




Oldham continues to take significant strides to be THE desirable place to live, work or visit in the North West.

As ever please get behind the team as loud as you can. Enjoy the game.



Jason Abdul - Fullback/Utility: The former Hull FC Academy player has been turning in some outstanding performances at number one this

Danny Lakeman - Fullback/Winger: Danny is another former Hull FC Academy player who has just joined the Open Age team after starring for East at youth level. A player with good pace and an eve for the line.

Gary Noble - Centre/Utility: Another player who has just re-joined the club from a professional side after progressing through the youth ranks and then signed for Hull FC and then Hull KR. Has done really well this season in an unfamiliar role of

John McCracken - Winger/Centre: John is the current captain of the team and has led them to all their recent successes. He is a player who is equally adept in attack or defence and has plied his

trade in the pro game with York and Hull.

Graham Clark - Winger: Graham is a stalwart of the team and played in the side when the club were going through hard times. Has come on in leaps and bounds since Easts' turnaround and is constantly taking the strain off the forwards with his powerful running. A player with a big future.

Jordan Precious - Stand Off/Centre: 'Sam Dingle' has really made the problem number six spot his own this season with a series of great displays. Another former Hull FC Academy player who has great balance and an astute kicking game.

Gary Blanchard - Halfback: The current East Hull Man of Steel is a terrific competitor who possesses a brilliant pair of hands. Another player who has stuck with Easts through hard times when he could have gone elsewhere.

James Aramavo - Prop: A larger than life character who is really starting to find his true form once again. A great Britain international at all levels and a player who never takes a backward step as well as producing some big hits on the opposition.

Gary Weymes - Hooker: A sublimely talented player who can simply cut through the opposition as if they were not there. He has won many a game for East Hull and his gamebreaking ability has recently won him a place in the County Championship winning Yorkshire side.

Lee Brown - Prop: The current Player of the Year and probably the fittest at the club. An 80 minute man who goes forward with purpose and hits with real meaning. Gets the man of the match most weeks and never has a bad game.

Mark Woodcock - Second Row/Loose Forward: An outstanding junior who signed for Leeds Rhinos

from school. Things went badly wrong for Mark with injuries, but he is now hitting the heights he is capable of with some brilliant performances. Paul Roberts - Second row: Paul has been a revelation since signing from rivals West Hull earlier in the season. A real 100% player who really

Michael Docherty - Loose Forward: According to some, Docky actually originates from Germany. However, he is also a great rugby league player. This time two years ago he was starring in Super League for Hull FC but is now an essential part of East Hull's side.

Dale Davidson - Prop/Second Row: Dale is an extremely tough customer who plays with his heart rather than his head. Another player who is starting to look the part since the East Hull transformation. A bright future looms for this no-nonsense forward. Lee Roberts - Prop/Second Row: Brother of Paul and another Ex Hull Academy lad, who also joined the club from West Hull. Just like his brother he really gets stuck in and loves being in the heart of the action.

Chris Windas - Halfback: This extrovert character signed for Leeds Rhinos from school along with Mark Woodcock. An extremely talented ball player who can turn the game in a split second. Has recently signed for the club from Hull Ionians. Phil Batty - Stand-off/Full-back: Another Great Britain international. Phil signed recently from Conference club Ideal Isberg and has put in some good performances since his arrival. A really good support player who always comes up with

important touchdowns. Rich Longley - Prop: A recent signing from local rivals Bilton Sullys. Rich has settled down well at East Hull and has added even more size and aggression to the pack and goes forward well.

Phil Colclough - Winger/Centre: Phil is a former Hull KR Academy player who is equally adept in either defence or attack. Has great balance and good defence.

Wayne Foster - Prop: Wayne has come into the game from Rugby Union and over the past year has acclimatised well. Is now well accustomed to League and can cause major problems to the opposition defenses with his sheer size.

Dean Cox - Full-back/Winger: Dean has been with the club for six years. Made 26 first team appearances last season but has been dogged with a back injury so far this season. A very reliable fullback and a good attacking winger - a real favourite with all the players.

A Potted History of East Hull. by Don Yates

The Roughyeds return to Boundary Park this afternoon with a visit from East Hull, reigning champions of the CMS Yorkshire League and current holders of the Yorkshire Cup.

