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




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FORD FOCUS ... with Mike Ford

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

TODAY we welcome to Boundary Park the players, officials and supporters of the Barrow club. Since the reformation of the "Roughyeds" in 1997 we have had some ding-dong battles with the "Furnessmen" with home advantage usually being the decisive factor. Indeed up until our win at Craven Park in December, victory in every match had gone to the home team.

The most famous match between the two clubs was the 1954 Lancashire Cup Final when Barrow belied their outsiders tag to win the trophy by twelve points to two at Swinton. As if to show it was no flash in the pan they followed up this success later in the season by carrying off the Challenge Cup at

Wembley against Workington Town.

The featured match today goes back to January 22nd 1949 when an inexperienced and somewhat experimental Oldham side took on a Barrow team well established in the top four of the championship under the general-ship of half back

genius Willie Horne.

As one could imagine for a damp January encounter at Watersheddings the conditions were not ideal for open rugby. However, both teams were giving the ball "plenty of air" and on seven minutes Oldham took the lead from a penalty goal from full back Irving Barraclough after Toohey the Barrow scrum half was caught off side. The lead was to be short lived and soon after the restart Oldham lost possession and quick hands by the visiting threequarters allowed Lewthwaite to score an

unconverted try at the corner. Oldham hit back with Platt and Mitchell combining well to put Spencer on a run to the line but the Barrow cover got across just in time to force the Oldham winger into touch at the corner flag.

Barrow gradually began to take control of the game and increased their lead after 33 minutes when, after a scrum in the Oldham quarter, Horne sent out a peach of a pass to Lewthwaite who cut inside for a clear run to the posts to register his second try. Jones converted to give Barrow a half

time lead of eight points to two.

In the second period Oldham tackled well to keep the visitors out and the frustration left Barrow resorting to some heavy handed tactics which eventually resulted in Ayres being sent off. Now with an extra man advantage Oldham came more into the match and enjoyed a spell of pressure in their opponents half which culminated in Sugden leaping high to take a kick and score. The conversion was missed and Barrow kept the "Roughyeds" out for the remainder of the match to record a victory by eight points to five.

THE appointment by Oldham of Shaun Gartland as Academy coach, on a one year contract, will inevitably stir memories of the sterling work done by late father, Brian, in a similar capacity for the old Oldham Bears Club.

Indeed, Shaun knows better than anyone that he will have a lot to live up to in order to retain the Gartland family tradition at Oldham Rugby.

Brian was all things to all men at Watersheddings, a scout, colts coach, 'A' team coach, trainer and he even had a spell in charge of the first team when, in the absence of Frank Myler on Great Britain duty, the late Peter Smethhurst resigned, to be followed one match later by Frankie Barrow's resignation.

Into the breach stepped Brian and a good job

he made of it, too.

His forte, however, was his ability to develop and groom youth and he was doing that on Oldham's behalf for years: from his early days when he was appointed to run a Colts team that was one of the most talented in the game to the final season before the club's liquidation when he spotted and then signed a fresh-faced lad who wouldn't have looked out of place with a chorister's ruff round his neck.

I will never forget coming across the boy and his father as they waited in the Watersheddings pavilion to meet Brian so they could complete the

signing formalities.

Brian had spotted the kid playing somewhere in the Ashton-in-Makerfield area. He was immediately impressed with the boy's handling and kicking ability, but he wondered why he hadn't been snapped up by one of the big West Lancashire clubs like Wigan, Saints or Warrington which were virtually on his doorstep.

He figured the lad's slender physique and baby-faced appearance - he was only just 16, mark you - might have had something to do with that, but Brian was so sure about the lad's natural ability that he couldn't sign him quickly enough for

Oldham.

'The problem I have in signing kids for Oldham,' he often remarked, 'is that the place is falling down. The Watersheddings facilities are

dilapidated. They don't impress the lads and dads:

just the opposite, in fact.:

What did impress this lad and this dad was Brian's ability to 'sell' the club: not its fading fabric, but its reputation for signing and developing youngsters in an environment in which they didn't get swallowed up as tiny fish in a big pond, but were always regarded with the greatest of respect and were allowed the space and freedom to enable their talents to develop.

In short, they were able to put their trust in

Brian Gartland.

As a result of that trust, the dad urged his son to sign for Oldham and that's how one Simon Svabic, now of Leigh and one of the most talented players in the NFP, came to join Oldham.

Over the years scores of boys came to Oldham thanks to Brian. Many, like Terry Flanagan, Ray Ashton, Mick Worrall and Paddy Kirwan had won all the amateur youth honours available to them and

didn't need much 'spotting'.

