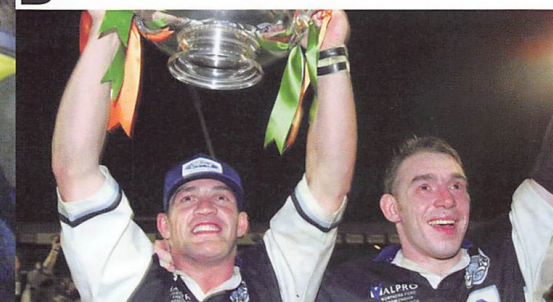

# Finals were just Grand



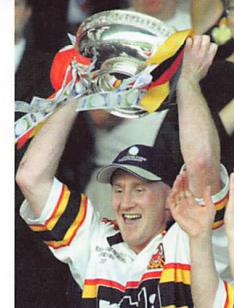
Great NFP Grand Finals of previous seasons are recalled by **TIM BUTCHER** of TotalRL.com

**T**HE two great clubs that will do battle today for the ultimate prize have a hard act to follow. The Northern Ford Premiership Grand Final has an unerring habit of producing all that is best about sport - passion, drama, skill, bravery and an unquenchable commitment to the cause.

The Grand Final is the type of event that confirms my faith in Rugby League as the greatest of sports. Having been fortunate enough to be present at all three finals so far, I never want to miss one.

The first, in 1998, was billed as a night to remember... and it was just that. Wakefield Trinity edged their arch rivals Featherstone Rovers 24-22 at the McAlpine Stadium.

A heart-stopping 80 minutes of football was only decided four minutes from time by a Francis Stephenson try, which was coolly converted by Garen



Casey. And this only minutes after Karl Pratt had been called back from scoring a seemingly match-clinching try for a knock-on by Asa Amone 60 metres back down the field.

1999 was no less dramatic, as Hunslet Hawks bettered Minor Premiers Dewsbury Rams by a single point, 12-11.

A 62nd-minute Jamie Leighton field goal decided the game at Headingley.

And last year we enjoyed a magnificent afternoon at Gigg Lane, Bury, when once again one point was all that could

separate two passionate sides. This time round, Richard Agar produced the field goal for Dewsbury as they held off the Leigh Centurions by 13-12.

Such is the determination to come out on top on these occasions, no more than two points has ever separated NFP Grand Finalists.

But who will win today? I wouldn't be daft enough to try and predict it.

The old adage that you have to lose a Grand Final to win one - which Dewsbury proved in 1999 and 2000 - is certainly of no use to us today, with both sides taking part in their first final. On the evidence of both side's comebacks in the Major semi-finals, we can be sure there will be no surrender from either team.

I'm just sure they will do us proud in showcasing all that is good about Rugby League.

# Northern Ford Premiership **REVIEW** 2000-2001

**It's Leigh's league and woe for the Wasps after a thrilling season of high drama and big changes**

**T**HE third season of the Northern Ford Premiership has seen standards rise to a new high level. Here, **GARETH WALKER** takes you back over the 2000-2001 highlights step by step and club by club.

**LEIGH CENTURIONS** finished the regular Northern Ford Premiership season nine points ahead of their nearest rivals after a stunning campaign under coach Paul Terzis.

With Neil Turley, Simon Svabic and Simon Baldwin prominent on their long list of key contributors, the Centurions were undefeated at Hilton Park in the league campaign and scored well over 1,000 points.

**WIDNES VIKINGS** secured second place on the final day of the season, having made great strides in the aftermath of Neil Kelly replacing David Hulme as coach midway through the campaign.

After making a number of impressive signings, the Vikings lost just one league game with Kelly in charge, and had key performers in Martin Crompton, Phil Cantillon and Simon Knox.

**ROCHDALE HORNETS** were undoubtedly the competition's biggest improvers. Under rookie coach Martin Hall, they progressed from 13th place in 2000 to third in 2001, despite Hall taking over the reigns just three weeks before the start of the season. Marlon Billy was a

prolific try-scorer, while captain Brendan O'Meara and prop Danny Sculthorpe also made the All Stars Team.

Hornets were only separated from fourth-placed **OLDHAM** by points difference, after the Roughyeds lost at Hull KR in the final league game of the season. But, overall, it was another outstanding year for Mike Ford and the Roughyeds, who came undefeated through a spell of seven games in 21 days in April and May.

