



# As we welcome Oldham today it is an appropriate time to mention the current situation regarding our future stadium requirements here in Workington.

The current Oldham Directors' have done a marvellous job in creating a new and thriving club from the wreckage of the Super League days. The one thing which was beyond their control however was ownership of their home ground. Once you lose your ground it becomes very difficult to regain control of your own situation.

All too often neighbouring clubs will seek to take advantage and charge unjustified levels of rent.

In Oldham's case it seems that despite great support from the Local Authority, the local soccer club were not willing to cooperate in ground sharing at an affordable level.

We have also seen the situation with Swinton who left their true home some years ago and have suffered ever since.

The difficulty is that although clubs usually recognise the advantages of retaining their original ground, finances can all too often force a change. Many stadiums, like our own, were built fifty years ago when the economics of the game were different and building costs not quite so enormous.

It has been difficult to make enough improvements over the years and we are now in the era of the modern super stadium.

The challenge for us is to come up with the right solution which I think everyone accepts has to be

within Workington itself. The advantage of Derwent Park is

that it is effectively "ours" with a long lease of the land which is virtually permanent and therefore it generates income for us to run the club e.g. Bar Revenue and Speedway rents as well as our own gate receipts.

The disadvantage is the tremendous cost of upgrading the facilities which is totally beyond the resources of the club itself.

Fortunately for us, the leadership of Allerdale Council is firmly committed to working with us to find the right solution and provide facilities of which the area will be proud.

We are going to be working together over the coming months, not as opposing interests but in seeking the same aim.

In the meantime, enjoy today's game and let's keep the old stadium as a fortress as far as visiting teams are concerned.

On the playing side, it was good to achieve a Cup win against Toulouse last week. No-one knew quite what standard they would be and in the end it was a reasonably comfortable victory. It might have been nice to get a little bit of applause from the Rugby League top brass who sat in the Visiting Directors Box, but they were obviously hoping for a French win.

We play Hunslet away in the next round and if we can get one or two injury worries cleared up we should be reasonably confident of progressing further. A top team in the next round to give the fans a good day would be ideal.

## When it all kicks off.....

If you're faced with more trying times than Town against some scary Superleague side, opening up to someone could make things a lot more bearable.

One choice that might help keep your cool is to use a new alternative to traditional helplines. CALM is a campaign that raises awareness of the problems young men in particular face, and also runs a helpline specifically designed with the millennial male in mind. The service runs from 5pm to 3am every night and provides free, confidential counselling, information and advice, with the option to get follow-up support in the caller's local area from over two hundred and eighty other agencies who can help with specific problems.

CALM is relatively new to Cumbria, having only been running since March this year, but already it's well established as a unique way of helping men help themselves. Differences become more apparent through the kind of people involved with the campaign, such as DJ Judge Jules, essential clothing company Kangol, BOSS Championship racing driver Steve Fitzsimmons, and Carlisle's own soccer ace export Matt Jansen:

'Missed penalties, relegation, goalkeeping howlers - every football fan will tell you they know what it's like to experience that sinking feeling. But if you really are feeling low, it's important to speak to someone. Don't suffer in silence.'

OK, so who would you speak to if you picked up the phone and rang CALM? As the call centre is based in Glasgow, there is no chance that someone will recognise your voice. The counsellors used by CALM come from a variety of relevant backgrounds:

Bereavement, addiction, family or relationship problems, sexuality, HIV/AIDS, work or economic stresses. Even if you just want someone to listen; a friendly advisor is there to talk you through whatever's causing concern.

While certain problems are universal, particular groups of young people across the county have to deal with a unique spin on common issues, simply because they live in Cumbria. Targeting isolated communities such as young farmers, hotel workers and young people in the care system is part of CALM's ongoing commitment to make the campaign relevant to the area, and meet the needs of local men.

Another way CALM is getting the message across that it's OK to 'open up and sort it out' is by being involved with events such as last year's Eden Millennium Festival and club nights at venues such as Workington's Fusion. CALM publicity can also be found at gigs, leisure centres, cafes and take-away food outlets, buses and just about anywhere young people congregate - yes, even in pubs!

The bottom line is, it's okay to talk about what's bugging you. Young men ringing the CALM helpline are treated with respect, and are in control. There is no time limit on calls and the helpline number doesn't show up on landline bills.

At long last the long running dispute between all the 'warring' factions currently running the game of rugby league appears to be coming to an end. The merging of Super League, the NFP and the Rugby Football League is long overdue, and at last we might get some much needed stability returning to the game.

