





GARETH BARBER - 20 year old Oldham born stand-off who was reared on rugby with his best pal, the Leeds and Great Britain forward Kevin Sinfield. When Sinfield signed for Rhinos, Barber signed for Warrington, but returned 'home' to Oldham before the start of last season. Seven Roughyeds first team appearances behind him. Played for the NFP under 21s at Widnes in the autumn.

PAUL NORTON - Journeyman forward and former Lancashire Lynx stalwart, who played in 31 of Oldham's 34 games last season. A hard worker and value-for-money performer, 'Knocker' will be missed in the first few weeks of the new season while he recovers from a groin operation.

JOE McNICHOLAS - One of the original 1997 Roughyeds, wingman Joe made a first team spot his own midway through last season and went on to score eight tries in 14 consecutive appearances. Fast off the mark and good on his feet.

DANNY GUEST - another of the Roughveds 'originals' who returned to the club two seasons ago. A big prop, he is expected to be a force in the NFP this season after signing a new, one-year deal. JASON CLEGG - Second biggest forward at the club, behind Guest, Jason is a former Bradford (Northern, not Bulls) forward, who has had four good seasons with Oldham. Powerful on the break, he is a people's favourite, who regularly picks up Junior Roughyeds player of the year awards. ANTHONY GIBBONS - formed a reliable centre partnership last season with goalkicking Pat Rich, who has now left the club to go on a 12 month world tour. Looks certain to be first-choice centre again, although he will miss the first two league games of the new campaign because of suspension.

DAVID GIBBONS - Anthony's twin. The brothers have moved around together throughout their rugby league careers with Leeds, Bramley and now Oldham. Vicecaptain last season, stand-off David has been appointed one of TWO Oldham captains this term (now that's a turn up for the books) and is sure to be one of coach Mike Ford's leading lights.

MARK SIBSON - quick fullback who loves nothing better than to attack from deep. Joined Oldham on a 2 year contract when he left Bramley at the same time as boss Mike Ford, the Gibbons boys and Andy Proctor, and has recently signed a new one year deal.

PHIL FARRELL - the `other' Oldham captain in a new move that Ford believes will work well to the benefit of the entire squad. Phil, younger brother of Wigan and GB's Andy Farrell, didnt miss a match last season and, in his two seasons with the Roughyeds, has a remarkable record of consistency. Played for the NFP under-21s against their Super League counterparts at Widnes.

NEIL RODEN - a clever half-back who joined Oldham from Wigan, with Farrell, a season and a half ago. Has only missed a couple of games since. Can play stand-off or scrumhalf and was a key figure in Oldham's run through to the NFP Grand Final last summer. A knee injury kept him out of the pre-season warm-up games, but he is sure to be a regular performer in the long and testing 2002 campaign.

BRYAN HENĂRE - Joined Oldham midway through last season from St Helens on Ioan. A Kiwi back-rower who has played for Auckland Warriors, Henare played a prominent role in Oldham's surge to the Grand Final in July 2001 before signing permanently for the club fort 2002 on a oneyear contract.

GAVIN JOHNSON - a young centre or wing, or occasional back-row forward, Oldhamer Gavin spent two seasons at Odsal in the Bradford Academy side and made the occasional appearance for the Bulls in the Alliance Championships. Spent almost a season earning his Oldham spurs in the Alliance team before signing a two-year deal last September.

KEVIN MANNION - a former Rochdale Hornets and Great Britain students forward from Wigan. Kevin has had two good seasons with the Roughyeds, despite being unlucky with injuries. He missed the start of last season with a pulled hamstring,

received in training and he is again on the sidelines now after damaging a shoulder in pre-session gym work. He should be ready by the end of January. SIMON KNOX - one of a handful of new recruits for 2002. Simon made his name with Bradford Bulls and Widnes Vikings before signing for the Roughyeds in September. He was an outstanding player for Widnes against Oldham in the senior citizen on the Oldham dressing room, Leo played for Oldham (the Bears variety), Featherstone, Swinton and Rochdale before rejoining his hometown club three seasons ago. Has just signed a new one-year deal.