The East Hull club was founded in 1974 as Mysons, joining the Hull Works Sports League. They quickly became one of the strongest teams on Humberside and enjoyed considerable success especially during the 1980s when they won both the Yorkshire Cup and the National Cup. Their National Cup win came in 1986 when they defeated Millom 17-8 in the final which was staged before a Headingley crowd of 3,000. Stand-off Stuart Sawyers won the man-of-thematch award after scoring a try, two goals and a dropped goal. In 1996, when Myson Heating moved out of Hull, the club was renamed East Hull. The change of name has not affected performances on the field with the club currently enjoying a superb campaign. They are undefeated so far, having won the Yorkshire Cup, have a 100% league record and, next Saturday, face an intriguing National Cup-tie against West Hull at the Boulevard.

This afternoons match will be the first time East Hull have met professional opposition in the Challenge Cup. Nevertheless they are not unfamiliar with this type of big occasion because they were involved in a series of matches against professional clubs during the late 1980s and early 1990s when amateur clubs competed in the John Player Trophy competition. Mysons were involved in five matches during that period and only suffered one heavy defeat. That was in 1993 when they were defeated 62-4 at Doncaster, Earlier, in 1984, they were far from disgraced when, despite heavy rain. they attracted a crowd of 1,572 to the Boulevard for the visit of Dewsbury. The

professionals were mightily relieved to leave Humberside after scraping through a preliminary round tie 8-2. Current Widnes coach Neil Kelly scored the only try of that match.

Twelve months later Mysons pulled off arguably the best victory in the clubs history when they visited Batley and won 8-2. Stand-off Stuart Sawyers was again the Mysons hero. After landing an early penalty, it was his kick which led to a try by scrum-half Mark Powley which Sawyers improved. In the first round Mysons were drawn at home to Swinton, a match which the amateurs switched to Craven Park, the Hull Kingston Rovers ground. Another big crowd, 1,648, were attracted to that tie and, once again, the amateurs did themselves proud. Although defeated, Mysons provided Swinton with stiff opposition and they, too, were a much-relieved team as they headed back along the M62 after pulling off a narrow 18-11 victory. At half time Mysons led 7-6 and this against a team which went on to gain promotion and win the Second Division Premiership. Two former Oldham juniors were included in the Swinton pack for that match against Mysons, hooker Gary Ainsworth and loose-forward Mark Rowbottom.

Mysons last tilt at professional opposition came in 1994 when the club was called upon to visit Bramley. From a financial point of view the match was a disaster, attracting just 302 spectators, and to make matters worse Mysons were beaten 40-14. Three former Oldham juniors were amongst the Bramley point scorers that afternoon, Paul Garrett, ex-Saddleworth Rangers, scored two tries, Brian Quinlan, ex-St.Annes, grabbed another whilst the Waterhead play-maker Jon Perks landed six goals.

Of Roughyeds And Amateurs East Hull

I AM SURE it is with keen anticipation, despite last weeks set-back at Leigh, that all the Roughyeds fans look forward to this coming 2003 season. It is good news that the team is once again playing back in the "borough" and for our first fixture back in town we have the pleasure of welcoming the amateurs of East Hull for this afternoon's Challenge Cup 3rd round tie.

The first time the club entertained nonleague opposition in this the most famous of all rugby cup competitions was way back in 1899 when the Goole club came to Watersheddings to finish on the end of a 63 - 0 thrashing. On that day it was the Oldham wingers that did the damage with Sam Williams crossing for five tries and Tom Fletcher scoring four. Arguably, the best performance by an amateur team against the Roughyeds came in 1905 when a star studded Oldham outfit, that were at the time the reigning Northern Union champions, were held to a 16 - 3 scoreline by Normanton, and at Watersheddings too.

The only time a local side has had a crack at their professional neighbours came in 1936 when Higginshaw, who were very much the premier amateur side of the time, eventually succumbed to a 38 -2 defeat after taking an early lead much to the delight of the Watersheddings crowd. Some of our older supporters may recall the visit of Walney Central from Barrow in 1960. A game which saw Oldham comfortable winners by 55 -4, the highlight of which was the six tries scored by international winger Ike Southward. In more recent times the "Ace" team from Hull gave a good account of themselves in 1979 before going down 23 - 5. This much postponed match finally being played at Salford, as Watersheddings lay frost bound for several weeks.