A certain Andy Goodway didn't fall in that category. Brought up in Castleford, he somehow got 'lost' in the wealth of young talent in that hotbed of the game at that time, but Brian watched him play in one game against Saddleworth for Redhill and knew immediately he had unearthed a gem.

In later years, as Goodway went on to big things with first Oldham, then Wigan and Great Britain, Brian became known as 'the man that signed Goodway' - a fitting tribute to a man who devoted so much of his life to rugby league in Oldham.


He would, indeed, be a proud man today to know that Shaun, his elder son, was about to embark on a similar job for the Roughveds.

Shaun cut his coaching teeth at Saddleworth Rangers, where he had charge of virtually every age group from under-9s to under-16s as well as a spell as coach of the Lancashire under-16s which at that time included Phil and Chris Farrell.

A year at Spotland Rangers was followed by half a season in charge of Oldham St. Anne's. He never really settled with the Saints, but within three weeks of finishing at Higginshaw Road the Roughyeds vacancy cropped up and this time he succeeded where he failed the year before when he applied for a job which went to Mark Knight.

This time he got it and there will be no happier man than Shaun at the prospect of following in his

father's footsteps.



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

WITH N.F.P. clubs hitting the financial buffers by the week the league table is undergoing a sudden and rapid transformation. Out of the blue there is no longer a big three but only a big one, Leigh Centurions. Now any team with any financial stability, one with the ability to cling on by its fingertips or one prepared to take a gamble is in a position to benefit. Any who fulfils these criteria? Oldham. Featherstone and Rochdale respectively. Now to the end of the season promises to be a week by week thriller as up to 13 of the 19 clubs battle for the play-offs.

Biggest beneficiaries of the week were Oldham, A midweek win over Doncaster in a cracker of a game set the ball rolling. For the Roughyeds Joe McNicholas didn't put a foot wrong on his return to first team duty and he scored a magnificent first try. Neil Roden constantly conjured something out of nothing. Jason Clegg was in barnstorming form. Phil Farrell was a model of both defensive and attacking second-row play. And stand in Keith Brennan was hooker sensational. Meanwhile for the Dragons Paul Mansson was a majestic play-maker and lan Ramskill a powerhouse prop.

And to follow this on Sunday the Roughyed overwhelmed troubled Keighley who gave debuts to nine of the 17 on duty. Despite this the understrength Cougars performed heroically, backed by a vociferous travelling support. It was a tribute to the coaching at Cougar Park that the Keighley side never looked disjointed nor disorganised. playing with enthusiasm and occasional panache. Nevertheless, frustrated by Oldham's rock solid defence, Keighley ended up unable to contain the rampant Roughyeds. Props Jason Clegg and Danny Guest were too hot to handle and Keith Brennan and David Gibbons took full advantage to dictate the play. With Kevin Mannion adding a telling presence and Gavin Dodd making forceful forays from fullback the Cougars wilted. And suddenly Oldham had hit second in the table.

That Oldham had now risen to their highest placing since re-formation was thanks to Workington Town winning at Ram Stadium. Tane Manihera and Hitro Okesene were the inspirations behind a dramatic Town victory. With the Cumbrians on nine wins from their last 12 outings and Dewsbury having lost four from six it becomes obvious how the balance of power has changed. Even so, after trailling 22-4 never-say-die Dewsbury scorched back to 22-16 before time ran out on them.

The other games last weekend all went to form. Featherstone were too good for Gateshead, Jamie Rooney notching 18 of the 38 points with 5 goals and 2 tries. Hull K.R.

comfortably dealt with Chorley, 4 tries here for Alasdair McLarron the ex-Driffield R.U. winger (who said R.U. players were no longer turning to R.L.?) Whitehaven added to York Wasps misery with a 54-6 win at Jockey Lane. And, finally Leigh overcame Sheffield 34-28 after Jamie Rooney



a titanic struggle at Don Valley where the Eagles had the Centurions hanging on desperately at the close after the visitors had led 30-10 at half time.

This weekend inevitably sees some crucial encounters. Leigh could be tested again by Hull K.R. but ground advantage should tell. Featherstone v Dewsbury will be a close call again with home advantage likely to decide it. Rochdale will be sorely tested by Workington, but I'll go with the Hornets to win. And it's anyone's guess whether Widnes are good enough to nail Whitehaven at the Recreation Ground.

