


Oldham continues to take significant strides to be THE desirable place to live, work or visit in the North West.



A Potted History of Featherstone . . . by Don Yates

THE current Featherstone Rovers club was founded in 1902 and accepted into the Rugby Football League in June 1921. Despite being located in a small town, Featherstone's achievements since then have been nothing short of remarkable. League Champions in 1977, Challenge Cup winners at Wembley on three occasions, they have appeared in the final of 17 other cup competitions and have provided numerous players for representative selection including sixteen who have gained full test recognition.



David Hobbs

Three of those internationals went on to play for Oldham including the current Roughyeds player-coach Steve Molloy. The other two were also propforwards, Terry Clawson and David Hobbs.

Featherstone Rovers have been promoted into the top flight of

competition three times and Oldham were promoted with them on all three occasions. In those days the top flight was Division One and Rovers were Second Division Champions during the 1979-80 and 1992-93 seasons. When Rovers won promotion in 1987-88, Oldham won the Second Division Championship. That was the season when Oldham and Featherstone Rovers met in that amazing Second Division Premiership thriller at Old Trafford. Oldham led 22-0 after 32 minutes but. after an unbelievable fight back, Rovers looked home and dry four minutes from time when they were 26-22 in front. At that point Des Fov made the break for Kevin Meadows to score the equalising

try which Charlie McAllister converted to snatch a 28-26 victory for the Roughyeds.

Since the inception of Super league seven years ago. Featherstone Rovers have figured outside the top league although they have made a significant contribution to the championship immediately below Super League. In 1996 they ended the campaign in fourth spot although that season there was no end-of-season play-off. Neither was there a play-off the following season, 1997, when Rovers finished in seventh position. However, late in the season their visit to the eventual champions, Hull, was televised as the Airlie Birds required a win to clinch the title. Featherstone spoiled the outside broadcast and also the championship celebrations by winning 18-4 at the Boulevard. Steve Molloy was a try scorer that day as Hull suffered their only league defeat of the season.

The closest Featherstone Rovers have been to gaining Super League status came in 1998 when the club reached the first Northern Ford Premiership Grand Final. That championship decider at Huddersfield proved to be a thrilling encounter in which Rovers led their neighbours and arch rivals Wakefield Trinity with five minutes of the match remaining. Trinity's late score, which snatched a 24-22 victory, was a real sickener for Rovers who many present thought deserved to take the title. The following two seasons saw Featherstone Rovers eliminated from the latter stages of the play-offs by clubs who went on to clinch the title. In 1999 they lost 17-9 at Hunslet and, twelve months later, were beaten 25-18 at Dewsbury.

The past two seasons have also seen Featherstone qualify for the play-off. In 2001 Rovers championship aspirations ended at Leigh where they were beaten 26-10 whilst last year they suffered a surprise 32-30 home defeat at the hands of Batley.

Of Roughyeds And ... Featherstone Rovers

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Featherstone Rovers and so renew the rivalry with one of our long standing trans-Pennine opponents.

Featherstone entered the league in the 1921-22 season and first visited Watersheddings on February 18th 1922 in a match which resulted in a 28 - 5 victory for the Roughyeds. Oldham finished at the top of the league table that season only to concede the championship to Wigan when beaten in the play off final. Featherstone struggled a little in their inaugural campaign finishing third from the bottom of the league of twenty six clubs. However, just six years later the club had come on so much that they finished third in the table and fought their way through to the championship final by defeating second placed Leeds at Headingley. In the final, which incidentally was played at Watersheddings, they came up against the all conquering Swinton side who defeated them by eleven points to nil

on their way to taking all four major trophies that were up for competition at the time.

Fixtures between Oldham and 'Fev' were quite infrequent in those days and it wasn't until the war time emergency league match on November 21st 1942 that Rovers managed to lower the Roughyeds colours with a 18 - 10 victory at Post Office Road. Although there was a drawn match (3 -3) also at Featherstone on March 9th 1929.