Since the formation of the new club, the Roughyeds have always started the competition with a match against an amateur club and for the record the sequence goes like this:

Well here we are back at Boundary Park, back, thank goodness, in Oldham. There appears to be a buzz back in the town amongst the rugby league fraternity and the knockers have retreated into the woodwork. What is even more pleasing is that a relatively poor display at Leigh last weekend hasn't brought them back out of the woodwork. Everybody seems to realise that there have been big changes and this was just the first match of a very, very long season.

The results last weekend show just how competitive both National League 1 and National League 2 are going to be and it really looks as if the Arriva Trains Competition could be equally competitive, especially in Oldham's group which coach Steve Molloy has rightly seen as a perfect preparation for the League programme to begin in March.

The Cup certainly started with a bang last weekend with three games getting over 3000 spectators including the first home game of the new York club against Hull K R. Most games were closely fought and Keighley Cougars showed that the gap between National League Division1 and Division 2 is not that great. In fact the Division 2 clubs really seem to have grasped the nettle and have far stronger squads than those they had last season. Locally Swinton and Chorley seem to have made some excellent signings and should be challenging for honours in their Division this season. It will be interesting if Round 4 of the Challenge Cup throws up some Division 1 versus Division 2 challenges they could prove very interesting and very close run

affairs.

London Skolars, the other newcomers, have also done well, not only on the field but also off it and I'm sure all genuine Rugby League fans wish them well in this their inaugural vear in Rugby League. It will be a difficult year especially with all the travelling they will be forced to undertake.

Here at Oldham preparations have gone well the only real black spot being the non arrival of the new replica shirts 'this has been frustrating for both club and spectators alike and all we can do is apologise for a situation that is quite honestly out of our hands.

We appear to have got a good squad together and the Spain training camp not only allowed for essential training time in good conditions but also allowed a great team spirit to develop at the club with new and old players bonding superbly. The Celebration Night at the Clayton Arms was also a great success and superbly attended. It is always nice to have so many complimentary remarks about the organisation and presentation of an evening enjoyed equally by players. club officials and fans. There has also been good news on the sponsorship side and I know Christopher Hamilton hopes to have some more good news in this respect for you in the very near future.

Let's hope the fans really get behind the club this season and attendances at Boundary Park exceed all expectations and the club's desire for a great season on the playing front comes to fruition.

Stacey Jones, these days the best rugby league play maker in the world, did not allow the bookies a killing, and walked away with the newly struck medal confirming the unstoppable Kiwi as the worthy winner of the player of the series award in last Autumn's Don't Drink Drive Test Matches.

The introduction of the two new awards into the Lion/Kiwi series, the Albert Baskerville Trophy for the tournament winners and the George Smith Medal provided ideal topics for

the media and perfect targets for camera lenses.

I thought, too, that the series went a long way to repair the damage surrounding last summers 'disaster in Sydney' and for once the RFL marketing team can afford to take a bow in the way they managed the Kiwi matches.

The word from head office is that at last major rugby league events are becoming easier to sell to the corporate market but the marketing team must now concentrate on cramming to the rafters the three test match stadiums selected for this Autumn's first full scale Ashes tour since 1994.

> te was already 30 years of age when he joined Oldham, but was still a very effective winger Championship Final win over Wigan in 1910, finishing the seasons, and scored a try in the 13-7 Championship Final win over Wigan in 1910, finishing the season with 37 tries. Smith related by the season with 37 tries. Smith played his last senior game for Oldham, scoring a try in the 19-0 win over Leigh at Watersheddings on March 7th, 1914. In all he had made 173 appearances for Oldham,

scoring an armazing 100 tries.

Prior to his Rugby League achievements,
George Smith had a rich, varied and successi George Smith had a rich, valido and soccess sporting career in New Zealand. The New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame says of George Smith: "For ability and versatility, George mith is perhaps the most remarkable sportsman ever produced by New Zealand. There weren't many sports at which George Smith didn't excel. Initially he made his mark as a jockey, riding a horse called Impulse to victory in the New Zealand Cup in 1894. Then he took up athletics and won a succession of national sprint and hurdles titles, and set a world 440-yard hurdles record of 58.5 seconds. With his great natural speed, Smith made a brilliant rugby union winger who represented New Zealand for nearly a decade. He was a member of the famous Originals team which toured Britain in 1905, scoring 19 tries in 19 matches, including eight in the first three matches..." But Smith found a home in this country, and for almost 20 years played f and managed the most successful ever Oldham side. He died in Oldham in 1954 at the age of 80.