What puzzles me is how we allowed this great game to get into this position into the first place. Although the product off the field was by no means perfect prior to the birth of Super League, we seemed to enjoy a much higher profile. We had regular international fixtures and tours, more than one knock-out cup competition, promotion and relegation, and players whose names were recognised away from their traditional homes in the North of England.

The arrival of Super League was greeted with open arms, mainly due to the fact the money on offer saved the majority of clubs from bankruptcy, albeit in some cases only for a short time, as other problems soon took over.

A game that had in the main been part-time for 100 years, suddenly became full-time over night. The clubs in Super League to a man were not prepared for this. Ourselves and Oldham are testimony to this fact. We were encouraged to spend money we didn't have, signing players on ridiculous contracts which we could not afford.

It was reputed at the time that Rowland Phillips was on £60,000 a year to play for Town - more than John Major

was being paid for being Prime Minister!! - this for a club with an average home crowd of 2,500 spectators.

Whether Rowland was actually paid that amount, or whether it was 'just hearsay' I don't know. What I do not is that we were relegated after one season and the club could not afford to pay the contracts, this resulted in the club going into voluntary liquidation with players and businessman alike losing a lot of money. The club, as we all know, was only saved from

extinction at the last minute due to the efforts of the present directors along with local businessman Bill Dobie's personal guarantees. Believe me I know what I'm talking about because I was one of those businessmen that lost money!

So what lessons has the game learnt during the last six years?

The battle between Super League and the rest of the rugby league has caused a lot

of bitterness, and it will be sometime before the trust and goodwill that the game always enjoyed will return, but if all the factions of the game start pulling in the same direction as they once did, then rugby league can once again go forth and prosper.

In order to do this we do need some stability; no tinkering of the rules and no changing the agreed format of the new leagues for at least a five seasons. The game must find its own level and develop from there.

It was interesting to read that in the on-going battle for television right for the Six Nations Championship between the BBC and Sky, one of the arguments being put forward for a return to the Beeb, was that 'since the loss of England games to Sky it was claimed that there had been a 30% drop in the number of players taking up the game'.

Rugby league has lost players galore at grass roots level and can't afford to lose any more. If we can entice more players to take up the sport by returning to terrestrial television, then I say go with it.

It is imperative that rugby league returns to the BBC in some form in order to gain the national stage that the game desires and needs to attract major sponsors.

This could be the last time we can use our 'Get out of Jail Free' card, and we must not waste it.

Rugby league is a good product, but needs repackaged and re-promoted. Then and only then will we see the true potential of the sport.





Today's subject is local businessman, and loyal Townie, Mr. Kevin Bailiff of Dearham. He is not only a dedicated follower of first team action, but also supports the alliance and academy teams, being a regular sponsor of the latter.

**What exactly is your line of business, and do you keep busy with it?**

Other than that give the young ones a go it's the only way we'll see if they are good enough.







# READY FOR THE CHALLENGE?

## Can NFP clubs close the gap?

**GARETH WALKER** of **LEAGUE EXPRESS** reflects on the Kellogg's Nutri-Grain Challenge Cup fourth round draw, and looks forward to this weekend's NFP games

JUST how big is the gap between the Northern Ford Premiership and Super League?

It's an issue that often provides great debate, and one that will arise again on the second weekend in February, when the Fourth Round of the Kellogg's Nutri-Grain Challenge Cup takes place.

The draw contains a multitude of mouth-watering clashes for NFP clubs, although unlike last year - when Leigh Centurions took on Salford City Reds and won in a memorable televised game - none of the highest placed Premiership sides will take on Super League opponents.

Nonetheless, the Cup draw, made at the game's birthplace, the George Hotel last Monday night, has ensured that a minimum of five Premiership clubs will progress to the last 16, and has thrown up several other exciting ties.

Batley Bulldogs' London contingent will relish the chance to take on the London Broncos, Barrow Raiders host the unknown quantity that is new-look

Warrington, and Sheffield entertain Wakefield Trinity Wildcats.

Oldham drew the Cup holders St Helens at home, but at the time of writing are undecided as to whether to switch the game to Knowsley Road. Certainly, it would be some English welcome for the likes of Australian newcomers Darren Britt and Darren Albert to trot out at the 2,080 capacity

ground at Hurst Cross, Ashton.

Of the all-Premiership clashes, the pick is the clash between title contenders Rochdale Hornets and Leigh Centurions. With much being made of the fact that the two clubs only play each other once in the league, and the teams recently fighting out a thrilling 14-all draw, there are plenty of scores to be settled.

