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
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FORD FOCUS ... with Mike Ford

Michael's Match

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters from our Cumbrian visitors Workington Town. Our retrospective feature looks back to an encounter at Watersheddings on March 18th 1961.

Oldham were forced to reorganise their side after the late withdrawal of Bernard Ganley. The reshuffle saw Johnny Noon slot in the full back position with Vince Nestor coming in at centre.

Oldham started well and soon big Charlie Winslade was forcing his way over for a try despite the attention of three defenders. Shortly afterwards winger Bill Patterson capitalised on a good break by Alan Kellett to increase the lead with another try. Both the conversions were missed but on thirty two minutes Johnny Noon popped over a penalty goal to give the "Roughveds" an eight point advantage. Workington hit back five minutes later with a try from O'Neill with full back Lowden tacking on the extras. Oldham's star player on the day was the recently signed scrum half Jack Pycroft and just before the interval he scythed through the Town defence before handing on to Noon who avoided the tackle of Foord to touch down (see pic). Again the conversion went astray but Oldham turned round with a lead of eleven points to five.

Seven minutes into the second period Oldham were in again. This time hooker Peter Goddard swerved round several defenders to score near the posts. Noon converted to stretch the Oldham lead to eleven points. Workington responded when Moss gathered up a fumble by Kellett to put Gardner in the clear. Wingman McDowall got up in support to go over for an unconverted try. Town were now beginning to dominate the game but another Noon penalty goal on 61 minutes again stretched the homeside's lead. Back came the Cumbrians and after some clever inter-passing between Archer and Roper produced a try for the latter, converted by Brennan, with seven minutes still to play the Oldham fans no doubt began to get the jitters. Another Noon penalty on 76 minutes eased the tension before a last minute try from Patterson, after a superb cross kick from Alan Davies, ensured victory for Oldham by 23-13.

OLDHAM'S future looks rosy judging by the amount of talent coming through the Academy and Alliance teams.

One of the most exciting projects currently taking place at the club is the

development of a youth policy that is already starting to bear fruit, and will continue to do so for years to come if the club can build on the extensive groundwork that has been put in over the past couple of years.

With the backing of a forward thinking Chairman and board, Mike Ford, Mark Knight, chief scout John Jackson and Academy team manager Peter Beswick have done sterling work to set up a youth policy at the club, while new-boy Shaun Gartland has made a flying start to his new job as Academy coach with two huge wins against Barrow at Boundary Park and Chorley Lynx at Victory Park, both as curtain raisers.

The curtain raiser idea is a cracker. It provides supporters with two games for the price of one, it enables the young players to parade their skills on the big stage and it encourages more followers of the club to turn up early to take a look at the stars of tomorrow.

Between 300 and 400 fans arrived at Boundary Park early to watch the Oldham youngsters overwhelm Barrow 48-8 and by the time the game was well into the second half there were a lot more fans in the main stand.

So to Chorley and a scorching hot day which brought out scores of Oldham fans early to watch the Roughyeds under 18s burn up the Victory Park turf to score 15 tries and seven goals in a 74-8 hammering of the home side.

I arrived in the ground at 1.15pm - quarter of an hour after kick off and there were already loads of Oldhamers, sporting their club colours, sitting on the well-grassed bank which ran the full length of the popular side and reminded me of many an Australian ground.

Curtain raisers in the middle of winter

wouldn't go down as well as this. But at this time of year they are an ideal way of promoting Academy rugby league and at the same time impressing upon young players that there is more to playing Academy rugby than merely turning up with your boots on a Saturday to play in a game watched by merely a handful of proud parents and the proverbial dog.

No. Academy rugby is a serious business. It is, I suggest, an absolutely crucial element of any club's future and the Oldham club can be proud of the work that it has undertaken at this level so early in the Roughyeds infancy.

Not only has the club collected a talented bunch of young recruits, several of whom are already contracted to the club, but it has put together a team that is scoring freely and winning in style despite its tender years.

In the 17 man squad at Chorley, there were no fewer than nine players in the 16 or under age bracket, including newly signed Paul Bennett, James Kirkland and Adam Clayton and one of last year's signings, James Wilkinson, who is still only 16 despite playing regularly in the under 21s.

