



Finally many congratulations to Hunslet Hawks for their cup win over my favourite team (not!) Huddersfield. As long as there are results like that the romance of the cup lives on.



Daniel Lockhart: Joined Barrow from Walney Central and immediately claimed the full back spot until his injury.

Barry Pugh: Another international, a player who is on the verge of the first team at stand off or loose forward.

Ryan Corbett: A big forward who runs hard at the gaps and who shows a surprisingly adroit side-step for such a big player.

Andrew Henderson: Torquay born 22 year old Aussie who only arrived in the country in May 2001. Went straight into Salford A team where he was appointed captain and awarded 'A Team Player of the Year'. Equally at home at half back, hooker or loose forward, came to the UK from North Sydney Bears.

Paul Jones: 22 year old versatile back very fast, signed from local amateurs Askam last season, scored a 80 yard try for Askam against Barrow in The Challenge Cup two years ago.

Paul Lupton: One of three rugby playing brothers Peter is at Leeds and Graham with local amateurs Askam. Paul, a strong tackling forward, is a former Barla international. Hails from the once famous Millom Club.

Adam Pate: A rugby union signing plays full back or stand off half. Hails from Carlisle and has represented Cumbria at Union, a useful goal kicker

Paul Gardner: Utility player and older brother of Saints (Ade) and Leeds (Matt) formerly with Warrington as a youngster, strong in attack.

Anthony Horton: Utility player signed from

Walney Central.

Chris Archer: Half back signed from London Broncos, where he spent two seasons, a major signing for Barrow. Archer is Barrow born having played junior rugby for Hindpool.

Paul Evans: Half back signed in the close season from local side Millom. A Cumbria County player a sound goal kicker.

Tane Manihera: Half back in his second spell at Barrow after rejoining the club in the close season after two years with Workington. Former junior Kiwi played for Carlisle also.

Andy McClure: Local centre from Roose-Pioneers strong running player played for Cumbria amateurs.

James King: Prop/second row forward new recruit from Australia.

Craig Bower: Centre also from Australia played alongside King and Andy Henderson.

A Potted History ofby Don Yates

BARROW, from National League Division Two, visit Boundary Park this afternoon in what, for both clubs, is a vital Arriva Trains League Cup qualifier. Oldham, without a win so far, have ground to make up but Barrow are confident of qualifying from the North group after collecting points from both their opening matches. Last season the Shipbuilders reached the quarter-final stage of this competition but were drawn away at Whitehaven where they narrowly lost 23-22. They will be hoping for a better draw this year as they strive to lift their first piece of silverware since 1984.

The Barrow club was founded in the 1870s and joined the Rugby Football League in 1900. For the next 50-odd years Barrow were respected and popular visitors to each and every ground because of their reputation for playing attractive rugby. However, success evaded them throughout those years although they were Lancashire Cup and Wembley finalists during the 1937-38 season.

The 1950s changed all that when the great Barrow team of the Willie Horne. Phil Jackson, Jack Grundy and Dennis Goodwin era enabled the Shipbuilders to win their first trophy. It was Oldham who suffered, beaten 12-2 in the 1954 Lancashire Cup Final. The Barrow try scorers in that final were centre threequarter Dennis Goodwin and second-row forward Reg Parker with skipper and stand-off Willie Horne landing three goals. Willie Horne is, without doubt, Barrows most famous sporting personality. Not only was he a very talented rugby player and an inspiring leader, he was also the epitome of modesty, generosity and sportsmanship. He became, quite literally, a legend in his own lifetime. He captained Barrow three times at Wembley and also skippered Lancashire, England and Great Britain. Between 1943 and 1959 Horne played in 461 matches for Barrow and scored 1,817 points from 113 tries and 739 goals. The main stand at Craven

Park is named after him as is a street in Barrow and he was also made a Freeman of the Borough of Barrow-in-Furness. Before Horne signed for Barrow he was sought by Oldham. He actually played a couple of matches for the Roughveds during the 1942-43 season after which he was offered a substantial sum of money to turn professional with Oldham. Instead Horne elected to join his hometown club on terms which were much less than those offered by the Roughyeds. How Oldham must have rued his loyalty to Barrow as he lifted the Lancashire Cup that October afternoon at Swinton. At the end of that 1954-55 season Barrow added the Challenge Cup to their haul after beating Workington Town 21-12 at Wembley. Since then Barrow have lifted three more trophies. Division Two Championships in 1976 and 1984 and the Lancashire Cup in 1983. Barrow also reached Wembley in 1951, 1957 and 1967 and were beaten Regal Trophy finalists in 1981 but recent seasons have been relatively barren.