Since then of course there have been many titanic struggles between the two clubs with Post Office Road being far from a happy hunting ground for Oldham, and most other clubs for that matter. Sorry to the Rovers fans to have to mention it again, but the biggest game between the sides was that Division two play off final at Old Trafford in 1988. Oldham won by 28 - 26 in one of the most exciting matches the clubs have ever conjured up between them.

For over eighty years our two famous clubs have done battle on the rugby field, let us hope the fixture prevails for as long again, and beyond.

Christopher Hamilton, the club Chairman thanked all those concerned for making the opening possible and presented Life Membership certificates to the volunteers and club staff who had put so much time into the clubs renovation. Saturday night was official opening night with top class cabaret booked, and all concerned waited with nervous anticipation of a good turn out. They need not have worried by 6.30pm half an hour before the doors were to open there was a queue forming outside, by 8.00pm there was not a seat to be had in the Concert Room.

It is thought that over 350 people were in attendance and many more new members were enrolled on the

night. There are now well over 500 paid up members, the vast majority being people who live in the vicinity of the club and once Oldham Rugby fans visit the club we are sure that the membership will further swell. I popped in on Sunday night and it was really pleasant to just sit and chat with Oldham Rugby fans who you normally just nod to at the game - in short it felt great to be in a place we could call our own and where you knew that the money you were spending was going to our club and not to others unconnected to the club or the game.

It was nice on Saturday night to be visited by a delegation from Leigh Centurions who were staying at the Avant Hotel just opposite in preparation for the Arriva Trains Final on the following day. Tommy Martyn was well received by Oldham Rugby fans present and he immediately likened the atmosphere to that of the old Watersheddings club.

It was good to see a 6,486 crowd at the Arriva Trains Final, which was bigger than four of the Super League games played over the weekend. Less pleasing was the violent nature of the game, but, all in all it, to me, proved that the Arriva Trains Cup has caught on - rugby league fans don't turn up to meaningless matches - and after all it was in direct competition to the Wimbledon Men's Final.

They represented Mike Neild Builders Ltd, chief sponsors of the Our picture shows club chairman tournament which was organised


comprising of John Barrett, John Battye, Robin Highfield, Brian Walker and club director Sean Whitehead.

Back On The Terraces

WHAT EXCELLENT news it was to hear that the club have been successful in their bid for 'Sports Match' funding with their first ever application. They have managed to land a £50,000 grant that will significantly contribute to the development of the game at grass roots level in the town. Indeed, one of the critical factors in securing this backing was that the Roughyeds were prepared to stump up £50,000 of their own money, truly a measure of their own commitment to developing into a real community club. In committing this kind of funding, the Roughyeds have given up the vast majority of the 2003 sponsorship from Oldham Property Partnership (OPP).

The total of £100,000 will see the Roughyeds employ somebody working specifically on full time Rugby League development with the club appointing a full time Community Marketing and Development Manager on a minimum 2 year contract.

It's now 10 years since Neil Wood was Oldham's RL Development Officer and, having personally worked in the scheme along with Mike Ford and many others, I can honestly vouch for it's value, particularly in terms of giving all of Oldham's voungsters the opportunity to sample this great game. A structured and well planned programme will not only see Rugby League played in every Primary school in the town but also allow the club to raise it's own profile whilst further developing links with the community.

The Roughveds have in the past made strenuous but financially restricted efforts to get into schools and promote the game locally. However, at a time where the Roughveds could have been forgiven for focusing solely on their immediate problems on the playing field, this success now presents the opportunity to make a significant investment in the game's longer term future in the town.

Whilst off the pitch developments are

moving along at a pace, it's clear that we are struggling on it. A return to Boundary Park and a significant investment in playing staff raised pre-season expectations to unprecedented levels. However, we have sadly not lived up to the hype as was demonstrated in our last outing which saw us suffer an embarrassing

defeat at the hands of you know who. Everybody has got an opinion as to why we presently find ourselves in this position. Indeed, I certainly have my own views but

these are neither appropriate or relevant to the purpose of this column. Whilst many people feel that some players are playing on past reputations when 'you are only as good as your last game'?.I certainly hope we are better than that!!