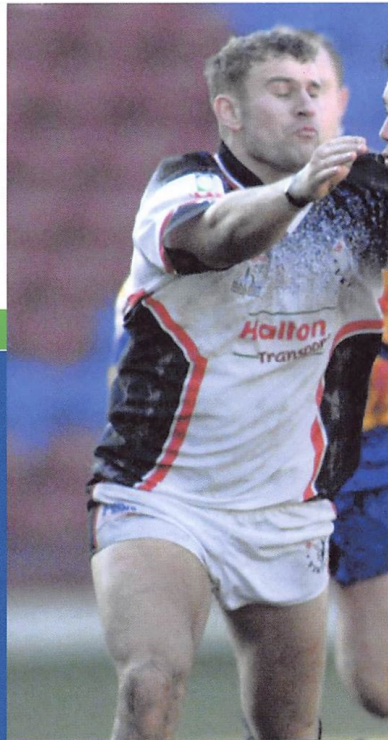
In fifth place for the third consecutive year were **FEATHERSTONE ROVERS**, who looked a good bet for the top four before losing a handful of crucial games in the second half of the season.

Last year's champions **DEWSBURY RAMS** suffered from a mid-season exodus to Widnes that saw coach Kelly and several important players depart. They never really recovered, although they did string together an impressive run of results late in the league campaign.

**HULL KR** finished as strongly as anyone, with seven wins from their last eight games, and will look forward to next season with great relish after a season of improvement under another coach who took over at short notice, Gary Wilkinson.

**KEIGHLEY COUGARS** enjoyed, and suffered, a rollercoaster of a season. They began by challenging for the Minor Premiership, lost almost their entire first team squad, then recovered with a group of young, enthusiastic players who guided them into a play-off place.

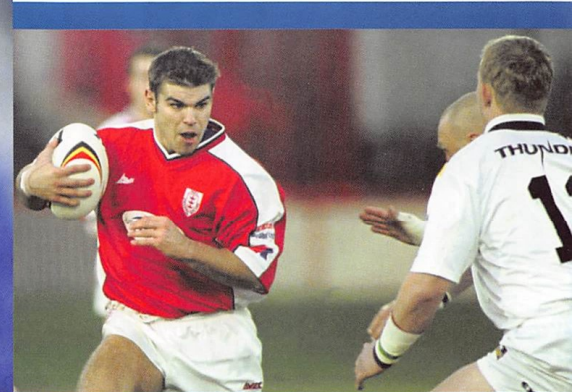
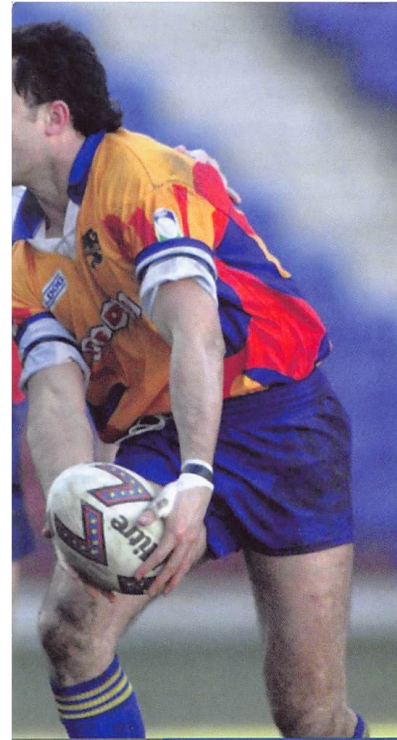
The two West Cumbrian neighbours, **WORKINGTON TOWN** and **WHITEHAVEN** both narrowly missed out on a top-eight spot, but both have

player-defections halfway through the year, which severely dented their play-off aspirations. Even then, they recovered to become the first side to defeat Leigh. But a desperately disappointing end to the season confined them to 12th place.

**BATLEY BULLDOGS** had three coaches during the season, but appear to be developing some stability now under their latest boss, Paul Storey. Performances late in the campaign suggest an upturn in fortunes at Mount Pleasant.

**BARROW BORDER RAIDERS** will soon welcome Cameron Bell as their new coach after Paul Charlton paid the price for some disappointing results and the lack of a top-eight challenge.

**SWINTON LIONS** and **HUNSLET HAWKS** both turned to youth after being forced to release high-profile players for financial reasons.

Their principle reasons to be cheerful centre around their talented young stars, notably the Lions' Mick Nanyan

and **DONCASTER DRAGONS** were another side hit by mass

and Craig Ibbotson of the Hawks. **GATESHEAD THUNDER**'s first season in the NFP was a largely disappointing affair, but a couple of wins towards the end of the season will have given them real hope for next year, and they achieved their main objective in surviving.