Of the other fixtures Swinton should defeat Gateshead; Keighley ought to account for Hunslet (depending on who the Cougars have available to play of course); Doncaster will beat York; and Oldham ought to overcome Barrow. Which leaves another close call at Batley where the Bulldogs meet the Eagles. Not wanting to sit on the fence I'll take Sheffield to win and you can gloat if I'm wrong.

BARROW BORDER RAIDERS

AFTER just missing out on a top eight place last season Barrow were expected to mount a big challenge this time round. However, it has been an in and out season for the Border Raiders, especially after Oldham dented their fortress Craven Park image with a first day away win by 28-16. Nevertheless the Cumbrians are making steady progress under the tutelage of former Salford and Great Britain

fullback Paul Charlton.

Among players likely to be on duty today Barrow will have outstanding scrum-half DARREN HOLT who has shone every time the Cumbrians have faced the Roughyeds. A superb playmaker, tactical kicker and goal kicker, Holt formerly played for Carlisle. Voted best scrum-half Darren Holt



in the N.F.P. in 1999 and Best Emerging Talent outside Super League he was Barrow's top scorer in 2000 with 8 tires and 116 goals.

Big centre PHIL ATKINSON is another to have troubled Oldham in the past although he could be missing today with injury. Originally signed from Ulverston, Atkinson appeared in Widnes' Academy team before settling at Craven Park.

A powerful second-row has also proved a handful for the Roughyeds in the past. Here GEOFF LUXON displays an outstanding workrate. In his sixth season with Barrow, Luxon was once a London Bronco. Last

season he was a winner of three separate club awards as player of the year. His partner STUART RHODES recently returned 'home' after signing for Widnes at the start of the season. A big, powerful runner Rhodes has also played for Carlisle.

Behind these two GARY CHARLTON, son

of the coach, is an abrasive loose-forward. Having played at Whitehaven and Carlisle. Charlton has now settled at Barrow where he is showing some of the best form of his career.

In the front row young prop DAMIEN WHITTER travels up from Warrington to train and play, a real mark of his enthusiasm and commitment. Fellow prop IAN RAWLINSON is a local lad signed from Barrow Island now recovered from close season surgery on a troublesome groin injury.

At the start of the season the Border Raiders snapped up discontented Leigh hooker ANTHONY MURRAY, a lively director of play from acting halfback who is capable of cracking

the tightest of defences.

In the backs CHRIS MASSEY will feature at stand-off. Another signing from Barrow Island the youngster has had to fill the gap left by Tane Manihere and has done so with aplomb.

Across the threequarters line we will see ADE GARDNER a young winger upgraded from last year's Alliance side; MATT LEIGH once with Wigan's all conquering Alliance side, then with Salford and a close season acquisition by Barrow; BRETT McDERMOTT, a player who has fought back from two seasons disrupted by shoulder and knee injuries; and SHANE IRABOR a Cumbria county Academy representative who formerly played for Walney Central.

Finally, full-back DANNY LOCKHART has broken through the ranks to take the no.1 shirt.

Substitutes will come from: MIKE KAVANAGH an experienced utility player originally at Askam and brought to Barrow from Carlisle; WILLIE BURNS ex-Carlisle prop who chose to sign for Barrow in preference to Workington; STEVE JACKSON, a Penrith born prop who also came to Craven Park via Carlisle; MIKE WHITEHEAD, a second row out of Walney who had four years at Wigan before heading back to Barrow; PAUL GARDNER, brother of Ade and once a schoolboy signing by Warrington; GLEN HUTTON, a speedy winger from Walney coming back to Craven Park via Keighley, and last season's leading try-scorer with 17 in 27 outings; and GARETH PRATT an ex-Doncaster and Dewsbury second-row.

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

Q. When did you first start playing rugby league?

I was thirteen when I started playing rugby league for Spotland Rangers and it was after a North West Counties game, Lancashire v Yorkshire, that I was approached by Brian Gartland to come to Oldham for a trial. After trials elsewhere I decided Oldham was for me and Oldham (Bears) as it was then became my first professional club.

Q. Do any particular games or opponents stick in your mind?

Just one or two, I remember playing for the 'A' team against Wigan when Sean Long was scrum half and it was a ding-dong game. The score was 3-2 and it was regarded as being the lowest scoring 'A' team game ever. (We won by the way).

I admired Mike Kuiti as a player and a pro: his commitment was superb and he was a very genuine person. Also Jason Robinson was a player I thought was very good to watch, because he has excellent skills and

fitness. It's a pity he plays union now.