The only thing that is clear is that the slide cannot be allowed to continue indefinitely. With games running out, we need to be aware of the very real threat of relegation to NL2. That's a fate not even worth considering but. whatever your opinions as to where the problems lie, nobody doubts the club's efforts to get themselves out of the end of season mire. As hard as it may be at times, let's give our backing to the boys today as we enter yet another crucial period in the club's short

On a brighter note, today could see Cleggy's long awaited return to action. It's been a difficult period for him as he adjusts to life as a paramedic. Following a lengthy residential course in Bolton, he has then had to adjust to shift patterns that are not always conducive to semi-professional RL, particularly when the squad has been in for 'additional' sessions due to our recent run of form.

However, commonsense seems to have prevailed as the chairman, coach and player finally sat down together and came up with a tenable solution. It seems only two minutes ago that his farewell card was being passed around the Rochdale Road end, such is his affinity with the Roughyed faithful.

Far from facing the possibility of being thrown on the scrap heap, Cleggy had other clubs interested in acquiring his services but only had the heart for one club, his beloved Roughyeds. That kind of loyalty is a rarity today and, if ever there was a time when the club needed a player with his undoubted commitment to the cause, it's surely now,

Finally, the news of ex-Roughyed, Shayne McMenemy's move to a top five club will come of no surprise to anybody that saw him pull on the red and white. Shayne has continually stood out in a poor Halifax side and was released by mutual agreement in an act which shows an acknowledgement by Fax that they are NL1 bound next season. Shayne will undoubtedly make a good impression at the KC Stadium and we all wish him the very best of luck.

Words of Wilson

SINCE THERE is little positive to say about our performances during June - and especially the one at Rochdale - I thought it best to confine my comments this week to Super League. Given all the recent hype, about new, still higher standards on the field, and its super - competitiveness, just how valid is it?

At the start of the 2003 season, I had mentally divided the league into three groups - the top 5 (Bradford, Leeds, St. Helens, Wigan and Hull); the three strugglers (Halifax, Huddersfield and Wakefield); and the middle four (Castleford, London, Warrington and Widnes), one of whom would make the top six play offs. As I write, exactly 100 games have been played, with 32 more regular fixtures to come, and then the additional 36 before the play offs begin.

The extent to which the competition is genuinely competitive across the board can perhaps best be judged by how many results go counter to those that would be predicted by the above groupings. How many matches do the three strugglers win other than between each other? How many times do teams from the middle four defeat top five outfits?

So far, there have been eleven such 'shock' results. Of the bottom three Halifax have only the one-off first day win against London to their credit, Huddersfield have outstanding home wins over Saints and Wigan, and Wakefield have three 'scalps' - Warrington at home, and away to Castleford and Saints. Amongst the middle four, Castleford defeated Wigan at Wheldon Road, and Widnes recorded one of Leeds only two defeats so far, at the Halton Stadium; but the real 'shock' kings so far have been London, with incredible victories at

Bradford, Hull and Wigan.

How does this figure compare with last season, say? Then, there was a total of 20 such 'shock' results, a slightly greater percentage overall (though, it has to be said, five of those involved victories of the bottom three over Warrington, who hardly performed like a middle four side for most of 2002).

So this suggests that the hype is being a little overdone, perhaps? When you look at the current league table, my pre season top 5 are the top 5 clubs in the league, the middle 4 are the middle 4 and the three strugglers are in 10, 11 and 12th places - though undoubtedly Saints have under performed, and Huddersfield and London over performed, against expectation, marginally.