The 15 tries were scored by full back Matt Harland (2), Wilkinson, Bennett (2), Kiel Lancashire (2), Matt Williams (2), Rob Williams, Clayton, Adam Sharples and substitute John Mitchell, last season's captain of Waterhead under 16s, who scored a hattrick of tries to polish off the home defence.

Chris Carter (3), Mitchell (3) and Lancashire added goals as the Roughyeds ran riot.

Dare I say it....yes, I will. It reminded me of watching the Oldham Colts team in the 1980s when Terry Flanagan, Paddy Kirwan, Ray Ashton, Mick Worrall and Andy Goodway were smashing everything in sight.

They went on to become powers in the game and to form the backbone of an Oldham side that was to stay in the old first division for five consecutive seasons.

If the Roughyeds get a similar return for their investment, and there is no reason why they shouldn't, then the club's future will, indeed, be a bright one.

A GOOD week for Featherstone, Doncaster, Leigh, Oldham and Widnes who all recorded two victories. Workington and Whitehaven both played one and won one and - wait for it -Gateshead recorded their first win.

Pride of place goes to Featherstone with two excellent away wins at Barrow and Sheffield. At Craven Park they only secured victory in the last three minutes (two tries providing an unrealistic 38-22 scoreline). Jamie Rooney's five goals and two tries gave him a useful points haul to which he added another six goals at Sheffield. As expected this game was a fiery affair and ended with the double dismissal of Eagles' Ricky Wright and Bright Sodje as Rovers recovered from a 10-6 half time deficit to win 28-14.

Doncaster won comfortably in midweek with a 56-20 defeat of Chorley, but last Sunday Swinton pushed them all the way before the Dragons prevailed by 27-26 with an injury time try by fullback Johnny Woodcock, Swinton Coach Mike Gregory was an unhappy man, both with his team's performance and with a high tackle incident involving Paul Mansson which left Andy Cheetham with a broken jaw. And wouldn't you just know it would be Mansson's kick which led to the winning try.

League leaders Leigh had no trouble with Hunslet, winning 68-4 with Lee Sanderson registering four tries and three goals. Neil Turley added a hattrick for good measure. On Sunday, however, battling Barrow gave them a good run for their money before going down 12-28. Turley scored two more tries in a match described as 'explosive'. Five sin-bins and two on reports tend to support this view in a game of 23 penalties, which culminated in a mass brawl.

Oldham were hard pressed by Swinton in midweek before emerging 22-20 winners, this game featuring Paul Norton's best performance of the season. Sunday was somewhat easier as Chorley were overwhelmed 60-10 a Mark Sibson hattrick and 8 Pat Rich goals the highlights.

Widnes had two home wins to their credit. 72-4 defeat of Gateshead Phil saw Cantillon notch four tries and Ian Watson land 8 Vikings goals. The followed up by halting Rochdale's winning sequence with а surprising margin of 44-18. Chris Percival scored Phil Cantillon



three tries and Craig Weston one try and six goals for the Vikings, though stand off Richard Agar orchestrated the performance.

Of the Cumbrian clubs Whitehaven's win was a 30-4 demolition of under-strength Keighley at Cougar Park, while today's visitors Workington accounted for Batley 25-16 at Derwent Park. This was another fiery match (does the hot weather suddenly raise the players' temperature or what?), with Town loose-forward Anthony Samuel outstanding. Left wing Graeme Lewthwaite scored twice. The result kept Workington in the top eight while Whitehaven continue to threaten from 11th spot.

In other matches, Rochdale beat Hull KR at Spotland in a midweek fixture by 32-10, but the Robins bounced back to win at York 56-8 at the weekend when Alex Godfrey grabbed three tries and Chris Charles landed eight goals. Dewsbury got past Keighley 19-9 at Ram Stadium where depleted Cougars put up a spirited performance. And finally, Gateshead posted their first points with an emphatic 40-12 win at Hunslet. Second-row Jim Carlton scored a hattrick and inspirational skipper Carl Briggs landed six goals. Needless to say all connected with the Thunder were delighted.

