

DON HE ON THIS DAY

Don Yates looks back to December 2nd yesteryear

IT WAS on this day in 1997, Tuesday 2nd December that the newly formed Oldham club pulled off their first signing. Hooker John Hough was that historic first capture, joining his hometown club after a short spell with Warrington. During his four seasons with the Roughyeds, Hough has appeared in 107 matches including two finals, both unfortunately lost, so although he will be hoping to continue his run of first team appearances, John will be looking for a different conclusion to next September's NFP play-offs.

Ninety-years ago, on Saturday 2nd December 1911. Oldham lost another final when Rochdale Hornets defeated them 12-5 in the Lancashire Cup. The Roughyeds were firm favourites to win that which final was staged at Broughton before a crowd of 20,000. Inexplicably, an Oldham side containing eleven George Smith internationals was



outplayed by a Hornets team, which thoroughly deserved their victory. Kiwi international George Smith scored the Oldham points, a try and conversion, on what was a disappointing afternoon for the club.

The Lancashire Cup competition was a popular early season knock-out tournament. which ran from 1905 to 1992. The first Lancashire Cup Final was also staged at Broughton on Saturday 2nd December 1905 when Leigh met Wigan. The attendance was 16,000 although those present were disappointed with the fare on show as the match ended in a scoreless draw.

There was not another drawn Lancashire Cup Final until 1967 when the two finalists were St. Helens and Warrington. The replay was staged on the old Station Road ground at Swinton on Saturday 2nd December and again a close match resulted. The teams were level at half time, 3-apiece, before St. Helens

pulled away to win 13-10. A couple of players included in the Warrington line-up that day are well known in the Oldham area. Back-row forward Billy Churm, a former Royton junior, was substitute whilst at loose forward was Ray Clark who later moved to Oldham and who is now involved with the Butterworth Park complex at Castleton where the Oldham alliance and academy teams played and where the club's training headquarters were once based.

Thirty-nine years ago, on Sunday 2nd December 1962, Great Britain stumbled to a disappointing defeat across the Channel in Perpignan. The Lions, who earlier that year had come within a whisker of whitewashing the Kangaroos in their own backyard, were beaten 17-12 by France. At fullback for Great Britain in that test was Ken Gowers, arguably the most talented fullback in the history of the Swinton club. Gowers is a native of Rochdale and the son of an outstanding servant to the Rochdale Hornets' club, Walter Gowers. Despite this Rochdale declined to sign Gowers junior from the Kirkholt amateur club because they considered him to be too small. He certainly was no giant in stature but between 1954 and 1973 he made 642 appearances for Swinton, Lancashire and Great Britain, scoring 2,315 points including 1,075 goals. Rochdale's loss was indeed Swinton's gain.

On Thursday 2nd December 1993 Great Britain met France at under-21 level. The match was staged at Wilderspool, Warrington where the British youngsters defeated France more easily than the 28-16 scoreline suggests. Two late French tries made the score respectable. Two members of the British team that evening later enjoyed short spells with the Roughyeds. Standoff Francis Maloney was then with Featherstone Rovers and is now at Salford, whilst second-row forward Mark Perrett was with Halifax at that time. Another local connection came in the shape of winger lestyn Harris, then of Warrington but now involved with kick and clap although he obviously keeps in touch with proper rugby judging by the solidarity he showed towards Oldham during the recent ground sharing talks.





FORECASTING anything in sport is a dangerous game but I've never been frightened to stick my neck out so I'll provide my usual opinion for you to laugh at or take apart at your leisure.

Before I do, however, I would point out that I didn't do too badly last season. For example: "top of the tree - look no further than Dewsbury and Leigh". The Centurions of course finished as Minor Premiers (top of the League to you and me!). And I could not be expected to foresee the collapse of the Rams. My reasoning was that Dewsbury had a top Coach and some top players and since that Coach and several of his players departed for Widnes and went on to win the Grand Final I think I was fully justified in my opening day predictions.

At the other end of the table I said Chorley would definitely not finish bottom and I am pleased to record that they didn't. I also predicted the Cumbrian trio of Barrow, Whitehaven and Workington would fall just short of the play-offs and was right again.

Of Oldham I said: "They should be serious challengers for honours." Not bad, eh?

Widnes did better than expected but that was down to pinching Neil Kelly and half the Dewsbury team, while I thought Featherstone and Hull K.R. might slip. Fev duly finished 5th as in the previous season and the Robins scraped into eighth spot with a final day defeat of Oldham.