WILL COWELL - a 21 year old from Warrington, this Cumbrian utility back is equally at home at full-back, wing or centre. Played 18 Super League games

Grand Final at Spotland last July and it was soon after the final that Mike Ford started the overtures to sign him. KEITH BRENNAN - a versatile half-back or hooker, local lad Keith shot to prominence last season when his form was so good that, for a time, he kept John Hough out of the No 9 shirt. A natural footballer with good hands, he damaged a hamstring in the pre-season Law Cup game with Rochdale and is unlikely to be ready for a few more weeks yet.

TOMMY HODKINSON - much travelled and vastly experienced back-row forward, Tommy joined the Roughveds from Widnes a week after his Auto Quest Stadium team mate Simon Knox had followed a similar path. Did well in the Oldham warm-up games and is expected to be a key figure in Ford's plans. GAVIN DODD - A local youngster who is learning the ropes under Ford's tutelage. A wing or full-back, the 20 year old Gavin played for the NFP under-21s at Widnes and is sure to be pushing for a regular spot this season, either as competition for Mark Sibson at full back or as a lively winger, who knows how to get to the line. LEE DORAN - Another young player in

LEE DORAN - Another young player in whom Ford has a lot of confidence. A Wiganer, Lee has worked his way through the Oldham academy and alliance sides and is now on the verge of breaking through to the first team on a regular basis. Showed up well for the NFP under-21s, one of five Oldham players in the squad.

LEO CASEY - Goes better with keeping, as the old saying goes. Aged 36, and the JOHN HOUGH

JOHN was the first player to sign for his home town club when the new Roughyeds were formed by Chris Hamilton and his fellow directors in the autumn of 1997. Before the start of last season, he had played in 87 of the club's 90 matches and had scored 32 tries, a phenomenal record for a hooker. He didn't enjoy one of his better seasons in 2001, but a change of job, and less travelling, should see him back at his best in 2002

for Warrington after signing from Kells, the Whitehaven amateur club. Recommended to Ford by former Wolves boss Daryl van de Velde, Cowell is keen to kick-start his career in the NFP. JOHN BRADDISH - signed from St Helens on long-term loan. Top goal kicker in the Alliance Championships last season and also leading points scorer in that competition. Wanted a change of club because of limited senior opportunities at Knowsley Road and he turned down several other offers to join Oldham where he can develop his halfback skills under Mike Ford. JON GODDARD - a 19 year old and the youngest member of the squad. Cas lad Jon joined Oldham on loan from Castleford thanks to the old pals act. Graham Steadman is a firm friend and former team mate of Ford and 'Steady' is looking to his old mate to bring Goddard along and develop his skills in the NFP.

Today we entertain Oldham here at Craven Park, where links between our two clubs seem to have been intertwined since the last world war. The focal points being the three cup semi finals in 1964 when after three tremendous matches the Robins finally got through to Wembley by beating Oldham 12 points to 2 in the final match at Huddersfield's old Fartown stadium.

This after much heartbreak and disappointment for both sets of supporters as at times, both clubs looked to have booked their places at Wembley during these three epic encounters.


One of the all time greats in our sport commenced his career at Craven Park before moving on to the Watersheddings, Oldham's traditional home, before ending his career with Wakefield Trinity. The man in question was of course Derek (Rocky) Turner who signed for Hull Kingston Rovers in 1951 from Ossett and made his debut for the club under the guise of A.N.O in a early evening fixture at Bramley on the 5th

September 1951, which the Robins lost by 6 points to 2. Rovers due to injuries put a very weak team out that night but it is still interesting to note the players on duty in Turner's debut match, they were: Sutton; Briggs, Lewis, Payne, Cornforth; Butler, Daddy; Palframan, Tong, Moore, Foster, Scholes and A.N.O (Turner). Derek Turner made a total of 141 appearances for the Robins scoring 27 tries. His last match in the famous red and white jersey was the away match at Leeds on the 24th August 1955 in a 30 points to 11 defeat. He was transferred to Oldham on the 27th August 1955 for a fee in the region of £2,500.