Today throws up the usual array of tight fixtures. Widnes against Featherstone is the pick and could go either way though home advantage should count. The same should go for Oldham v Workington but it will be close. Hull K.R. v Dewsbury is another nail biter for play-off hopes, the Robins perhaps slight favourites. Barrow and Swinton is another tough call, but I'll plump for the Raiders. And Batley might push Doncaster all the way at Belle View. Gateshead at home to York will give the Thunder a second consecutive victory, while Rochdale will win easily at Chorley, Sheffield will defeat Hunslet and, finally, Leigh will win against Whitehaven who will be courageous in defeat.

Another Kiwi forward is LOKENE SAVELIO once on the books at Halifax Blue Sox and a formidable competitor.

Samoan winger FATA SINI is another well known face to Oldham followers. A frequent try scorer Sini has played for Salford, York and Doncaster. In the last two seasons at York and Doncaster he has been involved in sending off incidents, so there will be no love lost today.

In form loose-forward ANTHONY SAMUEL was a representative of the Cook Islands in the 2000 World Cup and is a relentless tackler and fine ball distributor. Ex-Widnes.

To blend with their overseas stars Town employ a fine collection of Cumbrian talent. The best known face belongs to wingman GRAEME LEWTHWAITE, a double try scorer last week and a man packing plenty of experience with Town and with Whitehaven after turning professional from Hensingham.

Opposite wing is JONATHAN HEANEY who played for Northampton R.U. while studying at Bedford University. His early experience, however, was with crack amateur outfit Ellenborough Rangers. At 21 he is still developing and is one to keep and eye on.

Centre JOHN ALLEN left Lowca to join Whitehaven and has since moved up the road to Workington. Packs plenty of punch.

Co-centre NEIL FRAZER is also ex-Whitehaven and loves to score. He will need to be well policed today.

At scrum half LEE ALLEN has benefited from Coach Gary Murdock's guidance and the ex-Lowca player is now the man in possession of the jersey and is determined not to be shifted.

Behind these at fullback is LYNTON STOTT a recent recruit from cash-strapped Doncaster. Stott was a member of the Sheffield Eagles squad which beat Wigan in the 1998 Challenge Cup Final and also appeared with Wakefield Wildcats. His pediaree speaks for itself.

Vying for the number 9 shirt are 20 year old OWEN WILLIAMSON a former Barrow lad who moved up the coast to get his opportunity, and the lively CARL SICE. Originally with Kells, Sice joined Town's Academy and has progressed from there.

HOYLES, a rangy back-row runner recruited from Ellenborough; JAMIE BEAUMONT a back converted to second-row and developed through the Academy side; CRAIG BARKER, also an Academy product; WILLIAM BLACKBURN, a winger turned packman from Egremont; and MATTHEW WOODCOCK.

Finally, Town have dependable backs in STEVE McGRADY, a former Kells and Whitehaven threequarter; MICKEY HORNER, ex-Halifax halfback; LEIGH SMITH another one time Whitehaven man out of Hensingham; and, last but not least, the ever dependable KEVIN HETHERINGTON a gifted goal-kicker and playmaker who has featured at Whitehaven, Seaton and top R.U. side Aspatia.

AS A youngster Saturday mornings used to be a period of anticipation of Oldham rugby's match later that day, almost regardless of where it was to be played, Watersheddings, Station Road, Central Park, Alt Park or even Parkside. Saturday was a day when most people worked the morning and watched the red and whites in the afternoon. Then Saturday football wasn't exclusive to the Latics, and unless the Roughyeds were away in Cumberland (yes Cumberland, not Cumbria) or perhaps on Humberside, Saturday afternoon was rugby league and if you wanted a decent view you were in the ground a good half hour before kick off. I can still in my

mind's eye picture the football specials, queuing from the junction of Ripponden Road and Huddersfield Road all the way to Watersheddings, passengers dropping off at unscheduled stops, Edward's Pie Shop, Brown's confectioner's, but more likely the Wellington or Black Horse.