Q. Have you any personal ambitions in your rugby career?

Oh yes, I want to keep improving my game, and feel with Mike Ford as coach at Oldham that I am learning a lot. My favourite position is full back, but I really do not mind playing on the wing. My injuries are all behind me, my strength and stamina is good and I feel with a bit of luck, Oldham can get to the play-offs. Obviously, Super League is my ultimate goal, so let's wait and see.

Q. Do you have any time to relax?

A bit. At the moment I am learning to play golf, and I enjoy occasional nights out with my girl friend, who by the way, comes to all the games I play in.

Q. Any other memories, Joe?

I remember being the last player to score a try on the old Watersheddings ground. It was an 'A' team game against Swinton and all the lads and supporters were a bit made up that day. I also remember being picked as 'A' team Player of the Year by the supporters. And last week was a good day for me when chosen as Man of the Match against Doncaster. I was reminded how much I owe as a player to my dad for ferrying me around all over the place, and the supporters at Oldham who are the best ever. So everything at the moment is going great.

FOOTNOTE

Joe McNicholas signed for Oldham Bears in 1995 in time for the Centenary Season. He played Academy and Alliance football for the Bears and made one substitute appearance in the first team against Leeds away in the end of season play-offs in 1997. He re-signed for Oldham Roughyeds and is now, at 22, the club's longest serving player!



BARROW

Getting to Barrow is always an adventure (so how they go on travelling away every other game must be more than man can bear). If you don't get stuck in Morecambe Bay, trapped by the tide at Grange over Sands, you can get distracted by a boat trip at the foot of Lake Windermere or wonder at a lighthouse in the middle of nowhere (does it guide the drunks home from the pub at throwing out time?). Then you can look in on the Stan Laurel museum at Ulverston - another fine mess you got me into! Before the dullest link road you've ever travelled, it used to be better nipping down through Dalton, a sort of Furness version of Tombstone. And then you hit Barrow, like a lot of R.L. towns a bit of faded glory surrounded by the same everywhere you go i.e. B&Q, Tesco, Currys, Sainsbury, JJB. It could be Milton Keynes. As a tip, if you've time, go for lunch to the Old Bank, a spit and sawdust pub that'll do you a proper Sunday dinner (2 courses) for £3.95. And then you find the ground. And what do you know, it's terrific. Stands on all four sides, one of them named after local hero Willie Horne, and a smashing little shop. Do you know I drink out of a Barrow Braves (better name than Border Raiders) mug at work? Well you do now. Only two things wrong with Barrow, the wind off the sea and the bloody gulls!

BATLEY

A local industrialist in the 19th century had a weird sense of humour 'cos he called Batley's ground 'Mount Pleasant'. I don't know which day of the year he went but I've never been on the same day. Basic dress for Batley is outlined in Ranulph Fiennes' 'What you need for a trip to the Pole'. The cricket lads on the adjacent pitch have thermal jock straps.

If you stand at the top end of the ground you can just see the top of the posts at the bottom. The locals who congregate on the half way line all have one leg shorter than the other. And should you be unwise enough to sit in the stand the seats are so low they have a winch to get you up at the final whistle. And it's the only place I know where they give you your very own piece of carpet to sit on.

And, of course, these joys await you only if you've found your way via Cleckheckmondedge, Fox's biscuit works, various road humps and little Calcutta. Batley also completes my collection of R.L. drinking mugs (2 to be precise). Well for 50p you can't go wrong!

CHORLEY

Only someone experienced in Hampton Court maze can find Chorley's ground (which is why their crowds are so poor). It was built about 1815 to celebrate Waterloo, at least I think that's why they call it Victory Park: either that or somebody's got a REALLY cruel sense of humour.



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...... with Don Yates

THE CONVEYER belt of talent moving into professional rugby from local clubs is testament to the dedication and skills of a number of youth coaches in the Oldham area. One of these coaches is Joe Warburton who is currently coaching the Higginshaw under-13s team.

Joe was himself an outstanding youth player with Saddleworth Rangers. He played up at Greenfield from under-13s to under-18s before joining the highly successful Oldham Colts team which contained several players who went on to gain full test honours. Mick Worrall, Terry Flanagan, Andy Goodway and Ray Ashton were just a few of the star names in that team which lifted the Colts Premiership by beating Leeds 21-13 at Swinton as a curtain raiser to the 1980 Premiership Final. Warburton was a hooker in that team but he failed to gain first team recognition at Watersheddings.