The competition's bottom two was again made up of **YORK WASPS** and **CHORLEY LYNX**, with the Wasps this time round collecting the unwanted wooden spoon after a year of turmoil.

December saw a promising-looking squad starting the campaign for the Wasps, but many of their players soon left amid a financial crisis.

Coach Lee Crooks even had to pull on the boots to avoid the club being given a potentially crippling fine at their lowest point.

The Lynx also had a few afternoons to forget, but they have long-term plans in place to turn around their recent disappointments.

And at least they avoided bottom place this time.



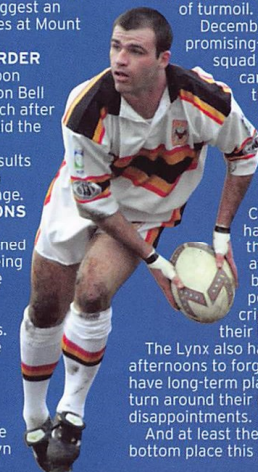
tremendous reason for optimism after progression in 2001.

# The comeback kings

**T**HE NFP finals series has once again provided a stunning end to the season. The play-offs got off to a remarkable start when fourth-placed Oldham recorded a shock 15-14 win at Minor Premiers Leigh Centurions.

Keith Brennan's field goal proved to be the difference between the two sides, although the Roughyeds' player-coach Mike Ford turned back the clock with an outstanding display from scrum-half.

In the other Preliminary Semi-final, Widnes Vikings defeated Rochdale Hornets 34-24 in a thrilling game at the Auto Quest.

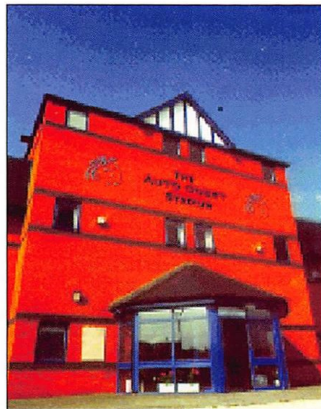

Led the predominantly young Sheffield side with distinction from the centre of the field. Richard was a controlling influence throughout the year for the Eagles.