Maybe it is fairest to say that the jury is still out, with 68 fixtures still to play. And competitiveness is not just measured by results, but by the narrowest of winning margins as well; after all, what both TV viewers and match day attendances must want is a reasonably high degree of uncertainty of outcome. I am sure, for example, that the current very sad attendance at The Shay would rise considerably if the suffering Halifax public had a realistic expectation that their side would finish within, say, 10 points of their opponents - in fact, their current average losing margin is 25 points per match.

When you compare us with Australia, though, you can see that our premier competition still has a long way to go. Look at Penrith and North Queensland this season, compared with last, for example. Let us not claim qualities we don't yet possess.

THE National Leagues have reached their half-way point, making now the perfect time to assess how each side has fared so far.

SALFORD CITY REDS are sitting top of NL1, as widely predicted, but a defeat at Featherstone and two draws against Whitehaven have proved they are not the invincible force that was Huddersfield Giants last year. But they must still be seen as favourites.

LEIGH CENTURIONS are second, with just two blemishes - a shock defeat at Oldham and a 12-32 home loss to the Reds. At times they have looked every inch the NL1 title contenders that they are, and remain Salford's chief threat

But ROCHDALE HORNETS cannot be discounted after a highly encouraging start to the campaign. Pushed Salford all the way at Spotland to underline their credentials, and have arguably the best pack in the division.

HULL KINGSTON ROVERS turned their season around after a stuttering start, though the heavy loss at Leigh has set them back a little. Another side very tough to beat at home.

DONCASTER DRAGONS have been up and down - conceding over 40 points at home to Rochdale and Hull KR but then winning at Whitehaven. Can beat anyone on their day.

OLDHAM have been a disappointment so far, a stirring home defeat against Leigh apart. The 58-14 loss at rivals Rochdale will have hurt.

BATLEY BULLDOGS have failed to scale the heights of last season as yet, and only two wins against Dewsbury have kept them off the bottom. But capable of considerable improvement.

Currently bottom of the pile are DEWSBURY RAMS with just one win to their name, against Featherstone. Have it all to do to avoid relegation.

In Yer Face

I HAVE BEEN proof reading the latest book on Oldham R.L.F.C. which Brian Walker is bringing out in time for Christmas. It contains some wonderful archive material and some outstanding images and I would thoroughly recommend it as essential reading for all Oldham fans, a splendid complement to Michael Turner's excellent Complete History of Oldham R.L.F.C. 1886-1997.

In the course of studying the written material it is surprising how certain themes suddenly appear. One such is that what goes around, comes around. It is not, of course, a world shattering observation that every dog has his day but the alternation of periods of success with periods of failure gives hope to all followers of the game. It is well known that Oldham enjoyed great success in the period just before the Northern Union breakaway, in the early years of the twentieth century, throughout the 1920's. again in the 1950's and once more in the period 1979-84. So, if you feel that the Roughyeds are currently in the doldrums. don't despair. Eventually Oldham will become a force to be reckoned with once again, though there is no way of knowing how soon that may come about. But, if history teaches us one thing, it is that all great empires eventually fall. So the fans of Bradford and St. Helens should enjoy their success while they can, for nothing is more certain than that one day they will taste the bitter fruits of failure once more.

A second theme that struck me was that a catalyst is required to inaugurate a period of success. It could be dynamic leadership or it could be finance, as with the successful lottery Oldham operated around 1978-79 enabling Brian Gartland to secure the cream of junior talent that became Frank Myler's outstanding team of the early eighties and which produced five Great Britain tourists to Australia in 1984. However, whatever the behind the scenes inspiration it will always be matched by a couple of key elements on

the pitch. And, by my observations, those key elements, which can transform a workmanlike side into an outstanding one. are a pack leader and a play-making half back. In the 1950's Bryn Goldswain was Oldham's first key-signing in sparking a revival but the players who really made Oldham's great side (bearing in mind they had great players in every position) were Derek Turner and Frank Pitchford. And what really brought home to me the importance of these key elements was the emphasis placed by Brian Walker also to be found in Mike Turner's book on the signing in 1973 by a Ray Hatton inspired committee of Frank Foster and Cliff Hill ending the dismal record of the 1960's and producing at least a half decent team at last after a decade of failure. It set me thinking how my own boyhood team of Halifax turned around a similar lacklustre period with the signing of pack leader Ken Roberts from Swinton and Roughyeds please note - Alan Kellet from Oldham. In the next three years Halifax won the Yorkshire Cup, the Eastern Division Championship and the League Championship in 1965 from seventh position in the league.