Elsewhere, York and Chorley both host French visitors, with the Wasps entertaining Villeneuve Leopards - last year's shock quarter-finalists - and the Lynx taking on Union Treiziste Catalane (UTC) at Victory Park in what should be Cup ties to remember.

Onto the league campaign, and this weekend's intriguing fixture list, which contains a number of games almost impossible to forecast.

Arguably the pick of the games is Featherstone's home match against high flying Whitehaven, who will be keen to prove their excellent start is one that can be maintained against a Rovers side yet to hit top form.

Two games that will go some way to deciphering the relevant clubs' play-off credentials take place at Sheffield - where the Eagles take on Barrow - and Doncaster, where St John Ellis' side face Batley Bulldogs.

Other games that should provide close encounters include Dewsbury versus Rochdale and Workington against Oldham. And at the Thunderdome, both Gateshead Thunder and Swinton Lions will be bidding for their first league wins of the campaign. Both clubs have endured difficult times of late, and a victory would provide a much needed morale-boost for either side.

Losing your team coach is never an ideal situation, but losing a coach in the calibre of Mike Ford on the eve of the season would be a blow to any club, even more so, when the coach leaves to join the ranks of 'the other code'.

The man left in charge is John Harbin, who as coach of Wakefield Trinity, and a man used to working on tight budgets, could be just the man to revive the Roughyeds' fortunes this time round.

Oldham finished last season in impressive style, finishing the season with an impressive ten match unbeaten run, including a hard fought 24-18 home victory over Town to which secure their place in the play-offs.

A place in the final was eventually won, but boy did they do it the hard way. A 15-14 victory away at Leigh was followed by an equally impressive 39-32 win at Rochdale to set up a final against Widnes. Despite putting up a brace performance, the game was one too many for Mike Ford's charges who lost by 24-14, allowing Widnes to take their place in this season's Super League.

This season, things haven't gone quite as planned for the club. A late decision to move to Ashton United's football ground after failing to reach an agreement with their tenants Oldham Athletic resulted in their opening game being cancelled to allow improvements to be made to the non-league sides ground. With five matches gone, the club, one of the favourites for the title, are currently languishing in the lower half of the division, although they do have three matches in hand over Workington, and two on leaders Huddersfield.

Squad wise, all of last season's pack has been retained, and has been strengthened by the arrival of ex-Townie Simon Knox and Tommy Hodgkinson. While the backs do not appear to be as strong, with the loss of Ford along with goalkicking supremo Pat Rich who has opted to travel the world, and Joey Hayes, the ex-Saints flier who will be out until March through injury.

Ford's replacement at half-back ex-Wigan player Neil Roden looks an ideal replacement, while hooker John Hough caused Town plenty of



Two of Super League's big guns are destined for an early exit from the Nutri-Grain Challenge Cup after four of last year's big five were paired together in the fourth-round draw.

In the tie of the round, League champions Bradford Bulls were paired with local rivals Leeds Rhinos in a blockbusting repeat of the 2000 final at Murrayfield, venue for this year's decider.

And Wigan, beaten Grand Finalists last October, will fancy their chances of regaining the trophy they held eight seasons in a row from 1988-95 if they can overcome Hull at the JJB Stadium.

That pairing has added extra spice to Wednesday night's Andy Farrell testimonial match between the two clubs.

However, the West Yorkshire derby is undoubtedly the highlight of the fourth round, where the 12 Super League clubs join the fray alongside all but one of the 19 Northern Ford Premiership clubs and three French representatives.

"It's a tough draw but one we're looking forward to," said Bradford coach Brian Noble. "The good thing is that we're at home."

Bradford, last year's runners-up who are looking for a third successive Cup final appearance, will be firm favourites against the Rhinos, having beaten their arch rivals in all four league games last season, but Leeds coach Daryl Powell is upbeat about the tie.

"Obviously one of the top teams will be falling at the first hurdle but when we won the cup three years ago we beat Wigan first up, played St Helens in the next round and beat Bradford in the semis.

"We will get a good look at Bradford this weekend and we'll relish the prospect of testing ourselves against them."

The all-Super League ties will both be screened live on BBC Grandstand on Saturday, February 9, kicking off at 1.15pm and 3pm, as long as Bradford get the go-ahead from their Valley Parade landlords.