Saturdays kept me going and they were what I looked forward to the whole of the week. Oldham's match, conquest or inquest, would then be the talking point until at least Wednesday, with Thursday and Friday allocated to forecasting the outcome of the next fixture.

Alas, nothing lasts forever and at the end of the sixties social habits changed to such an extent that they caused rugby league to pass through one of the worst periods of its history, and, in an attempt to arrest the decline, matches

attempt to arrest the decline, matches moved to Sundays. To me, Saturdays still remained sacrosanct and the amateur code a lifesaver.


To the point. That most excellent of establishments The Pump House People's History Museum, Manchester, is currently running an exhibition, 'ALL OUR SATURDAYS', Football and Rugby League playing an important part and many local clubs, including ourselves, providing the exhibition team with various pieces of sporting memorabilia. The Pump House is the only national museum dedicated to the lives of ordinary people, and as such, 'ALL OUR SATURDAYS' is much more than football or rugby league, it explores how from Victorian times working people in the north pushed for the right to at least a half day holiday on Saturday, and how they spent that precious freedom. The museum building itself is worth the visit but this is a superb story and the exhibition first class. Treat yourself, go and see.



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Cook(e)ing up a storm

WHATEVER the sport seven wins in twenty one days is a phenomenal achievement. But in a sport as intense and physically demanding as Rugby League it represents an achievement little short of miraculous. Both Barrow and Swinton, towards the end of this run, adopted spoiling tactics and played it hard and mean - which is no more than one should expect. That Oldham's players refused to succumb is a testament to their will power, to their physical conditioning, to their sheer bloody mindedness. And without ever being a 'dirty' team the thing I like best about Oldham is that they will not be intimidated. Truly, when the going gets tough, the tough get going. And, if the other players will forgive me for singling out some of their fellows, I would say that none exemplify this attitude better then the Gibbons twins, Jason Clegg and Phil Farrell, players who are largely unsung heroes but who front up week after week and match it with the best in the league. How little respect is paid to Oldham's squad is demonstrated by a glance at Rugby League World's players of the month chart where Roughyeds players barely rate a mention and NONE make the 'Team of the Month' selection. Whoever complied that little lot needs their bumps feeling!

All of which brought me to a few reflections of a wider vein. Looking at what these players do for a relative pittance evokes a stark comparison with Oldham Bears' Super League days. Given the levels of remuneration received by the former Bears' players, the current team put them to shame. I was going to say that the Bears had more skilful players, but given that they were full time professional I am not sure about even that. Let's face it if the former club had had the heart and the will to win of the current club then the history of Rugby league in Oldham would have been somewhat different.

So, if people will always watch a team of 'triers' isn't it about time the sporting public of Oldham got behind the side in greater numbers? And, for those who choose to criticise the current regime, which while not perfect (what organisation is?), is clearly doing a fantastic job without parallel anywhere else in the NFP, I would just ask where were you when Watersheddings was sold off; where were you when the previous club went bankrupt?

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
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Q. Where and when did you start playing rugby league?

I was seventeen years old when I started playing rugby at St. Anne's, Oldham, and it was Oldham who signed me on as a professional when I was nineteen. I had a great time at Oldham for five years until Featherstone came in with Peter Fox as coach and paid Oldham £100.000 which I believe was a record at that time. I staved at 'Fey' for about five years and then moved onto Swinton, eventually coming back to Oldham where I have always felt at home.

Q. Are there any players you have played with or against that you remember for any reason?

Playing with Brendon Tuuta was something a 'pro' never forgets: he has an attitude that is awesome. His training schedule is very impressive and he concentrates 100% on whatever he sets his mind to.

I think some of the toughest opponents I have played against are players of the calibre of Steve Roach, Kevin Tamati and of course Les Boyd whose physical presence on the pitch gives off an aura of strength, intimidation and power.

Q. What about happy memories?

Oh ves, there are plenty. I remember when Terry Flanagan was given the job of putting together an Irish squad for a Charity Shield game in Dublin: we had to pay our own fare, buy our own kit, you name it, we did it but we had a great time and still keep in touch. I remember Old Trafford in a Premiership Final with Oldham when we were down and out and losing by umpteen points at half time, but we came back some how in the second half, got stuck in, clawed our way back and won the game. The atmosphere was electric and the fans wonderful. It was great.