In the Frank Myler side I would suggest the key elements were Mick Morgan and Ray Ashton with Terry Flanagan assuming a gradually more influencial role. And the moral of the story? Well, Oldham currently have a workmanlike side with a lot of good professionals. But what would happen if the club could add an experienced pack leader and a quality half back? Sometimes a couple of key signings are all it takes. We probably all have our ideas on who could benefit the current side and identifying the right men to be in the right place at the right time is the job of management. At the end of the day it's all a question of judgement. But getting it right defines that fine line between success and failure.

ON THIS DAY

.... with Don Yates



SIX years ago, on Sunday 13th July 1997, Featherstone Rovers faced a difficult trip to Naughton Park and a crucial fixture against Widnes. They tore into their opponents from the opening whistle and within guarter-of-anhour Rovers led 10-0. Although Widnes fought back to close the gap to a couple of points by half-time, Rovers made a similar start to the second half and went on to win by 30 points to fourteen. Current Roughyeds player-coach Steve Molloy scored one of the early Featherstone tries and there were other touchdowns from Australian centre Davy Kimmel, hooker Richard Chapman, winger Paul Gleadhill and stand-off Karl Pratt. Chapman (4) and another Australian, substitute Ty Fallins, landed goals. Also included in the Featherstone line-up that afternoon was centre Shaun Irwin who had been signed from Oldham. Another former Oldham player, Jamie Bloem, was at fullback for Widnes and he landed their goal whilst at scrum-half was Anthony Murray, the versatile wanderer who joined the Roughyeds last year but who has since continued his nomadic career by signing for Workington Town.

Forty-five vears ago the only rugby played at this time of the year took place down under in either Australia or New Zealand, On Sunday 13th July 1958 the British Lions met the New South Wales North Coast before a crowd of 5,541 at Lismore. A couple of Oldham players were included in the British line-up. centre Alan Davies and scrum-half

Frank Pitchford. Both scored tries as the Lions comfortably disposed of the opposition by 56 points to fifteen.

The 1946 British Lions included only one player from Oldham, second-row forward Doug Phillips. On Saturday 13th July 1946 he was a member of the Great Britain team which defeated Toowoomba 34-5. Four years ago, on Tuesday 13th July 1999, another touring team appeared in Toowoomba. They were the Great Britain under-16 squad who registered a comfortable 36-4 victory over the local schoolboys. Making a telling contribution to that victory was Alex Wilkinson, the talented former Royton Tigers centre who is currently with Hull in Super League.

The last British team to win a test series against Australia were the 1970 Lions. A member of that touring team was the Featherstone Rovers prop Jimmy Thompson. He appeared in the two tests against the Kangaroos which were won and also in the match against Newcastle which was played on Saturday 13th July 1970. The local side provided stiff opposition for the tourists although the Lions eventually came out on top, winning 24-14.

On Wednesday 13th July 1988 Great Britain were in New Zealand where they met a Wellington district team. The Lions were skippered by Oldham's Mike Ford that evening and another Oldham player, propforward Hugh Waddell, was also included in the British team. The home side also fielded a talented line-up with Mike Kuiti at loose forward. Kuiti later spent several years playing in England and enjoyed a couple of seasons at Watersheddings playing for the Roughyeds. Hugh Waddell was inspirational that evening and he led the late charge that brought three tries for the Lions in the closing 15 minutes and enabled them to snatch a 24-18 victory, which at one point looked unlikely.