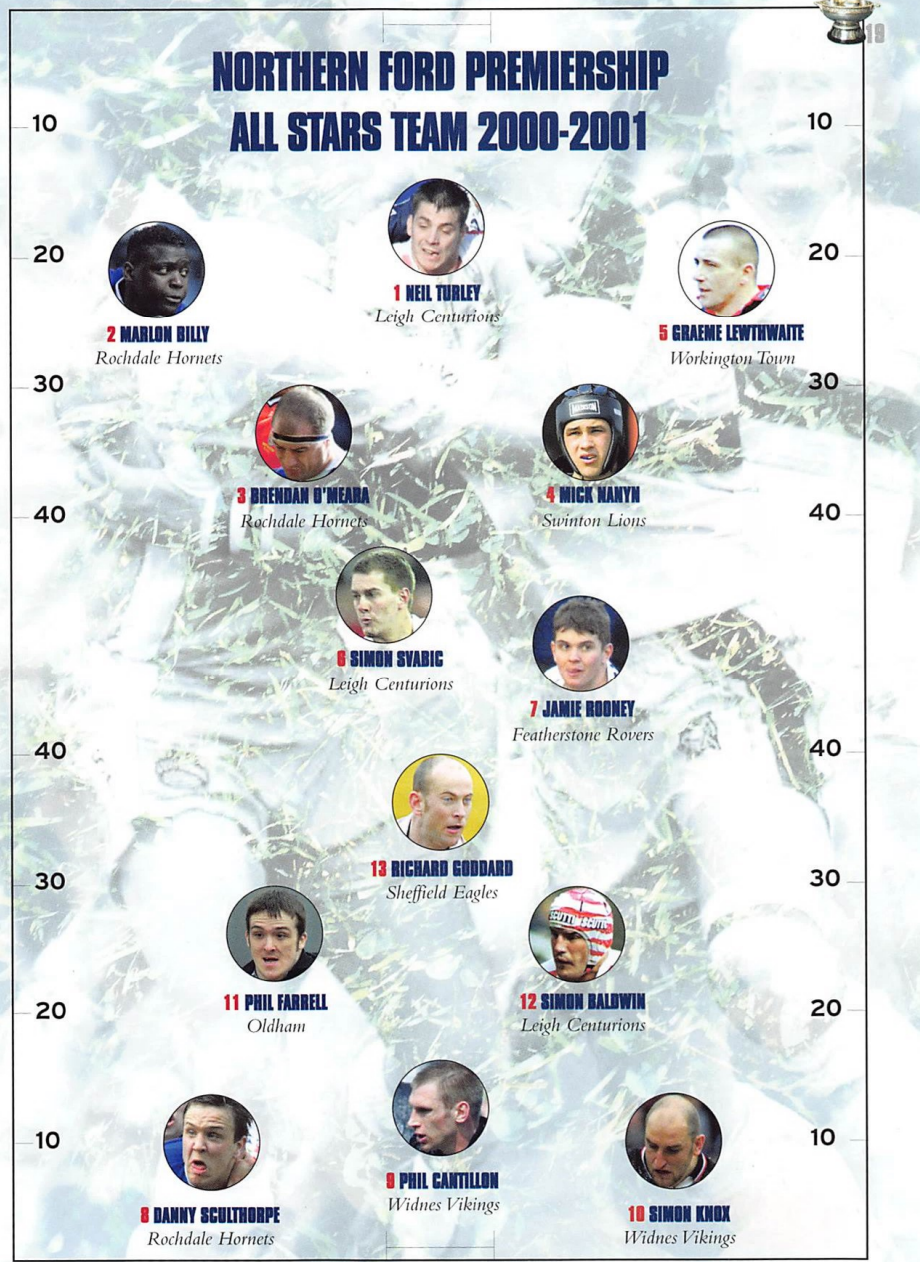

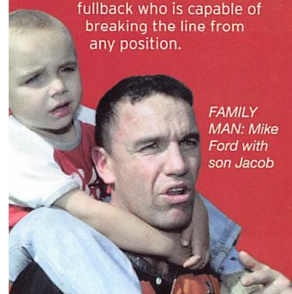
### DAVID GIBBONS

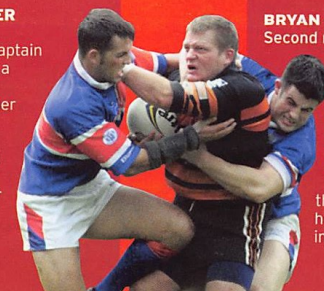

**ANDREW CRAIG**

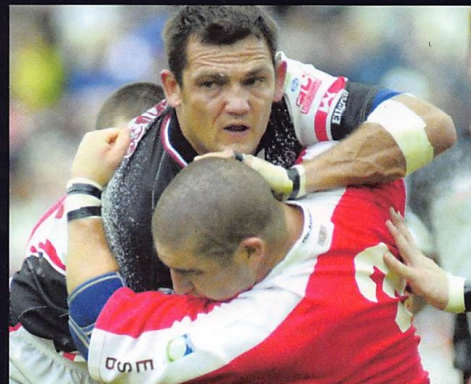
**Centre**

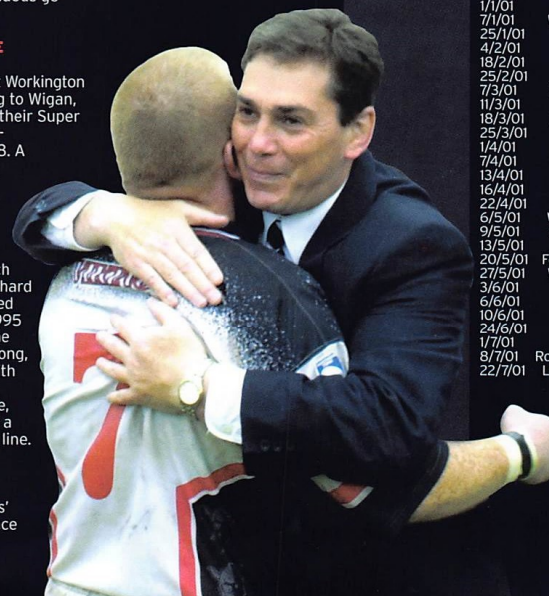

## IT'S CHILD'S PLAY

**TODAY'S** curtain-raiser consists of a Mini-League exhibition by teams from the west of the Pennines.

Mini-League is the game of Rugby League in its cut-down form specially designed to make the basic skills of the game more learnable for very young children.

The numbers on each team are reduced to nine, which means that individual children get more chances to practice their skills - they get the ball more, they get the opportunity to pass more, make more

tackles, run with the ball and become used to playing in a team environment. The ball is much smaller - a size three; and the pitch is in scale with the age and size of the kids, roughly half a full-size Rugby League pitch.

There are other rule differences designed to develop League skills in juniors.

The result is a game that is much more fun for all children and Mini-League is now mandatory for all teams at under-9s age group in Great Britain & Ireland.