Page from programme G.Britain v N. Zealand 2nd Test 16th Nov 2002

Back On The Terraces

I HAVEN'T seen as much enthusiasm generated about a Roughyeds season in a long time. There is a real buzz surrounding the club this year and it's great to see. Last years exile, coupled with the disruption caused by changes in coaching staff and the stop-start on the field progress in a badly constructed season, meant that the last campaign was always going to be nothing but extremely difficult.

Therefore, it's fairly obvious why people are enjoying a feeling of both relief and renewed optimism. The Houdini like achievements of Steve Molloy's men in the latter stages of the NFP campaign not only turned the season around, they effectively rescued the club.

As a result, we have seen our much celebrated return to the town and a significant investment made in the playing staff that gives cause for enthusiastic yet cautious optimism.

A few players have left the club over the closed season and we sincerely thank them for their service. Most have made a significant contribution over the last few years. Indeed, we have them to thank for our recent play off adventures, not least the two great play off wins against our fiercest of rivals along the way. Notably, the Gibbons twins have contributed much over the last couple of years and, along with Mark Sibson, they sure to add some spice to our encounters with the Bulldogs of Batley this year.

Also gone but not forgotten is Hurst Cross. There is no doubting that the place was a godsend last year and I would like to express my personal thanks to all involved at Ashton United where we were always made to feel extremely welcome. The tight ground, when filled, was conducive to a great atmosphere and many of the die hard supporters who turned up week in week out really identified with a place that was similar in many respects to our beloved Watersheddings.

However, times have moved on and the coach and chairman have clearly demonstrated their ambitions for the club. Indeed, as they prepare to make an assault on the new National Cup and National League 1, a coveted place in Super League looks once again like a realistic possibility. It wont be easy, but the closed season signings look to have significantly improved the standard of the squad and a definite steel has been added for this season's campaign.

My first thoughts about the new National League format turned to the 91-92 season when we played in the 8 team, quadruple round robin, Division 2. The teams knew each other like the back of their hand and to say it became stale

would be somewhat of an understatement. However, there are key differences this time around which I believe will make this format a success.

In many respects the formation of National League Divisions 1 and 2 has actually seen common sense prevail. Two divisions of 10 teams with a simple home and away fixture programme will finally see a truly representative league table come September. Also, moving the National League Cup to the beginning of the season will give the competition more prestige, ensure no mid season league break and is clearly a decision blessed with logic.

The play off system, culminating in the Grand Final has proved to be a real success in RL despite some initial reservations. However, I also believe that the decision to have an additional play off game between the 9th placed Div 1 side and the losing Div 2 Grand Finalists, is a great idea. Also, the formation of NL3 is a fantastic move and is the perfect way of building on the success of the Summer Conference and achieving sustainable expansion.

Are we therefore actually in danger of finally getting things right I ask? The report card reads not bad, but could do better.

I firmly believe that promotion and relegation from all divisions should be consistent. Since this column was last in print, Super League has finally relented and re-introduced relegation. As a result we have seen both of our neighbours Huddersfield and Salford face the drop and, parachute payment issues aside, this makes absolute sense. However, why don't we apply the same principles to the team finishing next to bottom in Super League and the losing NL1 Grand Finalists? Couldn't the same system also be extended to link NL2 and NL3 and why not even NL3 and the conference? I have long been an admirer of the pyramid system in Football. This allows the possibility of clubs doing a Wimbledon and means that expansion of the game is not solely dependant on TV money funding unstructured SL franchises like the French experiment.

Finally, on a personal note, due to work and family commitments today will see me bring down the curtain on 10 years of reporting on Oldham games for various publications. I will miss the banter of the press box, particularly Roger Halstead's outlandish half time predictions and Ian Wilson's unfaltering faith in our sliding defence. However, I am looking forward to reclaiming my place amongst the Roughyed faithful and soaking up the atmosphere back on the terraces.