Nationwide League First Division soccer club Bradford City, who have a home game on the Sunday, have consistently refused to allow their

tenants use of the ground the day before their match and talks between the two clubs and the Rugby Football League will be held in an attempt to resolve the problem.

"Obviously we've got to talk to Bradford City," said Bulls spokesman Stuart Duffy. "We are hopeful of playing on the Saturday."

In the only other all-Super League clash, Castleford meet Salford at the Jungle, while holders St Helens were paired with Northern Ford Premiership outfit Oldham.

That tie is due to take place at Oldham's new home of Ashton United but the Hurst Cross ground has a capacity of just 2,080 and the Roughyeds are considering moving the game to a bigger venue.

The three French teams experienced contrasting fortunes, with only St Gaudens, 24-0 winners over Keighley in the third round, receiving a home tie against Super League club Halifax.

French Championship leaders Union Treiziste Catalan (UTC) and reigning champions Villeneuve were handed away ties against struggling NFP sides Chorley and York respectively.


Last Sunday the visitors had no fans present to boost the gate, that I was aware of anyhow - did you see any? Although while within the inner



## Understanding The Game

**Point 1** - When passing the ball, it must always go backwards.

**Point 2** - When tackling a player, it must always be around the waist.

**Point 3** - After you have been tackled you must play the ball through your legs, making sure it touches your foot.

**Point 4** - The Defending side must always be 10 metres behind the play-the-ball.

**Point 5** - The attacking side is allowed 6 attempts to score before the ball is given up.

**Point 6** - If the ball bounces into touch from a kick, then a scrum is formed with the opposition gaining the put-in. Unless the ball is kicked from inside the 40 metre mark of the team in possession to past the 20 metre mark of the defending team(40/20).

**Point 7** - If a player drops the ball in a forward direction a scrum is formed with the opposition gaining the "put-in".

**Point 8** - When scoring a try you must place the ball down over the try line (you must not drop the ball) .After a try, the team has the opportunity to kick a "conversion" by kicking the ball through the posts and over the crossbar.

**Point 9** - If a player runs into touch or tackled into touch, a scrum is formed with the opposition gaining the "put-in".

**Point 10** - When a team gains a penalty it has two options: it can either kick to touch and then receive the ball back at the place it crossed the touchline or it can have a kick at goal.

**Point System** - 4 Points for a Try, 2 Points for a Conversion after a Try, 2 Points For a converted penalty goal. 1 point for a drop goal.







It will very soon be time for the Super League to fire into action. Will the added TV, and other media coverage, give an added spin off of interest in the NFP?

I certainly hope something quickly works the oracle for all our sakes.

## CLUBS AGREE TO CHANGE

Rugby League clubs have given their unanimous backing for a major overhaul of the game's administration after being told of moves to wipe out the organisation's debts of £1.8million inside two years.

The 31 club representatives approved plans to unify the game, bringing Super League Europe back into line with immediate effect and stepping up talks with the British Amateur Rugby League Association to bring them on board in the near future.

The Rugby Football League will keep its title and the game will continue to be part-administered from Red Hall but the media, marketing and finance departments will all be housed at Super League's city-centre Sovereign House.

Super League Europe and the Association of Premiership Clubs will continue but their powers will be severely curtailed and their meetings will be chaired by the League's new executive chairman, who could be in place by the summer.

The full-time chairman will be joined on a five-strong board by a business director and three non-executive directors, who will oversee a management team in charge of six distinct departments.

The radical plans were formulated by a task force, led by Wigan chairman Maurice Lindsay, who are expected to stay in place for another two months until the new board is assembled.

"The proposals put to council by the implementation committee were endorsed unanimously," said RFL chairman Sir Rodney Walker.

"The whole council wanted to draw a line in the past. There was a remarkable atmosphere of people wanting to go forward together."

Lindsay, a former RFL chief executive, revealed for the first time that the game's debts had reached £1.8million and said his committee had uncovered "some pretty ordinary management practices".

Six staff at Red Hall have been made redundant and director of rugby Greg McCallum and finance chief are both thought to be negotiating severance terms.

"Unification could not be achieved with the present structure," said Sir Rodney, who intends to step down after the Challenge Cup final on April 27.

"It required fairly radical surgery which created the opportunity to put in place a very focused, structure business plan which will see all accumulated losses eradicated by the end of 2003."

Meanwhile, Lindsay revealed that the League had received 40 applications for the role of executive chairman and that the implementation committee hope to draw up a shortlist by the end of February.

"We been totally impressed by the calibre of those candidates," he said.


