The Cougars, who dropped their first point at home to Featherstone on Sunday, will, of course, be out to ensure this weekend that it doesn't happen.

Whichever Yorkshire club makes it, they can be sure that the Centurions will be formidable opponents.

How many others went to Widnes last weekend them, I was one of them and spent the best part of the fay enjoying one of the local hostelries swapping a few war stories with a couple of lads from


the army. I did not find out the game was off until around twenty minutes before the scheduled kick off time. Gutted is not the word I would use.

There was no expense spared at these convivial events which was shown in the considerable item detailed within the clubs balance sheets. The practice ceased when clubs formed the Northern Union. Every club showed a considerable saving in its entertainment item compared to the broken time payments. The players receiving a small meal allowance for the long games. It was also common for clubs to have smoking evenings when it was considered unsociable to smoke, especially in the presence of ladies. These evenings consisted mainly of the singing of popular songs and one was composed by the Swinton bard specially for the Blue Colliers of the Little Village.


One of the better items of news to trickle through from the game's various governing bodies recently has been the suggestion that county matches between Lancashire and Yorkshire are set to return to the representative calendar. Those of you who remember the last time this was tried might feel a little underwhelmed at the prospect. Three years in a row, Yorkshire put the cleaners through Red Rose sides which did not really seem to have their minds on the job and the fixture eventually died of apathy.

But, as with other rugby league initiatives which have fallen by

the wayside, the question is whether it was the concept that was flawed or just its application.

In this case, I've got no doubts. There was nothing wrong with the idea, just with the way Lancashire failed to respond to it.

It pains me to say it, but Peter Fox's Yorkshiremen seemed a lot more proud to wear that shirt than did the Lancashire line-ups coached by Alex Murphy, Doug Laughton and - with slightly more effect - Ray Ashton. Done properly this time, there is no reason why it can't work. I was lucky enough to be in Australia as State of Origin was





just getting off the ground and the conventional wisdom, especially in Sydney, was that it couldn't be fair dinkum, because players wouldn't give it their best shot against team-mates from the same club. We all know what happened to that theory. Provided Super League clubs live up to their promises and make sure that players are available, the two teams should be a good match for each other.

But, as we found out last time round, the question of coaching is crucial. There lies the problem, because at Super League level, we have two Yorkshire-born coaches -Brian Noble and the semi-Aussie John Harbin - and not a single Lancastrian. If the counties have to be coached by a "native" - and I would argue that they do they might be better looking in the NFP, to people like Neil Kelly or Mike Ford. I can hear the objections now - that elite players are being asked to listen to someone from an inferior competition. But it would have great advantages as well. If the timing is right, the NFP season will be over and the selected coaches would be free to concentrate on the War of the Roses. They would also go into it with an open mind and might even prove to be a bit of a breath of fresh air to players from Super League who are familiar with the way the game is played at that level.


From the Lions Archives...

BILL HOLLIDAY

Great Britain captain and forward Bill Holliday was signed from Hull KR by Albert Blan in 1968 for a then club record fee of £6,000. It was hoped that the Cumbrian would kick-start the Lions' fading reputation, but in reality Swinton could have done with a forward of his quality a couple of seasons earlier. He made his debut on 7 September 1968 in a home defeat against Workington in the Lancashire Cup, and later that season he turned out twice in the County Championship for Cumberland. Indeed he scored a try and two goals in a defeat against Lancashire. He figured in Swinton's 11-2 victory over Leigh in the final of the Lancashire Cup in 1969, but by the following season he had become disillusioned enough to request a transfer. Injuries made his appearances more sporadic, but his last game in a Swinton shirt was another Lancashire Cup final this time the 1972 defeat against Salford. He later enjoyed a good spell as coach of amateurs Folly Lane, and in the mid-1980s he returned to Station Road as assistant to Jim Crellin. Then, as joint first team coach alongside Mike Peers, Holliday helped guide the Lions to a promotion and Premiership double in 1987.

Swinton Career Record 92 appearances, 5 tries, 57 goals Representative Honours: 2 Cumberland caps (4 goals, 1 try)

LES HOLLIDAY Signed from Folly Lane at the age of 20, the son of Bill Holliday made a try scoring debut in a 43-0 win against Doncaster at Station Road on 14 December 1982. He immediately showed his class as a looseforward of immense intelligence, tactical awareness and skill, and by only his third appearance he had taken two man-ofthe-match awards. In 1983/84 he scored a hat-trick of tries against Doncaster (42-0), and a season later he was hugely influential as the Lions won the second division championship. An unlucky relegation followed, but as captain he led the team to another promotion in 1986/87 as well as an unforgettable Premiership Final victory over Hunslet at Old Trafford. Huge speculation clouded Holliday's future, but an inspired performance. including a late drop-goal in a 21-20 success away to champions elect Widnes, merely underlined his class. Finally, after playing in a narrow John Player Trophy defeat against Salford on 15 November 1987, he joined Halifax in a record £65,000 deal. After enjoying successful stints at Thrum Hall, Widnes and Dewsbury, Holliday returned to his home-town club in 1995 and played a further 50 matches (culminating in 1997). As a player and assistant coach to Peter Roe promotion was achieved from the second division, before Holliday became coach in his own right before being succeeded by Mike Gregory. A hugely popular player for Swinton and arguably the finest player the club has had in the past 30 years. However, his only representative honour (in Swinton colours) came when he scored a try for

BRUCE HOOTEN

Another Cumbrian, this time a winger, who signed for reigning champions Swinton in the summer of 1935. A former county player from Kendal Rugby Union Club, he made his Swinton debut in a home win against Leeds on 2 November 1935. His only hat-trick came against Barrow in March 1936, and in season 1936/37 he was the Lions' top try scorer with 11. By the following campaign he had made his bow, but during his first two seasons with Swinton he had performed well playing outside Harold Evans and he had also appeared 3 times for Cumberland (scoring 1 try). Swinton Career Record 72 appearances, 22 tries, Representative Honours: 3 Cumberland caps (1 try)

ALBERT HOPE

Hope was a forward who made his debut way back on 26 October 1878. On this occasion Swinton faced Halifax at Stoneacre (and won), in what was the first ever time that the Lions had faced Yorkshire opposition. A week later, the Lions travelled into Yorkshire for the very first time, and with Hope again in the line-up Wakefield Trinity were also defeated. In season 1882/83 Albert Hope won his three Lancashire caps. Firstly against the Midlands at Whalley Range, then versus Cheshire at New Brighton, and finally against Yorkshire at Whalley Range when no less than 8 Swinton players were chosen for the home county. Further notable games in which he was involved were the match at Oxford University in 1882/83 which transpired Swinton's national reputation, and the first game at the new Chorley Road ground on 2 September 1886 when Manchester were in opposition. As a committee-man he was totally dedicated to the club, and it wasn't until season 1889/90 that he made his final appearance.