Senior Academy

THE Arriva Trains Cup, in the words of the advertising campaign, begun its journey last weekend, and it was a start littered with encouraging signals.

First of all there was the performances on the field of the National League's two new clubs - London Skolars and York City Knights. Both went down to defeat, but produced highly-promising performances against higher division opposition and will find much to be positive about.

The Skolars were actually ahead against Dewsbury with 35 minutes on the clock, before three tries in a seven-minute burst by the Rams helped them to a 22-10 victory. But, with the crowd of 820 made up predominantly of localsupport, they can look forward to the rest of 2003 with renewed optimism.

As can the Knights, who pushed Hull Kingston Rovers all the way before going down to a creditable 26-3 defeat. They saw over 3,000 flock to the Huntington Stadium for that game, the highest crowd for a Rugby League fixture in York since October 1990.

So much to be positive about for both new clubs, though they will be acutely aware of the need to record a victory as early as possible to maintain interest among their support. This weekend's TXU Energi Challenge Cup fixtures - with York taking on Skirlaugh and the Skolars travelling to Halton Simms Cross - will provide them with the opportunity to do that, though neither will have it all their own way.

Elsewhere last weekend, Salford and Leigh both hosted 3,000 plus crowds, against Swinton and Oldham respectively, while the first major shock of the competition came with Keighley Cougars' defeat of NL1 side Doncaster.

This weekend the focus turns to the Challenge Cup Third Round, and there are several intriguing ties to consider.

The most notable ones include those with a foreign side involved. French teams Villeneuve,

Elsewhere, a humdinger of a tie looks set to take place at the Recreation Ground on Friday night, when Wath Brow Hornets take on Cumbrian neighbours Workington Town.

And there are other 'derby' games scattered around, including Chorley Lynx versus Leigh Miners Rangers, Oldham St Annes against Rochdale Hornets and Doncaster's clash with Redhill.

So another round of terrific Rugby League action to look forward to then. Let's hope those turnstiles continue clicking throughout the coming year.

I LISTENED to the excellent Jack Dearden on BBC GMR on the way back from Leigh and, as usual, there were some rivetting talking points. Unfortunately, as usual, there were plenty of guests or callers who missed the point. I find it unbelievable that so many people oppose every move designed to expand our game. If U.T.C. of Perpignon are admitted to Super League in 2005 have no doubt that this will be a POSITIVE and UNRESERVED BENEFIT for Rugby League. We cannot, for example, argue for more and better television coverage if all we have to offer is the same old Wigan v St Helens six or seven times a season. however good the quality of the play. It is the European dimensions which currently attracts the best viewing figures for soccer and the other code of rugby. Indeed, I am on record as being in favour of admitting a second French side, be it Toulouse or Villeneuve, but would concede to a franchise in South Wales if this were the better option. This would put Super League up to the optimum number of clubs (14) to provide 26 league fixtures without creating artificial games to pad out the season. With new T.V. rights up for negotiation for 2004 and buoyant viewing figures we ought to be able to negotiate a new package which will give every club at least the same money as they now receive, plus sufficient funds to support two new entrants.

As to playing standards, the argument that a French side should be composed entirely of Frenchmen is a non-starter unless of course all British sides are composed solely of Brits. Yes. it was wrong that Paris ran a team of Australians but remember that in their first season Paris S. G. were essentially a completely French team handicapped by the expectation that their players were expected to play both in the French League and Super League and, further, had to fit in international duties as well. The Lesson is obvious: That you cannot have a competitive team if unreasonable demands are made of the players. At a time when British sides have a quota of overseas players plus as many as qualify by residence or, as Mike Ford rightly put it, by virtue of a Scottish grandmother it would be churlish to deny the U.T.C. the assistance of as many overseas stars as British clubs are allowed to recruit.

The argument that Leigh's new chairman put forward about lack of away support if we admit a French side is also flawed. Away support has already been decimated by the

kick off times used to satisfy Sky T.V. and any analysis of British fixtures gives the lie to just how sizeable is travelling support. For example just how many Leigh fans, or more to the point Swinton or Chorley fans, travel to Workington, Barrow or Hull K.R.? I hardly think it makes a dramatic impact on the revenues of the home club. Why else has the Arriva Trains Cup been organised on a regional basis in an effort to maximise derby fixtures? Unfortunately, the logic of this argument is that Leigh would be better served by playing against revived teams in Astley, Tyldesley and Atherton. Somehow I think not!