My big failures were Keighley and Rochdale. The Cougars had the plug pulled when their millionaire backer decided enough was enough (watch out Latics!), while Hornets, brilliantly coached by Martin Hall, took advantage of other clubs off-loading big wage players in mid-season to strengthen their squad to some tune.

As to this season, we have the rarity of a new side in the League in Huddersfield who, with a full time squad, should be one of the top dogs. However they will not be able to underestimate the current N.F.P. big guns and together with Leigh, Oldham and Rochdale should constitute a 'big four' though I'm not confident enough to forecast in what order they'll finish.

My reading of the rest is that Workington will make the play-offs this time (and it's a top 9 this season), principally because they've signed Martin Wood. An injury free Whitehaven could join them, because in Paul Cullen they have one of the best Coaches in the game. Hull K.R. and Featherstone will still be there or thereabouts but Fev will miss Peter Roe at the helm. Incidentally, if ever a Coach deserved a Super League break it's Roe: I only hope Wakefield isn't a poisoned chalice.

God only knows about Dewsbury and Keighley. To date the Rams have signed 23 new players and dispensed with 14, and since I'm not Russell Grant I can't tell you what this will mean. Meanwhile, the Cougars will rely heavily on home grown talent and are likely to be good, but not that good.

Elsewhere I expect Batley, Swinton and York to do better than last time and think Barrow and Hunslet will struggle. And I think Sheffield, Gateshead and Chorley will be fighting with the latter two near the bottom, though once again I say the Lynx will NOT prop up the table!

Humphries has signed a number of new players and at the commencement of a new season boasts a squad of 31 from which to select his team. This includes 13 new signings as follows:-CRAIG DEAN Scrum Half - Craig played for Halifax

under Steve Simms, before he moved to Leigh. Plagued with injury in his time at Leigh but has now made a full recovery and has been made captain of the team where his experience will be a vital asset. Will be the hub of the Lions attack and is a top quality player. ANDY LEATHAM Prop Forward - New signing this year played for Leigh last season, previously with St Helens for six years. Big strong and fast forward will provide power and leadership. STEVE GEE Second Row Forward - Steve is also a new signing from Widnes he scored a try in last seasons Grand Final, Steve is a big strong runner and will be a great asset to the Lions. 






TODAY we welcome our near neighbours from Swinton for the first 'home' game of the season. The Lions were the first ever visitors to our old Watersheddings' ground when they provided the opposition for the game on September 28th 1889.

However, when the great divide of 1895 occurred and 22 of the leading Northern Clubs broke away from the RFU to form the Northern Union, Swinton were not amongst their number. Very much one of the leading clubs of the time, their absence from the new league (along with Salford) caused some concern within the defecting clubs and offered solace to the Union authorities who dearly wanted the new venture to fail.

As it happened one season without fixtures against the likes of Oldham, Rochdale, Wigan, Leeds etc., was enough to convince the Manchester giants that their future lay firmly with their prestigious Northern neighbours.

So it was in the following 1896-97 season that the first 'Rugby League' between the Roughyeds and the Lions took place at Swinton on September 26th 1896. Oldham won the match by six points to three thanks to tries from wingman Jack Hurst and forward Jim Merrill. A feature of the match was the playing of the bustling forward Bob Edwards at stand off in place of the injured club captain Harry Varley. The honour of leading the team going to Sam Lees.

The return league fixture was originally scheduled to be played on January 9th and although the game went ahead, due to adverse weather prior to the match, officials of both sides agreed this match to be deemed as a friendly. This decision in effect cost Oldham the Lancashire champions' title because on that January day they won by six points to nil. However, when Swinton visited Watersheddings the following March they triumphed by four points to nil, and at the season's end Broughton Rangers nicked the title from the Roughyeds by a single league point.



A Chance to Meet BRYAN HENARE

with David McGealey, Radio Cavell 1350AM



How many are there in your family?

Two brothers (one older, one younger), mum, dad and wife Odette and we're expecting a baby next year.

What's your first memory of Rugby League?

I was a lad, about five or six, and we were playing rugby. I had no shoes on and I scored a try. After, we all rushed home to tell mum and dad. But my brother ran in before me and told everyone I'd scored a try before I could tell them. I think he did it to 'grass cut me' or something like that.

Who did you play for in your first real game of Rugby League?

Otahuhu, a local amateur club in Auckland. It's one of the best amateur clubs in New Zealand and has produced the likes of Hugh McGann, Mark Graham, Gary Freeman, Ritchie Blackmore, Ritchie Barnett. We all just came through the ranks.

Who did you first sign professional for, and how old were you?

Auckland Warriors and I was twenty one. No, twenty.

That's fairly old for a Rugby League player in this country, is it the same in New Zealand?