The last time Barrow won a major trophy was during season 1983-84 when they managed to lift two pieces of silverware. Early in the season they lifted the Lancashire Cup, beating First Division clubs Whitehaven, Salford, Warrington and Widnes in order to claim the trophy. Widnes were enjoying a tremendous run of success in cup competitions around that time and were firm favourites to win the final which was staged at Wigan. Barrow had different ideas and played magnificently to win 12-8. They lost only two matches in the league campaign to win the Second Division Championship a massive fourteen points in front of second placed Workington Town, A prominent member of that Barrow team was secondrow forward Steve Herbert who had been signed from Oldham a couple of years earlier. He missed only two matches all season and ended the campaign as the clubs leading try scorer with 25 touchdowns.

Of Roughyeds And Barrow

THE first match between Oldham and Barrow in the Rugby League era was on September 8th 1900. This being the season that the "Furness-men" were admitted to the League. The Roughyeds won that encounter by six points to three up at Barrow and completed the double two weeks later with an 8 - 2 victory at Watersheddings.

On January 25th 1947 Oldham made the trip to Barrow for a league game that was designated as a Benefit match for five Barrow players: Cumberbatch, Ayres, Higgins, Little and McKeating. The match ended in a draw, three points each. That same evening saw the beginning of the big freeze and it would be another two months before Oldham played their next league game.

The only final to feature the two clubs

was the 1954 Lancashire Cup final at Station Road, Swinton when Barrow upset the form book to take the trophy for the first time in their history.

One of the most memorable matches took place on September 22nd 1956 when a crowd of just under 19,000 packed Watersheddings to see the Roughyeds turn in a vintage performance to win the match by 45 - 13. Many of our older supporters still remember this game as representing the very best of the talents of the 1950s Oldham side. Dennis Ayres scored four tries and, in the absence of Bernard Ganley, Dick Cracknell took over the goal kicking duties landing five shots to supplement his two tries. All this achieved against a multi-talented Barrow outfit that would go on to finish third in the league

championship table and runners up in the Challenge Cup final, losing narrowly to Leeds at Wembley. Indeed they were one of only five teams to register a league victory over Oldham that season in the return match at Craven Park some two months later.

Since the Roughyeds reformed in 1997. The clubs have met on ten occasion with Oldham successful six times to four for Barrow.

Everything else in rugby league pales into insignificance when compared to the sad announcement of the death of 49 year old, rugby marketing guru, Peter Deakin and then last weekend, the shock news of the tragedy in which the two young Wigan Academy players Billy-Joe Edwards, brother of the legendary Shaun, and Craig Johnson, brother of current Wigan star Paul, both died.

Many Oldham supporters will recall just a few years ago the young Oldham players killed in a tragic car accident on the M62 just above the town. The grief felt by parents, friends, fellow players and within the rugby club must have been devastating.

There have already been many words written about Peter Deakin, but I would like to add just two; vision and drive. Peter was one of the few to enter the world of commercial club rugby and still manage to hold a crystal clear vision of the direction in which the sport, either code, needed to be heading. This he coupled to his limitless drive, enthusiasm

and ability in persuading people not just to listen but to act.

Let's not forget either that Peter, whilst an Oldham St. Annes man through and through, was also an Oldham player of the late 70's. He played in the same side as the likes of Fred Hall, Geoff Munro, Ian Ogden, Phil Larder, Martin Murphy, Mike Elliot, Roger O'Mahoney, Bob Blackwood and Jim Fiddler before his playing career was cut short due to a severe dislocated elbow.

How Peter Deakin, the marketing man, would have loved the news that Aussies coach Chris Anderson suggests the Kangaroos should play a Test in Moscow as a lead-up to this seasons Ashes Tour! What he would have planned for that match!

During the close season Bob Byrne a popular Oldham threequarter in the late 40's, early 50's passed away aged 78. Bob regularly attended Oldham's home matches and was a stalwart of the explayers group. A Roughyed to the core.