Mr Beaumont also seemed to think that we should develop the game in our own backyard first before encouraging the French I despair. We have had 107 years to develop the game in our own backyard: surely that is long enough to put down fine foundations? Apparently not. Last Sunday newcomers London Skolars recorded a gate 820. This was more than Batley (801), Barrow (817) and Rochdale (778), all established clubs. Own backyard my a-se as a certain Mr Royle might say!

Of course the real nub of the argument is that Leigh, and no doubt many other clubs, do not want the gangway to Super League closed off now that the principle of relegation and promotion has been re-established. Well, my answer to that would be that U.T.C. and any other club admitted to Super League should be guaranteed their status no matter where they finish for, say, three seasons BUT the lowest placed British team should be relegated and the National League One Grand Final winners promoted in their place, meaning that Leigh, Oldham, Rochdale or whoever still had the possibility of entry to Super League on merit.

And, finally, the presence of one or more French clubs in Super League operating on a fully professional basis should raise the standard of the French game and the international side. Nothing would benefit British Rugby League more than competitive international fixtures with our nearest neighbours. Just look what New Zealand Warriors have achieved for Kiwi League since their inception. And just for the record the Warriors have just two Australians, their Coach Daniel Anderson and stand-off or hooker (and not necessairly first choice) P. J. March. Allez la France!

ON THIS DAY

. . . . with Don Yates

Exactly eighteen years ago, on Saturday 26th January 1985, East Hull, then playing under the name of Mysons, met Oldham opposition in the opening round of the National Cup. Fitton Hill were those Oldham representatives and they travelled over to Humberside more in hope than in the expectancy of victory. Nevertheless they gave of their all against the club who were the competition favourites. Defences were on top on a snow-covered pitch and with eight minutes remaining the match was still scoreless. At that point each side dropped a goal. Fitton Hill then thought they had snatched a famous victory with another dropped goal but it was ruled that a defender had touched the ball in flight and, in those days, that meant that the goal was disallowed. Mysons hit back and in the closing minute Ricky Hewland landed a penalty to give the Humbersiders a rather fortunate 3-1 victory. Fitton Hills disappointment was tempered somewhat when, despite their defeat, they were awarded the team-ofthe-round prize for their magnificent performance.

It was on this day in 1996, Friday 26th January, that a Humberside club knocked professional opposition out of the Challenge Cup. That club was West Hull who entertained York in blizzard conditions before a crowd of 2,000 at the Boulevard. York led 6-4 at half time but the amateurs recovered to win 10-6. The first West Hull try that evening was scored by second-rower Scott Fletcher who joined the recently revived York club earlier this month.

Exactly twelve months later, on Sunday 26th January 1997, York were again the unwilling victims of an amateur club in the Challenge Cup. Dudley Hill beat them on that occasion by 21-14, this time at the Ryedale Stadium. Dudley Hill agreed that the big difference between the teams was the fact that the amateurs were midway through their season whilst

the professionals were just starting theirs. It is a problem which adds spice to the occasion but one which Oldham will have to be wary of this afternoon.

Two years ago, on Friday 26th January 2001, British rugby league received a huge fillip when St.Helens won the World Club Challenge with a 20-18 victory over Australian champions Brisbane Broncos. The Australian visitors led 18-6 early in the second half before St.Helens staged an exciting revival to

snatch a memorable victory. Former Oldham junior Paul Sculthorpe was outstanding for St.Helens that evening, scoring a try and a decisive late dropped goal whilst former Oldham player Chris Joynt also scored a try and skippered St. Helens to that historic victory.

Another former Oldham player to hit the headlines in cup football was full-back Derek Whitehead. On Saturday 26th January 1974 he landed the two first half penalties which enabled Warrington to defeat Featherstone Rovers 4-0 in the final of the Captain Morgan Trophy. This was a knockout competition involving first round winners in the earlier county cup competitions. It was not exactly the most invigorating competition ever staged by the Rugby Football League and this final at Salford was a rather dreary affair watched by a disappointing crowd of 5,259. Not surprisingly that inaugural tournament also turned out to be the last.