Not really. It was a brand new club and they were signing players to play in their Under 21's. I just happened to be one of them for which I was pretty rapped because it's a good club.

What happened to your career from then on?

I played four years at Auckland and when I neared the end of my contract St Helens, who were coached by Ellery Hanley, rang up and asked if I wanted to sign for them. I came over and signed a two year contract but after a couple of months Ellery got fired and Ian Millward came over. I played my two years out with St Helens and then Oldham asked me if I wanted to come with them. I said yes, No worries.

As a Super League player was it a big step down to come to Oldham?

No it wasn't. It's just the same intensity in the Northern Ford Premiership. It's just that maybe Super League has more skilful players with the likes of Andy Farrell and it is quite a bit faster. But other than the toughness and that, is still the same.

At the end of last season quite a few people thought you'd move back to Super League but you decided to stay with Oldham in NFP, why? I really got on well with Fordy and the lads. Once I heard that Fordy was going to stay and coach Oldham and that most of the lads were going to stay for another year and, because I'd enjoyed my time at Oldham, that was it. I decided to stay because I really enjoyed it.

Who's been the greatest influence on you in Rugby League?

My wife, I think. She keeps me in check and I think she's my biggest critic. When I think I've had a good game she puts me right.

Knowledgeable about the game then is she?

She is, she does know a fair bit. She knows how I play and what I can, and can't do, and all that kind of thing and what I need to improve on.

What was your most memorable moment in rugby league?

When I was over with the Junior Kiwis' Under 19's and we played the Great Britain Under 19's at Wembley and won. The atmosphere was great and I can say I've played on Wembley and not many people can say that.

What about the semi-final against Rochdale last year?

Ah well! My first try, I think anyone could have scored that. The second one was a good pass from Fordy and I just happened to be on the end of it. But I was rapped, especially as we were losing and we thought we were going to be down and out. But when we came back and won it we were rapped.

What about your low point?

My low point was during preseason training in 1998. I ruptured my knee after I'd done a real good preseason. I was probably at the fittest and strongest I'd ever been. During



training for the first game I went down early to play a bit of touch with some of the lads and I done my knee in and that was it-me out for the season. So after all that work, I just blew it on one stupid training session. I was pretty gutted and had to have the knee reconstructed. Luckily, its mended and is 100%.

What's the strangest thing you've ever seen on a rugby field?

That was when I was watching my younger brother play when he was about thirteen and a fight broke out. You know, kids fighting and all that kind of thing. Then one of the grandparents ran on with a brolly and started wacking the opposition players. I thought, 'what the hell's going on here?'. I just couldn't stop laughing.

Who's the biggest character you've come across in the game?

That'd have to be Cleggy. He's a good bloke and all that. But the whole team's full of characters who come up with their own individual comments and remarks. That keeps the team bonding.


What's your ambition in Rugby League?

I want to finish on a high note. To do well and be proud of what I do and just have no regrets.

Tell us a secret about one of your team mates at Oldham?

No, no, no. No secrets. I'm not saying nothing. Nope. No. I'm sure the others will tell you about nicknames and that, but I'm not saying anything. No!

Sunday, November 18th


A cracking afternoon at Leigh. Very hopeful performance on the field and good to see some old friends again on the terraces.

THIS afternoon we feature a former amateur star, Norman Widdall, who enjoyed considerable cuptie success during his lengthy playing career with Saddleworth Rangers.

Norman Widdall began playing rugby at Clarksfield school and moved to Saddleworth Rangers in the late 1950's when he was in his early teens. Thus began a 25 year association with the Greenfield club which brought many happy memories for the reliable, hard working hooker. Despite Norman's consistency, he failed to gain selection at international or even county level although he did make a dozen or so appearances for the Oldham town team.

But Norman did enjoy success in the prestigious local Standard Cup competition. appearing in five finals. Four of those finals ended in victory with only an 18-7 defeat against St. Anne's in 1978 spoiling the record. Either side of that defeat Rangers beat St. Marv's 9-0 in 1967. St. Anne's 20-8 in 1971, Waterhead 16-4 in 1976 and St. Anne's again 11-8 in 1980. Norman had difficulty selecting a highlight from his playing career, he simply enjoyed it all, but when pressed he said. 'I suppose it was scoring a try against Waterhead in the 1976 final. It was the first try I'd scored for about three years!! I really enjoyed playing and I would urge any of the kids playing now not to stop playing too early. They don't know how much they'll miss it.'