Q. I know you have a lovely wife and five young sons, haw do you fit everything in?

Fortunately I have the best wife, ever, my sons are fine and two of them play rugby, so that's not a bad start. I play rugby because I love it, I dearly want to get to the Grand Final with Oldham. We have a great squad of players and Mike is a coach who is going places, he is really thorough. Did you know when I played football for the Oldham Town team, under 15s I went on a European Tour and one of the players was Mike Ford? He was a good footballer, a brilliant scrum half and he is a great coach.

Q. So what about the future?

Well I am feeling fit now and itching to get back. Hopefully we'll have a good run up to the end of the season and the play-offs. There is some great support for the team so let's hope we can all put Oldham on the map once again, and all for the right reasons.



KEIGHLEY COUGARS

Cougar Park has the inevitable slope and is a tight little ground with the crowd right on top of the play. It is also the most picturesque ground in the NFP set against the back drop of the Yorkshire moors and dales. If you avoid the motorway and travel via Halifax or Hebden Bridge it is also one of the nicest places to drive to (as long as you avoid the Bronte country tourist buses). Once upon a time, of course, you strolled down Larkholme Lane which was very atmospheric, but these days that pleasure is denied by a town centre by-pass and Bradford (or Dales) link road (depending which way you are travelling) where you take your life into your hands to cross - which is why all Cougars promotion is aimed at the young because the old codgers aren't quick enough to get to the ground anymore. The ground itself has decent facilities: you can get a good pint and a tasty dish of pie and peas. Keighley also boasts one of the finest breweries in England in Timothy Taylor's. The town itself is a bit like the land that time forgot, but all in all I'm struggling to slag Keighley off - except, of course, they no longer have a team!

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THE League Express National Cup Final takes place on Bank Holiday Monday, 28th May at Spotland Stadium, Rochdale, kick off 3.00pm. It is an intriguing final between Thatto Heath Crusaders and Featherstone Lions. Many observers consider that Thatto Heath just cannot fail to lift the trophy. 'Their name is on the cup', they say about a club who, at times, have ridden their luck in this cup campaign but who have also pulled off some superb victories and all against opposition from a higher division than that in which they play.

Thatto Heath's cup run almost ended before it had even begun. They entertained West Bowing in round one and at the end of that tie referee Paul Barrett was convinced that the visitors had won 26-24. In actual fact the scores were level at 24 apiece

but by the time the correct scoreline had been established, West Bowling were in the showers and the playing of extra time was impractical. It was decided that the match be replayed in St. Helens where another close encounter resulted. Thatto Heath made the most of their reprise and edged through 14-11. Their reward for that victory was a trip to Woolston Rovers and a truly magnificent 15-10 victory. In round three Thatto Heath visited Eastmoor where they turned in another impressive performance. Winger Mike Woods raced in for a hattrick of tries in that match including a spectacular length-of-the-field effort. Next up were Saddleworth Rangers and, here again, Thatto Heath rode their luck. It took a controversial, injury time try from club chairman Chris Honey to squeeze Thatto Heath through 12-10. The Crusaders did not need any luck in their quarter-final tie at St. Anne's where they played magnificently to win 19-10. Scrum half Barry Ashall and a terrific defensive display were the cornerstones of that victory. Luck did play a part in another great victory at Siddal in the semi-final. It was a tough battle in freezing wet conditions but decisions went their way and a 12-6 victory ensued.


Their opponents, Featherstone Lions, have had a relatively comfortable passage through to the final. They began with two home ties, which they were expected to win easily. Cottingham Tigers were duly dispatched 32-0 and St. Judes brushed aside 32-12 before the Lions faced a tricky tie away to Championship chasing Eccles. The Lions turned in an excellent performance at Hallsworth Road where full back Lee Senior scored a try, two conversions and a couple of penalties in Featherstone's 20-6 victory. A home guarter-final tie against Oulton was expected to be close and so it was, with the experience of loose-forward, player-coach Simon Tufts proving decisive. He inspired the Lions to a 14-6 victory and gave them the belief that they could overcome West Hull in the semi-final. That semi-final was played on a heavy pitch which did not suit the Humberside giants who are, in my view, the best amateur team in the country. But take nothing away from Featherstone who defended magnificently and attacked enthusiastically during the first period when they scored both their tries. Full-back Lee Senior was again inspirational with his reliable defence and excellent field kicking not to mention his three decisive goals in Featherstone's 14-10 victory.