Back On The Terraces

FOLLOWING BARLA's decision to accept proposals to create a unified governing structure for the sport in this country, lets hope that we can now finally see an end to the infighting that has blighted the progress of our beloved game for so long. Commenting on the historic decision by the Amateur games ruling body, RFL Chief Executive, Richard Lewis commented, This decision is a massive step forward for the sport of Rugby League at all levels and everybody involved in the game should be delighted. The new unified structure will govern the game from grass roots to international level and create many benefits for all concerned. It will enable us to develop a unified, cohesive approach to many existing initiatives and strategies which will reap dividends for all sectors of Rugby League and help the sport build further on the excellent progress it has recently made in many areas".

Of course, like most decisions made in the modern game, this was made largely on a financial basis. Unification means funding from agencies such as Sport England and UK Sport and, now that Rugby League will take its rightful piece of the pie, lets hope that we finally see the real investment in the grass roots of the game something that has been sadly missing for all too

It was perhaps always going to be difficult to live up to the pre-season hype and the pre-season euphoria generated has perhaps stuttered a little in sync with the Roughyeds performances to date. Its very early doors of course but at Leigh we under performed, particularly defensively, and against the Hornets we looked good in spells but poor in others. I'm sure that the coaching team will be working overtime to tighten up our marker defence and promote a more direct approach from our outside half play.

Indeed, always the harshest of critics, many in the crowd were frustrated with the Rochdale performance. Not because it was particularly poor because it wasn't, but more because they have seen clear glimpses of what this side is capable of. We have an extremely young squad and, make no mistakes, there is plenty more football in this side and that's perhaps why the faithful are getting a little frustrated. In all honesty I myself came away from that game feeling a little disappointed at blowing a relatively comfortable lead.

However, lets not forget that the really important stuff doesn't even start until the 18 April when we entertain the Hornets once again (hopefully in better weather!). Of course winning the National League Cup will count for absolutely nothing if we are struggling in NL1 come the summer something I don't believe for a second will be the case. We have a young and mobile side that will undoubtedly perform better on the harder grounds and, with so many new faces,

when they gel together they will surely be a force to reckon with and must be considered as odds on for a play off spot. From there of course who knows what could happen!

Today we welcome Barrow to Boundary Park for a game that should prove an intriguing encounter. It will of course be of particular interest to lain Marsh and Martin McLoughlin who played for our visitors during the last campaign. Whilst it's early days for our two new recruits, their departure from Cumbria was viewed with disappointment by the Border Raiders fans who held both in high esteem. Barrow have performed well so far this season and will undoubtedly prove tough opposition today. Indeed, there was perhaps far more to gauge from their performance in last weekends Challenge Cup than ours. However, lets hope our new boys live up to their potential today and help the Roughyeds seal their first Arriva Trains Cup victory at Boundary Park.

The marketing efforts made by the club this season have been excellent. I'm pleased that the Oldham Chronicle is supporting both the town's professional sporting clubs this season with the promotion of free admission for children proving a real success. I've long held the belief that children should be allowed free admittance to matches as long as accompanied by a paying adult. These are of course are our supporters of tomorrow and once you get them hooked - they will keep coming back for more. Realistically we are competing with many other distractions for kids, particularly during the summer months, and to offer a 'free' alternative is an excellent way of doing so. Who wants to see an empty Boundary Park when we could have added a thousand onto the attendance, all shouting the Roughyeds on to victory. Of course there are the merchandising benefits that spin off from this - any youngster that becomes a regular will of course want to buy a shirt, scarf or programme etc.

In addition, the new lottery has been a great success by all accounts and overall it's clear that the club have made great strides on the commercial front this year. By building a close knit relationship with it's community, the club will profit in the longer term and will have then actually achieved it's goal of finally returning home.

Whilst on the marketing front, it would be remiss of me not to mention the sad passing of one of Oldham's sons, Peter Deakin. Peter was of course a stalwart of the St Annes club and will be remembered by most in RL circles as the man solely responsible for the creation of 'Bull mania'. I, like many, had hoped that Peter would one day return home and weave his marketing magic for the Roughyeds. However, that wasn't meant to be and we all extend our sympathies to his family and friends for theirs and Rugbys sad loss.

Covers the whole area thoroughly and without fuss. Only needs one chance to shine once applied provides lots of colour.

4. SHELF BRACKET

Good in any backs to the wall situation. Strong in support and willing to bear any load.

5. LIGHT FITTING

Can be a bit on and off. However, when on shines brightly and illuminates the scene splendidly.