He went on to play a total of 131 games for our visitors and was part of the successful Oldham side of the late 1950s before being transferred to Wakefield Trinity for £8,000, and finishing his career there. He again played a major part in their triumphs of the early 1960s. He played a total of 213 games for the Belle Vue club scoring 45 tries, before retiring from the game at the end of 1966 to run his own haulage business. Among other well known players to have played for both clubs were Welshman Bryn Goldswain who was part of that famous Rovers back three in the early post-war years of Atkinson, Goldswain and Docker. Two of our 1980 cup-winning side, Clive Sullivan and Brian Lockwood, both moved

to Oldham for the start of the 1980/81 season although neither stayed with the Lancashire club very long. At that time Geoff Clarkson who was a valuable squad member of our 1978/79 first division championshipwinning squad was also with Oldham. Two other explayers from Craven Park to have had a spell with today's visitors were Terry Clawson and Terry Ramshaw. As to matches between our clubs, apart from the above cup semi

finals of 1964 which were covered in detail in an earlier programme against Oldham, one also recalls the Second Division premiership final of 1990, which was played at Old Trafford. The Robins had won the Second Division title but in their three league defeats that season two had been against Oldham losing 12 points to 4 at the Watersheddings in October and then succumbing 9 points to 6 at Craven Park the following January. The Robins had arrived at Old Trafford by comprehensively beating Fulham (as London Broncos were then called) 40 points to 6 and Dewsbury by 36 points to 8, both matches being played at Craven Park. The down side however was that captain Mike Smith was declared unfit to play with an Achilles tendon injury and that half-backs Wayne Parker and David Bishop were both still carrying knocks going into the game.



The match looked sewn up in Rover's favour at halftime with the Robins leading by 23 roints to 8 and when Des Harrison scored a further try which, with Mike Fletcher's conversion his 199th goal of the season made it 29-8 shortly after the interval it looked all over. However Oldham had other ideas and five second half tries, only one of them improved, put them in

front 30-29 and secured them an amazing victory, despite late Rovers pressure which threatened to rescue the game.

The sides that day were Hull Kingston Rovers: Lightfoot, Clark, Fletcher, Austin, Sullivan, Parker, Bishop, Niebling, Rudd, Ema, Harrison (D), Thompson and Lyman. Subs: Irving and Armstrong.

Oldham: Platt, Irving, Hyde, Henderson, Lord, Clark, Ford, Casey, Ruane, Fieldhouse, Round, McAllister and Russell. Subs Martyn and Newton. The Robin's scorers were Parker (2), Clark, Lyman and Harrison with tries, Fletcher landing 4 goals and Parker scoring a drop goal. For Oldham-Lord, Henderson, Ford, Irving, Ruane and Martyn all crossed the whitewash with Hyde managing 3 goals. Mr. R. Whitfield of Widnes controlled the match. Another clash worth recalling is the First division fixture


played at the Watersheddings on the 11th November 1984. Rovers were on their way to winning the championship, but at the time the match was

played Oldham led the table, and the Robins were going into the match on the back of three straight defeats. The game attracted an attendance of nearly 8,000; this was Oldham's best league gate for nearly 20 years and marked the debut of Gavin Miller the Robins' Australian loose forward.

The result on this occasion was never in doubt as Rovers turned on a terrific display of open football to win the match by 31 points to 5.

The two teams were - Oldham: Caffrey, Nadiole, Parish, Foy, M. Taylor, P. Taylor, Kirwan, Morgan, McCurrie, Goodway, Platt, Phelan and Worrell.

The match marked the debut of Rovers' new Australian loose forward Gavin Miller.

Rovers: Fairbairn, Clark, Robinson, Prohm, Laws, Smith (M), Harkin, Broadhurst, Watkinson, Ema, Burton, Kelly and Miller. Subs Lydiat and Hogan. The Referee was Mr K. Spencer of Warrington. Mike Smith was adjudged to be Rovers best player but Gavin Miller also had a very impressive debut. Rovers had tries from Prohm (2), Smith, Kelly and Harkin with Fairbairn landing 5 goals and Harkin adding a drop goal, whilst Oldham had a try from Mike Taylor and a drop goal from Parish.

Sir John Stevens. Karrot, which is mostly Government funded, is expected to save around £1.5 million in its first two years by cutting time spent by police and other agencies on crime and the fallout from crime. More than 50 commercial organisations are involved including London Knights Ice Hockey, London Broncos Rugby League, Bubble Theatre Company, Millwall Football Club, London Towers Basketball and Surrey County Cricket Club.Does it make you wish you'd been bad, or feel like doing something daft. Would it not save a lot more money if parents made sure their kids behaved in the first place?


Congratulations to Psycho... RED BY/H FOR EVER PAUL FLEECH Still crazy after all these years...

But amazingly Paul is now easily Rovers' longest serving player ... We managed to catch up with him last Monday - after the Swinton game. 


Language