When Joe realised that he was never going to be given a first team opportunity at Oldham he moved on loan to Carlisle. He

played the final seven matches of the 1982-83 season in the old First Division, the equivalent of today's Super League. Warburton came up against all the top hookers of that era and satisfied himself that he was equal to most. 'I matched them all except Brian Noble of Bradford', he said. When his loan spell was over Warburton returned to Watersheddings where the Roughveds slapped an exorbitant transfer fee on his head. Carlisle could not afford it. Warburton was still out of favour at Oldham so he packed in the professional game and went playing for Salem Hornets. It was whilst at Salem that Warburton took up coaching.

Four years later Joe was back playing professionally when, with a number of other local juniors he joined Mansfield Marksmen. That 1987-88 season was a sensational one for Warburton. He played in 32 matches and topped the club try scoring charts with ten touchdowns. "I really enjoyed my days at Carlisle and Mansfield', said Joe. 'At Carlisle I satisfied myself that I was good enough for first team rugby and underlined the fact with a brilliant spell at Mansfield.'

Joe's only regret about turning professional was that he missed out on an appearance in the Standard Cup Final by joining Oldham at 18. Now he has moved into coaching he hopes one day to coach a team in that final.

Joe would also love to coach professionally or to coach a BARLA international side at any level, be it youth, open age or maybe the British Students team. He certainly has the qualifications and also the respect of his fellow coaches. Warburton holds a senior grade coaching badge and is also a coach educator. That means he is qualified to coach coaches. You cannot get much higher than that.

One of the ambitions of the Roughyeds is to gain Super League status and attract all the top local juniors to the club. One way forward is to introduce a scholarship scheme and who better to overlook any youth policy than Joe Warburton whose dedication, enthusiasm and knowledge of local youth rugby is second to none.

ON THIS DAY . . . Don Yates looks back to May 6th yesteryear

ON SATURDAY 6th May 1911 Oldham met Wigan in the League Championship Final at Wheater's Field, Broughton. It was the fifth consecutive Championship Final involving Oldham who, after losing the first three, had lifted the trophy twelve months previously by beating Wigan. The pie-eaters, therefore, were seeking revenge and, having defeated the Roughyeds in a play-off to decide which club took top spot, they were confident of victory. Despite their earlier success, Wigan were decidedly second best when it mattered most and the Roughyeds retained the title by winning 20-7. Centre Jimmy 'Jumbo' Lomas was the star of the match, scoring two tries and three goals. Stand-off Tom White also scored two tries whilst a goal from hooker Joe Ferguson completed the scoring.

Eleven years later Wigan did gain revenge when, at the same Wheater's Field in Lower Broughton, on Saturday 6th May, Wigan defeated Oldham 13-2 In the 1922 Championship Final. It was a disappointing final, not only for Oldham followers, but for the vast majority of the 26,000 crowd who were treated to just one try. Oldham's points came from a second-half penalty landed by

winger Reg Farrar.

It was on this day in 1935, Monday 6th May, that a Rugby League XIII defeated France 25-18 at Headingley, Leeds. There were no Oldham players involved in that match but included in the League pack was Barrow second-row forward Alec Troup. An outstanding forward, Troup was a native of Maryport who also played for Cumberland, England and toured Australasia with the 1936 Lions when he appeared in two test matches. A feature of the match against France was the use of a substitute by the visitors some thirty years before substitutes became common practice in the game. French scrum-half Joseph Carrere was replaced by Pierre Germineau on this historic occasion.

Seventeen years later, on Tuesday 6th May 1952, a Rugby League XIII were in action again. That evening they met Oldham at Watersheddings and were beaten 18-8 by the Roughyeds in a match staged for the benefit of James Chalmers, the former Oldham stand-off. The Roughyeds scored six tries that evening, the scorers being outstanding members of the great Oldham team of the mid-fifties, Terry O'Grady, Billy Mitchell, Alan Davies, Jack Keith, Sid Little and Dick Cracknell.

Four years ago, on Tuesday 6th May 1997. the Paris St.Germain Super League club sacked their Australian coach Peter Mulholland after the team had suffered run of eight consecutive defeats. Mulholland was eventually replaced by the former Oldham forward and coach Goodway although their results and, probably more

significantly, their attendances did not improve sufficiently so they were withdrawn from the competition by Super League Europe.

Exactly ten years ago, on Monday 6th May 1991, the Barrow Island junior club visited Redhill for a Conference League fixture.Barrow Island won 30-16 with seven of their players appearing on the scoresheet. Five of those scorers have since turned professional and have turned out for the senior Barrow club. These are Guy Spenceley who scored a try, Mike Charles try, Darren Carter three goals, Colin Wassell try and Gary Westwood try. The other two Barrow Island try scorers were Nicky Rushton and Rowan Nicholson.
