

In the capital today Al Ferrier runs the rule over today's visitors OLDHAM ROUGHYEDS

Good afternoon and welcome to Griffin Park. Today we welcome the supporters, players, directors and staff of Oldham for this crucial Powergen Challenge Cup fourth round match.

Today's match is the first time that London have entertained Oldham at Griffin Park, our previous meetings taking place around the city at The Valley, The Stoop and Barnet Copthall amongst others. It is also the first match between London and Oldham since August 1997. Both clubs have something in common in that they are tenants of Nationwide League Division Two football clubs.

London have faced the Roughyeds a good number of times over the years. Indeed, elsewhere in this issue, Peter Lush and Dave Farrar give the background to Oldham's rich history. In particular they mention the infamous 1991-2 season when, partly because of the strange divisional setup at the time, London faced Oldham no less than six times!

London kicked-off the following season at Oldham's former home, The Watersheddings, and duly went down 27-12. It was five hard months before they met again in the Challenge Cup, crashing out to the tune of 34-6. The Crusaders then had a change in fortune and beat them away on 21.3.93 with 20-27 being the final scoreline. Bizarrely, the fixture congestion caused by bad weather earlier meant that London concluded their season with two matches against Oldham, both times at home! London acquitted themselves well, with the first game being drawn at 20-20, the season closing with a 30-18 victory.

Time passed and the Super League era dawned. The shortened 1995-96 season saw the Broncos

face the Roughyeds again, going down 19-8 at Watersheddings in September '95 but raising their game to take the points a month later by a substantial 46-14 back in the capital. Super League I – the 1996 season – saw London in the ascendant with two narrow victories over the newly-named Oldham Bears, taking the spoils 28-22 in June '96 at The Valley and then again away in August by 14-22. London finished in a respectable fourth place that year but even better was to come ...

In terms of final Super League placement, 1997 was a golden season. London took on all comers and duly completed the double over the Bears in April (22-32) and August (36-28), eventually finishing in second place. Super League II is still widely-regarded as the best season's performance in the league in the Broncos era. Oldham were not so lucky and the visit by them on 5.8.97 was to be the last meeting between the two sides until today. Oldham Bears called it a day at the end of that season, later reforming themselves in the RFL's lower division

Coming back to the present day, Oldham's current squad has much to recommend it and will be a handful for London. Key personnel to

look out for today include the following:

Paul Anderson: Signing from Leigh Centurions for the beginning of the 2003 season, his preferred position is centre but he's not at a loss in the second row. A burly build enables him to make a try out of sheer strength. Paul was Leigh's leading try scorer the season before last, and is well known for his

blockbusting runs. His previous clubs include St Helens and Sheffield Eagles.

Simon Svabic: Simon is another one of the players signed from the Centurions at the end of the 2002 campaign, although his career started in Oldham with the nowdefunct Bears. A stand-off half of great guile, he will be an important play-maker in the Roughyeds' armoury for this year.

Steve Molloy: The experienced thirty-three year old is an ex-England captain and excels in his role as playercoach. Molloy, who signed for his second spell at Oldham from Batley Bulldogs, was the obvious choice for the dual

role when the previous coach left mid-season. A front-row forward who has also played for Featherstone, Sheffield, Warrington, Huddersfield and Leeds, Molloy is an Oldham lad and had a loan spell at Boundary Park at the end of the 2000 season, making a big contribution to Oldham's excellent end-ofChris Morley: Chris is the older brother of Great Britain's Adrian. Like his brother, Chris is a no-nonsense second-row forward. He was signed from Leigh Centurions to start the Roughyeds' 2003 campaign. Chris has the size and mean streak to stiffen up Oldham's back row.

Darren Shaw: London welcome back their former old boy today. Darren was signed from Salford City Reds after their relegation to National League Division One. He is a highly-experienced second row or prop forward, whose previous clubs include Sheffield Eagles where he won a Challenge Cup winners' medal

in 1998. Darren has also featured Castleford, Brisbane and Canberra Raider and has been a firm favourite with fans a every club he's played for.

Enjoy the game!

LOOKING BACK

Oldham one hundred and twenty-seven years of rugby history

Peter Lush and Dave Farrar look at today's visitors.

Oldham have won the Challenge Cup three times, but with the most recent win being in 1927, have never played in a Wembley final. The club were runners-up in another four finals. In modern times, the club's most famous Challenge Cup win was a 10-8 victory over Wigan in February 1987. Wigan did not lose in the competition again until 1996! In 1990, the club won the Divisional Premiership, beating Hull KR 30-29 in the final, having been 29-6 down early in the second half.

The club have won every honour in the game, including Championship (three times) and Lancashire Cup (nine times). Forty Oldham players have represented Great Britain, including Andy Goodway and Hugh Waddell in the 1980s. Alan Davies won twenty Great Britain caps between 1955 and 1960, and is the club's record try-scorer. Joe Ferguson holds the club's record for appearances: 626 between 1899 and 1923. Bernard Ganley is the record point scorer, with 2,775 between 1951 and 1961.