So to the final which really could go either way. It promises to be a cracking game and, indeed, a cracking atternoon with the entertainment starting at 12.30 before the big kick off at 3.00pm. Admission is \pounds 4, \pounds 1 concessions, so is great value for money and an afternoon not to be missed if at all possible.

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ON THIS DAY ... Don Yates looks back to May 20th yesteryear

ELEVEN years ago Saddleworth Rangers ended their first season of Conference League rugby by winning promotion to the Premier Division and almost made it a double celebration following their appearance in the National Cup Final. Unfortunately that final, which was staged at Knowsley Road, St. Helens on Sunday 20th May 1990, ended in defeat against Egremont Rangers who won 11-4. Prop forward Gary Dobbs scored the Saddleworth try in that final whilst at looseforward for Rangers was the Roughveds' director Sean Whitehead.

Thirty eight years ago, season 1962-63, was another outstanding era for Rangers. During that campaign Saddleworth won both the Standard Cup and the Lancashire Cup but on Monday 20th May 1963 they crashed to a home defeat in the Oldham shock Championship play off when Higginshaw won a semi-final tie at Greenfield by 18 points to two. Of course, shock results are part and parcel of cup-tie rugby and add to the excitement of the occasion. The result of the 1972 Championship Final was something of a surprise considering the build-up to the match which was staged at Station Road, Swinton on Saturday 20th May. St. Helens had won the Challenge Cup seven days previously by beating a full strength Leeds team and were expected to triumph again following the withdrawal of the Leeds quartet of Syd Hynes, Keith Hepworth, Bill Ramsey and Bob Haigh.

Saints led 3-2 at half time before prop Terry Clawson, later to join Oldham, added а touchline penalty to his earlier goal and then a touchline similar conversion to John Atkinson's try as Leeds recovered to win 9-5. Former Oldham loose forward Derek Turner was the Leeds' coach that year whilst another local connection in that final came in the shape referee Sam of Shepherd.

Leeds first won the Championship in 1961 after they had been losing finalists on no fewer than five previous occasions. An Odsal crowd of 52,177 saw them defeat Warrington 25-10 on Saturday 20th May 1961. Included in the Warrington line up that afternoon was the former St. Mary's and Oldham winger Terry O'Grady but there was Sam Sheperd also a local connection with



the winning team who had another former Oldham winger, Joe Warham, as their football manager.

The 1962 British Lions party which toured Australasia did not include any players from Oldham although assistant manager Arthur Walker (Rochdale Hornets) later enjoyed a spell as the Roughyeds' chairman. Workington Town, however, provided three players and all three appeared in the opening tour fixture against Western Australia. That match took place on Sunday 20th May in the rugby outpost of Perth and attracted the smallest attendance of the Australian section of the tour, a mere 2,842. Britain won the match 39-12 with Workington winger Ike Southward, back with Town after a spell at Watersheddings, scoring two of the nine British tries. The other two Workington tourists who played that afternoon were prop Norman Herbert, whose son Steve later played for Oldham, and second-row forward Bryan Edgar.

On a slightly lower level, twelve months ago, on Saturday 20th May 2000, the Manchester Knights defeated Derby City 56-0 in a Rugby League Summer Conference fixture. They ran in a dozen tries through Lee Baker, Martin Fitton, Ryan Knight (2), Chris Beck (2), John Webster (3) and Paul Lord (3), his three coming in a nine minute spell, with Lord also landing four goals. The Knights play Derby again next Saturday when a much closer encounter it envisaged. Medlock Leisure Centre, Droylsden is the venue, kickoff 2.30pm.

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