6. TILING GROUT

Prods and pokes into those tight nooks and crannies which defeat the heavy weight. Once set takes some shifting.

7. WALL BAROMETER

Mercurial. An up and down performer. Responds well to pressure. Always likely to record a high score.

8. BRICK OUTHOUSE

Really powerful and in your face. Not easy to tackle. Provides plenty of solidity whether in the open or close to.

9. WASHING LINE

An outstanding hooker, always hanging round the fringes. Often pegs back the opposition and able to offer support to the line.

10. IRONMONGERY

Hard as nails. Will hammer into any opposition and screws up their defence. Can be well drilled and offer plenty of bite.

11. TOILET SEAT

Has plumbed the depths but has also been flushed with success. Takes on the heaviest of loads at times but can be uplifting.

12. KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Takes everything in and is rarely found wanting. Wonderful capacity for keeping a lid on things. Occasionally adds spice to the proceedings.

13. FIRESIDE RUG

Very versatile. Can be used in a variety of positions and handles well. Sometimes a bit lightweight but covers a lot of holes.

All in all not a bad team but it's till not the same as the real thing. However, if we want to increase our gates perhaps Roughyeds v B &Q is the way to go.







Words of Wilson

... by Ian Wilson

THE issue of promotion and relegation is one that we in RL have been grappling with for many years, but it is also one which other sports find equally controversial. At Oldham we haven't been quite so directly affected as, for example, Keighlev. Dewsbury or Hunslet in recent years, maybe - though we did cease to exist on relegation from Super League, of course! And we were the archetypal yo-yo side in the previous era. So perhaps we do know something about it. Now that we have a uniformed spokesman for the game - thank goodness - and at least the beginnings, or the prospects, of some sort of pyramid structure throughout the game, perhaps it is worth another look at the issue.

It has always been the accepted view in the UK that, whatever 'foreigners' may choose to do (or USA American football, or Aussie RL), a recognised system of promotion and relegation is an integral part of the attraction of professional sport here; that 'doing a Wimbledon' ought to be possible, and a vital incentive for every club: and that standards follow this pattern. at whatever level, with this at the forefront of their minds, as a major attraction.

Soccer is the example always quoted. especially now that there is automatic promotion and relegation between the Football League and the Conference - after many, many years of re-election of the bottom side in the bottom division, it is often comically ignored, was the norm. [It is interesting to see currently Chester, Halifax Town, Doncaster Rovers, Hereford United, Scarborough and Southport in the top nine of the Nationwide Conference, as well as Aldershot and Accrington Stanley at the top of their leagues one notch further down the pyramid, Barrow, Bradford P.A. Gateshead and Workington, also once Football League clubs, languish further down the hierarchy.]

Cricket, on the other hand, had never had such a system until recently and their 3-up. 3-down shake up is already under fire from many. Rugby Union, too, is in the midst of a major debate on the subject, with a healthy bit of scandal thrown in, accusations of the current elite in effect bribing last season's potentially-promoted

side. Rotherham, to accept non-promotion quickly.

The man with the money behind the Newcastle club recently put the case against promotion and relegation very effectively. No doubt Martyn Sadler editor of League Express, would have great sympathy with his case, too - though I have never seen any serious agreement with Martyn's rather strange views that there should be promotion but no relegation! The argument is that the quality of the top level of the game requires stability, especially financial stability, if it is to be maintained and enhanced and that the threat of relegation makes this impossible. As a result, teams take short term action (e.g. import of overseas stars to try to give a quick fix) - or, indeed, do an Oldham Bears - and this goes against the long term health of the competition, and the game as a whole, including the quality of the international representative side.

This is not a case which should be dismissed lightly, it has a lot of validity. However, it is surely a question of priorities. For the benefits of having a franchise type system, with elevation to the Super League of the sport being based on criteria other than straight playing success, including the agreement of the existing member clubs, outweigh the incentive benefits of

promotion and relegation.

For myself, I think we have it just about right. I think a self perpetuating closed shop is utterly wrong, guaranteed to lead to conservatisim, and disunity within the game as a whole, and spectators discomfort - at least, in the UK. On the other hand, I see nothing wrong with criteria in addition to playing success or failure being used - provided they are set and policed by the game as a whole, and known in advance, by the clubs involved. So, it was quite right that Widnes replaced Huddersfield, and then Huddersfield replaced Salford; but it was equally right, sadly, that Hunslet and Dewsbury were denied Super League entry, on financial grounds.