When his playing career was over Norman began coaching. He took his coaching badge under the guidance of former Oldham centre Graham Starkey who Norman described as a 'good talker' although he added, 'I learned a good deal from him actually.' Norman learned a good deal from other coaches he was privileged to play under. They include Duggie Baker, Dave Leeming, Norman Harris, Harry Dyson, Tony Finan, Jimmy Russell, Peter Goddard, Johnny Noon and Ray Hicks. When Norman was assistant coach to Mick Coates at Saddleworth in the early 1990's, he regarded Rangers as having the strongest amateur set-up in the history of BARLA. In 1993 when Rangers were Conference League Champions and also lifted the National Cup and Conference League Challenge Cup, Norman led the Rangers' 'A' team to success in the Riley Cup, the Rochdale Charity Cup and the Oldham Championship Cup as well as winning the North West Counties fifth division Championship.

A couple of years later Norman moved across to Waterhead. During his first season there Waterhead gained promotion to the premier division of the North West Counties League and twelve months later, in 1997, he led them to the Standard Cup Final, although it was his old club, Saddleworth Rangers, who again lifted the trophy, beating Waterhead 25-12.

Nowadays Norman has no active involvement in the game although he frequently watches amateur matches as well as the odd Roughveds' home game. He now keeps himself fit by long distance walking. In April 1998 he walked across country from St. Bee's Head, Cumbria to Robin Hood Bay, North Yorkshire, raising £520 in sponsorship which was shared by the Saddleworth Rangers' youth section and a motor neuron disease charity. This year Norman was hoping to walk the Pennine Way with sponsorship money being donated to Dr. Kershaw's Hospice but, unfortunately, that had to be postponed because of the foot-and-mouth crises and instead Norman spent a week walking the Austrian Alps. Hopefully he will tackle the Pennine Way next year, no doubt with the same determination and commitment with which he tackled opponents during his impressive spell as the Saddleworth

THE GAME featured two teams with contrasting pedigrees.

Huddersfield, Challenge Cup Winners six times from 1913 to 1953, and twice runners up. Championship Winners seven times 1912-1962. And Doncaster, formed in 1951, took the field for the first time on August 18th that year to do battle with the formidable Wakefield Trinity, defeating them in front of a crowd of 12.000

Doncaster went on to win 21 of 36 games that season, and by beating Castleford 18-5 at one stage took 3rd place in the Rugby League table, two points behind Workington and one point behind Leeds. (The club finished 11th that season, but thereafter never finished above the halfway line).

bottom 14 were given their own competition for

the first time, but, and it was a big "but", the Rugby League Secretary Mr Bill Fallowfield introduced a new rule, viz: the team in possession would only be allowed one play the ball, and subsequently, if that team were tackled again, the ball had to be released by the tackled player and be played by the foot by either team before being picked up.

I was not given an early round or a semifinal, nor had I seen any of the games. I was advised by our "mentor" in the Oldham referees society, the late R. L. Thomas, to give this series a miss because players, not knowing what to do, were throwing the ball around like a "hot potato".

Lucky me! I got the final and it was chaotic/ Players were throwing the ball anywhere to avoid being tackled, and I was dishing out penalties galore. All this despite being given

> "advice" by Don Robinson (ex Leeds) the home captain, and by the late Peter Goddard plaving at prop for Huddersfield. the latter particularly after I sent off his stand-off team mate for foul play.

> It was a game best forgotten, but I was reminded of it some days later by a letter from Mr Fallowfield in which he admitted that it had been a poor game, but in which he indicated that my interpretation of the new rule was sadly lacking. The new rule was and scrapped to mv knowledge, there was never again a bottom 14 competition or an experiment like this.

on because now, thanks to League Express and their weekly penalty count, I can tell you! Okay so it includes offside and interference at play the ball but Coaches will tell you that the stats. don't lie, so here goes:

.. DISCIPLINE

The dirtiest side in the N.F.P. is . . . SHEFFIELD EAGLES! Surprised? Well, given the tactics employed by some sides last year against Oldham, I was. Still I'd better not go into that or I'll be in trouble again.

And the cleanest side in the league? . . . WHITEHAVEN. So well done Paul Cullen and the marras! Second best were Keighley, which was surprising after their display at Boundary Park, but to be fair, they conceded more penalties in that game than in any other all season and it was their first game after the financial collapse of the club when they fielded a scratch side.

The team most likely to be awarded penalties was FEATHERSTONE ROVERS, but since they were also the second most penalised side after Sheffield, a Featherstone game was more likely to be littered with penalties than any other. KEIGHLEY, meanwhile were the team least likely to benefit from penalties and with their second best placing for giving away penalties this meant a Keighley match was the least likely to require much intervention from the merry whistle-blower.