Oldham's original home was The Watersheddings, reputedly the coldest place in professional British Rugby League. In January 1997, the

club moved, with much regret, as major works were needed to bring the ground to a modern standard. Since then it has had a nomadic existence, but is now back in the town at Oldham FC's Boundary Park. The club played two seasons in Super League under the "Bears" name (also used by Fulham briefly in 1986) before withdrawing and reforming under their traditional nickname of the Roughyeds, playing recently in the Northern Ford Premiership (now the National League Divisions One and Two).


In league matches, London have won nine to Oldham's eight, with one draw, so the stage is set for an interesting contest. However, Oldham have won the four "knockout" matches, in the Challenge Cup, Regal Trophy and Divisional Premiership. In the 1991-2 season, the teams met six times, London's only victory being 10-0 at Watersheddings in December in the league. The few London supporters there that day celebrated, while a shocked Oldham crowd went home. having seen their team "nilled" at Watersheddings! That season an eight-team second division meant four matches against each club.

Just a handful of players have played for both clubs, most notably Mick Taylor, Hussain M'Barki, Alan Platt, Ben Olsen and Richard Blackman.

LOOKING FORWARD

Bring it on!

Al Ferrier previews the season ahead.

After weeks of tough training in the NSW Central Coast, London have returned to these shores ready to do battle with whatever the north can throw at them. Hopes are high that the Broncos can surpass last year's eighth placing and clinch a play-off position and, as long as the current squad can produce the goods on the pitch, we will continue to consider it a reality.

Weeks of training in eighty-degree plus heat culminated with a friendly against Wests Tigers. Without the services of Dennis Moran, who had post season knee surgery, coach Tony Rea suffred another setback when Chris Thorman was also ruled out through. Rea was obliged to call on local players and London went down narrowly with 12-18 being the final scoreline.

Tony Rea has been active on the transfer market with the biggest news being the signing of former Newcastle Knight Bill Peden. Peden was part of the side which went all the way to two Grand Finals and expects to make a similar mark on his debut season in the British game. He'll be joining up with Tommy Haughey, a young forward from Wakefield, and established stars like Jim Dymock, Tony Martin and skipper Jason Hetherington.

The season has no rest time, and there will be no 'easy' fixtures for the team to breeze through. Every month sees at least one match which will demand London playing at their very best to earn the points, and even then, there wil be no certainties. March could be hard with no actual home match scheduled and the Broncos will have to be clinical and kill off their opponents if the play-offs are to be a reality. The gameplan needs to be certain to account for the Wigans and Bradfords as much as the Wakefields and Huddersfields. There can be no let-up at all: total rugby league must be the desire!

Arguably the crucial period between 9th May (when London entertain Leeds) and when we face them again at Headingley on 25th July will decide whether we are play-off material but that's not to say that important matches don't figure before and after this time as they do.

One would like to think that sixth place play off spot will be assured come the start of September but this is Super League and nothing can be taken for granted...

SUPER LEAGUE

Up for the cup!

Dave Allen looks at how rugby league's premier cup competition is evolving

The Challenge Cup Final has seen plenty of firsts this year, but it seems that the competition is still managing to maintain its magic despite being among the most modern and revolutionary in British sport.

For a long time, people speculated that the Challenge Cup had lost some of its magic when the introduction of Super League saw Rugby League move to a summer season.

The 'something special' of Wembley was missing at Murrayfield and Twickenham but, having had the pleasure of visiting Cardiff's Millennium Stadium for last November's Test Match, I am already excited about Saturday 27th April, no matter which two teams are playing.

Despite a small crowd inside the venue, the atmosphere was still good, and the chances are that the stadium will be packed to the rafters with a full house this time around. Unfortunately, it is unlikely that the sole-surviving French team - Super League hopefuls Union Treiziste Catalan - will make it past this Fourth Round stage after being paired with last year's beaten finalists St Helens.

Saints are likely to have one eye on the World Club Challenge next weekend, but they should be too strong for the French club, who went one better than Toulouse, Villeneuve and Pia, who all put up competitive displays in vain. If the French are to fulfil their

hopes of returning at least one team into Super League, their progress in this competition over the coming years will be another key indicator of the renaissance of the code across the

This season also saw Russia enter the competition for the first time and, while defeats for Strella Kazan and Locomotiv Moscow, saw them fall at the first hurdle, the game continues to spread in the country. Indeed, the Russians have now declared that League has surpassed Union as the country's favourite handling code. Their automatic entry into the World Sevens without having to qualify, as opposed to the likes of Japan and the United States, is a sign of their growth, and it would be great to see British clubs playing Challenge Cup matches in Moscow in future years.

The Challenge Cup Final has been on somewhat of a roadshow itself over the past three seasons and, while Murrayfield was comfortably better than Twickenham in my experience, I hope that Cardiff can create that special feeling which Wembley did.

Seeing the Broncos there in 1999 and putting up such a great show for over half the game against Leeds was a landmark day for Rugby

Perhaps Tony Rea's men can go one better in 2003?






Prop Idol 2003 winners (I-r)