It would be interesting to know the view of others.


Every Monday From your newsagent since their re-formation when Hull visit the Don Valley Stadium. While a win for the Eagles is not impossible, they'll be long odds against.

107 years of rugby league development and investment throughout Lancashire and Yorkshire and fewer than 1000 paying spectators at all too many matches. If that doesn't make you think it should.

With the population drift in this country being inexorably to the south-east the timing in of the introduction of NL3 by the RFL could not be better. I don't want to see a single existing club go out of existence and would gladly welcome back a revived Bramley. But long term I can't help feeling the future might just lie with Coventry or Cheltenham, Crawley or Hemel Hempstead. To take but one example. Before about 1970 Swinton and Pendlebury was a maze of terraced houses whose occupants worked in the coal pits, steel works. chemical works or power stations that filled Irwell Valley and Agecroft. Both houses and employment are long gone together with the wonderful Station Road ground and some magnificent Swinton teams. With the best will in the world there will be no revival in the near future. Extend the analogy. Barrow are no longer the shipbuilders, Featherstone no longer the colliers. Batley and Dewsbury are no longer the heavy woollen district nor Oldham and Rochdale the textile capital of the world. Although this has an element of doommongering it is not intended to undermine the efforts of their forefathers. But we need to be realistic: for rugby league - the greatest game the future is clear: expand or die. Nationally or internationally the product is fantastic, so for everyone's sake let's take the game to the world. If 10,000 in Beirut or 16,000 in Kazan are interested what have we got to lose?

The concept of 'summer' rugby was put to the test again a fortnight ago against Rochdale Hornets. As a friend of mine commented about the Arriva Trains Cup: 'some great fixtures, a great competition, wrong time of year'! Will we ever learn?

ON THIS DAY



... with Don Yates

IT WAS on this day in 1974. Saturday 16th February, that a player who has given excellent service to both Oldham and Barrow made his senior professional debut. That player is Eddie Barton who appeared on the wing for Oldham in a home First Division match against Wakefield Trinity. It was a winning start for Barton with the Roughyeds defeating their visitors 9-2. Bartons introduction to rugby league was quite unusual. He was a colleague of Oldham centre Phil Larder who took him along to Watersheddings in order to receive some physiotherapy treatment. After the treatment Barton would test out his injury progress by joining in some of the training drills. Once it was established that Barton could play a bit, he was signed on and he went on to make 110 appearances for Oldham and score 21 tries. In December 1977 Barton was transferred to Barrow. He made 32 appearances for the Shipbuilders and scored three tries before moving on to Huddersfield in January 1980.

On Saturday 16th February 1991
Barrow appointed Paul Kavanagh as coach. He chose former player Geoff Worrall as his assistant. Worrall, a full-back, spent some time with Oldham in the early 1970s although he made only one first team appearance for the Roughyeds. It came in March 1973 when he landed a couple of goals in a 37-6 victory over Barrow at Watersheddings. When Kavanagh stepped down as coach, Worrall took over and was in control at Craven Park from July 1992 to April 1993.

Exactly five years ago, on Monday 16th February 1998, the current Roughyeds player-coach, Steve Molloy, was transferred from Featherstone Rovers to Sheffield Eagles. Molloy played 99 matches for the Eagles, including matches for the amalgamated Huddersfield-Sheffield Eagles club. He scored seven tries during those matches but became increasingly disillusioned with life at the McAlpine Stadium. As a result Molloy had a spell on loan with Oldham

during June and July 2001 before joining Batley in December of that year. Since then, of course, he has returned to Oldham where he leads the club, as ever, from the front.

Tuesday 16th February 1988 was a significant date in the career of Dean Marwood, the talented goal-kicking halfback. He turned professional that day when he joined Barrow from the productive Barrow Island junior club. He became a big crowd favourite at Craven Park before moving up the coast to Workington Town in December 1991. Marwood returned to Barrow six years later to play out the final couple of years of his playing career. During his two spells with Barrow he made 142 appearances and scored 21 tries, 342 goals and 14 dropped goals.

Six years ago, on Sunday 16th February 1997, Barrow were involved in the Silk Cut Plate, the competition for clubs eliminated from the third round of the Challenge Cup. They visited Deepdale that day to take on a Lancashire Lvnx side which included current Oldham prop
